Mayor Vehemently Opposes County Council Tax Increase For Shawville Village

Minutes of proceedings of the Municipal Council of the County of Pontiac at a regular quarterly session held in the Court House, Campbell's Bay, Que., on Wednesday, December 12th, 1956 at which were present His Worship the Warden, Mayor Thomas J. McGuire of the Township of Allumette Island East, and 23 County Councillors forming a quorum of Council.

The roll was called and the Warden called upon the new members to subscribe to their Oaths of Office, Councillor Lee Hodgins of Shawville conformed.

The minutes of the last regular quarterly session of September 12th, 1956, were read and adopted and signed without amendment.

Cr. Omer Dufault gave notice that he will at the March 13th session of this Council, introduce By Law No. V levying a rate of taxation for the 1957 fiscal year.

The following correspondence was read to Board; a reply from Ray Johnston, MPP on the subject of the Road construction to the Pembroke-Allumette Island Bridge; Acknowledgement of this County's condolences from Mrs. Emerson Cotie; Acknowledgement of the Grant to Hull Social Ser-

vice; and a letter from the president of the Fort Coulonge Curling Club Inc. appealing for financial assistance in the form of either a loan or a donation. No action whatever is taken in the latter instance.

It was moved by Crs. John J. McBane and seconded by Cr. Daniel Farrell that the following bills be paid:

Municipality of Bristol, bounty \$30.00; Rodolphe Asselin, caretaker, \$20.00; Pontiac Anti-Tuberculosis Ass'n. grant, \$100.00; A. Labelle, Secretary-Treasurer, \$200; stencils \$10.00; Mrs. Rene Asselin, Cercle des Fermiers \$25.00; W. J. Hayes & Son, wreath, \$15.30; Municipality Grand Calumet, bounty, \$40.00; Sessional expenses \$1385.40 with total expenses of \$1825.40.

Carried. Council proceeded to the examination, revision, equalization and homologation of the Valuation Rolls. It was moved by Crs. John McBane and Russell Taber that North Onslow's valuation for county purposes be established at \$250,000.00.

Carried. It is moved by Crs. J. C. Poisson and Eric Copeland that the Valuations of Aldfield and Dorion and Church be increased by \$5,000.00 each, to \$255,735.00 and \$205,000.00 respectively. Carried. It was moved by Crs. McBane and Russell Taber that Shawville's Valuation be increased to \$1,000,000 for County Purposes.

A vote was taken showing ten in favour and ten against. Cr. Elsie M. Gibbons introduced an amendment seconded by Cr. Jas. Turcotte that Shawville's valuation be established at \$875,000.00.

A vote was taken showing eleven in favour of the amendment and four against and the amendment was declared carried. Councillor Lee A. Hodgins of Shawville vigorously objects and went on record as vehemently opposing this measure.

It was moved by Cr. J. Hilliard Beattie and seconded by Cr. Earl P. Fulford that the valuation rolls for County purposes be hereby homologated with the above amendments and the following results:

The Secretary Treasurer informed Council of the establishment of 49 new Municipalities in

the unorganized section of this County and produced a map showing the location of each. Many valuable properties lie within this area, particularly along the Senneville Highway which are subject to municipal taxation by this County Council, when no local municipal council exists. It was moved by Crs. J.H. Beattie and Omer Dufault that the Secretary Treasurer secure all possible information in the matter of names and locations of taxable properties, approximate cost of assessment, etc., with a view to the appointment of assessors at the March session should such be found practicable. Carried.

HIGHWAY NO. 8

Concern over the dangerous condition of No. 8 Highway has been voiced on all sides during the past couple of weeks. This concern was publicly voiced at the December meeting of Shawville Council when telegrams were sent to Ray Johnston and the Department of Roads, urging that action be taken to have salt and calcium laid throughout its length. Replies received indicate that this is the responsibility of the local snowplow committees.

Contracts with plowmen require only the spreading of sand on hills where necessary. The sand is provided by the township councils and only the responsibility for spreading its rests with the plowmen.

What is needed is a change in policy which would require the spreading of salt and calcium over the entire length of Highway No. 8. The problem has been met quite effectively in Bristol Township where a small amount per mile was withheld by the secretary of the snowplow committee from payments owing to plowmen. The amount withheld was sufficient to purchase 12 tons of salt and calcium this year. Delivery has been made within the last week.

This is one way — and a good one — of solving the problem. It will mean good highway conditions for the rest of the winter in Bristol. The unfortunate fact remains that there is no likelihood of good conditions on the rest of Highway 8 this year.

It appears that it would be necessary for all snowplow committees to agree on a course of action in this regard, to be followed in future years; or have the provincial government dictate to the committees what work must be done to keep the highway properly cleared. This latter course seems to be the easier, since it is the government that pays the shot to the local snowplow committees.

If the government were to take a firm stand on this point, by providing that highway snow removal allowances would be paid only if the highways were kept bare, then this province would in one step have achieved a standard of winter road maintenance equal to that of Ontario, and much more important, would have achieved highways reasonably safe for winter driving.

Most people living in Pontiac are aware of just how bad Highway 8 gets in the winter months. For those who do not, we can state as a fact that more than one salesman who visits the Printshop make the trip from Shawville to Ottawa during the winter, via Haley and Renfrew, where they can enjoy the relative safety and comfort of Highway 17, even though it means a drive of over 90 miles instead of 50.
