

ARRAIGNMENT OF AMERICAN ACTION.

By the Filipino Sympathizers in Hong Kong.

APPEAL TO PRESIDENT MCKINLEY.

Which is Really an Arraignment of the U. S. Naval and Military Authorities at Manila.

Hong Kong, Nov. 14.—The Filipino Junta, representatives of General Aguinaldo and the Filipino Government here, have drawn up what they designate as an appeal to President McKinley and the American people, but which is in reality rather in the nature of an arraignment of American actions in the Philippines.

The memorial thus avers that false reports are spread broadcast alleging that the Filipinos are responsible for all the friction, points out that the tension is greater every day, and that any moment a shot may be fired by an irresponsible American or Filipino soldier leading to great bloodshed, and beseeches the United States to help the Junta to control our own people by directing American officials at Manila to temper their actions with friendship, justice and fairness.

From the commencement of hostilities, continues the memorial, the Filipinos acceded to all the American requests, but after settling up the Spaniards in Manila the Filipinos were completely ignored when the Americans advanced, and thus deprived of the fruits of victory. Now, after months of campaigning, the Filipino troops have been ordered beyond the suburbs, where they have no quarters and where supplies are difficult to obtain.

Berlin, Nov. 14.—A high official of the German Foreign Office asserts that no communication or negotiations have occurred between the Powers regarding the Philippines. Germany, he says, has only commercial interests to protect there.

THE CUBAN ASSEMBLY.

Gen. Garcia and Other Delegates to Proceed to Washington.

Havana, Nov. 14.—Gen. Calixto Garcia and his staff and other delegates from the so-called Cuban Assembly will remain at their Marianao headquarters until Wednesday, when they will leave for Washington. The delegates expect a satisfactory outcome of their conference with the President of the United States.

ANOTHER ELECTION VOIDED.

Both Candidates Cleared of Bribery but Respondent Unseated.

Stratford, Ont., Nov. 14.—(On remanding the South Perth election trial.) Judge Chancellor Boyd and Justice Meredith delivered judgment declaring the seat vacant. The candidates individually were cleared, but bribery by subordinate agents had been proven. Each party pays his own costs.

French Naval Programme.

London, Nov. 14.—The Daily Mail says this morning that the French naval construction programme for 1899 includes two battleships of 14,500 tons each with very powerful armament and two cruisers of 4,000 tons each, two large torpedo boat destroyers and eleven torpedo boats.

GERMANY PREPARING TOO.

Berlin, Nov. 14.—The semi-official papers announce that the German army will be gradually increased by about 15,000 men.

Gone to the Asylum.

Hamilton, Nov. 14.—Mrs. Burrell, who killed her three children in Toronto a couple of weeks ago, and Miss Minnie Saxton, of Newmarket, who shot her sister dead in August last, were brought to the Hamilton Asylum to-day in charge of two keepers. They were very quiet on route to their new home. They are placed in the criminal ward, in which are several other irresponsible persons who have killed their fellows.

South American Orbits.

Valparaiso, Chile, Nov. 14.—Owing to the attempt of President Errazuriz, of Chile, to treat direct with President Roca, of the Argentine Republic, with a view to the settlement of the Chilean question, Senator Martinez, the Chilean Minister to Argentina, and Senator Barrios Arana, President of the Chilean Boundary Commission, have resigned.

A HOPELESS OPPOSITION.

On the Part of Spain in the Paris Conference Crisis.

LONDON PAPERS POINT TO THE FACT

If Spain Remains Obstinate—U. S. Must Send Fleet to Europe.

London, Nov. 15.—The morning papers commenting editorially upon the peace conference crisis and the American naval preparations, reiterate their conviction of the hopelessness of the Spanish opposition and recognize that the United States have practically no alternative, but complete annexation, and that if Spain continues obstinate the United States must send a fleet to Europe, an act which is Power but Great Britain would welcome, though none would be likely to interfere in Spain's behalf.

INNOCENCE OF DREYFUS.

Likely to be Proclaimed Any Time—Trouble Expected.

New York, Nov. 14.—Henry Norman cables to the Times from London:—"Everything else in France is overshadowed for the moment by the imminent proclamation of the innocence of Dreyfus. It is not the signal for serious disturbances either immediately or when he sets foot in France, all the observers on the spot are mistaken. The whole edifice of lies is about to crumble. The wickedest conspiracy ever known to civilization is about to be exposed to the world. The moment draws nearer, the temper of the anti-Semitic, clerical and military gang grows worse. Many of the best men in Paris are going armed, living in unknown places, and approaching their offices in the dark by back streets, for fear of an assassination. Only yesterday the Foreign Minister called upon the German Ambassador to apologize for newspaper insults to his daughter, a girl of fifteen. Paris is a rumbling volcano."

FOOL AND HIS MONEY.

Fifty Thousand Pounds for a Coveted Baronetcy.

London, Nov. 14.—Mr. Hooley, on cross-examination, flatly contradicted the evidence of Sir William Marriott. He reiterated his statement that he had promised and had paid to Sir William Marriott £50,000 for a baronetcy, and that Sir William, Mr. Hooley added, told him that he did all the dirty work for the Conservative party. Sir William suggested the giving of £50,000 by Mr. Hooley for a baronetcy and he was to get £10,000 if Mr. Hooley was made a baronet.

Persecuting Aliens.

London, Nov. 15.—The Berlin correspondent of the Times says:—"Beside large expulsions of Danes from Northern Schleswig during the fortnight, many Austrian, Slavs and Polish Jews have been expelled from Breslau, as well as Dutchmen from Gronau, Westphalia. The cause is not known, but it is believed the expulsion was instigated by Dr. Von Miquel, Prussian Minister of Finance, with a view of provoking discontent, which would serve as a pretext for some severe measures against aliens."

London, Nov. 15.—The Daily Chronicle this morning says:—"We are reliably informed from the Congo Free State that the Belgians have captured Bohr, a Dervish post ninety miles north of Refoj, on the White Nile."

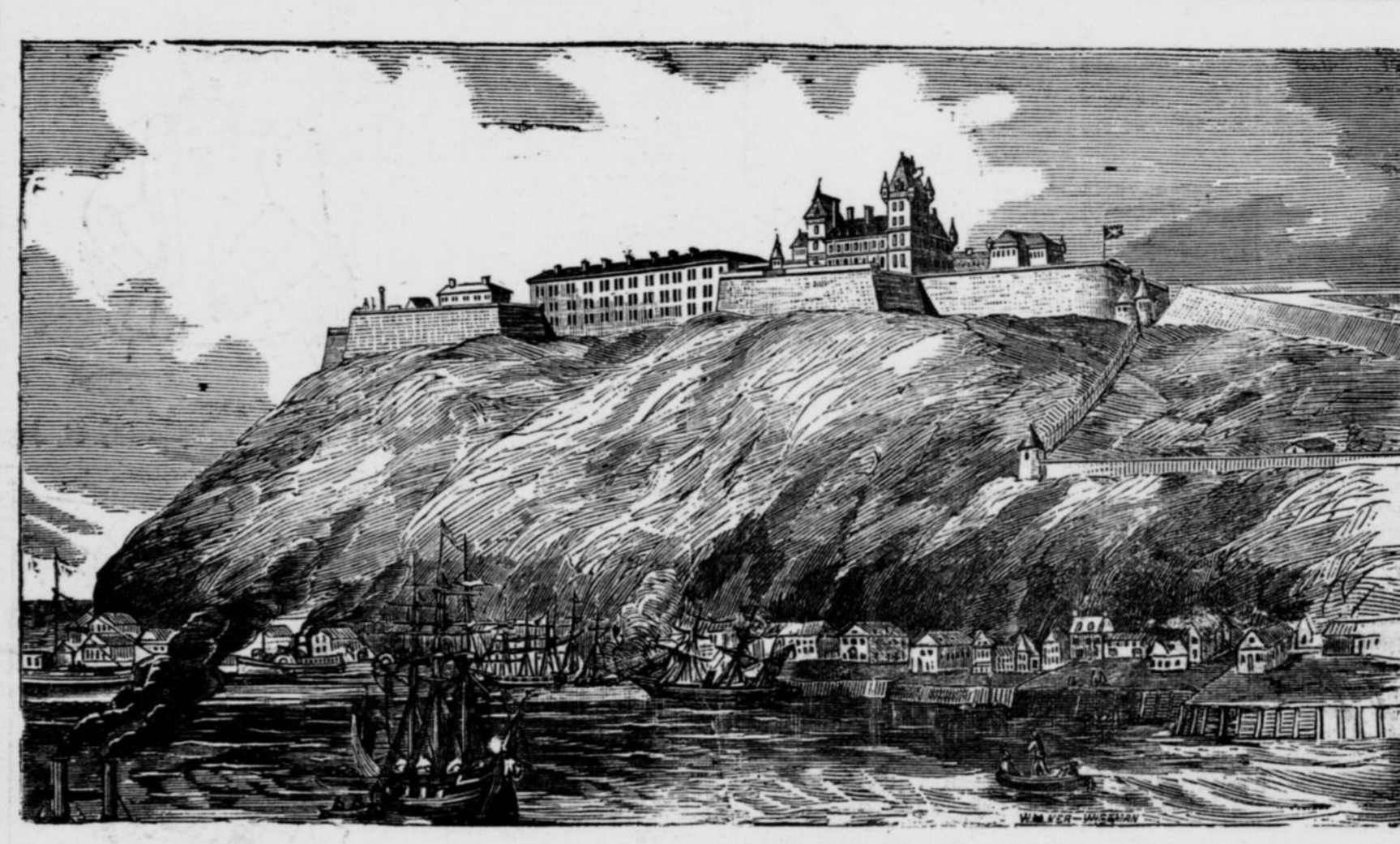

A DISPUTED PARTNERSHIP.

Judgments Rendered in the Superior Court.

Some interesting judgments were rendered on Saturday in the Superior Court. Three decisions were given by Judge Routhier. The first was McKibbin vs. McCone. In April last the plaintiff rented a house belonging to defendant, agreeing to pay \$15 monthly, and after occupying it for three months was notified that she kept a house of ill-repute on the premises, she would have to pay an additional sum of \$120. The plaintiff agreed to pay the latter sum and when she left the house last spring, she sued the proprietor for the recovery of the \$120, on the ground that the agreement to pay that amount was illegal, against good morals and public order. The defendant pleaded by a general demurrer and Judge Routhier dismissed the action with costs, on the grounds that although the contract was illegal, the plaintiff was the most guilty party thereto; that she willingly paid the amount; and that to allow the plaintiff to recover the amount would only encourage her turpitude. Messrs. P. Coriveau for plaintiff and Pelletier & Chouinard for the defendant.

DAMAGES FOR ASSAULT.

Joseph Jobin vs. A. Guay was an action of damages for \$200. The plaintiff alleged in his declaration that the defendant struck his son, 14 years of age, with a hoe and seriously injured one of his hands, which fact prevented the boy from working for some time, the plaintiff having to secure the services of another man to do his son's work, besides having to pay for medical attendance. By his plea the defendant admitted having struck the plaintiff's son, who was only laid up for seven or eight days, and that the plaintiff employed an extra hand, but not to replace his son, who only did light work; that moreover the plaintiff had the defendant arrested for assault and that he had pleaded guilty and paid a fine of \$20 and costs, but that wishing to pay for any damages caused to the plaintiff, he had offered him \$40 and \$8 for costs, which offer had been refused. The Court decided that the offer made by the defendant were sufficient and dismissed the case for the balance with costs of contention. Messrs. Parent & Lafleur for plaintiff, and Taschereau, Lavary & Rivard for defendant.

G. Montreuil vs. Alf. Chamberland.

The defendant was arrested upon a capias at the request of the plaintiff, who besides claiming \$53, amount of capital, interest and cost of a judgment in the Circuit Court, alleged that the defendant was secreting his goods. The latter, who was a hotelkeeper in St. Paul Street, contested the capias on the ground that he had not secreted his goods, that if he left his former place of business it was on account of his business not being profitable in that quarter, and that he had only taken away furniture which the law exempted from seizure, leaving the balance of goods in his former hotel. Judge Routhier dismissed the capias with costs, remarking that it had not been proven that Chamberland had secreted his goods; that the small quantity of furniture he had taken was removed during the day to his new place of business where they are liable to seizure. Messrs. J. L. O. Vidal for plaintiff and N. Lapointe for defendant.

A DISPUTED PARTNERSHIP.

Judge Andrews gave three decisions. Thibaudau et al. vs. Warren et vir, was the first case. The plaintiffs took action against the defendant Mrs. Hypolite Dufour, doing business as a merchant at Murray Bay under the name of Dufour & Co. The amount claimed was \$2,221.25 for goods sold and delivered since 1896. The plea of defendant was a general denial of facts. In 1894 the defendant's husband assigned and Mr. Lafleur, who had been appointed curator, was on 1st May, 1894, authorized to sell the defendant for 55 cents on the dollar, which the defendant agreed to pay to the creditors. The defendant, in Court, held that she did not transact business as merchant, marchande publique, under the name of H. Dufour & Co., but that on the contrary it was her husband who carried on the business, and that, moreover, the deed passed on 1st May, 1894, was null, as she then had bound herself to the deed for her husband. The plaintiffs proved that by the deed above mentioned, the assets claimed by the defendant had received the authorization of her husband, amounted to over \$10,000, and that she had pledged herself to pay \$6,000 for them, and that she had therefore received full value for the amount; that afterwards she went to the plaintiffs' store and paid them \$800 and then declared that she was doing business under the name of Dufour & Co. That the defendant's husband also wrote to that effect to the plaintiffs, and the defendant admitted in Court that she had done business with the assets purchased from the curator and that her husband had acted as her agent. On the other hand the defendant produced a certified copy of a partnership filed on the 7th May, 1894, with the Prothonotary, at Murray Bay, by which it appeared that Hypolite Dufour did business under the name of H. Dufour & Co. The Court decided that the execution of that partnership without the knowledge of the plaintiffs, could not prevent the latter from obtaining judgment against the defendant; that the deed of 1st May, 1894, was valid and that it had been proven that the defendant had done business under the name of H. Dufour & Co. Judgment was rendered for the full amount. Messrs. Robitaille & Roy, for plaintiffs, and Taschereau, Lavary & Rivard for the defendant.

INSURANCE SOCIETY LOSSES.

Perron vs. La Societe Bienveillante, St. Roch.—The plaintiff sued the defendants for \$1,000, which she alleges, was payable by the defendants on her son's death by reason of his membership in the said So-

ciety. The contention of the defendants was that having collected from their members on the call duly made by them for that purpose only a sum of \$524, they were not bound to pay more than that sum. By the written admissions and documentary evidence of record it was established that at the date of the death of plaintiff's son the said Society was composed of 1,815 members. In rendering judgment Judge Andrews remarked that it was indifferent as regards the defendants' liability towards the plaintiff whether the defendants did or did not succeed in collecting the calls by them made on their members; that moreover the defendants had not established any impossibility to effect such collections nor any necessary failure or want of funds applicable to the payment of plaintiff's demand; and that considering the right of the said plaintiff to have and the liability and obligation of the said defendants to pay, the said sum of \$1,000, is established by the fact of such membership of over 1,000 members and is not liable to be defeated by any of the grounds of exception pleaded by the defendants; maintained the plaintiff's action with costs.

LIMIT SALE SUSPENDED.

An important decision was rendered yesterday by Judge Routhier on the matter of the Caspacia Pulp and Lumber Co., in liquidation. Mr. Alfred Lemieux, of this city, had been appointed liquidator to the Company and as such obtained in May last leave from the Court to sell the property. The sale was advertised to take place on the 14th July last, but on that date the bidding not being considered satisfactory the sale was postponed and on the following day the Court again granted Mr. Lemieux's petition to sell the property on the 17th of August last. On the latter date the sale took place and Mr. McLellan purchased the property for \$20,700. Mr. J. M. Fortier, cigar manufacturer, was a shareholder and creditor of the Company when the latter assigned and took action in September last against Messrs. Lemieux and McLellan to have the sale to the latter annulled on the ground that the notices required by law were not given previous to the sale, and that the property was worth much more than the price obtained. Notwithstanding this action, the liquidator notified the shareholders and creditors that the property had been sold and published notices to that effect in the Quebec Official Gazette. Mr. Fortier then presented a petition to the Court, praying that all proceedings upon the ratification of the deed of sale be suspended until a decision was obtained in his case against Messrs. Lemieux and McLellan, and Judge Routhier granted the petition and ordered that all proceedings respecting the ratification of the sale to Mr. McLellan, be suspended as requested.

Messrs. Malouin, Bedard and Dechene represented the petitioner and Messrs. Drouin, Pelletier and Fiset the liquidator.

CONVICTED FOR INFRINGING UPON
