## Soil testing complete for artificial ice installation

The Artificial Ice Committee has received the report from McRostie Seto, Genest Assoc Ltd. Consulting Civil Engineers of Ottawa. This company had been asked to do a soil test of the earth on the floor of the Agricultural Building in Shawville to determine what was necessary

preliminary to laying artificial ice.

Alf Seto was the engineer who came to do the testing and he arrived last Thursday. Assisted by Earl Devine and Gerald Walls of the Shawville Municipal work force, and also by Morley Hodgins and Keith Horner of the Artificial Ice Committee and a few other interested people, Mr. Seto was able to complete his tests on Thursday afternoon.

On Tuesday of this week the report of the findings arrived in Shawville. Mr. Seto has decided that for a proper grounding beneath the ice there would have to be a layer one yard deep of crushed stone. The proposal is to remove 24" of earth first and then put in the 36" of gravel. On top of the crushed stone will go a one inch layer of styrofoam and on top of that would be the 5" layer of cement with the steel pipes embedded therein.

The committee is now waiting for quotations from several companies on the cost of the refrigeration plant. These are expected later this week.

## Direct distance dialing coming to Quyon

Dial telephones will be introduced in Quyon in May, 1967. This encouraging news has come from Mr. Lucien Landreville, Bell Canada manager, through his commercial assistant Mr. J. Coulombe of Ottawa.

A new fully automatic exchange will connect the Quyon and district subscribers to the DDD network. This DDD simply means direct distance dialing and makes it possible for people so connected to dial their own long distance calls to ninety million other telephones across the continent.

The changeover to DDD will require new telephone numbers to all customers consisting of seven digits. The first three digits in all Quyon exchange numbers will be 458 and the numbers will be listed in a special supplement of the telephone directory.

## Michael Finnigan and Charles Taylor attend East Canada Hockey School

Charles Taylor, 13 year old son of Mona and Watt Taylor and Michael Finnigan 12½ yr old son of Marie and Frank Finnigan attended the Eastern Canada Hockey School held in the Hull Arena August 15-20.

The boys stayed at the YMCA where a bus picked them up at 8.30 a.m. to go to the rink. Approximately 70 boys attended, some travelling as far away as Chicago, Potsdam, and Messina.

Commencing at 9 a.m. sharp the course consisted of limbering up exercises to prepare the boys for their training. Then followed chalk-talks and finally the ice-time. There were also hockey films and the boys were instructed on positional play, accepting passes etc. Although Charles and Michael shared a room at the "Y" they played on different groups on the ice, Charles on the gold group and Michael on the Reds.

Full time instructors were Ralph Backstrom, Johnny Wilson, Mike Donaldson and Bill Collins. Special visitors were John Ferguson, Jacques Plante and Leo Boivin.

Meanwhile, back at the mill-site, August 18th was the ninety-ninth consecutive day with no lost time accidents; a total of five hundred thousand hours!

Fifteen hundred cases have received first aid, 60 of which warranted hospital treatment. There are now about 760 men on the site and the average man hours between injuries is 8,330.

During the intervening months between now and May, representatives of Bell Telephone will be contacting telephone users in the area to explain the use of the dial phone and the DDD system.

Mr. Landreville says that the present basic monthly rates will remain unchanged when the changeover takes place. There will be a scale of mileage rates for individual and two-party service to customers outside out of what Bell calls the "Quyon urban area".

As they are at present, calls between Quyon and Luskville will continue to be local calls, (but when direct distance dialing sets in a few extra twirls of the dial by mistake can get you Vancouver or Halifax with charges accordingly, on your next phone bill, so a word to the wise from The Equity is to have them put your new dial phone out of reach of children).

At present the Bell Telephone cables are all buried as far west as they go on Highway 8 and by winter the connecting cables of the Pontiac Rural Telephone Company will also be buried as far as Shawville and thence as far north as Yarm, according to Mr. Ramsay Baker, of the Pontiac Company.

## Telephone voice selling stocks in Shawville area

This week local people are receiving phone calls from someone who says he is in Toronto. He is selling stocks. Some people are sending cheques to Toronto for these stocks. The results of buying stocks in this way we are told, have been tragic in some instances.

Nelson Johnston and Bill Main, Shawville managers of the Royal Bank and Bank of Montreal respectively are able to advise investors about stocks. They may not be experts but they do have information and experience and also they can contact their head offices for further information.

To avoid the possibility of losing out in a stock buying deal over the telephone, the local bank managers suggest you deal only with people you know—and CERTAINLY only with people you can SEE.

## Sewer pipelines now being laid at Campbell's Bay

The sewer pipes should all be laid by July, 1967 in Campbell's Bay if work progresses at the expected rate. Having started last month, Rollin Construction of Gatineau has kept to their schedule so far and the concrete sewers have been laid through the center part of the village already.

The plan calls for five sizes of lines. There will be 590 feet of

eighteen inch pipe; 7800 feet of 16-inch pipe; 1045 feet of 12" 875 ft of 10"; and 8310 ft of 8" pipe; 18,980 feet all told.

The sewer line will collect sewage from the north as far as Theodore Morin's, the south as far as Denzil Brown's on the town limits, from the east as far as the town limits at Edgar Allard's home and from the west as far as Dr. Chretien's house.

All the sewage will be dumped raw into the Ottawa River. The original hopes of the planners included a sanitary disposal plant but on direction from the Water Purification Board of Quebec they will now convey all the effluent to the River unfiltered.

After three years of experience with the new sewage, Campbell's Bay will be in a better position to know the size of sanitary disposal plant necessary, according to the Purification Board.

Engineers for the project are Lindsay, Cosgrove and Associates of Westmount, Que.

Campbell's Bay will assess the ratepayers an average of \$50 per year for 40 years to pay the cost of the pipeline which will be \$291,826. The town will also sell a bond issue.

Campbell's Bay is also served with a water pumping station which pipes water to the homes from the Ottawa River. A new subdivision on property previously owned by Mr. Theo Morin, will eventually include 31 homes.

The property has been purchased by the Consolidated Paper Corp and will be served by both water and sewer as homes are developed there.

The installation of a sewage line in Campbell's Bay is a giant step forward for the Count Seat of Pontiac. Among other municipalities studying the possibility of sewers is Calumet Island.

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## ONE SCHOOL

"One God", say the ecumenical leaders and theologians. "One World", say the world architects of peace. "One Canada" say the statesmen of the nation. "One Pontiac", say the politicians charged with local improvement.

Now the concept of "One school" has crept in; not a new idea but one which requires some intelligence to accept.

At Cowansville, the concept may become a reality. They are nearer to it than we are and therefore are worth taking a look at.

At Cowansville, the idea of a joint school, rather than separate buildings, originated with the regional boards and their architects. One of the key men in the plan is J. Lloyd MacKeen who was all too briefly a supervisor of education in Pontiac County.

The school will educate French speaking Catholics, English speaking Catholics, English speaking Protestants and French speaking Protestants—boys and girls during school hours, and adults in the evenings.

All English speaking classes will be integrated into the same co-educational classes except for the teaching of religion. French speaking Catholic students will have co-educational classes in a separate academic wing of the building and any French-speaking Protestant pupils who wish to pursue a highschool education in their mother tongue will be accommodated in the French Catholic section "without prejudice".

Construction of the new school is expected to begin next Spring in Cowansville.

As the enrollment will be very large, about 3800, the school will be divided for administrative purposes with deans for each division to assist the French and English principals and vice-principals. The school will offer academic programs, commercial courses, terminal trade and vocational studies and pre-technical programs.

Among trade and technical offerings at Cowansville will be food services, dress designing, textiles, household management, drafting, general business, wood-working metal working, electricity, electronics and motor mechanics.

Grades 7 to 11, and later grade 12, will be accommodated and a program in agriculture will be introduced at the grade 9 level. There will also be special programs in vocal music, instrumental music, arts and crafts, fine arts and commercial art.

Vocational and technical courses offered by one group are to be open to qualified students from the other and the Catholic board will try as much as possible to engage bilingual teachers in its technical and vocational programs.

The division of ownership of the school will be an imaginary line through the complex. According to the school laws, educational properties must be owned outright by one group or the other so the school architects will have a problem but their special designers are at work on the project with considerable enthusiasm.

The shared facilities will include a cafeteria which will be on the Catholic side but the three daily lunch shifts will not be divided along language or religious lines.

The auditorium will be on the Protestant side.

The two-storey bilingual library will be jointly owned. There will be separate shelves for French and English books, and a common reading room and any pupil in the school will be permitted to take out books in either language.

In fact, French and English students will be encouraged to mix in a number of activities and school officials hope to enter one team, rather than separate teams, in a number of inter-scholastic athletic competitions.

This is all supposed to happen in Cowansville. It is as yet on the drafting boards and in the minds of the people who wish the best for their district.

Meanwhile in Pontiac, what is going on? We told the Department of Education that we wanted our Pontiac children to continue their education in Pontiac County. They were thoroughly convinced in Quebec that

we meant what we said. So were we.

But now that the possibility of this coming to pass is within our grasp we seem to have changed our minds on the subject. This is getting to be expected of Pontiac. Look what happened to our great centennial project! After three years of negotiation to achieve a provincial-federal grant we threw the whole thing back in their faces.

The provincial-federal grants for secondary schools will not be available forever. If we can't think in terms of one school we may well find ourselves outside the government's plans for education, as we are now outside their plans for the Centennial.

The Cowansville experiment might not pan out perfectly. They may have their problems and they may fail before they even get started. They are already faced with petitioning parents opposed to the scheme.

But isn't it possible that here in Pontiac we can see straight on at least this one matter and allow our children to have the best education available today. We can PREVENT it with no trouble at all. But we can also ALLOW it to proceed with no trouble at all.

Assenting individuals and organizations have but to speak up. Write to the Department of Education in Quebec. Write to the Protestant Regional School Board and the Catholic Regionale School Board, both in Hull. Tell them you want them to go ahead with the plan. They have heard from the grumblers and dissenters—now let them hear from the positive thinkers—in both languages.

No wisp of mist removes me, I am here.

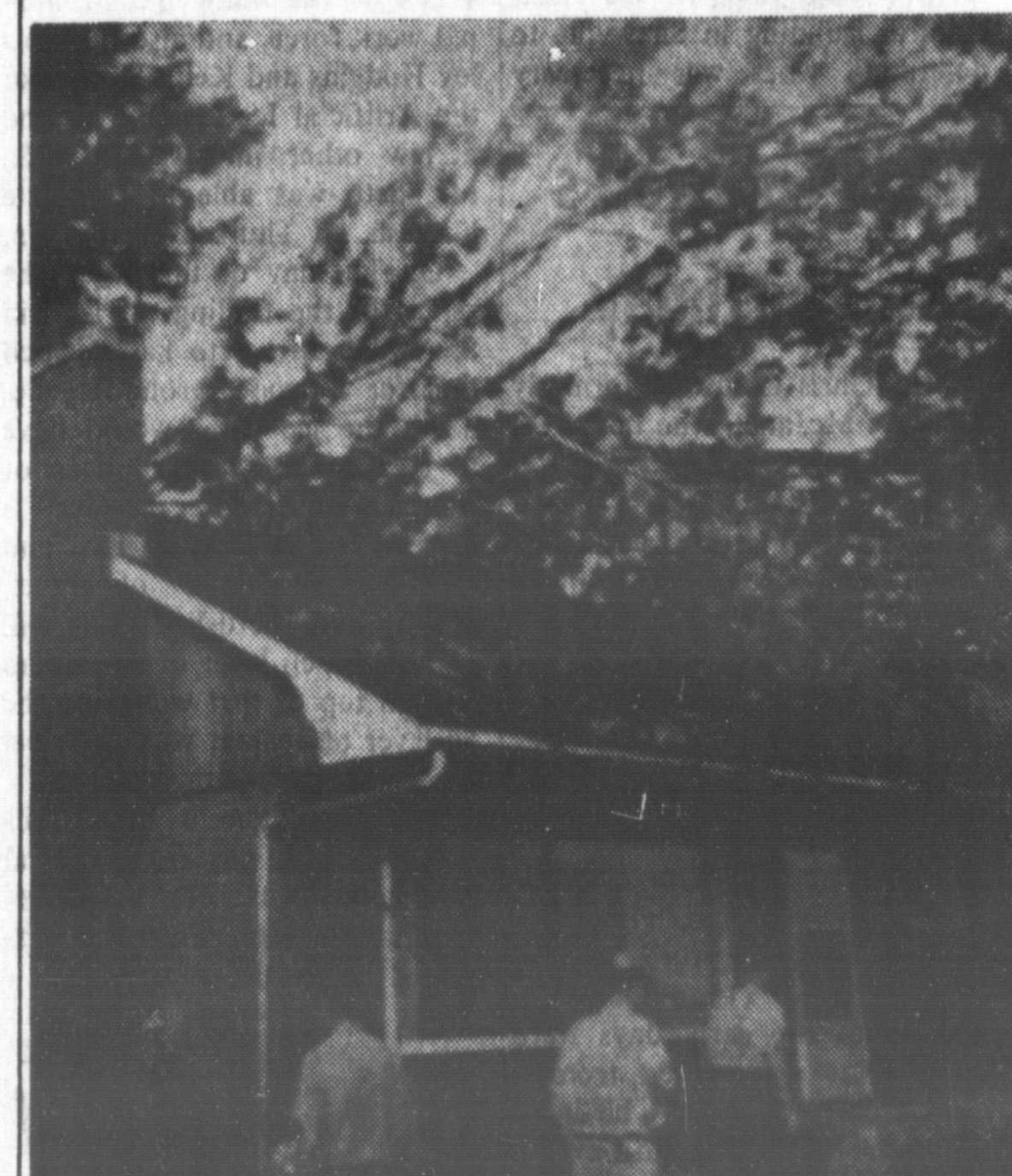
I looked above the waves and saw Him there—

**Poor Preacher**

Dear Editor,

It seems to me some people think an editor, a school teacher and preacher should be perfect. So let each one of us stop—and look at ourselves.

A preacher has a hard time —If his hair is white he is too old. If he is a young man he hasn't had any experience. If he has ten children he has too many. If he has none he should have and it is not showing a good example. If his wife sings in the choir, she is presuming—if she doesn't she isn't taking a proper interest.

If a preacher reads his notes he is a bore. If he speaks extemporaneously he isn't deep enough. If he stays at home to study, he does not mix with the people. If he is seen around on the streets he ought to be home getting up a sermon. If he calls at the home of the poor he is playing to the grandstand. If he calls at the home of the rich, he is an aristocrat. Whatever he does someone else could have told him how to do it better. Next to being an editor or a school teacher it is an awful life.

Weep not for me.

"I feel sorry for you". These words were lingering in my ears as I left the home that day I had just made a pastoral call and the lady of the house had told me how she felt sorry for me, a preacher and the way some people of the church will treat the minister. She went on to say she could no longer feel fellowship with those at that church so would worship the Lord at home—As I left my heart turned to Jesus—I remembered how the wicked church of His day led him to Calvary. His words to the women as they wept 'Weep not for me but weep for yourselves and your children' Luke 23-28.

It seemed Jesus was saying "Weep not for me; I am in the Father's will. If I suffer and die that is secondary—The most important thing is, I am in my Father's will. I settled this in Gethsemane, weep for yourselves". Are you now in His will?" I am glad that I too, settled it one day. Should persecution come from without the church or from within — weep not for me ,for today I am in the Fathers will—weep for yourselves all ye who are out of his will. 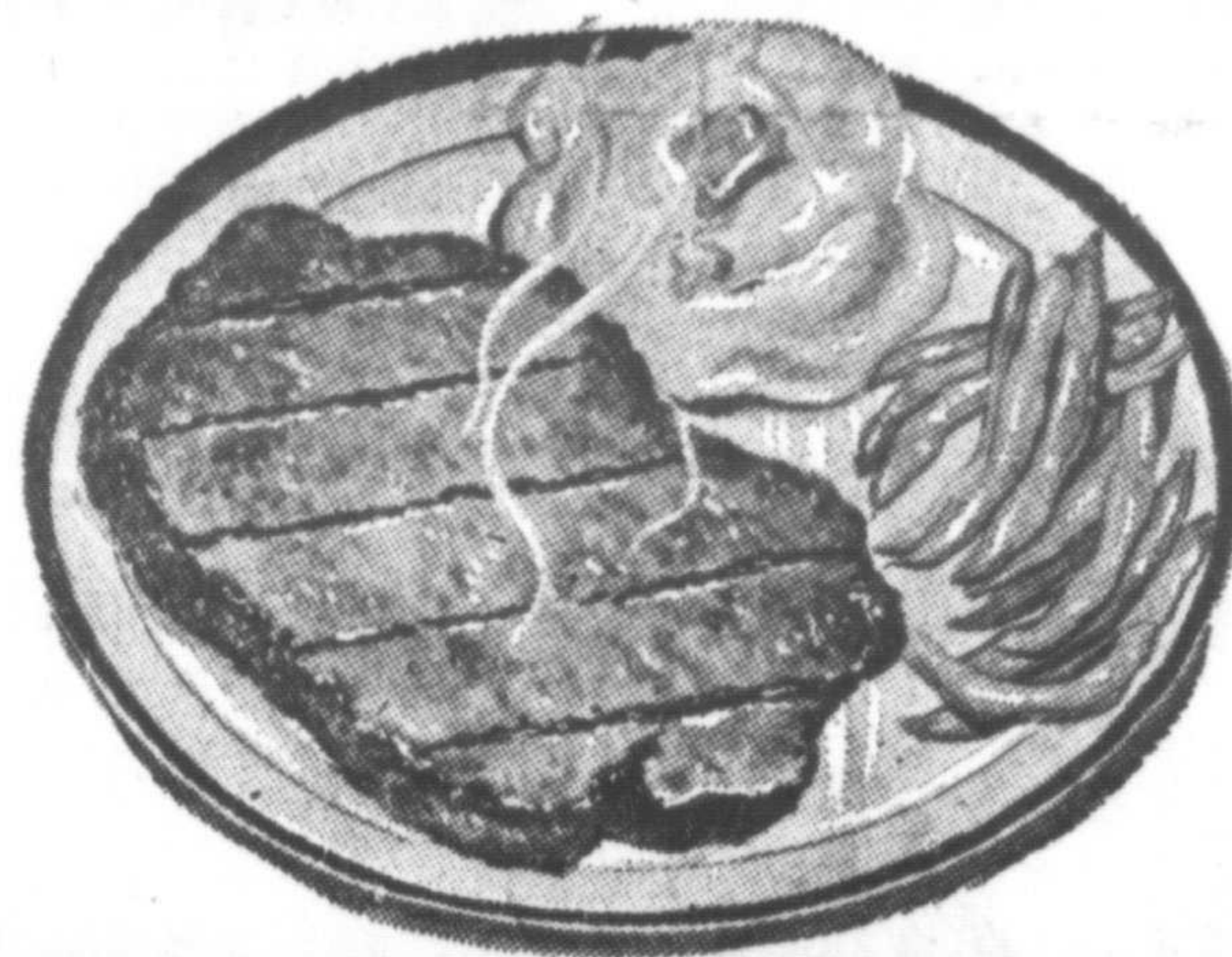

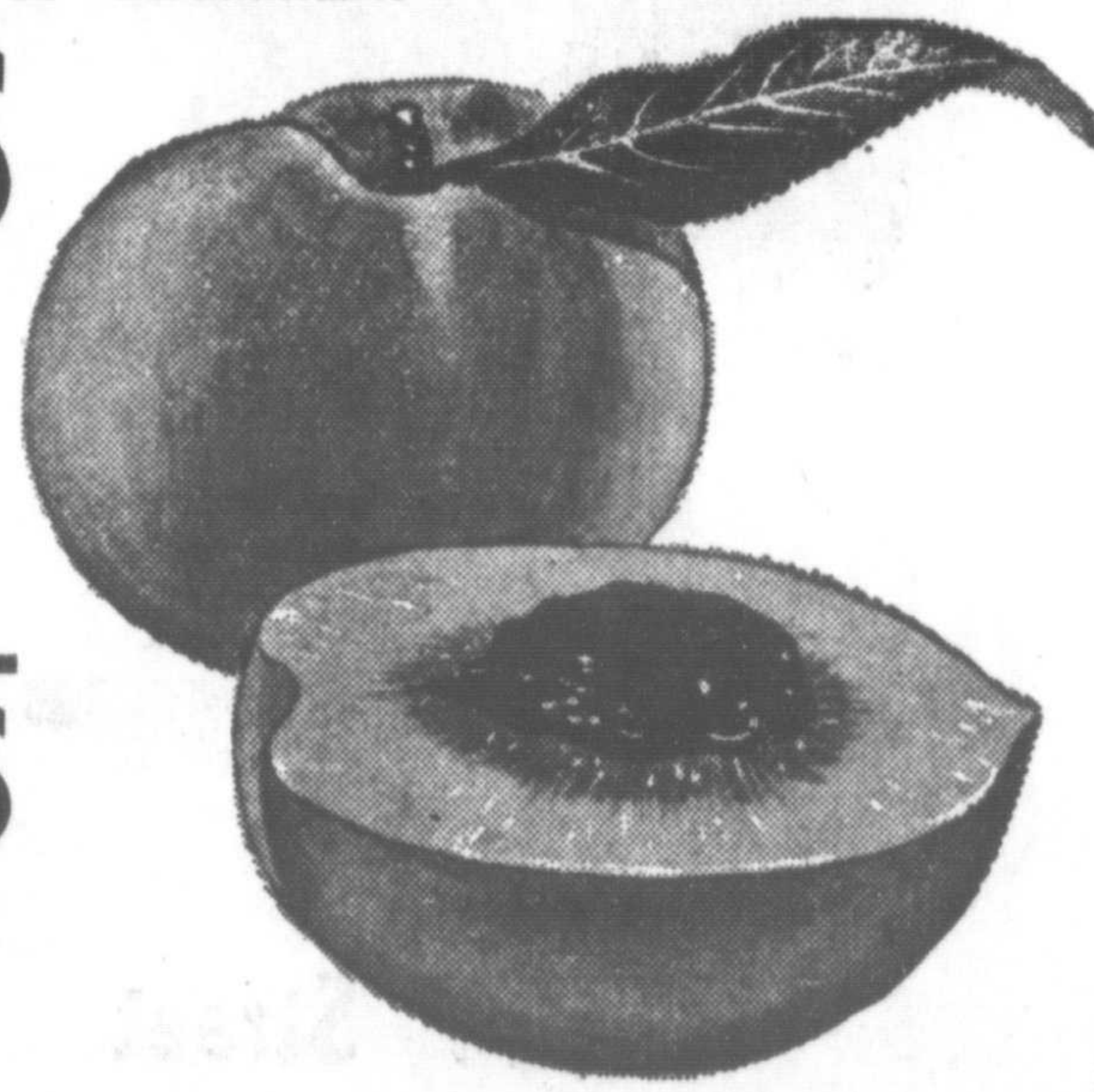

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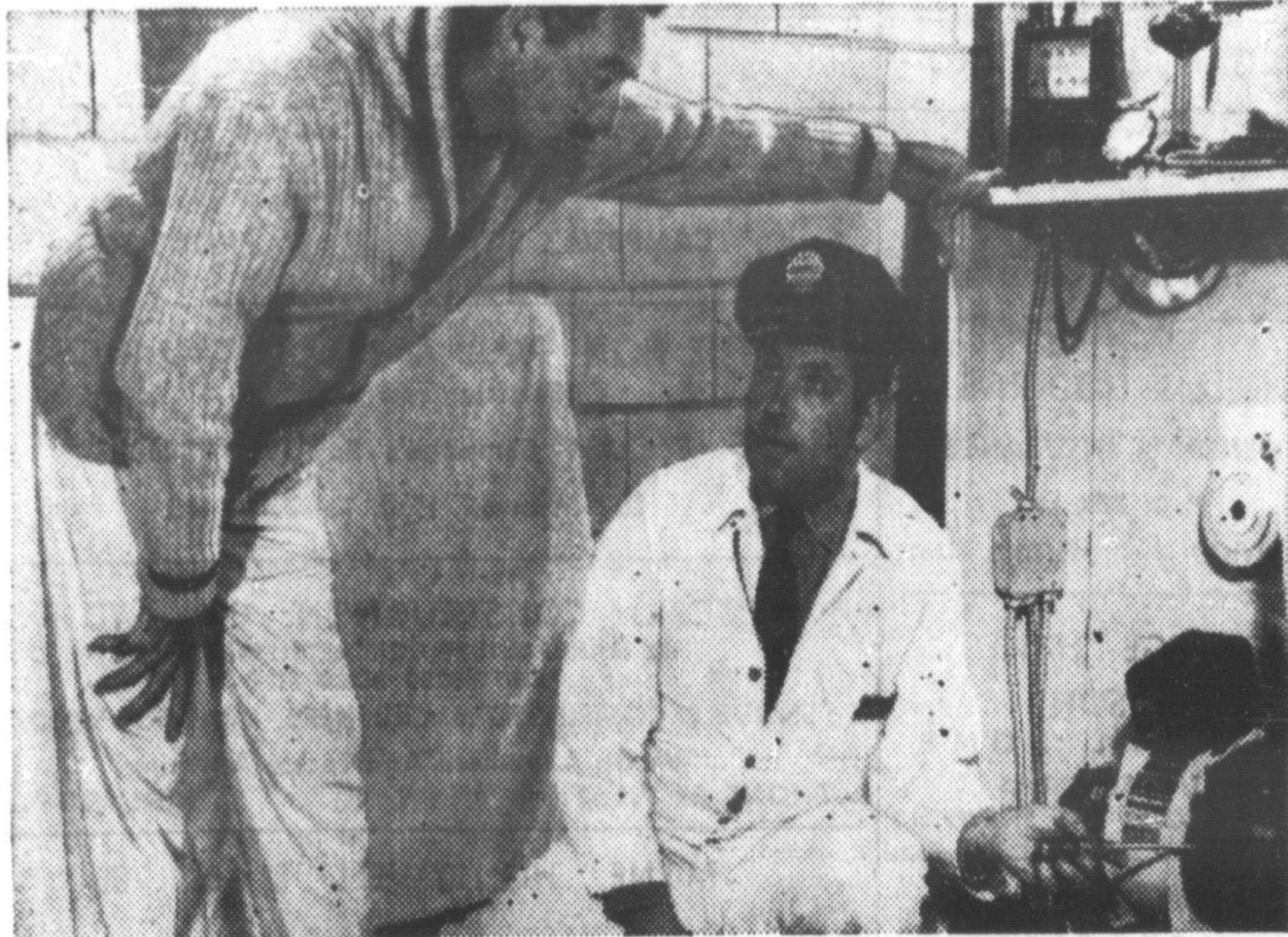

## Pastoral comment...

Rev William C. Inglis  
The classical example of faith is illustrated by an incident in the life of Blondin the world famous tight rope walker. At the height of his phenomenal success he had crossed the great Niagara Falls several times on a tight rope. It was then advertised that he proposed to cross the Falls pushing a wheelbarrow. On a much-looked-for day he was there, ready, barrow and all. Turning to one of the spectators and there were thousands that day, he said "Do you think I can successfully cross these Niagara Falls?" "Of course" said the spectator. Thereupon the famous Blondin said "Do you think that I can also cross pushing this wheelbarrow?" "Why, yes" said the man in reply. Then added Blondin with a smile "Jump into the borrow and I'll wheel you across". The startled man drew back and was quickly lost in the crowd. Blondin safely crossed the Falls without the man.

Many people have no faith in God's ability to do what His Holy Word, the Bible promises to do for their souls. Some people give a limited mental assent to the promises of God contained in His Holy Word. A small package of castor bean seeds could kill five children.

Other plants that can be fatal when eaten especially by children include: Bittersweet berries; Bluebonnet seeds; Burning Bush leaves; Elephant Ear (any part) four o'clock root or sheath Foxglove leaves; Iris root; Ivy leaves; Jimson Weed (any part); Lily of the Valley (any part); Mock Orange fruit; Monks Hood root; Mountain Laurel (any part); Narcissus (bulb); Oleander leaves; Pimpernel (any part); Rhododendron (any part); Scotch Broom seeds Spanish Bayonet root.

Garden plants should be forbidden territory to young children.

Keep seeds and bulbs out of the youngsters reach.

Teach them not to put leaves or stems of ANY plants in their mouths.
