LOOKS BAD FOR HARRY K. THAW

Jerome Reports Secret Indictment For Conspiracy in New York

GOVERNOR FELKER RESERVES DECISION TILL MONDAY.

SUMMARY OF ARGUMENT.

Concord, N.H., Sept. 24.—(Special)—The big development in the Thaw hearing before Governor Felker was the announcement by Jerome that Harry Thaw had been secretly indicted by the Grand Jury at Poughkeepsie, New York.

Jerome's statement came as an utter surprise to the Thaw array of counsel and caused a sensation. This proved to be Jerome's trump card, and, according to the opinion of lawyers who heard the arguments, makes the case very black for Thaw.

DECISION MONDAY.

Shortly after Jerome finished his argument, Governor Felker adjourned the hearing and announced that he would give counsel until next Monday to file supplementary briefs.

Harry had been keyed up to the highest nervous pitch all through the hearing. As his counsel pleaded for his freedom, he burst into tears and wept copiously. His white-haired mother, who sat next to him, pressed his hand again and again, and only at such times did he appear to grow less excited and fidgety. When Jerome mentioned the indictment Thaw simply stared in the special New York attorney's direction.

A moment later Harry had lost much of his confident bearing and appeared a bit depressed.

The Jerome declaration had a similar effect on the others in the State Chamber where the hearing was held. It came like a bolt from the blue. Hardly had Jerome made the announcement than he followed it up with the statement that the name of a man "vastly more important than yet mentioned has been drawn into the investigation of the charges of bribery and conspiracy in the escape of Thaw from Matteawan."

WILL ATTEND TO THOMPSON

"As far as Roger K. Thompson was concerned," Jerome assured the Thaw lawyers, "he will be attended to." "From the hour Stanford White lay dead it has been said that the Thaw millions would defeat the ends of justice, and the State of New York will not interrupt its justice by the corrupt influence of money. That, Your Excellency, is the reason, and the only reason, New York wants Harry Thaw back."

"If Thaw is returned he will be tried and convicted on the charge of conspiracy, and neither am I employed by anyone who would consent to the use of subterfuge. Nor would I use it myself."

Jerome then sat down amid a hum of comment. The Governor's face was implacable throughout the trial.

JEROME ATTACKS STONE

Referring to the Foughkeepsie proceedings, Jerome turned toward former Governor Stone of Thaw's counsel and said:

"I am surprised to hear such words from your lips. They sound strange. No evidence, it is true, has been shown here in an indictment has been found, I, as special district attorney for New York, have a right to make known what I do know of the transactions of the Grand Jury, and I say that an indictment was found. The investigation of the Grand Jury was held up until I could return from New Hampshire."

Myself and a member of the Grand Jury were made a special committee to investigate the conspiracy and bribery charges with the result that the name of a man vastly more important than yet mentioned has been drawn in."

You (still) looking at Governor Stone) are trying to tie the hands of a sister State which is trying to secure the return of an escaped criminal."

ATTACK ON MORRIS.

Jerome opened his argument at 2:45 o'clock. His address took up fifty-five minutes. In icy tones Jerome characterized Attorney Morris' argument that there was "an excuse for wide discretion on the part of the Governor to be found in public sentiment," as the most remarkable statement he had ever heard. He continued:

"Contrary to what Mr. Morris stated there is not one scintilla of discretion left the Governor in extradition proceedings. The Governor's functions are purely ministerial," and he produced numerous opinions of the United States Supreme Court to support his statement.

"The governor is merely in the position of a marshal or sheriff when a process is handed him for service. When the requisite evidence is presented, the Governor must yield up the fugitive."

"It is not a matter of grace but one of duty."

He mentioned a specific case in which New Hampshire claimed a fugitive from New Jersey. The Governor of New Jersey had no other discretion other than to yield to demands of New Hampshire attorneys and in an opinion the United States Supreme Court referred to the discretionary power of the Governor as unimportant, declared Jerome.

SITUATION IN BALKANS AGAIN THREATENING

Italy and Austria Will Make Move in Albanian Trouble

SERVIA INTENDS TO MOBILIZE WHOLE DIVISION TO DEAL WITH ALBANIA.

London, September 24.—The situation in the Balkans is again extremely threatening to the peace of Europe. Italy may take strong measures, even to the extent of a blockade of Piraeus should Greece continue to encroach on southern Albania, while it is rumored Austria will form an alliance with Bulgaria to prevent Servian aggression in northern Albania.

Late advices from Belgrade say that Serbia intends to mobilize a whole division to deal with the Albanian situation, because Albania respects only force, and any delay in the negotiations would be fatal to Servian interests.

CAPTURE OF DIBRA.

Belgrade, Sept. 24.—The official account of the capture of Dibra by the Albanians says that a large force attacked two companies of Servians in the vicinity of that town Monday morning. After a fierce battle of two hours, the Servians withdrew towards Retchovo, and the Albanians entered Dibra. They numbered 6,000 and were commanded by foreign officers the nationality of whom has not been established. Servian reinforcements have been despatched to Dibra.

ESSAD PASHA'S ACTIVITIES.

Saloniki, Sept. 24.—It is reported from Beirut, which is thirty miles from Avlona, that Essad Pasha proclaimed Albanian autonomy under the suzerainty of the Sultan, and has ordered Ismail Kemal Bey, president of the provisional government, to leave Avlona.

WINDSOR MILLS BOARD OF TRADE

Draft of Bye Laws Were Approved at Adjourned Meeting Last Night

PRESIDENT AND SECRETARY WILL BE REPRESENTATIVES AT E. T. ASSOCIATED BOARDS MEETING.

Windsor Mills, Sept. 24.—(Special)—The adjourned meeting of the newly formed Board of Trade was held in the Foresters' room at McCabe's Hall last evening. The president, Dr. J. A. McCabe, was in the chair. The secretary-treasurer, Mr. George Crutchlow, read the minutes of the last meeting, which were passed.

The president and secretary were appointed delegates to attend the E. T. Associated Boards of Trade meeting at Ayer's Cliff on Thursday, September 25th.

The secretary reported that sixty-one members had already paid their fees, and read a copy of a letter he had sent to the secretary of the E. T. A. Boards of Trade, with the cheque for the Windsor Mills Board of Trade to be admitted to membership.

A draft of the by-laws was read and approved and ordered to be printed in French and English.

The following committees were appointed: Mercantile Committee, and Printing and Advertising.

The names of members for the council were submitted and approved by acclamation.

Great interest is being taken by the tradespeople and others in the success of the Board, and it is expected that the number of members will soon reach the century mark.

STEAMER MOUNT TEMPLE ASHORE

Had Started on Voyage From Montreal to London

REPORTS RECEIVED STATE SHE IS BADLY DAMAGED AND MAKING WATER.

Montreal, Sept. 24.—(Special)—The steamer "Mount Temple," commanded by J. H. Moore, and one of the best known vessels in the Canadian trade, ran ashore off Maisonneuve this morning.

The reports received state that she is badly damaged and is taking in water.

The vessel left her wharf at 5:20 this morning to begin her voyage to London. The mornin' was foggy with smoke hanging over the river.

A pilot was on board and in the absence of Capt. Walsh, the marine superintendent of the C.P.R., the vessel was cleared by Mr. Elliott, the assistant superintendent.

ROYAL BETROTHALS.

Bucharest, September 24.—The betrothals of Prince Charles of Rumania to Grand Duchess Olga of Russia, and Crown Prince George of Greece to Princess Elizabeth of Rumania will be announced at an early date.

LOOKS LIKE STRIKE AT ST. JOHN

Longshoremen Have Presented New Schedule to Shipping Men

MEN HAVE BEEN PREPARING TO MOVE FOR HIGHER WAGE FOR SOME TIME.

St. John, N. B., September 24.—Action that may result in a strike and a consequent tie-up of the winter port business was taken by the longshoremen's union, numbering all the harbor workers in St. John, who drew up a new schedule of rates and presented it to the shipping companies with the notice that the union would move to put the new schedule into effect on November 16.

Local shipping men declined to discuss the demand or the probable action of the shipping companies, beyond saying that the matter demanded serious consideration, and that a meeting of shipping men would probably be held in a few days to consider a line of action. If the shipping companies refuse to grant the demands of the men, there is likelihood of a struggle, as the union men have been preparing to move for higher pay for some years, and they are backed by the International Longshoremen's Union.

STRIKE FEVER IS STILL HIGH

9000 Colliers Quit Work Over a Very Trifling Affair

POSTMEN'S CONVENTION ADOPT A RESOLUTION TO TAKE A STRIKE VOTE.

London, September 24.—That the strike fever is not entirely allayed is indicated by the strike of 4,000 colliers yesterday because a company policeman insulted a miner's wife. The company refused to dismiss the policeman and will close the pits today. This will bring the number idle up to 9,000.

POSTMEN WILL TAKE VOTE.

The postmen's convention adopted a resolution yesterday declaring that the statement of the Postmaster-General to the effect that the wages of postal employees would be raised \$5,000,000 during the course of the year was false and that a decade would expire before the amount would reach that sum. If at the end of six weeks nothing was done to meet the grievances, the convention declared, a general strike of postal employees would be put to vote of the union.

ATTORNEY FOR MINERS ARRESTED

Cyril Rubinowiz Taken Into Custody by Constables at Nanaimo

THIS MOVE ON PART OF MINE OWNERS HAS CAUSED A GREAT SENSATION.

Vancouver, B.C., Sept. 24.—(Special)—The latest bombshell at Nanaimo came with sensational suddenness in the arrest of Cyril Rubinowiz, lawyer, magistrate for Point Grey, and Rhodes Scholar, by special constables in Nanaimo on the charge of watching, following, besetting, and intimidating workmen.

Rubinowiz was recently retained by the miners defence committee to handle their cases arising out of the recent strike riots and went to Nanaimo Monday to acquaint himself with the local conditions. He was walking through the streets of the coal city under the guidance of two men when arrested by half a dozen special constables and thrown into prison, being refused bail.

RIVAL CHINESE BID HIGH.

Cleveland, O., Sept. 24.—(Special)—In Common Pleas Court yesterday, two rival Chinese Tongs bid up to \$10,000 for a Chinese restaurant which is valued at \$800, and the property was sold to the On Leong Tong for that amount. The Hip Sing Tong withdrew when that figure was reached.

ARRESTED THE WRONG MAN

CHICAGO CONTRACTOR MISTAKEN FOR MAN WANTED FOR MURDER.

Chicago, Sept. 24.—(Special)—Acting on a telegraphed "tip," policemen boarded a train from Indianapolis here early this morning and took off a man supposed to be W. R. Anderson, of Louisville, Ky., wanted in connection with the murder of Joseph Schelsky, in Indianapolis.

The man established his identity as a Chicago contractor, and was released with an apology.

The conductor of the train had thought that he recognized the man as Anderson, and telegraphed to Chicago.

DISREGARD OF FAIR WAGE ACT

Resolution Introduced at Labour Congress Condemning Minister

PROHIBIT ENTRY INTO CANADA OF TRADESMEN WHERE TRADE WAS IN DISPUTE.

Montreal, Sept. 24.—(Special)—Mr. C. W. Perry introduced into Labour Congress this morning a resolution requesting the drafting of a statute to be submitted to the Governor-in-Council to prohibit the entry into Canada of immigrants engaged in any trade which is involved in labor disputes at the time of their arrival.

Mr. Tom Moore, Niagara Falls, introduced a resolution condemning Hon. Frank Cochrane for alleged disregard of Fair Wage Act. He said the Minister of Railways employed carpenters at pay less than standard rate.

JOHN B. DALY DIES AT STANSTEAD

For Many Years Collector of Customs at Coaticook

FUNERAL WILL TAKE PLACE FRIDAY AT STANSTEAD, INTERMENT AT COATICOOK.

Stanstead, Sept. 24.—(Special)—Mr. John B. Daly, for many years Collector of Customs at Coaticook, and more recently connected with the customs department at Sherbrooke, died here, this morning.

Mr. Daly came here about a week ago and was taken ill after his arrival.

Deceased was 78 years old and for many years one of the best known citizens of Stanstead County.

The funeral will take place at Stanstead at 9 a. m. Friday with interment at Coaticook.

KING INTERESTED IN IRISH QUESTION

Inference is That He is Trying to Bring Parties Together

PREMIER ASQUITH WILL MAKE STATEMENT IN SPEECH NEXT MONTH.

London, September 24.—The Standard's lobby correspondent declares that the frequency with which politicians have been visiting Balmoral Castle bears out the inference that it was the King who instigated the attempt to bring the parties together. He adds that very serious attention is being paid the proposal to exclude northeastern Ulster from the immediate scheme of the Irish Government. The proposal, he continues, would involve the remodelling of present plans so as to convert the Irish Government scheme into a mere Liberal endowment of the Irish Parliament, and he adds that there is reason to believe that Unionist Ulster would accept such a solution of the difficulty.

The Daily Express, repeating former utterances on the subject, emphasizes its conviction that the present Home Rule Bill is as dead as Julius Caesar. Premier Asquith is now attacked within his own camp, Mr. Asquith, it says, must either agree to a conference on the Unionist conditions, or must go out of office. If the Radicals go, it says, Bonar Law will come in. Asquith will make a statement in a speech to be delivered in Scotland on the 11th of October.

WILL INSPECT BATTALIONS.

On Saturday Sir Edward Carson will inspect fourteen battalions of Belfast volunteers at Balmoral, near Belfast, when, instead of the salute, the general will call for three cheers, whilst the Unionists bands will play Rule Britannia and the National Anthem. A feature of the spectacle will be a huge Union Jack which was used at the Bonar Law meeting in 1912.

LORD METHUEN NEXT GOVERNOR-GENERAL.

London, Sept. 24.—(Special)—The Bystander says it is reported on good authority that General Lord Methuen has been offered and has accepted the post of Governor-General of Canada on the retirement of the Duke of Connaught.

DAUGHTER TURNS AGAINST KAISER.

Berlin, Sept. 24.—Princess Victoria Louise, daughter of the Kaiser, who married the son of the Duke of Cumberland last May, has turned against her father and has arrayed herself on the English side of the famous and ancient feud of Hohenzollerns and the Guelf family. Consequently the Kaiser is wroth, and proposes calling a family council, according to a prevailing rumor.

PROVISIONAL GOVERNMENT

Plan For Setting up Executive in Ulster All Prepared

WHOLE SCHEME WILL BE UNFOLDED AT MEETING OF DELEGATES TODAY.

New York, Sept. 24.—(Special)—A cable to the Tribune from London this morning says: "By tonight plans for setting up a provisional government for Ulster in the event of the Home Rule Bill being passed into law will have been considered in all their completeness."

The Ulster Unionist members of Parliament went over parts of the plan at Craigavon with Sir Edward Carson last night, and all is now in readiness for unfolding the whole scheme today at a private conference in Ulster Hall, when 500 delegates from all over Ulster will confer with Sir Edward Carson.

The machinery will be formed so as to be put into effect without panic, but by an organized plan.

The fervent avowal announced by the Ulster Protestants in December 1910 was to pay no taxes, and to obey none of the decrees of a Home Rule Government in Dublin.

FOUR ENGINEMEN WERE KILLED

Head-on-Collision on the Intercolonial Near Sackville, N.B.

THE CAUSE OF THE ACCIDENT DUE TO ONE CONDUCTOR MISCONSTRUING ORDERS.

Moncton, Sept. 24.—Four engine-men killed and two brakemen injured, at least a damage of \$40,000 to the I. C. R., line between Moncton and Halifax tied up for hours, which necessitated the transference of passengers, mail and baggage from one side of the wreck to the other, were the results of a wreck on the I. C. R., in which two trains came together in a head-on collision at a point known as Siddalls Cut, about one mile east of Aulac, or about six miles east of Sackville, yesterday afternoon.

The dead are:

Enoch Rushton, driver on No. 231, Dufferin street, Moncton.

Byron Colpitts, fireman on No. 231, Moncton.

Frank Lyons, driver on No. 234, Truro.

Hingley, fireman on No. 234, Stewiacke.

The injured:

R. H. Sharpe, forward brakeman on No. 231, Moncton.

Banks, forward brakeman on No. 234, Truro.

The bodies of the three others, too, presented a gruesome sight. They were taken out of the wreckage, placed on the side of the track and covered by blankets.

Dr. J. V. Calkin, of Sackville, was summoned and he went to the scene. After the two injured men had been attended to, Dr. Calkin who is a coroner, empaneled a jury, who, after viewing the remains adjourned until to-day.

The two forward brakemen on each train were riding in the engines with their respective drivers and how they escaped death along with the other occupants of the two engines is unexplained.

Brakeman Robert H. Sharpe, of Moncton, was badly injured. He was picked up in a critical condition and taken to the Amherst hospital. He will recover.

Banks, the other brakeman, who was in the cab of Driver Lyons' train was also badly injured, but it is thought that he will recover.

MISCONSTRUED ORDERS.

The cause of the collision was due to Conductor George Armstrong, of No. 231 train, and Driver Enoch Rushton, of the same train, misconstruing their cross with No. 234.

Both the premier, Sir Edward Morris, and Sir Robert Bond, the former premier, now leader of the Opposition, have completed their plans for an active campaign.

\$10,000,000 FOR AGRICULTURE.
Ottawa, Sept. 24.—The Hon. Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture, is inviting suggestions as to the expenditure of the ten million dollars which have been appropriated for the improvement of agriculture throughout the Dominion. The expenditure is to be extended over ten years and the Minister desires to know how best it may be used. The Minister proposes calling a conference of Provincial Ministers of Agriculture and agricultural experts at an early date to discuss the question.

FOOD FOR DUBLIN STRIKERS.
London, Sept. 24.—The parliamentary committee of the Trades Union Congress decided yesterday to send a shipment of provisions to Dublin for the relief of the strikers and their children, who are on the verge of starvation. The committee has pledged the credit of the Trades Unionists to the extent of \$25,000, with this object, and has issued an appeal to the Trade Societies to enable them to support the Dublin strikers as long as it is found necessary.

X-RAY VICTIM DIES.
Philadelphia, September 24.—Dr. Charles L. Leonard, a widely known X-ray operator, died at his summer home in Atlantic City from blood poisoning caused by exposure to the powerful rays.

He was fifty-five years old and devoted himself to Roentgenology from the time of his admission to the medical profession.

His arm and hand were amputated some time ago in an effort to arrest the progress of the disease which caused his death.

THAW'S MOTHER DENIES OWING LAWYER GLEASON \$53,000.
New York, Sept. 24.—In her answer to the suit brought by John B. Gleason in the United States Court to recover \$53,000 he asserts is due for services in the second trial of Harry K. Thaw, Mrs. Mary Copley Thaw denies that any money is due Mr. Gleason or to any one else on account of either of her son's trials.

In her answer, Mrs. Thaw says that her son was the beneficiary of a trust fund under the will of his father, the income from this to be exempt from all claims of his creditors, and that the discharge of Thaw in bankruptcy in Pittsburgh on Aug. 7, 1908 cleared his estate of all claims against it.

The contract with Mr. Gleason, she says, was made by Harry K. Thaw and that consequently any rights Mr. Gleason may have had under it are barred by the discharge of bankruptcy.

DEVOURED BY SHARKS.

London, Sept. 24.—When the Cunard liner Campania, which arrived at Queenston yesterday, was in mid-Atlantic an Irish third-class passenger, John Eagan, jumped or fell overboard.

The engines were stopped and a boat rowed quickly to the aid of the drowning man, but a number of sharks were seen in the water, and by the time the boat arrived at the spot there was no trace of him. It is believed that Eagan was devoured by the sharks. The Campania was stopped for about an hour.

CHATEAUGUAY ELECTION OCT. 11TH.

Montreal, Sept. 24.—Wrists were issued yesterday for the by-election in Chateauguay to fill the vacancy left recently by the death of Jas. Pollock Brown, who had represented the constituency continuously since 1891. The election will be held on Oct. 11th, and nominations will take place one week previously, Oct. 4th.

HAD CANADIAN CONNECTIONS.

WARSHIPS COULD BE BUILT IN CANADA

Expert of British Admiralty Gives Advice on Naval Construction

WOULD NOT COMMENT ON BORDEN POLICY OR THAT OF THE OPPOSITION.

Vancouver, B.C., Sept. 24.—In the opinion of Sir Philip Watts, K.C.B., since 1911 advisor on naval construction to the British Admiralty, who arrived in Vancouver yesterday morning, warships of the large kind could be built in Canada, but not as quickly or cheaply as they are turned out in England. The best way, he declared, for Canada to start in on naval construction would be to have a few ships built in England at first and then have some built, partly in England and partly in Canada, and finally, when the workmen have been trained and the shipbuilding plants properly organized and equipped here, to build the ships altogether in Canada. "Of course," he said, "the whole work could, no doubt, be done in Canada from the outset, but I think the cost would be very great and the ships would take a much longer time to construct than is the case in England."

As to the Borden naval policy and the naval policy of the Liberal Opposition he said that he had nothing to say, nor would he comment on the British naval programme.

LOOKS BAD FOR HARRY K. THAW

(Continued from page 1)

counsel preceded Jerome Morris said: "The first proposition to be considered in this proceeding is based upon law. It is evident that the first duty is to the citizen in respect to his rights under the law. The second is to the State of New York. "It seems to me that the affidavits attached to this requisition warrant all but short of showing that a crime was committed. "A crime of some sort must furnish the basis for any extradition proceedings, and it must be based upon something more substantial than mere hearsay. Laying aside for the moment the legal aspect of the question, there comes still another side. First, that there is no discretion when the complainant does not set forth an actual crime. Second, that there is the broadest discretion lodged with the Governor. There is to be considered your function in relation to the exercise of judicial as well as executive power.

MATTER OF GOOD FAITH.

"The question of good faith must be determined in every extradition proceeding. The demand must be genuine. The fact that Thaw escaped from Matteawan is not a crime. "Therefore, we can conclude that because they do not attempt to have him extradited, because he escaped from Matteawan, but on the charge of conspiracy they show that they really could not be extradited on the first charge.

"Now Thaw did escape from Matteawan and was followed into Canada. Did you ever hear of a case where a man has been so bounded for such a trifling misdemeanor? "Is the movement to try Thaw for the misdemeanor or to return him to Matteawan? They knew that they could not extradite him from Canada by being an escaped lunatic. "Therefore they employed lawyers to cook up a subterfuge and fell on that of conspiracy.

"Why are not sheriffs, lawyers, detectives and special attorneys after Roger K. Thompson in Canada? He is an alleged co-conspirator who has actually been released from the charge brought against him there. "They are trying your Excellency, in the Thaw case to do indirectly what the law will not permit them to do directly. There is something between the lines of this complaint and when all is said and done, your Excellency must agree that it is a mere subterfuge."

APPEALS TO GOVERNOR.

Mr. Morris expressed great surprise to the depth of public opinion in favor of Thaw. He found it an excuse for asking Governor Felker to exercise his judgment to decide that the proceeding is other than what it appears on the face. Continuing, he said:

"Since Harry K. Thaw was in an asylum for the insane by the decree of the courts, he is still legally insane, and the only way to show him otherwise is to produce evidence, and if they do that then they will have no right to hold him at Matteawan."

Mr. Morris closed by appealing to Governor Felker that Thaw be permitted to return to his native State, Pennsylvania.

MRS. THAW MEETS NEMESIS OF SON.

Concord, N.H., Sept. 24.—Mrs. Mary Copley Thaw met the arch-enemy of her son Harry late yesterday. With her son Harry she was returning to the Eagle Hotel from the court proceedings. She entered the hotel with her son and was escorted to the elevator. Harry was very attentive, but in some mysterious manner Mrs. Thaw was put off at the floor upon which Jerome lives. Mrs. Thaw, by mistake, went directly to the suite of Jerome and opened the door. Jerome was taken by surprise, but laughed. Mrs. Thaw excused herself and Harry said jokingly, "In the right church, but the wrong pew."

PRINCESS IS IN GOOD HEALTH.

Madrid, Sept. 24.—A report cabled from London that the little Princess Maria Cristina, daughter of King Alfonso, is deaf and dumb and that the physicians considered her case hopeless, is semi-officially denied here. According to an authorized statement from the Royal Palace, the health of the Princess is good and there is no fear about her normality.

SECOND VICTIM OF THETFORD ACCIDENT

Henri Marcoux, Who Was Crushed by Rock, Died From Injuries

TWO MEN WERE PRECIPITATED INTO BOTTOM OF PIT WHEN ROCK GAVE WAY.

Thetford Mines, Sept. 25.—(Special)—Henri Marcoux the other victim of the accident at the Asbestos Corporation Mine died yesterday afternoon at his home. As reported yesterday another workman, T. Guilmette, was almost instantly killed. It transpires that Marcoux was on the surface of the pit holding a rope while Guilmette was working on the face of the rock some ten feet from the top. This rock gave way so suddenly that Marcoux was taken off his guard and being unable to hold the other man both were precipitated to the bottom of the pit. An inquest was held last evening when a verdict of accidental death was returned.

CHANGE IN BRITISH NAVAL POLICY

Fleet Will be Sent to Mediterranean Waters in November

FRICION WITH GERMANY FORMERLY KEPT FIGHTING UNITS IN HOME WATERS.

London, Sept. 24.—The announcement by the Admiralty that a fleet comprising eight battleships, three battle cruisers, eight cruisers and eight light cruisers will be sent to the Mediterranean early in November coupled with the despatch of four large armored ships, which will have their base in the future at Bermuda, indicates a radical change in the British naval policy, which, on account of friction with Germany, has kept practically all the fighting units within home waters for several years past.

The Mediterranean fleet, after manoeuvres, will cruise as far as Alexandria. With the vessels already in those waters, the visiting fleet, under Vice-Admiral Sir Stanley Colville, will make the most imposing naval demonstration ever attempted by Great Britain in the Mediterranean.

The fourth cruiser squadron, leaving England, Sept. 29, will proceed direct to Bermuda. It is due there Oct. 19, after which the ships will scatter, to visit various ports in the Caribbean.

KAISER DEALS IN B. C. LAND.

London, September 24.—The Berlin correspondent of the Daily Telegraph states that the story to the effect that the German Emperor had bought land in Vancouver on his own account is officially denied. Notwithstanding this denial, however, a Victoria, B.C., message says that the Kaiser's investments in British Columbian lands are reported to total \$2,000,000.

VILLAGE OF BERKSHIRE SWEEP BY FIRE

Several Buildings Burned Down, and Loss is up in Thousands

STARTED IN LIVERY STABLE—NINE HORSES WERE BURNED TO DEATH.

Berkshire, Vt., Sept. 24.—(Special)—At one period yesterday morning it looked as if this little village would be wiped out by fire. As it was damage was done to property that will amount up into the thousands. About 3.30 yesterday morning Mr. Carl Sears, of Sutton, Que., who was in this place, observed fire in the livery stable adjoining the Avon hotel. He immediately gave the alarm, but as the flames had advanced so rapidly that before assistance arrived the Rubelief building in which was a store and the post office was attacked and burned down. From there the fire spread to the Combs residence, which was also destroyed as well as the barber shop and pool room belonging to Mr. Oscar Metivier. This was the last building attacked and the flames were kept from spreading by blowing up with dynamite an old shed which stood between the residence of Mr. Metivier, which was in the line of the fire.

There were nine horses in the livery stable, seven belonging to the owner and two to the New England Telephone Company, all of which were burned to death. There were six horses in Mr. Combs' barn and they were only saved after a hard struggle as they ran back into the fire after having been taken out of the barn.

There is no fire fighting appliances here, but the bucket brigade which was formed, did good work. The loss is not yet known but Mr. Rubelief places his at \$5,000. This with the others will put the damage up into at least \$12,000.

The origin of the fire is unknown. The previous night a man had been given permission to sleep in the barn. It is supposed that he must have been smoking and dropped a lighted match. It was at first supposed that this man was in the burned building, but later in the day he was located at Samsonville.

LAND OWNERS ARE SELLING PROPERTY

Duke of Grafton Has Decided to Dispose of All His Estates

THE DUKE OF NEWCASTLE HAS SOLD PROPERTY TO VALUE OF \$115,000.

London, Sept. 24.—(Special)—The Duke of Grafton has decided to sell all his estates except that in Norfolk, which include thousands of acres in Northamptonshire, including the family seat of Wakefield Lodge. No reason is given for the Duke's action. The Duke of Newcastle is also parting with some of his property, and this week sold land of the value of \$115,000.

The Royal is different from other ranges, most of which are copies of American models made to consume coal and consequently not suited to our climate. The stove needed here must have a large firebox, a large oven and large flues so as to heat the house as well as do the cooking.

THE FIREBOX of the "Royal" measures 10 1/2 in. wide by 11 in. deep, and is consequently large enough to use 2 ft. wood.

THE FLUES are constructed on scientific principles and are of sufficient size to assure a good draught and a perfect distribution of the heat. The ventilation system is perfect, so that the dry heat admirably cooks both meat and pastry.

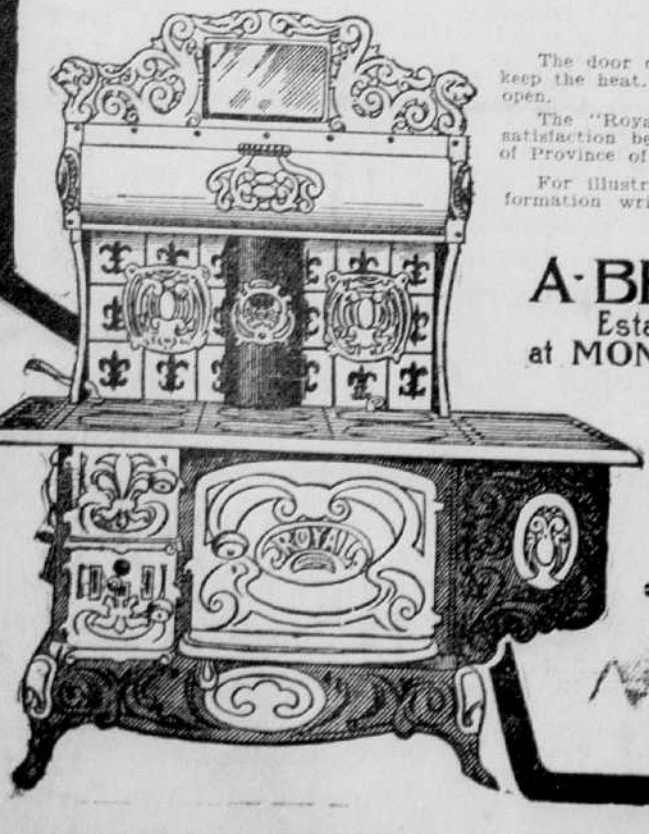
THE WOOD GRATE is of a new model and is completely closed at the bottom by a sliding plate, which allows the keeping of an all-night fire and economizes fuel: the bars are not as closely set as in most stoves; they are triangular in shape, with up-turned points, so that the ashes fall into the ash pit as soon as the sliding plate is opened, without necessitating the use of a poker.

THE OVEN TOP is made in sections, is unbreakable and opens at front.

THE LIDS are thin and corrugated. They can be instantly heated—the flame of a match is sufficient to heat them.

THE HEAT REGULATOR permits to heat one room or another in exactly the same way as can be done with a hot air furnace.

A serpentine coil placed in the firebox heats sufficient water for a good circulation in four to five hundred feet of 1-inch piping—this is sufficient to heat the entire upper part of a house.



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
