## Holiday schedules

Westmount City Hall, the public library and the Atwater Library will be closed all day Friday and Monday.

There will be no garbage collection on Good Friday. Collections normally scheduled for this day will be made Monday, March 30.

Protestant Schools in Westmount close today for the Easter holidays. They reopen Monday, April 6. Catholic schools are closed today and reopen Tuesday, March 31.

The Westmount Artificial Ice Rink will remain open Good Friday, Saturday and Easter Sunday in regular hours.

Offices of The Westmount Examiner will be closed Friday but reopen Monday.

## Board hands over Kings School for \$418,931.25

The former Kings School, a Western avenue landmark for generations, has formally been turned over to the New Rochelle Development Corporation, the Westmount School Board announced this week. They received a cheque for \$418,931.25.

While building plans are not yet complete, the corporation has announced that it intends to demolish the school building and replace it with an apartment building.

A spokesman said that the company would appeal to Westmount Council to re-zone the property for a twelve-storey building. Six is the present limit.

A six-storey building, said

the spokesman, would be "completely impractical on the site. This is one of the biggest lots available in years. We envision a 12-storey building with considerable set-back."

The Western avenue property contains 69,000 square feet.

## Dorchester area

## 16 new expropriations up cost to \$4,100,000

Westmount Council agreed Monday to pay \$650,000 for 16 properties expropriated for Dorchester widening and redevelopment. This brings to a total of 105 the number of properties bought. The total amount spent to date on expropriation in the area is \$4,100,000.

Council also approved a commitment of \$5,000 for "sales promotion" in connection with the redevelopment of the area. They intend to resell all of the land unused in the actual widening of the boulevard to developers of high-rise apartments. The commitment will enable the city to

prepare brochures, sales letters, and other material to send to various real estate agents and firms.

In other business, the City gave the go-ahead signal to Montreal subway workers on Western avenue who want to use noisy equipment past the normal curfew hour of 10 p.m.

The new ban will drop at 11 in the area of subway construction for the entire period of construction, an estimated 450 days. Council noted that this "gesture of cooperation" was to avoid interfering with normal shifts of the Montreal crews which end at 11. Work will resume at 7 a.m.

# WMA, Council seek citizens' views on park

City Council and the Westmount Municipal Association intend to actively seek the public view on renovations to Westmount Park, it was announced this week. What form the opinion sampling will take has not been decided.

Phase one of the renovation work will proceed as planned with work due to start Wednesday but "no further changes will be made before the question has been fully aired," WMA president J. H. Richer said Friday following a meeting between Alderman Fred Gross, Commissioner of Parks and Recreation, and members of the association executive.

"Everyone's view cannot be accommodated," Mr. Richer said. "A cross-section of opinion, however, would be highly desirable. We recommended that the subject be fully aired."

The Examiner, for its part, is conducting a special poll on the park plans and as a Westmounter you are invited to cast your ballot in this connection. Details and a ballot form will be found on page four. Readers may mark their preferences for or against the various proposed features for the park. Space is provided for comments.

He said that while members had "strong reservations" about many facets of the plan, generally speaking, we wanted to keep up the character of the park with lots of green areas, natural surroundings and space to wander about on the grass and not be channeled here and there."

The meeting with Alderman Gross and city officials, last of three, followed a formal protest to the council that plans outlined recently in the city newsletter might "alter the

If an emergency arises and you require the assistance of the Westmount Police don't waste time by trying to call WE, 5-3525, the number listed in the telephone directory. It has been disconnected.

Instead dial WE, 1-1711, the emergency number given out in November which may be used to call the police, to report an accident, a fire, a broken water main or pipes, a gas leak or any such emergency, day or night.

The WE, 5 number was abandoned this week when police moved into new quarters on Stanton street.

The new emergency number, WE, 1-1711 is contained on printed stickers sent out to every home in Westmount early in November. Police noted however that many local telephones still have attached another number used by the police and fire departments for many years. They advise that it too has been disconnected and suggest that WE, 1-1711 should be pasted over it on the phone.

## Firefighters 'save' Corporation Yards

Westmount's new auxiliary firefighting group, frustrated in their efforts to find an unneeded wooden shack to set ablaze for a final exercise, turned hoses against several "cool" buildings in the city's Corporation Yards Saturday. From their determination it was evident that no fire in the area would have stood a chance.

The Civil Protection volunteers demonstrated their ability on the ground and on ladders with two and a half inch lines and up to 120 pounds pressure in the hoses, strong enough to knock down the unskilled.

They kept the lines under control, however, and were mark-

ed on the basis of their performances combined with written tests taken earlier. Successful candidates receive a written certificate from Quebec, have their names added to the roster to be on call to assist the regular firemen in the event of a disaster in Westmount, such as a nuclear attack.

The eight men, meeting twice a week, received five weeks instruction from Fire Department Captains W. G. Black and H. McCoo.

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## 'Y' campaign is half-way

The Westmount YMCA's campaign to raise \$1,400 to help develop and strengthen overseas branches reached about the half-way mark in its first week of operation, it was announced Tuesday.

Westmount's campaign is part of an annual, continent-wide effort, said D. Y. Novinger, board chairman of the local branch. Last year, nearly 1,000 local YMCA's in the United States and Canada took part in raising about \$2,000,000 for their World Service program. The North American goal for 1964 is \$2,580,802, of which \$2,443,113 is being sought in individual contribu-

tions. This is the largest World Service goal ever set in the program's 75 year history.

Largest single item in the 1964 World Service program is for manpower, M. S. Davidson, World Service Chairman, said. Thirty-seven percent of this year's \$2,580,802 goal will go to support a staff of 67 North Americans serving YMCA's in 35 countries. This includes 56 Fraternal Secretaries, 3 short-term specialists, and eight Student World Service workers. Fraternal Secretaries, Mr. Davidson explained, are experienced North American Y men who go abroad on 3-5 year assignments. Their principle task is to train local men in each country to take the positions of leadership in their own YMCA's.

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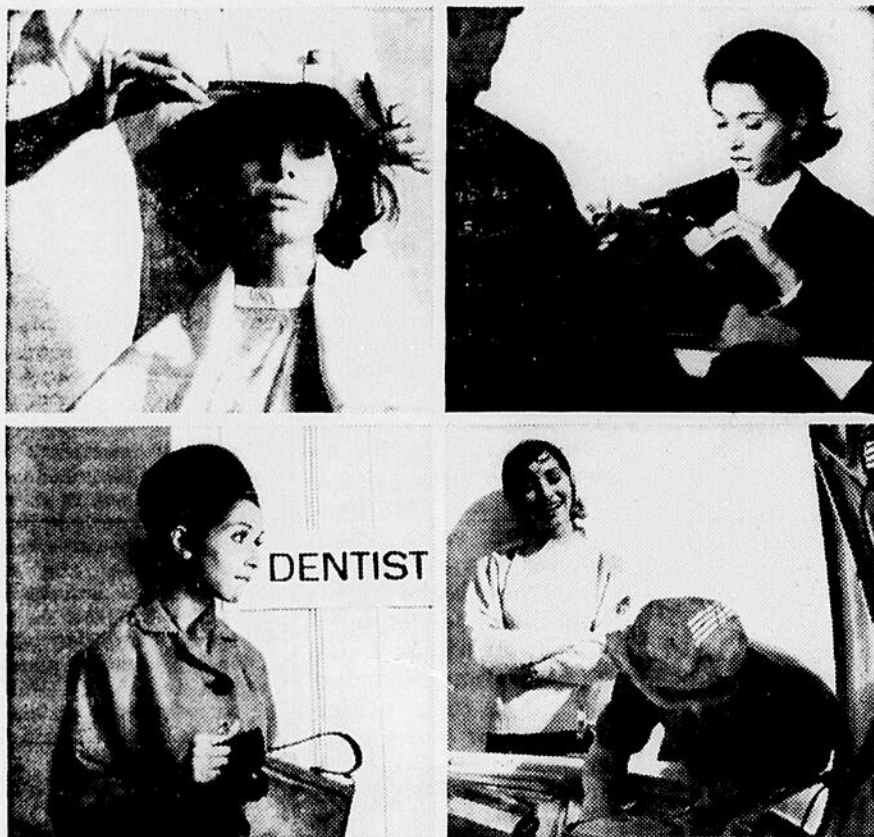

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## Water rates to come down

Westmounters, whose rental assessment rates remained relatively unchanged in the past year, can expect lower water taxes from Montreal in 1964-65. This was announced recently by Administration chairman Lucien

Saulnier in presenting highlights of Montreal's budgetary es-Westmount residents, along with those in Outremont, receive their water supply from Montreal and are billed at the same tax rate as in the big city.

According to Mr. Saulnier the reduction was necessary to compensate for an average five per cent increase in rental assessment for water and business taxes in Montreal. He complained, however, that the cut would not have the effect in most cases of alleviating the burden of the Montreal taxpayer, merely averting the necessity of paying a higher contribution.

### Saulnier hits Westmount again

He noted bitterly that the two suburbs appeared to get the better of the deal. "In the case of Westmount and Outremont it is good and well and lightening of taxation," said Mr. Saulnier, "as there have been no modifications of the rental assessment rolls of these two suburban cities."

"The law wills it thus," he added.

"In such a situation, the little hurray on our part in accepting the offer of the City of Westmount to pay a sum of \$75,000 annually as contribution toward the cost of construction of the east-west subway line will be

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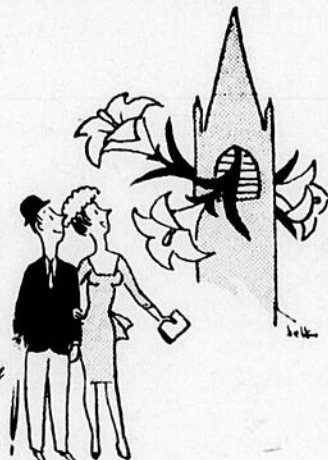

## It needs to be tried

THE first university in Canada to operate on a year-round basis will open in Burnaby, a suburb of Vancouver, next year. Simon Fraser University is to admit 3,000 students in the fall of 1965, and enrollment is expected to increase to 7,000 during the following six years.

The new school is to have three 16-week terms. Students will ordinarily attend two, but voluntary attendance at three terms will be possible and will allow a student to complete a four-year course in two and two-thirds years. Chancellor Gordon Shrum insists he is interested in quality, not quantity, although he admits that traditionalists may accuse him of favoring mass-production methods. "This idea of taking five months off from university studies to go working as a cook somewhere is no way to cope with the great increase in the amount of knowledge to be mastered," Chancellor Shrum said a while back. "We could cut a four-year course to at least three for gifted students if they had the chance to study the year round."

The year-round operation of universities may not be the ideal. It would not suit all schools, all staff or all students. But our resources for expanding university facilities are not unlimited, and year-round operation would permit more complete use of existing facilities. It is an idea that needs to be tried.

## BY THE WAY

THE Minister of Transport, says a report, is to inquire into the question of driving schools which subject learners to hypnosis, as an aid to passing the test.

To drive from, say, Lewisham to Barnet in a series of trances would relieve the monotony for even an experienced driver, so why not have a hypnotist seated beside every driver? Of course, if the magician was dishonest, or wanted a day in the country, the driver, on emerging from his trance, might find himself in Tavistock instead of Barnet. Not that I care a farthing rushlight.

## 26 Years Ago in The Examiner Friday, March 16, 1939

### Bloodshed averted by Hitler, Rotary is told

George W. Cavey, addressing the Westmount Rotary Club this week said he believed Hitler had done much to aid the lower income brackets and expressed the belief that bloodshed was averted by Germany's annexation of Austria.

Mr. Carey who had just returned from an extensive tour of Europe told of Italy's elaborate preparations to receive Hitler, noting that a special railway station was being constructed for the arrival. After his departure the station was to be levelled. In Italy Mr. Carey found considerable improvement in road conditions and expressed the belief that Mussolini was doing everything possible to advance the welfare of his people.

The speaker declared that Britain was following a wise course in trying to maintain the balance of power so long the basis of European policy.

### 'Begging' epidemic starts

An epidemic of "begging or panhandling" has broken out in Westmount it was noted this week. Police say the situation is becoming serious.

A resident reported that on one evening no less than three persons approached him within 15 minutes and requested the usual "dime for a cuppa coffee."

The sudden outbreak in the suburbs is believed traceable to an apparent "crackdown" on such activities by police in downtown areas due to the approach of the tourist season.

In Westmount the nuisance was not confined to begging on the streets and in many cases the offenders appeared at the door of homes, usually asking for a meal.

Westmount police believe that the influx will be short-lived. "We pick up panhandlers at times, but we make it so hot for them they seldom bother our citizens," said Inspector Gough. "If the accused has no record when arrested, he is given a suspended sentence. His second offence will bring a sentence of 15 days, however. We, at all times, co-operate with the police of neighboring departments in bringing offenders to justice and we pledge our hearty co-operation in this instance."

In view of the extraordinary interest aroused in recent plans for the revamping of Westmount Park and the desire for a sampling of public opinion expressed by City Council and the Westmount Municipal Association. The Examiner is conducting a special poll on the subject and as a Westmounter you are invited to cast your ballot in this connection.

In the special ballot accompanying this article, you are invited to mark your preference for or against the various proposed features for the park. Space is provided for comments.

Westmount officials have stated that they are willing to listen to all reasonable arguments, pro and con. YOU MAY HELP REDESIGN WESTMOUNT PARK.

A summary of the various proposed new features follows, corresponding with the accompanying ballot. Readers might also refer to the Westmount Newsletter recently distributed to every home in Westmount by the city.

REFLECTING P O O L, FORMAL GARDENS: These are planned to improve "the visual appearance of the park perimeter along Sherbrooke" and will be located opposite Stratheona avenue where the

cannons now stand.

EXTENDED PARKING AREAS: Additional parking facilities are planned behind the present flower clock stretching from Victoria Hall to Lansdowne avenue. The present parking area between the library and the park will be widened.

NEW FLORAL CLOCK SITE: The City's famous floral clock will be relocated in the centre of the formal gardens.

MOUND AREA NEAR SHERBROOKE: An earth mound with planting located behind the formal garden is planned to create "a background to stop the eye as well as a baffle for the children's play area beyond."

MALLS, PLEACHED TREE CANOPY: A paved mall area with a pleached tree canopy is planned in front of Victoria Hall extending around the east side so as to unify the Library and Palm House with the hall. The driveway in front of Victoria Hall will be pulled away from the building entrance.

LARGER PONDS: Existing ponds will be redesigned and extended in concrete. A brand new, irregular-shaped pond is planned for the centre of the park connecting with the present duck pond

by waterfall.

WIDER PATHS: The main arterial paths will be widened to 10 feet, an increase of two feet. New secondary paths, five feet wide are planned.

REVAMPED PLAY AREAS: The children's play areas would be divided by an overhead sun trellis and wash rooms. Benches are located under the trellis so that parents can watch and supervise their children on either side and still be protected from the sun. To the North of the overhead trellis, the area provided will accommodate existing play equipment for pre-school children. To the South the area accommodates existing play equipment for tots.

NEW REST ROOMS: It was recommended that the existing rest rooms be removed once the new buildings are erected. Their location becomes a dubious one inasmuch as they block the direct view of the main body of pond area and are some distance from the active areas."

ADDITIONAL TREE PLANTING: Conifers will be added in select area to create Winter color. Large shrub and ground cover areas are to be created as background.

## Paul Ouimet seeks more Cancer cash

The annual Canadian Cancer Society crusade to save more lives through research, education and service will be officially launched here April 20. Paul Ouimet, QC, former Westmount alderman, general campaign chairman has announced.

Mr. Ouimet, secretary of Quebec North Shore and Labrador Railway and solicitor of the Iron Ore Company of Canada, said it was hoped to raise \$300,000 in the Greater Montreal area and an additional \$250,000 in other parts of the Province. The national objective in the campaign throughout Canada, is \$3,985,000.

Mr. Ouimet said that 45 cents out of every dollar collected would go to research; 18 cents to education and 21 cents to welfare. Fund raising costs, he said, would not exceed six cents on the dollar and the remaining ten cents was for general overhead.

"We had a most successful campaign last year and through the help of our thousands of friends and volunteers we were able to slightly exceed our objective. I am positive we can do as well again this year."

The chairman said it was difficult to make the point, year after year, that the need was great, and that there was urgency in this appeal to raise the money to defeat cancer.

"But such is the case. One need only visit a hospital and talk to patients with cancer, or to their loved ones, to realize that cancer is a terrible disease and that it costs in terms of lives and unhappiness can scarcely be imagined," Mr. Ouimet said.

"We need volunteers to do the door to door bell ringing which is so important in raising funds and educating the public in ways to protect themselves from death from cancer. Because of the importance of the job to the community's welfare, I am sure the people will respond with enthusiasm out of a sense of duty and compassion for peoples' lives," Mr. Ouimet said.

In a brief outline of the work being carried out by the Canadian Cancer Society, Mr. Ouimet said it was the only national organization fighting the cause of

cancer and was active in every part of Canada from Newfoundland to the Pacific Coast.

The Society, he continued, was spending more than \$1,500,000 to finance research projects in the universities, hospitals and research laboratories throughout Canada. The Province of Quebec, he said, had become perhaps the greatest cancer research centre in all of Canada and each year the Canadian Cancer Society provides more than \$250,000 to finance these projects in Quebec institutions.

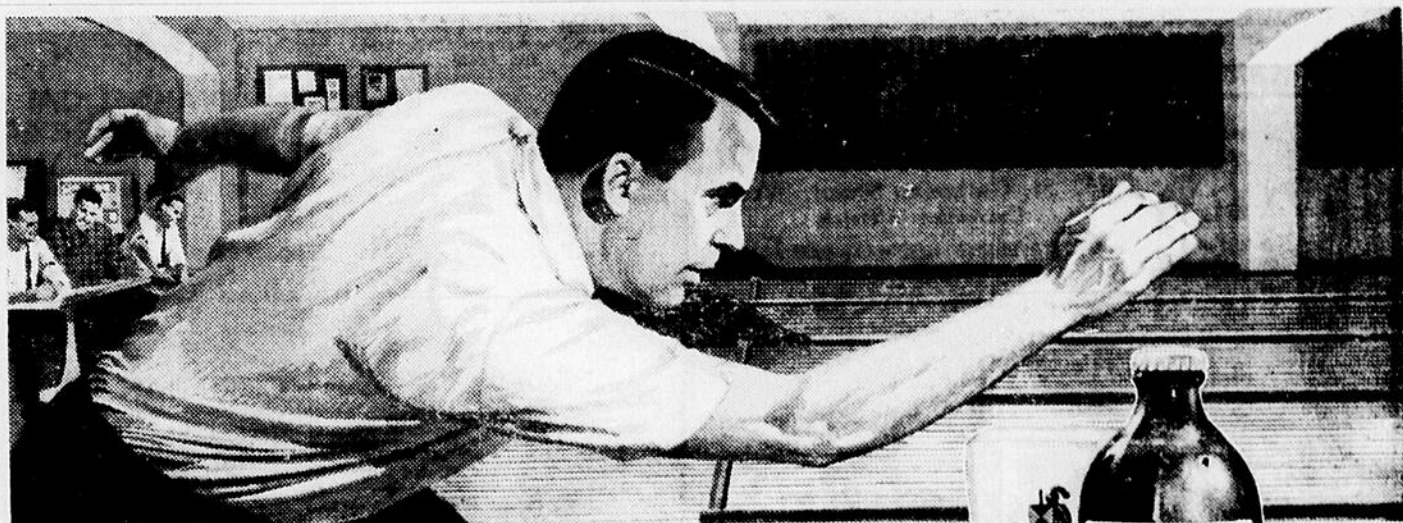

This is his third solo show in Montreal. Many of his works are in private collections and owned by business firms.

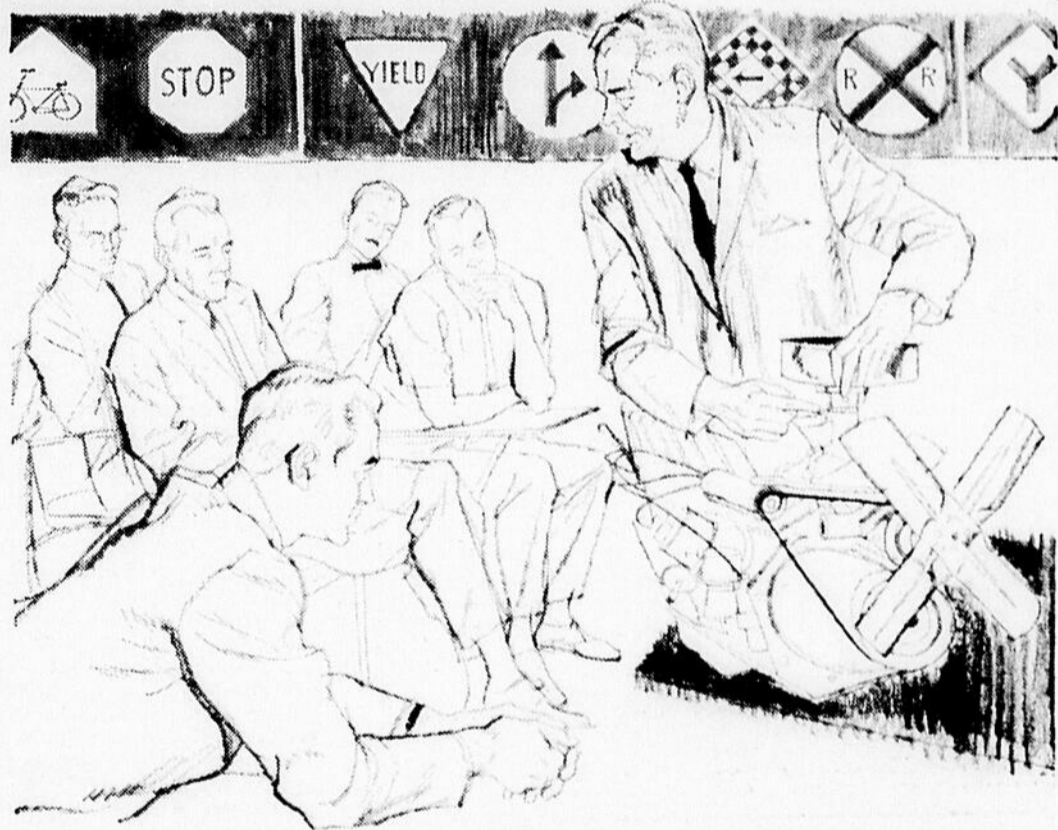
### Another exhibit

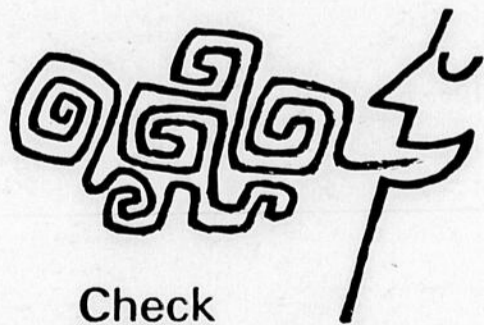

## Fry lamb for Easter meal

From pagan times to the present, roast lamb has been a traditional Easter dish.

In many European countries, Easter lamb symbolizes the triumph of good over evil and of spring and life over the temporary death of winter.

This Easter, add a new touch to your holiday meal with this recipe from the New Zealand Lamb Information Centre.

### Minted Glazed Leg of Lamb

5 to 6 lb. leg of lamb  
1 teaspoon rosemary  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1/4 cup mint jelly  
1/2 cup firmly packed, brown sugar  
6 or 8 medium potatoes, peeled

Roasting time is based on temperature of the lamb when it is taken from the refrigerator, completely thawed.

Wipe the meat with a clean, damp cloth; make several slits in the top fat; sprinkle with rosemary and rub into the cut surface; place fat side up, on a rack in shallow roasting pan. Do not cover or add liquid. Insert meat thermometer, if being used, in centre of roast so that

tip is not touching fat or bone. Roast until thermometer registers 170° for medium or 180° for well done. Allow 22 to 30 minutes per pound. Sprinkle roast with salt and pepper about half way through roasting time.

Melt mint jelly in a small saucepan. Mix in brown sugar; spread this glaze over meat about half hour before end of roasting time. Serves 6 to 8 with leftovers. Serve with Franconia potatoes, steamed carrots, green beans and mushrooms.

### Franconia Potatoes

One and a half hours before the end of the roasting time for the meat, place potatoes in roasting pan around lamb. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Turn occasionally to brown on all sides.

(Continued from page 3) understood. This subway line will cost the city of Montreal nearly \$100,000,000 and the terminal station will be situated precisely in Westmount."

Westmount will make its first payment to Montreal in January 1965, a spokesman said. The plan is subject to review one year after the subway begins operations.

Details of the offer were contained in a one page letter to Executive Committee chairman Lucien Saulnier.

Pending Montreal's approval, Westmount will apply to the Quebec Legislature for permission to levy a special tax to raise the annual contribution. "It will be similar to the tax which was to be levied by the old Metropolitan Corporation when they sought payments for the Metropolitan Boulevard," the spokesman said. The additional taxation law will be added to the city charter by private bill in the legislature.

Alderman Fred Gross outlined the complete program and explained that council had approved only the first phase of operations. He assured members that "phase one will not modify the basic appearance and function of Westmount Park. The city will also take into consideration any objections to future plans."

Work will include the replacement and redevelopment of the pond system, which formerly constituted a water course running through the park and down the Glen. Also scheduled is the replacement of the electrical system, installation of basic lighting equipment, preliminary grading to create a sizeable mound in the middle of the park near Sherbrooke.

Cost of this phase is \$203,000. General contractors are Charles Duranceau Ltd.

The girls, in groups of four with a bilingual counsellor for each group, will spend three days a week speaking and learning only in French. Three days a week all activities will be conducted in English. Sunday is the day when each child may speak her own language.

This "every-second-day" arrangement does not have the obvious drawbacks of a "crash-course," which often leaves a child tense and worried. Instead, she has a chance to relax in her own language after bouts of concentrated learning and listening. She is not always the humble learner at the bottom of the class, haunted by the feeling that she is never going to learn; sometimes she is the teacher, the one-who-knows, and this can be a heady feeling indeed.

## Paul Kenwood reports record volume moved
