Five killed in collision, fire

Labor left wing fights

BLACKPOOL, England (CP) — The Labor party's left wing was reduced today to fighting for a concession that the leadership had virtually yielded in advance at the annual party conference.

The final day of the five-day conference featured a debate on delayed plans to nationalize the British steel industry. Party members angered by the government's failure to fulfill a nationalization pledge during its first year in office were supporting resolutions demanding action.

The leftists, balked on every important issue in the first four days of the conference, lost some steam in the steel debate when the government gave them an answer Thursday.

James Callaghan, chancellor of the exchequer, told the meeting Thursday that steel nationalization remains a firm part of the government program.

The steel takeover was also in the parliamentary program presented last October, but final action was put off after publication of a white paper outlining procedure.

Some observers believe the government feared defeat on the issue because some right-wing Labor members of Parliament opposed it. The Conservative and Liberal opposition, combined with Laborite defectors, could have wiped out the government's tiny majority.



WRECKAGE OF VEHICLES INVOLVED IN CRASH

Five people were killed last night in a two-vehicle collision followed by fire on Route 1 near the Bishopton turnoff.

Four of the victims were reported to be occupants of a bakery truck. The fifth victim was driving alone in his car when the head-on collision occurred at a junction about 20 miles northeast of Sherbrooke.

Dead are:

Normand Bolduc, 20, of Weedon, who was reported driving the bakery truck.

Mrs. Eddy Pomerleau, of St. Gerard, who was a passenger in the truck.

Francine and Odette Pomerleau, Mrs. Pomerleau's two daughters, who were accompanying their mother.

Michel St. Hilaire, 24, son of Alcide St. Hilaire of Weedon, who was driving the car.

The accident occurred immediately outside the Breton Service Station. The first man on the scene was station proprietor Felecion Breton. He says he was sitting in a house next door to the service station, reading when he heard the crash.

He rushed outside. No fire had started and he tried to get the driver of the truck free. All the occupants seemed to be dead, he reported.

When fire broke out, Mr. Breton, afraid of an explosion, left and called the police. They arrived almost immediately, he said. The Paquin ambulance arrived soon afterwards.

Mr. Breton reported that the victims had been thrown underneath the truck making it very difficult to get them out. He said that the fire was still burning at 5:00 a.m. when he went to bed.

Bertrand Nadeau of Bishopston, one of Mr. Breton's employees and a friend of the car driver, arrived about a half hour later. He said that when he arrived, the fire had already started, and a large group of people had gathered.

Mr. Breton said that the horrible truth about the accident was that after the crash there were no cries. It was silent, he said.

All the bodies, which were badly burned, making identification almost impossible, were taken to the Paquin Funeral Home in East Angus.

British and American heritage and cars 'in'

Hunt bomb as Pearson dines, talks

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) —

More than 500 persons attended a dinner in honor of Prime Minister Pearson here Thursday night, unaware city police were searching the building for a bomb.

A local radio station (VOCM) said it received an anonymous call about 6 p.m. NDT disclosing alleged plans to place a home-made bomb in the Memorial University dining hall where the prime minister was to speak.

About 40 police searched the hall before and during the dinner and speeches. No bomb was found.

It was not known if Mr. Pearson was informed of the incident before the dinner.

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Indonesia coup try fails as Sukarno, top man, safe

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — Jakarta radio said today the chief of Indonesia's armed forces, Gen. Abdul Harris Nasution has smashed a coup d'etat led by Lt. Col. Untung.

The Malaysian government radio, which has been monitoring Indonesian broadcasts out of Jakarta throughout the day, said no further details were immediately available.

Then moments later, the Malaysian radio reported Jakarta had announced that army units under a Gen. Suharto were instrumental in crushing the coup.

It said Nasution and Suharto were "both safe and well."

The Jakarta radio said "those responsible for the coup have been arrested," Malaysian officials reported.

UNDER 'PROTECTION'

Untung's revolutionary council, during its bid for supremacy, had declared that Sukarno, 64, was "under protection" of the council. This led to speculation that the strong man had been removed.

There was no immediate report of Sukarno's whereabouts.

Untung, in a broadcast before the government's counter-move, had said he took the action because a number of generals and the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency had planned a anti-Sukarno coup.

Radio Jakarta at that time appeared to have been under control.

A broadcast by Radio Jakarta announced formation of a new, 45-member cabinet laced with perhaps a dozen Communists, but D. N. Aidit, leader of Indonesia's 3,000,000 - member Communist party, was not on the list.

Also absent from the new cabinet were Indonesia's top military officers, Gen. Nasution, commander of the armed forces, and Maj. Gen. Achmad Yani, army commander.

Nasution had been considered the chief obstacle to a Communist takeover in Indonesia. There was growing belief that he and Yani were among the generals arrested.

D. N. Aidit, the leader of Indonesia's big Communist party, also was not on the cabinet list, but the monitors said at least a dozen members were believed to be Communists.

SEE COMMUNIST RISE

Observers in Kuala Lumpur expected Communist influence to increase still more in Indonesia in the wake of the upheaval. For years the country's army leaders had acted as a check on the Communists.

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SUKARNO "UNDER PROTECTION" OF COUNCIL — Indonesia's President Sukarno was reported safe today and "under the protection" of a "Revolutionary Council" headed by his bodyguard. The new council took over Indonesia, Radio Jakarta announced, to block an attempted coup and had arrested a number of generals. (CP Wirephoto)

US Senate approves auto bill

WASHINGTON (CP) — The agreement between Canada and the United States to integrate the North American automotive industry was approved by the U.S. Senate Thursday, despite two surprisingly strong moves to delay it.

A vote of 54 to 18 in the 100-seat chamber sent the enabling legislation back to the House of Representatives for acceptance of amendments.

But the margin was much closer on two moves to hold the bill up for further scrutiny by higher-cost, lower-volume U.S. tariff commission. The 425-seat House had approved it by a margin of better than two to one with one amendment.

on most motor vehicles and their original parts.

This means a loss of \$50,000,000 annually in Canadian tariff revenues.

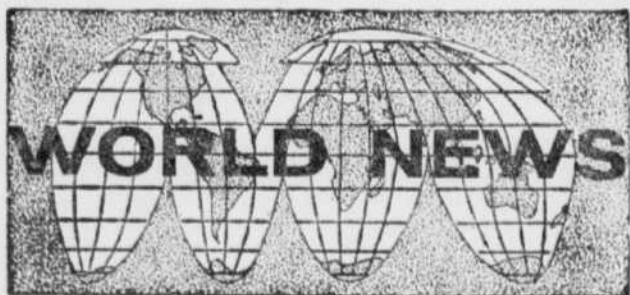

Acquitted

HAYNEVILLE, Ala. (AP) — The acquittal of a part-time deputy sheriff in the slaying of a young civil rights worker brought cries from integration leaders for federal "anti-lynch" legislation, condemnation from church leaders and criticism from Alabama's attorney-gen.

After two hours of deliberation Thursday, a jury of 12 white men acquitted Thomas L. Coleman of a manslaughter charge in the death of Jonathan M. Daniels, Coleman pleaded self-defence.

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Permits extended

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some 1,400 Canadian woodcutters have been granted extended authorizations by the labor department to remain at work in the U.S. pulpwood industry until the end of October.

An announcement Thursday said they visas under the im-

migration act had been scheduled to expire Thursday. A total of 2,016 Canadians are working in the pulpwood industry, mostly in Maine.

Others work in New Hampshire, Vermont and in upper New York state.

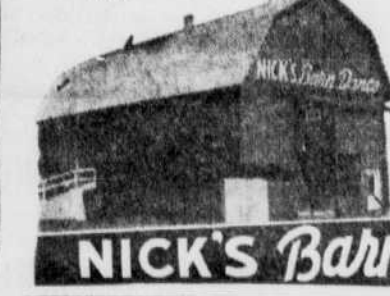

This set up the last two diamonds whereupon South cashed his king of trumps and dummy's ace and discarded two clubs on the long diamonds. He still had to lose a club and was

NEW YORK (AP)—Network television has been a topsy-turvy place for the last few weeks with so many new shows and old shows with cast changes. Thus, it was comfortable Wednesday night to find an old friend in a familiar content—Bob Hope in his first NBC comedy special of the year. Nothing has changed, and no body wanted it to.

Hope in his opening monologue—often the brightest spot in the program—fired off his usual sharp remarks at his favorite targets — Los Angeles traffic conditions, smog, the Beatles, the Mets, LBJ, plus some new ones like the New York water shortage and even the impending visit of the Pope.

Hope now is in his 16th television season and as a sentimental gesture had three guest stars who were with him on his first television show—Douglas Fairbanks Jr., Beatrice Lillie (Toronto born Lady Peel) and Dinah Shore.

Fairbanks and Hope were in a sketch about a pair of astronauts locked in space for three years, but they had a tough time extracting much humor out of the situation.

SATIRE'S BEST

The most amusing sketch was a satire on the current rash of secret agent stories. Hope played a private eye hired to investigate the stealing of television program ideas in a network. Dinah Shore was the spy, in a sequin gown, for the other network. The setup gave Hope an opportunity to make fun of TV commercials, network executives and show business protocols generally.

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Caritas campaign opens

Caritas serves more people than any other charitable organization in this area, the president of the Caritas charity campaign, Gerald Pelletier, told campaign organizers last night.

The campaign, which supports 16 charitable groups in eight Eastern Townships counties, held its opening meeting at the Social Club.

Mr. Pelletier said it was desirable to unite the appeals of many different organizations. In this way, he said, all the groups are assured of support from the population. However, he added, it's unfortunate that more businessmen don't realize that Caritas does represent more than one appeal.

A dollar split 16 ways doesn't amount to much, he said.

One hundred and sixty-five thousand dollars is the goal that the campaign has set itself. This money will be spread equally among the organizations represented in the appeal.

Vice-president of the appeal, J. H. Daly announced that this was not just a campaign for French Canadians. Caritas serves many charities which serve the English-speaking residents of the Eastern Townships, including the Victoria Order of Nurses and prisoners' aid. In fact, he said, it had been found that at least six of the charities supported serve English-speaking people.

U of S medical building is steadily taking shape

The University of Sherbrooke's Medical faculty building on the Stoke Road is taking shape, slowly but steadily.

Workmen at the building are at present in the stages of closing all the doors and windows and keeping out the cold.

In the building, class rooms have been built. However, complete floors, ceilings, and proper lights have not as yet been installed.

In certain parts of the building the floors have been covered with a beige tile floor.

Even though the heating plant is completely finished and in operation, not all of the rooms have a heating system. In summer time the system can be cooled to give an air conditioning effect.

The hospital, which will also be a medical school, will have four amphitheatres for teaching.

The theatres are not at all completed as just the floor of the inclined seating area has been installed. Workmen are busy installing lights, ceilings, and other special features which will be needed in the theatres.

The building will house several medical departments, such as the biology, chemistry, psychology, and pediatrics departments.

Many of the departments have been assigned locations but not all of these locations are available yet for occupancy. In some rooms lights may be missing, in others it may be glass or a complete heating system that has not been installed as yet.

Nurses' residences are near completion. Both floor and ceiling coverings as well as lights are ready.

When the building is ready for reception of both patients and students, which will be about September, 1967, it will feature a vast library on two floors and administration offices.

A reception room gives a panoramic view of the countryside around the medical centre.

Roughly, the structure is built in the form of a Y with one crosspiece and is 10 stories high. The elevator shaft, however, has 11 floors.

Planned for the building and to be in operation by September.

Operation of Quebec pension plan outlined

The Quebec pension board, which goes into operation on January 1, 1966 has created two distinct organizations, the Quebec Pension Board and the deposit and investment fund. These two organizations were created by adopting a special law, the law of supplementary pension boards which seeks to improve the pension of the workers, the Sherbrooke Chamber of Commerce was told last night.

Speaking at the annual general meeting Robert De Coster, C.A., president of the Quebec Pension Board outlined the general plan of the board, and defined the role of each of the two organizations.

The role of the board is to administer the pension plan and the deposit and investment fund as well as the financial part of the system.

Speaking of state intervention in the social insurance domain, Mr. De Coster said that this situation was derived from the facts that very few of the Quebec workers actually benefit from old age pension protection.

Statistics show that 30 per cent of the active labor force have private plans. On the subject of private plans, the president said that these systems would continue to exist, to develop and to multiply, because they answer a necessity.

The board, which consists of a president and two directors, of which one is a secretary, constitutes an autonomous organization like that administered by labor accidents law legislation.

In the course of his speech, Mr. De Coster described briefly the different advantages offered by the board. The advantages are the following: the retirement pension; the invalid pension; the widow's pension; the orphan pension; the pension for children of invalids and the death payments.

Contribution to the fund are 3.6 per cent for self-employed individuals and 1.8 per cent for employees. The speaker emphasized that the contributions are to be collected by the Revenue department.

In ending his speech, Mr. De Coster underlined that collaboration is very important on the part of the population of Quebec in general and employers in particular.

"Parachute" entries out of Sherbrooke county race

Sherbrooke County apparently will be free from "parachute" candidates in the November 8 election, except those who may be "parachuted" from one party onto another.

Politically, parachuting is the practice of running a non-resident of the constituency in a riding. Generally the practice is adopted when the central organization has a top-name man for whom it cannot find a seat in his own area and decides that he should seek election elsewhere.

Earlier in the week there were persistent reports that both the Liberals and Progressive Conservatives would seek to enter Montrealeers in the Sherbrooke race, the suggested names being Gerard Pelletier for the Liberals and Hon. Pierre Sevigny for the Official Opposition.

But Mr. Pelletier has announced that he will seek the Liberal nomination in Hochelaga, Montreal Island riding, and Mr. Sevigny has indicated that he prefers to campaign in the Montreal area.

So this leaves the two major parties in Sherbrooke County still without candidates.

The Liberal convention, originally scheduled for Sept. 26, was postponed at almost the last minute. Reason given for the postponement was the inability of obtaining a top-line speaker. But sharp divisions within the party over the choice of a suitable candidate are believed to have been a basic factor in the decision to delay the nominating meeting.

Efforts to iron out the differences apparently have met with little success. At any rate there has been no decision made as to when the convention will be held.

Progressive Conservatives are also having their troubles but they revolve around the inability to find a suitable candidate.

Maurice Allard, P.C. MP for Sherbrooke from 1958 to 1962, has indicated his willingness to enter the fight but he is unacceptable to certain of the old-line party members because of his long-established opposition to Rt. Hon. John Diefenbaker.

And he cannot make up his own mind as to whether to run as a straight party candidate or as an Independent Conservative.

A form of inter-party parachuting is playing the New Democratic Party.

Most members of the party apparently favor Albert Gosselin, of Rock Forest, as the standard-bearer. Mr. Gosselin is a long-time supporter of the NDP movement.

But reports persist that Louis Philippe Brousseau, one-time Liberal M.L.A. for Sherbrooke, who was read out of the party when he contested the 1963 federal elections as an Independent Liberal, has indicated that he will offer his "services" to the NDP.

For some time Mr. Brousseau was provincial organizer for one of the labor unions which provides much of the financial support for the NDP at the national level, a fact he indicates should make him suitable material.

However, if the convention fails to approve him, he hints he will run anyway, possible as an Independent Something or Other.

So, as the situation stands at present, the only candidates actually in the race are Gerard Chapdelaine, Secred MP from

Welcome news for Bedford district

Establishment of Social Welfare Courts in five more Quebec judicial districts, including the District of Bedford, announced Thursday by Justice Minister Claude Wagner should alleviate one of the principal problems faced by those seeking to curb juvenile delinquency.

For several months now the residents of the District of Bedford have complained, and rightly, that the existing system whereby juveniles charged with various offences were brought before the regular courts came in contact with more hardened criminals who further undermined their morale.

This is no reflection on the judges or officials of the regular courts, many of whom realized the handicaps under which they were operating. In fact, in the District of Bedford at least, Superior Court and District Court judges gave strong support for the idea of Social Welfare courts in which the young people could be segregated from the senior offenders.

Family Welfare Courts also have the specially-trained personnel required to

deal with the particular problems in a more efficient manner.

But the creation of additional Family Welfare Courts is not the final step in the effort to meet youth problems in this province.

Suitable centres for young people awaiting a hearing must be provided in the various centres. With the possible exception of Montreal and Quebec City, juveniles are frequently held in the district jails because of the lack of special facilities to handle them.

Prison officials generally make an effort to separate the young detainees from the older prisoners but the results are unsatisfactory at best. Most district jails in Quebec are outdated, many of them being a century or more old. This makes any effective segregation policy impossible.

Provincial government spokesmen have indicated that such a juvenile detention centre will be established at Sherbrooke in the near future. There should be no delay in providing such an institution here or in the other judicial districts of the province.

Revolutionary travel development

Perils inherent in long-range planning which fails to make allowances for possible technological developments are emphasized in the case of the hovercraft — a combination of automobile, motorboat and airplane which neither quite flies, or quite rides, but rather travels on a cushion of air that holds it a short distance above ground or water.

Hovercraft, developed in England by one Christopher Cockerell, a small-scale boat builder in East Anglia, must still undergo many tests before it can be determined whether it will do everything its inventor claims.

But if these tests do prove successful, it may revolutionize transportation.

Already its promoters are planning a service across the English Channel which may go into operation within a year "floating" cars and passengers from England to France.

A five-mile stretch of rail line discarded by the British Railways will be used as an experimental area for testing this 300-mile-an-hour form of travel.

The idea of a vehicle that can travel over land and water at will holds intri-

guing thoughts for the people of this country with its numerous lakes and rivers.

Just imagine a resident of Stanstead driving his car along the highway to Lake Memphremagog, crossing the lake and then continuing his journey through Bromfield County without being faced to make the long detour around the end of the lake.

Or think of the advantages that would accrue to a Montrealer who would be able to hop onto the St. Lawrence river surface and reach the South Shore without experiencing the traffic jams at the various bridges.

And in the winter the problems created by snow-blocked highways would be eliminated. The hovercraft would just climb over the drifts and continue along its way.

But while the possibilities appear fantastic at first glance, it is doubtful whether the provincial government would be justified in curtailing its highway improvement plans or abandoning the Three Rivers bridge project.

Perhaps the gadget might not like the Canadian climate.

We understand that some of the Communist countries are training rockthrowing teams to enter in the next Olympics.

Canadians given unfriendly advice

Well, Canadians finally know what they can do — in the opinion of three United States Democrat Senators anyway.

They can go on being dirt farmers, lumberjacks and base metal miners. But they should never aspire to becoming machinists, technicians or any other variety of skilled tradesmen, unless they are prepared to transfer their activities to the United States.

The authors of this kindly advice are Senators Albert Gore, of Tennessee, Abraham Ribicoff, of Connecticut, and Vance Hartke, of Indiana.

Perhaps we might be allowed to turn our own pulpwood into newsprint because we have developed certain techniques in this direction. But the idea of making automobiles, machinery and

other such goods is preposterous in the minds of these three men who voiced their disapproval of the automobile agreement recently negotiated between the two countries.

Fortunately Canadians need not lose much sleep over the prospects of the great manufacturing plants in this country closing down under United States pressure.

Basically United States government leaders have accepted the thesis that this country should become industrialized in the belief that by strengthening the Canadian economy, that of their own nation will be improved.

But the outpourings of these US senators should serve as a warning to some politicians in this country who are seeking to advance their own short-sighted interests by Yankee-baiting statements.

South Africa applies brakes

'Great leap forward' slows

JOHANNESBURG (Reuters)—South Africa's economic "great leap forward" of the last three to four years is being rapidly slowed by the government leading the campaign to put the brakes on hard.
From Premier Hendrik Verwoerd down, leading members of the government have warned South Africans that they should stop living it up and realize they are in for a period of earnest consolidation.
At the same time a number of new "put-the-brake-on" measures, chief of them tighter con-

trols on consumer goods imports, have been put into effect. More are forecast.
None of this belt-tightening is likely to be popular with South Africa's white population of just over 3,000,000, the great majority of whom are accustomed to a free-spending good life.
"Tighter Money Times Lie Ahead — It Will Be Austerity Christmas," ran a typical front-page headline in the Johannesburg Star.
Verwoerd said: "It is necessary for the government to slow

down the present tremendous development to a somewhat slower rate so that we can progress to a development curve that will always rise."
Finance Minister Eben Dönges issued a similar warning that the country was living beyond its means. He appealed to civil engineers to help put the brake on by postponing or cancelling construction projects.
House loans are already difficult to obtain and time-payment plans are likely to be increasingly affected.

French Canada says:

Lesage and knowing contribute to unity; we survived then grew

Quebec L'Action—The visit of Premier Lesage to Western Canada will not only encourage our people but will also make majority groups among whom the minorities live understand that Quebec also has its minorities and that it treats them as partners. . . .

The honorable premier will also reassure the English group about the separatist ideas of certain groups which are more noisy than numerous and which will lose their importance as English Canada admits, in fact and in law, that French-Canadians are equal partners everywhere in Confederation. It is not only a question of Quebec and nine other provinces; it is also, and most important, a question of this country's two founding groups — English-speaking and French-speaking Canadians. . . .

Mr. Lesage is making his pilgrimage during the course of a federal election campaign. He has undertaken to stay away from politics. If he remains true to this undertaking he will have proven again, and in spectacular fashion, that politics in Quebec is really and truly autonomous, even if the Quebec government is of the same (Liberal) stripe as the federal government which is seeking re-election. . . .

Louis-Philippe Roy (Sept. 21)

Ottawa Le Droit—The latest issue of RA News, magazine of the Ottawa Civil Servants' Recreation Association, contains an interesting article entitled: "Classes in French at RA Centre." The author believes the study of French can serve to bring closer together the two main ethnic groups, as a source of cultural enrichment and also in getting various types of jobs. . . .

He points out that French has been a diplomatic language since 1678 and that it is used in several countries other than France. Montreal La Presse — At Saskatoon, but before an audience largely made up of compatriots—members of the Franco-Canadian Cultural As-

sociation of Saskatchewan—Premier Lesage began his tour (of Western Canada) to explain Quebec, "the pillar of support for French Canada."

Even if the general theme of his first speech was not new, a few of his main ideas, and especially his presentation, had a new aura. According to the Quebec premier, those who want to retain the present division of Canada into 10 watertight provinces, each carefully partitioned, have a "vertical view" of our country that makes solution of our problems difficult if not impossible. . . .

It is from the horizontal angle, that is to say, from the aspect of two majorities surrounded by minorities, that Canada appears in its true perspective, that which is determined by its history and geography. If Quebec wants to give itself new strength and occupy all the jurisdictional territory to which it has a right, it is simply to make this "horizontal view" of Canada prevail against those who would like to separate it into 10 units of equal value, faced with an octopus-like central government capable of dominating the provinces. . . .

Mr. Lesage takes this important subject from the top and treats it with the adroitness and nuances it needs. However, before English-speaking audiences and especially at press conferences which he will not be able to avoid, will he always be able to stay at this level? . . .

Before leaving Quebec he specified that during this tour

all political subjects will be taboo. However, things have appeared in the English-language press which lead us to believe he will have much difficulty staying within such limits. . . . If he succeeds despite everything he will have accomplished a new-style feat of strength. . . .

New Russian enemy

'Unfriendly Communists'

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (NEA) — Russian soldiers are now warned by the Kremlin that their "main enemy" is Red China and not just the West.

According to diplomats from Communist East Europe, a revised edition of the Red Army's standard propaganda book entitled "Know Your Enemy" is currently being distributed to Soviet garrisons stationed on Russia's 4,000-mile-long frontier with Red China.

The former edition of the book contained the statement that Western imperialists and American capitalists were the "only enemies" against whom the Russian soldier must be ready to fight in order to defend Russia and world communism. But in the revised edition, the enemies of the "Fatherland" to be fought include the new category of "unfriendly Communists."

Since the demise of former Premier Nikita Khrushchev the Kremlin's new rulers have carefully avoided any direct reference to Mao Tse-tung or Red China. Thus, the new edition of "Know Your Enemy" does not state that "unfriendly Communists" means Red China.

But it's hardly a coincidence — in the view of the East European diplomats — that several million copies of the book were first distributed among Russian troops on the Soviet-Chinese border. Nor is it a coincidence that Moscow's latest propaganda urges the Red Army to stand ready to fight for the "Fatherland" and not for the victory of world communism.

A similar appeal was made by Stalin after Hitler attacked Russia in 1941. Aware that the ordinary Russian would fight for "Holy Mother Russia" but not for the Marxist-Leninist creed, Stalin declared that the conflict with Nazi Germany was, in effect, a "great patriotic war." He even invoked the aid of the persecuted Eastern Orthodox Church.

History is clearly repeating itself in Russia. There is little doubt that it is fear of Red China that forces Moscow to join the United States in seeking a peaceful solution to the conflict between India and Pakistan over Kashmir.

Communist party chief Leonid Brezhnev said as much when he expressed the Soviet government's "anxiety" over the fact that it took place in "a region immediately adjacent to the frontiers of the Soviet Union."

Brezhnev also hinted that Red China is determined, sooner or later, to attack India.

The East European diplomats believe that any action at all by Russia would be in support of India. This could bring Red Russia into a di-

rect armed conflict with Red China.

Under the circumstances, there is little Moscow can do except to try to isolate China from the rest of the Communist world and back the United States and the United Nations in their efforts to settle the Kashmir problem.

This does not mean that Russia's Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko will stop his attack against "American imperialism." Such attacks are his stock in trade and Russia, to fight Red China, must preserve his revolutionary image at all costs.

Don John of Austria, the victor of the sea battle of Lepanto (described in Chesterton's well-known poem) died 387 years ago today—in 1578—while campaigning against William of Orange in The Netherlands. An illegitimate son of Emperor Charles V, Don John's ambitions had been roused by his victories over the Turkish and Moorish pirates, but Philip II of Spain refused to advance him or make him heir to the Spanish throne. The political command of the Spanish-ruled Low Countries was the opposite of his ambitions and, at the time of his death, Don John had been forced off the battlefield by lack of funds to pay his troops.

Look into the future is given Lions Club

COWANSVILLE — (Staff) — Imagine being able to shop by telephone and actually see the color of a pair of shoes, the pattern on a dress and even the freshness of vegetables right in your own home.

Sound unreal? All you need is a picturephone which within 50 years will be standard equipment in homes or stores, Leo Hudon, supervisor of Bell Telephone translation method department predicted Tuesday evening.

Speaking to the second regular meeting of the Cowansville Lions Club at the Hotel Maurice, Mr. Hudon said that with the picturephone will come all the services which can only be dreamed of today.

Besides the above services,

he said that "you could dial the library and preview books and magazines; visit an art gallery or even hire a tutor who wouldn't have to set foot out of his house to give you special instruction on any subject."

Businessmen could set up picturephone conferences to show their latest line of goods to people around the world. "And think of the thousands of deaf people who depend on lip reading to carry on a conversation. With a picturephone they would be able to have a telephone conversation for the first time," he said.

By the year 2000 dialing telephone calls will be a thing of the past, for touchtone telephone which is only now being introduced in a few communities "will be standard in our homes and offices," Mr. Hudon noted.

Having explained some of the new inventions that will probably be in use in about 50 years, Mr. Hudon then described what might well be a day in the life of a 21st century businessman.

phone inventories of his stock begin. Machines notify machines in warehouses about stock shortages and new shipments are on their way that night.

"Meanwhile, our businessman, whose wife has taken a couple of days' trip to Hong Kong, has used his electronic central office equipment, E-C-O for short, to turn on the oven at his home, water the lawn and transfer his telephone calls to a friend's home where he'll visit until dinner's cooked."

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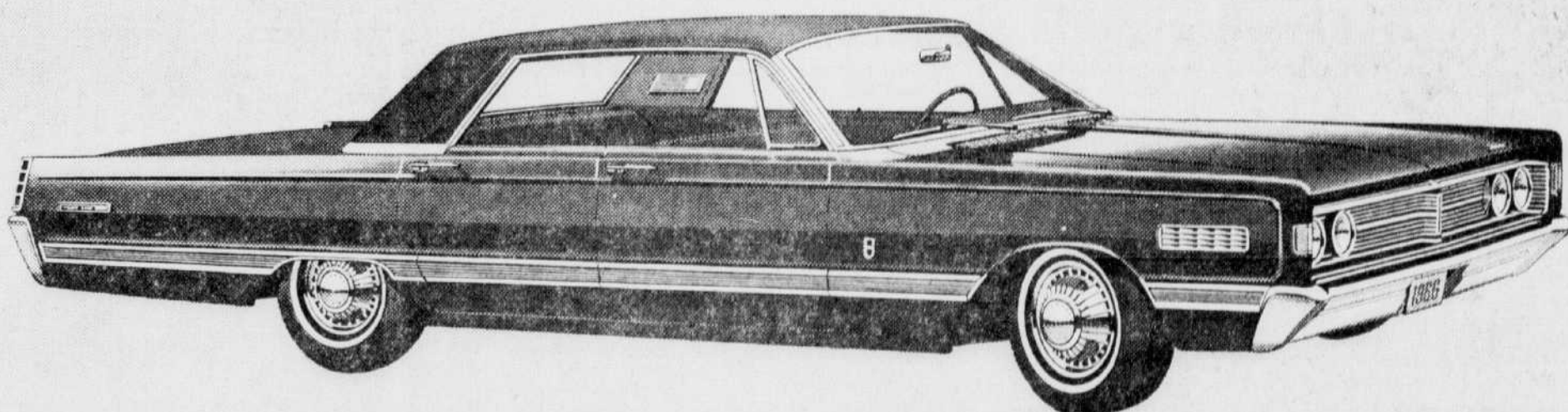
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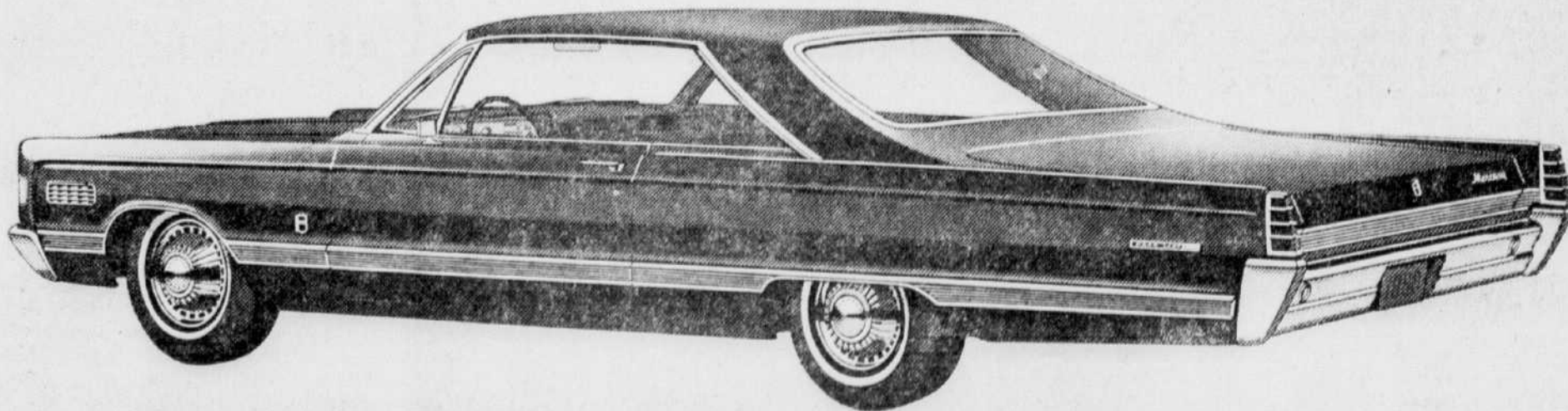

She told a party rally Monday night: "I didn't walk for a year. Then with braces, canes and a lot of determination, here I am."

No newcomer to politics, Mrs. Cochrane was a young Conservative as a teen-ager in Britain with her parents. Later she thought she would seek nominations in Newfoundland or British Columbia.

"Then Senator (Wallace) McCutcheon thought I'd do best in Toronto."

LIVED IN Nfld. Mrs. Cochrane has been well-trained in publicity.

She went to Newfoundland in 1952 with her parents and got a job with Gander radio station CBG. She ran her own CBC network program, People Who Travel, and was Gander correspondent for the St. John's Telegram.

"That was in 1954 when all sorts of famous people were staying at Gander on transatlantic flights. I remember interviewing the late Agha Khan, Zsa Zsa Gabor, Olivia de Havilland and dozens of others, including Lester Pearson."

She later moved to New York and the Long Island Examiner news desk and from there to Newsday's night desk. She was the London Telegraph's correspondent at the same time.

Marriage to a Canadian pilot brought her back to Canada where her daughters, Nadia, Gayle and Glenda, were born.

News flashes from around the world

PARIS (Reuters) — Lord Thomson, Canadian-born publisher, said Thursday he does not believe border disputes between China and the Soviet Union will be settled without great difficulties, perhaps even to the extent of armed conflict.

In a speech to the American Club of Paris, Lord Thomson recalled that he had interviewed with Soviet Communist leaders, and said:

"My observation is that top Communist officials in the Soviet Union are greatly concerned with the Chinese situation. They have a long border with China, much of it in dispute.

"I do not believe these border disputes will be settled without great difficulties, perhaps even to the extent of armed conflict."

REGINA (CP) — Senator M. Wallace McCutcheon said Thursday night the Liberal government is really asking for more rubber - stamp votes in Parliament in its plea for a majority in the Nov. 8 general election.

In an address to a nominating convention here, the Progressive Conservative senator and former trade minister launched a double-barrelled attack on Trade Minister Sharp and Finance Minister Walter Gordon.

He accused the Liberal trade minister of arrogance and use of dishonest arguments in election speeches on the Prairies and Mr. Gordon of advocating anti-American policies which drive out essential foreign investment.

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Cuban Premier Fidel Castro offered an open door policy today, including two free flights daily, to Cubans wishing to leave the Caribbean island for the United States.

Castro, in a statement broadcast by Havana radio, elaborated on his offer of Tuesday in which he said he would allow any Cubans to leave their homeland to join relatives or go into exile in the U.S.

The premier said in the broadcast, monitored here, that "we maintain the decision that from Oct. 10 we will give absolute guarantees and facilities to all those who wish to come to Cuba by their own means or to pick up their relatives."

OTTAWA (CP) — The interest rate on new Government of Canada treasury bills returned Thursday to its post-1962 peak of 4.13 per cent after the Bank of Canada further reined in the money supply.

The rate of yield on the three-month treasury investments is generally regarded as a signal for interest rates generally.

Strike affects PQ

QUEBEC (CP) — Paul - Emile Lachance, president of the Council of Quebec Pulp and Paper Producers, says the 12-day

strike which has halted publication of six New York City daily papers is costing Quebec newspaper producers \$1,620,000 a week in losses.

Nearly all Quebec newspaper manufacturers are affected and weekly deliveries have been reduced by about 12,000 tons, he said in a statement Thursday.

Mr. Lachance said the mills are continuing to operate at the same pace, or at more than 90 per cent of their capacity, but they may be forced to reduce production if the New York strike is prolonged.

In 1962-63 a similar strike halted publication of the New York dailies for 114 days with serious repercussions in the Quebec paper industry, which exports more than 70 per cent of its output to the United States.

CROWD SWELLED

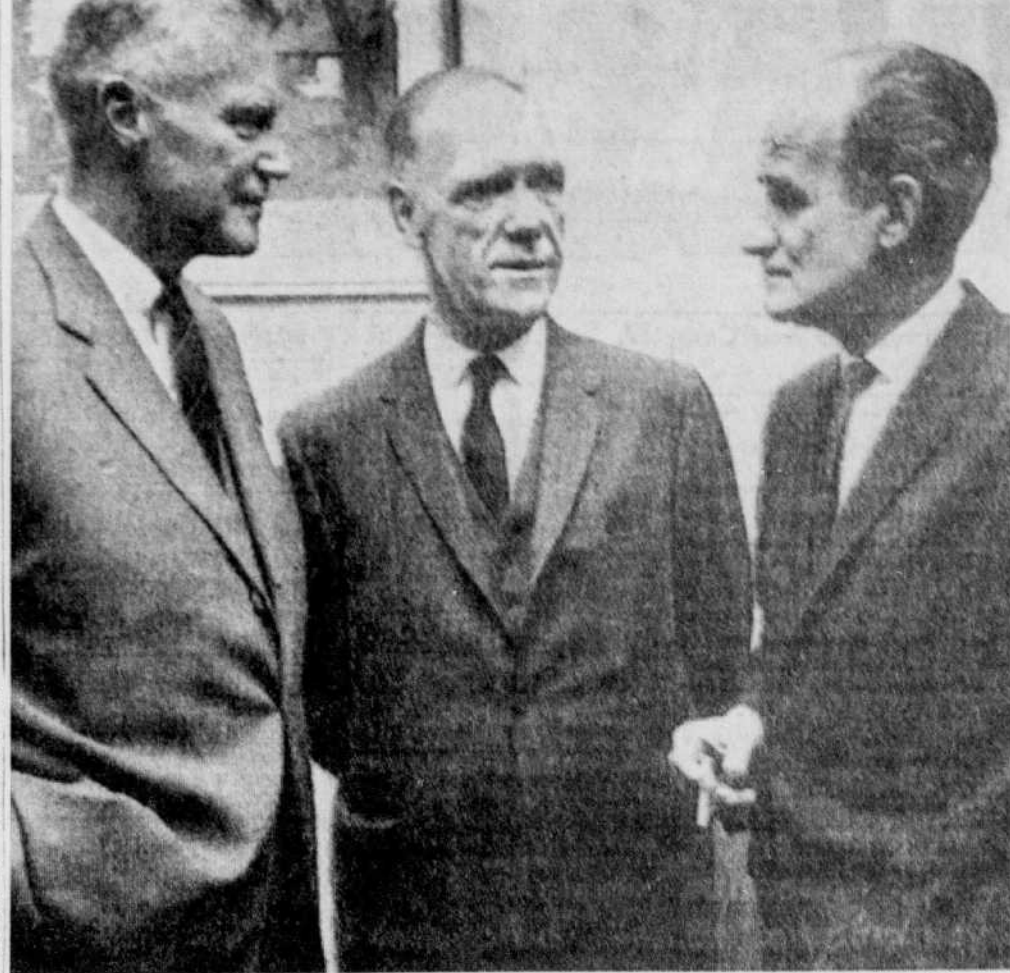

SAID RESPONSIBLE

MONTEAL (CP) — Andre Charbonneau, 20, of Montreal, was found criminally responsible here Thursday for the death of Sept. 26 of Richard White, 24, a Moncton laborer, who was found strangled and stabbed in a Montreal hotel.

The inquest was held behind closed doors.

Police said he came voluntarily to police headquarters Monday night.

White booked into the east-end hotel on Friday and again on Saturday. He was found Sunday unclothed and tied to a bed by his arms and legs.

There was a pillow over his head and a piece of string tied round his neck. He had been stabbed several times in different parts of the body.

It is believed he had been living in Montreal for some months.

In Quebec no charges are laid in a case of violent death until after a coroner's inquest.

"O Canada"

MONTEAL (CP) — Guy Favreau, president of the Privy Council, said Thursday night that one of the first acts of a majority Liberal government would be to declare O Canada the country's national anthem.

He made the statement at a nominating convention that chose Jean-Pierre Cote to contest Longueuil riding in the Nov. 8 federal election. Mr. Cote won the seat in 1963, defeating Pierre Sevigny, former associate defence minister in the Diefenbaker government.

U of S

Power station

QUEBEC (CP) — Rene Levesque, Quebec minister of natural resources, said Thursday a thermo-electric power station is to be constructed in the Matane region by Hydro-Quebec.

The minister told reporters, however, that the exact location of the power station has not yet been fixed.

The minister added that construction of a thermoelectric power station in the province at a cost of about \$100,000,000 is also being studied. It would probably be located near Montreal, he said.

Pilots prod

MONTEAL (CP) — The Federation of St. Lawrence River Pilots urged the federal government Thursday to improve winter services and navigational aids.

The federation, in a brief, said pilots cannot consider working another winter under present conditions.

The pilots said they are dealing with "woefully inadequate" conditions in Quebec City where there are neither pilot boats nor tugs available between the end of December and the middle of March.

Pilots had to bring vessels alongside a wharf amid floating ice and strong tidal currents without the help of tugs.

The Canning company, I hear, had to leave several hundred acres contract- sweet corn in the field — at the growers' loss. And that, in the short view, doesn't increase the popularity of corn.

But some fields were being cut without trouble. Some of these had naturally good drainage; others had been tiled.

I was talking to one of the Howick men about the effect of tile drains. He noted that the tiled fields had stood up to the June drought better than the others. He thought that the ear- lier planting and lower water- table in the spring had given the roots a chance to go down deeper.

He commented, too, that those who had planted the early vari- eties weren't so worried. If the worst came to the worst, and they couldn't get the corn off as silage, they had an alter- native — it could be harvested as grain corn after the ground was frozen.

Fast buck salesmen peddling tax auditing services are still at it, so I hear. Periodically these fly-by-nighters descend on an area offering "in- come tax services" for \$75 or \$85 dollars.

We just about got caught once ourselves. These two characters who drove up our lane, well dressed and driving a good car,

gave the impression that they were working with the govern- ment's Income Tax Division. Their job was to get the far- mer's books in shape ready for the inspector who would be fol- lowing in a day or two.

Of course, there would be a charge — but it would be small compared with the tax I would pay if the inspector lost pa- tience with my shoe-box ac- counting.

They looked and sound- ed genuine, and I agreed to let them start on my books next morning. But a doubt kept tap- ping me on the shoulder, and I dropped the hint that I would be phoning a friend that evening who worked in the Income Tax office. We never saw these "au- ditors" again.

A neighbor did fall for it. He paid \$75 for a three-year ac- counting service contract. A set of ruled account books was all he ever got out of it.

Word has just come in at the time of writing of the prices established at the first North- ern Feeder Sale of the Season at Watford, Ontario. A pen of 500 pound calves brought top price at \$28 cwt. Good heifers were in demand. One pen which averaged 650 pounds brought \$24.80 cwt. Others sealed down from that.

Seven feeder sales in Quebec and Ontario are scheduled be- fore the middle of October. The one at Coaticook, south of Sher- brooke, is on October 1st.

The sale at La Sarre, in Abitibi West, is on October 13th. It's their first, so we will be wish- ing them luck.

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The Doctor Says
CHRONIC NAILBITERS
NEED GREATER
SELF-CONFIDENCE

By Wayne G. Brandstadt, M.D.

A mother writes that her son, 13, bites his nails whenever he is not using his hands and es- pecially while watching televi- sion. Since this common habit is an indication of some form of inner tension it will do no good to scold or nag the boy. The best treatment is to relieve his need to bite his nails by bol- istering his self-confidence.

He should be praised for his accomplishments, however mod- est, and he should not be pushed beyond his ability. If the televi- sion shows he watches are over- exciting his parents should try to alter his tastes, but this must be done tactfully and without undue pressure or the nailbiting will be aggravated.

Q—My daughter, 11, has alopecia. First her eyelashes fell out, then she got a bald spot on her scalp the size of a half dollar. What caused this and what can be done for it?

A—When baldness comes on rather suddenly in patches (alopecia areata) it usually per- sists for several months before the hair gradually returns. The cause is unknown. Feeding the children dried brewer's yeast sometimes helps. Other helpful measures include daily massage with an ointment containing anthralin or prednisolone and gradually increasing exposure to sunlight, taking care to avoid sunburn. As the disease subsides the eyelashes will also come back.

Q—My son, 2½, has had eczema for two years. After using many different preparations we found a steroid of the cortisone group that controls it. Will its prolonged use have any bad effects?

A—Although it is unwise to take cortisone-like preparations by mouth for a long period, a cortisone ointment applied in the smallest amount that will control the eczema can be used as long as necessary without harm. But meanwhile, your doctor should be finding out what your son is allergic to. Removing the cause is the best treat- ment.

Q—How long after an attack of glandular fever can a 12-year-old boy resume physical sports?

A—Glandular fever, more commonly called infectious mono- nucleosis, is a self-limited dis- ease. Return to full vigor may take two or three months but steroids of the cortisone group, when given early in the course of the disease, will hasten re- covery.

Q—My 2-year-old daughter's uvula seems to be growing to the side instead of hanging down straight. It doesn't bother her in any way. Is any treatment needed?

A—This minor abnormality is of no significance if the uvula is not inflamed or enlarged.

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Do-it-yourself

A fence should enhance the beauty of your yard

A fence need not be some- thing ugly designed only to keep people, creatures and things in or out. While the functions of a fence may be any of these it also can be some- thing that is a thing of beauty, a logical part of your landscap- ing, a feature that enhances your home.

Do not, however, build a fence just for the sake of build- ing a fence. A fence provides privacy, serves as a screen, protects property or ties the house into its setting. But if your fence does none of these, forget it.

Before you build, check local zoning ordinances. These will define where you may and may not erect a fence and its size, or whether you can put up a fence at all.

There are many styles, many materials from which to choose. Remember to keep the fence subordinate to the house and yard. Avoid these situa- tions:

—Big fence, small house. Your house will look unimpor- tant if you can see it at all. A big fence, on the other hand, can make a big, old house look smaller, cozier.

—High fence, narrow lot. Your lot will look narrower. Build a low fence so that hor- izontal lines are emphasized, making the lot look wider.

—Fence tops that dip and climb. Keep the top line strong and even. Avoid scallops that will detract from the house and yard. If you don't want the fence following a slope, let it drop down a few steps at a time keeping the top rail level.

You can start from scratch with the raw material and de- sign and build the entire fence yourself. Or you can buy a fence in prefabricated sections in a variety of styles.

Just about anything makes a fence—stone, brick, wire, alu- minum, fiberglass, plastic, boards, plywood sheets, rails—almost anything. The most pop- ular material because of looks, economy and the simplicity of building is wood.

If you use wood, be sure to treat it to prevent rotting wherever it enters or touches the ground. You can purchase treated lumber or you can treat the wood (especially posts) with wood preservative by dipping and soaking.

Posts should be long enough so that a third of the length can go below ground. And this should be at least 2½ feet.

Use a posthole digger to make the postholes. The work will go faster and easier. Most hardware stores will rent you one.

Use 4x4 lumber for posts, or larger. They should be no more than 8 feet apart. With 8-foot rails, each rail would be sup- ported by three posts—in the center and at each end.

Set Posts Firmly
Set posts deeper in sandy soil than in clay. Pour a little gravel in the base of the hole for drainage, set the post in and tramp the earth firmly around it. If the soil is loose, use concrete — a little at the bottom, then a layer of rocks around the post, then more concrete.

Rails should be set with a level, rather than measuring the distance from the ground be- cause the ground may be irreg- ular. If you do want the rails to follow the contours, set the posts the same depth, measure from the top of the post to fix the position of the rails.

Use screws instead of nails, they last longer. Paint over hardware and nails and screws. Aluminum paint will prevent rust from bleeding through the finished paint.

Long family association
CENTENARY celebrations held at Acton Vale Anglican Church

ACTONVALE — Centenary cel- ebrations Sunday, Sept. 12, of a church here were organized by members of a family who have been associated with that church since 1863.

Attending the celebration were Anglican dignitaries from Quebec City, Westmount, Len-noxville, Drummondville along with Wurtelle family descendants and people from the area.

In 1863 Rev. Louis G. Wur- telle became pastor of St. Mark's Anglican Church here. Fifty-seven years later in 1919 his widow bought the church and the property, the presbytery and cemetery as a family estate.

Anglicans, still numerous in the area, continued to attend the church.

Louis Campbell Wurtelle stud- ied for the ministry at Lennox- ville's Bishop's College while living at River David, (today St. David de Guire) in Yamaska County.

In 1848 he visited Acton in Drummond County on a hunt- ing trip. He travelled via St. Hyacinthe on the Grand Trunk Railway which stretched to Ac- ton.

Twelve years later, after mar- rying Emily Towle, Mr. Wur- telle built a home on the land where he had camped while hunting. This building was to be St. Mark's presbytery. The land was owned by the episcopal syn- od of the Anglican Church.

His wife died at the age of 37 in 1872. He was remarried to Isabella Tracy Hunter who lived three years longer than he.

Rev. Mr. Wurtelle's diary tells how he led the building of St. Mark's Church in 1863 at Ac- ton and another Anglican Church at South Durham where he was also minister.

He notes in the diary's mar- gin "that at the death of Bishop

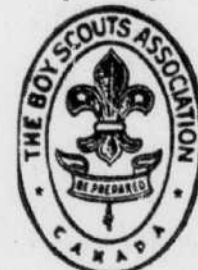
