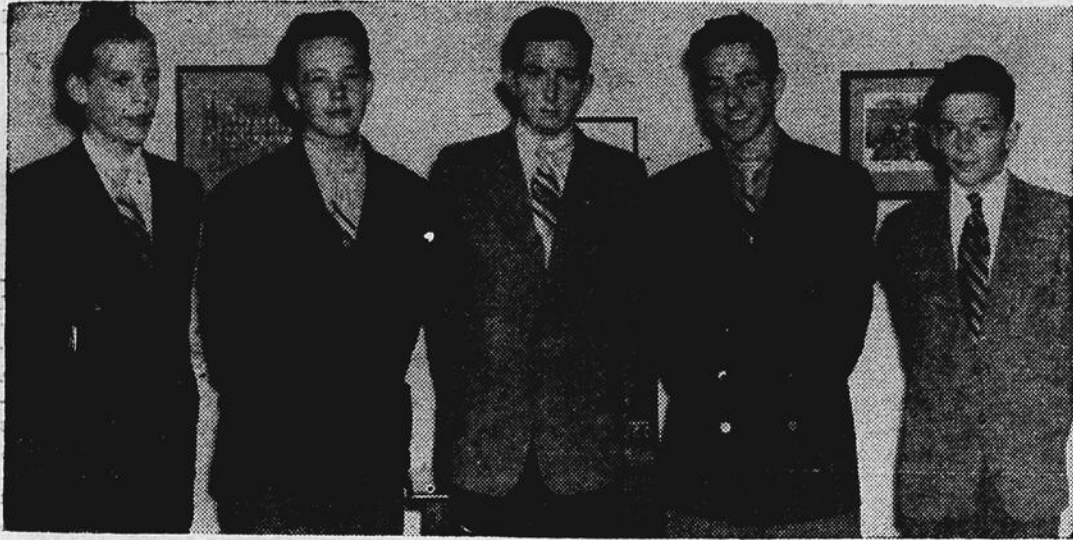

Westmount Students At Selwyn House Win Scholarships

Largest Chair Displayed Here On Victoria Ave.

A chair reputed to be the largest in Montreal is now on show at 380 Victoria Avenue. Owner L. Greenbaum, of 4847 Sherbrooke Street West, thinks it to be one of the largest in the country.

Built for the Speaker of the Quebec Legislative Assembly, it is easily roomy enough to comfortably seat the champion of the fat boys. The seat of the chair is 40 inches wide and 34 inches deep, big enough to make a six foot man look like a midget.

Former owner of the chair was Hon. F. O. Faillon, speaker of the Assembly, 1882-83. The present owner, Mr. Greenbaum, has purchased it for display at his antique shop. Offered \$300 for it, he refused saying it was more valuable as a curio.

Constructed of solid walnut in the Louis XIV baroque style, this chair, two inches shy of being six feet tall, is a masterpiece of craftsmanship. It will be on display in the window at 380 Victoria Avenue.

Motorman Blames Boys For Mishap

The motorman of an East-bound tram on Sherbrooke Street told the Westmount police he couldn't avoid striking two boys bicycling in front of his tram at Arlington Avenue.

He said the boys, Ian McLeod, of 4835 St. Catherine Street, and George Young, of 454 Grosvenor Avenue, both 15 years old, were fooling about on their bicycles in front of his tram.

He told the police that their bicycles locked handlebars swerving into the line of the streetcar. He signalled to them, applied his brakes, but said it was impossible to avoid hitting them.

Both bicycles were smashed, but the boys luckily were thrown clear of the wheels.

Norman Holland Reports More Calls On Last Post

Norman Holland, 3749 Westmount Boulevard, was re-elected president, of the Dominion Council of the Last Post Fund and the Quebec Provincial Branch, at the 42nd annual meeting held in the Ritz-Carlton Hotel on Thursday.

Mr. Holland in his report stated that the Last Post Fund was established here 42 years ago to ensure that no veteran of the Empire's armed forces should ever be buried in a pauper's grave. The organization has buried 17,177 ex-service persons on the North American Continent, Mr. Holland said. He added that \$1,798,187.95 had been expended by the Fund in its work.

V.C. Winners Buried

Mr. Holland said that in the Field of Honor at Pointe Claire there were now 1,755 ex-service men, of whom 1,049 were Protestants and 706 Roman Catholics. Last year there were 102 burials there, an increase of 32 over the previous year.

He said that the work of the Last Post Fund continued to grow, partly due to the fact that they were now dealing with veterans who fought in the two world wars.

Mr. Holland noted that in the cemeteries of the Fund across Canada there were soldiers who had earned the very highest decorations, including the Victoria Cross, ranking from the humble private to top-ranking generals, and also including soldiers who fought in the Fenian Raid of 1860 and from then on in every war in which the British Empire ever took part.

Any person who fought for the Empire anywhere in the world was eligible for burial in any Last Post Fund Cemetery, he stressed.

Unity Boys' Club Carnival To Open With Big Parade

The Unity Boys' Penny Carnival will open June 1 with a parade headed by No. 4 Montreal Squadron R.C.A.F. Air Cadets precision squadron under the command of Sqdn. Ldr. Norman Vincent.

The parade will leave Unity Boys' Clubhouse at 7 p.m. and march along St. Antoine Street, Atwater Avenue, Dorchester Street, Hallowel Avenue, St. Catherine Street back to the Unity Boys' Club where the carnival will open at 8 p.m.

Club members will also march in the parade dressed in costumes, driving their bicycle and wagons. There will be a special section in the parade for dogs and cats.

Prizes will be given for the best decorated wagons, bicycles and the most original costumes.

Cote Rd. Open Both Ways From 8.30 To 9.30 a.m.

Cote St. Antoine Road will be open to two-way traffic from 8:30 to 9:30 a.m. every day along its entire route during the time Sherbrooke Street is closed off for repairs and widening. Outside of this period only Westbound traffic will be allowed Clarke and Kensington Avenues.

Mooted Expressway May Aid Westmount Residents

From a Montreal City Hall source it is learned that Westmount citizens may eventually have a new route in getting to downtown Montreal.

The oft discussed expressway which, according to plan, would run across the city near the harbour line, may utilize the railway lines to achieve its purpose.

According to our informant the Executive Committee of the City of Montreal feels that there are a number of railway lines both in the eastern and western parts of Montreal which could be abandoned for railway purposes and turned over to the city as right of way for expressways, one of which is the line running into the old Bonaventure station.

If the plan goes through a bus service down the Glen could connect with the expressway thus eliminating the delay experienced by the existing tram and bus lines leading to the downtown area.

No definite action will be taken by Montreal until a conference is held with Ottawa transportation officials in connection with using the railway rights of way. In the meantime the Executive Committee has turned down a request of the City Planning Department for \$75,000 to finance the preparation of definite plans for the expressway.

An opinion has been expressed that the project be built above the present Canadian National tracks instead of on the proposed site.

J. W. Rankin, OBE Realty Expert Died On Friday

J. Wurtele Rankin, O.B.E., prominent real estate authority and former president of the Rotary Club of Montreal, died Friday afternoon in his 57th year, after a brief illness, at the Western Division of the General Hospital. His home was at 432 Clarke avenue, Westmount.

A funeral service was held on Monday at St. Andrews Church, Westmount.

A native of Westmount, Mr. Rankin was the son of the late Archibald J. Rankin and Mrs. Rankin. He was educated at Wykeham House School and Westmount Academy, and began his business career with Canadian Car and Foundry Company and later Kingsbury Footwear Company.

Joined Westmount Realities

Joining the Westmount Realities Company in 1919, he was named a director in 1936 and elected vice-president in 1944, holding this appointment at his death. During World War II he was assistant to the Real Estate Advisor, Department of national Defense, and was made an officer of the Order of the British Empire for his services. In 1945 he was appointed member of the real estate advisory committee of the War Assets Corporation.

In addition to being a member of American Institute of Real Estate Appraisers, Mr. Rankin was vice-president of the Canadian Association of Real Estate Boards from 1948 to 1949, a director of the Montreal Real Estate Board and a member of the Urban Land Institute and the Society of Industrial Realtors.

Rotary President

Mr. Rankin was president of the Rotary Club of Montreal in 1944-45. In addition to his Rotary affiliation, he was a member of the Engineers, Seignior, Mount Stephen and Canadian clubs and of the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association. As a young man he was active in sports with the old Westmount A.A.A.

Mr. Rankin was a member of St. Andrew Church in Westmount.

He is survived by his wife, the former Susan Beryl Martin; a son Ronald; a daughter, Marilyn (Mrs. P. C. Staples); his mother, Mrs. Archibald Rankin; and a brother, Air Commodore A. James Rankin, O.B.E., A.F.C.

Current Events Club Heard Baseball Talk

The great variety of prominent people, who have once been school teachers was never better illustrated than last week, before Westmount Senior High Schools Current Events Club, when Wally Alston, now manager of the Montreal Royals Baseball team, revealed to the amazed students his original identity.

Mr. Alston was the guest speaker at the closing meeting of the Club at which he traced the joys and sorrows of professional baseball players, and of those who manage them. Mr. Alston turned out to be a very pleasant speaker with a considerable sense of humor. Discussing the prospects for the Royals this year, he said that he would neither be too optimistic nor too pessimistic, though his quiet confidence ranged him more on the side of the former.

Quiz on Game Fun

Mr. Alston discussed various aspects of baseball, answering such

questions as: "How can boys get in to professional baseball?", "spring training for rookies", and "the prospects for this year's Royals". Under the first heading Mr. Alston dwelt on the essential requirements for a young man planning to play professional baseball. These were: the ability to run fast, hit hard, throw swiftly and to have courage when facing a crafty pitcher. He also stressed the importance of team work and the frequent necessity of sacrifice plays. The speaker also dwelt on the vast scouting organization maintained by the Brooklyn Dodgers, parent club of the Montreal Royals, and of the 500 ball players who turn out for spring training. He also pointed out that no rookie was sent home from spring training unless the scouts were unanimous about it. Mr. Alston made the meeting doubly exciting by producing from nowhere two baseballs, each containing the autographs of all the members of the Royals team. There followed

Dr. Lorne Gilday Given Stephens Memorial Award

The Canadian Hospital Council announced in Toronto Thursday, that Dr. A. Lorne C. Gilday, 478 Mountain Ave., has won the council's 1951 George Findlay Stephens Memorial Award for noteworthy service to hospital administration.

Dr. Gilday was superintendent of the Western Division of the Montreal General Hospital from 1923 until his retirement last January. He was a veteran of the First World War, in which he won the D.S.O. and was wounded and mentioned in despatches. During the Second World War he served as General Superintendent of the Montreal General Hospital. He served as secretary of the Montreal Hospital Council from its formation in 1926 until his retirement.

The Stephens Memorial Award is named in honor of Dr. George F. Stephens, former superintendent of the Winnipeg General Hospital and the Royal Victoria Hospital in Montreal.

"Fitz" Tells Rotarians "On and Off the Record"

Gerald "Fitz" FitzGerald, columnist for The Montreal Gazette, told the meeting of the Westmount Rotary Club that his job was the most satisfying in the newspaper field.

In a description of his column, "On and Off the Record", the main factor in the birth of its title was the frustrating habit many public figures had of telling a reporter a story then adding it was off the record.

"It was decided by our paper that there was a spot for this sort of off the record material, plus human bits of general or particular interest.

"Titles are born a lot more easily than the columns themselves. There's no magic formula for turning out an average of 1,000 words a day, six days a week, 313 days a year."

There was only one way to do it, never to be too far away from a phone, or with a pencil and scratch paper. Concentration, contacts, checking and work were the ingredients that added up to a daily column.

For Mr. FitzGerald there was one thing a daily column could not be produced without a telephone. More than 400 calls, incoming and outgoing, came to his desk each week.

New hope for many persons who suffer from tuberculosis of bones and joints is indicated in advanced treatments reported by surgeons of the Royal Victoria Hospital.

The importance of early operations for some tuberculosis cases was demonstrated by Dr. J. Gordon Petrie, of Westmount, to the audience at the annual clinical evening of the Montreal Medico-Chirurgical Society. With the Hospital as host in its Out-Patient Department, the society's members displayed 53 exhibits of current developments in medical and surgical treatments and research.

panied by paralysis may have the diseased tissue removed. Then surgeons perform a bone graft that aids in allowing the tuberculous tissue to heal, meanwhile immobilizing the affected structure. The new technique for such tuberculosis sufferers, he said, contrasts with older methods of "putting them to bed for years with a plaster cast."

For the surgery described, a refrigerated bone bank is kept at hand and from which the surgeon selects proper pieces for bone grafts to aid in recovery.

If an operation is indicated, it should be done moderately early in order to obtain recovery, Dr. Petrie said.

CLASSICAL

Piano Concerto No. 1 in B flat minor, op. 23; (Tchaikowsky) Clifford Curzon, Piano with George Szell conducting The New Symphony Orchestra (London). This popular work which was destined to failure in 1874 by the composer's great friend Nicholas Rubenstein, was recorded for LP in The Kingsway Hall, London, England during September 1950. The performance by Messrs Curzon and Szell is a well-balanced one, precise and full in technique, lacking the histrionics of some earlier recordings, stirring in the powerful themes at the opening and finale. This disc has good tonal and surface qualities, and the piano reproduction is above average.

A Mantovani Program: Mantovani and his Concert Orchestra.

Now an institution in England's musical circles, this 46 year old conductor has achieved fame for his brilliant scores of both familiar and unusual compositions. Witness the choice selection of light concert numbers on this LP record. Such descriptive novelties as The Bullfrog and The Laughing Violin are executed with a precision and subtlety which make classics of such fare. There is a remarkable scoring of Somewhere a Voice is Calling, using an ethereal instrument effect which is uncanny. Other pieces include the popular Destiny Waltz, Jealous Lover, and Addinsells' Festival all beautifully arranged.

Popular

By Decca: Here are a couple of surefire hits. "Unless" which is a smooth melody done in the if style with a generous orchestral portion by Gordon Jenkins' band. The chorus is also heard with Bob Stevens as soloist. The reverse side is "Rose, Rose, I Love You" with Cisco Houston carrying the vocal. This is a peppy number with an oriental flavour given a suitable, clamorous background by the same musical ensemble.

And now some top tunes from the new Rodgers and Hammerstein production "The King And I" cheerfully sung by Bing Crosby and ably assisted by Victor Young's orchestra. Of the two records, "I Whistle a Happy Tune" and "Getting to Know You" have a slight edge over "Something Wonderful" and "Hello, Young Lovers." Bing's styling is tops.

An item for jazz collectors is the lazy rhythm of the old "Johnson Rag" with the famous treatment by Jerry Gray's orchestra featuring Dave Harris on the tenor sax. This is a blues classic, and is suitably coupled with "Farewell Blues" on the reverse.

"Dancing on the Ceiling" by Richard Rodgers, and "My Kinda Love" are two easy-listening numbers nicely done by Artie Shaw's Gramercy Five with June Hutton in good form vocally.

"Basically Montreal is a small town, where what a man does is of interest if not concern to his fellows, where everybody is mad at the Montreal Tramways, at the traffic situation, and any one of a dozen things."

Columns like "On and Off the Record" were of fairly recent vintage. At one time there were thousands of them along a little different angle, the old party-line telephones. In those gossip columns were the same sort of neighbourly spirit which made a column pull readership.

Careless smokers and campers cause many forest fires such as depicted in the above photo. Once these fires are started they are hard to put out. Millions of dollars worth of timber is destroyed every year in Canada by carelessness on the part of thoughtless persons. The Canadian Forestry Association is making a special appeal this week to all Canadians to conserve and protect our natural wealth in the form of forests.

Careless Smokers, Campers, Cause Most Forest Fires

In an announcement prior to the launching of Canada's first Forest Conservation Week (May 19-26) the Canadian Forestry Association said that more than half of this country's annual woodland fires are caused by careless smokers and campers.

"No one can control lightning which sets the forest afire about 1,000 times each spring," the association pointed out. "But lightning is far out-paced by the human flame-thrower. For every time the woodlands are hit by lightning, they are hit four times by human agency.

"Sometimes the blazes are started by settlers who, in clearing their land of debris, burn their piles on a hot and windy day in defiance of well known provincial regulations; sometimes they are started by sparks scattered by railway locomotives.

"Year by year the chain of forest fires attributable mainly to personal recklessness robs Canada of enough forest wealth to build 80,000 five-room bungalows."

Aim of the conservation week is to impress Canadians that this country's most valuable asset is its forests, employing, directly or indirectly, thousands.

Says the association: "Throughout Canada millions of dollars are spent each year on forest protective services, but the general public is asked merely to contribute understanding and common sense caution. In spite of all the efforts of those engaged in government services and forest industries, more than 2,000,000 acres of forest are destroyed annually by fire."

One of the highlights of the week has been a short fire prevention movie shown in all commercial theatres throughout the country.

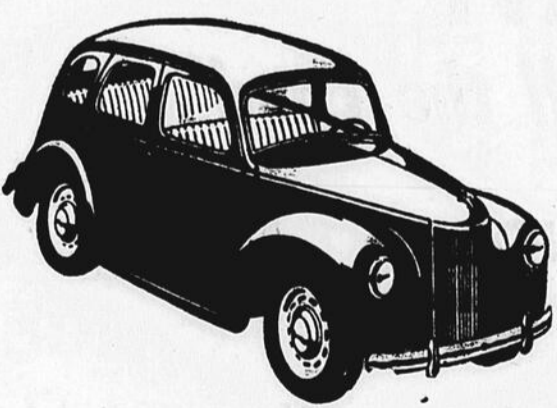

Musical Sharps Flats and Naturals

HAPPENINGS IN MAY

May is a month of many important dates in musical history, so numerous, in fact, that it was hard to condense the items to fit today's column. The number indicates the date as there are several significant events for some days.

May 1, Rossini's Opera, "Semiramide" had its American premiere in New Orleans, 1837. May 2, Verdi's popular opera, "Il Trovatore" was first given in New York, 1855 and the world premiere of "Peter and the Wolf" by Serge Prokofieff was at a Children's Concert in Moscow, 1936. May 3, The celebrated impresario of Gilbert and Sullivan operas, Richard D'Oyly Carte was born in London, 1884 and Marcel Dupre, famous French organist, heard many times in Montreal, was born 1886.

Ravel's orchestration of "Pictures at an Exhibition" was given its premiere at a Koussevitsky Concert in Paris, 1923. May 4 1665, birth of the inventor of the earliest piano, Bartolommeo Cristofori. His first model is in the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City.

May 5, Carnegie Hall officially opened in 1891 with Tschai-kowsky as guest conductor. May 6, Leopold Damrosch makes his American debut in 1871 as violinist, composer and conductor. May 7, two great birthdates — Brahms in 1833, Tschai-kowsky in 1840 also the premiere of Beethoven's Choral Symphony, the Ninth, in Vienna, 1824. May 8, first performance of "Home, Sweet Home", 1823. May 9, American premiere, 1863, of "Harold In Italy" by Hector Berlioz. May 10, Anatole Liadow, famous Russian composer born, 1855. May 11, Irving Berlin, celebrated contemporary composer born in Russia, 1888 and William Grant Still, famous American Negro composer, 1895.

Composers Born May 12 Three great composers born on the 12th of May were Adolf Henselt, 1814; Jules Massenet, 1842 and Gabriel Faure, 1845. May 13, world premiere of the "Italian" Symphony in London, 1833 with the composer, Mendelssohn, conducting. Birth of Sir Arthur Sullivan, 1842 in London. Camille Saint-Saens plays his Second Piano Concerto in G Minor in Paris, 1868 with Anton Rubinstein conducting.

May 14, Mendelssohn leads his "Hebrides" Overture in London, 1832 from the manuscript. 1870, Sigismund Stojowski born. George Bernard Shaw, at the age of 32, in 1888 writes his first review as a music critic in the London "Star".

Famous musicians born on the fifteenth were Michael Balfe, 1808 in Dublin; Stephen Heller, 1813 in Pest and the contemporary Otto Klemperer 1885, in Breslau, Germany. May 16, premiere of Tschai-kowsky's "Romeo and Juliette" Overture, 1870, Nicolas Rubinstein conducting. In Philadelphia, 1888, first public demonstration of the gramophone disc by Emile Berliner, the inventor. May 17, Beethoven's "Kreutzer" Sonata first performed with the composer and violinist, George Bridgetower in Vienna, 1803. May 18, Karl Goldmark, Hungarian composer born 1830. May 19, birth of Nellie Melba, in Melbourne, Australia, 1859.

Events on May 20 May 20, American premiere of Beethoven's "Choral" symphony by the New York Philharmonic, 1846. May 21, world premiere of Leoncavallo's great opera "Pagliacci", in Milan, 1892. May 22, Richard Wagner born in Leipsig 1813. The first player-piano patented 1900 by Edwin S. Votey. May 23, first great violin virtuoso, Jean Baptiste Viotti, founder of modern violin playing, born, 1753. May 24, Sir Edward Elgar conducts first performance of his Second Symphony, London 1911. May 25, premiere of Beethoven's "Emperor" Concerto in London, 1829, played by Mendelssohn, aged 20, who conducted from his piano seat. It was his English debut. First per-

formance of ballet, "Coppelia" by Leo Delibes, 1870 and world premiere of "H.M.S. Pinafore" in London, 1878. Claude Debussy plays his piano Preludes in Paris 1910 for the first time.

CIVIL DEFENCE BOGS DOWN

Action Needed Soon If Initial Enthusiasm Is To Be Kept Alive

Many Westmount citizens are wondering whether our Civil Defence effort has bogged down, as since the public meeting held in Victoria Hall some time ago, under the auspices of the Westmount Municipal Association, no further information has been forthcoming from the civil defence committee.

Perhaps this is a good omen as it could be that the authorities think that there is

no pressing need for the hurried formation of a civil defence organization — the threat of war or enemy action on the home front may have diminished.

If however, the situation is as grave as some of our government leaders and military men appear to think the delay in getting the civil defence organization geared for action requires some explanation.

From newspaper sources it would seem that the main stumbling block is that of funds. Who is going to pay the bills? The majority of municipalities appear to think that the Federal Government should foot the bill. Just what the attitude of Westmount is on this subject is a matter for conjecture.

It is refreshing to know that right here in our midst there is one organization going right ahead in training its members in civil defence and doing so without receiving one cent from any outside source. The Civil Defence Group organized by the Rev. O. J. Ritz, of the Seventh Day Adventist Church, has been quietly organizing and training the group to be able to turn out on a moment's notice to help the community in case of danger.

Surely our civic organization could at least emulate this example before the enthusiasm aroused by the initial appeal cools off.

Students Needed To Supervise At Vacation Schools

Westmount teachers and students from upper grades in high school may be interested in offering their services to the "Daily Vacation Schools" a Red Feather Service which provides "instruction and attractive recreation" for from 1,500 to 2,000 children the hot summer weeks.

Training classes for personnel will start tomorrow in Colley Hall, 1485 Drummond Street, provided by kind courtesy of the Salvation Army.

The classes will continue each Saturday until and including June 2 from 9 a.m. to noon.

Each year many youths assist in supervising play and instruction of the children during the summer school sessions. The unusual summer school keeps children busy and off the streets during the trying weeks of July. It takes children from four to 14 years of age and runs every week, Monday through Friday, mornings only, during July only.

C. A. C. Reports
... STOCK-TAKING ...
... YOU AND C.A.C. ...

Of course you know that nine out of Canada's ten provinces now have a Provincial Branch of the Canadian Association of Consumers. One of the projects of the National Office in Ottawa is to keep all these Provincial Branches informed of each other's activities. The latest bulletin received covers some of the work being done in Saskatchewan. C.A.C. undertook to make a survey of buying habits in the cities of Saskatoon and Regina. A cross-section of housewives, business and professional women was queried on shopping preferences. This "Quiz" was made on the basic buying needs of these women for groceries, clothing and hardware. Results of the survey showed conclusively that women shoppers expect to receive courtesy and to have the sales-clerks exercise tact and show interest in the customers' requirements. The shoppers wanted variety of merchandise, value and attractiveness of display.

Now also in the Province of Saskatchewan there is a "School for Retailers" run by the Retailers Association. When news of the C.A.C. Survey was made public, this Association asked for the Provincial President to appear before a session of the School and give her findings. After the talk, entitled "Consumer-Retail Likes and Dislikes," the Provincial President heard of the other side of the picture. After all there are always two sides to everything and some customers need to have a warning flag pinned on to them to indicate that they mean trouble for the storekeeper. Thus C.A.C. in Saskatchewan has taken an interesting step towards better understanding between the home-maker and her source of supplies.

The first-formed of the C.A.C. units in the West End held its annual meeting last Friday evening at the home of Mrs. J. O. Clark. Guest speaker was Mrs. Neil Cameron, Vice President of the Provincial Branch of Quebec, who discussed some of today's consumer problems. The members decided unanimously to support the resolution of the Provincial Branch to oppose the amendment of the British North America Act which was to make possible the proposed 3% Turnover Tax. Officers elected for the coming year were: President, Mrs. R. H. Grant; Vice-President, Mrs. J. O. Clark, and Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. T. D. Handrahan. Mrs. Grant and Mrs. Clark were appointed as delegates from the Unit to the Provincial Annual Meeting to take place in June.

Well, that's our C.A.C. news for this week. Do you want to attend that Provincial Annual Meeting on June 8th? While only accredited delegates may vote, the meeting will be open to all C.A.C. members. If you are not already a member or have not renewed your membership, don't forget—membership is still only fifty cents a year and the Provincial Treasurer is still Mrs. E. K. Marye Dahnke is a food stylist, lecturer, author, distinguished

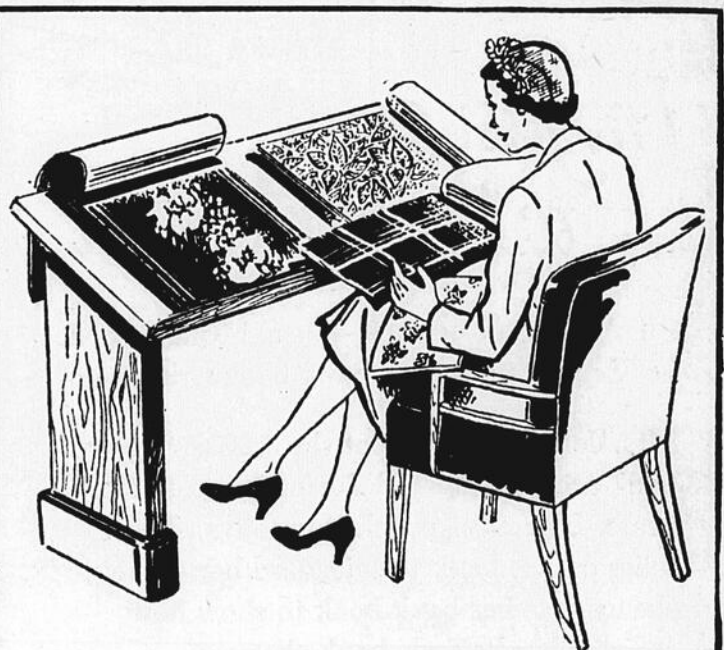

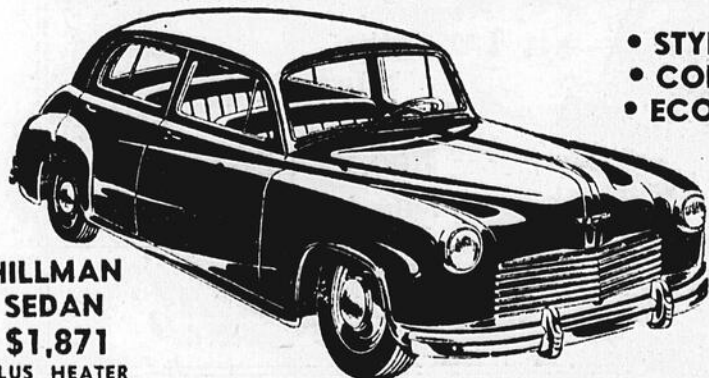

English Ace

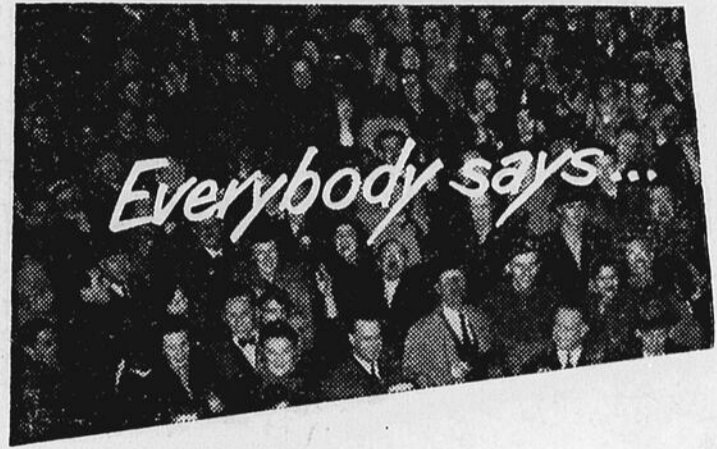

Marler Claims N.U. Extravagant Funds Are Wasted

Hon. George C. Marler, Liberal member for Westmount-St. George, in the Quebec House, and Opposition Leader in the Legislative Assembly, said in a radio address on Thursday that Quebec Province cannot afford another five years of National Union financial extravagances.

For Premier Maurice Duplessis "the increase in the cost of living and the fight against inflation have not the least bit of significance," Mr. Marler said, charging the Government with wastage of public funds.

Mr. Marler accused the National Union administration of having set up several commissions since 1945 "whose main function seems to be to spend the people's money without ever making any report."

He charged the Government with "playing politics" with the Rimouski and Cabana Relief Fund collected from the general public and distributed to the victims "as

if it were a personal gift of Mr. Duplessis.

The Opposition Leader said there was still a substantial amount left in the fund, adding that he wondered whether the Government intended to wait until general elections are held so as to distribute the money to those who show their electoral gratitude to the regime.
