TRADE & COMMERCE.

Montreal, September 20.

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during the Exhibition week, prevents us from giving our usual monthly comparisons, but it will appear on Saturday if we are not forced to continue the present form. The money market continues without feature calling for special comment. Good commercial bills are readily negotiable at 6 1/2 per cent, as to name and date. Call and short-dated loans, on acceptable collateral, are made at 3 1/2, 4, and time loans at 4 1/2 per cent. The market for Sterling Exchange today was dull and inactive, but the rates are nominally unchanged at 8 1/2 @ 8 3/4 premium for round amounts of 60-day bills between banks, and 8 1/2 @ 8 3/4 cash over the counter, demand bills being quoted at 8 1/2 @ 8 3/4 premium. Documentary are issued at 7 1/2, and drawings on New York are 1-16 @ 4 premium. The Stock market today was moderately active and stronger all round at the first board, and in the afternoon was firm, without much business in Bank Stocks. Montreal sold at the first Call at 153 1/2 @ 154, and closed in the afternoon at 153 1/2, 153 3/4 asked. Ontario were placed 1/2 higher at 86 1/2 @ 86 3/4 and closed steady at 86 1/2 @ 87. Molsons moved up one point, from 97 to 98 ex-div., and closed at 97 1/2, 98 1/4 asked. Merchants opened stronger at 104 1/2, and advanced to 105 1/2, at which shares were placed at the second Call. Commerce were inactive but firmer at 128 bid, 129 1/4 asked. Exchange changed hands at 55, and stood at the end of the day at 54 for buyers, 57 for holders. Montreal Telegraph led off 1 per cent. higher at 134, and closed a little easier at 132 1/2, 133 asked. Richelieu, ex-dividend, sold at 61 1/2 @ 61 3/4, and closed at 60 bid, holders firm at 61 1/2. City Passenger opened 2 per cent. better at 118, advanced to 118 1/2, and closed at that figure for sellers, 117 1/2 offered. City Gas sold up from 148 1/2 @ 149, reacted to 148 1/2, and closed steady at 148 1/2 @ 149 1/4. The transactions were:

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BUTTER AND OLEOMARGARINE.

The dairymen are becoming alarmed by the rivalry of Oleomargarine, and are anxious to consider what can be done to protect them and the public. The law of several States requiring this imitation to be so plainly marked that all who buy may read, is said to be a dead letter. Nearly all the Butter dealers sell the composite article, and so perfect is the imitation that few but experts can detect it. It is not claimed that more than five per cent of Butter is used in Oleomargarine, and it is estimated that ten cents a pound covers all the cost of the materials and manufacture. As it is sold to dealers within three or four cents of the price of dairy Butter, it will be seen that their manufacture must be very profitable. The manufacturers have called to their aid eminent professors in chemistry, who give it as their opinion that Oleomargarine is fully equal to pure, fresh dairy Butter. If they would sell it for just what it is, and not attempt to deceive consumers by offering it as dairy Butter, they would disarm their opponents, and not be liable to the charge of deception. In that case, those who choose to use the manufactured compound would do so with a full knowledge of what they were eating. If it is healthful and nutritious as they affirm—as good and cheaper than the old-fashioned Butter—they should not attempt to palm it off as something which it is not. No adequate remedy will be found for the deception until the public so far interests itself in securing unadulterated food as to insist upon the violation of the law, and prosecute offenders to the full extent of the law. If the present statutes are inoperative, let more stringent ones be enacted.—N. Y. Shipping List.

LIVERPOOL PRODUCE MARKET.

LIVERPOOL, September 9.

Butter.—For really choice Butter and the best brands of Butterine there is a good demand, and sales of such are readily made at an extreme quotation, and occasionally a little more, but the bulk of the stock offering consists of stale or strong Butter which has been good once, but gone stale with age. Stocks command a premium to accumulate, and holders make concessions if they could dispose of quantity, but buyers take only small lots, and have the advantage as to price. The receipts from America and Canada for the week ending are 18,096 packages.

Cheese.—The market has ruled quiet throughout the week, with buyers again taking small quantities, and generally at inside rates. The bulk of the sales are at 63s. @ 64s. and 65s. is made with great difficulty and only for very choice goods. American advices are stronger towards the close, and with the trade generally carrying over light stocks. It looks like a stronger market here next week. The receipts from America and Canada for the week ending are 15,352 packages.—Geo. A. Cochrane & Co. Circular.

SUMMARY OF NEWS.

DOMINION.

In the Belleville Council the other day, Alderman Pettie, who is a Conservative, and voted for the N. P., declared that the population had fallen off so much that it would not exceed 9,000. Another Alderman stated that all the mechanics and labourers got lower wages than formerly. How is that for the N. P.?

UNITED STATES.

Fears are entertained for the safety of the "Inman" steamship "City of Chester," which left New York on the 9th inst. and is overdue at Liverpool. The steamer was spoken on the 14th by the "City of Berlin."

GREAT BRITAIN.

Lords Dalhousie, Sandhurst and Thurlow have been gazetted Lords-in-Waiting.

Lord Orammore and Browne has received another postcard telling him not to delay over making his will.

It is expected that the result of the Election Commissions will be the disfranchisement of seven or eight seats, which, with the six already disfranchised, will give Parliament more than a dozen to allocate to new and existing constituencies.

Lord and Lady Dufferin will leave Russia for England immediately after the departure of the Russian Court for Laidia. Lady Dufferin is not in the best of health. Her summer sojourn at the health resort (so-called) of Navara, so far from refreshing her constitution, has done her harm, and it will take several months in England to fit her for a second Russian winter.

FOREIGN.

Two thousand Parisian cabinet-makers are on strike.

A Vienna despatch says that Bismarck's new Customs policy encounters much hostility there.

Admiral Lesovsky, commander of the Russian fleet in the Pacific, arrived at Nagasaki, August 30.

The British Consul at Van Armenia has telegraphed Mr. Goshen, the British Ambassador, that the Kurds have devastated 13 Armenian villages.

THE FRENCH CABINET.

The friends of France would undoubtedly all the other things being equal, have desired that she should be able to continue her political course, with an united Cabinet, consisting of the same men. Change in the personal composition of the Administration in itself seems to carry with it, at least, the suspicion of instability in the institutions of a country whose institutions are so fluctuating, and, therefore, for the moment, so dependent on personal influences. We, therefore, regret to read of the recent break-up of the DeFreycinet Cabinet. Nor can the occasion of the retirement of the late Premier be altogether satisfactory to men who believe in the principle of perfect freedom, and fear that even toleration for practices, not evil per se, is too near an approach to freedom for those who are the present rulers of the country. M. DeFreycinet, a Protestant himself, naturally wishes to avoid anything like measures of persecution, restraint, or coercion to religious bodies. He has on all occasions, both by his administrative acts and by his public speeches, indicated his wish to avoid the extreme application of the decrees against the religious houses. The ideal of liberty is that which prevails in a State where all parties are allowed to act according to their own views of religious faith and duty, without offensive interference with or from others, and, least of all, without repression from the State. But it must be acknowledged that it evinces great firmness of principle, and great faith in the ultimate triumph of justice, to maintain in practice these liberal doctrines for the sake of those who do not even pretend that they would act upon them, except under circumstances which render any other system inexpedient, that is to say, impossible. It must be a severe trial of confidence in sound principle which can make a statesman grant free course to an able and dangerous propaganda against the foundation of the existing national polity, and that in the name of freedom of conscience, claimed by a Church whose chief dignitaries at Rome are at the same moment protesting against the permission to open Protestant Churches within the city. Freedom ought to be reciprocal; and its reciprocity ought to be avowed by those who claim its benefit. It is not a blessing that one class can demand for itself, while avowing that, if it concedes it to any other class, it does so not as matter of right, but only on account of necessity. It is, nevertheless, not the religious dissidents from the Roman Catholic Church in France who are pressing for the expulsion of the religious orders; men brought up in that Church's own bosom, who are violently rebounding from her into the various degrees of unbelief. In a recent controversy in the London Times, Mr. Pressense, the Protestant pastor, who had been alluded to by M. Martin, a Jesuit, as an advocate of the decrees against the religious orders, showed that he had both written against them, and, if we remember rightly, had voted against them as a member of the Chambers. He declared that the French Protestants while they had cause to complain of intolerance wherever, in France or Europe, men of their faith were powerless, were nevertheless, as a body, opposed to intolerant measures. The Protestant, De Freycinet, in the same spirit manifested by M. Pressense, resigns his post as Premier rather

than go to extremes against the Orders. While feeling that this is the just and, therefore, the best side of the controversy, however, we cannot be much surprised that the bitterness with which the Republic is fought by the Church—of which we have ample proof in our own French journals—should produce bitterness in turn. And as to the particular point now at issue—that religious orders are not to be allowed in France without express authorization of the Government—there can be no doubt in the mind of any one acquainted in the least degree with French law or French history that, reasonably or unreasonably, it was the inflexible rule of the old Monarchy in its most Catholic times. The Orders may say, no doubt, that these are not Catholic times, and that this makes all the difference in the application of the rule. But the Government may reply that the prerogative has never been abandoned; and as it was formerly exercised to prevent certain movements which were then judged, for political reasons, to be abuses, so it may still be rightly employed to prevent abuses, perhaps of another kind, which are adjudged to be so by the political sentiment of the time. Whatever justice there may be in any of these arguments it seems only too certain that the conflict between the Republic and the Roman Catholic Church is about to assume a new and still more acrid phase.

THE NEW FISHERY DIFFICULTY.—The new fishery legislation, if it has occurred as reported by the Americans, does not seem to be so susceptible of justification as the first affair of the same kind undoubtedly was. The story is that the schooner "Moro Castle" was anchored in Conception Bay on the 4th August. The captain had come there for the purpose of buying bait, and was ashore probably with this object. During his absence the seamen threw their lines overboard to catch squid; but they were boarded by about three hundred Newfoundlanders, who drove them under hatches, and got the vessel under way. Before the captain got on board again, the captors had left the schooner, but not till she had nearly gone ashore. Another vessel had been "treated" in a similar way the day before. We do not know upon what grounds these proceedings took place. The previous so-called "outrage" was only an outrage, if so at all, on account of the unofficial and irregular manner of preventing an unlawful act. The Americans then were breaking a reasonable law for the regulation of the fishery, which prohibited Sunday fishing, and to which they, like the natives, were bound to pay respect. But if they were not so bound, they were still doing an act not authorized by treaty, and, therefore, illegal, as they had expressly disclaimed before the Commission any pretence of right to seize herring from the shore. Whatever right a mob might or might not have to interference, and whatever claim for damages might or might not arise from such interference, if unauthorized, the fact was that the Americans were infringing the law, as avowed in the most distinct manner by their own representatives at Halifax. But, incidentally, these same representatives did claim the privilege for Americans, or did at least assert their custom, of jigging squid, and we do not know that this pretension was combated. That is not a conclusive argument as to legal right; but it goes some way to show that the fishermen in Conception Bay were probably doing what they supposed to be fairly within their guaranteed freedom of fishing. We shall probably soon hear the Newfoundland account of the affair, which may put quite a new colour on it. It would seem, however, desirable at least that whatever force is employed to repress illegal fishing on the coast, should be placed under some public and responsible authority. Mobs of regulators are only too well fitted to do acts which must lead to international complications of a very serious character.

DRUGGISTS AND PHYSICIANS.—The Medico-Legal Society, of Philadelphia, has made a report on the relations between physicians and druggists, of considerable importance to professional men and to their patients. The report states that many regulars, as here, receive a regular percentage from the druggists on all their prescriptions; and that, on the other hand, some of them pay the druggist a commission on patients recommended by the latter. The report, of course, points out the injustice to honest and independent practitioners, and especially to patients, of this irregular proceeding. It naturally enhances the fair price of medicines by the 25 or 30 per cent. of commission; but it does worse than that, because it makes it difficult for the physician to insist, as he ought to do, on the purity of the drug, which are compounded in answer to his prescriptions. The doctor prescribes quinine; the druggist substitutes the less expensive quinaldine, and charges for quinine or uses an inferior or adulterated article. This practice is quite extensive. Diluted tinctures are employed; bismuth adulterated with arsenic is made to serve for pure bismuth in infantile troubles; the child dies, and the doctor gets the blame. He justifies the blame he has dabbled in the dishonest practice of taking commissions; for that makes him a partner in the fraud. The Philadelphia report seems to us to be rather too hard upon the druggist, and not sufficiently severe on the physician, in distributing the blame of these very improper practices. But it lays down as a remedy that physicians should once more make up their own prescriptions. If they would all begin to do as the respectable men among them do already, however, refuse commissions, they would be independent of the druggists, and would doubtless be then able to enforce from the latter an honest compliance with prescriptions.

NEW JOURNAL.—The manoeuvre by which the Government procured from a single arbitrator an award of \$100,000, which it subsequently paid to a contractor, whose demand had been dismissed by the Exchequer Court after an open hearing before the Judges, is being repeated on a large scale. A great number of claims made by contractors on the Intercolonial, which Mr. Mackenzie refused to acknowledge, are being re-opened before Mr. Shanly, acting under the orders of the Government. All these cases could be tried before the Exchequer Court; but this Court has been just enough in such suits to give judgment in favour of the Government defendant. This is not what the Government defendant wants. It desires to be enabled to reward and create partisans, and to enable Conservative lawyers, who are also members of Parliament, to make great fees by pressing claims which are sure to be successful under such circumstances. There is every probability

of another big bill for extras, decided upon by just such another secret tribunal of one, as that held by Mr. Samuel Keefer, by direction of the Minister, for the purpose of awarding the \$100,000 already mentioned. Mr. Caron, M.P., is said to be very active in promoting some of these claims.

ON—Sir Leonard Tilley only made a few good-natured remarks to the proprietors of the brewery at Halifax, and only said he hoped that if people would drink beer, they would drink that of the N. P. quality—good or bad, we suppose. That is the revised Conservative version of the Minister's wishing God-speed to the makers of what, at a recent meeting, he would call liquid damnation. Only think of such an explanation of God-natural remarks, that is, the concoction of perdition, to thousands, according to Sir Leonard's theories, when on the platform! Apply that to the dealers in other and more undoubted wickedness, and see how it would look for Sir Leonard to say, in a good-natured way, that he hoped, if people would be immoral, they would spend the money on national establishments of vice, and that the panders to sin in France during his fostering care, all the mischief was done, and the profit made by those who handle the native article. What ideas of morality and consistency Conservative journalism breeds?

THE BALANCE OF TRADE.—Those who imagine that unless the value of a country's exports exceeds that of its imports, such country is going to the dogs, will be astonished, no doubt, at the present state of affairs in France. France is, undoubtedly, one of the most prosperous countries in Europe. Yet a late return of the imports into France during the eight months ending August 31, show an increase, compared with the corresponding period in 1879, of 250,000,000 francs. The exports have increased 108,000,000 francs during the same time. The total imports exceed the exports by 1,098,000 francs. It has been claimed that the great cause of France's increased wealth is the rigid protective system which she enjoys, but this system, at all events, has not brought about a "balance of trade" in her favour, and the experience of France leads one to believe that the "balance of trade" is no criterion whatever of a country's prosperity or depression.

CLERICAL INTERFERENCE IN POLITICS.—It is rumoured in Quebec that, on a recent occasion, when a number of the clergy were assembled, the Archbishop addressed them a very earnest exhortation to adhere to the directions given by the joint letter of the Bishops, during the visit of Monseigneur Conroy, and to avoid violent interference in politics. It is said that the Archbishop was particularly emphatic in pointing out the evil of such scandals as were disclosed by the evidence in the Berthier election case.

THE TORONTO SHOW.—According to the Hamilton Times, in the desire to make out a great crowd at the Toronto exhibition, it has been found impossible to tell within 20,000, one way or another, the numbers who paid for admission.
