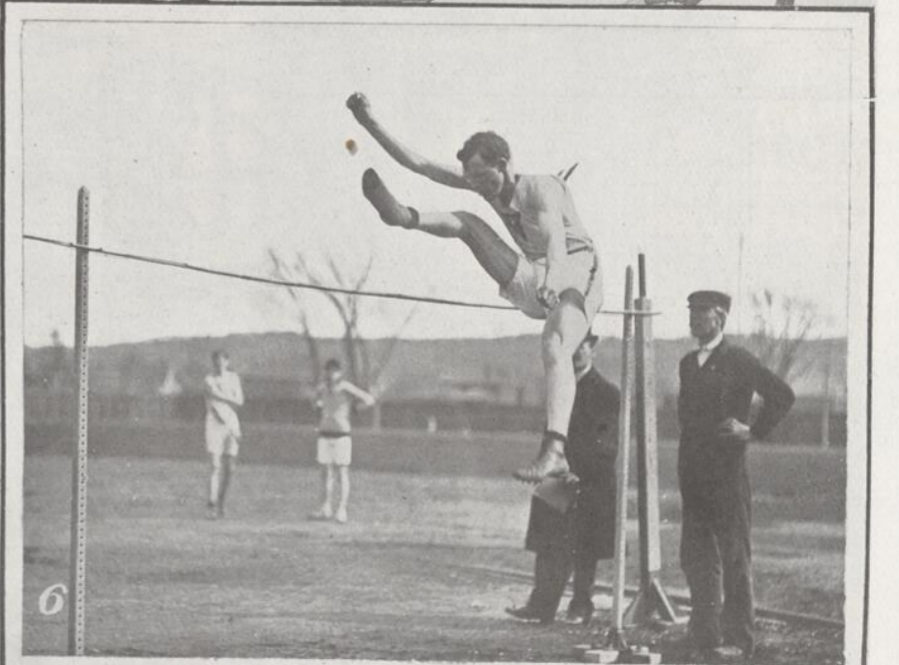


## Canadians and Americans Fraternize: Recent Splendid Banquet of Canadian Club of New York

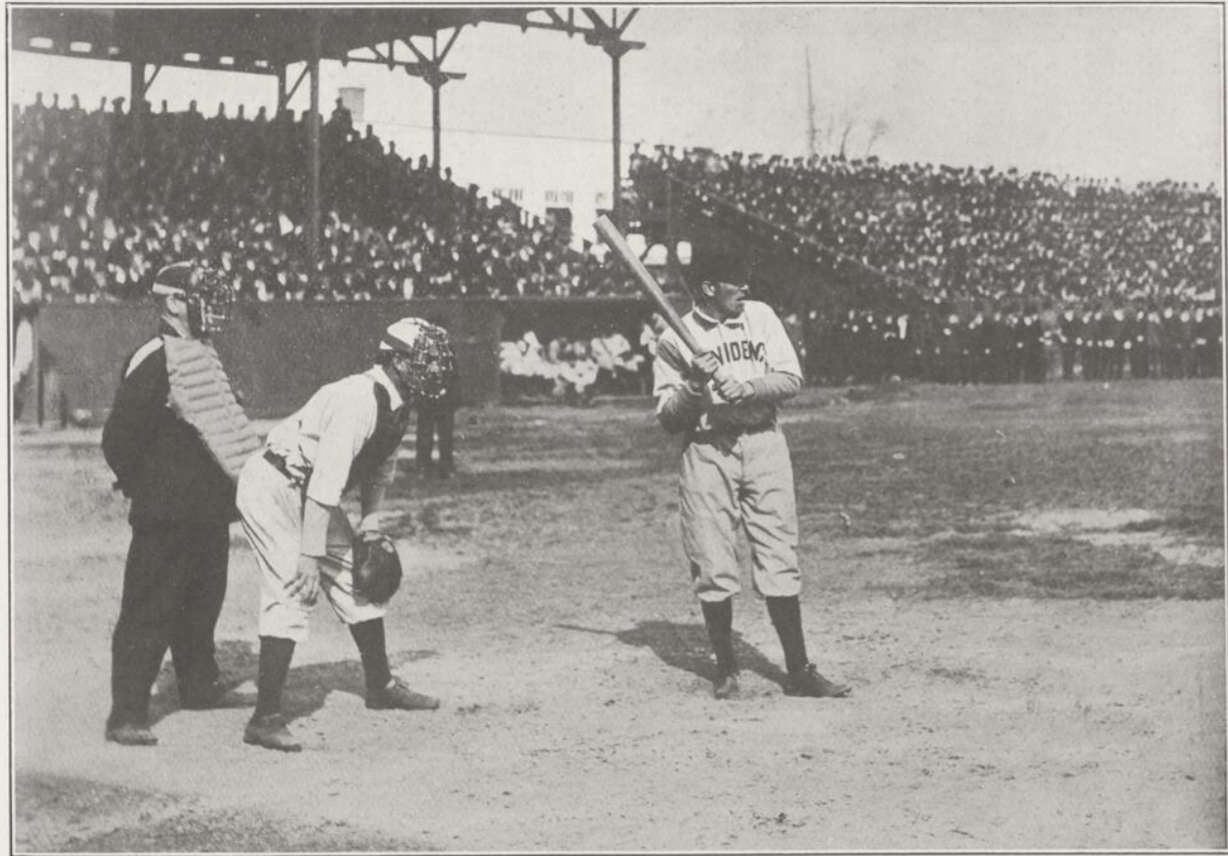

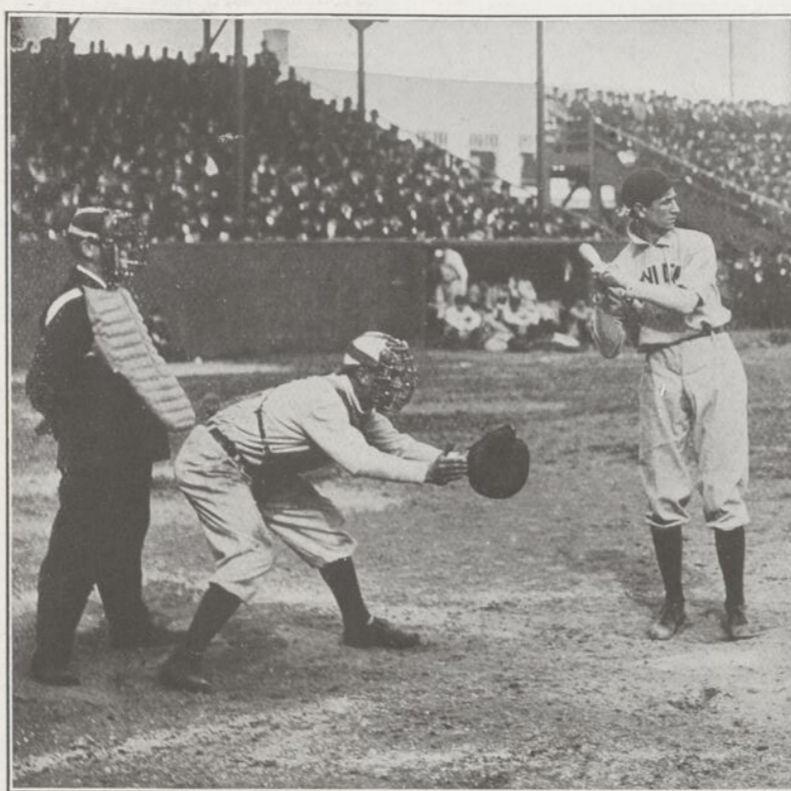
## Growth of Athletics in Canada: Striking Incidents at Recent "Bobby" Kerr Meeting at Hamilton

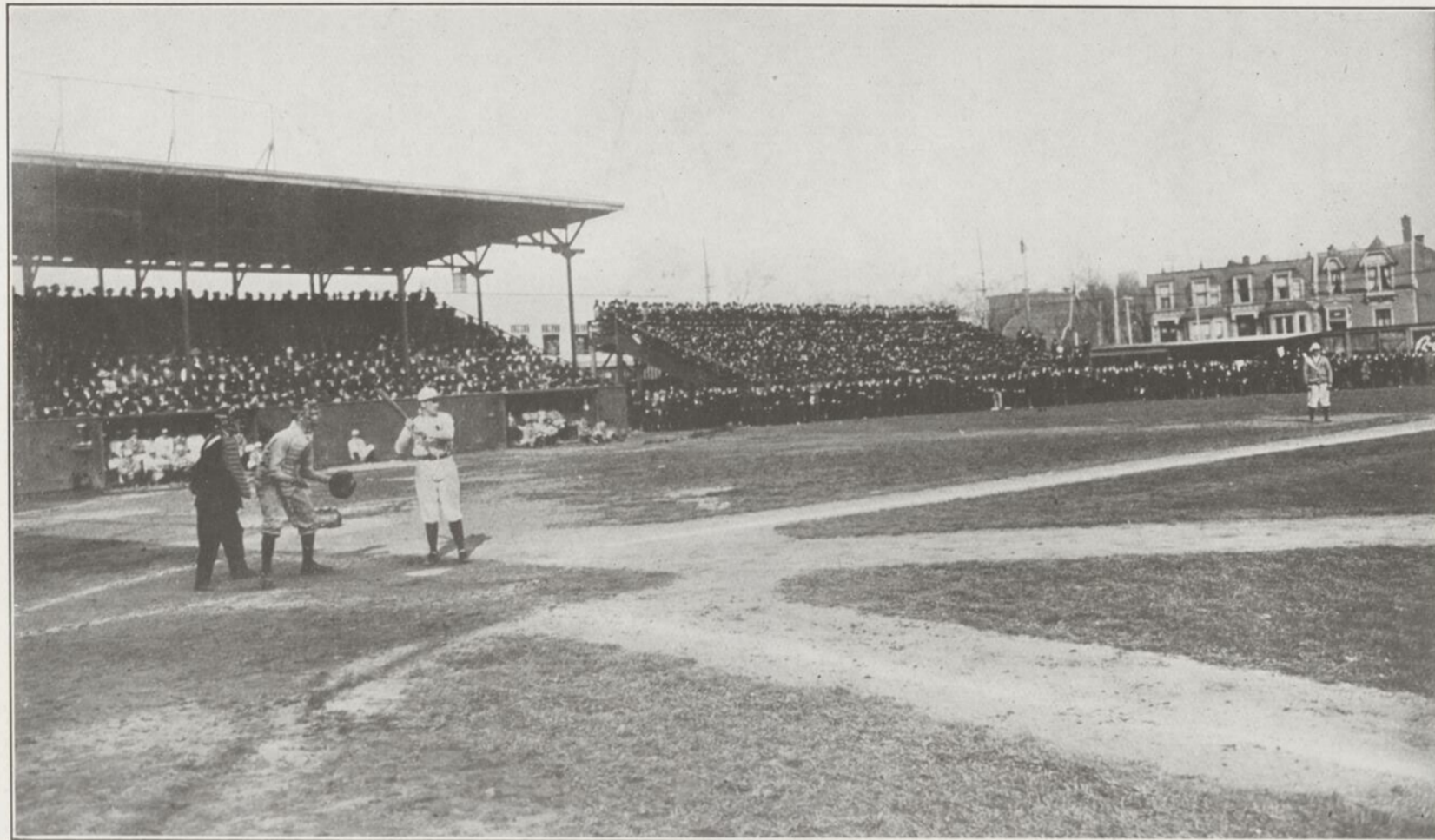

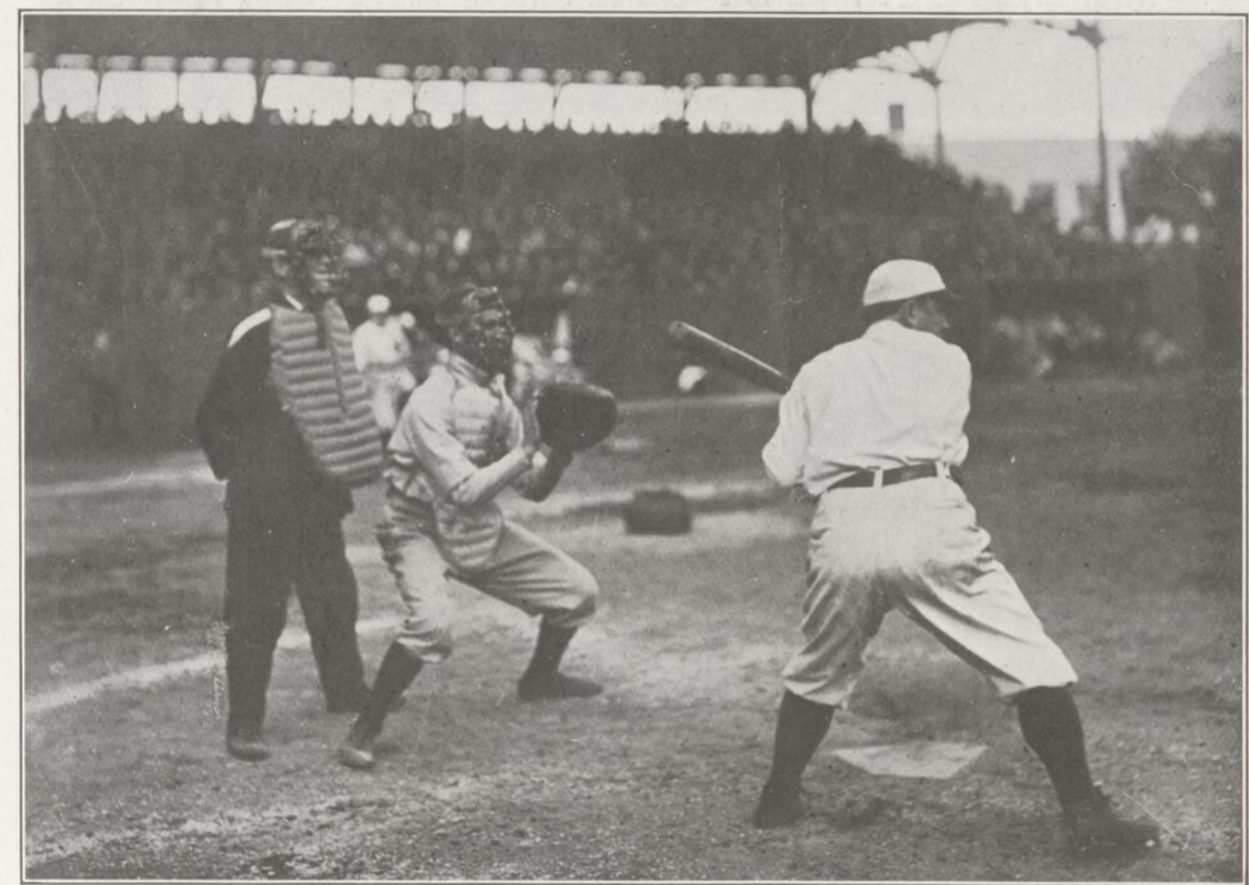

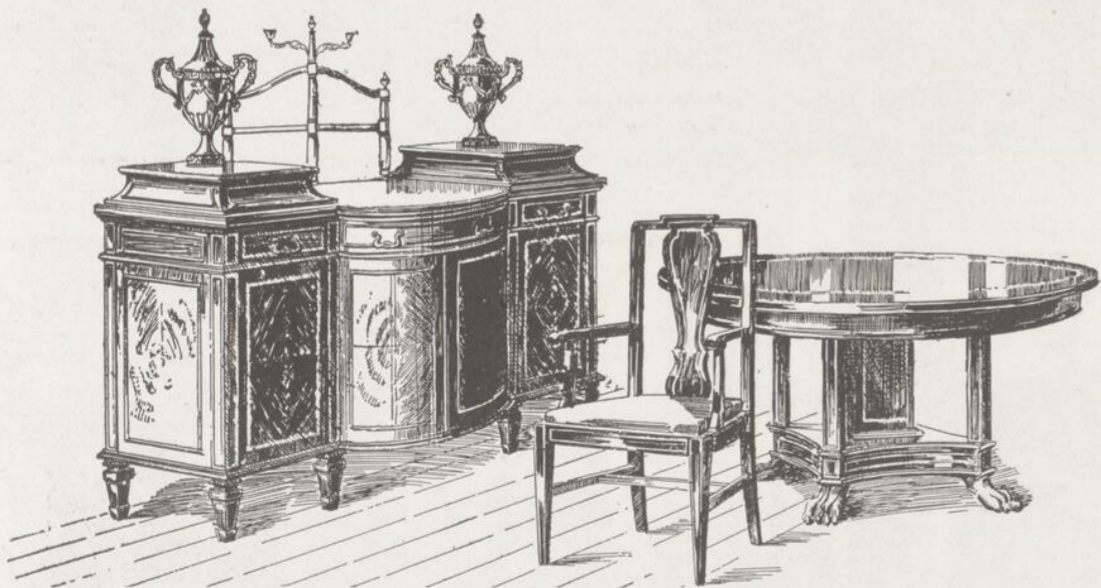

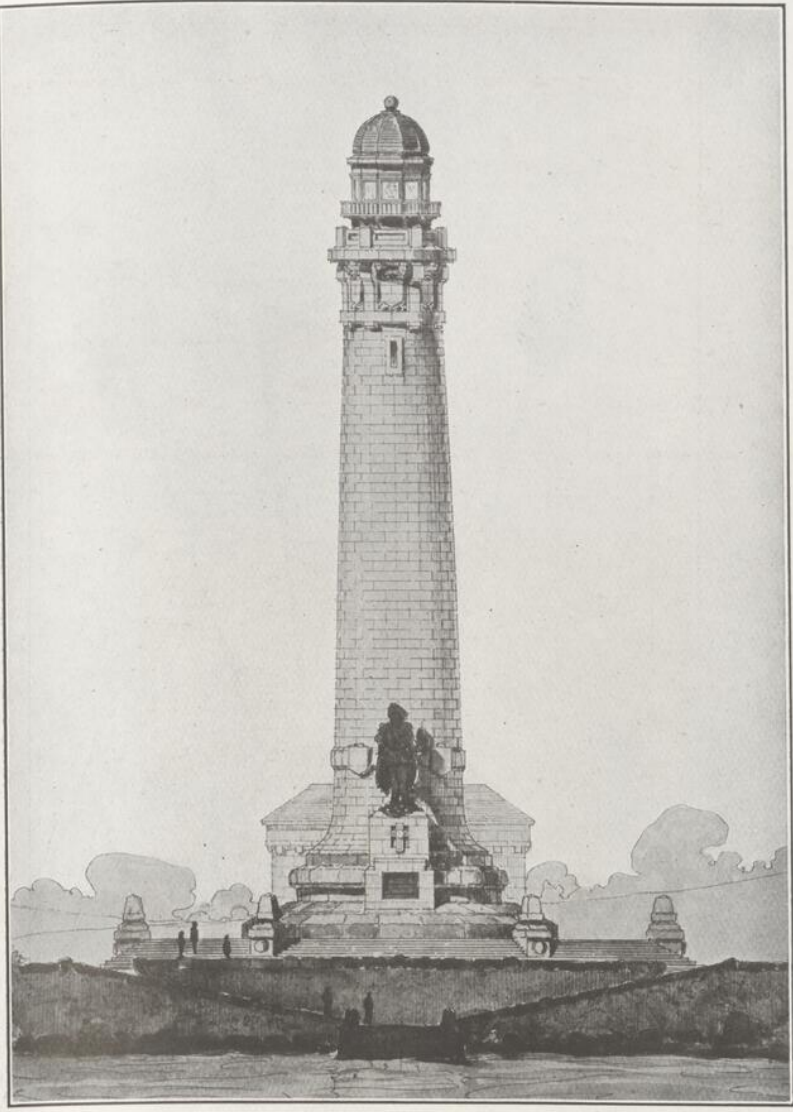

made on the enemy," by M. de La Mothe, a captain of the famous Carignan Regiment of the French Army. The old fort figured in many of the stirring incidents of the wars with the Indians following Champlain's discovery of the Lake, as well as during the Revolution and the War of 1812, and it is planned to care for the very interesting little collection of relics, now in a small frame building at the shrine of St. Anne, in the museum building which is proposed as a part of the memorial to Champlain. According to the plans which have been prepared, the entire Government reservation would be converted into a plaza, in the centre of which, rising from a stone platform one hundred feet square, would be the graceful circular tower of the lighthouse surmounted by its light, one hundred and forty feet above the level of the lake. For miles up and down the lake this lighthouse could be seen day and night. It would face towards the New York shore, and from the plaza a broad series of steps would lead down to the level of the lake. The estimated cost of the undertaking is \$50,000, and because the lighthouse and museum could be built of limestone taken from quarries but a short distance from the proposed site, it is believed the work of erecting them could be completed within four months of the letting of the contract.

Louis C. Lafontaine, of Champlain, N.Y., who is one of the members of the New York Lake Champlain Tercentenary Commission, is very anxious that immediate steps for the erection of the memorial should be taken, that the corner stone may be laid during the week of July 4, forming a portion of the celebration of the three hundredth anniversary of the discovery of the Lake. Mr. Lafontaine claims that the opportunity to lay the corner stone of the memorial during Tercentenary Week should not be allowed to pass, for President Taft, Vice-President Sherman, members of the Cabinet, the Ambassadors of Great Britain and France, Earl Grey (Governor-General of Canada), Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Governors Hughes (of New York) and Prouty (of Vermont), as well as many other dignitaries, will then be present, as the guests of the State and nation.

Though there has been no official announcement to that effect, members of the New York Lake Champlain Tercentenary Commission have good reason to believe that the Government of France stands ready to aid in the execution of the project by furnishing the

THE CHAMPLAIN MEMORIAL

ONE result of the celebration, during the entire week of July 4, of the three hundredth anniversary of the discovery of Lake Champlain, will probably be the erection, at some point on the shores of that beautiful body of water, of a permanent and fitting memorial to Samuel de Champlain, its discoverer, and definite action in the matter will probably be taken at a meeting next week of the New York Lake Champlain Tercentenary Commission. Plans for a Memorial Lighthouse, including a museum and a heroic size statue of Champlain, which have been prepared, and which have already been submitted to Governor Hughes and some of the members of the Tercentenary Commission, will be shown then, and will be probably acted upon.

The site of the proposed lighthouse memorial has not yet been definitely decided on. Several positions have been suggested, but the one most discussed is that now occupied by a small Government lighthouse on the north-west shore of Isle La Motte. This site, which is within the State of Vermont, is just over the boundary-line between that State and the State of New York. It is a Government reservation of about an acre in area, located very near the site of old Fort St. Anne and the shrine of St. Anne, where thousands journey annually on pilgrimages. The occupation of the site of Fort St. Anne as a

military base dates back to 1642 when it was selected as a rendezvous, "from which continued attacks could be

bronze statue of Champlain which it is planned to erect on a pedestal forty feet above the surface of the Lake, and at the base of the lighthouse shaft. This statue, according to the plans, will be nineteen feet high, and like the lighthouse itself, will face to the west. Upon the pedestal, space will be

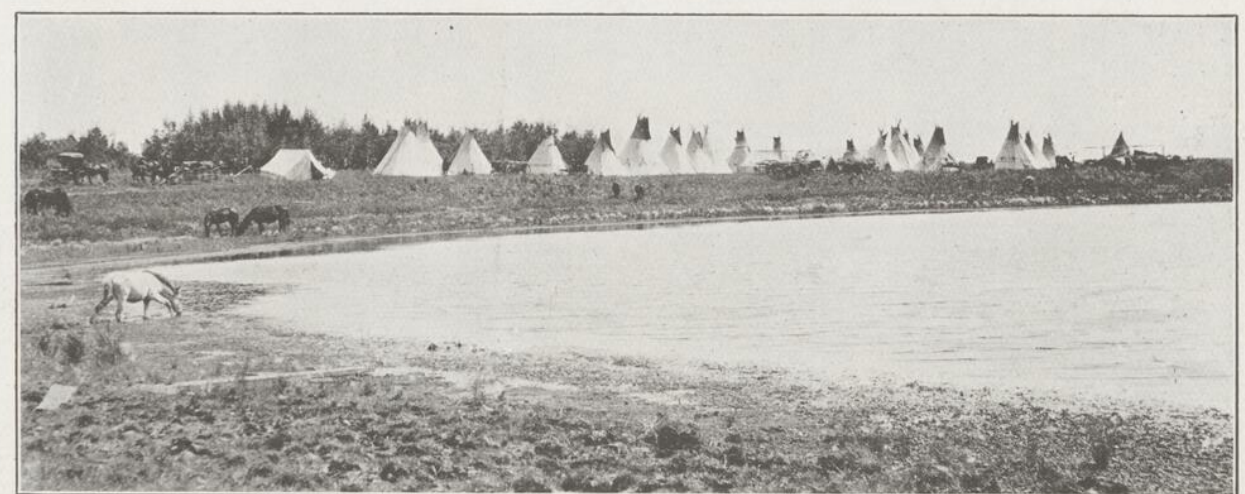

served for tablets to be erected by historical societies. From the plaza a series of broad steps will lead down to the level of the Lake. The location selected for the keeper's house and museum is just east of that chosen for the lighthouse, and both museum and lighthouse would be built of limestone similar to that used in the construction of the Victoria Bridge and in several of the small Government lighthouses now to be found about the shores of Lake Champlain.

Mr. Lafontaine, himself of French parentage, is a great admirer of his illustrious countryman Champlain, and is exerting every energy to insure the erection of a fitting memorial to him in the United States, on the shore of the beautiful body of water which he discovered.

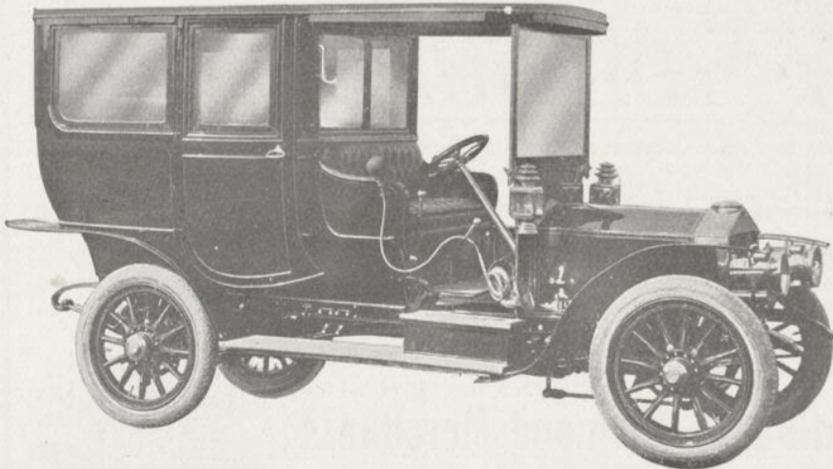

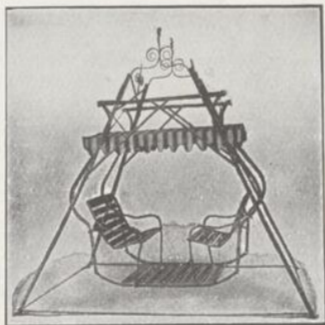
