Election time around the councils

Following Nomination Day on Sunday, Oct. 20 and Monday, Oct. 21, depending on the municipalities, many mayors and council members have already been declared elected as they met no opposition. Here is how the situation stands in our area:

Elgin
The make-up of the municipal council for Elgin Township remains the same, following Nomination Day on Sunday, Oct. 20, as Mayor Peter Dagg and councillors Philippe Leduc, Georges Leduc, and Roger Bergevin were all reelected without opposition, for another two-year term.

Dundee
A woman councillor, Mrs. Jean Armstrong, will replace outgoing Gordon Elder on Dundee council. William Gray will replace Justin Nieuwenhof. But there will be an election to determine whether Denis Garceau or Yves Lalonde will fill seat no. 3, which was held before by Fernand Hurteau who left the seat vacant before the end of his term. The election will take place on Sunday, Nov. 3 from 8 to 6.

Franklin
In Franklin, incumbent Jean-Gilles Bourdeau is seeking a second three-year term as mayor. He is opposed by Jean Laplante.

Two people are vying for Seat No. 2: Mario Tremblay and Claudette Barré. For Seat No. 3, Germain Latour is trying to oust Paul-Emile Lemieux who is seeking a second term. Advanced polls will be open on Sunday, Oct. 27 and the election will take place on Sunday, Nov. 3 from 8 to 6 at the Town Hall.

Havelock
Things were very quiet in Havelock on Nomination Day, Oct. 20, as Mayor Claude Gareault and councillors Jean-Yves Boileau and Calvin Edgerton were reelected without opposition. A new face Denis Vincent, was elected by acclamation, to replace Hubert Lavallée who did not seek reelection. **Hemmingford Village**
Maurice Patenaude was reelected mayor of Hemmingford Village, a job he's held since 1973. A woman councillor, Suzanne Barrière, will replace incumbent Thérèse Oumet in Seat No. 1. Both Gérard Laberge, Seat No. 2, and Claude Mailloux, Seat No. 3, were reelected.

Hemmingford Township
Three people will battle for the mayor's chair: Donald Hadley, William Winter and John Dulude. A new councillor Alfred Moore replaces incumbent Donald Hadley in Seat No. 1. David Napper, Seat No.

2 was reelected while Yvon Gravel, Seat No. 4, was elected by acclamation, to replace Oscar Maynard. Beattie Barr will run against Bernard Boyer for Seat No. 3 which was previously held by William Winter, while Paul Viau and Oscar Maynard will vie for Seat No. 5, previously held by Raymond Lavallée.

Hinchinbrooke
Everyone coming to the end of their term of office was reelected in Hinchinbrooke: Roland Greenbank will be mayor for a second term, Melvin Thompson was reelected to Seat No. 1, Donald Frier to Seat No. 3 and for Seat No. 5, Peter Niven was elected to replace Glen Wallace who was not running again.

Howick Village
Robert Tennant is challenging outgoing mayor Roma Myre who is seeking a third term as mayor of Howick Village. Denis Barbeau was reelected to Seat No. 1 for a third term, Gilles Leboeuf was elected to Seat No. 3 replacing Réjean Soucisse, Arthur Tellier was reelected to Seat No. 5, and Scott Gebbie replaces Bob Tennant for Seat No. 6.

Howick's Tres St. Sacrement
Fernand Primeau will be the new mayor of Tres St. Sacrement Parish, replacing Henry Welburn who was not seeking reelection. Alvin Chisholm was elected for a second term to Seat No. 1, Albert Billette for a third term to Seat No. 2 while Réal Rose will replace Gaston Amyot for Seat No. 6 and Yvon Robidoux will replace Fernand Primeau who still had one year to go as a councillor. **Ormstown Village**
There'll be no election in Ormstown village as all incumbents were reelected without opposition. They are: Mayor Gilles Brunet coming back for a third term, Gerald McCartney, Seat No. 1, Theobald Dandurand, Seat No. 2 and Walter Bidwell, Seat No. 5.

Ormstown's St. Malachie
A new mayor, Harold Merson, will head the table at the next meeting of the council in St. Malachie Parish, replacing Jean-Paul Riendeau who did not seek reelection. André Bergevin and Raymond Lalonde were elected councillors, while Robert Robidoux has replaced Fernand Lepage for seat no. 5.

Saint-Anicet
Two new faces will appear around the council table in St. Anicet with Maurice Léger elected by acclamation to seat no. 1, to replace Philippe Brunet, and Marc Walsh elected to seat no. 3, in place of Norman Legault who did not seek reelection. **Sainte-Barbe**
A woman councillor was elected without opposition to Seat No. 1 on the Ste-Barbe council. Mrs. Lucie Loyer will replace former councillor André Belisle. Long-time councillor Louis-Philippe Girouard was again reelected.

St. Chrysostome Village
Mayor Yvon Lefort was reelected by acclamation for another two-year term, Hortémis Vaillancourt received the people's confidence for a sixth term as councillor for Seat No. 5 and James Roy was reelected for a second term to Seat No. 3. A new man, Robert Provost, was elected to Seat No. 1, replacing Gerald Bouthillier. **St. Chrysostome Parish**
Robert Décosse was reelected mayor for two years, Réjean Montreuil was reelected to Seat No. 1, Gérard Giroux to Seat No. 2 and Lucette Henderson to Seat No. 3.

Gabriel Grégoire wants to run for the Parti Québécois

Gabriel Grégoire, who played football for the now extinct Montreal Alouettes, has decided to switch from sports to politics and to seek election as the Parti Québécois candidate for Huntingdon riding.

Grégoire made up his mind a while ago but the official news of his candidacy only came last Friday, Oct. 18 during a press conference held at his residence in Ste-Martine.

The 32-year-old former star athlete said that four main reasons led to his decision to enter politics. They are: his liking for this kind of work, an opportunity to work for young people, senior citizens the handicapped and farmers, the presence of a competent team, and the confidence expressed in him by friends who helped him to reach a decision.

Grégoire explains that his liking for politics comes from his father Aristide, who would debate political

questions in his barbershop.

One of Grégoire's first reforms would be to change the name of Huntingdon County into that of Huntingdon-St. Remi County so that all the municipalities in the vast area covered by the county could have a greater feeling of belonging.

Recalling that MNA Claude Dubois was elected with a 6,000 vote majority in the last election in 1981, Grégoire says he's going to campaign door to door to get at least 3,000 of those votes and to learn more about people's needs and concerns.

Grégoire would like to improve education in the county, see more farm products transformed here and develop the tourist potential of the area.

In order to achieve this, Grégoire suggests the formation of a Tourist, Commercial and Industrial Development Society for the county, to promote the farming industry and tourism from St. Remi-

Hemmingford to Saint-Anicet. "An enormous potential exists there and all we have to do is develop it," says Grégoire.

The meeting to elect a candidate for the Parti Québécois in Huntingdon County will take place on Sunday, Nov. 3 at the Lac des Pins Hall in St. Antoine-Abbé. Grégoire is the only candidate.

Godmanchester

At its meeting of Monday, Oct. 7, Godmanchester council decided to take action about the problems caused by the passage of trains through its territory. It was decided to send a formal complaint to the Canadian Transport Commission concerning Conrail's habit of blocking access to (or exit from) Huntingdon sometimes for as long as one hour at a time. The crossings are on François-Cleyn, Dalhousie, Bouchette and Lake Streets. This procedure on the part of the railway company represents a danger for the population of Huntingdon, Godmanchester and Hinchinbrooke, in case of fire for example or for ambulances.

A letter of protest will also be sent to the same commission to denounce the use by Conrail of an old unused railway line which ran from Huntingdon to Malone, N.Y.

The council settled the purchase of salt to spread on roads during winter by giving the contract to the lowest bidder, Sifto, whose price was \$34.90 per metric tonne, delivered to the municipal warehouse.

As for the sand needed for the winter, the contract went to Charly Excavation who bid \$2,700 for the season.

The municipality will call for tenders by invitation for 15,000 litres of heating oil needed to heat the buildings located at 2282 and 3435 Ridge Road. Tenders will be opened at the next meeting of the council on November 4.

By-laws 258 and 259 concerning the Weaver and Cowan Creek watercourses were adopted. Requests to the Ministry of Agriculture included: - to dig a ditch on the Back Ridge from Biggar Road along lot 270, property of Elmer Duhem; and lot 69,

property of Hubert Daoust, in order to improve the flow of water.

- to take charge at no cost to the municipality, of the drainage work on the Cowan watercourse and branches.

- to dig a ditch on the side of the Town of Huntingdon between Bouchette Street and the Cunningham watercourse, property of Malcolm Arnold and to dig a ditch about 4 acres long on lots 413-414, property of George Robb on the Ridge Road

- to lower the conrail culvert between the properties of Roger St-Onge and Michel Leroux. The Department of Transport for its part, will be asked by Godmanchester to repair the culvert on Montee Seigneuriale north of New Erin, opposite the property of Daniel Leduc.

Both Departments will be asked to lower the culvert opposite the property of Guy Leblanc, 4545 Route 138.

The report on work done on the Domaine Taillefer Road, at a cost of \$4,023.60, was approved.

Council adopted a resolution to the effect that it had no objection to becoming a customer of the regional dump site operated by the MRC Beauharnois-Salaberry. MNA Claude Dubois will be asked to have the Ridge Road straightened, from Lee's Corner to the entrance of the Town of Huntingdon.

Donations were made to the following: \$50 to the Loisirs Folkloriques of Huntingdon, \$50 to the Prêt d'honneur, \$100 to The Little Green Library, and \$100 to Centraide. The council gave Raymond Viau the responsibility of getting Verner Asphalt to repair holes in Bergeron Street, York (across Pigeon), McCallum and Girouard Streets. Bills totalling \$12,704.09 were approved.

Community hall opens in Franklin

The Community Centre, over which there was such controversy in Franklin a few months ago, was built in record time, and a gala evening was held last Saturday, Oct. 19 to mark its official opening.

Incumbent Mayor Jean-Gilles Bourdeau, accompanied by MNA Claude

Dubois and Jim Leahy, substituting for MP Jean-Guy Hudon, took advantage of the occasion to confirm the news that the Quebec government had just granted \$29,200 towards paying the cost of the building the new hall.

This is the second grant obtained by the Bourdeau administration for the

construction of the hall; the first one being \$50,000 given by the federal government a few months ago.

Most of those who were opposed to the idea of building a new hall in Franklin now agree that it was a worthwhile achievement, especially since it hasn't meant an increase in taxes. The new hall was built

with a high ceiling so as to accommodate people who want to play basketball, volley-ball and other indoor sports.

It is hoped that in this way the hall will benefit the whole population, young and old alike and will foster the development of a true community spirit among the people of Franklin and St. Antoine Abbé.

Robert Tennant for mayor

A large group of Howick village residents have asked Robert Tennant to seek the mayor's chair in the coming municipal election.

Roma Myre seeks third term

Roma Myre has announced that he will be seeking a third term as mayor of Howick Village.

As he broke the news at the regular meeting of the council on Monday, Oct. 7, Myre received the immediate support of five councillors.

Saying he was ready and able to serve his fellow citizens for another term, the outgoing mayor stressed he was proud to stand on his record of the past few years.

It's under his tenure that Howick Village and Tres St Sacrement Parish have come to a new agreement with regards to the Fire Department. The cost of supporting this joint ser-

vice will now be shared one third only by the Village, instead of the 50% it used to pay. This will result in savings for the municipality Myre pointed out.

Another achievement of his administration, Myre explained, was the signing of a five-year lease with the Canada Post Corporation for part of the municipal building to be used as a Post Office.

Mayor Myre and his council also undertook the revamping of the Village's fire hydrants, which were getting quite old. Money was cut from other municipal services to insure the repair of the faulty hydrants, at a total cost of about \$10,000.

In his next term, Roma Myre would like to start a study for the eventual installation of a water treatment plant. He would also like to see the repair of some streets such as Lafond Street and the building of a sidewalk on one side of the bridge.

Mayor Myre is very active in MRC du Haut-Saint-Laurent affairs where he sits with the mayors of the other municipalities. He's also chairman of the Inter-municipal Transport Commission and of the Assessment Board. He sits on MRC committees on Land Management, Resources and Water, and Garbage Management.

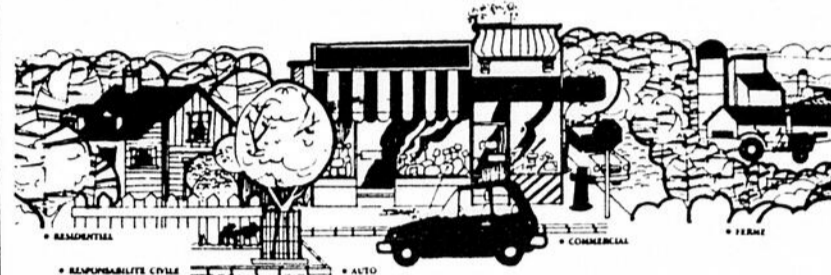

given to you so that you need not back-track. A half hour is generally all that is required.

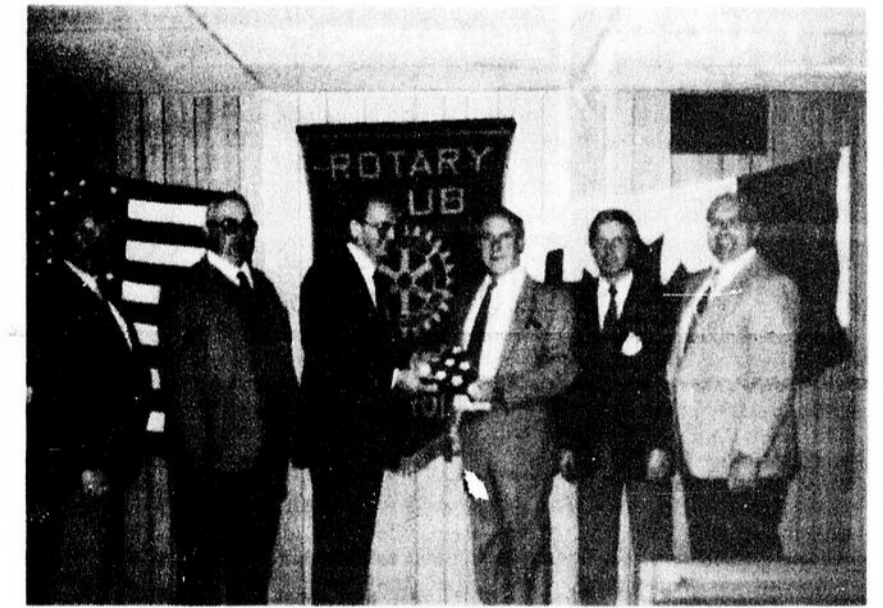

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Editorial

ONE-HALF OF MANKIND

Following Nomination Day for candidates who wished to become members of municipal councils (on Sunday or Monday, depending on the municipalities) it's clear once again that this will not be the year when women attain their rightful share of responsibility in that sphere of activity.

Results show that there are only five women now sitting on the councils of the 17 municipalities served by The Gleaner (15 MRC members and the two Hemmingfords).

These women are: Newly elected Jean Armstrong in Dundee, Suzanne Barrière in Hemmingford, Lucie Loyer in Ste-Barbe and Sharon Fletcher who gained her seat last year and Lucette Henderson in St. Jean Chrysostome Parish.

Since there are seven members per council (including the mayor), it follows that 119 persons are part of the councils in our area. Theoretically at least half of these offices could be held by women. The five women now serving represent a very small percentage indeed.

In all fairness, since women represent about half the population the same proportion - about 50 to 60 should be found serving on municipal councils in our area.

But it takes a very long time for people's attitudes to change regarding the place of women in society.

As far back as 1869 a book called "The Subjection of Women" was written by an English writer and philosopher, John Stuart Mill.

The book was described as "The most ambitious, and at the same time among the most heartfelt pleas in the English language for the perfect equality of the sexes", and the arguments contained in the book

were used abundantly even by recent Women's Lib movements.

When the book was written, women were not even allowed to vote, much less hold office. The author argues that this situation is unfair. He wrote: "Are we so certain of always finding a man made to our hands for any duty or function of social importance which falls vacant, that we lose nothing by putting a ban upon one half of mankind, and refusing beforehand to make their faculties available, however distinguished they may be?"

The author also wrote that: "To ordain that any kind of persons shall not be physicians, or shall not be advocates, or shall not be Members of Parliament, is to injure not them only but all who employ physicians, or advocates, or elect Members of Parliament and who are deprived of the stimulating effect of greater competition..."

John Stuart Mill also mentions that "the loss to the world by refusing to make use of one-half of the whole quantity of talent it possesses, is extremely serious."

Even though the words above were written more than a hundred years ago and even though the case for the equality of women has been defended almost constantly through the years since then, proof that attitudes have not progressed that much is that right now, out of a possible 119 seats on municipal councils in our area, only five are held by women.

To say that there's room for improvement in that field is an understatement.

It's too late for women to be candidates this year, but let's hope that a good number will make it a point to seek office in the future.

The minorities: time for solutions. The third colloquium of the Commissioner of Official Languages was held in Ottawa on October 17, 18 and 19, with a view to giving language reform in Canada a new start.

Twenty years after the work of the Royal Commission on Bilingualism and Biculturalism, and 16 years after the adoption of the Official Languages Act, an overall evaluation of language reform indicates that it has not succeeded in ensuring the development of a good many Francophone communities outside Quebec, or in adequately protecting the English-speaking community inside Quebec. The objectives of the Colloquium were all aimed at focussing attention on ways of improving the situation of the minorities:

- 1) To offer representatives of the minority communities a special opportunity to explain their visions of the country and their expectations.
- 2) To better define the common interests of Anglophone and Francophone minority groups, while recognizing the particular identity, characteristics and problems of each group;
- 3) To analyze why actions taken over the last 16 years to foster true linguistic equality and to protect and to develop the official languages minorities have not been entirely successful;
- 4) To identify the means of setting up the infrastructure necessary for the development of the official languages minority communities by broadening the range of services offered by the public and private sectors, and by creating an environment conducive to the full use of such services;
- 5) To go beyond what the communities can do for themselves to examine the advantages of more integrated linguistic planning whereby the national, provincial and local levels can work together and

involve the private and voluntary sectors. In this regard, it is important that all interested parties at all levels play their roles to the fullest rather than rely mainly on one centre of responsibility;

6) To shed new light on the language debate in Canada, and to deliver a message about the pace and the direction language reform must take in the future as well as about the duties of the various governments.

French, English minorities meet in Ottawa

A colloquium sponsored by the Office of the Commissioner of Official Languages was held in Ottawa-Hull on October 17, 18 and 19 with 125 participants from across Canada representing French groups from outside of Quebec and English groups within Quebec. The participants included academics, economists and politicians.

The Chateauguay Valley English-Speaking People were represented by Maurice King, President of CVESPA. The Commissioner of Official Languages d'Iberville Fortier opened the conference by calling on the participants to address the theme of the conference, "The time for solutions." He said "There can be no doubt that our official language minorities are close to the breaking point." He went on to say, "Very few observers would question the need to protect the French language even in Quebec because of the Canadian and North American context. But may we not also hope to see guarantees that the services traditionally available to anglophones in Quebec will be maintained?"

Michael Goldbloom, President of Alliance Quebec called for a "rekindling of a

national passion for the commitment to linguistic harmony and justice." He said that our challenge in Quebec "is to ensure Quebec's ability within the federal framework, to protect the French language while respecting the rights of its English-speaking community."

Gilles Leblanc, President of the Federation of Francophones outside Quebec said "a lot of francophones outside Quebec feel anglophone Quebecers have a hell of a lot more than we ever had" and they "don't want any anglophones telling them how to do things."

Maurice King, President of the Chateauguay Valley English-Speaking People's Association, in his intervention remarked that "finding a solution to the minority language problem must include the participation of the provincial decision makers and cannot be resolved by only the federal government." He said that "The assistance of the Commissioner of Official Languages and the Secretary of State were essential and had been a great help to the minority language groups."

Royal Orr, Off-Island Vice-President of Alliance Quebec, described the importance of just one job in a small community. It means that one family is able to stay in a village or town; it means two parents are able to participate in local volunteer activities; it means a couple of kids for our struggling school system. In contrast, one job in Ottawa doesn't even make a dent in the statistics churned out by the computers. But in our rural Quebec communities, one job is a different story.

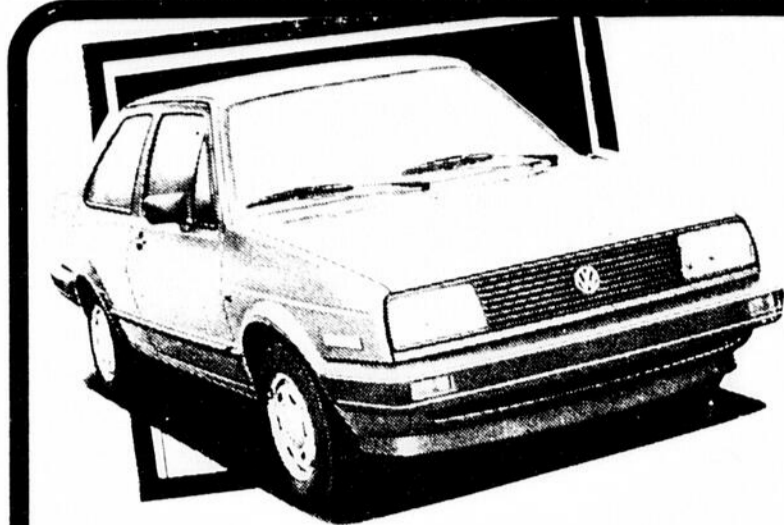

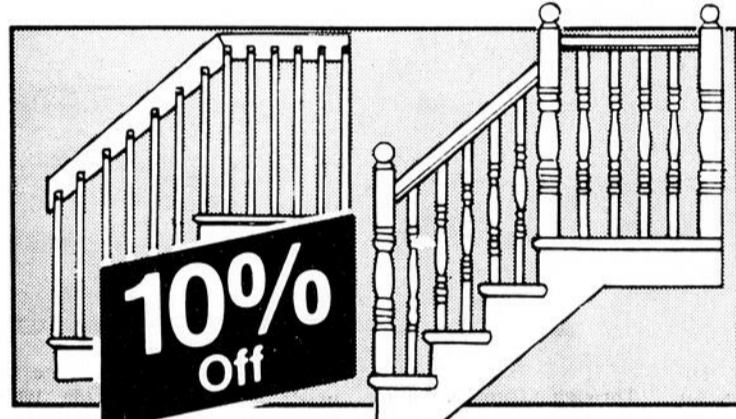



Special Joint Committee On Canada's International Relations

After the tabling of the Green Paper on "Competitiveness and Security: Directions for Canada's International Relations" by the Secretary of State for External Affairs, Parliament asked this Committee to consider the issues and to make recommendations on the objectives and conduct of Canada's international relations. The Committee presented an interim report on August 23, 1985 and is required to present its final report by May 31, 1986.

The Committee will focus its work on the following themes:

1. How are current international security arrangements likely to evolve, and in particular how might East-West relations develop? What part can multilateral organizations and arms control negotiations be expected to play in this situation? Do these anticipated developments have implications for Canada's defence posture and its alliance relationships?
2. Which regions of the world can be expected to have particular importance for Canada in the future and how should Canadian foreign policy be adapted to take account of this situation?
3. What are the implications for Canadian economic competitiveness of the most important shifts occurring in the international economic and financial systems?
4. What opportunities are there for Canadian contributions to international well-being and the promotion of human rights? What are the international instruments available for promoting human rights?
5. What historical and geographic factors, natural and human resources and traditions influence Canada's foreign policy? What particular qualities can Canada bring to shaping a better world?
6. Are the mechanisms for forming and delivering Canadian foreign policy effective? How might the system be improved?

We invite your participation.

SUBMISSIONS

Your written brief (whether a formal submission or a letter) must be received by the Clerks of the Committee no later than Friday, November 29, 1985 to ensure its consideration in the planning of hearings across Canada.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

During the autumn, hearings and panel discussions will be held in Ottawa to solicit the views of recognized experts on all issues raised in the Green Paper. During the winter, hearings will be scheduled in representative cities across Canada.

WITNESSES

Witnesses to appear before the Committee at hearings held during the winter will be selected from among those submitting written briefs.

Loving tribute from daughter to Mrs. Viola Kerr who died at 83

She lived

"a good, long time"

The following is a loving tribute to my Mother - a lady who meant a great deal to all of us. It is a happy task done by her younger daughter because of what I want to say, and the fact that Mom liked the idea that I write things. Viola Margaret was born November 29, 1901 at Elm Bank Farm on the Chateaugay River near Howick; the welcome first child of John Brown and his wife Margaret Gardner. Two sisters, Winnifred and Lillian, and a brother, J. Melville completed the family. All the Brown youngsters remember the happy adventures of playing in the creeks near the house, the hours spent with neighbor playmates and the happy visiting with their many relatives. Their mother died in 1913, when the children were young, so the next few years were difficult and over-filled with adult responsibilities.

Housekeeper at 14

Mom attended school right next door to home at Chateaugay, District 4, followed by two years at Howick Model School. Then came a period of self-taught household management when at the age of 14, Mom became cook and housekeeper for her father as well as mother to the three younger children. They remember her as their champion, who made home a happy place once more. It was 'Vi' who added the extra touches and smoothed the rough places; and it is Vi's cooking that is associated with the nostalgia of home memories. Mom learned well, even though her self-confidence sometimes took a beating and many of the lessons were difficult. She maintained an optimistic outlook on life, quietly seeing what had to be done and then doing it. While she was not an aggressive person, she had the courage to voice and stand by her convictions. One of her early projects was to set in motion the formation of a young people's group at Georgetown Church, a group that remained popular and active until Church Union.

Viola married Clarence Kerr in 1927. After living in Massena, N.Y. for a year, they moved to Forest View Farm on Fertile Creek - home, within a wonderful concession community, until they retired to the Village of Howick in 1958. They welcomed two daughters into their lives: Lenora and Evelyn, adding sons-in-law, grandchildren and great-grandchildren as years progressed. Mom

matter-of-factly with her fate. As a family we opted for home care, adapting the house and situation as we went along. It was a time unsurpassed in caring and sharing, with support from family, friends and neighbors. Everyone got into the act: the youngest great-grandchild was able to hold her hand, visitors could come and go at any hour, even the family dog offered her affection. Care for terminally ill

Palliative care - care without hope of healing - was a new term to us, yet we learned that home nursing support through C.L.S.C. was available and our nurse made regular, frequent visits which became a life-line guiding Mom. Dad and all of us through a brand new experience. Dad proved to be a devoted and competent nurse. Mom's courage and honesty set the pace so we didn't need to pretend about the situation. So we talked, a little at least, about the remainder of her earthtime and how beloved she was to us. She assured us that she wasn't afraid, though sad at leaving us. She reminded us that she had lived a good long time in a lifestyle pleasing to her. And we did things together: cleaning out long forgotten corners and drawers, going for drives, looking at photos and slides, having family dinners, discussing local and personal history, and we hugged a lot - all ways of reviewing a lifetime, and everyone had an opportunity to share in Mom's time and memories.

She managed some new things too. She crocheted new stars for our Christmas trees, cut out blocks for a grandson's quilt, saw for the first time 3000 chickens in a single pen during a visit to her prospective grandson-in-law, and she enjoyed her first plane flight coming home from Florida in April.

"Doing fine, thank you" As she grew weaker, and was eventually confined to bed early in September, Mom accepted more help from us, and taught us even more about uncomplaining acceptance and courage; admitting to only occasional discomfort and wondering when she might be released from a life becoming too heavy to bear. Even during those semi-conscious days that marked the last week of her life, she responded to our touch and said thanks that lightened our hearts. Her statement that she was doing fine, thank you" only hours before she died made us ashamed to complain without good reason.

It was sad, yet a rare and wonderful privilege to be at her bedside - husband and daughters with supportive guidance from our nurse - as Mom died. It was somehow a comfort to hold her as she finally passed to rest, the rest that we no longer could wish to deny her. The moment of peace came after midnight on September 28, 1985, two months short of her 84th birthday.

Her family is sad to see

her leave, but we have been blessed and thankful to have enjoyed her company all through this good long time. She will be remembered with love and appreciation by husband Clarence; daughters Lenora & Edwin Brown, Evelyn & Kenneth Lamb; grandchildren John and Brenda Brown, Mary and Len Hone, David Lamb and Loraine Lamb; great-grandchildren Cathy, Bobby, Dan Russell and Carolyn Brown; sisters Winnifred Ferguson and Lillian Chisholm; brother Melville Brown. Services, conducted by Rev. John S. Anderson, were held from the Chapel of the McGerrigle Funeral Home in Ormstown on September 30, 1985. Cremation followed, with her final resting place being Georgetown Cemetery.

Mr. Taylor was ably assisted in his presentation by School Technician Sheryle Cullen, who was able to call up individual student data. It was demonstrated that in a matter of moments, a student's course selection can be changed, and teacher class lists updated with additions and

deletions.

The software program being used is called Harts III, and the school administration package was described by Mr. Taylor as being "absolutely ingenious." He pointed out that his guidance role in terms of course counselling and general student programming is greatly enhanced because the movement has been made in the direction of in-house independence. "Functions formerly requiring two or

three days now can be handled in a matter of two or three minutes. Outside of minor problems which have been both encountered and overcome, we are extremely happy with Harts III.

At this point in time, we are the only school in the Province of Quebec using this school administration package. "I guess that either makes us a pioneer or a guinea pig," concluded Mr. Taylor.

Whether guinea pig or pioneer, the school is immensely proud of its decision to go with this

particular program. The timetabling process will in the near future lead itself into the attendance and absentee components which in turn will be followed by a much more lucid pupil progress reporting system. "Parents can look forward to receiving the first in-house computer generated pupil progress report around mid-November. We are shipping into high gear in preparation for that third phase."

Throughout it all, student services at CVR, despite

this heavy commitment to the technology, maintains its role in serving the needs of the individual student attending CVR. The meeting ended on the optimistic note that it is the fervent hope of school administration and student services' personnel alike that the restrictive elements of the Ministry of Education's new course of study can be counterbalanced. This can be realized through creative pedagogical experimentation using this technology.

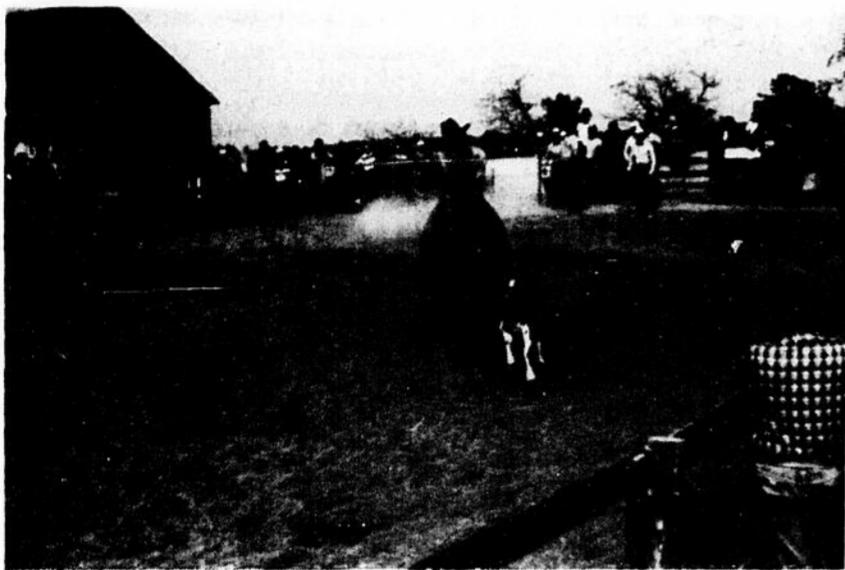

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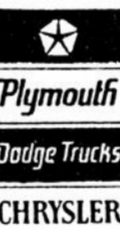
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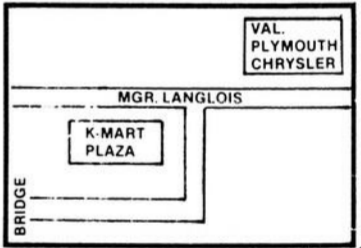
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Treorchy Male Choir, from Wales to Montreal

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The ultimate in wildfowling: hunting the Canada Goose

October in Quebec is the month for the hunter. Grouse and rabbit hunting becomes productive with the falling of the leaves. Moose hunting is in full swing and the end of the month ushers in the start of the deer season. The northern ducks are feeling the migration urge and are beginning to stream southward through Quebec and along with the ducks comes the king of wildfowl the Canadian Goose.

The autumn skies over Quebec are filled with long skeins of majestic Canada winging their way south to warmer climes. The big birds tired from their flight from the barren lands of Hudson and James Bay are ravenous and the lush cornfields of South-Western Quebec are an irresistible magnet. They set down by the thousands and dine royally, replenishing their strength and filling their bellies for the long trip south. Depending on the severity of the weather, they stay anywhere from four to six weeks, departing only when winter begins to set in, in earnest.

The arrival of the Canada Geese in Quebec culminates an 11-month wait for area waterfowlers. The time has been well-spent refurbishing old decoys, making or buying new ones, practicing on their geese calls, reloading shells in their favorite loadings, (magnums of course) and dreaming of past hunts and the ones to come. Well for Eddy Westlake and myself the waiting was over and hopefully the shooting would soon be beginning. We had been out the day before doing some jump shooting for Mallards

on a series of Beaver ponds in the Howick area. About a half hour before sunset we watched a large flock of Canada as they circled for 20 minutes, gabbling, honking and talking things over and finally deciding to settle down in an old abandoned quarry filled with water, about a mile away from where we were.

The minute the Geese landed they immediately silenced their calling and all was still. No shooting was forthcoming, so we knew their arrival had been unobserved by other hunters. It was almost pitch dark now and legal shooting time was long past. We knew if we didn't bother them, the chances were excellent that they would still be there in the morning. We decided against trying for them in the morning because it was a moonlight night and that fact coupled with all the loose shale in the old quarry would make a successful stalk almost impossible.

Instead we decided to return to the quarry the next afternoon, put out about a dozen Geese decoys and trust that the Geese would return to their resting place of the previous night after feeding all day in some nearby cornfield. Legal shooting time ended a half hour after sunset, which was about 6:10 p.m., so we agreed that if we arrived back at the quarry around 3 p.m. it would give us plenty of time to set up a blind, put our decoys out and be waiting in readiness for the Geese which would probably arrive just at sunset or perhaps a little later.

We arrived back at the quarry a little after 3 the next day. We chose a spot about in the middle of the quarry to make our blind.

In this location the edge of the pit was lined with a heavy growth of White Birch and Cedars and with the help of a small hand axe we had brought along we soon had an excellent blind constructed.

We then set out eight large oversize magnum floating Geese decoys in about eight feet of water around 25 feet away from our blind. The wind was blowing strongly from the west and we knew that meant the Geese would be coming into the pit from an easterly direction to land into the

wind. As they approached from the east they would see our decoys on their approach and hopefully fly close by to our hide as they came closer to inspect our decoys.

To add to the naturalness of our setup we set eight shell-bodied Geese decoys out on stakes in the shallow water at the edge of the pit. Five of the Geese were in the feeding position with their necks bent over as if they were feeding and one of the decoys was standing at attention as if on the lookout for danger.

Any flock of Geese always has one of their number who does not feed and is always on guard for hunters or predators.

All was in readiness and all we had to do now was sit and wait. About half an hour before sunset a small flock of about eight Mallards came winging by, made two passes over our Geese decoys and finally set down with a soft splash at the far end of the pit, some 400 yards away, safely out of range of our 12 bore Remington Pump Guns.

After they landed they started to swim ever so slowly in the direction of our blind. We waited expectantly hoping that maybe they'd swim close enough to give us a good shot. After a 15-minute wait the eight fat Mallards had come about 300 yards closer to our hide-out and if they continued on their present course would soon be in range of our 12 bores. 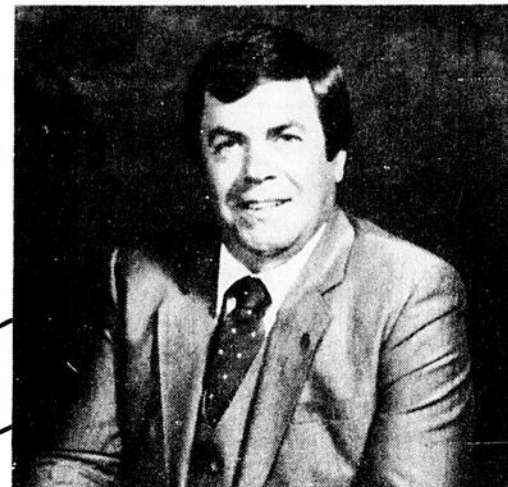

Si le psychiatre décide que le malade doit être placé sous la protection du Curateur public, il rédige un certificat: le certificat d'incapacité; ce certificat est ensuite contresigné par le directeur des services professionnels puis transmis au Curateur public. L'hôpital prévient alors la famille que l'incapable est placé sous la protection du Curateur public.

Il convient de remarquer qu'il n'existe pas d'obligation de subir un examen psychiatrique, à moins d'une ordonnance du Tribunal: un individu ne peut donc être déclaré incapable sans cet examen. On peut toutefois conseiller à toute personne présentant des troubles de comportement de se livrer à un examen psychiatrique dans son propre intérêt.
