

GERMAN ATTACK ON AISNE FRONT REPULSED WITH LOSSES AND NO RESULTS WERE ATTAINED

Effort Was Made to Recapture Trenches Taken on Saturday. Artillery Actions Are Spirited East of Rheims. Two Hun Airplanes and Captive Balloon Brought Down by French Pilots. Nothing Special to Report From Franco-Belgian Front. Fighting in Southern Moldavia is Desperate. Russians and Rumanians Offer Valiant Resistance.

GERMAN ATTACKS FUTILE.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

PARIS, August 13.—The Germans attacked last night on the Aisne front in an effort to recapture trenches taken by the French on Saturday. Today's official statement says they were repulsed with losses.

LONDON, August 13.—"There is nothing special to report from the Franco-Belgian front," says today's official communication.

FRENCH OFFICIAL STATEMENT

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

PARIS, Aug. 13.—The French official announcement follows:

"Between Cerny and Craonne the enemy's artillery developed pronounced activity, especially in the sector south of Ailles. The Germans attacked in vain at the point at which we captured trenches on August 11. They were repulsed with losses and obtained no result.

"In the Champagne east of Rheims in the regions of the Casque and the Teton, and on the left bank of the Meuse there were spirited artillery actions. Two surprise attacks by the enemy, at Caurieres wood and Bezonvaux, were repulsed by our fire. Elsewhere the night was calm. Two German airplanes, and a captive balloon were brought down yesterday by our pilots. Three other enemy machines were forced to land, having been severely damaged.

HAND-TO-HAND FIGHTING ON BRITISH FRONT

British Front in France and Belgium, August 13.—Hand-to-hand fighting on the most furious nature, in which bayonets and clubbed rifles were utilized, developed in the Glencorse Wood Saturday as a result of a German counter-attack by which the enemy retook the southeastern portion of this elevation. Glencorse Wood was the southern extremity of the line taken by the British in Friday's offensive, and owing to the fact that it overlooked the surrounding country, the Germans determined to regain it at any cost.

Yesterday's counter-attack was most determined. The Germans preceded their infantry advance by an intense bombardment from guns of all calibres and then sent troops forward under a heavy barrage. The Germans were met by a strong fire by the British artillery, and, as they approached the wood, were mowed down in large numbers by machine-gun fire. But the expenditure of life did not enter into the German calculations. They were willing to pay the price for this important position, through a rain of death until the wood itself was reached.

USED RIFLES AS CLUBS. Two British battalions, the Queen's Royal West Surrey and the Bedfordshire, made a valiant fight against the numerically superior forces of the enemy, but were forced gradually to withdraw, battling every inch of the way with their bayonets and using their rifles as clubs. In the northwest portion of the wood, however, they made such a determined stand that the en-

emy was unable to continue his advance, and the British retained possession of it. The German losses were exceedingly heavy, being greatly in excess of the British casualties. The Westhoek ridge position, which the British took on Friday morning, has been held against numerous German counter-attacks, and the line now extends along the forward crest of the ridge, with its left on the Ypres-Roulers railway and with the right merging into the Glencorse Wood. German prisoners say that they were taken by surprise in Friday's offensive, and that the British were upon them before they were aware that an attack was impending. The fighting along the ridge and in the Glencorse Wood on Friday was most bitter and sanguinary, a large part of the ridge being taken with the bayonet. Heavy casualties were inflicted on the defenders. At one strongly-defended point, the Germans withstood the British for three hours with machine-gun fire, and then the position was rushed by the attackers, the Germans being forced out.

FIGHTING IS DESPERATE IN SO. MOLDAVIA

LONDON, Aug. 13.—In Southern Moldavia the desperate fighting between the Russo-Rumanians and the Germans continues with increasing ferocity.

Field Marshal von Mackensen is using strong forces in an endeavor to break through the Entente line toward the railroad junction of Teutchiu. The Russians and Rumanians are resisting valiantly the numerical superiority of the enemy, but have been forced to give up, at least temporarily, their positions along the railroad line north of Pokshant. A Russo-Rumanian retirement to the villages of Maraschti and Furtzen, on the Sereth River, is reported by Petrograd. In counter-attacks preceding their retreat the Russians and Rumanians took 1,200 German prisoners. Berlin says that von Mackensen's troops withstood strong attacks and captured more than 6,700 prisoners, as well as eighteen cannon and 61 machine guns.

Around Cona, northwest of Pokshant and near the Transylvanian border there has been intense fighting, with the Teutons forcing a Rumanian retirement northward to Cona. As a counter-move to the Teuton offensive, the Russians have assumed the initiative in an attack at the confluence of the Buzen and Sereth rivers, southeast of Pokshant and in the region of Galatz. Part of the Teuton positions were captured by the Russians, who also took some prisoners, four cannon and eight machine guns. Elsewhere on the eastern front, in Northern Rumania, in Bukowina and on the Russo-Galician frontier there has been no marked activity.

TWO GERMAN AIR RAIDERS BROUGHT DOWN

Machines Were Returning From Bombing English Watering Coast Towns.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) LONDON, Aug. 13.—Two of the German machines which yesterday evening raided the English southeast coast watering-places were destroyed by British naval airplanes. The official statement issued by the Government today says that one of the machines was a Gotha airplane and the other a seaplane.

TWENTY-THREE KILLED AND 50 WERE WOUNDED

LONDON, Aug. 13.—Twenty-three persons, including nine women and six children, were killed and fifty persons were injured, at Southend, in Sussex, 40 miles east of London, by bombs dropped by German raiders yesterday, says an official statement issued last night. Considerable damage to property was caused at Southend by the nearly forty bombs dropped upon the town. Two men were injured at Rochford, but four bombs dropped on Margate, in Kent, 30 miles southeast of London, did little damage. The latest statement follows:

"Enemy raiders caused considerable damage at Southend, where they dropped about forty bombs. The casualties thus far reported are: killed, eight men, nine women, six children. About fifty people were injured. At Rochford, two men were injured, but no damage is reported. At Margate four bombs were dropped. One uninhabited house was demolished, but there were no casualties."

British aviators pursued the raiders out to sea. There were about 20 hostile airplanes in the raiding party. Unofficial telegrams received from Southend shortly before midnight say that the deaths there now are known to have been mostly those of women and children. Two airplanes were over the town about ten minutes, firing aerial torpedoes as well as dropping bombs. Seventeen houses along one street were damaged without a single casualty.

READY FOR ENEMY.

LONDON, Aug. 13.—Reports from several of the East Coast towns concerning yesterday's air raid say our machines were up awaiting the enemy at various points. At one place our machines were doing evolutions in the air while waiting. The enemy was unable to penetrate inland.

U.S. STEAMER CITY OF ATHENS A TOTAL LOSS

Passengers, Which Included Seven Missionaries, Land at an African Port.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) NEW BEDFORD, Mass., August 13.—The loss of the American steamer City of Athens and the rescue and landing at an African port of all the passengers was announced in a cable message received last night in this city from a South African port. No details of the mishap were given. The message simply stated: "All passengers saved. Everything lost."

The steamer was bound from an American port and had seven missionaries on board representing a local religious organization. Among the passengers were Douglas Hume, Ottawa, and Mr. and Mrs. Arthur R. Hornby and baby of this city. The City of Athens registered 9000 tons and was owned by the American Navigation Company.

EXCESSIVE AUTO PLEASURE TRIPS

U.S. Government May Take Drastic Action to Save Gasoline.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Warning of the possibility of drastic action by the American Government to stop excessive pleasure use of automobiles during the war in order that the gasoline needs of the United States and its allies may be met, is given in a statement issued by Director Vao H. Manning, of the Bureau of Mines today in which he asks the co-operation of automobile owners in stopping the practice. Enough gasoline to care for the requirements of America and perhaps that of its allies will be saved, in the opinion of Mr. Manning, if automobile owners of the country will stop unnecessary and extravagant pleasure riding, and if owners and dealers handle this fuel in a careful and economical manner.

FATAL AERO ACCIDENTS.

CAMP BORDEN, ONT., August 13.—Cadet A. Heylar, of the Royal Flying Corps, was killed in the wreck of his aeroplane Saturday morning. His home was in Midland. The victim of another aeroplane accident has just died in the camp hospital. He is Cadet Reginald Walker, banked his machine too steeply on a turn, and crashed to the ground from a height of about 600 feet. He was the son of Rev. R. E. Walker, of Victoria, B.C.

FILM HITS SLACKERS AND PACIFISTS HARD

"Womanhood, the Glory of the Nation," Uncomfortable for Those Who Won't Fight.

"Womanhood, the glory of the Nation," is the title of a remarkable picture, which has been shown at the Premier Theatre during the past few days, the concluding performance being last evening. The producers of the film are the same as brought out the "Battle Cry of Peace" film some time ago and the purpose the same, namely to arouse the American nation to action in the war, to shame the slackers and silence the pacifists.

The production in its representation of its battle scenes was more remarkable than its predecessor. The Rumanians (Germans) who had captured New York, Philadelphia and all the Eastern States, were finally destroyed or expelled by the aroused American people, and through their inventive genius, which brought into use new and destructive instruments of warfare, the name implies, the women of America played an important part in the production taking the lead in patriotic action and arousing the men to cast aside selfish considerations and place themselves at the disposal of the State to defend the Nation.

The example of Canada in sending 400,000 men out of a population of 8,000,000, was prominently referred to and reviews of Canadian troops shown as an inspiration to Americans just entering the war.

The slackers, cowards, pacifists, and all who argue that their country is not in danger are severely arraigned and classed with Benedict Arnold and other traitors to the nation.

BRITAIN TAKES OVER CROP OF COTTON SEED.

GERMAN SOCIALISTS WILL ENLIGHTEN BRITISHERS.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) LONDON, Aug. 13.—Commenting on the decision of the British labor council to send delegates to the Socialist meeting at Stockholm, Vorwarts, the Socialist organ of Berlin says, according to a despatch to the Exchange Telegram Company:

"We hope when the delegates arrive that they will understand their mission in quite a different spirit from that indicated by Henderson. They must understand that it is impossible for them to preach a continuation of the war by giving German minority Socialists additional evidence against the German Government. One single discussion with the Germans will show the English how native they are. This is an advance we hope for from the coming discussion. Therefore, we rejoice in this step forward. It cannot remain the only step."

CONDITION OF AMERICAN JEWS IS DEPLORABLE

State of Refugees Arriving in Switzerland From Palestine Arouse Indignation of Press.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) GENEVA, Aug. 13.—The Swiss press is indignant over the condition of American Jews from Palestine and Syrian towns who have arrived in Switzerland after eight weeks of constant travelling under terrible conditions. La Suisse says: "We have seen many unfortunate refugees of several nationalities pass through our country, but never have they been so miserable as the Americans."

The Zurich Zeitung says the old men, women and children among the refugees had been unable to change their linen for eight weeks, and that the majority of them were covered with vermin. They also were half starved. The American consular service in Switzerland is taking care of the refugees, many of whom will not be able to continue their voyage to America for some time, owing to bad health. The blame for the condition of the refugees is placed on the Austrian and Turkish governments.

PREMIER WILL MAKE REPLY TO HENDERSON

Ex-Minister to Demand Production of Negotiations With Russia Over Stockholm Conference.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) LONDON, Aug. 13.—A statement by Arthur Henderson, the Labor leader, and minister without portfolio in the British War Council, who resigned Saturday, was expected to be made this afternoon in Parliament, and it was assumed that Premier Lloyd George would reply immediately. It was reported that Mr. Henderson would demand the production of all communications between the British and Russian Governments with reference to the Stockholm conference with a view to showing that the Premier put a wrong interpretation on the Russian telegram he quoted in a letter to Mr. Henderson. If the House of Commons endorses the demand, a secret session is likely to be held for the communication of certain documents.

BRITISH DELEGATES CAN NOT GO TO STOCKHOLM.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) LONDON, August 13.—Andrew Bonar Law, the Government spokesman in the House of Commons, told the members of the Lower House this afternoon that the Government had decided that persons mission to attend the International Socialist Conference at Stockholm would not be granted to British delegates.

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MINISTER OF MILITIA DOES NOT ANTICIPATE TROUBLE FROM SENATE AMENDMENTS.

CAMP BORDEN, Ont., August 13.—"We are going to put the conscription bill into force right away," declared Sir Edward Kemp, Minister of Militia, who Saturday afternoon paid his first visit this year at Camp Borden. Sir Edward said he did not anticipate any difficulty from Senate amendments.

Regarding his visit to Camp Borden, he stated that it bore no special significance. He was merely up to see the camp and the improvements made since last year, and was well satisfied with everything he had seen.

"It is a splendid camp, worth every cent of the money we have spent on it," declared Sir Edward Kemp, who was accompanied by Major-General Gwatkin, Chief of the General Staff, and Major Bristol, of Militia Headquarters.

In the afternoon the camp of the Flying Corps was visited, where the party was received by Col. Hoare, R.F.C. "It is a most complete plant doing splendid work," was the Minister's comment.

Major-General John Hughes motor-ed back with the party, Major-General Mewburn having left somewhat earlier in the afternoon.

GREEK BILL TO PURGE NAVY.

ATHENS, Greece, Aug. 13.—A bill has been introduced into the Greek Chamber establishing a naval commission to investigate the qualifications of officers up to the rank of captain. Cases of officers of higher rank will be submitted to the Cabinet, with a view to purging the Navy of undesirable elements.

CHINA TO INCLUDE AUSTRIA.

PEKING, China, Aug. 13.—It is believed that in her declaration of war with Germany China will include Austria. If, however, no definite war declaration with Austria is made, there will undoubtedly, it is said, be a rupture of relations.

RUSSIAN GOVERNMENT MAY ORDER EVACUATION OF IDLE ELEMENT IN PETROGRAD

To Ameliorate Food Shortage Such Action is Absolutely Necessary. Economic Situation Growing More Serious. Measure Will Remove From Capital Section of Population That Fosters Disorders and Who Are Responsible for Recent Uprisings.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

PETROGRAD, August 13.—A partial evacuation of Petrograd by idle and non-productive elements of the population in order to alleviate the economic situation which daily is becoming more acute, was favorably considered by the Government at a conference yesterday and the question referred to the Minister for his approval.

In order to ameliorate the food shortage such a measure is absolutely necessary, according to the conclusions reached by the government. The order of evacuation, if promulgated, and it is likely that it will be, will provide for the transfer of all institutions and individuals not productively engaged in Petrograd or necessary to the economic or official life of the city. The measure will aim to remove from the capital the burden of the idle parasite populations which foment disorders and which, to a great extent, was responsible for the recent uprisings. Schools probably will be included among the institutions transferred from that city.

A special permit designating the business of the bearer will be required of persons entering the city.

COSSACKS URGE DELAY IN ELECTIONS.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) PETROGRAD, August 12.—The general allied council of Cossack troops had addressed a memorandum to Premier Kerensky urging him to defer the election for the constitution assembly. The plea of the Cossacks is made on the ground that "A population weakened by a long disorganization of power generally shows signs of inertia," and because a third of the Cossack population is at the front and cannot participate in the elections.

NEW COMMANDER ON WESTERN FRONT.

PETROGRAD, Aug. 13.—General Baloneff, commanding the southwestern front, has been appointed to the command of the Russian armies on the western (Russian) front. General Dinkino, at present commander on the west front, has been transferred to the command of the southwestern front.

CONSCRIPTION TO BE APPLIED RIGHT AWAY

Minister of Militia Does Not Anticipate Trouble From Senate Amendments.

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MAYOR CURLEY OF BOSTON IN SHERBROOKE

His worship, Mayor Curley, of Boston, was in the city for an hour yesterday en route to Quebec and was shown around the city by vice-president E. J. Page, of the Sherbrooke Board of Trade and Mrs. Page.

The Mayor was accompanied by his secretary, Mr. Power, and one of the Canadian highlanders, and was going to Quebec on invitation of the highlanders, who were entertained recently in Boston. He will spend three or four days in the ancient Capital.

Mr. Curley expressed much interest in Sherbrooke and particularly with regard to the extensive industries and attractive residential districts. In the hour at his disposal he was taken through the principal section and did not fail to observe that Sherbrooke had its street problems as well as Boston. He said Boston had spent \$10,000,000 on paving in the last year and did not have good streets yet.

Speaking of the war, Mayor Curley said the United States was making tremendous preparations and would send very large forces to the European battlefields. The selective draft was working well and would get the men. The great mistake was that it had not been applied two years earlier. The time for the United States to have acted was following the Lusitania outrage.

Mayor Curley promised to make a special trip to Sherbrooke later, and said he would be pleased to address a Board of Trade gathering.

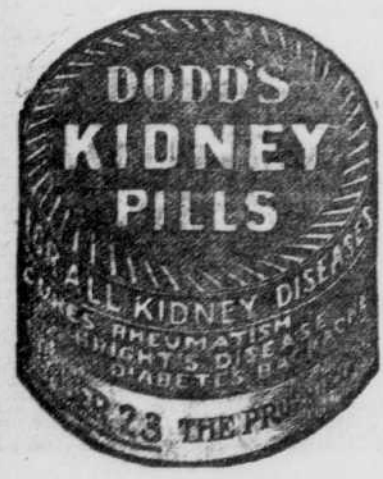

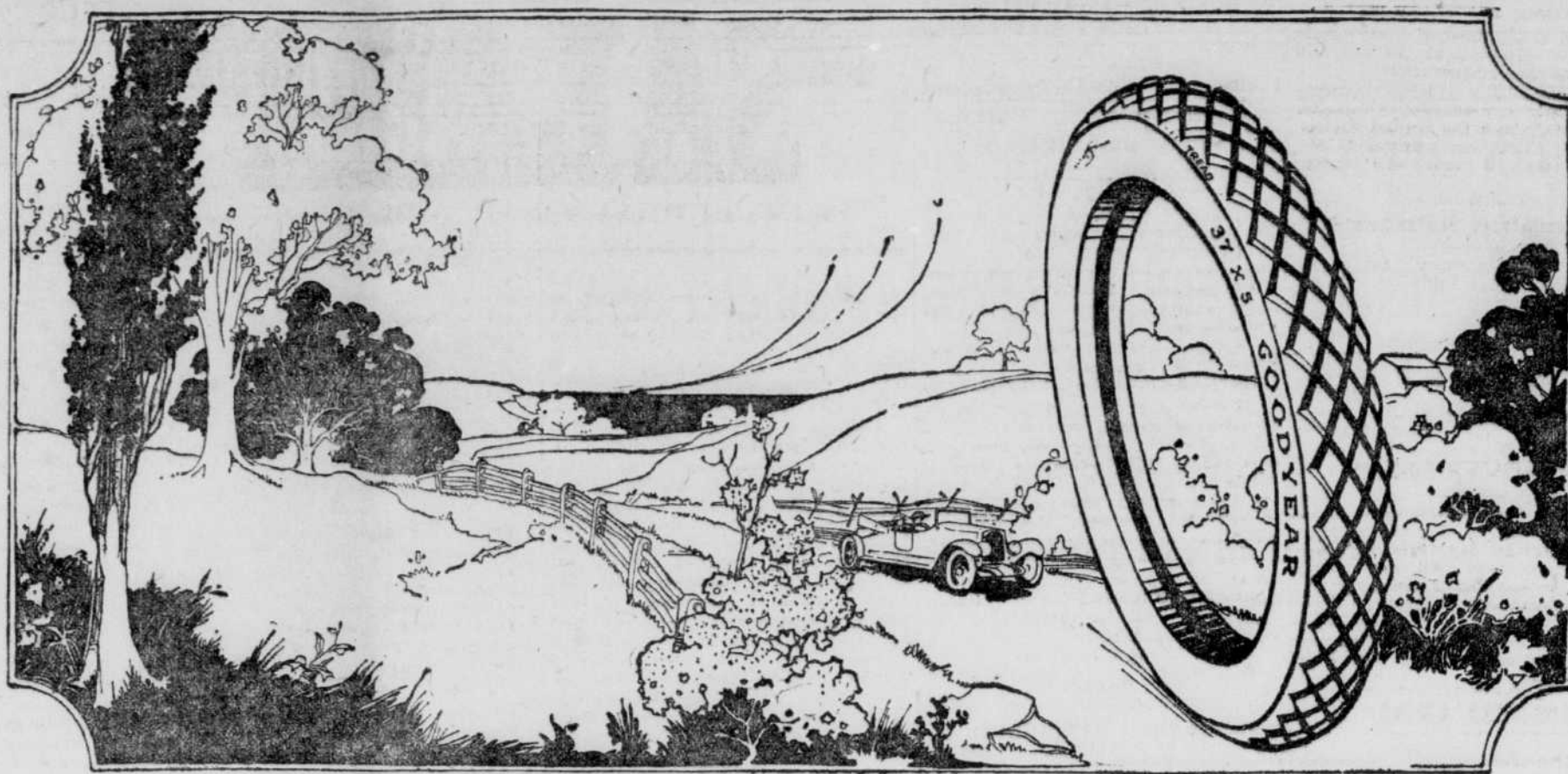

paid for their trouble by the beauti-
ful and far-reaching scenery that one
could see from all sides, upon climb-
ing the observatory. This structure
stands at the very highest point of
the mountain, and is about sixty feet
high. It was built three years ago by
the late Judge Foster, who has made
this place accessible and the view so
easily seen.

The top of the mountain is over
three thousand feet above sea level.
Looking down from the observatory,
one can see the surrounding country
for miles around, dotted here and
there with lakes, a few of which are
Lake Memphremagog, Lake Megantic,
Lake Funella and Brome Lake.
Altogether it was a very enjoyable
trip, and the view from the observa-
tory will long be remembered by
those who have seen it.

peanuts. These are for hog feed. The
hogs are let into the field and dig
them for themselves. I shipped in

early spring 80 hampers of potatoes
to New York that we raised. They
were planted January 10th and dug
April 10th. We have 30 acres of
orange and grapefruit trees which
have to be harvested every two weeks
from 1st of April to last of May. We
are in the midst of several lakes, but
on the whole I don't believe the East-
ern Townships can be beaten year in
and year out. The country here is so
sandy and level we miss the moun-
tains and rivers."

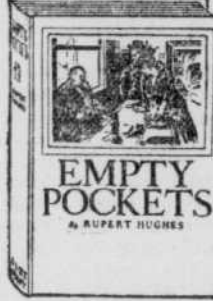
PASSING OF OLD RESIDENT.

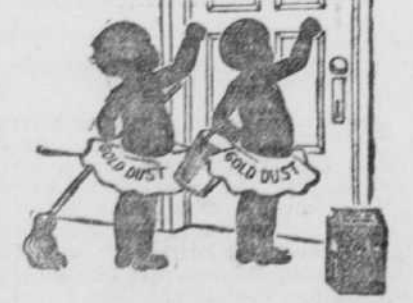

U. S. FIGHTING MEN WILL BE INSURED

Will Cost Government in First Two Years Over 500 Millions.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—Bearing the President's stamp of approval and Mr. McAdoo's plea that it be made law in justice to America's fighting men and their families, the long expected war compensation, indemnity and insurance bill was introduced in both Houses of Congress yesterday. It represents America's first attempt to be forthcoming in providing for those homes are wrecked by war.

Its outstanding feature is authorization of insurance for every fighting man and nurse at \$8 a year per \$1,000 worth up to \$10,000. Drafted by international experts under Mr. McAdoo's direction, the proposed law is a substitute for the Civil War pension system. It will cost the Government \$556,000,000 the first two years.

Family allowances \$141,000,000; \$190,000,000; death indemnities \$3,700,000; \$22,000,000; compensation for total disability, \$5,250,000, \$35,000,000; compensation for partial disability, \$3,200,000, \$21,000,000; insurance against death and disability, \$23,000,000, \$12,500,000. Totals first year, \$176,150,000; second year \$380,500,000.

The ten thousand dollars' worth of insurance for \$80 a year as compared with standard rates of about \$302 a year for \$10,000 for a man of 27, is possible because the Government doesn't require high priced salesmen, advertising and offices.

The bill provides for the assignment of part of each man's pay to his family, for a separation allowance to be paid by the Government, for a graduated scale of payments for total or partial disability, for a death indemnity and for the insurance.

If a man fails to make application for insurance on the \$7 to \$8 per \$1,000 plan, and is killed, the Government presumes him to have made application for a \$5,000 policy and pays his widow or his estate that amount.

MR. STEWART LYON IS COMING HOME

Has Been Eight Months at Front as Special Correspondent of Canadian Press.

Mr. Stewart Lyon, who, for nearly eight months has been special correspondent of the Canadian Press at the battlefront in France, is leaving for home shortly. The directors of Canadian Press, Limited, yesterday acceded to the request of Mr. Lyon and the Toronto Globe, of which he is editor, that he be relieved as soon as possible.

It was decided that a suitable address be engraved and presented to Mr. Lyon, setting forth the obligations of the Canadian newspapers and public to him, and recognizing the patriotic sacrifices he has made.

Mr. Lyon has sent through many enlightening cables about the Canadian troops and their battles, particularly the conflict at Vimy Ridge, and that they were not more complete and graphic was entirely due to the exertions of the censorship.

The question of whether another correspondent should be sent over to take Mr. Lyon's place was held over, pending enquiries. The cost of maintaining a special war correspondent and the cable charges have fallen heavily on the Canadian newspaper publishers, who refused a Government grant in aid.

MR. W. P. HINTON VICE-PRESIDENT OF G. T. PACIFIC

Succeeds Mr. Morley Donaldson Who Retires Owing to Ill-Health.

In a circular issued by the President of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, the announcement is made that Mr. W. P. Hinton, hitherto traffic manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, has been appointed Vice-President and General Manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway and the Grand Trunk Pacific Coast Steamship Company, succeeding Mr. Morley Donaldson, who has retired on account of ill health. His appointment is effective from August 1st.

William Pittman Hinton was born August 30, 1871, at Ottawa, Ont., and was educated at Ottawa Collegiate Institute. He began railway work on May 3, 1887, in the Auditor's Department of the Canada Atlantic, and in September, 1891, became rate clerk in the traffic department. From March 1896, to July 1901, he was assistant general freight agent, and then was pointment in February, 1903, as general freight and passenger agent of the same road. In October, 1905, when the Grand Trunk absorbed the Canada Atlantic, he became general agent in the passenger department of the Grand Trunk at Ottawa, Ont., in charge of immigration and transatlantic passenger traffic, remaining in that position until January 1, 1907, when he was appointed assistant general passenger agent of the Grand Trunk at Montreal. On May 1, 1909, he was appointed general passenger agent of the Grand Trunk Pacific at Winnipeg, Man., on January 1, 1914, was promoted to assistant passenger traffic manager of the same road at Winnipeg. On October 1, 1914, he was promoted to be assistant passenger traffic manager of the Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific lines, with headquarters at Montreal. In November, 1915, he returned to Winnipeg as traffic manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific, having charge of both freight and passenger traffic, and was appointed at the same time to represent also the Canadian Government Railways with the title of Western traffic manager.

MR. DONALDSON'S CAREER.

Mr. Morley Donaldson was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, May 1, 1851, and was educated privately in France and Canada. He was for some time in the engine works of E. Gilbert & Co. Montreal, served under Walter and Frank Shanly during construction of the Hoosac Tunnel, Mass., one of the largest in the world; entered service, Canada Atlantic Railway, as chief draughtsman, 1881, becoming successively mechanical superintendent, superintendent of traffic and mechanical departments, general superintendent until road merged with Grand Trunk Railway System, 1905; superintendent Ottawa Division of Grand Trunk Railway System, 1905-1912; vice-president and general manager, Grand Trunk Pacific, since 1912. Member Canadian Society of C. E. (1889).

AMERICA'S WAR PREPARATIONS KEPT FROM HUNS

Newspapers Purposely Suppress News so as Not to Depress Spirit of Public.

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 11.—Not a line of concrete fact about America's war preparations and actual participation in the war has been published in Germany in many a day. A neutral observer confirmed to me recently that American news is purposely kept out of the German newspapers so as not to depress the spirits of the public, which are being kept up by a liberal administration of optimistic oxygen.

To keep the public mind from America's preparations the old Japan-American bogey is again being exploited, for instance, the slender basis being dispatches from London (indirect, with confirmation from an unnamed source in Copenhagen) that Japan has made demands on Washington to obtain assurance that America would not mix in China's internal affairs and trench on Japanese interests there.

Brooding over this bad egg of current news, studious Germans hatch out this comforting conviction that Japanese-American antagonism has been veiled, only with the utmost difficulty, by their becoming allies, that Japan has intensively exploited the psychological moment afforded by the world war for the penetration of China until the extension of Japanese influence there is becoming a nightmare for England and America.

The Berlin Morgenpost says sagely: "England sees itself threatened in India and America is trembling at the prospect of Japan's mastery of the Pacific. England's and America's joint opposition against Japan was not the least of the factors that determined President Wilson's attitude during the war."

These astounding theories are actually believed by the German people, and are engendering an optimistic feeling, reviving the pipe dream of an alliance with Japan, in which Zimmermann, recently foreign secretary indulged. German publicists also are trying to nourish the popular hope of a break, if not an actual clash, between England and Japan.

LATEST TELEGRAPHIC DESPATCHES CANNOT CONFER WITH ENEMY SUBJECTS

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

LONDON, Aug. 13.—Mr. Bonar Law, in announcing the attitude of the Government toward the British delegates to Stockholm, said: "The law officers of the Crown have advised the Government that it is not legal for any persons resident in His Majesty's dominions to engage in a conference with enemy subjects. Therefore permission to attend the Stockholm conference will not be granted."

"The same decision has been made by the Governments of the United States, France and Italy, with which His Majesty's Government has been in communication."

GERMAN SOCIALISTS MAY WITHDRAW.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 13.—It is stated semi-officially in the Frankfurter Zeitung that the German Socialists may decline to participate in the Stockholm conference if the Entente Socialists insist on placing on the programme discussion of the question of placing responsibility for the war.

DENIES KAISER SENT MESSAGE TO WILSON

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

BERLIN, Aug. 13. by Amsterdam.—The semi-official Norddeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung denies the existence of the telegram alleged by James W. Gerard, the former American Ambassador at Berlin, to have been sent by Emperor William to President Wilson, in August, 1914, when the German Emperor is quoted as having asserted that Belgian neutrality "had to be violated by Germany on strategic grounds."

The alleged telegram, which has reached Berlin by way of Switzerland, has the Emperor saying that King George sent him word through the Emperor's brother, Prince Henry, that Great Britain would remain neutral if war broke out on the continent involving Germany and France, Russia and Austria. The Norddeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung says: "We are in a position to declare that no such telegram from the Emperor exists. It is true that Mr. Gerard was given an audience on August 10, 1914, in order to give him an opportunity of placing President Wilson's offer of mediation before the Emperor."

"This proposal was made at the time when the armies of both sides had already crossed the frontier, and when it seemed out of the question to call a halt to events. The Emperor could, therefore, only have his thanks conveyed to President Wilson for his offer, and thereby remark that while the present moment was too early for mediation by the neutral powers, the President's friendly proposal might later be returned to."

FIVE KILLED AT CROSSING

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Automobile Struck by G. T. Express Near Bowmanville, Ont.

BOWMANVILLE, Ont., Aug. 13.—Five persons were instantly killed and another injured when the G.T.R. International Limited struck an automobile Saturday evening at what is known as Wharf Road, about 300 yards east of Bowmanville Station.

Five men and one woman were riding in the automobile, which was driven by Herman Fletcher, of this town. Just before the original party of four men reached the crossing they overtook Mr. and Mrs. Frank Walker and invited them to ride. A minute later the car was halted by a freight train blocking the road. The trainmen divided the train to let the automobile pass, and just then the car came along. The train, which was running at a speed of fifty to sixty miles an hour, struck the automobile and carried it for about 150 yards before it could be stopped. Five of the occupants were instantly killed. The sixth, Mr. Frank Walker, who was sitting in the back seat with his feet on the running board, attempted to move his wife, but failed then jumped off in time to save his life.

VICTORIA CROSS FOR CANADIAN

Third Honor Captain Bishop of Flying Corps Has Won This Year.

LONDON, Aug. 13.—The intrepidity of William Avery Bishop, a Canadian, and a member of the Royal Flying Corps, in attacking a German airdrome single-handed, has been rewarded by the bestowal upon him of the Victoria Cross, the most prized of British valor medals.

This is the third honor Captain Bishop won this year. He was awarded the Military Cross in May and the D.S.O. in June, the latter for attacking three machines and bringing down two, although he himself was attacked by four machines.

DROWNING AT LITTLE LAKE

Charles Cote Lost His Life When Overtaken With Fit While in the Water.

Charles Cote, of Frontenac street, Sherbrooke, was drowned in Little Lake Magog yesterday afternoon, while bathing. The deceased was subject to epileptic fits and had a seizure when he went into the water. His wife and friends saw him disappear, but they were powerless to render assistance, and his body was not recovered until some time later.

The body was removed to Sherbrooke later in the evening. An inquest will be held this evening. The late Mr. Cote formerly worked for Bradley & Sons, and had only been married a few months.

GARY SEES NO SIGNS OF AN EARLY PEACE

Head of U.S. Steel Corporation Says There Was Chance Two Years Ago But Not at Present.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
TACOMA, WASH., Aug. 13.—Judge E. H. Garry, head of the United States Steel Corporation, sees no "signs of an early peace."

In speaking of the war situation, Judge Garry said here today: "I do not believe there are any chances of an early peace from the information I am able to get. Two years there could have been a settlement on a pretty fair basis;—One which would have secured the integrity of all the countries and with practically the same geographical lines which existed when the war commenced, and what is more important, the establishment of a basis for the prevention of future wars. I have some information which leads me to that conclusion."

"In any event it is only a question of time when the Allies must be successful."

FORMER RICHFORD WOMAN DIES IN TACOMA, WASH.

RICHFORD, VT., Aug. 13.—Letters received here the past week from Melvin J. Smith, of Tacoma, Wash., announced the death of his wife, which occurred July 27th. She suffered a shock July 22, and remained unconscious until death. Mrs. Smith was 71 years of age and a native of Richford, a daughter of the late A. W. Sears.

FATAL ACCIDENT AT ASBESTOS

J. A. Pinard Struck By Falling Rock in Mine and Instantly Killed.

ASBESTOS, Aug. 13.—(Special)—A workman named Joseph Alfred Pinard, was instantly killed in the mine belonging to the Monville Asbestos Company on Friday. The deceased in company with another man was running the compressed air drill when a rock fell on the unfortunate man, killing him instantly. It is supposed the rock became loosened by the rain of the previous night. The deceased had only been a short time in the place and leaves a large family.

An inquest was held when the following jurors were empanelled: V. Bruneau, (foreman), L. C. Morrill, J. G. Boisvert, Notary Duhamel, Notary Cote, and F. A. Moore. After hearing the evidence a verdict of accidental death was returned.

EXPANSION OF RUSSIA

King Ferdinand Says This Will Follow Liberation of the People.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
BERLIN, August 12, via Amsterdam.—In the course of an interview with a Stuttgart editor, King Ferdinand of Bulgaria, who has been visiting the King of Wurttemberg, said he believed the desires for expansion would continue to assert themselves in liberated Russia, and also that the smallest states must constantly be on their guard.

The economic future of his own country, the Bulgarian king said, was dependent upon a close association with Germany and Austria-Hungary, which countries would prove ready markets for Bulgaria's agricultural products. The olive and lemon industries, he added, especially were suited and developments on a large scale would make Bulgarians an active competitor of Italy. The Bulgarian monarch said he firmly believed that Asia Minor would be a profitable field of economic endeavor, its exploitation merely awaiting the introduction of adequate transportation facilities. The Bulgarian king blamed the Italian king and French influence for Italy's withdrawal from the Triple Alliance.

BURY AUTO DROPPED 40 FEET INTO SALMON RIVER

Had to be Taken Apart Before Being Recovered. Victims of Accident Recovering.

BURY, Aug. 13.—(Special)—The automobile owned by Mr. C. E. Sherman that went over the embankment into the Salmon river recently was taken out of the river on Thursday last. It was quite a difficult piece of work, as it had to be taken apart and hauled up by means of pulley blocks. The car, which plunged down nearly forty feet on to the rocks in the river, is not nearly as badly smashed as was at first anticipated. Maurice McLeod, who was so seriously injured, is now improving and his ultimate recovery is expected.

REORGANIZATION OF THE CABINET

Considered a Certainty at Ottawa. To Include Prominent Liberals.

OTTAWA, Aug. 13.—Sir Robert Borden left Friday afternoon to spend the week-end at Hon. Dr. Reid's summer home on the St. Lawrence and get a much-needed rest. He is showing the effects of his tiring duties.

With his departure the political excitement of the last two days which was occasioned by the now famous Rideau Hall conference subsided, and there will be no developments, so far as the Government is concerned, until after his return this week.

That there will be a reorganization of the cabinet is certain, and there is still a strong probability that it will include some prominent Liberals, even if Sir Wilfrid Laurier has refused the second offer of the Premier to join with him in the formation of a union Government. The offer made by Sir Robert to certain Liberals to enter his Government is still open, and the time is approaching quickly when announcement will be made.

With regard to Mr. N. W. Rowell, leader of the Opposition in Ontario, it is understood that he is willing to enter the Government, provided he has the assurance that he has a strong body of Liberal opinion in the province behind him. His action in the matter will depend upon this.

The Western convention at Winnipeg has had one notable result. It has brought to the Government an unexpected flood of correspondence and messages from many parts of the country, particularly from Ontario, conveying the assurance that the tide of public opinion is flowing strongly in favor of conscription. There is now absolutely no doubt that Ontario will give the Government a tremendous support. It is fully anticipated that only two anti-conscriptionists will be returned by this province.

MORE SPRUCE FOR AIRPLANE STOCK

Allied Commission Urge Lumbermen to Increase Production.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 13.—Members of the allied aircraft commission are in Portland to-day in conference with lumber manufacturers relative to increasing their production of spruce lumber for airplane stock. The commission includes Lieut.-Col. L. W. B. Rees, of the British army; Major Raffaele Peretti, of the Italian army; Captain Henri Pourif in the French army, and F. T. Allen, of Portland, representing the national council of defence.

The 14-inch Belt is transmitting 65 H.P. in the grinding department, and was put on with a defective pulley which crowded the belt over against the concrete pier. Rather than shut down the mill, the belt was operated in this way until a new pulley could be obtained, some two weeks, the belt at the end of this time had worn off three-eighths of an inch on the edge, but there was absolutely no ply separation or apparent damage to the belt whatever, other than the wear on the edge.

The writer has no hesitation in saying that as far as his experience goes, there is no belt seems so well adapted for cement mill service as "Extra Power."
