THE present volume of the CITY DIRECTORY, as will be observed on examination, does not differ in arrangement from those of the last four years, as the Editor is not aware that any change in that respect would have been advantageous.

The alphabetical list of names extends to 270 pages, *being 14 pages more* than ever appeared in any former edition, which, when taken in connection with the fact, that many of the houses destroyed by the great fire of 1852, are not yet re-built, is pretty conclusive evidence that a good degree of industry has been used in collecting the material for the work.

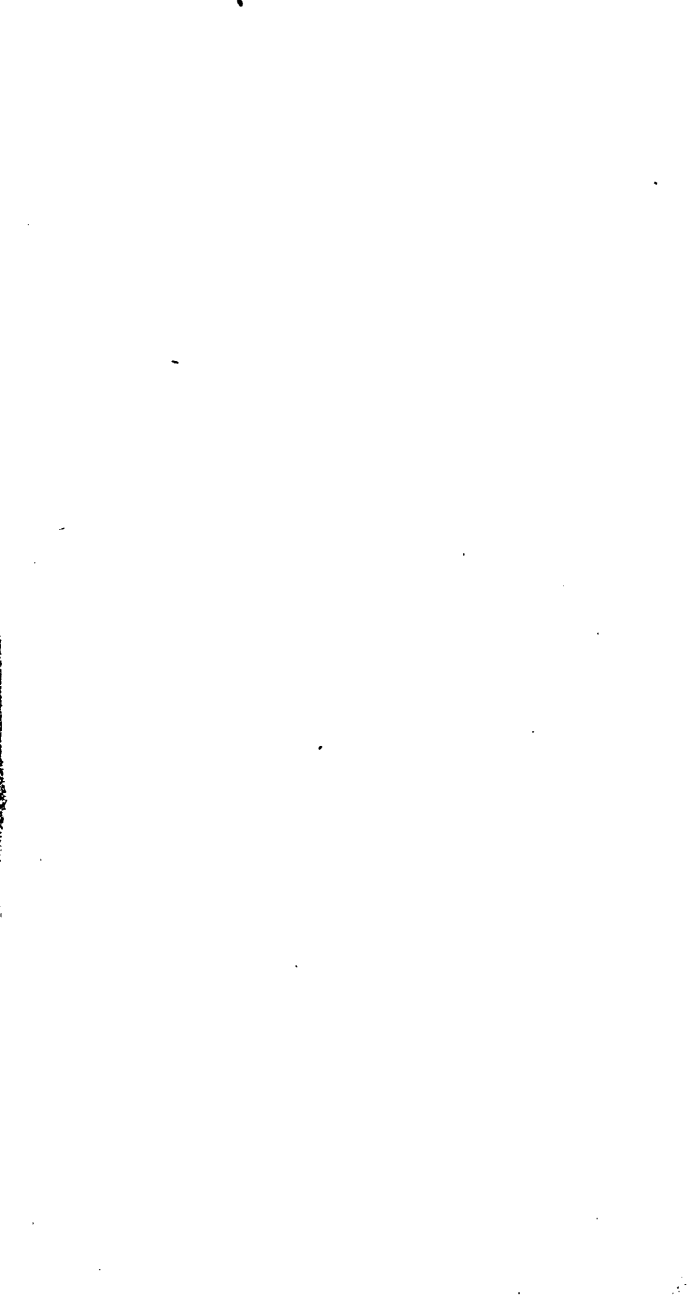
