Tragedy at Flodden.

Mr. Charles Rose Gored to Death By a Bull.

A frightful fatality took place at Flodden on Tuesday afternoon, when Mr. Charles Rose was leading a four-year-old bull to the water. The bull was secured in the usual way, but the stick attached to the ring broke and the bull set on the unfortunate man, knocking him down, and gored him leaving him in a deplorable condition. The infuriated animal was at last captured and made safe, and afterwards destroyed. Mr. Rose lingered on in agony from the hour of the occurrence, which was four o'clock to the following morning at eight o'clock, when he expired. The entire neighborhood is very much saddened by such a tragical and unforeseen occurrence. The funeral services took place in Flodden church, and were conducted by the Rev. Dr. Kellock Friday afternoon at one o'clock. Mr. Rose leaves a wife and four children to bemoan his loss.

Canada's Affairs Managed in a Business Like Way.

In a recent issue the London Saturday Review declared: "No Imperial business has been managed in a more business-like way than the development of Canada. Of course, the essential cause of the increase in prosperity has been the natural capacity of the country for growing corn and the development of the corn growing industry has been only retarded by the lack of railways. But even railways over a gigantic corn area are more or less useless without men, and in the attraction of population the Dominion Government has shown admirable skill." Unlike certain of our conservative contemporaries, the Review does not give Providence credit for producing all the prevailing prosperity.

Neglected Its Duty.

Rev. S. S. Bland's Criticism of the Methodist Church.

In a sermon on John Wesley's greatness on Sunday night in connection with the bi-centenary celebration Rev. S. G. Bland, Ottawa, said that if the Methodist Church had paid less attention to harping on such minor questions as amusements and devoted more attention to attacking real evils there would not be the disgusting rotten state of affairs revealed in Ontario politics today—a Province supposed to be one-third Methodist.

HON. H. T. DUFFY PASSES AWAY.

Did Not Regain Consciousness.

Sketch of the Late Provincial Treasurer.

Hon. H. T. Duffy, Provincial Treasurer, whose serious illness was reported in Friday's paper, died at three o'clock on Friday afternoon. He took a turn for the worse at 1 o'clock and rapidly sank until he passed away without regaining consciousness. From the very first moment Dr. Colin Sewell saw the honorable gentleman he entertained no hopes of his recovery, and gave him but a short time to live. He attributes Hon. Mr. Duffy's death to diabetic coma, better known as apoplexy. It is thought that the remains of deceased will be conveyed to the home of his private secretary, Mr. A. Doughty, St. Eastache street, Quebec, whence the funeral will take place.

Hon. Mr. Duffy was born in Durham, County of Drummond, and educated at the St. Francis College, Richmond, and later at the McGill University, where he took his degree of B.A. and graduated with honors in English literature in the year 1876. He afterwards followed a course in law in the same university and took his B.C.L. degree in 1878, and was duly called to the Bar. Hon. Mr. Duffy practiced his profession in the town of Sweetsburg, P.Q., where he became very popular and at one period held the position of Mayor. He was a strong advocate of temperance and was prominently identified with the Brome County Temperance Alliance. Deceased unsuccessfully contested the County of Brome for the Legislature at the general elections of 1888. He was, however, returned at the general election of 1897, and on the formation of the late Hon. Mr. Marchand's Cabinet, in the month of May of the same year, was called to it, and entrusted with the portfolio as Minister of Public Works. On the death of Premier Marchand and the formation of the present Government by Hon. Mr. Poirer, he was named Provincial Treasurer, which portfolio he held up to the time of his death. Deceased was one of the old school Liberals, honest in his opinions, and also firm in his personal integrity. The honorary degree of D.C.L. was conferred upon him at Bishop's College, Lennoxville, on the 18th June last.

THE NEWS IN SHERBROOKE.

The news of the sudden death of the Hon. H. T. Duffy, came as a great shock to his many friends in this city on Friday afternoon. The remark was made by Liberal M.P. for the city, Mr. J. G. Macdonald, that the death means a distinct loss to the Province of Quebec.

It was pretty well understood that the late Provincial Treasurer was to have come to the Superior Court, Sherbrooke, in the fall, and the appointment was looked upon with much favour by the members of the Bar.

It is only the other day that the late hon. gentleman was in the city, and in discussing the affairs of the Province with friends, expressed himself as being very much satisfied with the position of affairs. He complained of not feeling well, but spoke in such a way as if a rest, after the arduous duties of the session, would be the means of restoring his health again. It is now evident that he sacrificed his health to the demands of his office. He has been a devoted public servant, and was stricken down at the post of duty.

FUNERAL TO-DAY AT ULVEBTON.

The remains of the late Hon. H. T. Duffy were conveyed from Quebec to South Durham on Saturday, and the funeral will take place from the latter place to L'Assommoir, where the remains will be buried today.

A Great University Projected in London.

Lord Rosebery, as Chancellor of the University of London, England, has announced that Wernher, Beit & Co., Sir Ernest Cassel, Lord Strathcona and other public spirited citizens have offered to contribute \$15,000,000 to erect a scientific university in London, if the London County Council undertake to keep it up at a cost of £150,000 annually. The Government has promised a site for the institution in South Kensington. The institution will be devoted to advanced scientific and technological education.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE HEALING.

Important Judgment Issued by Ontario Court of Appeal.

Verdict of Jury Against J. Lewis Upheld.

The practice of Christian Science healing has received a severe setback at the hands of the Ontario Court of Appeal, in the judgment delivered by that court in the case of the King against James Henry Lewis.

Lewis was tried and convicted in November, 1901, at Toronto, on a charge of manslaughter, arising out of the death of his son Roy, in August of that year from diphtheria. The indictment charged that the said James Henry Lewis being under a legal duty to provide necessaries for the said Roy Lewis, then under the age of sixteen years, did then and there neglect and omit to provide necessary medical treatment, medicines, assistance and other necessaries whereby the death of the said Roy Lewis was caused.

The prisoner was a member of the religious body known as the Church of Christ Scientist, of which an essential belief is that God heals the sick as well as the sinful, and in which body resort is had to prayer, by which is meant silent communion with God as a means of healing the sick. This was the treatment given to the deceased, and many witnesses were called by the defendant to prove that the treatment was beneficial, and they had been cured by it.

The jury found the prisoner guilty, but as objection had been taken by Mr. Vickers, his counsel, to parts of the judge's charge to the jury, sentence was suspended, and Lewis allowed out on his own bail pending answers to the following three questions submitted by the trial judge, Chief Justice Falconbridge, to the Court of Appeal: "1. Was there sufficient evidence to warrant the verdict."

"2. Was my direction to the jury that the word necessaries as used in the code includes medicines and medical attendance, correct?" "3. Was I right in directing the jury that the evidence of the numerous witnesses that they had been cured by Christian Science methods, was of no value except as showing the good faith of the prisoner?"

The decision of the Court of Appeal was stated by Chief Justice Meech: "We are of the opinion that the answers to all these questions should, generally speaking, be in the affirmative: "1. We think there was sufficient evidence to warrant the verdict."

"2. We also think that the learned judge did properly charge the jury that the word necessaries includes medicine and medical treatment."

"3. With regard to this question, we think that this evidence (as to other cures), should not have been admitted at all, but that in any event it forms no answer to the charge."
