Seeing the Editor.
An interesting story is related by
Colonel Dennison in the volume "Sol-
diering in Canada" concerning the late
Sir Henry Havelock-Allan, who was a

how she liked his horse. She said very
much, and I gave my opinion that it
was about the finest horse I had seen
on the river that day. He then told us
an anecdote about the horse. He said
he had ridden into Darlington, which
was close to his country seat, and he
sent a boy up to the editor of the news-
paper asking him to come down to the
street to speak to him for a few min-
utes, as he could not leave his horse.
The editor was too busy to come down,
and Sir Henry went to him. He rode
up two flights of stairs into the editor's
room, spoke to him from the horse's
back, rode round his table and back
again and then made his way out into
the street. He said the horse tumbled
things about a good bit, and the editor
danced out of his way. "But," added
Sir Henry, "now the editor comes down
to me if I go to see him mounted."

Climbing Animals.
Dogs often have to be trained to
climb stairs, instinctively distrusting
the upper stories. It has been con-
jectured that this is because the dog's
forelegs break easily below the shoul-
der, and the beast seems to realize this.
The fox has no such fear and has been
known to climb a tree with plenty of
small limbs to the height of seventeen
feet. Swimming comes easier than
climbing to most animals as well as to
many races of men. Rats and guinea
pigs can swim well and do not climb at
all.

Bears can climb well if little, but the
grizzly and other large species stay
mainly on the ground. A bear always
climbs down a tree backward, as does
the domestic cat until she has nearly
reached the ground, when she turns
and jumps, but most wild cats run
down a trunk head first, even the heavy
leopard being a more skillful climber
than the light house cat. The tiger
and lion, however, do not climb, for no
discoverable reason unless it be that
they fear falling on account of their
weight.

Modifications of Iron.
Add carbon to pure iron, and it be-
comes steel. Add a hydrocarbon to
iron, and steel itself becomes so ex-
tensively modified that its properties
are not recognizable. Thus steel may
be soft as pure iron. Add hydrogen in
varying quantity, and it has the quali-
ty of resilience, as in the watch spring,
or the quality of tenacity, as in the
knife or razor, or may be given nearly
all the hardness of a diamond, as in a
file. With steel at a low temperature,
from 400 to 450 degrees F., edge tools
are produced and color in the yellow
shades; from 500 to 525 degrees various
sorts of springs are produced, color
blue, while by heating iron to white-
ness and plunging it into water, which
is mainly composed of hydrogen, files
are produced or forms even harder.

Ice in the Sickroom.
A medical journal tells how a saucer-
ful of shaved ice may be kept in a
sickroom through a day and night if
be, even with a fire in the room.
Put the saucer holding the ice in a
soup plate and cover it with another.
Then place the soup plates thus arranged
on a good, heavy pillow and cover
with another pillow, pressing the pil-
lows so that the plates are completely
imbedded in them. The paragraph adds
that one of the best ice shavers is an
old jack plane set deep. It should be
turned bottom upward and the ice
moved backward and forward over the
cutter.

COMPULSORY VACCINATION.**Sweeping Order Issued By Board of Health.**

Everyone Who Cannot Show a Mark Must Pay a Fine.

The Provincial Board of Health have issued instructions to the municipalities and towns in the Province of Quebec to enforce vaccination. This is done to stop the spread of smallpox which has practically developed into an epidemic.

Municipalities are called upon to pass bylaws calling for vaccination, and if at the expiration of 48 hours from the time the bylaw is passed, any person who is not able to establish that he has been successfully vaccinated within the past seven years, or who will not be able to establish by physician's certificate, that he has been vaccinated without success within the last six months, will be liable to a fine of \$5, and also to an additional fine of \$1 for each day he will have omitted or will omit to get vaccinated from the second day after the bylaw has come into force.

Any person may be called on after the passage of the bylaw to show a certificate and is liable to a fine of \$5 if he refuses to do so. Doctors are liable to a fine of \$20 if a false certificate is given.

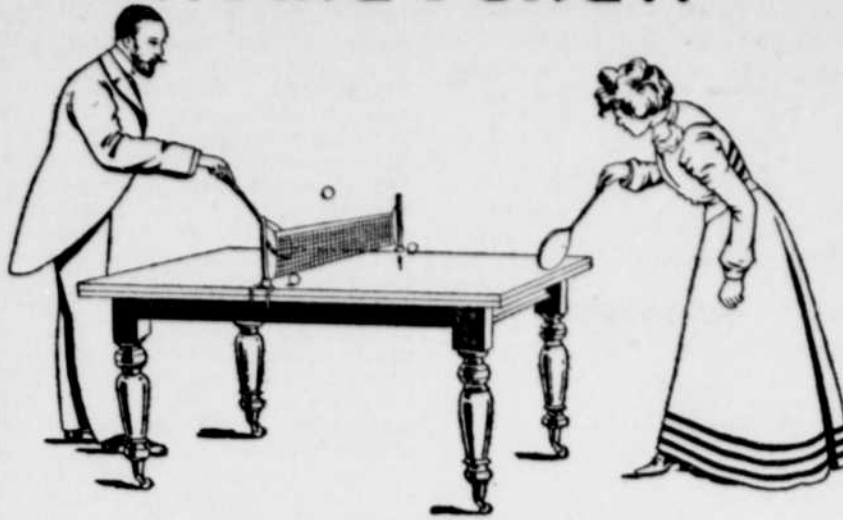

To Dwarf Trees.

To dwarf trees as the Chinese do you must follow their methods. They take a young plant, say a seedling or a cutting of cedar when two or three inches high, cut off its taproot as soon as it has enough other rootlets to live upon and replant it in a shallow pot or pan, allowing the end of the taproot to rest upon the bottom of the pan. Alluvial clay molded to the size of beans and just sufficient in quantity to furnish a scanty nourishment is then put into the pot. Water, heat and light are permitted on the same basis.

The Chinese also use various mechanical contrivances to promote symmetry of growth. As, owing to the shallow pots, both top and roots are easily accessible, the gardener uses the pruning knife and the searing iron freely, so that the little tree, hemmed on every side, eventually gives up the unequal struggle and, contenting itself with the little life left, grows just enough to live and look well.

BRITAIN'S MULES AND HORSES.

Britain Has Spent \$32,000,000 on American Live Stock.

The first cargo of horses and mules for the British army in South Africa left New Orleans on October 1, 1899. Since then up to the end of last week there have left New Orleans 140 transports loaded with animals for the British army, of which 78,491 were horses and 59,559 were mules, a total of 138,050 animals, costing the British Government \$31,676,270. The total cost of landing these animals in South Africa, exclusive of the maintenance of the British purchasing agency here, has been \$32,826,270, nearly all of which has been expended in this country.

The British agencies, here and at Kansas City, number 21 men under the command of Col. Ulrick de Burgh.

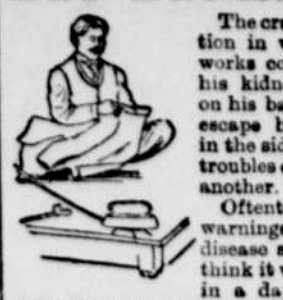
The Stubborn Man.

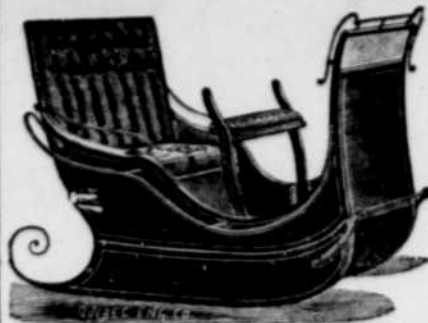

Difficulties Confronting Catholic Church.

Pope Condemns Excessive Liberty of Thought.

The Pope on Tuesday morning received the cardinals who offered him their Christmas greetings. The Pontiff made a lengthy address, during which he condemned the excessive liberty of thought indulged in at the present time. He sharply criticized socialism, agitation for divorce, and hostility between different sections of the church, and urged a union of the Christian churches.

The Church, said the Pope, during the course of his remarks, is now confronted by difficulties similar to those of earlier times. There were attempts everywhere to make the masses enemies of the Churches; the religious orders were subjected to all kinds of vexatious proscriptions, and laws were being passed in open defiance of God's eternal laws.

In his reference to socialism, the Pontiff said the only means of successfully combating it was for Catholics to hearken to and obey the instructions of the Church.

A cabinet meeting of the Provincial Ministers was held in Montreal on Monday, when a delegation asked that the provincial ex-emption be held in St. John's, Que., and that \$12,000 be granted for that purpose.
