THE MUNICIPAL FINANCES. His Worship Mayor PARENT submitted to the City Council last night a review of the municipal finances for the civic year ending the 30th April last, which is one of the most encouraging statements concerning local affairs that has been given to the Quebec public for a number of years back, and that fully bears out the gratifying reports that have been current for some time past as to the condition of the city treasury.

Commencing with a review of the civic situation as it was found by the present Council upon its entrance into office, His Worship showed that the close of the fiscal year 1893-94 left a deficit of \$99,761.28 between expenditures and appropriations, or an outlay of \$698,955.46 against appropriations of \$599,194.18. In addition to this there was an overdraft at the bank on the 30th April, 1894, of \$529,196.38. Seeing this alarming condition of affairs, the present Council bent all its energies towards ameliorating the financial position of the city. For the fiscal year 1894-95 it therefore voted appropriations to the sum of \$628,000, of which \$377,000 was to come from ordinary revenue, such as business and personal taxes, water rates, markets, licenses, Recorder's Court, &c., and the balance of \$251,000 to be levied on real estate by means of a tax of 20 cents in the dollar upon its annual value. For the first time in very many years, the City Council has not exceeded the amount of its appropriations. Out of the \$628,000 voted at the commencement of the fiscal year, only \$623,056.24 have been expended, leaving a surplus over appropriations of \$4,943.76. Moreover, the total receipts of the Corporation for the year, exclusive of the proceeds of debentures sold for the purpose of extinguishing the floating debt and for permanent works, amounted to \$627,000 in round figures. The fund debt has been slightly increased in order to extinguish the floating debt and to build the new City Hall, to widen St. Paul and Caron streets and construct the new fire station in St. Peter's Ward, but it is no less satisfactory than it is remarkable that the interest payable upon the debt is no higher than it was before.

The admirable economy that has prevailed in the administration of the finances during the past year and the success obtained in the sale of debentures has enabled the Council this year to reduce by 2 1/2 cents in the dollar, or from 20 to 17 1/2 cents, the tax upon real estate. This means that the present rate of taxation is pretty nearly what it was when the present Council entered into office, for it must not be lost sight of that the old Council, outside of a tax of 1/2 of one per cent over the real value of immovable property, had also imposed a special tax of one-twelfth of one per cent.

its credit in bank, the sum of \$165,079.55, bearing interest at 4 per cent, a large portion of which is destined to be paid out for permanent works.

The improvement in Quebec's financial position has not been without its effect upon the credit of the city abroad, and never before have its debentures been quoted so high as at the present time. The London Daily Stock and Share List of the 11th April last, which was produced by Mayor PARENT last night before the Council, quotes the city of Quebec's four per cent at 102 and reports sales of them at 102 1/2. Both the Mayor and City Council have our sincere congratulations upon the result of their financial administration of municipal affairs. Mayor PARENT has distinguished himself by his very close attention to the working of the various departments of the City Hall, and especially by his careful oversight of all expenditure and his regular attendance upon all Committee meetings. But he modestly places the credit for the present satisfactory showing of municipal affairs at the door of the Council over which he presides. It is certainly a novel experience as it is a satisfactory one for Quebec to find its annual balance upon the right side of the ledger, and we trust that it is a condition of affairs that may long continue. Meanwhile many of our readers may like to cut out the names of those to whom we are indebted for the first municipal surplus ever recorded in Quebec, and to paste them in their hats. THE TALK OF THE DAY. It will be remembered that shortly after the GREENWAY Cabinet received the message of the Federal Government, the remedial order, the Legislature of that Province adjourned, with the avowed object of studying the document. On Thursday next, 9th instant, the Manitoba statesmen will reassemble at Winnipeg, and a hot discussion on the question may be expected. A correspondent at the Capital informs us, that the Manitoba majority in the House, will carry their point, and that the prospects are, that the question will be submitted to the people, the Government, of course, making the matter the cry and chief plank in the platform of the Administration. It would seem, that war to the knife has been declared.

The feeling is growing that Newfoundland should have the opportunity of voting for, or against, union with Canada. The admission of the Island into our happy family would be intolerable only on the condition that her people were willing to cast in their lot with ours. We do not wish to take with the ancient colony, any grievances, which may turn out to be more or less vexatious. We believe, firmly, that the union would be beneficial to Newfoundland, and Newfoundland to her great fisheries, vast mineral deposits, and rich agricultural and forest possessions, could easily find scope for development once that Island became a part of Canada. The advantages are good on both sides, but the Islanders must understand thoroughly what they are doing. A plebiscite would do the business much better than a partisan conflict. The Island has had enough elections lately. But those contests were between rival parties. The present politicians need not be disturbed. Let them retain possession of their seats, but allow the people to vote "yes" or "no," and on the result of the vote the authorities could act. There is, just now, undoubtedly, a little current of ill-feeling in Newfoundland. The men arrayed against union with Canada, seem to be acting with considerable bitterness, and, certainly, without much knowledge of the real posture of affairs. There must be something behind this opposition, of the purport of which we are not aware. It seems so confined to a certain element of the population, that one is justified, even at this distance from the scene, to suspect, that there is a large-sized "nigger in the fence," somewhere. There is no annexation to the United States sentiment in the Island, worth speaking about. At least nothing in that direction is being done publicly. A few months ago, a handful of Boston oddish dealers started a boom, and called on the Newfoundlanders to enter the American Union. But the handful spoke without authority of any kind, and the Islanders easily saw through the little game, and declined to compromise themselves by even talking the matter at home, seriously. Then the Boston group subsided, and no one, now-a-days, hears a word about annexation. In the first place, Great Britain would not permit it. In the second place, the Newfoundlanders are not fools. They know, just as well as many others do, on what side their bread is buttered. And, in this year of grace, they are not disposed to make personal sacrifices for anybody. The door to Canada's heart is open. They can enter if they want to, and a warm and generous welcome awaits them. But they must speak the word. There is, and must be no coercion in this matter. A union framed without consent from both of the contracting parties, is not worth having. This should be thoroughly well understood, at the outset. It will save heart-burnings hereafter.

A PLEBISCITE FOR NEWFOUNDLAND. The report that the Newfoundland Government will submit the terms of union to the people of Newfoundland in the form of a plebiscite, is a comforting one. This will secure a vote on the matter, for itself, without the interference of party feeling or personal influence. The politicians will then not be compelled to go into the struggle in two opposing party camps, but may each man think and vote as a citizen.

As ready as Canadians are to receive Newfoundland into Confederation and thus to "round off the Dominion," they would not like the people of the new Province to feel that they had been unworthily trapped into union. Ours is a wide enough territory to manage from one centre of Government as it is, without bringing into the fold an unwilling population, suffering from a sense of having been swindled. Nothing so indignifying to a people as a belief that they have been betrayed by their representatives. Hence it will be a good thing for all concerned if the people of Newfoundland get a fair chance to vote upon the terms of union at an election unswayed by other questions, and we shall be ready to rejoice as Britons in the success of the plebiscite. We will like the marriage, but we prefer that the bride shall be willing. -Montreal Star.

The Shrivelly Matter. Under the title of "The Shrivelly Dispute," a contemporary says: "The dispute in the Sheriff's office appears to be on the eve of termination. Mr. Amyot apologized to Mr. Gagnon and offered a bond of \$4,000 as security for future good behavior, and the Sheriff is now considering the offer."

This information conveyed by this paragraph is entirely correct. Mr. Amyot has agreed to a bond of \$4,000 as security for his future good conduct. As Deputy Sheriff, he as well as the Sheriff, is held to give security for the faithful execution of the public duties, which pass through their hands, and it is this bond which the Attorney-General very properly exacts from all his officers.

Proposed Electric Railway. A letter from Mr. H. Besmer, President of the Quebec, Montmorency and Charlevoix Railway, was read at the City Council meeting last night, in which application was made to the Corporation for the right to run an electric railway through most of the important streets of the city. The letter was probably read in the usual and formal opinion of the promoters of the scheme. Mr. Besmer outlines in his letter some of the main features of the proposed railway. One of its divisions is to run from Champlain Market through Dalhousie, Leaside, Paul, Desjardins, Bridge, St. Francois, St. Ours, Masse, Aqueduct and St. Joseph's, and another branch up Cote d'Abraham, Frontenac and run out St. Louis street, Maple Avenue, and in St. Foye road, St. John street, Fabrique and Back, to take the Chateau Frontenac line to the St. Paul street for St. Charles and St. Valier streets to join the main line at St. Ours street. From St. Valier street it is proposed to build a branch up Cote d'Abraham, St. George street, D'Youville and Kent Gate to St. Louis street. Another link will connect St. John street with the main line by way of St. Nicholas and Palace streets, while yet another will connect the Palace Hill with that at the Post Office by way of the Grand Battery and Rampart street.
