Several ladies who are connected with the work of the Knights of Columbus Hut were then presented to the General. These ladies were Lady Hingston, Mrs. G. E. Hall, Mrs. J. A. Marion, Mrs. J. A. MacDonald and Miss Rosemary Smith. With French gallantry, General Pau kissed the ladies' hands, and remarked that he was very happy to review a battalion of ladies.

Later the General spoke to two more ladies, Miss E. LaMothe and Miss Steele. General Pau appeared delighted when Lt.-Col. Clarence Smith, Comptroller of the Knights of Columbus Huts in Canada, presented him with a gold medalion, bearing the device of the K. of C. The General said: "It is very beautiful; it will be for me a precious souvenir."

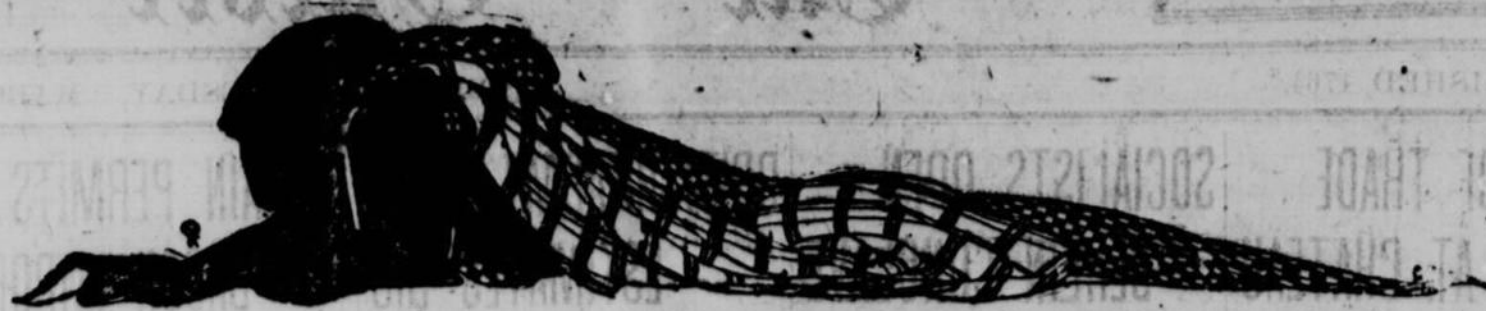

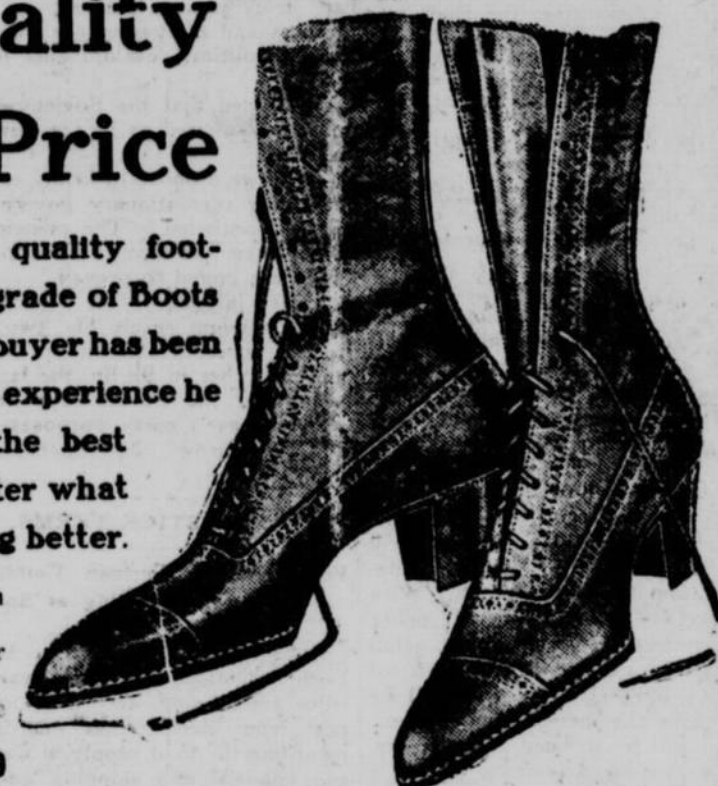

BOARD OF TRADE DINNER AT CHATEAU

MR. E. RAY MARIEN AND HON. FRANK CARREL PRINCIPLE SPEAKERS AT BUSINESSMEN'S REUNION.

The Quebec Board of Trade held the fifth of a series of banquets at the Chateau Frontenac last night and as on previous occasions the main dining room was filled with members of the Board and Quebec business men. The principle speakers last night were Mr. E. Ray Marien, the newly appointed Trade Commissioner of Quebec, who spoke in French, and Hon. Frank Carrel, who spoke in English, both delivering most interesting addresses on the means to be taken and at hand, to make Quebec the equal of any city in Canada in point of industries. In the absence of the President of the Board of Trade, Mr. O. W. Bedard, and of Mr. Elzear Turcotte, president of the Industrial Committee, the chair was occupied by Mr. Napoleon Lavoie, general manager of La Banque Nationale.

Mr. Marien who was first to address the influential gathering of business men, said in part:

"The enlargement of our present industries and the bringing on of new ones, necessitates a considerable amount of work. If this work is carried out successfully, it will be necessary that the population of Quebec be increased, and while on this subject allow me to quote a few figures: in looking over statistics, I find that from 1911 to 1916 the population increased from 78,190 to 110,000, or about 6,000 per year. This is not a sufficient increase for a city like Quebec, and I am convinced that this splendid trade revival proposal will enable us to obtain in 1924, a population of from 250,000 to 300,000. With this increase in population, Quebec will not have the same aspect, small establishments will take the form of luxurious buildings, the city will be enriched by the increase of revenues, its debt will be reduced considerably, and the new improvements will be a joy to its inhabitants and the admiration of strangers. As an American engineer once said: 'The city that can win the most trade, will be the most prosperous; the one that is the most efficient will win the most trade.' The Board of Trade being the directing body will play a most important part in Quebec's future development, it will be the supreme war council, fulfilling the functions of generalissimo, but the soldiers in this great battle will have to be our business men, merchants, commercial travellers, in fact all our population."

Hon. Frank Carrel in opening his address, said that as he had been asked to choose his own subject, he could not think of a better one than that of optimism and ambition.

"Every Quebecker should be an optimist," said Mr. Carrel.

"We have so many advantages and natural resources surrounding us that we cannot help being anything else, if we will only stop to realize what we possess. Within the last twenty-five years Quebec has developed a rapidly increasing Dominion wide manufacturing trade. Twenty-five years ago, Quebec was only known for its furs, boots and shoes, lumber and shipping, but today it is known not only by these exports but by its pulp and paper, its corsets, its tobacco, its cigarettes, gloves, preserved fruits, paper boxes, gloves, sporting goods and many other commodities that are only in their infancy."

"Let me point out to you one reason why our manufacturers will continue to expand. It is due to the individual efforts and hard work of the proprietors or owners, who are leaving their surpluses in their businesses which gives them advantages, excepting in the recent war taxation, over the enormously watered capitalization of other similar industries. Our Trade Commissioner has given you other reasons than this, but all combined it will make Quebec exceptionally healthy and prosperous for industrial development."

"We must not forget that it is our present day young men who will be running this city in the near future, and we must take every care to see that they are brought up with a healthy and progressive commercial mind. We must travel if we want to enlarge our vision on what is going on outside of our city, and when I say travel, I mean that our young men should use their savings in find-

SOCIALISTS OPEN BERLIN CONCLAVE

CONVENTION MARKS OPENING SKIRMISH AGAINST WEIMAR GOVERNMENT BY INDEPENDENTS

Berlin, Sunday, March 3.—(By the Ass'd. Press)—The Independent Socialists opened a four-days' party conclave in Berlin today. While the convention ostensibly is called to discuss the party political program, it really marks the opening skirmish against the Weimar Government. The Independents and their radical following do not conceal their determination to overthrow the Ebert Government. The session was opened by Hugo Haase, leader of the Independent Socialists, who asserted that despite the fact of the National Assembly having gone to sleep "the proletarian revolution is wide awake and marching independent of their leaders and discussing the immediate future political developments in Germany."

He added that the Soviet principle must be adhered to in the new form of state.

"And we propose to firmly establish it in our revolutionary government," Haase continued. "The principles of Bolshevism cannot be suppressed. They are bound to prevail."

Haase intimated that a second revolution might result in two competing governments, one in Weimar and the other in Berlin, the latter representing the Soviet republic with which Haase's party purposes to try and overthrow the Ebert-Scheidemann regime.

ARMISTICE TERMS.

Foch Notifies German Commission to Attend Meeting at Spa.

Copenhagen, March 3.—Marshal Foch has informed the German armistice commission, according to a report from Berlin, that negotiations regarding the food supply of Germany and financial and shipping questions will begin at Spa on Tuesday.

General Nudant, the representative of Marshal Foch at Spa, it is added, has told the German Armistice Commission that the French Government has decided to send a new mission to Berlin to study the question of food supply. The mission will be headed by M. Laguein.

Allied Representatives.

Paris, March 3.—Representatives of Great Britain, the United States, France and of the other Powers, have departed for Spa to complete with the German arrangements for the release of German ships in certain ports and certain German vessels in neutral ports.

Virtually all the details for the release of the vessels have been arranged, and it is anticipated that they will be turned over under the agreement without delay.

BAVARIAN ROYALTY BEATS A RETREAT

Vienna, Sunday, March 3.—(By the Ass'd. Press)—Former King Ludwig of Bavaria, former Prince Leopold of Bavaria, former commander of the German army on the Russian front, and other members of the former Bavarian royal family have arrived in the Austrian Tyrol. The former king, it is said, intends to live in the Oetz Valley, Prince Leopold, who was accompanied by his wife, the former Duchess Gissela, of Austria, will live at Reuss.

Prince Leopold is said to have left Bavaria because he was threatened with internment.

ing a pleasure as well as interest, in studying the development of commerce or industry in other cities. We must ask the big men of Quebec to take special pains to encourage in their respective industries, optimism and ambition. Hon. Mr. Carrel before concluding said he was convinced that within six months the St. Malo workshops would be in operation, and predicted one of the biggest shipping seasons for the port of Quebec for next summer.

Others who spoke briefly were Mr. G. E. Marquis, Mr. W. H. Wiggs, and Mr. Eugene Julien. On behalf of those present, votes of thanks were extended to the speakers by the Chairman, Mr. Nap. Lavoie, and the evening came to a close by the singing of "God Save the King" and "O Canada."

BRITISH ARMY ESTIMATES BIG

WINSTON CHURCHILL POINTS TO UNCERTAINTY OF ALL CONDITIONS.

London, March 3.—(Canadian Press despatch from Reuters, Limited).—In the House of Commons today, the Right Hon. Winston Churchill, Secretary of War, introduced the Army estimates of £287,000,000 emphasized the difficulties of framing estimates this year because every factor was uncertain and fluctuating. We are half way between peace and war. We were unable to fix the rate of demobilization. We did not know what arrangements affecting armaments would be embodied in the peace treaty nor how many men we must keep in the Middle East and on the Rhine or for how long. We did not know whether the Germans would accept our conditions or refuse them, throw responsibility for the future upon us and simply degenerate into ruin. He emphasized the fact that vast areas of Europe and the East were in a state of anarchy and the Allies upon whom rested the responsibility of enabling the world to get to work again, were themselves very seriously exhausted.

To all these difficulties must be added the enormous effort of winding up the war. The present estimates represented a maximum which he hoped it would be possible to revise in a downward direction. He mentioned that the Allies were still discussing the exact amount of the contributions to be received from Germany towards the upkeep of their armies on the Rhine.

The regular military establishment of Great Britain never could, nor ever ought to fall to the low scale of 1914, as it was not known what other Powers were going to do, Winston Churchill, Secretary of War, declared.

WARNS LITTLE NATIONS OF BIG FAULTS

London, March 3.—(By The Associated Press)—Premier Lloyd George, speaking at a Welsh festival dinner in London tonight said he hoped to be back in Paris within forty-eight hours. The Premier warned the little nations of the danger of emulating the faults of the great empires by a tendency to annex territory not their own. "This is a most fatal error for any people, great or small," he said.

AIR FORCE EQUIPMENT ALL AUCTIONED OFF

Toronto, Ont., March 3.—An auction sale of the entire equipment of the Royal Air Force, which opened today at the plant of the Canadian Aeroplanes Limited, marks the passing of the Royal Air Force from Canada. It is expected that at least three days will be required to complete the disposal of the 148 carloads of equipment which have been brought to Toronto from the camps of the force in Canada. There were more than five thousand people present when the sale opened.

GREENLAND A PRIZE.

May be awarded to Canada by Peace Conference.

In making a new map of the world, the task of the Paris Peace Conference, it is quiet possible Canada may extend her territory in the Far North. Denmark is anxious to obtain North Schleswig and is indifferent to the future of Greenland. In fact, it is useless territory to the little European country, and the Danes would welcome being relieved of responsibility for a portion of the territory wrested from them by Prussia in the sixties. It is quiet possible that Canada may be asked to assume, with the consent of Denmark and the Allied powers, authority over Greenland. Certainly with the development of the submarine and the danger of foreign submarine bases in proximity to another country no other nation will be permitted to occupy Greenland but Canada if a change in the sovereignty of that country is determined. Nor should our people be indifferent to the acquisition of this territory. Their chief knowledge of Greenland is drawn from that old hymn, "From Greenland's Icy Mountains." It should be remembered that one of the great prizes in the national real estate market is spitzbergen, despised for centuries and known only as a base for polar exploration or whale fishing. Its mineral wealth has been discovered to be enormous and European countries are coveting this "northern waste." So, too, the mineral sea and wealth of Greenland may be of equal, or even greater value, and Canada might find in "Greenland's Icy Mountains" and seas an indemnity for a considerable portion of our war expenditure.

BRITAIN PERMITS BACON IMPORTS

IMPORTANT STEP TAKEN TENDING TO FAVORABLY AFFECT CANADIAN TRADE.

Ottawa, March 3.—One of the most important steps tending favorably to affect Canadian trade has been taken by the British Board of Trade in the issue of an open general license to permit the importation of bacon, hams and lard arriving on or after March 10th. Consignments which may be imported under this general license before March 31st may not, however, be sold before that date, according to the information cabled yesterday to the Canadian Trade Commission in Ottawa.

This restriction, it is believed, has been dictated partly by the difficulties of allotment under the ration plan in Great Britain. The Board of Trade also announces the removal as from the end of April of all restrictions in importation of paper, including wall paper and paper making materials. Meanwhile the number of import licenses will be increased to seventy-five per cent of the pre-war standard. The Canadian Mission at No. 1 Regent street, London, S.W., is prepared to advise importers into the United Kingdom who may be experiencing difficulties in importing goods from Canada.

HARBOR BOATMEN VOTE TO STRIKE

NEW YORK OWNERS FAIL TO BRING ABOUT ADJUSTMENT OF DISPUTE.

New York, March 3.—A strike of harbor boatmen effective at 6 o'clock tomorrow morning, was voted today by the Legislative Council of the Marine Workers' Affiliation, following a conference with owners of private craft, which failed to bring about an adjustment of the dispute over the ward of an eight-hour day for some classes of port workers by an umpire of the National War Labor Board.

The strike was expected to tie-up harbor traffic, duplicating the conditions of several weeks ago, when a similar walk-out left the city without ferry, lighter, barge and tug service. Ferry leaders said the strike order affected seven unions, with a combined membership of 16,000 men. The strike, it was declared, would tie-up all harbor traffic except army and navy tugs employed in moving sick and wounded men and in docking transports from overseas and boats plying to and from city and state hospitals.

All ferries would be tied-up, it was declared, until the strike committee met again, probably tomorrow, when it would be decided whether workers should man a limited number of ferries plying between Manhattan and Staten Island. It was asserted that 54,000 members of the longshoremen's and freight handlers' unions were ready to go on sympathetic strike if an attempt were made to break the strike by employment of non-union labor.

Owners' Proposals.

The New York Boat-Owners' Association today presented three propositions to the Marine Workers' Affiliation in an effort to avert the threatened harbor strike and bring about a settlement of the controversy between the men and their employers. These proposals were first, the acceptance by the men of the Macy award of the War Labor Board, which provides for an eight-hour day for employees on certain classes of boats and on increase in wages; second, the acceptance by the men of a wage increase with no change in working hours, and third, the creation of a joint board of owners and employees to adjust present differences and any others that may arise. The Marine Workers' Strike Committee met this afternoon to consider the offer.

COURT MARTIAL FOR COTTIN

Paris, March 3.—Emile Cottin, who recently shot and wounded Premier Clemenceau, will be tried by court martial on March 14. Captain Bouchardson, head of the Paris Military Court, continued his interrogation of the Premier's assailant this afternoon. Cottin admitted that the attack had been premeditated for several months and declared that if he had not been stopped he would have re-loaded his revolver and fired again.

LYONS PREPARING FOR GREAT FAIR

CITY SHOWS EVIDENCE OF GREAT ECONOMIC EVENT ATTRACTING THOUSANDS

Lyons, France, March 3.—(Cable from Leon Trepanier).—The city shows evidence of the great economic event which has attracted thousands of businessmen from the Allied countries. The civic authorities are doing their utmost to facilitate the housing and the comfort of visitors, and private families are opening their homes to those who cannot find space in the hotels and pensions.

The Canadian Participants are so enthusiastic at the outlook of their visit of the Lyon Fair this year that already they are taking means for establishing closer business relations between France and Canada, and accordingly, they held a meeting and formed a committee to undertake a thorough study of the subject. Those at the meeting expressed deep satisfaction at the efforts made by the Canadian Minister of Commerce and Canada's trade representatives here for making France an accessible market for Canadian goods.

The committees formed had decided to enter into postwar relations with the Government and consult Sir George Foster, Mr. Lloyd Harris and M. Philippe Roy, Canadian Commissioner in France, on the possibility of forming a permanent organization such as a Canadian Chamber of Commerce to foster Canadian trade with France. Mr. Clarke, Canadian Trade Commissioner at Milan, in charge of the Canadian section here, was appointed temporary president. Colonel Marsh occupied the chair, Mr. W. P. Hughes Secretary Canadian Manufacturers' Association, acting as Secretary.

Special committees were also appointed to take up the matter of embargoes on Canadian exports into France, as well as other vital matters affecting the development of the Canadian trade in France. Daily meetings are to be held during the fair to discuss progress of business transactions.

One of the Paris dailies thus summarizes the Lyons Fair as a maximum of business of minimum space in a minimum of time and minimum of expense.

BIG HOLD UP

Montreal, Que., March 3.—Four men and a woman were held up at the point of revolver tonight, and gagged and bound by six masked bandits who invaded a house at 2389 Greenfield Avenue. The bandits made off with \$30 in cash and bank book containing account of over \$1,000. The names of the victims are Mike Nicholok, owner of the house, Pete Koornit, boarder, Jacya Oleknick and Mrs. Nicholok.

The house was in an isolated position.

NATURALIZATION FIGURES

Ottawa, Ont., March 3.—Certificates of naturalization and of readmission to British nationality were granted to 9,029 people during the last fiscal year. This number included 471 Austrians, 43 Germans, 240 French, 170 Belgians, 107 Japanese, 406 Norwegians, 1,163 Russians and 5,192 Americans.

MANY SOLDIERS INSANE.

On account of the fact that there are likely to be in Canada many men permanently disabled, the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment is likely to continue for a long period of years to come, according to Sir James Lougheed. "We have unfortunately, between 800 and 1,000 insane soldiers on our hands, who will require attention for many years, as well as many tubercular patients, and in addition to that there will have to be institutions for the permanent care of men who are totally disabled," said Sir James recently, in answer to a question as to the duration of the work of the department.

"About a year after demobilization is concluded," he said, "the educational work of the department should be completed. I understand that it will be eight or nine months before demobilization is completed on account of the fact that we cannot absorb the men any faster than that. There are difficulties of the carrying companies to be got over, and twenty thousand men a month is all that we can expect during the winter months."

Sir James explained that the number of amputation cases which require attention means delay in the winding up of the work of the department, as these men must be restored to the maximum amount of efficiency before they are discharged. In regard to the large number of insane, he said that while many of them will ultimately recover their sanity there are many who will not and must be looked after for years, if not all their lives.

"We are trying to do everything we possibly can for the soldiers, but I do not know of anything special that has not been announced," he said in reference to the immediate plans of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, over which he presides.

A QUESTION WHICH WORLD IS FACING

CAN YOU OPPOSE BOLSHIEVISM WITH THE BIBLE? ASKS PADEREWSKI.

Warsaw, Saturday, March 1.—(By the Associated Press)—"Can you oppose Bolshevism with the Bible? This is a question which the world is facing today."

Ignace Jan Paderewski, the Premier of Poland, somewhat nettled at the apparent American opposition to the big Polish army which is being formed while the Peace Conference is sitting asked this of the Associated Press correspondent today.

"It is not an individual peril, but a peril for civilization, for the aim of the entire Christian civilization—peace and work—will not kill Bolshevism as far as we are concerned, because you cannot have peace and organize prosperity with your next door neighbor advising your workmen not to work and paying agents to destroy your factories as quickly as you can build them. Most people like to get money without working, and that is what Bolshevism Russia offers."

When asked if he was able to reconcile the 350,000 Polish army with the League of Nations plan, M. Paderewski replied:

"Yes, certainly and I am quite in sympathy with that plan. Poland's army is to be recruited for such time as is necessary to restore order on our frontiers. It will be an army of peace and order, or policemen, if you will, the same as the United States called up to protect its borders along Mexico from outrage."

"We do not seek any quarrel. We shall be delighted to see this pacific plan worked out."

NAVAL LOSSES

Allied Total For War Aggregates 803,000 Tons, Mostly British

London, March 3rd.—(Reuters)—The total Allied naval losses in the war aggregated 803,000 tons, according to an estimate sent by Reuters' Paris correspondent.

Of this loss the British portion was 550,000 tons. The Central Powers lost 405,000 tons but the German total which was 350,000 tons does not cover the huge tonnage surrendered under the armistice terms.

Commenting upon these estimates, the Westminster Gazette says that although the figures given are not official they may be taken as closely approximating the naval losses suffered by the chief powers in the war.

"When we learn that in big ships alone we sacrificed thirteen battle-ships, three battle cruisers and twenty five cruisers," says the newspaper, "we get some notion of the tremendous character of the effort that was necessary to enable the navy to emerge from the war vastly more powerful than it was at the end of 1914."

ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATED.

Inhabitants of Strasbourg and Alsace Remember Bordeaux Protest.

Strasbourg, Saturday, March 1.—The anniversary of the protest made The inhabitants of Alsace, and Strasbourg in particular, today celebrated in the French National Assembly at Bordeaux in 1871 by the Deputies of Alsace-Lorraine against the annexation of their country to Germany.

All the buildings in Strasbourg were decorated and school children marched through the streets. In the afternoon a wreath was laid on the grave of Emile Kuss, the last French mayor of Strasbourg before the German occupation.

Leon Bourgeois, in the name of the Army Commission of the French Senate, paid tribute to Kuss and Leon Gambetta. He recalled that Premier Clemenceau was the only one of the protestants of 1871 who is still alive.

He said that the Premier had been able to realize in his old age the promise of his youth.

BIG RECEPTION FOR PRESIDENT

WILSON WILL SPEAK FROM THE SAME PLATFORM AS TAFT.

New York, March 3.—Plans were completed here late today for the reception of President Wilson tomorrow night, when he will speak from the same platform with former President William H. Taft, in advocacy of the League of Nations, before sailing to take up his work at the Peace Conference.

The President, it was announced, will arrive at the Pennsylvania Station at 9:15 p.m., and will proceed directly to the Metropolitan Opera House, where he is to deliver the address. At least two sets of women pickets are planning to be on hand outside the Metropolitan when the President arrives. Alice Paul, leader of the National Women's Party announced from the home of Mrs. O. P. Belmont, where she is a guest, that she will personally lead suffrage pickets with purple, gold and white banners demanding that the President call an extra session of Congress to pass the Woman Suffrage Amendment.

The General Mooney Committee of the Central Federated Union, it was announced, will have women workers before the building with banners demanding that the President act to bring about the release of them as Mooney.

At the Opera House, the President will greet Mr. Taft in a private room. In this room also the President will receive a delegation of twenty Irishmen who will ask him to bring the matter of self-determination of Ireland before the Peace Conference.

Although the committee in charge of the meeting already has mailed out tickets for all of the 3,926 seats in the Metropolitan, letters and telegrams requesting seats continue to pour in today, and it was estimated that more than two tons of mail was still unopened. More than 300,000 applications have been received, it was said.

CANADA'S INDEMNITY

Montreal Member Wants Germany to Repay Canada's War Disbursements

Ottawa, Ont., March 3.—Mr. P. R. Du Tremblay, of the Laurier-Outremont Division, Montreal, wants the Dominion Parliament to declare in favor of the payment by Germany of an indemnity equal to Canada's disbursements in the war. He will give notice of a resolution declaring that "Instructions should be given to Sir Robert Borden, Prime Minister of this country, to take such steps as he will deem advisable to claim from Germany an indemnity corresponding to the amount disbursed by Canada in the pursuit of this war, and that, in any case, Sir Robert Borden should be instructed to claim from the British Government, such amount, to be paid out of the indemnity which the British Government might receive from Germany and that the whole question should be submitted through the proper channels to the Peace Conference, now sitting in Paris."

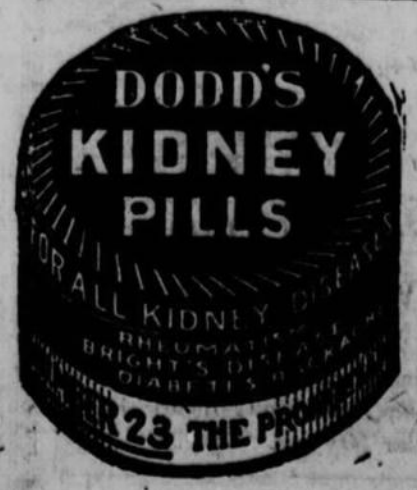

OUR DISTINGUISHED GUEST

The Chronicle desires to associate itself respectfully with the general voice of the Ancient Capital in expressing a cordial "Bienvenu" to General Pau, its distinguished guest. The frosts of time have turned the hair of this one-armed veteran to silver but have been impotent to impair his physical vigor or military alertness. Like Joffre and Castelnau this victorious leader dates his active service as far back as the previous Franco-German War of 1871 and he was well past the age of active service when, like Cincinnatus, he was summoned from retirement to save the State. Expert testimony gives generous credit to the successes obtained by General Pau in Alsace-Lorraine during the critical opening stages of the war which, with unexpected Belgian resistance, the heroic treat of the British "Contemptibles" and the early advance of Russia into Eastern Prussia, combined to save the Allied cause from a premature debacle. Since that time the General has continued to render conspicuous service in divers capacities, not least of which was his direction of the retreat of the Belgian army from Antwerp, for which purpose he had been lent by the French Republic to the Government of King Albert.

No one who is not a Frenchman, no one who does not belong to their generation, can experience or even fully appreciate the emotions of men like Clemenceau, Joffre and Pau when the Sedan of 1871 was amply avenged by that of 1918, when the new "Watch on the Rhine" removed all bitterness from the yet vivid memory of Hunnish hordes pouring in malignant triumph down the Parisian boulevards; when after years of vigil the mourning could at last be removed from the Strasbourg monument and the tricolor floated once again over the long lost Provinces of Alsace-Lorraine.

Quebec today is therefore privileged to greet not alone the deliverer of civilization, not alone a conquering General of *La Grande Armee*, but a link with the history of that land from which the majority of its citizens are proud to boast their origin. No French Mission, on the other hand, could possibly visit Canada without sojourning in this city which, more than any other part of the Dominion, is bound up with the romance and glory of French Imperial rule. As a student of military strategy there can be no inch of the Ancient Capital and its environs that is not pregnant with interest for this civic guest, battle-ground as it has been for some of the most celebrated and decisive campaigns of the latter half of the eighteenth century when, as at the present day, the world was in the melting pot. Whatever regret may be experienced that the adverse fortunes of war should have alienated so fair a heritage will be swallowed up in a glow of pride at the heroic deeds of his intrepid ancestors and in gratification to see how wholly the language, customs and traditions of Old France have been adhered to in the New after the lapse of so many years and in spite of new interests, new environment.

From those of his own language General Pau will receive a welcome those warmth he can more easily estimate but that will be in no measure outdone by the hearty sentiments of the English-speaking citizens of Quebec, who recognize in him the spokesman of a splendid ally of the British Empire.

PENSION QUERIES

Far from objecting to criticism or queries the Board of Pension Commissioners states that it will welcome inquiries and statements from groups of returned men who are interested in any particular case.

All the Board requests is that such inquiries should be submitted in proper form and that they come from a qualified committee of investigation rather than from miscellaneous individuals.

The reason for this is that frequently as many as seven or eight people will write in with reference to one case. Obviously it is impossible for the time of officials of the Board to be taken up in replying individually to everyone relative to the same case.

A suggestion has been made, however, and in many instances it is already working with success, that members of the G. W. V. A. should form themselves in different localities into "Committees of investigation" or "Pension committees" so that any member or person having a grievance, misunderstanding or complaint with regard to pension shall bring it up at such committee and the head thereof may submit such complaint or misunderstanding on a special form to the Board of Pension Commissioners at Ottawa.

This done the Board will undertake to send back a complete description of the case as to how it stands and why the award was made and the disabilities discovered by medical investigation. In cases where this has already been done members of such committees have expressed entire satisfaction with the findings of the Medical Board.

DEMobilIZATION

Yesterday morning the Press announced the departure from England of two battalions—the Royal Canadian Regiment and the Forty Second—of the Third Division which is the first unit of the Canadian Army Corps to be withdrawn from service at the front. Hitherto soldiers have been repatriated as individuals through sickness or other special causes but today the formal demobilization of the Dominion's army has commenced and will go forward unrelentingly until complete.

A number of well-intentioned people who have been fittingly designated as "Godsakers" have been fretting themselves as to what Canada will think of these men on their return; will they prove a disturbing element not readily re-absorbed into civilian routine and useful employment? It will however be far more to the point, far more beneficial if we set ourselves to study what these men are going to think of Canada. Four years is a comparatively short time but four such years as those just lived through leave an indelible brand and it must not be forgotten that while Canada still stands pretty much where it did in 1914, none of those men who come back to it from the Moloch furnace of Mars will be anywhere near where they stood before they went. It is not that the majority of them are going to be worse citizens but infinitely better, infinitely more exacting of democratic institutions, and the only possibility of friction will be where Canada falls short of their new and bitterly acquired ideals. A few black sheep there will naturally be as riots in centres such as Toronto and Halifax bear witness but these phenomena are meaningless.

Candid introspection compels the admission that no national aim exists and that the numerous conflicting sectional aims are largely selfish in character. The feeling is general that now when society is in a state of flux there has come an opportunity that may never occur again to grasp some long-sought but so far unobtainable privilege or advantage. Thus we have Capital and Labor, Industry and Agriculture facing each other like snarling dogs while the politician who should steer the ship of state and preserve discipline among its crew evinces a complacent readiness to return to his own petty party game which was rudely interrupted by the realities of the war. If Canada is unable to bring order out of this domestic chaos it is far from unlikely that the returned soldier will pitch in and undertake the job himself, nor will the process be a gentle one for the soft-bodied civilian.

In this connection certain statements ascribed by the Christian Science Monitor to Ole Hansen, Mayor of recently revolutionary Seattle, are worthy of domestic application. "Let the national government," he declared, "stop pandering and concealing the men who talk against it. Let us clean up the United States of America. Let all men stand up and be counted. If the majority of the people of this country are disloyal and owe superior allegiance to some other country or some other cause, now is the time to find it out."

I take the position that our duty as citizens stands ahead of the demand of any organization on the face of the earth. The union man, the business man, the churchman, must first of all be citizens. man, the churchman, must first of all be citizens. Any man who owes a higher allegiance to any organization a federal prison or deported."

Here also the time approaches when every man will have to stand up and be counted and, in that time, what the soldier thinks of Canada is likely to be made plain.

GOVERNMENT BY THE CRIMINAL

(Wall Street Journal)

It almost seems that if people can be induced to call some forms of agitation by high-sounding names, to assume without inquiry that agitation necessarily involves a grievance, that all agitation is directed to securing greater liberty, that there is "something in" socialism and there may even be "something in" Bolshevism which mankind has lacked and needed, there is a disposition to tolerate what we should all condemn if we called things by their right names.

Bolshevism, syndicalism, the kindred teachings of the I. W. W., stripped of phrases simply mean crime. They represent the government of the law-abiding, useful, producing citizen by the element which should be in jail and which is sternly repressed under all orderly systems of government. The Bolsheviks in Russia are not democrats or friends of the worker, or exponents of a new form of progress. They are merely an armed band of criminals guided by no principle, formed for the purpose of loot and rapine and, above all, to live at the public expense without working.

We have all too many loose-thinking, well-meaning people among us, well to do financially and well placed socially, who accept the false assumptions in the first of these paragraphs but who cannot or will not recognize the inescapable truth of the second. Anarchy means the absence of all government, with a theoretical conception of every man governing himself, so as to make organized social order unnecessary. But this is not the Bolshevik theory. The licensed pickpocket, the bandit, the murderer, are established in authority organized after its kind, with a backing of bayonets and bombs. Robbery is its motive and lust its second nature.

Whether we have a League of Nations or not, the world for its own safety faces the task of stamping out Bolshevism, in Russia and elsewhere, by exactly the means civilization uses towards crime.

BOND ISSUE FOR CATHOLIC SCHOOLS

THE COMMISSION WILL CALL FOR TENDERS TO BORROW \$400,000.

In order to raise a sum of \$400,000 required for building and repair work by the Roman Catholic School Commission it was decided by that body last night to call for tenders for a bond issue redeemable at a period varying between ten and thirty-five years.

Mr. Rene Dupont and Mr. C. E. Taschereau, N.P., appeared before the Commission and submitted a plan of long-term bonds whereby the entire debt would be wiped out within a period of thirty-five years without having recourse to the usual method of establishing a sinking fund.

Due consideration will be given to the plan outlined together with the other tenders which will be received. On a report made by Dr. E. M. A. Savard as to the hygienic conditions in the Notre Dame du Chemin Academy on Cremazie street, it was decided to make repairs to alleviate the congested quarters by making an extension which would provide for two more classes and also give more salubrious quarters for the teaching sisters.

Influenza Again.

It was reported to the Commission that influenza had made its appearance again in the city and was affecting certain schools, notably the Good Shepherd Convent where four sisters were ill and as a result four classes had to be closed.

A delegation of Christian Brothers representing 70 teachers in the schools of the Commission waited on the members urging that the allowance per annum for each teacher be increased from \$375 to \$450, the increase to take effect in September, 1919. The Commission promised consideration.

Chairman Morissette announced that a charitable citizen had offered to subscribe a sum of \$1,000 towards the founding of a maternal school in Stadacona similar to that conducted by the Sisters of La Providence at St. Malo. In this school mothers who have to work to earn for their families may leave their children while they are absent working and call for them in the evening. Mr. Morissette said that the philanthropic citizen had even intimated that he would double his subscription if the institution were founded and would use his influence to raise other subscriptions as well. The chairman explained that the Sisters at Stadacona had volunteered help to get the movement started.

FEBRUARY BUILDING REPORT

More Than Double In Value Of Corresponding Month Last Year

The building report of the Civic Public Works Department for the month of February 1919 which has just been completed, show that during the past month there were issued by the department 20 permits representing in value the sum of \$33,630. During the corresponding month of 1918 the same number of permits were issued but amounting only, \$25,147. There was, therefore, an increase in value of building operations in this city during February, 1919 over February 1918 of 28,483.00.

SCHOOL STATISTICS IN THIS CITY

FIGURES GIVEN OUT AT MEETING OF CATHOLIC SCHOOL COMMISSION.

At the meeting of the Roman Catholic School Commission last night it was announced that there were 14,650 children attending the sixty schools under the jurisdiction of the commission in the city.

The attendance at the schools this year averages 85 per cent, which is just one per cent less than last year when the average attendance was 86 per cent.

Chairman Morissette announced that in accordance with the Provincial Law, the City of Quebec is taking for the first time this year, the census of all children of school age in the city. This census which is being taken by the pastors of parishes will be ready for the next meeting of the commission and when available will enable the commission to establish irrefutable figures on school attendance here.

It was pointed out that the cities of Quebec, Montreal and Sherbrooke had consistently refused to take this census arguing that it would be too costly, but Quebec has now taken the lead and in view of the fact that the work is being done by the clergy it will cost little or nothing.

EXHIBITION COMMISSION.

This medal was offered by the Canadian Bank of Commerce to the Commission for the encouragement of vacant lot gardening and is very handsome in design.

WANT RICKARD TO STAGE RITCHIE LEONARD FIGHT

COAST FANS THINK THAT BIG BOUT COULD BE HELD AT RENO, NEVADA.

New York, March 3.—According to a wire from Willie Leonard, who out-pointed Benny Ritchie, in their four-round bout in the California metropolis on Friday night, San Francisco promoters are trying to sign Ritchie and Leonard for a light weight championship bout at Reno on July 3, th night before the heavy-weight battle. Ritchie states that he has wired Tex Rickard in Chicago, asking him to bid for the match. If the lightweight clash does come through Rickard will be the only promoter who will be able to handle the proposition if it is to be staged as the prelude to the Willard-Dempsey contest. It is quite certain that he will not permit any other promoters to use his arena. It is absolutely sure that he will have nothing to do with any of the boxing clan from San Francisco. Rickard had some unpleasant experiences in California when he tried to hold the Jeffries-Johnson fight there, and he never will forgive California or its boxing promoters.

Ritchie v. Leonard for 25 rounds to a decision in Reno sounds mighty fine, but there are ever so many "ifs" between talk of the match and the fight's actually taking place. First, we do not think that Ritchie could make 135 pounds at 3 o'clock and still be a worthy opponent for Leonard. Last Friday, five hours before the fight, Ritchie scaled at 141 1/2 pounds. It is safe to say that when he faced the champion he was about five pounds heavier. Ritchie had all he could do to make 140 pounds when he fought Welsh and Dundee four years ago. For Ted Lewis he made 141 pounds. In the second place, it is not at all certain that Rickard will go to Reno. In the third place—and this very properly should have come first—we do not think that Leonard will fight anybody to a decision, be it 10 or 25 rounds, for the simple reason that he can get all the work and purses he wants without risking title or prestige. It is safe to say that Billy Gibson will not pilot Leonard into any battle which will call for a referee's verdict, no matter who the opponent may be, Ritchie or One Eyed Pete. Conditions in this country make it possible for a champion to keep going for years without once putting his title in jeopardy, and business acumen prompts Gibson to steer his men away from anything that even resembles a shoal.

Leonard's having been outpointed brought about a quick change in San Francisco experts' estimates regarding the lightweight champion. After his first 2 bouts there he was hailed as a second Joe Gans. Now they rate him below ever so many champions. One goes so far as to say that even Wolgast at his best would have rushed Leonard to defeat. How the mighty have fallen—and only a four-round bout at that! But Leonard has fled from San Francisco and will fight next in Los Angeles. His setback by Ritchie no doubt will result in his canceling his plans for other fights on the coast and hastening back here, where a mere \$10,000 awaits him for a match with Joe Welling in Newark. The Welling thing will be off if Lew Tindler should happen to give the former gob a—had beating in Newark. The Newark promoters asked Leonard to fight the winner of the Tindler-Welling after, but Gibson declines to have anything to do with Tindler until next summer. He has lined up a match between Leonard and Tindler for Shibe park in Philadelphia in July, and he figures that by waiting he can clean up close to \$15,000 in only six rounds. In addition to holding off a dangerous contender for about four months.

HE HAS FOUGHT IN MANY CLIMES

WON "V. C." IN EGYPT—WAS RECOMMENDED FOR IT AGAIN IN GREAT WAR.

Winner of the Victoria Cross in Egypt, and recommended for this most coveted war decoration for valor in the great war, Sergt-Major Charles Garrett has recently come to Canada. He won the D. C. M. in France. A soldier all his life, he has campaigned in many lands. He is a big, upstanding Irishman, who was born in the pretty little town of Belling, which is in the far west of Ireland. He had a hankering after a soldier's life, and took the earliest opportunity of joining the army. In August, 1894, he enlisted with the 21st Hussars, a regiment which afterwards was armed with the lance. He went to India in the following year, and was in that country for three years.

In 1898 he was sent to the Sudan with Kitchener's forces, and took part in the battle of Omdurman. It was here that he won the V.C. for saving the life of Lieut. D. Montmorency. The troopers had ridden three times through the ranks of the Dervishes, who were showing their wonted disregard of death and fighting with savage fury. The officer was thrown from his horse, and, being surrounded by the enemy, his life was apparently not worth a minute's purchase. Sergt-Major Garrett rode to his aid, and after almost losing his own life, succeeded in bringing the young officer out of the ring of death, losing both his sword and lance in doing so.

Speaking of the incident to a Canadian friend the sergeant-major said: "I met him afterwards in South Africa but unfortunately he was killed at Nickolson's Nek. I was then serving in the 5th Lancers, having been sent to South Africa at the beginning of the war."

Garrett fought at Elandslaagte, the Siege of Ladysmith, Diamond Hill and Belfast, and in a number of minor engagements. At the termination of the campaign he went to London, England, and still determined to follow a military career, joined the 1st Irish Guards with rank of sergeant-major for twenty years, which in itself is a record to be proud of.

Ever anxious for active service, the sergeant-major again turned his eyes towards Africa, and in 1904 was on the West Coast, serving on the staff. A couple of years later he was on the other side of the Dark Continent, putting the fear of the British drill sergeant into the hearts of Soudanese troops, and later the fear of death into the Somaliland natives. He was at Port Soudan and Mombassa in 1907 and 1908, and four years later he left the army and came to Canada, making Vancouver his objective.

After serving on the Northwest Mounted Police for some time, he went to South America, and is next seen in his Protean career as a captain in the police force at Chuquibambilla, about 700 kilometres from Antofagasta, on the Bolivian frontier. In 1914 he returned to London, and when the great war broke out joined the 1st Battalion, King's Liverpool Regiment. He was soon in France, and fought at Mons, won the D.C.M., at Givenchy on Christmas Eve, 1914, and was recommended for the Medaille Militaire. He was several times wounded, slightly at Loos and Festubert, and most seriously in the head and legs at Boucourt. He was again recommended for the V. C., but, with soldierly modesty, prefers to touch lightly on the fact.

On January 26th last year he received his discharge from active service, but was soon again in harness, his next appearance being as instructor for three months at El Paso, Texas, to the 5th and 7th American cavalry. In July last he was camp sergeant-major at Vaucartier, and took a party of French-Canadian troops to England. Last year he was in charge of the greatest military pageant ever held in the United States, the Sousa-Lauder parade for the Liberty Loan at Detroit.

Sergt-Major Garrett is at present in a Toronto military hospital, as he is troubled by some of his six old wounds. He is in the prime of life, however, and with his breast adorned with ribbons, looks a fine figure of a British soldier. He is unmarried, and has no relatives in this country, but Lieut. Oswald Lennox, a son of Mr. Justice Lennox, whom he knew in France, is a warm friend.

AN ALLENBY STORY.

Gen. Allenby, the hero of the victorious British campaign in Palestine, is fond of telling a story concerning the guilelessness of a certain Indian soldier of his army.

There is, it appears, a good deal of counterfeit coin in circulation out there, and one day the soldier in question tendered at his canteen a ten-piastre piece which on examination, was found to be bad.

The canteen steward called his attention to the fact, and at his request handed the coin back to him in order that he might examine it.

He turned it over and over, scanning it closely. Then he said, quite innocently:

"You say this coin is counterfeit, sahbi, I think you must be mistaken, for the date upon it, you will observe, is 1900. If it were false, surely it would have been found out before this."

HOCKEN ATTACK CIVIL SERVICE

(Continued from Page One)
Government preferred to play politics rather than to render justice to the French-Canadian soldiers. The French-Canadians had been done a great injustice.

H. C. Hocken.

H. C. Hocken urged the adoption of an old age pensions scheme and unemployment insurance. The fair and legitimate demands of labor would have to be recognized. He would like to see the trades unions strong, for where a trades union was strong, the industry was more likely to be on a basis of regularity. He declared that the policy of the Government with regard to housing was "eminently sound."

In carrying out its policy he made a plea to the Government to establish the principle of personal ownership.

Mr. Hocken said that the men appointed to Pensions Commissions should be men in whom the human interest was strongly developed. They should be as fathers to the disabled men. He thought it was a disgrace to offer a man totally disabled, less than a thousand dollars a year. A thousand dollars, he said, was less than a mechanic's wages today and there was no likelihood of these wages ever being reduced.

He made a strong attack on the Civil Service Commission, he said that twelve months ago he had remarked that a new Civil Service Act would lead the Civil Service with friends of officials. He had hardly expected that his prediction would be so quickly fulfilled. That was what had happened and was happening all along.

He cited the Deputy Postmaster of Toronto. The man most qualified for the work had his appointment held up for months because the next man in authority was a friend of a friend of the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission. Appointments were going by friendship instead of fitness. Advertisements were sent out as a matter of routine and the man was picked for the job before the advertisement was issued.

Mr. Hocken cited also the appointment made of a chief fruit inspector for Western Ontario. The man selected was last election an American citizen. He was the friend of the official. He came from the United States to work for the Canada Food Board. When the Food Board was demobilized another appointment was found for him.

The Civil Service Commission did not have the courage to appoint a superintendent of penitentiaries. They selected three men as a committee to choose and one of the men was known to be hostile to the best qualified man in Canada. The committee threw out all the applications and advertised.

"See how they double-crossed," Mr.

Hocken went on, "how they treat a qualified man who was a returned soldier, who was promoted to Brigadier-General on the field of battle, his application was thrown aside. He has not a friend on the committee. There is no official anxious for his appointment."

Mr. Hocken continued his criticism of the Civil Service Commission when the House resumed in the evening. He objected to the way the Commission delegated its duties to other bodies. Experience proved, he said, the necessity for providing more assistance for the Commission. One of the commissioners was at present in the South, the chairman was not very well and that left only Commissioner Larochelle.

One of the most objectionable practices of the Commission, said Mr. Hocken, was the selection of men to fill positions before the vacancies were advertised. He produced an advertisement for a man to fill the position of Assistant Filing Clerk of Records at a salary of \$1,600 per annum. The qualifications asked for in the advertisement were, said Mr. Hocken, ridiculous in view of the work which had to be done.

The speaker referred to another case in which a man had been notified on February 3 in Halifax that he had been appointed to a certain position, and that applications were asked to be in by the 18th of February.

In closing, Mr. Hocken declared that the patronage system at its worst was better than that prevailing today. He suggested that the Civil Service Act should be amended so that all positions in the outside service should be filled on the suggestion of the member sitting for the constituency in which the vacancy occurred. Personally he did not want to bother with this work but he felt it was the only way to fill the positions in a satisfactory manner. One thing that could be said for the Commission, he asserted, was that it was impartial. He thought that in Ontario more Liberal than Conservative appointments had been made by it.

YORKSHIRE HOGS OF REAL BACON TYPE

Yorkshire hogs are distinctly of the bacon type. They have small hams and shoulders and a large quantity of side meat and do not get excessively fat. This makes it possible to produce an excellent quality of bacon from them and they ordinarily command a premium on the market if shipped in carload lots. The Yorkshires are very prolific and are excellent mothers. They are inclined to be more active than the lard breeds and need better fences. The Yorkshires are to be recommended for regions where corn is grown in a small quantity. Where corn is the principal crop of the farm, the lard breeds prove more profitable.

BOARD FORESTRY PROGRAM IS URGENT

COL. H. S. GRAVES FAVORS A MANDATORY REQUIREMENT OF REGULATED CUTTING OF TIMBER.

Boston, Mass., March 3.—Development of a broad United States program of forestry, that shall include not only the public action necessary to aid and promote forestry, but also a mandatory requirement of fire protection and regulated cutting of timber, was advocated by Col. Henry S. Graves, head of the United States Forest Service, in his address at the dinner of the New England Forestry Congress at the Copley-Plaza. The congress is being held under the auspices of the Boston Chamber of Commerce and the Massachusetts Forestry Association.

"If the war emergency had come 15 years later," said Colonel Graves, "we would have had great embarrassment in obtaining the lumber needed for general construction. Four-fifths of the standing timber in the United States is in private hands and 97 per cent of our wood comes from that source. According to the leaders of the southern pine industry, the original supplies of pine in the South will be exhausted in ten years and within five years not less than 3,000 mills will go out of existence. Pacific Coast timber is already entering eastern markets and this means that the price of home grown timber has risen to a point making it possible to ship lumber 3,000 miles in competition with it."

"The Lake States, which a few years ago were the greatest producers of lumber in the country, are today paying freight bills of about \$6,000,000 a year to bring wood materials from outside sources. Our country is progressively destroying its forests, and the consequences are very far-reaching. The exhaustion of forests is followed by the closing of industries, the steady increase of waste lands, the abandonment of farms that depended for their market on lumber communities and the impoverishment of many regions. No section of the country can afford to have a large part of its lands an unproductive waste with the loss of the taxable values, the loss of industries and the population that would be supported if these lands were productive, nor can it afford to be dependent for its supplies of wood products on another section from 1,000 to 3,000 miles away."

The congress was opened on Monday morning, when a number of important papers relating to forestry were read.

THE LOST INVENTOR.

Th Mysterious Case of Dr. Rudolf Diesel.

Shortly before the war broke out, writes Edwin E. Slosson in the Independent, but when a war was regarded as imminent if not inevitable, Germany's greatest inventor, the man who had inaugurated a revolution in the world's motive power likely to be as important as that achieved by Watt, left Germany for England. But he never arrived.

Dr. Rudolf Diesel took passage at Antwerp on the channel steamer Dresden the night of September 29, 1913. When the vessel arrived at Harwich next morning he was missing and the annual meeting of the Consolidated Diesel Engine Manufacturers at London, which he was to attend on the following day, was held without him. So much the world knows. Everything else is speculation.

Naturally speculation has been abundant. Diesel's disappearance has given rise to as many wild theories as Kitchen's. These theories, such as that he has happened to hear of may be classified in the following way:

Accidentally fell overboard and drowned.

Seized by heart disease and fell overboard.

Pushed overboard by German agents.

Alive and in the service of British Government.

Jumped overboard because of mental breakdown due to insomnia, financial worries, domestic troubles or lack of proper appreciation.

The reader may take his choice of these hypotheses, for there is no proof of any of them and there is evidence against all of them. One other point must be mentioned, though it adds to the mystery instead of clarifying it. That is, that his family at Munich received a telegram announcing his safe arrival in London—but the telegram was sent from Geneva, Switzerland.

Against the hypotheses of hypochondria is that when last seen he appeared cheerful. His family life is said to have been happy. He had broken down from overwork 13 years before, but had apparently recovered. He had suffered from heart failure, but seemed to be alright again. He had not made as much money out of his inventions, as he hoped, but he had accumulated a comfortable competence of two and one-fourth million dollars. He had not received all the credit that he deserved, but the original Diesel engine was installed in the place of honor in the Munich Museum and he had just given to the museum all his drawings and models.

Against the rumor that he is still alive in England is the fact that it is the Germans and not the British who, during the war, as well as before, made greatest use of his invention.

tions. As for the remaining hypothesis, that he was killed or kidnapped by order of the German Government, that rests upon no firmer foundation than our natural inclination to ascribe any devilry to the Germans and the fact that if Diesel's inventive genius had been transferred to the other side it would have been worth more than any army corps to the Allies.

AN AMERICAN ABROAD.

A Candid Confession of a Man In London.

According to an American writer, the American stops boasting when he arrives in London. He stops patting himself on the back and filling the air with ecstatic mispronunciations of Chateau Thierry. The streets are jammed with soldiers—Australians, Arabs, New Zealanders, Canadians, Tommies. They drift by the thousands through Piccadilly and the Strand. They are in all the restaurants and on all buses. Slowly it dawns on the American that "Tipperary" is an older song than "Over There."

This dawn is followed by the sudden realization that there are no black gowned wives and mothers mourning in the streets of London—that there is no haze over the heart of London. Cheerful, crowded, busy London swarms around the American as if there never had been any air raids, any Ypres, any Belgium or any Flanders.

There is only one outstanding oddity in London—woman. Something has happened to her. It is not so much that she wears boots and bloomers and washes restaurant windows, that she tends bar, runs buses, works behind most of the counters in the city or that she smokes in the street. It is that in four years she has grown up into a man. A London woman dares look at the American as she sells him a package of cigarettes and her look is unemphatic. It is not hard. It is the look of one who says, "I belong to the race of human beings and not to the weaker sex." Regarding the London woman the American feels less inclined to boast than ever. Under wooden crosses in France lies a generation of Englishmen. Their women have taken their places in England.

Because the American no longer boasts his way through London the Londoner no longer smiles tolerantly at him. And pocketing his change at the tobacconist the American feels a fellowship that his history and the story of Bunker Hill have never taught him.

AN ANCIENT CHURCH.

The old Church of All Saints in the little village of Witley, in Surrey, England, has often been filled on a Sunday evening with Canadians from the camp, and four of the battalions have deposited their colors in it for safe keeping. Last spring some men of the 134th Battalion started the idea of placing some memorial in the church as a token of the good-will that has existed between them and the villagers. The idea was received with enthusiasm and £77 was quickly subscribed. As a result some oak paneling has been placed all along the south wall of the nave. This wall was built before 1050 A.D., in Anglo-Saxon days, when Edward the Confessor was King. It will bear the following inscription, "To the glory of God, this oak paneling was placed in this ancient church of the Motherland by Canadians in the Witley Camp, 1918. United by loyalty in sacrifice and faith."

On Dec. 6th, the gift was dedicated by the Right Rev. Edward Talbot, Bishop of Winchester, in the presence of the Hon. C. J. Doeherty, Minister of Justice who took the place of Sir Robert Borden, who was prevented from being present. After the Vicar, the Rev. E. J. Newitt had told the story of the gift, the service began with the singing of "O Canada." The bishop made the dedication, other prayers followed for the fallen, for peace and for the Empire.

A Trail Across the Rockies

The first trip over the Simpson Pass through the Canadian Pacific Rockies was made by Sir George Simpson, Governor of the Hudson's Bay Company, in 1841, and formed part of the first recorded land tour round the world, that is to say across the North American Continent, and by way of Siberia and Russia, occupying about nine months, and the subject of considerable literature. Jim Brewster, the famous guide and outfitter at Banff, discovered the fallen tree on the summit of the Pass on which the travellers left their record.

Fired by the ambition to cross this pass, I set out one day this summer, with two guides, ten porters and camping outfit and supplies for 12 or seven days. Jim Brewster set these over from Banff to Invermere at the headwaters of the Columbia Valley, where I had promised to wait for them. Close to Invermere are the remains of Kootenai House, an outpost of the Northwest Trading Company established by David Thompson in 1806. Now there is a comfortable little tourist hotel, much appreciated by motorists who use the excellent Government road through the Upper Columbia Valley.

On our first day's ride we stopped off for a swim at the hot sulphur springs of Sinclair Canyon, where St. John Harmsworth, brother of the famous Lord Northcliffe, and his wife, built a fine and famous bathing pool under the springs which pours its naturally warm water out of the rock. At night we found shelter in a homesteaders' cabin, the owner of which was away at the war and hospitable enough to leave the latch loose. Next day we were in the forests of the Selkirk—a wonderful resort for big game judging by the tracks we saw and the animals we even met—two black bear and a deer on the trail with mouse paths worn deep into small Devonshire lanes along the meadows beside the river.

The Kootenay River had a rather bad reputation. Two parties were drowned in the attempt to make the crossing at the same time, last year, and we ourselves had been

warned to postpone our trip. However, we found a ford where we did not even have to swim our horses, and next day were on the banks of the Vermillion River, into the Vermillion pour the raging torrent of the Simpson, which itself is fed from the melting glaciers of the snow-clad Rockies high above. At least one cyclone seemed to have swept down its valley, and the river itself had washed away several corners so that our trail had to be made, or found anew on many a mile.

Once while Ed. Dawson, the leading guide was backing a trail through a deadfall, his saddle pony took it into its head to cross the torrent. The packponies followed suit, and before we could stop them, our camp, and most of all our food supplies were on the wrong side of the most vicious looking water I ever came to see. There was nothing to do but follow, and evidently we got across—else how could this tale have ever been told? As we approached the Summit of the Pass, one grizzly left a visiting card such as grizzlies do leave—scattered-upon the trail and again we saw deer. The Summit, according to the guides, should be ten feet deep in snow, and the description given by Sir George Simpson gave the same anticipation:—"We were surrounded by peaks and crags on whose summits lay perpetual snow; and the only sounds which disturbed the solitude were the crackling of prostrate branches under the tread of our horses, and the roaring of the stream as it leaped down its rocky course."

About seven hours of hard work brought us to the height of land, the hinge as it were between the eastern and western waters. We breakfasted on the level isthmus, which did not exceed fourteen paces in width, filling our bottles for this one lonely meal at once from the crystal sources of the Columbia and the Saskatchewan, while these willing feeders of two opposite oceans, murmuring over their beds of mossy stones, as if to bid each other a long farewell, could hardly fail to attract our minds to the sublimity of the scene.

From the vicinity of Banff, we estimated the elevation of the height of land to be seven or eight thousand feet above the level of the sea, while the surrounding peaks appeared to rise nearly half that altitude above our heads.

We ourselves found the snow all gone and our horses found water and ample pasture on the valley meadow. As we looked back from the Great Divide upon the mountains of the Selkirk, we had as fine a panorama as any artist could desire—rugged outlines capped and fringed with perpetual snow. The Banff side of the Summit comes within the jurisdiction of the Dominion Government, and its Superintendent of Parks was good enough to provide us with a trail which really was a trail. To the right up Healy Creek we had a glimpse of Mount Asinifoline, the giant of these giant mountains—only a glimpse however, for in a minute his head was caught in a turban of clouds. Thence without adventure except for a plague of mosquitoes we reached the C.P.R. Hotel at Banff, alive with summer tourists who found in our cavalcade a fitting subject for innumerable snapshots.

The fishing, I may say in passing, which one gets on such a trip, is of the very best. Every creek, every pool seems to be stocked with trout, all inquisitive about the nature of the fly. Brown Hackle and Gray Hackle are always deadly. The red flies such as Parmachenee do not seem to take so well in these waters. There were both Belly Varden and Steelhead in our creek on the Simpson, averaging a little over a pound. In the Kootenay the trout ran up to two and three pounds and were very tame. (Search day in the middle of the day—J. M. G.)

OLD TIME SUGAR ON THE GATINEAU

THE FATHERS OF THE HOLY GHOST TAP, 3,500 TREES ON ESTATE AT IRONSIDE

By the first rapid of the turbulent Gatineau, five miles from the Parliament Buildings at Ottawa, in a beautiful forest of pine and hardwood the late Alonzo Wright, M.P., for many years known as the "King of Gatineau," established himself on an estate of some 1,600 acres and kept a baronial hall. Here for many years he was famous for his princely hospitality. He was a grandson of Philémon Wright, the pioneer lumberman of the Ottawa Valley and the first settler in Hull, the site of which town and a great part of the country named after him, was included in the original Wright patent—Alonzo Wright succeeded to the title to some 1,600 acres of the property situated on the East bank of the Gatineau nearly opposite the village of Ironside.

Alonzo Wright, Lumber King of the Gatineau, is no more. His estate has passed from possession of his heirs and assigns. For 14 years it has been the mundane home of the Fathers of the Holy Ghost and St. Alexandre College, where boys are educated for the priesthood. But a beautiful picture of old-time Canada it remains. The racing Gatineau still pours over the rocky slope on the western boundary. An island clothed

with original white pine stands near the eastern shore. Of the 1,600 acres, 300 only are cultivated as a farm, and the college is surrounded by the thick forest—spruce, pine, maples and other hardwoods, including thousands of sugar maples. And a wilderness primal indeed it must have seemed to the reverend fathers from old France, and a striking contrast to Paris, that cosmopolitan centre of European civilization. But they adapted themselves to new conditions in a manner worthy of the traditions of their predecessors, the early Canadian Missionaries. The farm today is well cultivated, thrifty and managed in a thoroughly business-like manner. From the beginning they saw in the maple trees of the estate a resource to be realized upon, and they went about its development in a scientific, practical manner, securing the best authoritative information and acting upon it. Quality they recognized as an essential to success. They therefore, obtained the most modern utensils, they built a commodious sugar house and installed the largest and most approved evaporators, those with corrugated bottoms. They procured spouts of enamelware, tanks of galvanized iron, and tin pails for catching the sap. No wooden pails or troughs were to be permitted to soak up sap and make cleanlines difficult or impossible. Their sugar and syrup soon became famous in the city of Ottawa, and they found a ready market for all they cared to sell. During the sugar season, the maple bush of the Fathers of the Holy Ghost at Ironside is a favorite pilgrimage of the young people from Ottawa and Hull, and many other folk too, who walk or drive from Hull or Gatineau Point to visit the Holy Fathers, make maple taffy in the snow, drink fresh run maple sap and carry home new made maple sugar.

The reverend fathers have erected a big modern college building around the old mansion of the late Mr. Alonzo Wright, which is now completely dwarfed in comparison. The college, residence and farm account for the activities of 250 people.

The maple bush of the Fathers' estate consists approximately of 3,500 maples. Although maple trees are numerous outside that zone, they are at such a distance apart and so far from the sugar house, that tapping them would not be advantageous. The reverend fathers having difficulty in securing sufficient help in the sugar bush conceived the ambitious plan of laying a system of iron pipes to convey the sap to the evaporator. The engineering difficulties were overcome but on putting the system into use it proved impossible to keep the pipes perfectly clean, and the flavor of the syrup was strangely and unfavorably affected. The piping system was, therefore, removed.

"Fourteen or fifteen years experience at Ironside has taught us that to make good syrup the sap must be gathered every day and placed at once in the evaporator," says Reverend Father Joseph Burgstaler the Superior of the college. "The flavor of the syrup soon depends upon how often the sap is gathered. If a nice amber coloring is desired, the evaporation must be done rapidly, the sap being placed in small quantities on a bright steady fire. A mixed fuel of

THE LATE DR. J. M. HARPER

A man's sphere of usefulness in life can never really be considered as ended even when death writes 'Finis' to his story. I feel this is peculiarly true about the late Dr. J. M. Harper. He was old in years but his mind moved with characteristic alertness even up to the last; and as he remarked to me, when I visited him in Quebec a couple of weeks ago, he was glad to have disproven the Osler theory.

A man always keenly bound up with the welfare of his adopted country, while never forgetful of the old land which gave him birth (as witness the frequent affectionate references to Scotland in his published verse) Dr. Harper was one of that fine old school of post-patriots who lend to modern busy life a touch of warm romance.

Nothing was dearer to him than the service of mankind; and in public work and in private action, he lived completely up to the very letter of his creed. He feared God and he honored the King; and that's as much as we can expect from any man.

His play "Champlain" is an admirable historical chronicle-play, and one which may perhaps someday be presented on Canadian soil; in it Dr. Harper showed his rich grasp of ancient lore, mingled with a happy ear for the fall of verse. It was "Champlain" that first brought Dr. Harper and myself in touch with each other. There was some talk about its preparation for early production by me; and we were both looking forward to the early Summer, when closer details were to be talked about. But now, that's all at an end, and the busy brain that conceived "Champlain" is no longer active. "After life's fitful fever he sleeps well."

maple and soft wood we find the best, and on such a fire 140 gallons of sap per hour can be evaporated. With all these precautions we could only obtain a mediocre syrup if we should neglect to keep the utensils used in a state of perfect cleanliness. Frequent and careful washing is of absolute necessity.

"For making first class maple sugar syrup of first quality, carefully filtered and carefully boiled, must be used. Here also two conditions are essential and have no alternatives, namely, cleanliness and rapidity."

The 3,500 trees tapped in the maple bush of the Ironside estate operated by the Fathers yield an average crop of 500 gallons of syrup per year, one gallon of syrup necessitating the tapping of seven trees. One hundred gallons of sap averages 3 1/4 pounds of syrup, the sap therefore, containing 3.25 per cent of syrup. Allowing 13.125 pounds of syrup to a gallon of sap, the proportion of sugar contained in the sap of the maple runs at about 2.24 per cent.

The fathers consume 35 cords of wood each spring in operating their evaporating plant, and allowing for capital disbursed in installation, cost of labor and incidentals, \$2.00 per gallon for syrup and 25 cents a pound for sugar.

AUSTRALIAN HEROES.

A statuary group in the main entrance of Australia house, in London, which was opened by King George recently, is a memorial to the pioneer explorers of the southern continent. It represents Burke and Wills, who, in 1861, with two companions, surveyed the desert from Melbourne to the Gulf of Carpentaria. Only one of the four, King, returned, the other succumbing one after another to the hardships of the journey back. Burke died in the desert, lying with his face to the sky. Wills, the expedition's astronomer, to whose memory an obelisk has been raised in his native town of Totnes, wrote in his diary just before he died: "Though starving on nardoo seed is not unpleasant, I would prefer a little sugar mixed with it."

LOUVAIN GRATEFUL.

Catholic University of Louvain,
Office of the Rector.

Editor Chronicle, Dear Sir,

Now that the defeat of the Central Empires has secured for Belgium with the ending of a painful oppression that has lasted more than four years, restoration in her rights and faculty, after a long silence, of making her voice once more heard, the Catholic University of Louvain is pleased to use its returned freedom of speech in publicly expressing its gratitude towards all those, who in the whole world have sympathized with its sufferings, have stigmatized the crime—of which it has been the victim, have spontaneously organized manifestations, raised contributions and appealed to generosity on behalf of an institution that has so much suffered by the war.

Before the ruins of her incomparable library, among her children reduced to powerlessness by the cavillous invader and by the difficulty of outside communication, the old Alma Mater was justified in asking herself what the future had in store for her. In the midst of her afflictions and of her mournings, she learned one after another the deaths of many of her exiled professors, caused by grief and suffering. She was comforted however by numerous tokens of esteem, sympathy and scientific solidarity reaching her from everywhere and of which some times she could perceive the weakened echoes, though the heavy and oppressing atmosphere with which the brutal foe has surrounded her.

The University of Louvain was not without having heard of scientific celebrities, statesmen, artists, journalists and almost all possessed with an intelligence and a heart condoling with the trials it has experienced, were busy collecting books and contributions for the destroyed library, while others were sheltering

TRAMWAY POWER
FINDS READY MARKET

ADVANCEMENT INDICATED
BY ABSORPTION OF LARQUE
ISSUE NOW BEING MADE.

The Montreal Financial Times says. The great expansion that has occurred in the bond market of the entire Province of Quebec is being reflected in the large demand that has come for the issue now being made of \$7,300,000 of Montreal Tramway and Power Company 5-year, 6 1/2% Gold Notes.

During the past few years there has been a marked development of the bond business in this Province, and the success that several French-Canadian houses have had in the handling of municipal issues resulted in their being confident enough in the local situation to undertake to understand the large re-financing plan now being carried out by the Montreal Tramways and Power Co.

As has been the case in previous issues, the Bank of Hochelaga was closely associated with the leading French-Canadian firms and in the present instance, in order to have available as large a market as possible, the well-known English firm of Hanson Bros. and the Montreal Securities Corporation were included. The Tramway-Power notes are being issued at a rate to yield 6 1/2 per cent on the investment, a price that makes them particularly attractive to the special market that has been established throughout the Province of Quebec.

The announcement that such large and important corporation financing was being carried out by the local houses, and that it was the intention to market practically the entire issue in the local field, caused considerable surprise. Those, however, who had followed closely the development of the markets here, readily recognized that a big market had been established.

The financing that has been carried out is rendered all the more attractive because of the close relationship that is established by the present franchise of the Tramways Company between the city of Montreal and the Tramways corporation as the city practically guarantees 6 percent on the capital of the company, included in which according to the statement of the issuing houses, is the present issue.

All the larger French-Canadian houses which have been mainly responsible for the developments of the bond market in this Province are identified with the present issue, included among them being Versailles, Vidrecaire, Boulaix, Limited; Rene T. Leclerc; L. G. Beaubien and Company; Credit-Canadien, Incorporated, and Beausoleil, Limited.

The English firms, as mentioned above are Messrs. Hanson Bros., and the Montreal Securities Corporation.

SOME FISH NOT EATABLE.

WAR WIDOWS REMARRYING

War widows are making the best of misfortunes and many are taking unto themselves other husbands. Information forthcoming from the Board of Pension Commissioners shows that a great many women who have lost their husbands at the front are remarrying. War widows who remarry are given a gratuity of \$420, which amount is paid to them in a lump sum. This is the equal of one year's pension, ordinarily paid in monthly instalments to widows. Then the Government ceases to have further responsibility for the widow, though the pension allowed to each of her children continues, in the case of a girl, until she attains the age of seventeen years, and in the case of a boy, until he reaches sixteen years of age.

The University will never forget that, as Mr. Imbart de la Tour has so eloquently told his hearers at that memorable Havre meeting in August, 1918 "the whole elite of the civilized world has gathered because a crime has been committed against mind," and "by but one unanimous gesture has resolved to blot it out."

SHIPPING NEWS

NEW CUNARDERS TO
HAVE DUAL PURPOSEWILL BE COMBINATION OF
PASSENGER AND CARGO-
CAPACITY.

Much interest has been taken by
shipping men in the recent statement
of Sir Ashley Sparks, head of the
Cunard Company on this side of the
water, that the type of boat to be
built by the Line in the immediate
future would be an improved Tuscan-
ia or Franconia. "The outstanding
feature of the new boats," said Sir
Ashley, "will be a combination of pas-
senger and cargo-carrying capacity.
It is difficult to say more than this
just now, as the details will depend
upon architects' plans and many other
considerations, but speaking generally
economy of operation is the point
aimed at."

"Probably," continued Sir Ashley,
"the new boats will be oil-burners.
Not only that, but there is a possi-
bility of our converting other vessels
into oil-burners. There is very little
doubt in my mind that the marine oil-
burner has a big future before it.
It is likely that our new boat, to
some extent at any rate, will be built
with the geared turbine."

The Franconia, the larger of the
two boats mentioned by Sir Ashley,
was one of the many large Cunarders
lost in the war. She was built in 1911
at Newcastle-on-Tyne by Swan, Hun-
ter & Wigham Richardson, and had a
gross tonnage of 18,150 tons. She
had quadruple reciprocating engines
driving her twin screws and her di-
mensions were 600.3 feet long, 71.3-
foot beam and 40.4 feet d.p. She
had three decks and a shelter deck.

From 8,000 to 9,000 tons of cargo
could be loaded on the Franconia and
her passenger accommodation was as
follows: Saloon, 350; cabin, 400, and
third class, 2,000; total, 2,750. When
it is recalled that the huge Aquitania
carries less than 2,000 tons of cargo
the economy of vessel like the Fran-
conia is apparent. There will, of
course, also be an enormous economy
in coal consumption, as vessels of the
Mauritania class consume about 1,000
tons of coal a day.

The Tuscania, the other boat men-
tioned by Sir Ashley, was one of the
few troopships lost during the war.
She was torpedoed just about a year
ago, with considerable loss of life.
The Tuscania was built in 1914, at
Glasgow, by A. Stephen & Sons, and
had a gross tonnage of 13,348 tons.
Her cargo carrying capacity was
about 6,200 deadweight tons. She
was 549.3 feet long, 66.5 feet in
breadth and 41.7 feet in depth. Four
geared turbines drove her twin screws
She had four decks and a shelter deck.

The purchase from the British Gov-
ernment by the Cunard Company was
announced last month of six standard
steel cargo steamers of from 6,000 to
7,000 deadweight carry capacity. With
its various subsidiaries, Funch, Edey
& Co., the Anchor Line, the Common-
wealth & Dominion Line, etc., the Cun-
ard bids fair to occupy ere long the
boasted position of the Hamburg-
American Company, whose motto
was: "The World is my Field."

STATE CANALS OPEN
TO PRIVATE LINESNEW YORK WATERWAYS NOW
FREE OF GOVERNMENT
OPERATION AND CONTROL

Albany, N. Y., March 3.—New
York State canals are to be free of
government operation and control
and independent canal lines are to
be permitted to fix their own carry-
ing rates, Lewis Nixon, Superinten-
dent of Public Works, announces.

This decision was reached follow-
ing a conference with Edward
Chambers, director of traffic of the
Railroad Administration, and G. A.
Tomlinson, director of inland wa-
terways. Federal officials propose
soon to announce the rates for
freight to be carried by a govern-
ment line of ninety-two barges to be
operated on the canal next summer,
but independent lines probably will
fix their rates on a lower basis than
those of the government.

The decision of the government not
to interfere with the State operation
or control of the canal will remove
some of the difficulties which have
stood in the way of private capital
entering the canal transportation
business, Mr. Nixon stated.

Mr. Nixon also announced that
federal officials had assured him in-
dependent lines would be given equal
opportunities with the government
lines in through routing of freight
and in joint rates between canal
lines and rail or water lines con-
trolled by the government.

IS GERMANY HARD UP?

There is some difference of opinion
as to whether the Germans are as
short of metals as they would lead
one to suppose, and there are many
who believe that they are busily en-
gaged at present, by the aid of child
and alien labor, in turning out hollow
ware, bedstead tubing and fittings,
brass foundry (or, rather, zinc-fund-
dry) tanks, cisterns and so forth, so
as to be in a position to rush sup-
plies into overseas markets as soon
as peace is declared, and to seek to
regain their lost commercial position
at the earliest moment.

It is even thought by some that
Germany's alleged scarcity of tex-
tiles, etc., is a piece of industrial
"camouflage," and that the people
are wearing paper clothing and us-
ing paper and nettle fibres for the
weaving of coarse cloths, strings and
sacking in order that every scrap of
cotton and woollen material in the
country can be made up into piece
goods or shoddies for sending over-
seas at the first available opportu-
nity.

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Financial and Commercial News

CLOSING LETTERS BY THE CANADIAN PRESS

(By Canadian Press)

New York, N. Y., March 3.—The week in the Stock Market opened with another broad speculative inquiry, rails sharing liberally in the general advance, which assumed its most substantial proportions, however, in specialties representing the motor industry.

Strengthening of local bank reserves, the latest political and industrial developments helped to sustain the bullish movement being neutralized in a measure by a slight falling off in western railroad tonnage and further uncertainty in that section regarding trade conditions.

United States Steel provided the market's firmest foundation, reflecting more demand than any period since the extra common dividend was cut. Steel made an extreme advance of 1-1/2 points to 94 5/8, forfeiting only a fraction at the close.

Kelly-Springfield Tire made a new top of its further rise of four points to 118 3/4. General Motors held most of its five point rise and the pools in Baldwin Locomotive, Continental Can, Industrial Alcohol and Montana Power, lifted those shares three to five points.

Leather, Tobacco, Sugar and oil stocks yielded part of their one to four point rise. Mexican Petroleum and Royal Dutch falling back in the final hour, when the usual releasing for profits caused moderate reactions.

Low-priced rails, including Western Pacific Common and Preferred, Rock Island, and Pittsburg, and West Virginia, were no less strong than issues of the calibre of Reading and Canadian Pacific but shipings and Coppers were backward.

Sales amounted to 775,000 shares. Foreign bonds held steady, but the several domestic groups, including Liberty issues, were irregular within restrictive limits. Total sales, (par value), aggregated \$13,200,000.

Old United States bonds were unchanged on call.

Events are occurring and history is being made so fast that it is foolish to give more than a temporary opinion.

New York, March 3.—The opening of the stock market today offered quite a contrast to the state of affairs that existed at the close of last week from a declining tendency due to weak and realising, the market opened today with renewed buying power. Initial prices were at a much improved level, with a particular interest centered in the standard railroads, tobacco, rubber, oils and specialties. Shipping and copper groups were less favored, however, and showed little change in market value with trading in them on a small scale. As the session progressed trading developed considerably, however, under a buying movement that added further substantial gains in prices. During the afternoon the low priced railroads showed noteworthy activity, as a result of heavy buying driven by the fact that Colorado and Southern, Erie, Pennsylvania and Pittsburgh and West Virginia, while price had declined, showed the day offered trading opportunities, reactions in the late afternoon were more pronounced. However, this was due more to profit taking than to any unfavorable news and no impairment of the market's undertone was indicated. On the whole, the action of the market today was highly encouraging and the buying of securities appeared to be of a confident character.

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MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Friday the 28th Feb., 1919

Present: His Worship the Mayor, Aldermen: Bedard, Bertrand, Bouchard, Bouchard, Collier, Fiset, Gauvin, Lantier, Lesage, Martin and Seguin.—11.

The minutes of the last meeting being submitted, Alderman Fiset points out a difference in the mention made of his motion and of Ald Bertrand adopted in the report of the council sitting as a committee of the whole and the same motion adopted at the regular sitting of the council which adopts the report of the committee of the whole concerning the appointment of a manager for the Quebec Exhibition.

Reference being made to the original of the minutes of the said meeting of the council, it is found that the error is corrected in the original of the said minutes. And the said minutes are adopted.

Read a letter from Mr. L. A. Campbell, acting city clerk of the city council of Calgary, enclosing copy of resolution adopted by their council, asking cooperation of the city council of Quebec to obtain that the government of Canada provide that returned soldiers wishing discharge be granted an adequate living and suitable work be found for the said soldiers. Ordered that the said letter lay on the table.

Read a letter from Mr. F. J. Dorval, asking the council to insist that the stoppage of the tramway cars be continued at the corner of St. Dominique and Des Pesses Streets. Ordered that the said letter lay on the table.

Read a petition of the Quebec City police constables asking that the council grant official recognition of policemen's federal Labor Union No. 64, which they have recently organized and enumerating eighteen different demands which they ask the council to grant them. Referred to the police-fire committee.

Read a petition of the fire-department employees, National Union asking recognition of the Union which they have recently formed and stating the different demands and privileges which they ask to the Council of the City of Quebec. Referred to the police-fire committee.

Read a letter from the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, local 730, enclosing resolution in support of the demand made by the members of the police force. Referred to the police-fire committee.

Presented the Following Reports of the Finance Committee

Finance No. 114th. To authorize the sale of a lot of land to the Imperial Oil Co., Ltd. Moved by Alderman Collier, seconded by Alderman Gauvin and resolved: That the said report be inscribed on the order of the day.

Finance No. 115th. Recommending to pass a new by-law, to regulate the establishment where aerated water, mild liquors, temperance beer and wines in retail are sold, and enclosing draft of said by-law. Moved by Alderman Collier, seconded by Alderman Seguin and resolved: That the said report be inscribed on the order of the day.

Finance No. 116th. To transfer certain amounts from the credit of one department to another. Moved by Alderman Collier, seconded by Alderman Bedard and resolved: That the said report be inscribed on the order of the day.

Finance No. 117th. Recommending that the council give its assent to the granting of an Act of Incorporation to a certain club under the name of "Club Amis." Moved by Alderman Collier, seconded by Alderman Martin and resolved: That the said report be inscribed on the order of the day.

Finance No. 118th. To lease a certain lot of land for one year, to the "Archer Coal Co." Moved by Alderman Collier, seconded by Alderman Bouchard (J.C.) and resolved: That the said report be inscribed on the order of the day.

Finance No. 119th. To authorize the treasurer to redeem forty shares of permanent stock which belong to Mr. Raymond. Moved by Alderman Collier, seconded by Alderman Bedard and resolved: That the said report be inscribed on the order of the day.

1st Order of the day.—Notice of motion by Alderman Bedard, to appoint committee to investigate the prices of certain food stuffs, especially bread and meat. With the consent of the council the said notice of motion is dropped.

2nd Order of the day.—Notice of motion, by Alderman Fiset, Alderman Bertrand and the council hereby appoints a special committee who will be entrusted with the revision of salaries. Said committee to be composed of His Worship the Mayor, ex-officio, Aldermen: Collier, Bedard, Bouchard, (S.R.) Gauvin and Bertrand and the said motion being put to the vote, Alderman Bouchard (S.R.) moves seconded by Alderman Martin. 4th Order of the day.—Read the 114th report of the finance committee, which being put to the vote is adopted and it is resolved: That this council authorizes the sale to the Imperial Oil Co., Ltd., of a portion of land, measuring 16,370.83 superficial feet, at twenty cents a foot, for the sum of \$3,254.19, as shown on plan annexed to the 112th report of the finance and by-law committee, provided the said company shall erect a building on said land. And His Worship the Mayor is authorized to sign a contract to that effect, and the said 112th report is hereby cancelled.

Read the 115th report of the finance committee, together with draft of by-law, therein enclosed, concerning good-order, said report being put to the vote is adopted and it is ordered: That the enclosed by-law be now read for the first time, and the said by-law is then read for the first time, and it is moved by Alderman Collier, seconded by Alderman Seguin and resolved: That the said by-law No. 141a be translated in English and published in the official newspapers of the city, together with a public notice, that it shall be read for the second time and submitted for adoption at the next meeting of this council.

6th Order of the day.—Read the 116th report of the finance committee, which being put to the vote is adopted and it is resolved: That the following sums of money be transferred respectively to the credit of departments as follows:—The sum of \$100,000, presently to the credit of must be carried to the credit of Contingents. The sum of \$50, now to the credit of protestant assessors is carried to the credit of ground rents.

7th Order of the day.—Read the 117th report of the finance committee, which being put to the vote is adopted and it is resolved: That the council hereby authorizes His Worship the Mayor to sign a deed of lease for a piece of land on Dorchester street, on the new market, measuring 100 feet frontage, on the River St. Charles, for one year, beginning the first of May 1919, to the 30th of April 1920, for the sum of \$350 per year. Said land to be limited to the sidewalk to be built by the department of public works. The tenant binding himself to remove the snow and to accept such conditions that His Worship the Mayor and the city engineer shall stipulate on the deed of lease, and the 117th report of the finance committee is hereby annulled.

paid to the amount of \$3264.19 on the proceeds of the sale of land to the Imperial Oil Co., and the balance \$1535.81 to be charged to special account No. 2.

Questions Being Called

Alderman Seguin asks: What progress has the city made relating to the tramway extension in Limoilou ward?

After some discussion, Alderman Fiset moves, seconded by Alderman Bertrand and it is resolved: That this council hereby appoints a delegation composed of His Worship the Mayor, the pro-mayor, and chairman of the road committee, Alderman Bouchard, (J.C.) Seguin, and Mr. Ballarge, city engineer to meet Mr. Lynch, manager of the O. R. L. & Power Co. and the directors to ascertain what definite answer they are prepared to give on the subject of the extension of the electric tramway on Charlesbourg and Beauport Roads, as the city intend to improve the said road ways.

Alderman Seguin asks, Whether the city has obtained from the Canadian Northern Railway, the land necessary for the crossing of the Beauport Road in order to allow the laying of railway tracks on the tramway and the permanent paving works, proposed on the said road.

By Alderman Martin: 1.—How many children have been admitted in the charitable institutions subsides by the city of Quebec in the course of the year 1918?

2.—Is it true that the city will be required to pay an additional sum of \$10,000 for the maintenance of those children?

3.—Regarding the admission of those children, have all the formalities required by law, be faithfully accomplished?

4.—Is it true that a large number of these children for whom the city is called upon to pay belong to families who are well enough able to pay for the maintenance of those children?

It is then moved by Alderman Bedard, seconded by Alderman Gauvin, and it is resolved: That when this council shall adjourn, it stand adjourn until Friday the 14th of March next. Adjourned.

NASH WAR RECORD.

Third Largest Industry in America Played Stupendous Amount of War Work.

Business may well be proud of the part it played in winning the war, and among the industries at the very top of the list, of those which helped is the automobile business. Unquestionably, all manufacturers of motor cars did their best—as did other manufacturers with hardly an exception. The part played by the Nash Motors Company, of Kenosha, added no small quota to the stupendous amount of war work done by this third largest industry in America.

Immediately, the entire plant was placed at the disposal of the war department—more than 100 acres over trained motor car builders, the engineering staff, the entire force were at the service, in whole or part of the Government, to use as it saw fit.

Huge contracts were placed with the Nash Motors Company by the Government, and the Nash Motors Company made good in each contract, delivering quads on the schedule time called for by the Government.

Nash quads made good wherever they were put, under most difficult conditions. So much so, in fact, that no less than three other plants were engaged to build them.

Next the most important C. W. Nash, President of the Nash Motors Company, one of the leaders in quantity production in the United States, at the urgent request of the Government, closed his desk in Kenosha at the time of the reorganization of the aircraft board and took charge of engineering and production of aircraft: from then until the signing of the armistice, on November 11.

When it comes to employees actually in the military service of the country, Nash Motors again ranks high. Five hundred and sixty-two men from the factory men in Kenosha were in the various military forces during the war. Of these eight were commissioned officers and 554 were enlisted men.

The Nash car, which won popularity so quickly after it was introduced to the public, is handled in Quebec by Legare Automobile Limited. Exceptional opportunities are given for inspecting the models during opening week.

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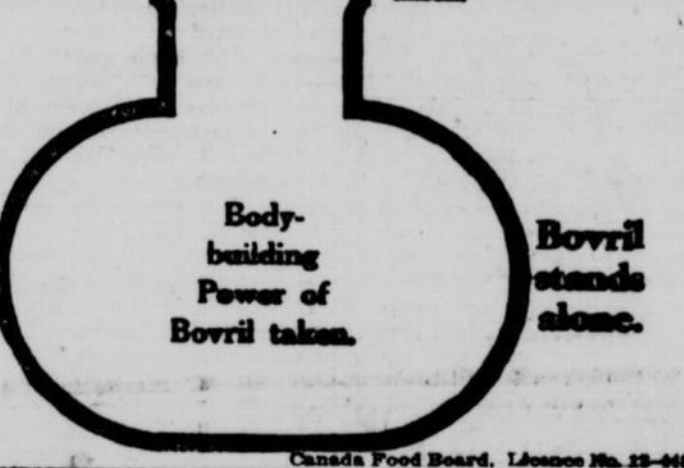


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
