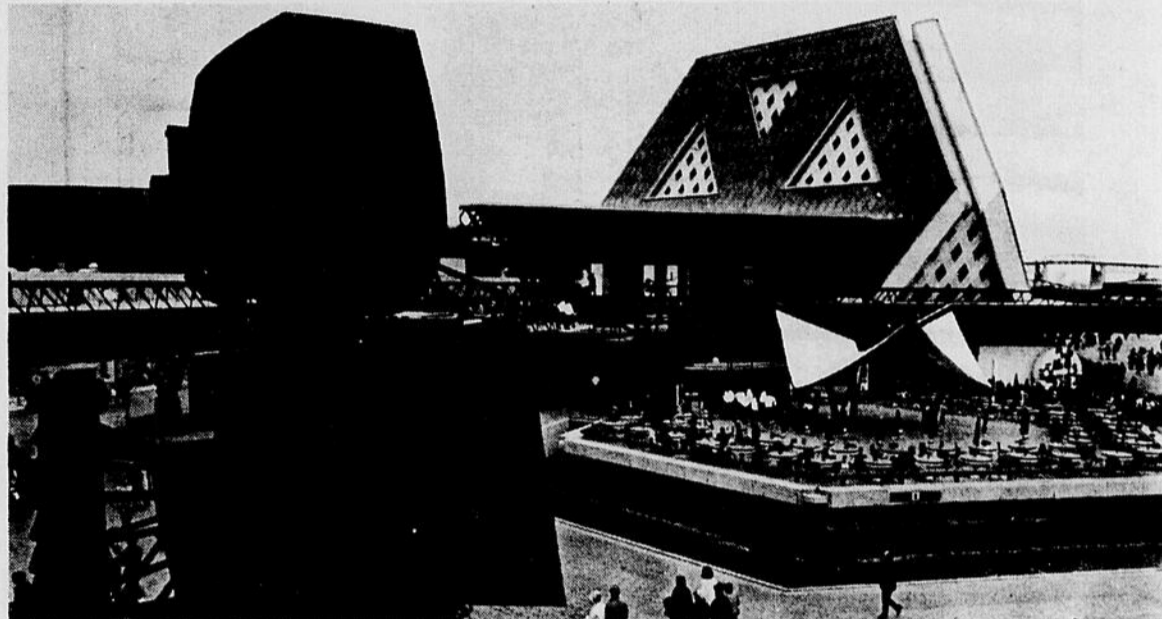

School Children To Entertain

Plans are moving rapidly ahead for the celebration of Centennial Day in Westmount, Tuesday, Oct. 17. The date will coincide with Westmount Day at Expo '67.

In a letter mailed to residents at mid-week, Mayor M. L. Tucker cordially invited all Westmounters to "participate in the events which will mark this significant year in Canadian history".

"It is appropriate that we observe the Day with a profound sense of pride, acknowledging the historic achievements of the past while preparing to face the future with renewed confidence," he said.

Referring to the Expo part of the celebrations, Mayor Tucker said, "This recognition by the Canadian Corporation for the 1967 World Exhibition reflects Westmount's status as a member of the Greater Montreal community and acknowledges our city's sponsorship of the Plaza of the Universe on the Expo site."

The official party will travel from the City Hall by motorcade, arriving at Place des Nations shortly before 11 o'clock.

Following addresses by Deputy Commissioner Robert F. Shaw and Mayor Tucker, there will be entertainment provided mainly by the school children of Westmount. Rehearsals have been underway all week under the

direction of Mrs. Jeannine Beaubien, who is producing the entertainment with the assistance of Jack Crisp and Scott Savage.

At one o'clock Commissioner General Dupuy will entertain officials of the City of Westmount and other guests at a private luncheon.

Centennial celebrations will take place in the evening so that all residents will have an opportunity to participate. At 7:45 o'clock, the new Centennial Reference Room in Westmount Library will be officially dedicated. At 8 o'clock, the rebuilt Melville Pond in the northeast section of Westmount Park will be officially opened. At 8:30 o'clock, a centennial project of the Royal Canadian Engineers, a flagpole and emplacement within the park, will be dedicated. A colorful fireworks display at 9 o'clock in Westmount Park will conclude the day's celebrations.

In his letter Mayor Tucker said, "I sincerely trust that October 17 will be a joyous occasion and I hope that you, as a resident of Westmount, will be able to attend the ceremonies at Place des Nations, at the Library and in Westmount Park."

Selby Resident in Custody CHILD ASSAULTED

A young Selby Street resident is being held by police after parents complained that their five-year-old son had been indecently assaulted. The young man apparently cruised the streets until he found an unaccompanied child, persuaded the child to accompany him to his rented room accommodation on Selby Street and then assaulted him.

Police obtained a description of the attacker after speaking with the child's parents and in short order apprehended the young man. After speaking with Westmount detectives, the suspect confessed to the assault and pleaded guilty to "contributing to the delinquency of a juvenile" in court on Tuesday. He will be sentenced later in the week. Police suspect the mental stability of the defendant and it is likely that psychiatric examination will be recommended.

Pornography Ring Boken

Police also cleared up a pornography sales ring recently. The smut business used a St. Catherine St., Westmount, address as a mail drop for a thriving trade that had spread all over Quebec and the Eastern U.S. The suspect, a Ville d'Anjou resident, is awaiting judgement at the moment. Witnesses for the trial came from as far away as Boston.

Traffic Offender hides behind hedge

Also on this week's Police blotter, a Sherbrooke, Quebec, resident is being charged with impaired driving after going east on de Maisonneuve St. against the one-way traffic flow on Thursday evening. The suspect failed to turn off de Maisonneuve at the point where the street becomes one-way and struck cars on both sides of the street finally coming to a stop in a head-on collision. When police arrived at the scene seconds later they found the suspect attempting to hide behind a hedge.

Emphasis on quality rather than quantity Old rules violated with success

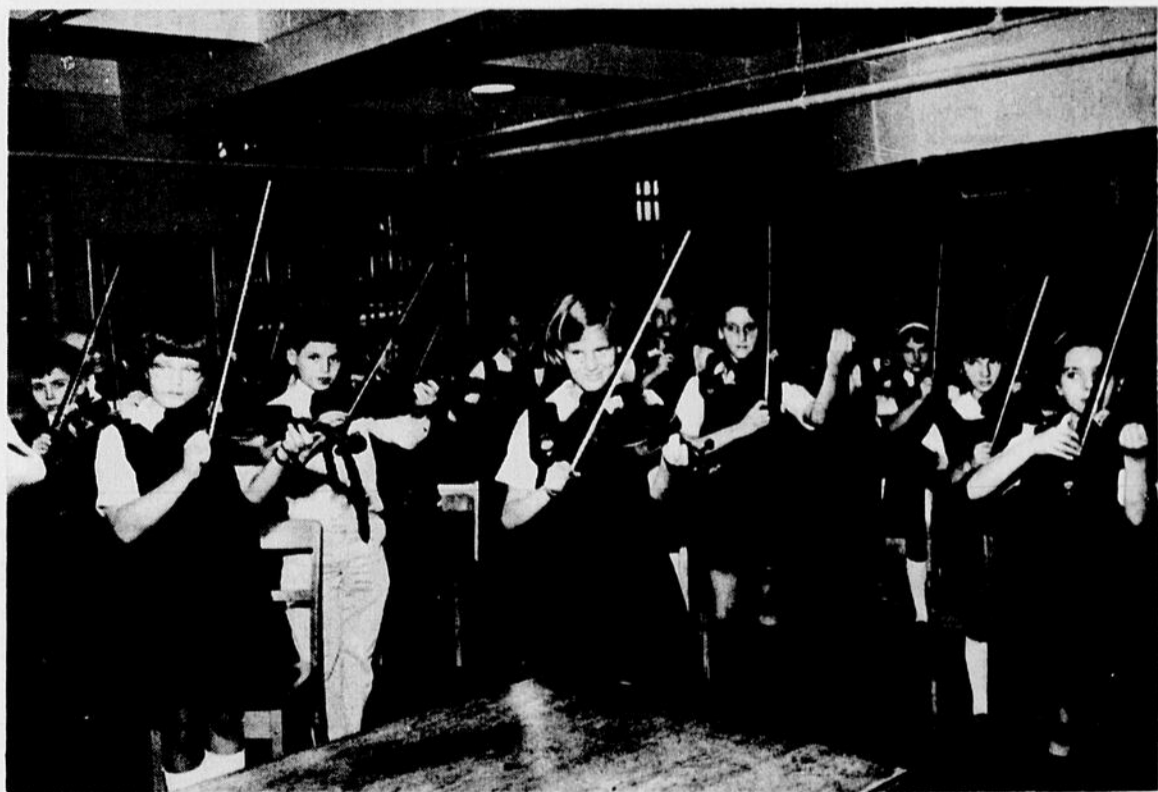
Commissioner To Speak To New Democrats



Contributions may be sent to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital of Montreal, 2100 Marlowe Avenue, Montreal 28.

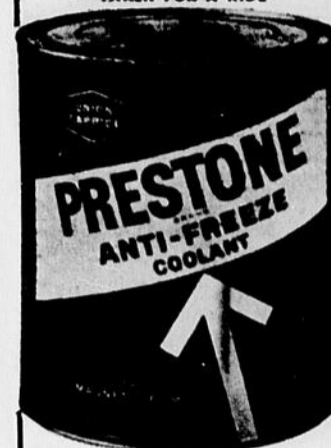
**Advantages
of hypnosis
in business**

Power of the sub-conscious mind in the human individual was explained to members of the Westmount Rotary Club at their regular weekly luncheon meeting by James Breslin an authority on insurance and estate planning and an enthusiastic supporter of hypnosis as an aid in business. Mr. Breslin guest speaker for the luncheon gave a demonstration of hypnosis to the assembled gathering in which he attempted to spellbind the entire group through the power of suggestion.

Following his explanation of methods employed through hypnosis of the individual by sugges-

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We Say

Messrs. Drury and Hyde should both speak up

Where do the elected representatives of Westmount, at Ottawa and Quebec, stand in the fervent debate on the future of Quebec in or out of confederation?

Have the Hon. C. M. Drury, MP, and Mr. Richard Hyde, MPP, nothing definitive, of substance to contribute, to say, to do?

As individuals, even as political persons, perhaps not.

But as members of parliament and legislature, the voices of Westmounters who sent them to the national and provincial capitals to speak and act, they should have a great deal to say.

And seemingly don't.

Westmount is quite properly regarded as "le citadel des anglais" in Quebec. In the struggling, largely French-sided dialogue between people of the two founding races, we English of this province have a unique position which will be what we make it.

We shall be an inarticulate, mumbling minority meekly accepting our lot at the hands of the French Canada in which we live;

Or we shall use our privileged vantage point as English-speaking Quebecers, who can understand both sides in the French-English debate, and provide leadership for what will be not only our own future but that of all Canada, French and English.

Economics not answer

The only English voice being heard with any strength is that of Mr. Eric Kierans, MPP for N.D.G. But he speaks more as president of the Quebec Liberal Federation than for the Eng-

lish-speaking population and from his expertise as an economist, not as a person who betrays any deep understanding or sympathy with the true and deep aspirations of French Canada.

The Westmount Liberal Association meeting, attended by Mr. Hyde, has produced a resolution which might just as well affirmed support of motherhood and opposition to sin: "... in favour of a strong Quebec within the framework of a united Canada."

Such a resolution, for all it says, might have come from the Liberal (or Conservative) Association of Chicoutimi or of Wetaskiwin, Alta., (for a "strong Alberta") for that matter.

What it doesn't say is more devastatingly eloquent.

It says we won't or are afraid to recognize publicly:

That Quebec and French Canada have aspirations, and problems arising out of those aspirations, peculiarly their own for which the constitution of Canada does not adequately provide and which the people of the rest of Canada do not acknowledge; That the quiet revolution has made giant strides in education, culture and economic progress which, if not accommodated by the rest of Canada, is prepared to go it alone;

That the time has come to work out a truer partnership between French and English Canada--without which there can be no strong Quebec and no united Canada.

It won't go away

One gets the feeling Messrs. Drury and Hyde are saying as little as possible in the hope or hopelessness that the question will go away and die.

It won't.

Canada's Jays

"There comes our favourite Jay," we told our B.C. visitors to Expo. "Listen, it is saying, 'Jay, jay' way off in the distance."

The call came closer, and presently with a loud "bump" the bird arrived on the feeding tray. "That is no Jay!" our western friend exclaimed. "We see Jays often in Vancouver, but they don't look like that. I may not know all the birds, but I do know a Jay. This bird isn't saying the right things either."

He was incredulous until we explained that his large, dark, black and blue bird with the long crest was Steller's Jay, while this paler blue bird with white trimmings and a blue crest was a Blue Jay. The Blue Jay has a good vocabulary too. It yells "wee-you," whistles "too-wee-dle", chuckles like an amused human being, and squeaks like a

child being pinched. Perhaps its most clever performance is screaming so like a Red-shouldered Hawk that even ardent bird watchers can be fooled.

Blue Jays (indeed all birds) have individual habits. Our loud-voiced Blue Jay's brother or sister (sex cannot be differentiated) was quite unlike most of its close relatives. Its arrival was always unheralded--and, in consequence we often frightened it in the middle of a meal by suddenly arriving not two feet distant to open the window. This stealthy one always landed first on a certain forked branch,

A NOTE TO PARENTS ABOUT WESTMOUNT DAY AT EXPO 67

This year Canada is passing a great milestone in its history and at Expo 67, a Centennial project of our country, the City of Westmount is being accorded a Special Day on October 17 in recognition of its participation in this greatest of world exhibitions. It shall be a long time, no doubt, before your City is again so recognized at an event which is so universally acclaimed and so much in the world's spotlight. Indeed the opportunity may never occur again in our lifetime nor in the lifetime of our children. As a result it is hoped that as many as possible of the Westmount children will be in attendance at the Place des Nations at 11.00 A.M. next Tuesday, October 17 to witness the official ceremony and the entertainment associated with this Special Day. The major portion of the entertainment program, which will include an historical perspective of your City, will be provided by the school children of Westmount.

With the co-operation of public minded citizens the City has been able to obtain sufficient buses to transport the school children (who will be going to School at the usual time), from the schools to the Expo site and back. Due to the problems in public transport the return journey from Expo cannot be arranged before 4.30 p.m. As a result it is suggested that all children bring a hearty lunch with them that day.

The assistance of parents is requested in order that a sufficient number of monitors will be available to assist the schools in getting the children to and from the site and to accompany them during their stay on the Expo grounds. If it is possible for you to act as a monitor for a group of 10 children on that day your assistance would be greatly appreciated. It is suggested that you telephone the school which your child attends or the Westmount City Hall (ask for the Westmount Day extension) and give your name and telephone number. This should be done as soon as possible because the time remaining in which to organize the visit is very limited. Even if you have no children at school your assistance would be most welcome. The transportation costs and the admission fees for the children and the monitors will be borne by the City.

Although the emphasis is being placed on the attendance of the children at the Westmount Day ceremonies at Expo it is hoped that as many of the City's adult population as possible will also be at Place des Nations at 11.00 a.m. next Tuesday.

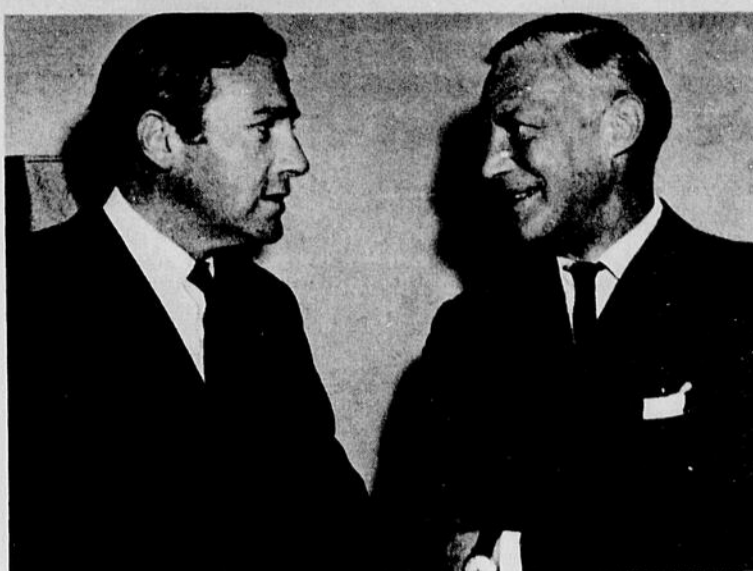
Life in the suburbs has a different emphasis, sometimes, from the way things are in, say, urban Westmount.

tion, the speaker proceeded to have the group relax, close their eyes and leave their minds blank as he walked through the group suggesting to them complete relaxation and when the demonstration was finished they would feel entirely rested. The demonstration continued for a full five minutes.

Everything a person has done ever since he was born is registered in his sub-conscious mind and through the medium of hypnosis can be recalled he said. And as an analogy compared the human mind to that of a computer. "You can put things into it and get them out later even after a period of years" he said. It was his contention that its application in business could be beneficial in as much as a person could be hypnotized unknowingly through the power of suggestion and its effects used later for the benefit of the business in which one is involved. The power of hypnosis, he said could not be defined but he could tell what can be done through its use.

He suggested the instilling of enthusiasm into salesmen by executives and sales could be increased through the power of suggestion to the sub-conscious mind.

To business executives he suggested the advantages of relaxation and called to their attention the high mortality rate in their ranks caused through pressure of business. Many take work home, when there they can't work. Later they take sleeping pills and pep pills to help them but to no avail. "Relax, gentlemen, learn the art of relaxation" he said and stated because of this lack they had forgotten how to take up a hobby.

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

putting it out, and, better still, by prevention.

TAKE STEPS NOW

Nine out of ten fires could be avoided

Every week fire strikes nearly a thousand Canadian homes. The typical house fire averages about \$1000.00 in damages.

But the tragedy is that three-quarters of all fire deaths occur in those homes, and not only deaths. Many people are horribly burned and often permanently scarred.

Fires rarely just "happen". Nine out of ten fires are the result of sheer carelessness and thoughtless neglect of simple precautions.

The fire service have made the following recommendations to those who are interested in saving their families and homes from destruction.

Have your heating system inspected by your service company.

Check your electrical panel to make sure your branch circuits are not overfused.

Check the following areas for unnecessary combustibles: attic; basement; garage; rear yard.

Check that matches or lighters are not within reach of children.

Be sure that no-one in your home smokes in bed.

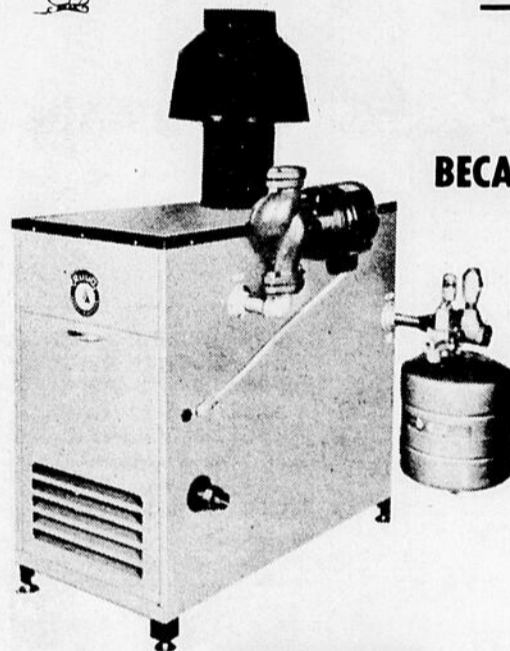


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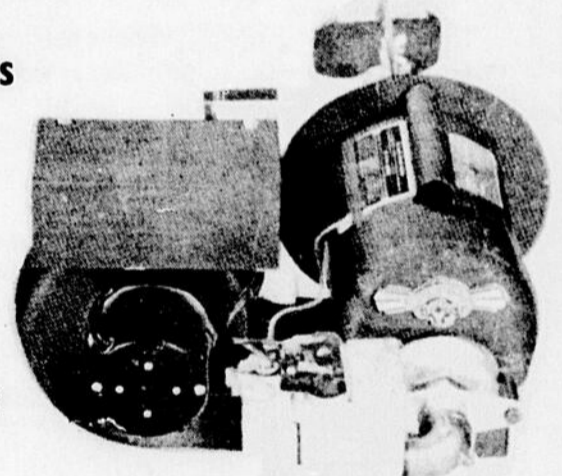

by Japan's saintly Shinichi Suzuki.

Under the guidance of Mr. Ted McLearn, Music Specialist for The Protestant School Board of Greater Montreal, the Westmount schools are on the verge of producing an outstanding nucleus of young musicians. Mr. McLearn has studied under Suzuki in the United States, and in Japan. A portion of this study was made possible by the sabbatical leave programme the P.S.B.G.M. operates for its teachers who wish to improve their qualifications and teaching abilities.

"Suzuki does so many things that were once considered wrong," commented Mr. McLearn. "For example, for centuries we have insisted that students learn to read music as soon as possible—that they use their minds and eyes, but not their ears. Suzuki has come along and removed all that drudgery by making use of memory, or rote, and of playing by ear."

To even the uneducated observer, the results of the Suzuki Method are obvious. Students look forward to their music lessons. They enjoy learning how to play their new instruments. The elimination of dull, routine work such as continuous practicing of scales, has placed them in contact with good music. From "Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star", the leap to Bach, Handel and Vivaldi is short. As a result, pupils take to the Suzuki Method rapidly.

Suzuki's exploitation of memory work is based on a simple, obvious thesis. According to this outstanding teacher if a baby can learn to speak his mother tongue then there is no earthly reason why he cannot learn to play a musical instrument.

"Ideally, we should begin teaching with the Suzuki Method when the pupils are about three or four years of age," indicated Mr. McLearn. "Obviously, under our present school system this is impossible. However, application of Suzuki's principles to older age groups is not difficult."

Essentially, the Suzuki Method utilizes the "mother language method" by teaching students through rote. Recordings are used frequently as the model to imitate, and parents (usually the mother) are encouraged to participate in practice sessions. The actual teaching process involves slow, careful, constant repetition of the basic fundamentals. This will result in a good foundation and a rapid growth later.

YOUTH PROGRAM BEGINS SATURDAY

This Saturday, October 7th, was the big day at the local "Y". Most club programs began on this date and, in addition, all gym classes commenced. Programs such as skin diving model building, stamp club, crafts and air rifle were launched for all boys and girls 8-14 years of age. Each program is under the direction of a teen leader skilled in the program he or she is running.

The gym programs that began on Saturday are under the capable direction of two new members of our staff. Girls classes will be run by Jan Horseman, a student at Sir George Williams University. Jan hails from Moose Jaw, Sask. and has had a long association with the YMCA as a leader in physical activities, particularly in swimming and gym work.

Boys classes will be directed by Gord Bastian, also a student at Sir

George Williams University. Gord is a Montrealer. He has been in the YMCA for the past twelve years and is well qualified in the areas of physical activity and leaders corps.

Another program of great interest to local teens who ski is the new ski conditioning classes for teens, 13 years and up. These classes will start October 23rd and run to December 14th. Classes will run twice a week, Monday and Thursday evenings from 7:00-8:00 p.m. In addition, to conditioning exercises, there will be a lecture period on the Monday evening from 8:00-9:00 p.m. Some of the guest speakers will be Dave Jacobs, Karl Hellzinger and Dr. Douglas Ackman.

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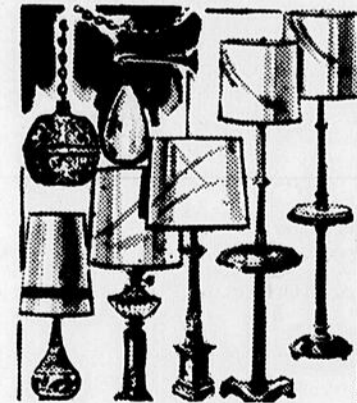

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SKI CONDITIONING OFFERED FEATURES YOUTH COURSE

The Westmount Y.M.C.A. will soon be beginning its SKI CONDITIONING COURSE, which will be its second year of existence.

The course consists of two nights of exercise for 1 1/2 hrs. and one hour of lectures per week. The course begins October 23rd and ends on December 14th.

There are two new features of the course this year, over last year. The first new addition is that part of this course is for youth and part is for adults. The youth course is a new venture because of popular demand by junior skiers. For the youth, the Exercise class is instructed by Andrew MacDonald the Physical Director of the Westmount Y.M.C.A. and COURSE

DIRECTOR, the young people will attend the lecture with the Adults.

The second new feature is the series of lectures given by well known personalities in the world of skiing. Three such people are Mr. Dave Jacobs who will speak on Ski Competition, Mr. Karl Helzinger, who speaks on Ski Progression and Instruction and Dr. Douglas Ackman who will cover "SKI INJURIES and PREVENTION". Other speakers will be representatives from Air Canada, Ski Patrol, local ski areas and Ski Shops.

The lecture sequence is designed to interest the whole ski population (all ski enthusiasts) from beginners to national competitors, and with such speakers it promises to

be informative and interesting.

The main emphasis is on physical conditioning, in this program, and promises to meet the needs of the most ardent skier, with special attention paid to endurance training and strength training. Endurance work is mainly running both on a level and up and down hill. Last year the final test of the course was to run from the corner of Arlington St. and Sherbrooke West to the Summit Look out and back down in under forty minutes. This test was passed by all even a 59 year old gentleman. The strength exercises are designed to strengthen the major areas of the body with special emphasis on ankles, knees and hips, and of course what falls between.

To sum up the total course content it covers all facets of skiing.

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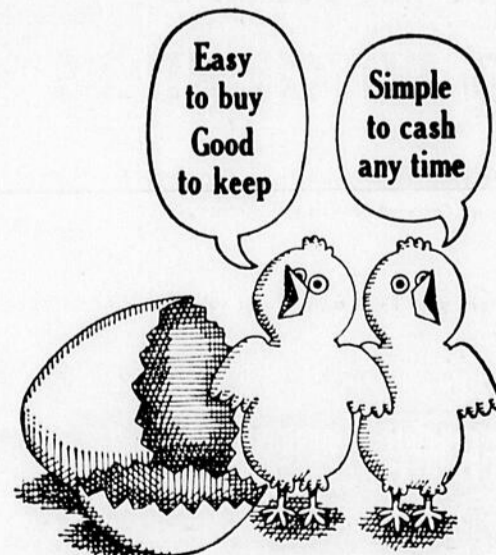

jumped from that to the sheet of zinc that shielded the shelf from chipmunks, and then silently hopped down.

It was unfortunate that our visitor had not been east in early summer when the Blue Jay family was yet young. Between their antics and the parents' efforts to feed them bread, corn, and suet, the show had been almost as good as an Expo exhibit.

Canada actually has three important and absolutely different kinds of Jays. The territory of Steller's Jay begins just about where that of the Blue Jay ends. The western bird breeds on Vancouver Island, and on the mainland from southern Alaska to Canada's southern border, and eastward to southern Alberta; the eastern species takes over from there right across southern Canada including the islands in the Gulf of St. Lawrence and Newfoundland. The bird formerly known as Canada Jay and recently going by the name Gray Jay is to be found from our northern tree limit in coniferous forest, but it seldom visits habitations.

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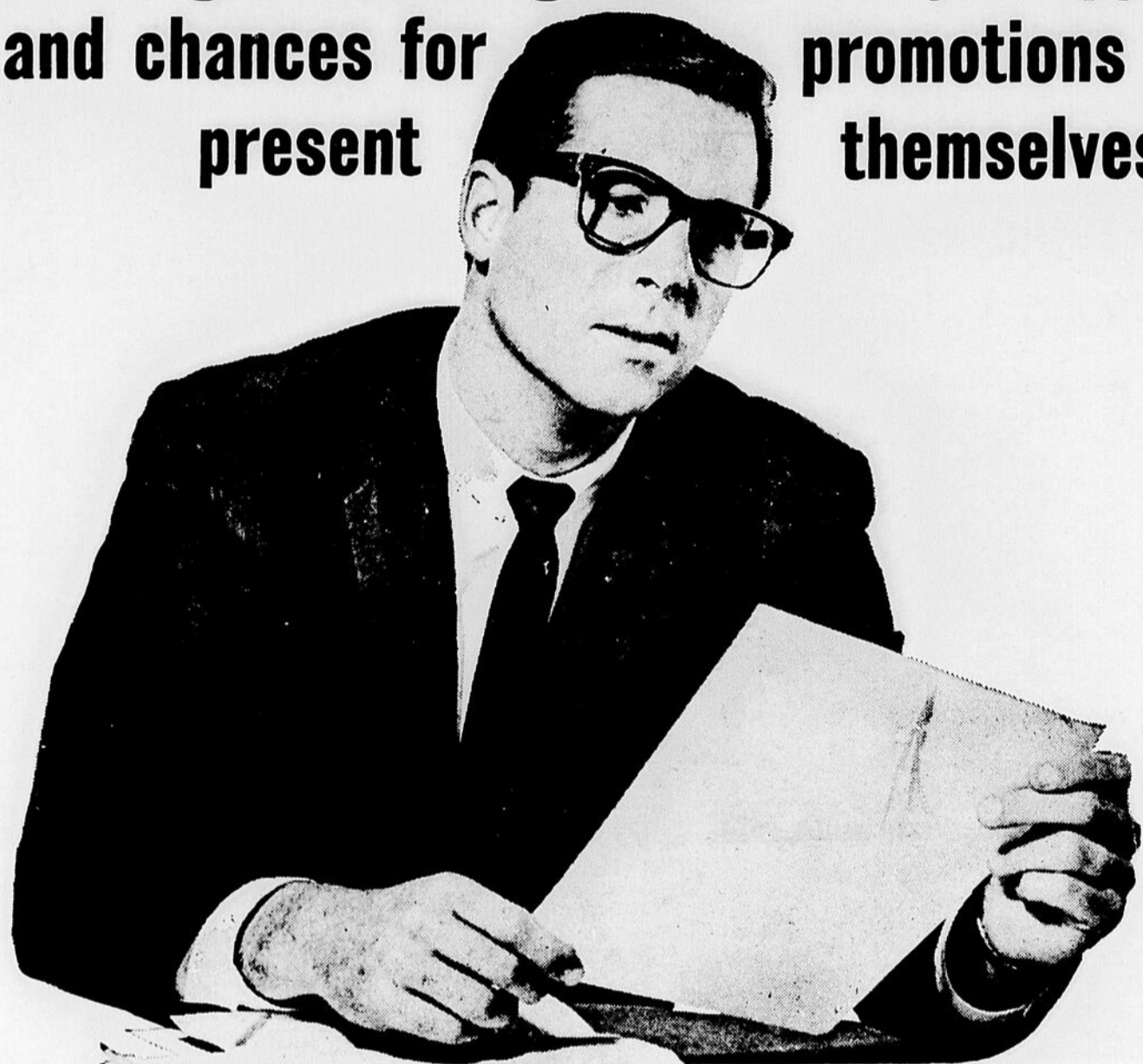
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
