No word at 401 of flying 'cul'

Future of 401 City of Westmount's Auxiliary Squadron hung in the balance this week as reports and rumours and reports continued to circulate that all RCAF auxiliary squadrons were to be abolished.

Word of the proposed cuts first came from John B. Hamilton, Progressive Conservative MP for York West while he was addressing the Canadian Owners' and Pilots' Association annual convention last weekend. He intimated that it would be impossible for the weekend flyers to handle the super-sonic CF-105 fighter scheduled for service within the next two years.

Next day Defence Minister Pearkes denied the existence of any plan, and said the squadrons would continue to serve as partially trained personnel.

Squadron Leader Sanders, commanding officer of 401 Squadron told The Examiner that so far he had received no official communication concerning the squadron's future. He knew only what he had read in the papers.

"But," he said, "I know that the members of my squadron will be able to fly any new replacements that they care to give us. We have successfully flown both Sabres and T-33s for quite a while now, and we can handle anything else that comes along."

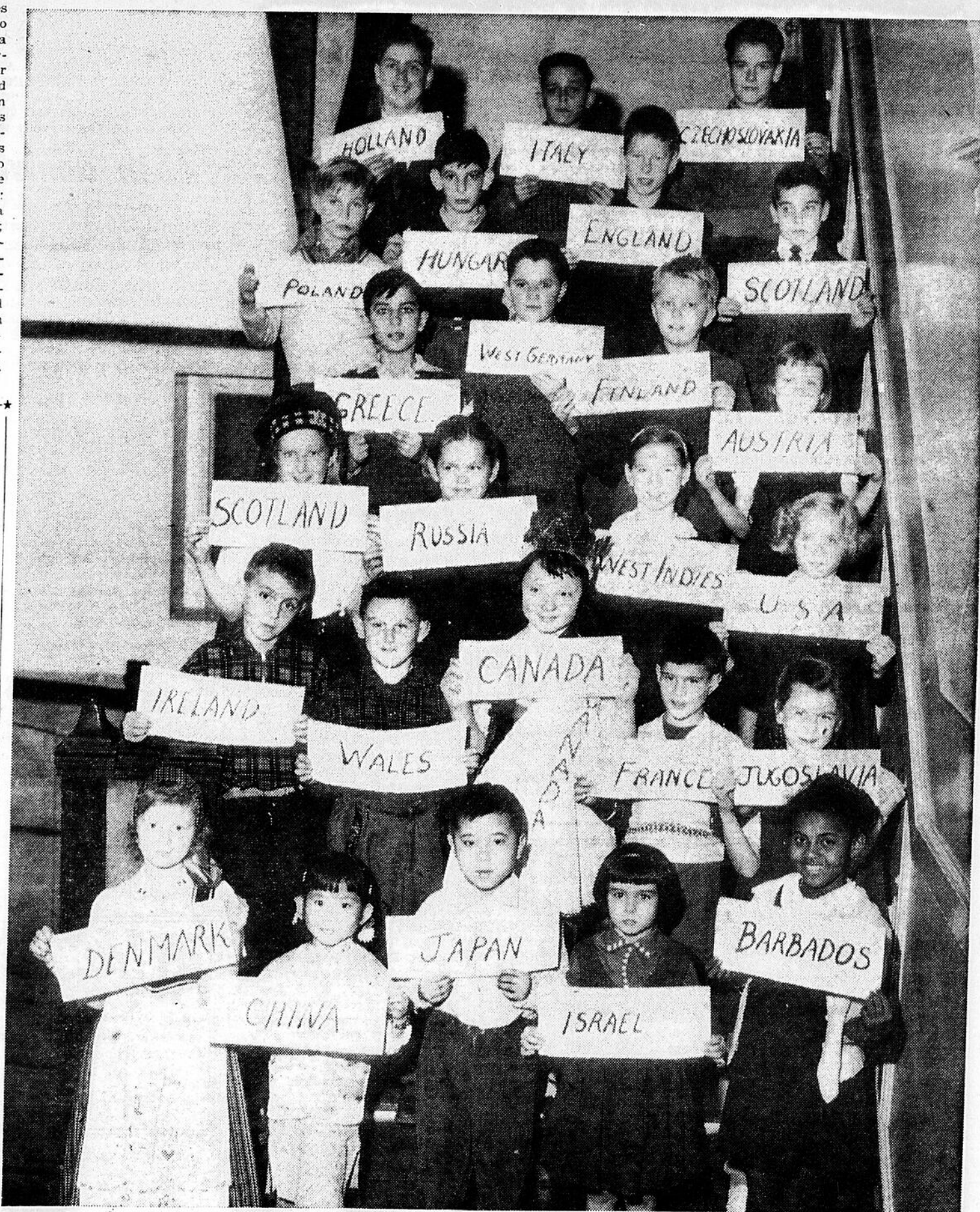

work in column on October 28th. Ice surface is expected to be available for part of the 1958 hockey and skating season. The city has advised that loud-speakers would not be heard outside of the building. Small soft-toned speakers will be spotted inside the rink for local sound. The cost to Westmount proprietors of the rink is expected to be about 54c per \$1000 of assessed valuation for the first ten years and 28c per \$1000 for the following 20 years. The artificial ice rink will cost about \$25,000. per year for running expenses, most of which is expected to be off-set by savings elsewhere.

School board signs option for AA ground

L. M. Nelson, chairman of the Westmount Protestant School Commission, has announced that his board has signed an option to purchase from the City of Westmount a portion of the Westmount Athletic Grounds as a site for a new Senior High School.

The site will provide access to a fully equipped playing field immediately behind the school. The playing field and track will remain the property of the city and continue under the management and control, the school supplying the necessary dressing room facilities.

As soon as the necessary approvals of this project are obtained and the property acquired, it is the Board's intention to push the planning and construction of the school with all possible speed.

Restrain censure of youthful fun

HALLOWE'EN is one of the highlights of the year for the children, from tiny tots to teenagers.

It is one of the few occasions when they can give play to their natural inclination for fun and mischief without coming under too severe censure.

The tiny tots will collect, for UNICEF or otherwise, their peanuts, apples, candy and pennies, and get home to bed early, tired but happy. The older ones will probably cause you, and us, and some of our friends a bit of annoyance.

Older youngsters' pranks can be annoying; but restrain that impulse to call the police as you remember your own escapades as a youngster.

Call the police if pranks are costly or dangerous, by all means. Otherwise, be reasonable and tolerant. The police will be busy enough with their legitimate duties without having to run around because some unknown character in a false face has been ringing your doorbell or putting a buzzer to your window.

Neglect injures 73,000 persons

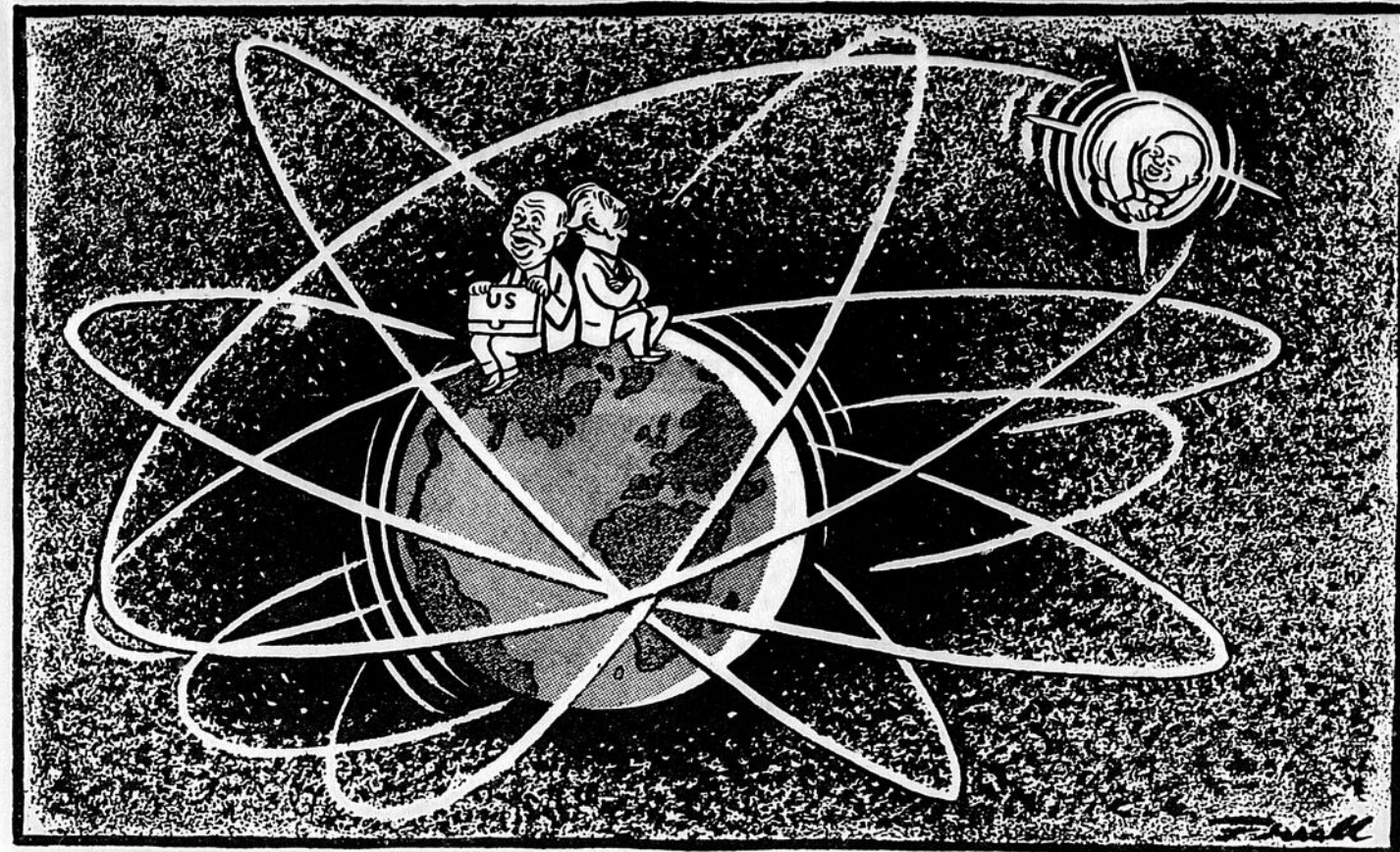
LAST year, nearly 73,000 Canadians were injured as the result of traffic accidents.

Most of these injuries were caused by neglect or by poor driving practises.

Each year, many persons are killed or injured as they stand on the highway after their car has been disabled or involved in an accident.

Insurance reports offer these recommendations for safety in such highway emergencies:

(1) Never stop on the travelled portion of the highway unless it is absolutely necessary. Find a spot where you can

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park with all four wheels off the pavement;

(2) Leave your parking lights on at night and do not block the rear lights with your body while you are changing a tire or repairing your car;

(3) Always carry a flashlight in good condition for use in locating trouble or signalling for help;

(4) Self-igniting flares of the type used by police forces can be obtained from safety supply houses and are often handy for signalling or warning oncoming traffic of an emergency;

(5) Use extreme caution when walking for help on highways or expressways. At night, try to wear or carry a light-colored article or flashlight;

(6) If possible, ask a passing motorist or police officer to send help. Do not leave your car unattended;

(7) If you stay in your car with the motor running while waiting for help, keep windows open to avoid the possibility of monoxide poisoning.

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Something I Want To Say:

A year since the Suez crisis

IT is now a year since the Suez crisis, since Israeli, French and British troops moved in on Nasser in a final attempt to claim a considered right to the Suez canal.

Now the man who worked so hard to bring a troubled peace to the Middle East has been awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. Today, in the shifting sands of Middle Eastern diplomacy his effort seems very small. But at the time it was valuable, and his work has been recognized.

In London there will be few who will want to remember the stormy week that followed those first parachute landings. In fact, it was a week most people prefer to forget. A time when families and friends were in violent disagreement. When papers of world-renown and responsibility, such as the Manchester Guardian and Sunday Observer, posed a bitter moral question with cold, biting criticism.

It was a time when young airmen refused to fly bombing missions, students fought policemen, and the Speaker of the House of Commons had to suspend the House to allow tempers to cool off.

EVERY COLOR

THERE was little political feeling in it. Even in the House, Conservative and Labor back-benchers alike were in revolt against the party line; and meetings organized by the parties were attended by Conservatives, Liberals, Socialists and every color from blue to a blood-stained red.

Everybody seemed to have concrete views. There were no shrugged shoulders or half-thoughts. Just one question. Right or Wrong?

Sales of newspapers rose and fell almost as rapidly as the shells in Egypt.

There was one person, I remember, a large, red-faced worker in the docks. A staunch union man who had read the Daily Mirror every day for 20 years. Now he disagreed with that paper's attack on Sir Anthony Eden. So every lunch-time he sat down, crossed his legs and read the Conservative Daily Telegraph—a paper usually

read by retired generals, university graduates and professional men. He was a man of few words, and that was how he registered his protest. He has never bought the Daily Mirror since.

At the opposite end of the scale there was the young Under Secretary with a distinguished career ahead of him, who resigned his cabinet position.

RIGHT OR WRONG?

FOR everybody there was one question only: Right or Wrong?

It isn't hard to recall the events of what became known as the "Suez Weekend." Aneurin Bevan, claimed as the greatest orator after Sir Winston, stood under Nelson's column carefully modifying his tone to contain the anger of a crowded Trafalgar square. The violent scenes in Whitehall were smoothed over only by the calm insistence of the police.

And then a protest march of 2,000 people from Hyde

Park corner. Grim, joyous and worried people who fondly believed they were following the five men in dark raincoats, who headed the procession to another meeting. Instead they ended up foot-sore in North London. It was reported later that the five men were plainclothes policemen. A typical blend of comedy and purposefulness.

Later, after the stunned silence of the Conservative Party the bold attempts to justify all that had taken place. The insinuations, documentary evidence and the counter-charges of collusion.

STILL ARGUED

YOU can still hear it argued in a bar when people have drunk too much. The same question: Right or Wrong? And the old arguments come tumbling out of the cupboard, to be dusted and polished and gone over again.

It was a hectic week. A time when you were either "British" or "Un-British," a pacifist or a warmonger.

But above all it was a time when a nation examined its conscience. And nations, just like individuals, don't like to remember the time when they found it necessary to do so.

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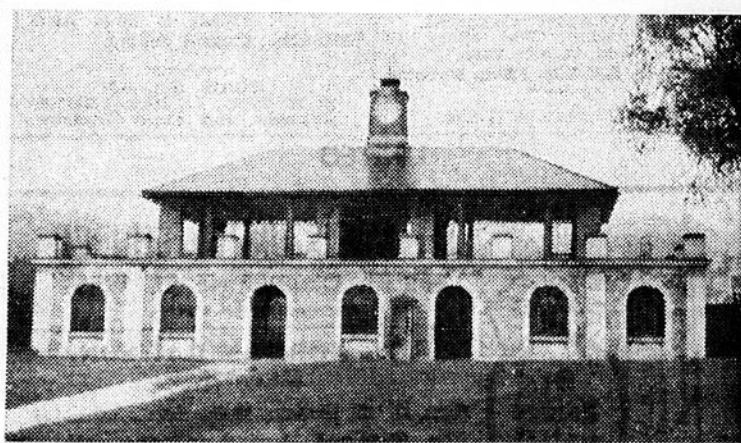

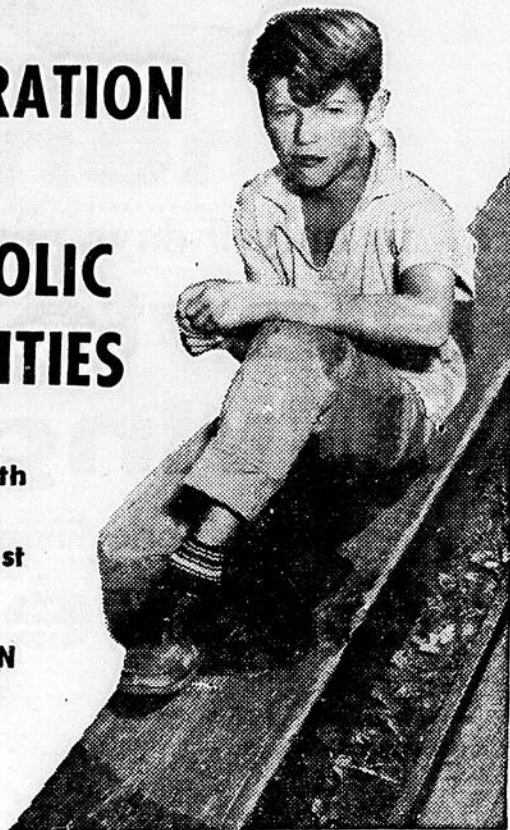

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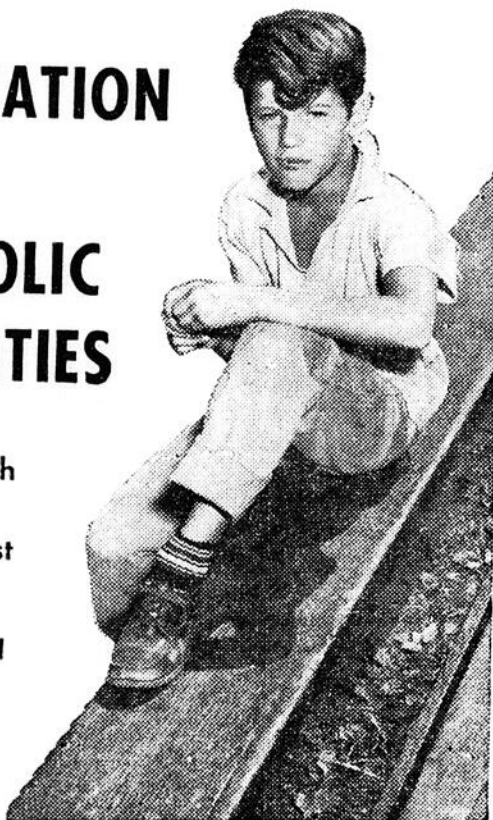
