HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Here's evidence of how fantastic show business can be — the Three Stooges are starring in a feature movie.
A year and a half ago, the Stooges were finished, washed up. They had come to the end of a record stand of 24 years at Columbia Pictures, making shorts. Their knockabout comedy was considered passe, the market for short subjects had vanished. Then it happened.
The Columbia subsidiary, Screen Gems, released the first batch of old Stooge comedies to TV. Wham! The Stooges, a show business team for a third of a century, found themselves at the height of their fame.
When they were making shorts, they earned \$70,000 from filming and picked up an equal amount on personal appearances. This

year they already are guaranteed a \$275,000 gross, and the figure may go much higher.
STAR IN FEATURE
The boys have returned to Columbia, but not to make shorts. They are filming *Have Rocket, Will Travel*, their first feature as a starring team.
"This is the first time we've been started in a feature," said Moe Howard, "and we're getting 25 per cent of the take."
Moe is the leader of the Stooges. He's the one with the black bangs. Larry Fine has the operatic hairdo, and Joe DeRita is the fat one who takes most of the knocks. He was preceded in his post by Moe's brothers, Curly and Shemp, both now deceased, and comic Joe Besser.
The Stooges made 218 comedies and profit not a cent from their showings on TV. But the results of their new-found popularity are considerable.

Regulation Dress Is Suggested For Waterloo Pupils

WATERLOO — Two years ago the commissioners of the Waterloo High School decided to modify the dress of the students. The girls complied with the request that they wear navy blue tunics and white blouses to school.
This year even further regulations have been suggested by the School Board in co-operation with the staff. The following letter has been sent to the parents.
"This year we have made a start on a modified dress regulation for High School students, which has been well received by the pupils and staff. Heavy boots with steel heels are not permitted due to damage to the school property. The boys were asked not to wear tight jeans. After special study of dress in other schools and careful consideration from the staff, we have the following suggestions for school dress for the coming school year.
"Boys: Grades 8 to 11: Slacks or trousers of a dress style, preferably dark or gray in color, a dress or sport shirt, solid color. Shirts must be worn tucked inside the trouser top. A jacket or V-neck sweater, conservative color should be worn. Shoes polished. Attention will be paid to neatness of appearance and dress. Boys needing a haircut or shoe-shine will be checked.
"Girls: Grades 1 to 7: White cotton blouses with long or short sleeves and blue tunics. If sweaters are worn, navy blue Grades 8 to 11: White cotton blouses, navy blue jumpers, if sweaters are worn, navy blue, full length stockings or white socks, conservative shoes.
Another important step forward will be taken at the graduation exercises to be held May 29. The boys and girls in the graduating class will wear gowns in the school colors. The boys' gowns are royal blue and the girls' gowns are white.
It is felt the uniform appearance of the graduates on the stage will add dignity to the ceremony, as well as proving a saving for the parents.

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Lennoxville, Ascot Mayors Blast Pinard Annexation Suggestions

Following a public statement made by West ward Alderman Antonio Pinard in which he proposes to submit to the Sherbrooke City Council next Monday evening a plan for the annexation of certain parts of the Town of Lennoxville and of Ascot Township, Mayor Ernest Gilbey of Lennoxville, said that Ald. Pinard "should have approached the town of Lennoxville before making such a public statement."

The Lennoxville mayor added that: "I don't think that the citizens of Lennoxville would take Mr. Pinard's proposition too kindly, especially because it came from a Sherbrooke alderman."

Ald. Pinard's plan is that a number of lots in Lennoxville and Ascot Township be annexed to the City of Sherbrooke.

Exactly how much and where the properties should be annexed will be left to the city engineers or to the urbanism council who would decide which properties would be most advantageous to the City of Sherbrooke.

Ald. Pinard said that the properties to be taken would represent a lot of land.

The West Ward alderman believes that sooner or later, the City of Sherbrooke will be obliged to annex all this property and even more.

He claimed that it is better to annex right now so as to control the development and draw plans which conform with the overall urbanism plan prepared by the city's town planner J. C. LaHaye.

"The only way to do this is by annexing the land," added Ald. Pinard.

In answer to these statements, the mayor of Ascot, Eddy Lynch, said that Ald. Pinard's statement was "ridiculous".

"Who does he think he is, he can't do such a thing just like that," added the Ascot mayor.

"If the city of Sherbrooke wants the grounds of the University of Sherbrooke, that is all right because there is no revenue coming from them," added Mayor Lynch.

"The citizens of Ascot Township will be annoyed because some of them have moved to this Township because there are lower taxes."

"As far as I am concerned, this plan will never materialize," he added.

"Mr. Pinard's statement that the main reason for the annexation is that the Sherbrooke urbanism plan can be followed is ridiculous."

"Our building bylaws are better than Sherbrooke's. Sherbrooke is still putting up shacks," Mayor Lynch concluded.

St. Francois Man Seriously Hurt In Road Mishap

A St. Francois Xavier man, Wilfrid Pouliot, aged 67, was seriously injured yesterday noon following a freak accident on the road between Danville and Richmond when he was partially crushed by a piece of pipe.

Louise Theriault, of 1158 Lincoln st., Sherbrooke, suffered minor injuries yesterday at about noon when she was injured on Galt st., W. She was taken to the Hotel Dieu after being struck by a car. Police in Sherbrooke said this morning that the child had not been seriously injured.

Pouliot, according to information received yesterday from police sources was struck by a length of pipe which had been suspended by a crane. The chain holding the pipe broke, dropping it onto Pouliot, who was working in a trench intended for the pipe.

Hotel Dieu officials said this morning that Pouliot underwent surgery this morning for a fractured knee. He also suffered injuries to the left hip and side, including multiple bruises.

His general condition today, officials said, is good and he had spent a comfortable night.

A co-worker with Pouliot, Maurice St. Pierre, managed to escape from the trench before being hit by the pipe.

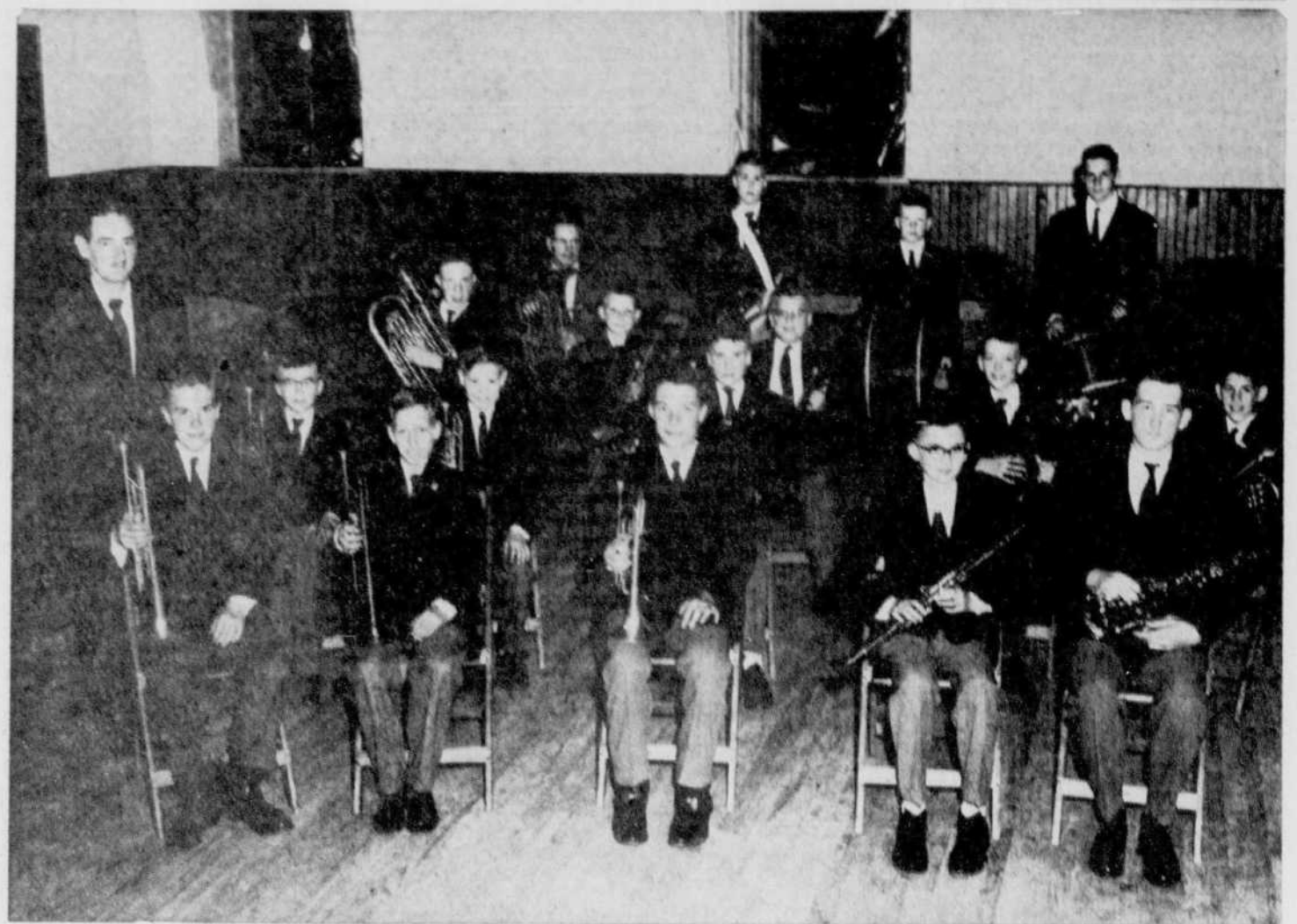
Pulp And Paper Executive Meets

Vice Charge Against Hotel Man

Judgment in the case of M. Lemieux, 50-year-old night clerk at the Chateau Frontenac Hotel in Sherbrooke, accused of using the hotel as a bawdy house, was deferred by Judge Joseph Marier until Friday, June 5, following his trial yesterday in court of Sessions.

The trial got underway yesterday morning when Crown witness Raymond Drouin, 27-year-old Quebec provincial policeman testified that on Jan. 20 at about 1:20 a.m. he and a provincial police girl spotted a room for \$5 from the accused after making it clear to Lemieux that they wanted the room for prostitution.

"We spent about one hour in the room," said the detective, "after which we came down stairs and turned in the key to Lemieux."

Standing nearby were two other provincial policemen who saw the key being turned in, said the witness.

Crown Witness Paul-Emile Blouin, of the provincial police testified that on Jan. 23, three days after Drouin had been there, he went up to a room with the same girl spotted after he told the night clerk that the room was for prostitution.

Also with the latter witness was another provincial police couple who had rented a room for the same alleged purpose, stated Blouin.

"While in the room, we ordered beer," said the detective.

Blouin added that he and the girl spotted had asked for a room at about 5:45 a.m. and were told by Lemieux to try and get out by 7 a.m. so that the room

could be cleaned out by the maids.

Provincial policeman Roger Grondin, 30, of Quebec corroborated the testimony of the two above witnesses.

Crown witness Ghislaine Morissette, 29, of Quebec city, corroborated the testimony of Blouin and Drouin, saying that she was the spotter who went up into the rooms with the two provincial policemen.

The only witness for the defence, Lemieux, the accused himself testified that he only remembered one man present in the court who had signed his name as Breton.

When asked if this man was in the court, he identified Provincial policeman Drouin.

"I only saw him once and he was with a woman, which I believed to be his wife," said the witness.

"I never saw the chap again, and if he did leave one hour after with the girl, I did not see them, because I had just broken my glasses," concluded the witness.

Before taking the case under consideration, Judge Marier said that "I don't believe a word of the accused's testimony."

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Judge To Decide

Is Local Hotel A Gambling Den?

Is the Chateau Frontenac Hotel on Wellington street S., a gambling house or not?

This was the question before Judge Marier in Court of Sessions yesterday when Wellie Gagnon, owner of the hotel, was upon a such a charge.

Although the trial was held yesterday, Judge Marier decided to take the case en delibere and render his verdict Friday, June 5.

Crown witness Paul-Emile Blouin, provincial policeman, testified that on Dec. 19, 1958, he met Blouin in the lobby of the hotel about 11 p.m. and was asked by the owner if he wanted to play cards with a group of four others.

"I joined in and played till 4 a.m.," said the witness.

"They were playing Whist for money," he added.

"Playing was the owner, Mr. Gagnon, his wife, his sister-in-law, a man by the name of Jack and myself," said Blouin.

Provincial policeman David Chouinard, testified that he was with Blouin at the time but did not play. "I only watched them play."

Asked where were the people playing cards, Crown Witness Omer Auclair of the provincial police said that it was in the lobby of the hotel.

"Was any liquor sold?" asked the defence.

"Yes, there was."

"Were the players obliged to buy drinks?" inquired the defence.

"No, I don't think so," was the reply.

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Judge Marier decided not to render his verdict before June 5.

Crown witness Gerard Rioux, 44-year-old Sherbrooke resident, testified that he was the individual known as Jack and that Mr. Gagnon never forced anyone to play cards because they were playing cards and that he never took a cut on the amount of money on the table.

"As a matter of fact," said the witness, "The only time he received money was when he won the pot."

Mrs. Gagnon, wife of the hotel owner, corroborated the testimony given by Rioux.

Defence Attorney Jean L. Pelquin, in addressing the Judge, said that he did not believe that Gagnon could be convicted of holding a gambling house, because, first of all, it was a game among friends, Gagnon did not receive any money from the game and that the games were held in the lobby of the hotel and not where liquor was sold even though some people bought beer.

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First Of Vagrancy Trials Opens In Local Court

The 15 women arrested last Feb. 12 following provincial liquor police raids on two local hotels and charged with vagrancy, started to appear for trial yesterday afternoon in Court of Sessions before Judge Joseph Marier.

Crown witness Paul-Emile Blouin of the provincial police testified that on Jan. 9, 1959 at the Chateau Frontenac Hotel he noticed a girl sitting at a table having a bottle of beer alone.

A short while later, he saw a man approach the table and have a discussion with the girl.

"The man then got into a taxi and left," added the witness.

"About 15 minutes later, there was a phone call for the girl, then she would leave in a taxi," added the detective.

This would happen five or six times in one evening said the witness.

"Did you know who the men were," asked Defence Attorney Pierre Beaudry.

"No," replied the witness.

"Therefore, as far as you know it could have been her brothers," asked the lawyer.

"Well, she must have had an awful lot of brothers," replied the detective.

"A boon to Sherbrooke and a wonderful addition to the industrial picture in this Eastern Townships centre," were the words used yesterday by Ald. Paul Gervais, to describe the Quebec Oxygen and Acetylene Limited, located on the St. Francis road near the city limits.

Ald. Gervais was speaking at the official announcement that the new industry was preparing for the grand opening.

Producers of acetylene, oxygen and nitrogen, Quebec Oxygen is expected to have a full-scale production rate of more than 7,000,000 cubic feet of oxygen, acetylene and nitrogen per month.

The equipment and cylinders required for operations reach well over the \$1,000,000 mark, stated T. P. Hanson, secretary-treasurer of the company.

When full scale operations are in progress, said Don Bourne, plant manager, Quebec Oxygen will employ a minimum of 12 people on a 24-hour, three-shift basis, six days a week.

The equipment, he said, is ultra-modern and extensive safety measures have been installed. The building itself, begun in January, is completely fireproof.

Trucking for the time being, he pointed out, is being done on a hire basis, but eventually company trucks will be used. Ship-

Incurring A Liability

Proposals by Ald. Antonio Pinard that the City of Sherbrooke annex sections of the Town of Lennoxville and of the Township of Ascot should be looked upon with suspicion. The grabbing of the land of these adjoining municipalities will bring little advantage to the city and at the same time will bring many obligations and liabilities.

Much of the financial troubles the city now finds itself in can be traced to a series of annexations a few years ago which resulted in the disappearance of the Township of Orford, and the incorporation of large areas of farm lands within the city limits.

Once these areas are absorbed by a major municipality, the latter must be prepared to provide them with a high standard of municipal services which they did not previously enjoy. And, generally, these districts contribute tax revenues which cover only a small percentage of the outlays. These services must be provided or the only justification for the annexation disappears — that the areas must be incorporated in the city so that proper housing standards may be maintained.

Sherbrooke would be better advised to consolidate the development of the territory it already controls than to take on further liabilities.

France On Its Feet

Soon it will be a year since Charles de Gaulle came out of the retirement of a small French town and once more took supreme power in France.

No one can say that he will succeed in his long-range mission to restore France to its old power and glory. The prospect would not seem bright in this age when power seems polarized in the two giants, the United States and Russia.

But de Gaulle, first premier and now president, has gone far to bring his country back into the respected circle of orderly nations.

He won the day for a drastic new constitution that put some backbone in the French executive authority for the first time in many decades.

His missionary flair brought fresh discipline to the army, to the civil service, to many another aspect of his country's life.

In the economic field he ordered an austerity regime that probably no Frenchman but de Gaulle could have imposed. It restored the franc to solid status. French capital has been drawn back from overseas flight.

He set up the so-called "community of nations," a co-operative grouping of colonies now tied to France by their own consent. Only French Guinea turned it down.

The general has not solved the crucial Algerian problem, but he is still stubbornly trying. It would be foolhardy at this stage to say that this determined and surprisingly imaginative man will not finally succeed, though Algeria is admittedly his toughest nut.

His firm adherence to principle, his steady assertion of a strong French posture in international dealings, has won new regard for France on the world scene. His bold venture into partnership with West Germany has further buttressed the French position.

A man of such stout character and such vigorous ideas does not please everybody, either at home or abroad. But Charles de Gaulle, more than any man in the recent past, has given Frenchmen their faith again, and thereby has led them back to full membership in the family of free nations.

It is hoped that tax-paying citizens, and who isn't, arise against this dictating to their way of private living. "A man's home is his castle" it is said, and I promise the persons invading mine to enforce this idiotic law will receive a proper dousing.

POLITICS IN PANAMA.

(London Times Weekly.)

Politics in Panama have been, for a long time, a closed shop, with membership restricted to a group of families and their ramifications.

Power changes hands periodically, sometimes violently, as in 1955 when President Remon was assassinated at the racecourse and his successor very soon afterwards found himself deeply implicated in the affair. In fifty-six years Panama has had twenty-nine Presidents.

The ordinary Panamanians have come to regard the ring of the changes in this political masquerade almost with dispassion, and their neighbors, to the north and south, do the same; furthermore, they do not really feel that Panama is part of the Latin American family.

KEY INDUSTRY IN TROUBLE

(Ottawa Journal.)

One of this country's largest dollar-earners for many years, the Canadian pulp and paper industry now finds itself in trouble. For years the major supplier of paper to both American and Canadian newspapers, the industry is now facing stiff competition from quick-growing pine in the Southern States. On top of this threat comes word from Moscow that Russia may enter the pulp and paper market, offering its products at prices lower than Canadian mills can afford to sell.

Heads of the pulp and paper industry here are doing their best to meet competition

through improved cutting and manufacturing methods. The fact remains that Canada is a cold country and that trees take much longer to grow here than in the semi-tropical South of the United States. Trees grow at much the same rate in Russia as they do in Canada, but if the Soviet State decided to break into the North American newsprint market, it would present a grave threat to Canadian mills.

Newsprint manufacturers in this country feel that they are forced to bear an undue heavy tax burden and now seek to have existing tax-rates and structures modified. The problem is highly complex and merits the closest examination both by provincial and federal authorities.

FORGOT THE VICTIM.

(Fort William Times-Journal.)

A London mob protested vigorously the hanging of a young man of 25 yesterday. Hundreds of persons milled outside the prison gates where a man who had killed a policeman was paying the supreme penalty. They took their anger out on prison guards, whom they called "Savages! Beasts! Murderers!"

Such a mob is created by humane sentiment, well organized against the death penalty for murderers. There is nothing much wrong in their clamoring against hangings. Yet one wonders how many of this mob felt such compassion for the slain policeman that they were impelled to mourn his loss at his funeral.

OTTAWA.—The idea of good emerging from evil has been used by writers down through the centuries in opposition to the moralistic thesis that evil can produce only more of the same.

In this good-from-evil concept it is interesting to consider the case of the National Energy Board and the Texas oilmen.

Thinking back over the politics-spattered story of gas exploitation in this decade, it becomes obvious that the oilmen who sailed through the nation's stock exchanges, plundering as they went, performed some valuable services for the country.

Their unrestrained profit-taking shocked Canadians into an awareness of the value of Canada's resources of gas and other forms of energy. Service number one. Their operations brought official thinking to bear sharply on the problems of protecting the national interest in the exploitation of energy. Service number two. And their callous rapacity produced curbs on excesses which are embodied in the legislation setting up the National Energy Board. Service number three.

Thus it might even be said that unwittingly they earned the millions they took back to Texas.

the citizen expressed through his elected representatives are protected, and the rights of the subject to justice under law are safeguarded.

The government did not see fit to empower the board to limit returns to stockholders on some basis proportionate to stockholders' equity in pipeline companies. This constitutes a rejection of a major recommendation of the Borden royal commission, and probably is a concession to the need to encourage a continuing flow of new capital into the gas industry.

Nevertheless, the powers of the board are probably sufficient, given firm governmental backing, to write "finis" to the era of the Texas oilmen and their Canadian jackals.

The profits that Texas oilman Clint W. Murchison and his sons and associates made in their Canadian gas pipeline activities are not on record, but those made by some of their associates in Canada are. One reaped a tax free capital gain of \$1,457,500 in 19 months. Another made \$1,325,000. A good many more made profits in the hundreds of thousands from penny investments, by grabbing the coattails of the Texans—like one man who invested \$300 and made \$528,000. The experience was costly. But maybe in the long run it will prove worth the price.

Prehistoric Monster

New Specimen For Calgary Zoo

AUCKLAND, N.Z. (CP) — Calgary Zoo will soon get a real prehistoric monster for its prehistoric park.

Permission has been given for a New Zealand expedition to capture a tuatara for the Alberta city. The tuatara is New Zealand's "living fossil." It can call the dinosaur which once roamed the earth its first cousin.

Now rare on the mainland of New Zealand, and found in any numbers only on a few small islands off the coast, the tuatara is a small version of the monsters of prehistoric times. The average specimen is only about two feet long and weighs two pounds, but still bears a close resemblance to the giant creatures of the past.

The species has survived almost unchanged for untold centuries, and still has a rudimentary third eye in the forehead.

Looking like grim, bored, aloof and singularly ugly lizards, they move in a sluggish way which seems to indicate complete disillusion with an existence extending back into the dawn of history. In fact, individual tuataras are thought to live more than 100 years, although their life span is uncertain since they have only been known for little more than a century and have been subject to close study for a much shorter period.

They roar, but in muted tones. Tape recordings of their cries sound when amplified for all the world like the famed movie lion. Tuataras may be captured only with special permission from the

New Zealand government, and few zoos in the world have specimens.

Calgary asked for a specimen last year in order to have a live creature to match the models of prehistoric monsters in a special display there.

The Auckland Zoo offered to obtain a specimen, but the government at that time banned an expedition to Stephens Island, the only place which has a sufficiently thriving colony to spare specimens for export. The government said visits to the island

could only be made at intervals, and no further trip was planned for some months.

Permission now has been given, however, and the Auckland Zoo has arrangements in hand for an expedition to Stephens Island, which lies in Cook Strait between the two main islands of New Zealand.

It is planned to air-freight the tuatara to Calgary after it has become accustomed to captivity. The party does not expect to have difficulty in making its capture, since tuataras are slow-moving creatures.

DECENT PRISONERS

(Vancouver Province)

We should not be so much surprised that four Oakalla prisoners behaved like decent human beings the other day.

When a guard fell from a bridge, knocked himself out and lay in danger of drowning, these four renounced a first-class opportunity to escape and instead rescued their guard. The rest of the prisoners on the work party went for help.

The basic belief underlying the treatment program now transforming Oakalla, is that prisoners are potentially decent men who need to be assisted to solve their personality and background problems so that they are free to act like decent men.

If Warden Hugh Christie and his staff didn't believe this there wouldn't be much point in their treatment program.

But they would like us to believe it, too, because the staff of a prison can't to the whole job of reforming a man. If reformation is to stick, he must also be accepted back into a community that is willing to give him a chance.

As Deputy Warden Duncan Clark pointed out, the staff at Oakalla wasn't surprised that these men behaved well. They would have been surprised if they hadn't.

Perhaps we should try to share their faith.

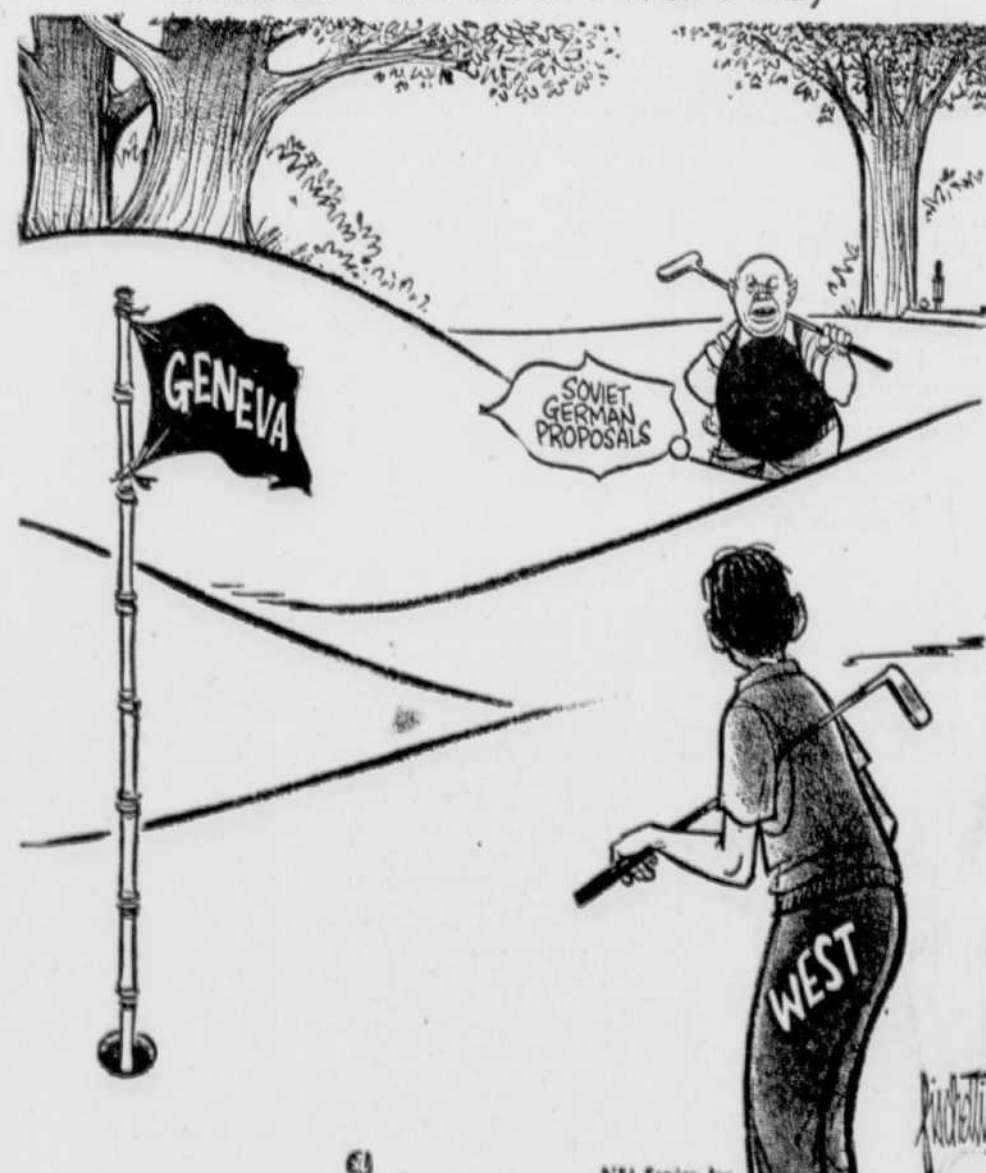

John Meyer, financial editor of the Montreal Gazette, told the conference a commercial policy based on the maintenance of exports is no longer adequate to meet Canadian requirements. Domestic markets must be made available to Canadian manufacturers or else the growth of manufacturing in Canada will be slowed, he said.

The three-day conference was attended by representatives of 44 Canadian firms engaged in the production of man-made fibres and fabrics.

Mulberry Mothers Protest Traffic

MONTREAL (CP) — A delegation of Mulberry Street mothers is to meet today with an official of the city's traffic department to talk over problems arising from heavy traffic which has been rerouted through their formerly peaceful street.

Tuesday a number of mothers and neighborhood children blocked all traffic entering Mulberry Street from Namur Street for about two hours. The move was to dramatize their desire to close off the street from through traffic. The neighborhood mothers set up a similar blockade April 24.

'Prevent Madness'

BONN, West Germany (Reut) — Evangelical students in West Germany have called on teachers and parents to inform the younger generation frankly about the "terrible, anti-semitic events" of the past, the official West German government bulletin said Wednesday. The students said their appeal was to prevent "youth from being led again into madness."

LICE ARE THE REAL DIRTY GUYS OF THE INSECT WORLD

There is a strong possibility that if we succeed in blowing ourselves off the face of the globe, and probably destroying most other animal life with us, insects will inherit what remains.

Be that as it may, there are many insects which sometimes seem to already have begun to take us over. Among these is the body louse — an insect pest which is unpleasant and mortifying to a acquire, a particular source of trouble in times of war, famine or overcrowding.

Several kinds of lice may infest human beings. Most of them prefer the human scalp, except for the so-called "crab louse" which likes the groin region.

Some people seem to have a special attraction for lice. Lice will actually desert the bodies of some for more attractive locations.

Lice lay eggs, or nits, on the body. These hatch in about seven days. The nits are not destroyed by most treatments, so that they must be taken care of in some other way — usually by treatment after hatching.

Personal cleanliness is the most important part of prevention. There is no doubt that bathing in warm water and the use of soap at least once a week, together with frequent changes into clean clothing, reduces the chances of acquiring lice.

Crowding acts to spread louse infestation. In rapidly growing and crowded communities these vermin are frequently found even among clean families.

Treatment was often difficult in the past because the substances which poisoned lice did not always work and their applications took a great deal of time and work on the part of the patient.

Now, partly as a result of experience learned during the war, there are several quite satisfactory methods of eliminating lice from the human body.

These newer methods include the use of DDT powder, a substance known as benzyl benzoate, and for body lice a kind of bomb made up of what is called freon pyrethrum. This can be sprayed over the entire body in a few seconds, providing a suitable place for use is available.

In order to make any of these treatments successful however, it is important to follow directions closely and, in the case of head lice, to guard against injuries to the eyes.

The female louse lays from 50 to 150 eggs a day and the average louse will live from 30 to 40 days.

Besides the discomfort and embarrassment of having lice, there is some danger involved. Several diseases, including typhus and plague, are carried by lice. The more people have lice the more risk there is of spreading such diseases.

'Must' Reading for Mothers Living With Married Child

Here's a letter that ought to be required reading for any parent living in the home of a married son or daughter. A husband who has become a displaced person in his own home writes:

"Last winter my wife's mother came to live with us and her actions have almost wrecked our long and happy marriage.

"This is not an unusual story. I am sure, but what is tragic about it is that my mother-in-law is not even aware that she has caused so much unhappiness by her interference.

"What do I mean by interference? She gives our children orders, and disciplines our children in our presence. She takes sides in discussions between my wife and me over family matters that in no way concern her.

"She makes rules for our children in direct conflict with rules already established by my wife and me, and criticizes me in the presence of my children, and once even in the presence of my friends. She constantly bosses my wife around as if she were a child unable to make up her own mind or come to her own decisions.

"Underlying it all, I believe, is

a solicitude for her daughter so overwhelming that it blinds her to the great harm she is doing.

"The harm? The children are at first confused and then belligerent and finally disobedient. My wife, fearing to displease her mother, takes her side in all disputes and our relationship deteriorates day by day. We become edgy. We avoid talking things over for fear of becoming involved in a real quarrel.

"Because I love my wife and do not hate my mother-in-law, I have avoided sitting down with her for a frank discussion of the problem. Knowing her disposition, I am afraid she would blow up and storm out of the house, vowing never to return. Then my wife would blame me and I am sure our split would be complete.

"I'm not asking for advice. I am writing this in the hope that through your column you could warn other mothers-in-law not to interfere in the family lives of their married children."

Natives With Spears And Homburg Hats Met By Red Cross Overseas Director

LONDON (CP) — When Joan Whittington visited an African village in Swaziland, a man wearing animal skins and carrying spears rushed forward to greet her.

The grey-haired overseas director of the British Red Cross was the first representative of the organization he had ever seen. He thanked her profusely for food parcels he had received as a

prisoner of war in Tobruk. "He said they had kept him alive and was so happy that he could thank a person from the Red Cross at last."

It is incidents like this, says Miss Whittington, "which make the job such a rewarding one and give such a feeling of satisfaction."

FOUND 30 BRANCHES

A youthful-looking 50, Miss Whittington was appointed overseas director in 1947. Since then she has helped to found 30 branches of the Red Cross in British colonial territories.

For three months each year she travels to countries in need of medical or welfare services and talks with local or government authorities. But her work doesn't end there. Sometimes she starts a centre personally and she never lets wars or revolts interfere with her job.

During the disturbances in Malaya, Kenya and Cyprus, Miss Whittington travelled across the affected countries, helping to set up Red Cross facilities and centres to rehabilitate people made homeless.

This meant sometimes travelling through steamy jungles, protected only by her uniform.

BIG KENYA JOB

She thinks one of the biggest recent achievements of the Red Cross was in Kenya during the Mau Mau disorders. Miss Whittington went there at the begin-

ning of the emergency to organize health and welfare services for the women and children.

She was met by four Africans dressed in blankets and wearing homburg hats trimmed with feathers. They acted as guards during her stay.

Miss Whittington began a simple training scheme for hundreds of Kikuyu women in which they were taught elementary child care and how to improve their dress and home conditions.

"We even taught them to make curtains for the windows of their huts."

Miss Whittington, who considers her job a part-time one, likes to relax by doing farm work at her home in Surrey.

She thinks she is fortunate in having her Red Cross work which followed a spell as a volunteer nurse during the war, when she served in the Middle East and Italy with the 8th army.

Slight Discord Between Cus D'Amato And Promoter Rosensohn, Talk Of Moving Fight Out Of New York

NEW YORK (AP)—Under the surface discord between promoter Bill Rosensohn and Cus D'Amato erupted Wednesday and threatened the Floyd Patterson-Ingenieur Johansson heavyweight title fight at Yankee Stadium, June 25.

The 38-year-old promoter accused D'Amato, Patterson's manager, of casting doubts on whether the fight will be staged. Rosensohn said he would sue the manager if he pulls the championship out of the fight.

"D'Amato called me yesterday morning and said he was thinking of moving the fight from New York," said the New York promoter. "I told him the fight was going to be held right here at Yankee Stadium and that I was not going to be intimidated. I've got too much at stake in this already."

"HE CAN'T PULL OUT" — "I don't care what he says any more. He can't pull out. If he does, he's a ruined man — in my view as well as public opinion. I'll sue him for everything. He's determined to put the fight on."

The key man to the puzzling promotion—D'Amato—couldn't be reached. That is not unusual. If Johansson and Patterson were concerned about the backstage squabbling, they didn't show it at their training camps.

"It is nothing but good publicity for the fight," said the Swedish challenger at his Grossinger, N.Y., camp. "There will be a fight. Patterson is too much of a gentleman to stop the fight or let his manager stop the fight now."

Patterson, who does the fighting and leaves everything else to his manager, took it out on four sparring partners in a four-round drill at his Chatham, N.J., camp. He dropped a newcomer, Billy Tisdale of Bridgeport, Conn., with a right to the jaw.

FINSTERWALD'S GOLF... No. 26 Grain Is For Or Against

Another of a series written for NEA Service and Sherbrooke Record.

By DOW FINSTERWALD PGA Champion

As Ben Hogan pointed out, reading the green is like understanding the fine type in a contract.

A golfer can lose strokes by not making a close study of the greens and that costs a professional money on the circuit. If you see a "shine" between the ball and the cup you know the grain of the grass is with you and the putt will be faster. If upon sizing up the green from a 90-degree angle to the left of the line you observe this shine, you know the grain will carry the ball off line to the right. This is why top players study a putt from the side as well as from in back of the ball.

When the green appears dark-green, you know the grain of the grass is against you and you must allow accordingly.

The best putting stroke is of

little avail if you fail to reckon with the grain.

NEXT: The best missed putt is the one nearest the hole.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Bob Carpenter, president of Philadelphia Phillies, Wednesday bought the 65 acres in New Jersey which not long ago were reported to be the future stamping ground of the ball club.

But Carpenter insisted, after making the announcement, that he obtained the land primarily as a personal investment, although it would be available as a site for a sports stadium.

The club's present home, Connie Mack Stadium, is small and lacks adequate parking facilities.

In Philadelphia Mayor Richardson Dilworth has conferred with groups determined not to lose the Phillies and has asked for cost estimates for possible stadium sites.

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Posts His 256th Major League Win With Five-Hitter Against Cleveland; Yanks Edge Red Sox But Remain Deep

If the way Cleveland has managed to hold the American League lead is a surprise, imagine where the Indians might be if they could shake loose from Chicago White Sox, the club they have a tough time beating, and Early Wynn, the guy they can't beat at all.

Half of Cleveland's 14 defeats through the first quarter of the schedule have been from the second-place White Sox. And three of those have been nailed by Wynn, who has won seven in a row from the Indians since they traded him away 1 1/2 years ago.

If the Indians could reverse that 3-7 season record against Chicago, they'd be orbiting 6 1/2 games above the rest of the league. Instead, they are just a game in front after Wynn (7-3) and the White Sox went to work again Wednesday for a 5-1 victory.

Baltimore, the only other club with an edge (3-2) over Cleveland this year, missed a chance to close in when Washington's Camilo Pascual beat the third-place Orioles 6-0 with a two-hitter.

YANKS TAKE SQUEAKER — Last-place New York squeezed past Boston 3-2 in the other game. Wynn, 39-year-old righthander, closed in on the top-20 group of all-time winners with his 256th victory, but needed Gerry Stalvey's relief help for the last two outs. The Indians scored in the first on doubles by Ed Fitzgerald and Minnie Minoso but were blanked the rest of the way on three hits.

Wynn, who gave way after a walk and Fitzgerald's second double in the ninth, is 21st on the all-time list of winners, four shy of Ted Lyons's 260. Wynn is tops among active pitchers.

TWO CHISOLM HOMERS — The White Sox, who had lost three in a row, put it away with eight hits against Gary Bell (4-3).

Two were homers, one a solo smash by Sherm Lollar and the other a one-on shot by Earl Torgeson in a clinching three-run sixth inning.

Pascual gained his first two-hitter after holding the Orioles hitless until Gene Woodling and Albie Pearson singled in the seventh. A double play preserved the righthander's fifth major league shutout and fourth victory in eight decisions this season. Harmon Killebrew upped his major league-leading home run total to 16 with a three-run blast in the first inning against loser Arnie Portocarrero (0-4).

The Yankees were hitless until the fifth, when Andy Carey socked a home run against loser Ike Delock (5-2). Bill Skowron hit a two-run homer in the seventh for the winning margin as Boston broke through Duke Maas's two-hit shutout bid on Pete Runnels's two-run homer in the ninth. Reliever Ryne Duren saved it for Maas (3-2) and the Yanks, who were out 5-4.

Royals Blast Columbus For 12-2 Victory

MONTREAL (CP) — Montreal Royals supported the seven-hit pitching of Tommy LaSorda by lambasting three Columbus hurlers for 13 hits and a 12-2 International League win.

The outcome created a three-way tie for second place in the standing among the Royals, Rochester Red Wings and Buffalo Bisons, all a half-game behind Miami Marlins.

Columbus fell one game off the pace. LaSorda chalked up his fourth win against one setback.

Clyde Parriss' three-run homer high-lighted a six-run outburst that put the game away for Montreal in the eighth inning.

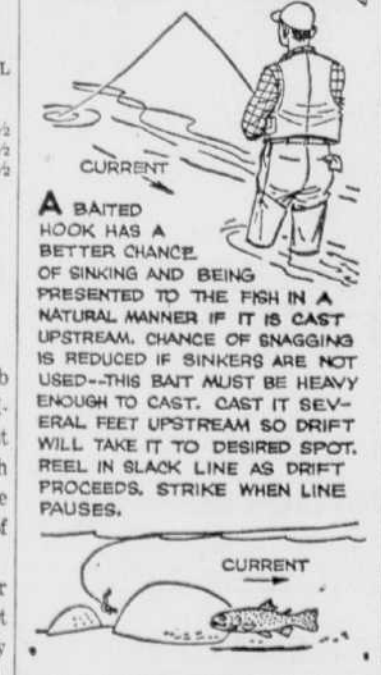
CBC And Big Four Reach Agreement For \$312,500
