PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT MADE BOLD BID TODAY FOR NEW WORLD ORDER

Plain-Speaking Message Addressed Directly to World Rulers Demands that Nations Abandon Weapons of Aggression, Reduce Armaments, Refrain from Sending Any Armed Force Beyond Their Borders and Forget Petty National Aims—Declares "if Any Nation Interposes Obstructions to Peace and Economic Recovery, World Will Know Where Responsibility for Failure Lies."

Washington, May 16.—President Roosevelt asked the world today to give up offensive weapons of war and unite for peace and economic recovery.

In a message immediately interpreted on Capitol Hill as constituting particularly plain speaking to Germany, the President admonished all foreign potentates to give up "petty" national aims, or the civilized world know where to place the blame.

Despatched to fifty-four foreign capitals just on the eve of Adolf Hitler's expected pronouncement of German policy, the message was a diplomatic sensation of first magnitude.

It proposed that no armed troops whatsoever should hereafter cross any frontier save when a neighbor had offended by breaking her armament agreements.

It backed the proposal of Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald for a consultative pact for security, which the United States heretofore had shunned and which France much desires, but it also proposed that all nations hold armament within treaty limits, which France has been accused of failing to do.

It mentioned no names, but denounced foreign invasion at a time when the Japanese advance in China is in full swing.

It laid down the doctrine of non-invasion so broadly as to preclude by implication further United States marine incursions into Latin America.

A copy of the message was prepared for submission to Congress, for its information, and administration congressional leaders at once hailed it as an epochal step of leadership for peace.

As an immediate goal, the President asked success for the Geneva Arms Conference and the Economic Conference soon to meet in London. He proposed:

Adoption at Geneva of Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald's plan to reduce the armaments of France, stabilize those of Germany, and set up a consultative pact to promote peace.

Agreement upon the time and place of a later conference to carry these steps still further.

An agreement meantime that no nation shall increase its existing armaments.

And a promise by all nations, providing the terms of arms limitation are faithfully kept, "that they will send no armed force of whatsoever nature across their frontiers."

"Common sense points out that if any strong nation refuses to join with genuine sincerity in these concerted efforts for political and economic peace, the one at Geneva and the other at London, progress can be obstructed and ultimately blocked," said Mr. Roosevelt.

"In such an event the civilized world, seeking both forms of peace, will know where the responsibility for failure lies."

"I urge that no nation assume such a responsibility, and that all the nations joined in these great conferences translate their professed politics into action. This is the way to political and economic peace."

The message, contrary to long-standing diplomatic custom, was addressed directly to the kings, potentates, and presidents of all of the forty-four nations to be represented at London, including Russia. It was signed just "Franklin D. Roosevelt."

It went forward early today in direct language without the usual protection of diplomatic code.

Within a space of a few hours it would be before the heads of every great nation around the globe, and most of the smaller ones.

Officials here indicated they did not consider the Russian attitude among the recipients as in any sense a gesture of Russian recognition. Although this was the first direct diplomatic message to pass for years between Washington and the Russian ruling regime, it was described as a "gesture of recognition" that such a step as the President proposed could not succeed unless it had universal acceptance.

Mr. Roosevelt's bold bid for a new world order surprised even some of the diplomats who have been directly associated with the conversations in progress here preliminary to the London Conference. They expected him to take leadership once the London Conference had begun, but his direct manner of striking at the obstacles developing beforehand was a complete surprise.

No American official would comment for publication on the possible implications of the message with respect to individual nations. So far as formal comment was concerned, it might have been just coincident that the appeal, with its words of admonition, was issued just on the eve of Adolf Hitler's pronouncement of German policy to be delivered in the Reichstag tomorrow.

The text of President Roosevelt's message follows:

A profound hope of the people of my country impels me, as the head of their government, to address to you and, through you, the people of your nation. This hope is that peace may be assured through practical measures of disarmament and that all of us may carry to victory our own common struggle against economic chaos.

To these ends the nations have called two great world conferences.

BLAMES U. S. FOR WORLD-WIDE ECONOMIC CRISIS.

Philadelphia, May 16.—Owen D. Young, author of the reparations payment plan, held the United States responsible, in an address last night, for having "ruined the currency and banking systems of the world," with the resultant paralysis of international trade, through its insistence upon collecting war debts in gold.

Young declared a failure to temper "the letter of the bond" with a realization and acceptance of the obligations of relationship, both among individuals and nations, and brought about the world-wide economic crisis. Young spoke at the annual conference of the Association of Junior Leagues of America.

OPPOSITION TO MOVE TO RAISE POSTAGE RATES

Senator Graham Declares Move Will Force Papers to Distribute Publications by Truck Instead of Mail.

Ottawa, May 16.—Objections to the increased postage rates on newspapers were voiced in the Senate yesterday as the bill providing for them received second reading.

Rt. Hon. George P. Graham, Brockville, said there were not five daily newspapers in Canada out of "the Red." The Government could obtain \$100,000 in other directions involving less hardship.

Reductions in train services had forced many newspapers to use trucks instead of trains, thus cutting down on postal revenue. The higher rates might force more to do so, causing further loss to the Government.

Senator A. D. McRae, of Vancouver, agreed with Senator Graham.

Newspapers were now being bussed out of the public treasury to the extent of \$6,000,000 a year, said Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Government leader. The change would reduce this cost to the government by only \$100,000 a year.

The figure was based on the fact that the Office Department who estimated the loss on handling newspapers last year at between \$5,000,000 and \$6,000,000.

BENNETT URGES GRADUATES TO SERVE CANADA

Prime Minister Expressed Confidence in Success of Coming World Economic Conference in Address at McMaster College.

Hamilton, Ont., May 16.—Graduating students of McMaster University today heard from Prime Minister R. B. Bennett an earnest plea that they exercise to the best of their ability the training they had received in the interests of their country.

Addressing the university's convocation yesterday, Mr. Bennett expressed the belief that the World Economic Conference, about to be convened in London, would go a long way toward solving the world's economic difficulties and warned his hearers it was a mistake to think the millennium could come by any trick of economic adjustment.

IMPROVED TONE NOTED IN NORTH CHINA CIRCLES

With Arrival of New National Government Representative It Is Expected that Japanese Will Shortly Withdraw.

Tientsin, May 16.—The political atmosphere in North China has suddenly changed, leading to the belief that the latest Japanese incursion south of the Great Wall is near an end.

The changed atmosphere resulted from the coming to North China of General Hwang Fu, National Government representative slated as Minister to North China from the Nanking government.

Hwang, former National government Foreign Minister, is considered distinctly friendly toward Japan.

His coming, coupled with a statement yesterday at Changchun, Manchuria, by Field Marshal Nobuyoshi Muto, Japanese military commander in Manchuria, that the Japanese would withdraw as soon as the Chinese remain away from the Wall, was interpreted as meaning a Chinese-Japanese compromise had been reached.

Under the compromise, it was believed, the Chinese would avoid the borders of the new state of Manchukuo, while the new Peking government would be allowed to function as a branch of the Central government.

Only in the contest between the small group of "Coalitionists" led by Tielman Roos and members of the two main parties did any issue appear. Roos, arch-foe of racialism and former member of the Nationalist cabinet, will oppose Minister of Lands P. G. Grobler in Rustenburg. Credited widely as the author of the coalition move, he maintains the House of Assembly should contain a half dozen or so members pledged to either main group and intent only on insuring that neither party will attempt to gain control at the expense of the coalition.

Nomination of Roos in Rustenburg spoiled a record for the new cabinet. All its members except Grobler were elected by acclamation on nomination day.

The first move toward coalition came from Roos soon after the government was forced to suspend the gold standard at the end of last year. Political uncertainty, engendered partly by constant hammering of the South Africans against the Nationalist gold policy, brought such a flight of capital from the country that the administration was forced to check what appeared to be a growing panic.

Roos, then an appeal judge in the Supreme Court, at once left the bench and returned to politics as the champion of a union government. His aim was to create a following, ally himself with General Smuts and oust the government as a failure.

Similarly General Smuts' first offer of coalition met summary rejection from the Nationalists. Roos, however, began a tour of the country, urging coalition. He was received with enthusiasm by the Nationalist Orange Free State.

While the Roos crusade was still in progress the two main parties began to attempt alliance. They failed once through disagreement on division of cabinet posts, but reached an understanding soon after and decided to submit their move to judgment of the electorate.

Much interest is centring on the election at Calvinia, Cape Province, where Dr. Daniel Francois Malan, former Minister of the Interior in the Nationalist government, who voiced disapproval of the coalition, is vigorously opposed by a woman, Mrs. A. C. S. Steenkamp. Dr. Malan has represented the constituency for twenty years.

General Smuts recently caused considerable wonderment when he responded to Malan's dramatic appeal for help and hurried to the district, where he made several speeches in Dr. Malan's support.

Col. Frederic Creswell, Labor, former Minister of National Defence, is threatened by a business man candidate at Belleville, Cape Province.

Today In Parliament

Ottawa, May 16.—The House of Commons will consider the shipping bill and other Government measures today. The Senate will resume its session.

Yesterday the Senate gave third reading to amendments to the customs tariff, second reading to the bill imposing higher postage rates on newspapers and heard objections from Sir Allen Aylesworth to the bill to force judges over seventy-five years of age to accept their pensions.

The House of Commons yesterday passed the two commercial treaties with France through all stages.

The Senate amendments to the Sarnia-Port Huron vehicular tunnel bill, gave third reading to bills to amend the Senate and House of Commons Act and respecting British and Canadian industrial companies.

The House also received supplementary estimates totalling \$2,097,964 and approved most of them, and passed the remainder of the main estimates including the votes for the Departments of Agriculture, Trade and Commerce and Pensions and National Health.

CLAIM MODERN GIRL SHOULD CHANGE HER TACTICS

Oxford, Eng., May 16.—Says the "Isis," Oxford university magazine: "Every day more students are lured away from their books by the siren charms of powdered sirens."

"The modern girl should be taught the attractions of crochet and knitting."

Little criticism was offered in the House to the terms of the French trade treaty. Liberals took the opportunity of pointing out similarities to the earlier pact negotiated under their own regime and terminated by the present government a year ago.

Li, along with the agreement, which provides for special treatment in either country for the commercial representatives of the other, received third reading yesterday and will now go to the Senate.

The long expected discussion of the proposed cattle-oil barter with Russia, which was to the fore a few months ago, took place in the House of Commons. Hon. Robert Weir, Minister of Agriculture, explained the promoters had come to him for information and he had provided it as he would to anyone interested in promoting livestock sales. He had not bestowed any special sympathy or encouragement on the project.

All the main estimates have now passed the House of Commons with the voting of the required funds for the Departments of Trade and Commerce, Agriculture and Pensions and National Health last night. Supplementary estimates totalling two million dollars were laid before the House by Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Minister of Finance, and more than half of these were voted.

During the discussion on the treaty with France, Mr. Cahan gave many interesting figures on Canadian trade with that country. Wheat formed a large part of the Canadian exports. This export trade varied widely in the past six years, due largely to the fluctuations in French domestic production. In 1928 Canada sold 2,438,709 bushels valued at \$8,271,220; in the following year the exports were 5,170,285 bushels valued at \$6,720,092; in 1930 they were 5,346,325 bushels valued at \$7,980,918; in 1931 they rose to 5,556,407 bushels valued at \$7,443,681; in 1932, due to a partial crop failure in France, they jumped to 20,074 bushels valued at \$12,753,116; while last year they dropped to a value of \$8,901,097. When there was a good crop in France, Mr. Cahan explained, wheat was not imported under the heavy import duties levied against foreign wheat.

In 1927 Canada's total exports to France were \$15,220,202 and the imports from France were \$27,995,322. In 1930 the exports were \$14,000,011 and the imports \$15,158,270; and in 1933 the exports were \$12,730,226 and the imports \$7,712,558. The Secretary of State pointed out that a very large percentage of Canada's exports to France were agricultural products.

Answering various questions Mr. Cahan said that the minimum tariff of France, granted to Canada in the treaty, was liable to change at the option of the French Government at any time, that there was no restriction upon changes France might make, while Canada had the same privilege under the treaty. He stated, too, that when the treaty passed the House and became effective the appropriate department of the Canadian Government would circulate throughout the country a detailed statement of the duties which were imposed under each item of the minimum tariff which was of interest to Canada.

RESIST MOVE TO PENSION HIGHER COURT JUSTICES

Ottawa, May 16.—Indians and judges received considerable attention from the Senators yesterday. When the bill to amend the Indian Act, to provide for the compulsory enfranchisement of certain Indians, Senator Meighen explained that in no way would the "braves" be deprived of their ancient tribal rights. They would still be entitled to their share of the tribes' cash and also of its land.

The bill providing for the retirement of higher provincial court judges at the age of seventy-five years aroused considerable opposition, the majority of the members

GERMAN OPINION CHARGES FRANCE WITH BREAKDOWN OF ARMS PARLEY

World Anxiously Awaiting Statement by Chancellor Hitler Before Reichstag Tomorrow—Situation Tense as Government Leaders Seek to Check Drift to Political Isolation—German Press Disclaims All Desire for War—Hitlerites Charge French Sabotage at Conference.

Berlin, May 16.—Chancellor Adolf Hitler today called Count Rudolph Nafzky to get the latest information from Geneva preparatory to facing the Reichstag and the world with a declaration of Germany's international political intentions.

The Chancellor at 3 p.m. tomorrow will outline before the reassembled Reichstag Germany's position in the face of the deadlock in the World Disarmament Conference which followed German disagreement with articles of the British disarmament plan.

The Count, chief delegate at the Conference, and Dr. Alfred Rosenberg, chief of the foreign division of the Nazi party, were recalled to Berlin over the week-end for conferences. The latter had been in London.

The situation in Germany was tense as government leaders sought to check the drift which was carrying the country into political isolation.

Newspapers generally blamed France for the Geneva impasse, and expressed surprise that the speech last Saturday night of Vice Chancellor Franz von Papen, in which he compared the present situation with that existing in 1914, had received a cool foreign reception.

The Wolff news agency subsidiary, Deutsche Diplomatische Politische Korrespondenz, spoke of ceaseless French "sabotage," and blamed France for the crisis in the Geneva deliberations. The subsidiary usually reflects official opinion.

"Hitler wants no war," the Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung declared in belittling talk of war. "He could not want it without jeopardizing his life work and his ideology. He wants peace, security, equality and gradual revision of the Versailles Treaty."

"Never at any time," the news service said, "has it been possible to assess France's attitude toward disarmament measures France intended to carry out, even if all her security demands were conceded. The pretense today that the world is waiting for Germany to show hers is a waste of time."

REVIEW OF COUNCIL OF AMBASSADORS DISCUSSED

Paris, May 16.—As a national defense measure Paris factories were ordered today to report to the "Passive Defence Bureau" within a month on the number of their employees and on their capacity.

This move came as the nation was waiting for Chancellor Hitler's important pronouncement before the German Reichstag tomorrow on the German policy in regard to rearmament.

Jean Chiappe, Perfect of Police, issued the order to the Paris factories. It applied to all establishments employing more than five hundred workers, and to metal, wood, food, chemical, clothing and banking concerns, as well as army supply plants.

The Council of Ambassadors, the executive body of the Treaty of Versailles, may shortly resume activity as a result of the controversy over the German arms problem. It was learned today.

Paris and London are busily discussing the revival of the council in connection with the disarmament conference.

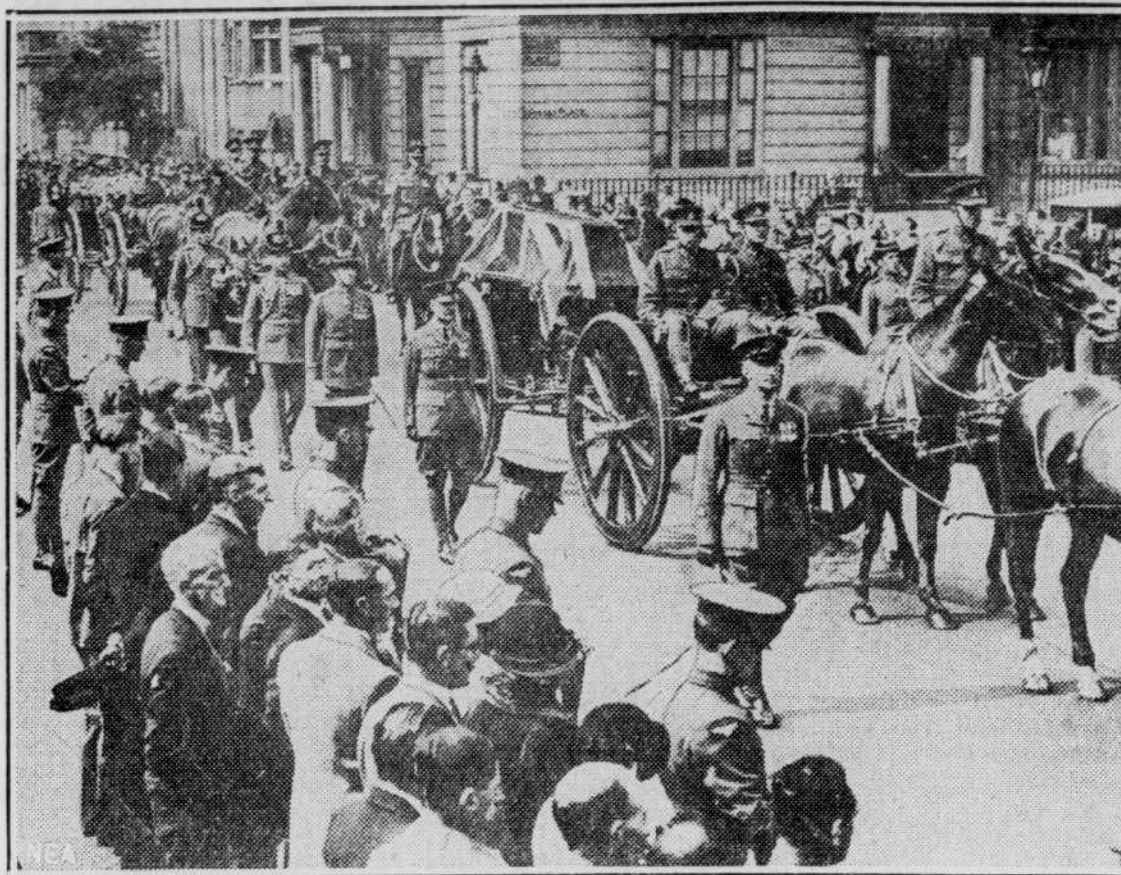

laws and industries of other provinces as well as Quebec. A plea was made for the support of the official organ, "Home and Country," copies of which go to all other countries where the Women's Institute is organized.

SHIPMENT OF VEGETABLES FROM BERMUDA AT QUEBEC

Bermudian Products, Enjoying Free Entry into Canada, May Replace American Markets in Dominion.

Quebec, May 16.—Arrival of an experimental shipment of potatoes and celery from Bermuda on the S.S. Chomey, which marks the first time that any Bermudian vegetables have ever been unloaded from any ship docking at Quebec, will very probably result in the early inauguration of a regular service of vessels from Bermuda calling at this port to unload a wide variety of Bermudian vegetables for consumption on the food markets of the Ancient Capital, according to an opinion expressed by W. R. Evans, assistant director of agriculture for Bermuda.

Mr. Evans, who is making a complete survey of the Canadian markets with a view to the greater sale of his country's vegetables here, pointed out that the Bermudian products would sell much cheaper than the American varieties due to the free duty entry into Canada of products from the West Indies.

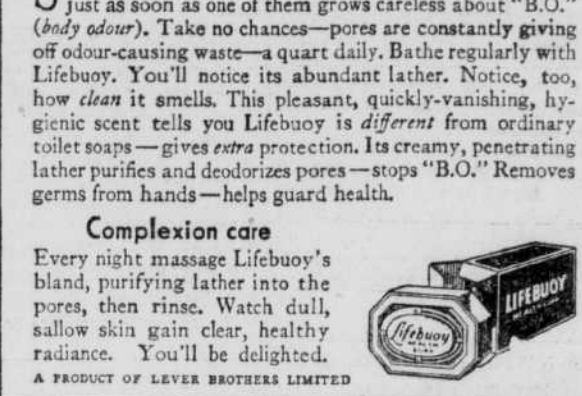
