RARE ENCOUNTER.—A man named Vezina, in the service of Mr. Leggo, was walking home from a visit to his relatives at St. Joy on Sunday night, about eleven o'clock, when he heard a large bird flying directly towards his face. He flourished his walking stick to keep it at bay, and to his astonishment laid an immense owl stunned at his feet. It took two or three more blows to kill the bird, which, on bringing home, he found to measure four feet across the wings.

ROWDIES.—On Sunday midnight the streets of St. John's suburbs were traversed by bands of lawless, drunken rowdies, bent on doing mischief. One of these gangs attacked a man passing down Cote a Coton, and used him in a most brutish manner, kicking him severely about the face and body. The rascals took to their heels.

## COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS.

BEFORE MR. JUSTICE MAQUIRE.

To-day, John Arwin was tried for stealing \$10.50, belonging to Philip Scanton, on the 8th November last. The prisoner, being related to Scanton's wife, was allowed to live in her house, for some time, but was turned out of it, on account of his drunken habits. Soon after he left, about \$80 in silver was missed, and when arrested, a few days afterwards, the money mentioned in the indictment was found on his person. He admitted that the \$10.50 formed part of what he took from Scanton, and said he would not have robbed him had he not been put out of the house. The jury found the prisoner guilty.

Jean Caron was put upon his trial for larceny of a box of scented soap, the property of Mr. J. A. Mailloir, on the 29th of November last. The box, proved to have been taken from Mr. Mailloir's store, was traced to the prisoner, who sold it to a shop keeper in St. Roch's, and when taxed with the crime by Mr. Mailloir the prisoner admitted that he was with the party who stole it. Verdict guilty.

Jean Caron, Eliezer Paradis and Thomas Armatrust were tried for stealing eight sides of harness leather of the value of \$40, from Desiré Guay on the 4th December last. There was no direct evidence of the theft, but it was proved that the prisoners had sold the leather, which was fully identified, to several parties, shortly after the offence. Verdict guilty.

The Grand Jury brought in true bills against Patrick Flanagan, George Thompson, and Eliezer Roy, for larceny and receiving stolen goods; Louis Boivin, for aggravated assault; and Mary Ann Roue, wife of James Nugent Clarke, for assaulting a bailiff in the execution of his duty. All of these defendants were arraigned, and pleaded not guilty.

The Grand Jury returned indictments as to the bills against Danmore Moore and Patrick Tohey for larceny; and no bill against Patrick Doyle for larceny, and Eliezer Black for receiving stolen goods.

The Grand Jury having completed the business before them, were thanked for their attendance, by the Court, and discharged.

## ST. GEORGE'S SOCIETY.

In the absence of Mr. White, President, who had left for England on the day previous, the first Vice-President, Mr. Fitch, was called to the chair, and Mr. G. T. Cary requested to act as secretary.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

GEORGE W. INNES, The Managing Committee of your Society beg to hand to you your annual report for the year just closing.

The anniversary of St. George's Day was celebrated by Divine Service at the Cathedral, under an excellent sermon was preached by the Rev. G. W. Innes, to a crowded congregation, and the collection amounted to \$250.41, as well as a sum of money spent by the Society, and have done a larger amount of good than for many years; the various steamboat and railway companies making a heavy reduction in their fares when applied to for passages by the Society, and in several instances the St. George's Steam Company refusing any remuneration.

At the same time we regret to have to record the loss of W. S. Sewell, Esquire, Sheriff, Edward Poston, Esquire, and Captain James Bankier—all life members; also of Samuel Newton, Esquire, one of the original members, and also a life member of this Society, and at all times an active and zealous member. Eighteen years ago Mr. Newton was Vice-President, and up to the time of his death was one of the most useful members of the Committee of Management.

## THE CANADIAN EPISCOPAL CHURCH AND THE ROYAL PREROGATIVE.

The following correspondence is published by the authority of the Lord Bishop of Montreal:

"Elmsley Rectory, Drogheda," Nov. 27, 1866.

My dear Lord, I have much pleasure in forwarding to your lordship a copy of a letter I have received from the Earl of Carnarvon, together with a document from myself, giving you the necessary authority to proceed at once with the consecration of the site of the proposed new cathedral.

There has been any delay in the matter, but as we have hitherto acted on such occasions under a mandate from the Crown, I certainly should not have felt warranted in proceeding without it until thus advised to do so by some sufficient authority. And I am sure it will be satisfactory to your lordship, and to the Canadian church generally, to know that it is after a very full and careful consideration of our position, in connection with all the recent judgments, that the Secretary of State for the Colonies, acting in accordance with the opinion of the law officers of the Crown, has written the letter of which I now forward you a copy.

To the Lord Bishop of Toronto.

Downing Street, 21st Nov. 1866.

My Lord, I have received your lordship's letter of the 10th of October, relating to the proposed appointment of the Archbishop of Toronto to be coadjutor Bishop of that diocese under the title of Bishop of Niagara, and his consecration in Canada with as little delay as possible. It appears, by the recent decision of the Judicial Committee in the case of the Bishop of Natal, that Her Majesty has not the power to create a diocese, or assign a sphere of action to a Bishop in a colony in which an independent legislature has been established.

And it is the opinion of the law officers of the Crown, to whom I have caused this question to be submitted, that a mandate from the Crown is not necessary to enable colonial bishops to perform the set of consecration. As, therefore, the intervention of the Crown is not legally required, either to give to the Archbishop of Toronto the intended jurisdiction, or to authorise his consecration to the office of Bishop, it would not appear that the proposed mandate could have any legal effect, and under such circumstances, it would hardly be consistent with the dignity of the Crown that Her Majesty should be advised to issue such a mandate.

It will thus rest with yourselves and the other Bishops of Canada, and will be in your own power under the Canadian acts of 19 and 20 Vic., cap. 121, and 22 Vic., cap. 139 to determine, without hindrance or assistance from the Royal prerogative, in what manner the consecration of the Bishop of Niagara shall be effected.

You are, of course, aware that under Imperial Act, of which 39 Geo. III., cap. 60 is the chief, clergymen ordained by colonial bishops, not having local jurisdiction and residing within the limits of that jurisdiction, are subjected to certain disabilities, except when this ordination is effected under commission from a diocesan bishop and within his diocese.

## DEFENCE OF MONTREAL.

(From the Montreal Gazette.)

With all due deference to our contemporary Le Journal de Quebec, we will again repeat that "for all practical purposes Montreal is stronger than Quebec." Le Journal has fallen into some serious errors in its review of our comments. We never gave it to be understood, for instance, that the fortifications erected for the defence of Montreal would be excavated on the north side of the river between the St. Lawrence and the city, and must certainly say that by so interfering our contemporary has abundantly proved that he does not understand the argument, or the first principles of the new system of defence which has relegated Quebec to a secondary rank as a fortress.

The editor must not suppose that the designers of the defences of this city would be so blind as to erect them within its immediate neighbourhood, and thereby expose the Victoria Bridge and Montreal to the shot and shell of an enemy. By no means. If Montreal is ever attacked and defended the struggle for its possession will take place on the plain between the St. John's, at a safe distance for Montreal from the enemy's cannon. The city itself would fall as soon as a hostile force could penetrate to the river bank opposite, and bring its artillery to bear upon it. The country they would first have to pass over we will admit, as level as a billiard table, but nevertheless, we repeat, could soon be turned into a labyrinth of earthworks of greater importance and greater strength than the walls of Quebec, and so govern the coast for the possession of the city that it would reduce itself to a mere question of blood and money.

The editor of the Journal, in addition to the seiges we referred to, should also study the lesson conveyed by the successful attack by the Federal fleets on Fort St. Philip and Jackson, Pulaski and Fisher during the recent war. The difference between stone forts such as they have at Quebec and the earthworks proposed to be erected in front of Montreal, would be, perhaps, a somewhat more apparent to his understanding. They went down like chaff before the pondering they were subjected to, while the earthworks of Vicksburg, Corinth and Richmond were never directly taken by assault, and would probably have been held to this day if the men and resources with which the South originally defended them could have been kept up. Napoleon once said that he fought and won his battles with the legs, and not with the arms of his soldiers. The science of the present day will soon cause it, in the same way, to be said that empires are kept and won with the spade and not with the musket.

Mr. Henry C. Belden, a member of the bar at New Orleans, has been committed for perjury, for swearing falsely that he had property to the amount of \$10,000, in order to stand bail for one Cronan. He has been admitted to bail, the security being fixed at \$500.

A mid. occurrence has just happened at Aith, in France. Lieut. Felchin was some time back bitten in the thumb by a man named Muller, but he thought nothing of the wound, and went next day on a journey on his private affairs. On reaching Bale he found his hand and arm begin to swell, and a medical man declared that the case was one of poisoning from a human bite. He at once returned home in haste, but he refused to have the arm amputated. The consequence was that the inflammation increased frightfully, and he died some days after in horrible suffering.

A CURIOS CIRCUMSTANCE.—A Council of barristers of the Paris circuit have decided that it is incompatible with the dignity of a barrister at the bar to be likewise a member of the Jockey Club.

The coast of Cape Breton was recently visited with a heavy gale of wind, accompanied with snow, which proved disastrous to several inward bound vessels. The Cape Breton News learns of the total wreck of the schooners Henrietta, from Boston and Halifax, and Eunice & Mary, from Halifax, the former in St. Peter's Bay and the latter at Lingan. Both vessels had cargoes, which were partly saved in a damaged condition.

The schr. Isabella, Boutillier, was stranded between Low Point Light and the point of the South Bar. The gale was severely felt at Cow Bay, where it did some trifling damage.
