NEWS OF NAPLES' FALL EXPECTED MOMENTARILY

5th Army Drives Germans Out Of Mountain Posts

Huns Pursued on Plain Within Fifteen Miles of Naples. Fall of Which Appeared Imminent Today—Allies Now in Complete Possession of Sorrento Peninsula, Separating Bay of Naples from Gulf of Salerno.

London, Sept. 29.—(P)—The Press Association said today it had learned authoritatively in London that British troops have entered Pompei, near Naples.

Allied Headquarters, North Africa, Sept. 29.—(P)—The 5th Army has driven the Germans from their last mountain positions above Salerno and is pursuing the enemy on the plain within fifteen miles of Naples, the fall of which appeared today to be imminent.

The Germans, routed out of the mountain strongholds in six days of heavy fighting, were in general retreat, leaving the Allies in complete possession of the Sorrento Peninsula, which separates the Bay of Naples from the Gulf of Salerno.

British and American troops of Lt.-Gen. Mark Clark began the final attack on the enemy's extremely strong mountain positions at dawn yesterday and by noon had captured Nocera, vital road centre at the beginning of the coastal plain leading to Naples.

Castellammare, important naval base on the Southern shore of the Bay of Naples, also fell quickly into Allied hands as the Germans withdrew in a flight that may not cease until they reach the River Volturno, well North of Naples.

In London, the authoritative British Press Association said it had learned that 5th Army forces had entered historic Pompei at the foot of smoking Vesuvius and only thirteen airline miles from the heart of Naples.

The breakthrough on the extreme Western end of the front extending across Italy from coast to coast was accompanied by a general advance on the entire 8th and 5th army line.

Troops on the 5th Army's right flank smashed their way six miles Northward against crumbling enemy opposition and were within seven miles of Avellino, road and rail junction which is the key to inland communications East of Naples.

The capture of Avellino would constitute a threat to any German effort to make a new stand anywhere East or South of Naples.

The British 8th Army, including the Canadian 1st Division, meanwhile wiped out the deep salient on its Western flank, previously reported, and established a straight line between San Angelo and Melfi, while along the Adriatic Gen. Sir Bernard Montgomery's forces stormed Northward from Margherita di Savoia and occupied the town of Zappalato on the Gulf of Manfredonia, due East of the Great Foggia air base.

British troops on the extreme Southwest end of the Allied front began the final shove against the enemy in the mountain line North and Northwest of Salerno and encountered the bitterest kind of fighting at the town of Sala, which already had changed hands many times in recent weeks of the furious struggle.

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GOVERNMENT LOSES ON PULPWOOD DEAL

Montreal, Sept. 29.—(P)—By a court ruling here today the Government, as custodian of enemy property, failed to recover \$3,828 in insurance premiums paid on a cargo of pulpwood loaded at Montreal and destined for France but which got only as far as Quebec.

The fall of France and the subsequent application of "trading with the enemy" regulations intervened before the ship cleared the port of Quebec.

Pilots Fighter Aircraft At 840 M.P.H., Faster Than Any Human Has Ever Travelled

A U. S. Fighter Base, Somewhere in England, Sept. 29.—(P)—Lieut. Robert H. Knapp, of Norwich, N.Y., was believed today to have achieved a speed of approximately 840 miles per hour in a dive during an airfight over Emden, Germany, last Monday.

If true, then Knapp, pilot of a Thunderbolt fighter which helped escort heavy bombers in a raid on the German city, probably has flown faster than any human being ever has travelled before. Authorities did not explain how they arrived at the estimate of his speed, however.

The greatest speed previously officially recorded by the pilot of a fighter plane was that of Col. Cass Hough, also of the 8th Air Force Fighter Command, when he dove a Thunderbolt "more than 780 miles an hour," which is the speed of sound, in a test flight in England last spring.

CANADIAN WIRE FIRMS MODIFY U.S. CONTRACTS

Merger of American Companies Compels Change in Existing Contractual Obligations.

Montreal, Sept. 29.—(P)—The Canadian Pacific Communications and the Canadian National Telegraphs said last night in a joint statement on the proposed merging of the Western Union and Postal Telegraph that their two companies will continue to accept telegraph traffic of all classes destined for the United States.

(A Washington dispatch yesterday said the Federal Communications Commission approved the merger of the two United States companies in a move designed to give that country one vast telegraph system that could operate efficiently and economically.)

The statement noted that Western Union has been the exclusive connection of the C.N.T. and Post Telegraph the exclusive connection of the C.P.C. for the interchange of telegraph business.

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May Accord Italian Nation Status Of A Co-Belligerent

Somewhere in Italy, Sept. 29.—(Delayed)—(P)—Despite the Badoglio Government's obvious desire for recognition as a full-fledged British-American ally, it now seems possible that Italy may be accorded the status of a co-belligerent and that any concession she may receive will be measured by the aid she delivers.

There have been indications during the past week that Premier Badoglio has been on the verge of declaring war upon Germany in an effort to line Italy up with the Allies.

This would be purely an independent action, however, and it is expected that Italy's new war role and her relations with the United Nations will be fixed shortly through negotiation.

Many difficulties lie in the way of granting Italy anything even approaching United Nations status. One is the reluctance of the troops who have been fighting the Italians to accept them as allies—a feeling doubtless shared by a large part of the public in Britain and the United States.

The attitude of London and Washington, on the other hand, seems to be that since the Italians apparently wish sincerely to help in the fight against Germany it is only common sense to make use of them.

How much Italy can help to wage war on Germany is, of course, a question. Her capacity to help may be limited mainly to behind the lines assistance to the British and American armies, but having the Italians with us might simplify our occupation problems and aggravate those of the Germans, possibly relieving several Allied divisions from occupation tasks and tying up five or six German divisions.

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U.S. LEND-LEASE REACHES NEW HIGH

Washington, Sept. 29.—(P)—Lend-lease supplies to the Allied Nations now total nearly 15 1/2 billion dollars, it was disclosed yesterday by President Roosevelt. The President's announcement came after a hint of the possible trend of next year's invasion campaigns implied in the disclosure by Lt.-Col. William S. Gaud, of the United States Army General Staff, that 10 per cent of military lend-lease shipments for 1944 have been earmarked for such countries as France, Belgium, Norway and Greece.

MARSHALL PROMOTION IS NOT DENIED

Washington, Sept. 29.—(P)—President Roosevelt left the gate swinging wide today for Gen. George C. Marshall, 63, Army Chief-of-Staff, to move to any new or enlarged command over Allied arms.

The President made no effort at a news conference yesterday to deny reports that Marshall had been picked for world command of all Anglo-American forces. In fact, he admitted there had been what he called some leaks in prominent places.

Mr. Roosevelt read to reporters excerpts from two editorials in the New York Herald Tribune which he apparently endorsed. One editorial remarked that in all the columns about what had been intimated, learned, or said by "authoritative sources" about Marshall, "there has not appeared a single solid fact backed up by a man who would put his name to it or support it, explicitly, by evidence that a freshman in history would look at twice."

Several Nearby Towns And Villages Seized

Allied Headquarters, North Africa, Sept. 29.—(P)—Allied troops were only a few miles from Naples today and news of an entry into the Italian metropolis was expected any moment.

London, Sept. 29.—(P)—The Berlin radio said today that German troops had evacuated several towns and villages Northeast of Naples, the big Italian port threatened with imminent capture by Allied troops. Two towns named in the broadcast, however, are Southeast of Naples. These were named as Castel San Giorio, three miles East of Nocera, and Baronissi, five miles North of Salerno.

Berlin also reported that American reinforcements had arrived in the Salerno sector and that an Allied attack had been launched on the road leading from Vietri, on the Sorrento Peninsula West of Salerno, to the Northwest.

The Germans said that in the sector Northeast of Naples their troops had withdrawn to shortened positions in the mountains and had evacuated Montoro and other towns after destroying all military installations. Montoro is about eleven miles North of Salerno and due East of Naples.

Canadians Occupy Important Town As Climax To Twelve Hour Siege

In the following delayed dispatch William Stewart, Canadian Press war correspondent in Italy, describes the first serious opposition Canadian troops encountered since they landed September 3 on the toe of Italy with the British 8th Army. Until this fight the Canadians had experienced little resistance in keeping up with the rapidly withdrawing Germans.

With the 8th Army in Italy, Sept. 29.—(Delayed)—(P.C. Cable)—Canadians occupied an important town in the hills of Southern Italy after a 12-hour siege fought from neighboring slopes.

Difficulty of approach to the town made it possible for light German rearguards to hold the Canadians off until Royal Canadian Engineers had cleared the roads of mines and built a detour around a demolished bridge to open the way in.

While they worked tanks, which later rolled into the town with the first troops, sat in the hills blazing away at cleverly-concealed German machine-gun nests. Canadian artillery behind the tanks also battered various defensive locations.

Canadian infantry who moved slowly into the town took a few German prisoners who were among the first captured since the start of the invasion of Southern Italy. Both infantry and engineers came under rapid fire of German machine-guns and suffered slight casualties.

We joined the Canadian spearhead force of reconnaissance, infantry, tanks, artillery and sappers last Sunday afternoon and got to within two miles of the town at nightfall. It was slow progress because engineers had to repair bridge demolitions carried out a bare half an hour before the Canadian advance, and sweep roads of mines.

At one time forward elements of the Canadian force ran into four heavy loads of Germans preparing demolitions and there was a sharp exchange of gunfire.

The Germans fled but a Canadian mortar was brought quickly into action and dropping its missiles over the crest of a hill onto the snake-like road scored a direct hit on one lorry which blazed fiercely.

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URGES GREATER FRANKNESS IN WAR REPORTING

Pearl Harbor, Sept. 29.—(P)—Greater frankness in war news presentation today will prevent cynicism and lack of confidence in leaders.

Senator Wishart Robertson, of Halifax, 52-year-old former member of the Nova Scotia Legislature for Shelburne County, was the unanimous choice as President.

It was the first national meeting since before the outbreak of war, but henceforth they will be held annually by virtue of an amendment to the constitution making annual meetings mandatory.

The resolutions dealt with such subjects as social security, labor relations, agriculture, fisheries, lumbering and mining. The resolution on labor relations was said to have demanded efforts to bring about a better understanding between capital and labor, and to widen the recognition of labor's rights.

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MAN SUSPECTED OF POISONING MOTHER OF TWO

Toronto, Sept. 29.—(P)—Mrs. Oliver Casselman, mother of two children, is dead and 53-year-old Walter D. Holland, with whom she lived for 11 years, is under arrest charged with her murder.

The woman died suddenly yesterday after she had taken a capsule believed to have contained poison. Police said the capsule had been given to her by Holland the previous evening when she asked for a pill to relieve a headache.

The 32-year-old Mrs. Casselman, who, police said, had left her husband and who had lived with Holland in Peterborough, Ont., and Windsor, Ont., before coming here, died in hospital soon after she had collapsed in a house on Woodcrest Avenue. 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WAR BULLETINS

Ottawa.—Members of an R.C.A.F. long-range fighter squadron of Coastal Command in Britain recently destroyed three German flying boats over the North Sea in one day, two of the planes being knocked down by pilots on their first operational sortie, and the third by one of the squadron's flight commanders, Headquarters said today.

New York.—A communique from the Yugoslav Army of Liberation, broadcast by the United Nations radio at Algiers, said today that the Adriatic seaport of Split "has been evacuated as the result of enemy pressure after heavy fighting." War materials stored in the town were saved, said the broadcast.

London.—There are strong indications in London that Italian crews and Italian troops ashore are actively engaged in organized effort against the Germans—in addition to previously-acknowledged activities behind the Nazi lines.

BITTER BATTLE FOR JAP BASE NEARS CLIMAX

Australian Soldiers Reported to Be Exacting Heavy Toll Among Japanese Defenders at Finschhafen.

Allied Headquarters, the Southwest Pacific, Sept. 29.—(P)—The bloody battle for Finschhafen roared toward its finish today, with Australian soldiers exacting a heavy toll among the Japanese defenders and the supporting bases of the enemy for 300 miles to the Northwest along the New Guinea coast bombed into impotence.

More than 60 planes were destroyed at Wewak by Allied bombers and fighters Monday. Three tankers and four merchant ships, just arrived in the Wewak harbor with supplies which could have been intended for overland movement South, were blasted to the harbor bottom.

Less than a mile North of Finschhafen, veteran Australian ground troops struck hard at Japanese positions on high ground, inflicting heavy casualties.

Two More Years Of Hard War Lie Ahead, Warns Churchill

CHARGES ARE DISMISSED IN RIOT INCIDENT

Recorder Declares Evidence Offered in Plage Laval Case Was "Contradictory."

Plage Laval, Que., Sept. 29.—(P)—Charges of "resisting police" and "disturbing the peace" against Rene Bolduc, 23-year-old son of Police Chief Leo Bolduc of this beach resort near Montreal, and Andre Bigras, 18, were dismissed here last night by Recorder Desbois.

The Recorder said police evidence in the case had been "contradictory."

When he left the courtroom, Bolduc was picked up by Royal Canadian Mounted Police on a charge of failing to report for a military medical "rebound" August 30. Police said he may answer the charge in police court in Montreal today.

Bolduc last week had changed his plea to "not guilty" after the Recorder accepted his argument that defensive hearing had caused him to misunderstand the question put him at his first appearance the week before.

Bolduc gave himself up two weeks ago, several weeks after a warrant had been sworn out for his arrest. He explained that he had been away in the woods and did not know of the warrant.

The charges arose out of a disturbance at a dance hall here July 25 when 75 persons of the summer colony mixed in a battle in which Moe Hecovitch of Montreal received eye injuries necessitating hospital treatment. Recorder Desbois described the incident as part of a "racial war between Jews and French Canadians."

The evidence, which Recorder Desbois said was conflicting, was given by Constables George Perrotte and R. Heathfield. Perrotte testified that he had ordered Bolduc out of the restaurant and that Bolduc had not resisted. Heathfield said that Bolduc had pushed both constables and was ejected from the hall forcibly.

PROPERTY OWNERS ASK BETTER TERMS

St. Johns, Que., Sept. 29.—(P)—A session of the 11th annual convention of the Union of Property Owners' Leagues of the Province of Quebec passed resolutions:

1.—Condemning the Quebec Government "for allowing the real estate mortgage moratorium to lapse."

2.—Asking the Federal Government to limit to five per cent interest on real estate mortgages, both urban and rural.

3.—Requesting that the Quebec Government, after an immediate inquiry, institute a system of credits for urban realty owners.

Huns Counter-Attack Strongly In Effort To Hold Bridgeheads

Germans Unleash Concentrations of Troops and Tanks in Battle for Dnieper River—Russian Attacks Reported Frustrated at Several Points—Press Three-Pronged Drive on Kremenchug.

UTMOST EFFORT NEEDED UNTIL VICTORY WON

Canberra, Australia, Sept. 29.—(P)—Australia's 1943-44 war budget was introduced into the House of Representatives today with the Commonwealth Treasurer, J. B. Chifley, warning that nothing less than the utmost effort would suffice until victory had been won.

The budget estimated total expenditures of £715,000,000 (about \$2,574,000,000), an increase of £44,000,000 over last year. Approximately £570,000,000 was devoted to war outlays and the remainder to civilian costs.

The budget contained no surprises and no increases of direct or indirect taxes.

Moscow, Sept. 29.—(P)—Unleashing concentrations of troops and tanks in the battle for the Dnieper river, the Germans counter-attacked strongly today in a bid to maintain their bridgeheads on the Eastern bank.

Frontline dispatches said the enemy, holding favorable positions, was launching 10 to 12 counter-attacks daily with powerful air support. The Communist Party newspaper Pravda reported that at one point a Red Army was put in a "critical situation" at one time, but Soviet artillery came to its relief.

No further progress was reported immediately in the directions of Zaporozhe and Dnepropetrovsk, two major objectives on the lower Dnieper.

Zaporozhe lies on the East bank of the Dnieper behind a solid ring of fortifications. The main part of Dnepropetrovsk, the suburbs of which already have been reached, lies on the West bank.

(Today's German communique, as broadcast by Berlin, said German troops, engaged in heavy defensive fighting on the Dnieper waterfront, lost ground temporarily yesterday but wiped out their losses with counter-attacks.)

(The communique added Russian attacks at several points on the West bank of the central Dnieper were frustrated. It reported Russian bombers raided Constanta, Rumanian Black Sea port.)

London, Sept. 29.—(P)—Investment of Kremenchug, one of the few remaining escape bridgeheads across the broad Dnieper available to Hitler's battered legions in their retreat from the Ukraine, appeared imminent today as Red Army troops pressed a three-pronged drive on the city from the East, South and North.

Capture of this important city on the East bank of the Dnieper would pave the way for a westward surge of Soviet forces across the 1,600-mile wide river, carrying with them an obvious threat to German concentrations on the Western bank behind Dnepropetrovsk to the South, also under siege by the Red Army troops.

A Russian communique placed Soviet troops nine miles from Kremenchug in the East, while other columns were said to have reached the Dnieper at points North and South of the city. German defence positions were reported taking a terrific pounding from Soviet guns.

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Industrial Unrest In Britain's Factories Causing Deep Concern

London, Sept. 29.—(P)—The buoyancy with which the nation greeted the success of Allied arms had a paradoxical effect in war industries where good news led to some relaxation of the all-out effort workers have been making since Dunkerque.

Britain's factory output is higher than a year ago and the hourly output per worker is greater than in the United States or Germany, but there have been in recent weeks signs of industrial unrest which are causing concern.

Late in September 20,000 workers were on strike in Britain and other strikes were threatened. In many cases the grievances were what one industrial reporter termed "frivolous" and the real reason was believed to be the conviction that "the war is as good as won."

The Government, however, as evidence in Prime Minister Churchill's speech to the House of Commons Sept. 21, does not hold such an optimistic opinion, contending that the bloodiest period of the war is still to come. The industrial unrest has Government departments worried.

Sir Stafford Cripps, Minister of Aircraft Production, met 1,000 representatives of the aircraft industry in

London the day Mr. Churchill spoke to hear and discuss their complaints and to tell them the Government's programme.

For some months there has been unrest among aircraft workers, provoked by what they claim are "inexplicable delays and lack of work."

Daily Mail Reporter Charles Sutton wrote that there had been strange stories, though little evidence, of fighters being assembled in one factory and dismantled in another. Urgent work, it was reported, was deliberately being left undone.

Shop stewards charged that management refused to co-operate with workers on the joint production committees and that they were concentrating their energies on post-war production at the expense of Royal Air Force output.

Whatever truth there may have been in these reports, there were few signs of disunity at the Cripps' meeting. The Minister spoke to the representatives for 90 minutes, then answered questions for more than an hour.

At the end of the meeting, during which a message from Churchill was read, a pledge was made that the industry would devote its untiring

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MILK SHIPPERS VOTE TO JOIN ASSOCIATION

At a meeting held at the Sherbrooke Arena the shippers of milk to the Carnation plant at Sherbrooke voted to join the Milk Producers' Association. The shippers as a whole were represented by two and in some cases more men from each truck route.

The meeting got under way with H. A. Ross, the President of the Milk Producers' Association, in the chair, assisted by W. Smith, the Secretary of the Association.

It was agreed that since the directors of the Association had been elected for one year, it would be inconvenient to disturb this body. However, the fluid milk men felt that the Carnation shippers should be equally represented on the Board of Directors. Mr. Ross asked that they appoint eleven directors to balance it up. This took a great deal of time, but after much deliberation, the following men were appointed for the full year. Each of the following has as his responsibility the areas given to him at the meeting: J. E. Bouford, Stanstead and Ayer's Cliff; Hollis Burns, Cookshire, Sawyerville, Island Brook and La Patrie; Norman Cameron, Spring Hill and East Angus; H. Osborne, Windermere, St. Claude and Richmond; W. Couture, St. Francois and Bromptonville; John Peters, Magog and

Cherry River; C. W. Moulton, Hatley and Waterville; C. Bégin, Coaticook and Dixville; M. Paige, Rock Forest, Suffield and St. Elie; L. Cloutier, Bromfield, Foster and Knowlton; H. Wheeler, Johnville, Bulwer and St. Edwidge.

After going over the routes it was found that about 85 per cent were represented. Mr. Ross asked for a motion from the floor to carry the directors named, into the body. The motion was moved by G. Turner and seconded by Mr. French, of Flaners.

It was then time to discuss the question of the half-cent payment for the Association fee. It was agreed that the committee would meet the Milk Committee Board, and discuss ways and means of getting this arrangement put on a solid footing. Should the committee grant this, then all who go into the Carnation plant will be members of the Milk Producers' Association.

the details of the tremendous amount of work accomplished in all the subdivisions but I would like to pay tribute to the members for their untiring zeal and unremitting labor in the many activities of social service," Mrs. Vallee said.

"We co-operate with the different social welfare agencies—the Victorian Order of Nurses, St. Vincent de Paul Society, Junior Welfare League, Sisters of Service, Red Cross, Child Welfare Clinic and have representatives on many of these boards.

"Reports received from sub-divisions show that \$32.43 was spent on medicine, eighty-five articles sewn and distributed. \$38.00 spent on clothing, \$5 taxi fares for school children.

The air offensive against troop concentrations and supply lines of the retreating Germans was hampered by bad weather, although some Allied squadrons which carried out offensive patrols encountered a few enemy fighters and shot down one of them.

Fighters and fighter-bombers attacked a train and a motor transport convoy, the communiqué said, while other Allied airmen continued to patrol the battle area. No Allied planes were lost.

(A German communiqué said continuous rains prevented major operations in Southern Italy, but added vaguely that "movements of our own took their anticipated course.")

On the Adriatic coast the British 8th Army, of which the Canadian 1st Division is a part, keep up its hot pursuit of retreating German forces after capturing the big enemy air base at Foggia.

and planes. While the situation around Kiev, less than 200 miles to the North-west on the great bend of the Dniester, was comparatively static with the Russians consolidating their positions on the East bank across from the great German defence bastion, Soviet armies far to the North were plunging forward in a movement that threatened the early collapse of Germany's Upper Dniester line.

The Moscow war bulletin recorded the capture of more than 1,000 villages and towns in this drive into White Russia toward the Baltic states and old Polish border. Already the strategic Gomel-Vitebsk railway line is within range of the Red Army's siege guns.

German troops falling back on Vitebsk were reported blowing up bridges and dynamiting military installations as the Soviet columns stormed to within ten miles of that key to Poland and the Baltic seacoast.

The Soviet communiqué declared that German troops were falling back in disorder between Vitebsk and Gomel, junction of five railways which lies 200 miles to the South.

Accidental Death Verdict Is Returned In Corriveau Case

Accidental death from asphyxiation was the verdict returned by a coroner's jury under the direction of Leonidas Bachand investigating the death of Hubert Corriveau, who was found on the floor of his room yesterday morning.

Principle witness at the trial was Omer Marceau, the proprietor of the house in which Corriveau was living. He said that the old man had been staying with him about a month and that he had rented two rooms, one which he used for his bedroom and the other which served as a kitchenette. He testified that the man was quiet and peaceable, attended church regularly every day. "I saw him return to the house about five o'clock last night and after that I didn't see him," the witness said. When asked if he heard anything during the night he said that there was no sound whatsoever and that he knew nothing had happened until about eight thirty the next morning when not hearing any sound from the rooms he opened the door which was ajar and found the man on the floor. When questioned about the gas, Marceau said that he noticed a peculiar smell

District Governor Believes Youth Problem Should Head List Of Post-War Endeavors

Guy M. Catlin, of Randolph, Vt., Addresses Local Rotary Club Members—Declares that After War There Will Be A Big Task for Rotarians in Field of Community Service.

Community service and the youth problem should head the list of post-war plans of Rotary Clubs, Governor Guy M. Catlin, of the 195th Rotary District, who resides in Randolph, Vt., said last night when he addressed the regular meeting of the Sherbrooke Rotary Club in the New Sherbrooke House. Accompanied by Robert Davis, of Newport, Vt., a Past Governor, Mr. Catlin went to St. George's Club where he conferred with the directors, committee chairmen and members of the club after the dinner-meeting.

In the post war era Governor Catlin pointed out that there is a big task for Rotarians in the field of community service. He urged Rotarians to "take off their coats and roll up their sleeves" and work zealously to mould the future peace period.

But he warned, however, that this cannot be accomplished unless the youth problem is handled effectively in the community, explaining that the youngsters of today are the men and women of tomorrow. "These youngsters at present are the future builders in all lines of endeavor."

After the war, he said, there will be Rotarians in the now-occupied countries of Europe who will assist in more than one way in reconstructing a new and better world. Termining the Rotary movement as a gigantic one he stated that it has more than 200,000 members of all races, color and creed speaking all languages.

"For one minute don't doubt the executive ability of those directing Rotary," Mr. Catlin continued, in paying tribute to all officials of the international organization.

"Rotarians are doing a service, irrespective of the size of the club," he stated, "and there is a big job for you to do."

For instance, he said, there is a Rotary Club in Vermont with seven members, sponsoring a Boy Scout troop.

The Sherbrooke Club was lauded for the various projects which it continues to undertake. "From what I have heard, your club is doing a magnificent job," he stated.

Preparations for the annual international Rotary convention, which this year was held in St. Louis, Mo., were explained by Governor Catlin. He touched on the pre-parley meeting of officials who met precisely at nine o'clock every morning with the International President and his associates to prepare the convention programme. Praising Paul Harris, founder of the Rotary movement, whom he met in St. Louis earlier this year, Governor Catlin said that Mr. Harris has spent a lifetime doing good for others.

Making the first official visit in his capacity, he told Rotarians that he was visiting all clubs under his jurisdiction for the sole purpose of exchanging ideas and to pass on Rotary information. He then declared that the Sherbrooke club will soon be the biggest in his district.

Governor Catlin thanked the club for the warm welcome extended him. Introduced by President Willard Cross, he was thanked by George Ewing, Past Governor. In respect to the visitor, the meeting concluded with the singing of "America" and "God Save the King."

The largest single task is that of the special names division, which has the job of raising about one-half of the required quota. Calling on the homes are women, while men are taken care of the downtown business district.

The present campaign, which ends on Saturday, pools the needs of three organizations so as to effect one single drive for their budget requirements. This scheme was established in the early days of the war to reduce as much as possible appeals for public support and to prevent overlapping in services. The present budget was established only after the most careful consideration, with the result that contributors can be assured that their donations will be used to the best possible effect.

Campaign headquarters are located at 73 Wellington Street North, next to the City Hall, and those wishing to help are asked not to wait for a canvasser, but to get in touch with officials there at once, either by mail or by telephoning 1803.

CLARIFIES NEW PROCEDURE FOR MEDICAL EXAMS

Arthur MacNamara, Director of National Selective Service, today clarified the new method of medical examination of men called under the Mobilization Regulations, which, he said, could result in some "confusion."

In explaining the new procedure again, Mr. MacNamara said the new system, which will come into force shortly, is intended to cause a minimum of inconvenience to the called, and to simplify administrative procedure. In future, the Registrar will indicate on the "Order-Medical-Examination" where and when the called will be required to submit himself for examination in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

(a) If the called lives a reasonable distance from a "Reception Centre," he will be ordered to report at this Centre for the purpose of submitting himself for medical examination. After this examination which will establish finally his medical category, the called will return home. (There are in the province of Quebec two Reception Centres, one situated at Montreal and the other at Quebec.)

(b) If the called lives at too great a distance from the "Reception Centre" in order to make it possible to submit himself for medical examination and to return home within a reasonable time, he will be ordered to present himself to one of the designated physicians in his "Order-Medical-Examination." It is understood that these physicians will have their offices at a reasonable distance from the home of the called and, to this end, several physicians have been named in different centres of the province.

(c) In certain cases, where the called lives in a very remote locality, he will be ordered to present himself before a doctor of his own choice in order to submit to medical examination.

In all three cases except the last, it is for the Registrar to decide where and when the called is obliged to present himself for medical examination. In the past, every man receiving an "Order-Medical-Examination" could appear before the doctor of his own choice. The Registrar, on receiving the results of these medical examinations, was very often obliged to call a man to undergo a second medical examination before a medical revision board composed of military doctors. If the medical revision board found this man to be fit for service, he was called for military training and was submitted to another examination before military doctors of the Reception Centre. It is easily understood how, by this procedure, a man could have undergone three medical examinations, thereby losing too much time and occupying the services of too great a number of physicians.

Mr. MacNamara has emphasized the fact that this new method of medical examination does not change any of the remaining obligations of a man callable under the Mobilization Regulations. What is more, there is no change in the manner of submitting an application for postponement.

Satisfactory Reports Given At Meeting Of Red Cross Society

The highlight of the quarterly meeting of the Sherbrooke Branch of the Red Cross Society held yesterday afternoon was the report given by Mrs. F. A. Briggs, who is in charge of the Supplies Committee, in which she stated that during the months of July, August and September a total of 63,846 articles were sent to the Red Cross headquarters for distribution. These figures included all kinds of articles that are made and repaired by the Red Cross workers and some of these were the weekly quota of surgical dressings, for each month as well as the cutting, knitting and sewing articles and the civilian clothing articles which totalled 1,287 pieces. In concluding her report, Mrs. Briggs called for more volunteers to carry out the ever-increasing demands of the Red Cross.

Mrs. Russell Tate, the Work Convenor, also made her report on the work accomplished during the summer and said that while it did fall off to a certain extent she expected that it would pick up now that the fall and winter months were at hand. Mrs. Tate said that civilian clothing was in the greatest demand at the present since the Red Cross cannot keep the supply of clothing to the people in the liberated territories ahead of the demand. She said that at present there was a slackening in the making of hospital supplies since there was for the time being a

surplus on hand, but that later on in the season more would be needed and the demand would increase. Surgical dressings, although on a decreased scale, are still being made in the rooms, according to the report, and the dressings for the Blood Clinic are being made in town. Mrs. Tate, too, expressed her appreciation to the group who had worked so well during the past season and she hoped they would redouble their efforts during the next term.

The knitting department under the convenership of Mrs. F. S. Rugg, left the most to be desired of any, the shelves were full of wool and that the number of articles required of them has not been met so far. Sweaters are the most needed of any knitted garments, Mrs. Rugg said, and she stressed that there was wool in the rooms for all kinds of sweaters. July was the slow month in this section and during the month of August the number of knitted supplies doubled. So far no report has been made of the supplies sent in this month since the books are not closed as yet but it is expected to be just as good as the one for August. Mrs. Rugg said she expected that more knitting would be done during the winter months and that at this time their average could be brought back up again.

PRIME MINISTER KING OPPOSES AN ELECTION

The Federal Government, Prime Minister King has informed the people of Canada, is opposed to the idea of holding a general election in war time, so it may be assumed that unless one of the five conditions enunciated by the Prime Minister are brought about, the present administration will carry on until the conclusion of hostilities. This attitude can be easily understood in view of the determined efforts of the Government to hold on to power in the past, an attitude which has caused general concern throughout the country, especially among that section of the population which felt that the war effort of the nation was impeded by the appeasement policies of the administration.

Mr. King's stand can be appreciated in view of the recent Provincial general election and Federal bye-election results. Despite the attempt of the Prime Minister to gloss over these setbacks as of strictly local significance, there is no doubt that Federal affairs played a part in the Provincial results, especially in Ontario, where all parties claimed that the interference of the Ottawa administration brought on the Provincial general election. Thus the trouncing given the Liberal Government then in power in Ontario cannot but be an indication that the people were dissatisfied with the manner in which affairs were being administered and with the close link between Ottawa and Toronto Liberals the former cannot but be worried by the outcome.

In blaming the bye-election setbacks on the lack of Liberal organization, the Prime Minister is virtually admitting that the general elections must be delayed for the purpose of permitting the reorganization of the party machine, although at the same time he chastises the Opposition groups for playing politics while the Government was diverting all its attention to the task of prosecuting the war. However it will be difficult to make the average voter see much difference between the so far unsuccessful policy of appeasement as practised by the Government and the playing of party politics, for the appeasement efforts were directed to the very sections where the Government held the solid bloc of seats.

No, Mr. King does not want an election until after the war and the reason is not far to find.

FOGGIA AND THE BALKANS

The great fears held by the German High Command about an imminent invasion of the Balkans by the Allied forces are clearly indicated by the speed with which they moved to protect themselves from the grave strategic consequences of the loss of the vital Italian air base of Foggia and its elaborate string of airports. The Foggia air base provides a splendid springboard for an attack against the Balkans by air, which in turn would pave the way for any land offensive across the Adriatic or through the Mediterranean to link up with the patriot forces now operating in the subjugated countries.

Hardly had the Allied communiqué disclosed the capture of the airport that the Germans announced the landing of forces on Corfu Island off the West Coast of Greece and the recapture of the Yugoslav harbor city of Split, previously seized by the Yugoslav patriots.

While these operations are designed to counter-act to a degree the seizure of Foggia which places the whole of Northern Italy, the Danube Valley and Southern Germany itself under the shadow of the Allied air arm, developments on the Russian front have also served to increase Hitler's worries about his Balkan satellites. Despatches from Germany indicate that even at home the continued Nazi retreat in Russia is causing uneasiness, with sections of the

populace wondering when the withdrawal will end and the official press admitting the seriousness of the situation but at the same time emphasizing that the Germans were gaining strength through defence—that their position was stronger because of the shorter battle lines. Also, the Propaganda Ministry is seeking to steel the people for further bad news during the coming fifth winter of war.

But for Bulgaria, Hungary and Rumania, who have shown signs of repenting the day they cast their lot with the Axis, the situation is growing serious.

Bulgaria, bound to Russia by racial ties, has been virtually under Nazi domination since the death of King Boris and Nazi agricultural specialists have been sped to Sofia to extract a heavier contribution of foodstuffs. Hungary, which has been reported toying with the idea of complete withdrawal from the war, is said to have withdrawn her troops from Kiev with Hitler's approval. The Gazette de Lausanne, of Switzerland, reports from Bucharest that the Rumanian Government has forbidden discussion of the German retreat in Russia, but says there is considerable worry on the part of the people over the approach of Russia to the Rumanian border and at the seizure of Foggia.

NAZI CIRCUMLOCUTION

Not only have the Nazis developed into a fine art the military manoeuvre of advancing to the rear—they have built up a veritable arsenal of circumlocutions with which to explain to the world their process of going forward backwards.

The United States Office of Wartime Information dipped into this arsenal and dredged up for the public some of the twists and alibis used in German High Command communiqués since the first of this year to cover admissions of Nazi retreats from specified military localities. The list reflected the development of a German lexicon of retreat which has tried to make a virtue of military necessity, dismiss the importance of lost territory and twist defeat into a propaganda pattern seeking to give the impression of "planned withdrawal" and Nazi "qualitative superiority" over Allied "quantitatively superior" troops.

German retreat propaganda as contained in official communiqués now includes such clichés as "defensive successes," "successful disengagement," "elastic defence," "mobile defence," "fluid defence," "according to plan," "shortening of the front," and a real honey "withdrawal to the enemy's surprise."

However, all those failed the other day when describing the situation in the Bryansk sector of the Russian front, so D.N.B., the German news agency, broadcast the report that the "bulk of the German troops reached a new line without fighting."

The Nazis said their "evacuation" of Sicily was an "achievement without precedent in military history."

And just about that time their toothy friends on the other side of the globe were acknowledging the loss of Kiska, modestly saying the "withdrawal" of their troops from the Aleutian Island was "without parallel in world military history."

EIGHTY YEARS OF SERVICE

Eighty years of service to Huntingdon and the surrounding Beauharnois district have just been completed by the Huntingdon Gleaner, the occasion being marked by a series of special articles in which the present publisher of the veteran journal, Adam L. Sellar, recalls the struggles of his forbears in creating an instrument of public service in the district.

Throughout its long career dating back to 1863, the Gleaner has been a consistent champion of the rights of the district which it serves and has become one of the leading newspapers in the Dominion.

Serving an important English-speaking district, it also holds promise of an even more vigorous future and upon entering its eighty-first year it carries with it the congratulations and best wishes of the Record and its contemporaries in other parts of Canada.

PRESS COMMENTS

PRIME MINISTER KING DICTATED

Windsor Star

We shall have little reason for pride in the spectacle we shall present to our Allies and to the world at large, if Ottawa reports prove to be true, and conscription for overseas is invoked. Not that we shall have any cause for shame in compelling able-bodied men to get into action, but the considerations reportedly influencing the Government—for which reports there is logical foundation—will show us in a distinctly unfavorable light.

So long has the Government delayed taking this step, it can have no complaint if it is accused of taking action entirely on a political basis. The reasoning is that the Liberals have lost Quebec support anyway, so they now have nothing further to fear from that source. Thus they are at last free to adopt a firm attitude toward overseas action.

The Government will find it difficult indeed to escape the accusation that it has allowed one province to hold it back for months from realistic action. The record speaks for itself.

That we must, if we are to retain our reputation, adopt some new method to keep the ranks overseas filled, there can be little doubt. We have an Army in Britain, presumably ready to go into action. It is obvious that the volume of voluntary recruiting is not adequate to guarantee that organization the reinforcements it will need, once it comes actually in contact with the enemy and begins to suffer major casualties.

The pity of it is that the supplying of these reinforcements must depend on political considerations. The scrambling and hedging that has taken place over this question of compulsory service has been anything but an edifying spectacle, nor will it be greatly improved by this late submission to the inevitable.

It has been so obvious that Quebec was the stumbling block. The Dominion as a whole long ago gave the Government authority to proceed in whatever manner was found necessary, the only serious opposition coming from the Old Province. That is prima facie evidence that Quebec was the sole bar to decisive action.

Another unsavory factor is the restriction which Prime Minister Mackenzie King chose to impose on himself even after the plebiscite. He gave the House of Commons the undertaking that, before introducing any measure of conscription for overseas service, he would ask for the approval of the House, staking the existence of the Government upon it.

We shall thus have the spectacle of a full dress political battle over an issue that has already been settled by the democratic free vote of the people of Canada. Thus conscription, if and when it comes, will arrive in an atmosphere of revived bitterness, and just how bitter the fighting can be over this matter has already been demonstrated.

It is fortunate indeed for this country that all its war effort has not been on the same plane as that having to do with the provision of manpower. Luckily, tanks and planes and guns do not have votes, so there has been no political necessity, in the case of such materials, for the manoeuvring that has gone on over the building up of our armed forces.

THE FAILURE OF CLASS APPEALS IN THE PAST

In attempting to appraise the importance of the recent electoral successes of the Socialist C.C.F. it is useful to view them in the perspective of the previous third party movements which waxed and waned following the Great War. Their victories at the polls were impressive and their leaders, Thomas Crerar, J. W. Morrison, E. C. Drury, R. W. E. Burnaby and others were as excited about their prospects of power as are M. J. Coldwell, E. B. Joffe and the Socialist of today.

The success of the C.C.F. in electing the largest group in the Ontario Legislature in 1939, followed by the formation of the Drury administration, gave farm leaders from coast to coast great hopes for a new political group and out of a conference held at Windsor on January 6th, 1939, the National Progressive Party was born. Using language

not much different from that of C.C.F. spokesmen today, Henry Wise Wood, an Alberta farm leader, declared: "We are now an economic group preparing for political action." In the House of Commons a Progressive parliamentary party, larger than the present C.C.F. membership was formed and following the 1921 general election T. A. Crerar found himself leading sixty-six members, comprising the second largest group in the chamber. The popular vote received by the Progressive party in that election was only 200,000 short of the vote received by the Conservatives.

The third parties of twenty-three years ago were class movements, just as the Socialist C.C.F. is a class party. Neither they nor the C.C.F. today were truly representative of all the people of Canada. The U.F.C. Government disappeared after four years in office and the National Progressive party gradually vanished.

GEN. MONTGOMERY'S FAMILY

A number of American newspapers have mistakenly published the statement that Gen. Sir Bernard Law Montgomery, Commander of the British Eighth Army, is the grandson of James Montgomery, the writer of many well-loved hymns. There is a family tradition of relationship, but it never has been definitely established. A letter from the General's mother, Mrs. Maude Farrar Montgomery, to a representative of the Christian Science Publishing Society in London says:

In reply to yours, of August 13th, I have always understood there was some connection between my husband's family and the hymn writer, James Montgomery, but I have never been able to trace it.

Sir Robert Montgomery, K.C.B., Governor of the Punjab, was my husband's father. We are also related to the Montgomeries of Grey Abbey and Elinton.

My father was Dean F. W. Farrar, author of *The Life of Christ* and *Prayer*, and Little by Little.

General Montgomery's father, the Rt. Rev. Henry Hutchinson Montgomery, K.C.M.G., was Bishop of Tasmania at the turn of the century and the author of a number of books, including biographies of five leaders of the Church of England.

THE RUSH CASE

Donald Gordon, Chairman of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, has done the right thing to clarify the situation with regard to giving a man named David Rush of Dunnville, was fined \$50 and costs at Toronto, for giving his wife a ride in his truck. 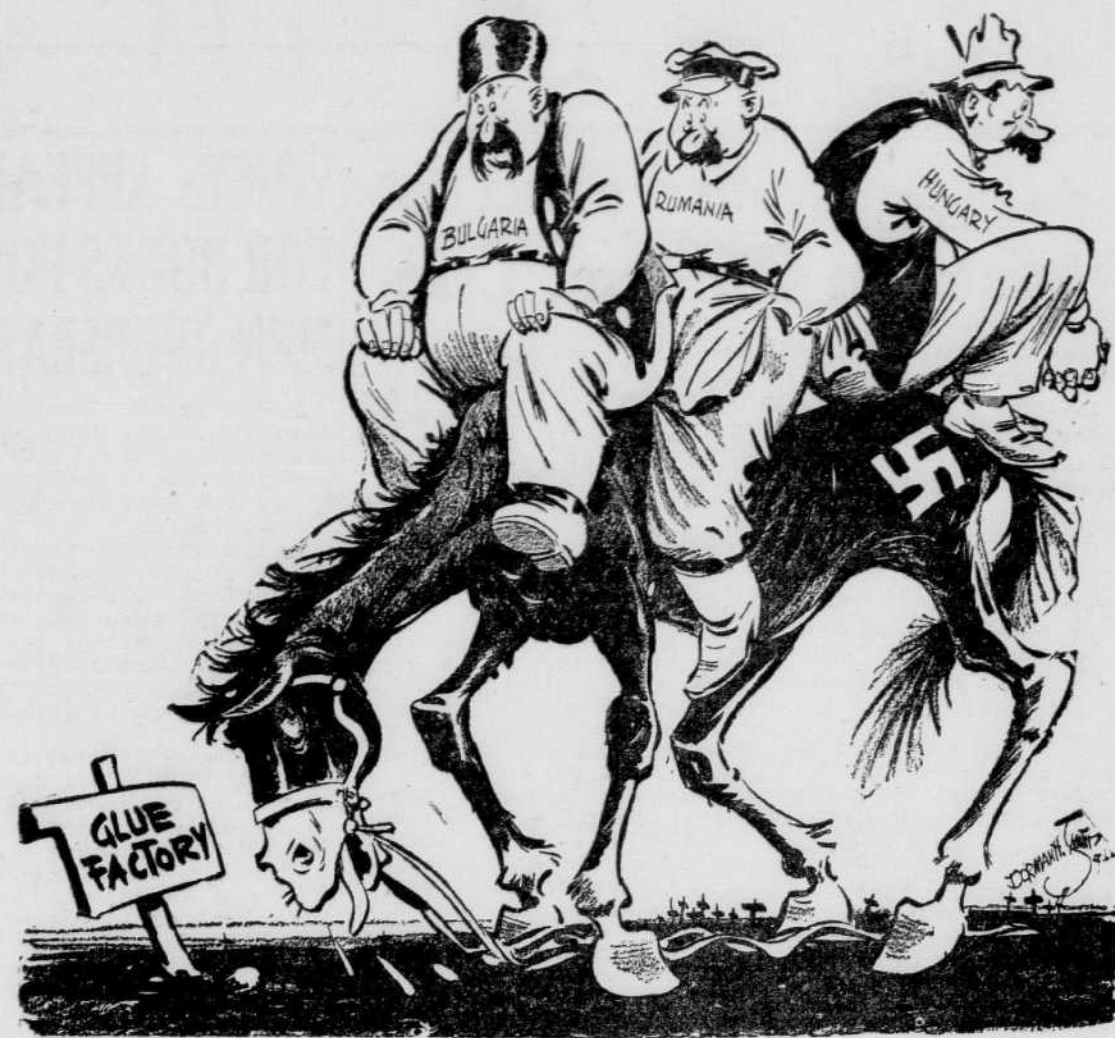

THE BRENNER PASS

SACRIFICE BID CUTS OPPONENTS' PROFITS

The art of sacrifice bidding has been so highly perfected in tournament play that a player cannot relax even when his side seems sure to make a slam. He must fear that his opponents will find a profitable sacrifice against his slam bid, and must prepare in advance to discourage such a bid. The present holders of the Eastern States pair championship, Jules Tilles and A. Goldstein, of New York, showed how in today's hand.

Tilles (South) made the key bid when he put in a bid in his void club suit. When North jumped him to six clubs, Tilles had to scurry back to six diamonds. It appeared to the opponents that South had perhaps bid the six diamonds unwilling and therefore that the six-diamond contract might be an unsafe one. Furthermore, the three-club bid had the effect of making both opponents over-estimate the value of their club strength.

Many North-South pairs in the tournament who bid six diamonds by straight-forward bidding, lost out when East went to six spades against them. At six spades East

lost only four tricks, two clubs, a heart and a diamond, and so went down only 500 points; while at six diamonds North-South could score 1370 points.

There was no play to six diamonds, of course. East won the first trick with the spade king, but North trumped a spade continuation, drew trumps, and won the rest with dummy's trumps and high hearts.

War Service Work Must Not Be Allowed To Lag, C.W.L. Members Warned At Session At Richmond

Annual Diocesan Convention of C.W.L. of Canada Opened this Afternoon with Presentation of Many Interesting Reports Reviewing Activities of Past Year—League Active in Many Departments.

Richmond, Sept. 29.—Delegates to the annual Diocesan Convention of the Catholic Women's League of Canada, in session here today, were reminded of the National War Service Convention's warning that while the general outlook may be brighter and more encouraging "we should not relax in the slightest degree our War Service work."

In the months to come "even greater courage, sacrifice and endurance will be demanded of us," the delegates representing five Diocesan sub-divisions—Richmond senior and junior, Sherbrooke senior and junior, and Lennoxville—were told.

The Diocesan War Service report revealed much work accomplished during the past year, with particular emphasis placed upon the Red Cross, the Merchant Navy and War Savings.

Another important report submitted this afternoon was that covering Social Service and Child Welfare, presented by Mrs. A. L. Vallee, Conventer, who stated that at no time in the history of the League have demands upon the members been greater. "The splendid reports on

PAST NATIONAL PRESIDENT AT CONVENTION

Richmond, Sept. 29.—The annual Diocesan Convention of the C.W.L. of Canada, which opened here this afternoon, is being honored by the presence of Mrs. J. Coffey, of Montreal, Past National President.

Guest speaker at tonight's dinner will be Rev. Father Gerald Berry, of Montreal, of the Catholic Welfare Bureau in that city.

Social Service and Child Welfare, received from the various sub-divisions, are proof that Catholic women, true to their motto "For God and Canada," are doing a great work for the spiritual and temporal welfare of our future citizens," Mrs. Vallee said.

The War Services report revealed that during the year 63 pairs of socks, two pairs of seamen's boots and 749 other garments were knitted for the Red Cross, this being an increase of 296 over the year before. A total of 1,568 hospital garments were sewn, 1,900 hospital supplies and 709 surgical dressings were made. Total number of garments made for evacuees were 1,357 and garments cut and assembled 906. Twelve Navy kits were made and filled. Other articles made included 143 quilt linings, 27 rolls of cotton, 8 twine balls, 103 quilts and five afghans.

The report also indicated that 133 ditty bags were made, filled and sent to the men of the Merchant Navy, the approximate value of

these bags being \$425.

Sixty-two housewives were made, 36 of these being filled at a cost of \$14.88.

In War Savings, the sum of \$37.25 was spent in the purchase of stamps for prizes and seventy-two members worked on various War Savings Committees.

Members helping in the Red Cross campaign collected \$159.40 and one member assisted in collecting \$265 at the Lord Sherbrooke Training Centre.

Thirty-one boxes, costing \$144.63, were sent to the Armed Forces; Overseas at Christmas and Easter and 600 cigarettes were sent to the League's adopted Overseas chaplain, Capt. the Rev. Charles Beaudry, at Christmas. The sum of \$75.75 was raised at an annual street fair for Christmas boxes for the armed forces overseas.

In her review of the work carried on by the Social Service and Child Welfare Department, Mrs. Vallee said that innumerable donations were made, boots and shoes given to school children, cases of clothing sent to the Sisters of Service, many pieces of clothing distributed, also quilts, sheets and pillow cases, cod liver oil, medicines and milk to undernourished children, room rent paid for unemployed girls, positions secured, children sent to summer camps, layettes made and given to expectant mothers, children outfitted for First Communion, visits made to the sick in homes and hospitals, Masses offered for deceased members and Christmas baskets distributed to families.

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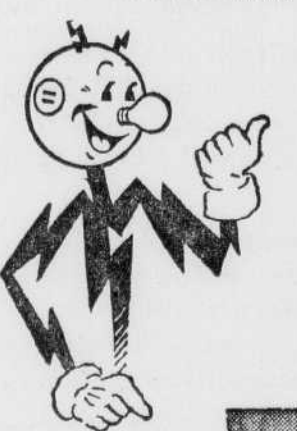

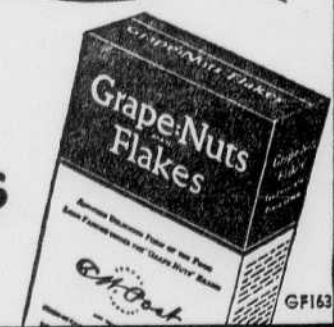

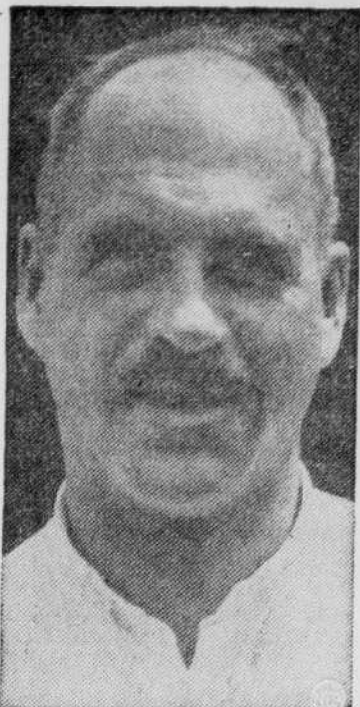

REASONS FOR INCREASE

A landlord may apply to a Rentals Ap-
praiser for an increase of maximum rent on
the following grounds:

- An increase in municipal taxes or water
rates payable by the landlord.
- Provision of more space for the tenant
or the supplying of furniture or additional
services by the landlord.
- Renovation of the accommodation at a
cost of not less than 10% of the municipal
assessed value of the accommodation.
- The accommodation is an apartment,
duplex or flat and the maximum rental is
less than that of other similar units in
the same building.
- The maximum rental is less than twice
the total of the taxes and water rates
payable by the landlord.

TENANTS MAY APPLY FOR A DECREASE
OF MAXIMUM RENT

- If the accommodation was rented for the first time between October
11, 1941, and December 10, 1942, and the landlord himself fixed
the maximum rent at a price substantially in excess of the rents
generally prevailing in the neighbourhood for similar accommo-
dation; or
- If the landlord has lessened the amount of space, furniture, equip-
ment, etc., or has lessened or discontinued any services such as
heat or hot water.

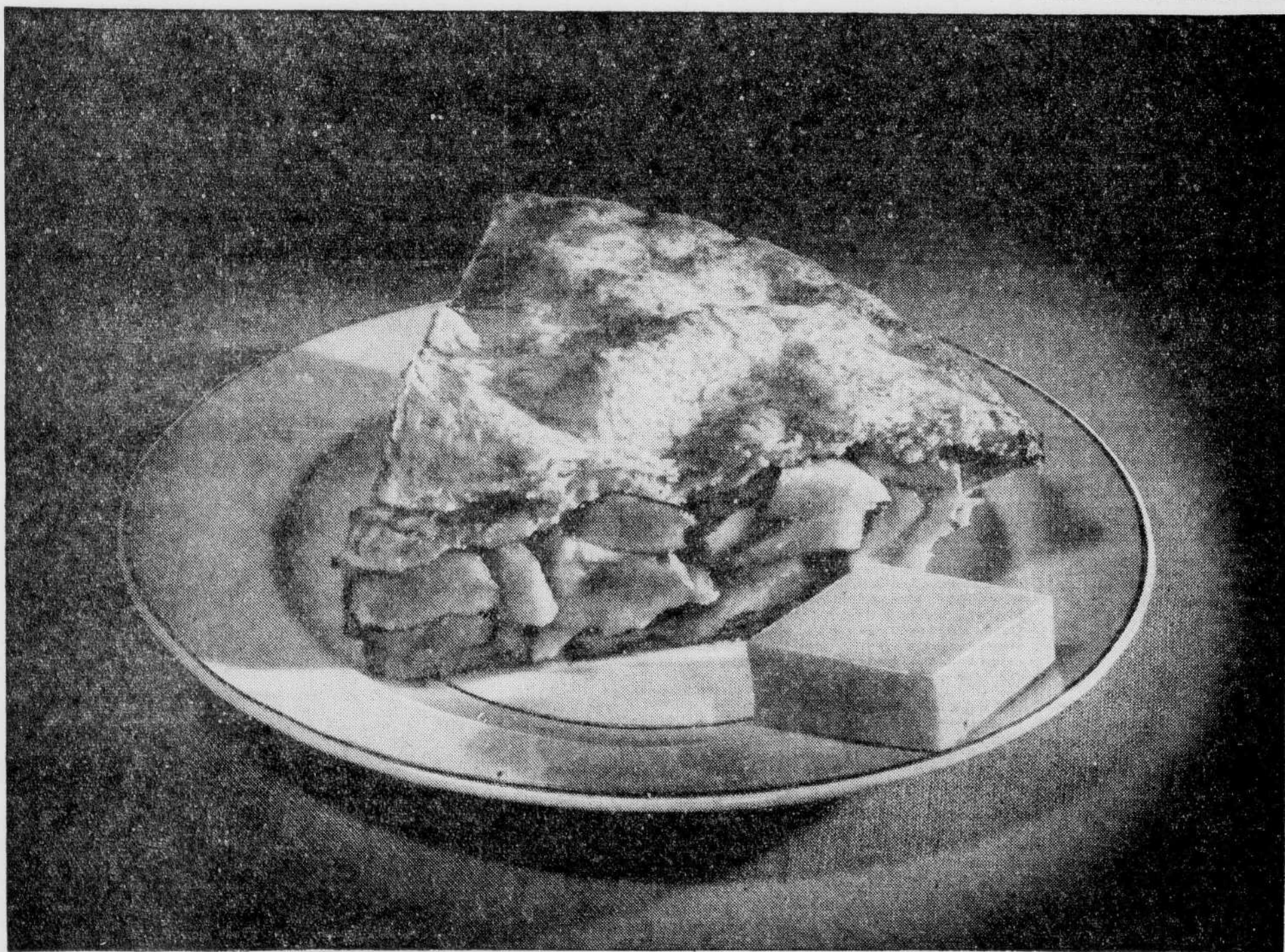

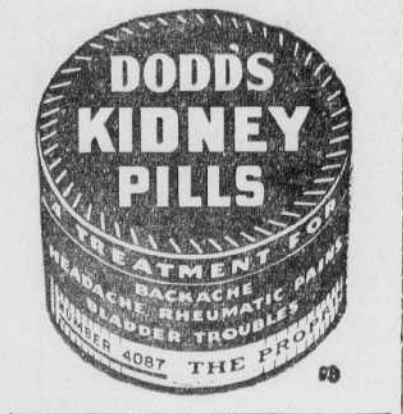

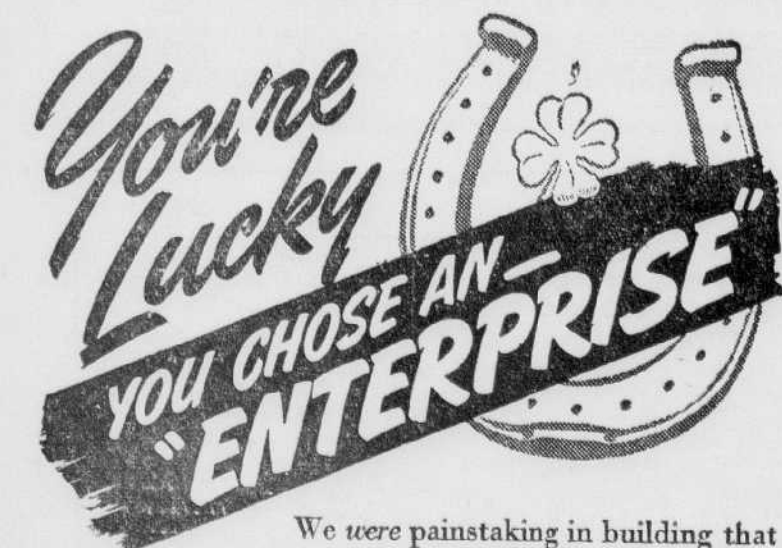
