## Realty Sales Hit 20 Mark In September

Westmount recorded 20 real estate sales with a value of \$506,842 during the month of September, it was shown in figures released this week by the Montreal Real Estate Board.

St. Laurent and Town of Mount Royal led the suburban municipalities in value with close to \$1,500,000 each.

Total of sales and value was up over the corresponding figure last year. There were 892 sales worth \$11,271,406, as compared to 846 sales worth \$10,397,198 in September of 1954.

The figures brought the Westmount cumulative total for the period from January through September up to 258 sales worth \$7,584,787, fifth highest evaluation among suburban municipalities.

Ranking higher are St. Laurent 674 sales worth \$15,037,536; Town of Mount Royal 482 sales worth \$11,970,502; Cote St. Luc 684 sales worth \$8,785,704; and Town of Pointe Claire 533 sales worth \$7,944,231.

Total for all suburban municipalities was 7711 sales worth \$11,440,377, compared to 6901 sales worth \$97,946,948 in the same period last year.

### Sub Post Office Open At Victoria

The sub Post Office — in the former Pascal store at Victoria and Sherbrooke streets — opened for business Monday.

"We have been urging the opening of a sub Post Office in this area for two years," city officials commented yesterday, "and we are happy to see it is in business for the Christmas rush."

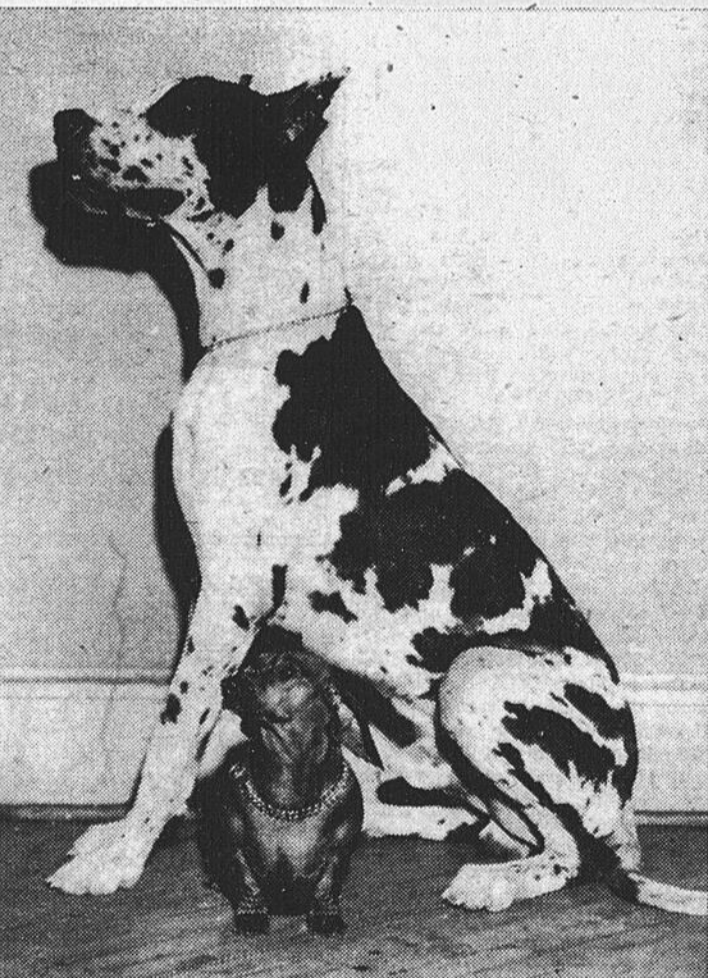

## Israel Punished For Virtues Max Freedman Tells Temple

The current situation of tension in the Middle East represents a decision that punishes Israel because of her virtues, Max Freedman, Washington editor of the Manchester Guardian and Winnipeg Free Press, said Wednesday.

It is impossible for Israel to live without freedom, he told a meeting of the Temple Emanuel Brotherhood in the Temple Community Hall, and thus it is possible to put into effect a calculated plan to woo the Arab states to the west.

Mr. Freedman was here to give the annual David Jassy Memorial Lecture.

He noted that America's basic principle has always been to find the strongest country in any area of tension, and make it an American ally.

"Israel was that strongest nation in the Middle East after the war with the Arab states, yet every security plan for the area has excluded her," he said.

"This decision to bypass Israel is based upon friendship with her."

He said that American policy has always averred that it is to Israel's ultimate advantage if the Arab states join the western bloc.

Mr. Freedman said that Israel has heeded a request to this effect, put forward by British Prime Minister (then Foreign Minister) Anthony Eden, in 1950. "Israel has never denied the right of other nations to ask the Arabs for friendship.

"Yet no security pact has ever been brought about."

He said that the Russian vote of assent for the state of Israel in the United Nations was "one of extreme hypocrisy . . . for at the same time Zionism was a crime in Russia."

He said that it was done to "ultimately foment antagonism.

The United States made their vote to produce a bridge of friendship. It is these two aims that are now in conflict."

Mr. Freedman said that the west fears not the Arabs nor their fighting power, but rather "Arab geography. Military experts agree that any attack would be made no both western Europe and the Middle East — simultaneously. This is the haunting fear that causes the

## Dr. H. J. Stern Speaks Tonight

The State of Israel today has its modern Maccabees, Rabbi Dr. Harry J. Stern will tell his congregation at Temple Emmanuel tonight in a special Chanukah message.

In part Rabbi Stern's message follows:

"We usher in tonight Chanukah which recalls the heroism of the Jewish zealots known as the Maccabees who fought the Syrian-Greek pagans and defended Judaism with its timeless message of the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of man. Had the Maccabees failed in the year 165 B.C.E. the spiritual life of the whole world would have been engulfed. Christianity and Mohammedanism the two daughter religions of Judaism would never have been born.

"We of our own day must emulate the heroism of the Maccabees of old and do battle against the paganism of power, gratification of the senses and the worship of materialism. We must be possessed of the qualities of the ancient Jewish heroes such

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Ernest Cousins Marks  
His Ninetieth Birthday

Ernest Cousins, well known local resident who built a single-wagon milk round into a two million dollar business celebrated his ninetieth birthday yesterday.

And he went about 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. daily tasks as usual.

"I have reached the time of life" he told friends "when rest is a hobby of mine".

Travelling, however, is his chief hobby. For some years past now he has visited many parts of the world in order to see the historic cities of the past — Carthage, Jerusalem, Damascus and others. He points out from his deep lore of historical knowledge that Damascus is today the oldest populated city in the world. In Palestine he carried out the wish to follow in the footsteps of St. Paul to walk the street called "Straight."

Long automobile journeys are another of his hobbies, or, possibly, part of the travel hobby. Last summer he drove 1,300 miles to Cape Cod and back.

Mr. Cousins gave, as his recipe for longevity, hard work

and a contented mind. Actually, however, he comes of a hardy race of seafaring ancestors who left Normandy some 300 years or more ago to settle in what is now Norwich, on the east coast of England. There, right up to his father's time, the family went down to the sea in ships. But his father felt that seafaring was no pursuit for a married man, so he went off to Northampton and entered the shoemaker business.

Here Mr. Cousins was born and in all probability would have remained if he had not been sent to school in London. He finished his schooling at the age of 14, and went to work, but having seen "distant parts" once, he itched to be off again, and at the age of 19 he set out for Canada.

He founded the business which has brought him fame and fortune in August, 1889, and said he never regretted the move. "Why milk?" he replied to a question. "It was the farm. I got a two-wheeled cart with a horse, and started up in Griffintown. I got my milk from the farmer I had worked for, and everything went along fine — except in winter."

He recalled that a toll-gate straddled the road from Montreal to Longue Pointe in those days, and at times the snowdrifts completely buried it. Often the horse stumbled into the gate in the snow and had to be dragged out.

Mr. Cousins kept his own cows at the Longue Pointe farm, and made steady progress in business. "I never had what are called 'lucky breaks' nor was there any particular 'turning point,'" he says. "It was steady growth all the time from 30 gallons a day delivered at first to the thousands of gallons delivered today."

At one time the Cousins' stables boasted 100 fine horses, but everything is mechanized today. Mr. Cousins said he regrets the passing of the horse. "Horses, dogs and children are my chief pets," he admits.

His interests, however, have covered a wide field. He has been the president of "a good many" organizations, and is the oldest surviving past president of the Kiwanis Club of Montreal; a former deputy District Grand Master for Quebec of the Masonic Order, a Shriner and member of the Scottish Rite. He was a golfer at one time, a leading member of the St. George Snowshoe Club, and member of other social and sporting clubs.

His wife, the former Maud Douglas, of Lachute, died in 1948, and a son and a daughter have predeceased him. But his two other sons, Frank and Cecil, are now in the business, and two other daughters are happily married. They are Helena, whose three children, Bill, Ernest and Babs Chauvin, all served in the Second World War, and Grace, who is Mrs. Alex Muir.

Mr. Cousins still feels the loss of his wife. They were married more than 60 years.

He recalls a striking coincidence in the history of Montreal business concerns. Three of the largest dairy concerns still operating in the city were all opened about the same time. These included the Cousins business, and those of J. J. Joubert and Guaranteed Pure Milk Co., the latter founded by the late George Hogg. Mr. Cousins referred to Mr. Hogg, a one-time Mayor of Westmount, as "one of the finest men this district has ever produced."

The Westmount Municipal Association met in Victoria Hall last Tuesday night.

Approximately 75 people attended, and after hearing reports read by the various committee heads, participated in an open question and answer period.

Some of the questions were leading and at one time it was asked that if city council had the prerogative of refusing suggestions or demands made by the association, were not the members wasting their time. Chairman Thomas Atkinson replied that the function of the association was neither to run the city of Westmount, nor in any way to attempt to circumvent the action taken by the city council to resolve certain problems. The association, he said, served mainly as a sounding board for public opinion.

Mayor James A. DeLalanne, and City Manager T. J. Hughes, both of whom were in attendance, were not called upon to answer spot questions from the floor, but the mayor did volunteer a few comments regarding one-way streets and traffic regulations.

He said that the increased flow of traffic through Westmount of late, was due in part to the altering of the intersection at Queen Mary Rd., and Cote des Neiges. Then too, more and more motorists are being attracted to the one-way routes of the Cote Road and Westmount Avenue, as a quicker means of getting to and from work. He said that minor changes to these thoroughfares may be warranted as the traffic shakes down to some sort of consistency.

One other suggestion worthy of mention was that traffic lights be installed at the intersection of Lansdowne and Sherbrooke, to be operated during rush hours. We all know that signal lights slow traffic down

considerably, but if everybody is to get a fair chance of getting into main arteries we'll just have to put up with them, he said.

It has been said that 75% of all Westmount traffic is transient. Quite frankly I can't see what purpose is served by this kind of statistic. With a population of 28,050 people, and situated practically in the middle of greater Montreal, the traffic can hardly be anything but transient.

## Jewish Teaching Problems Remain, Eisenberg Holds

Several problems still remain to be solved in the Jewish education of children, despite an upsurge in the past six years, Dr. Azriel Eisenberg, executive director of the Jewish Education Committee of New York said this week.

Addressing a meeting at Shaar Hashomayim Synagogue, on Education of Our Youth, he said Jewish afternoon school enrolment increased to 400,000 from 239,000 during the last six years, and in day schools enrolment jumped from 1,844 to 30,268.

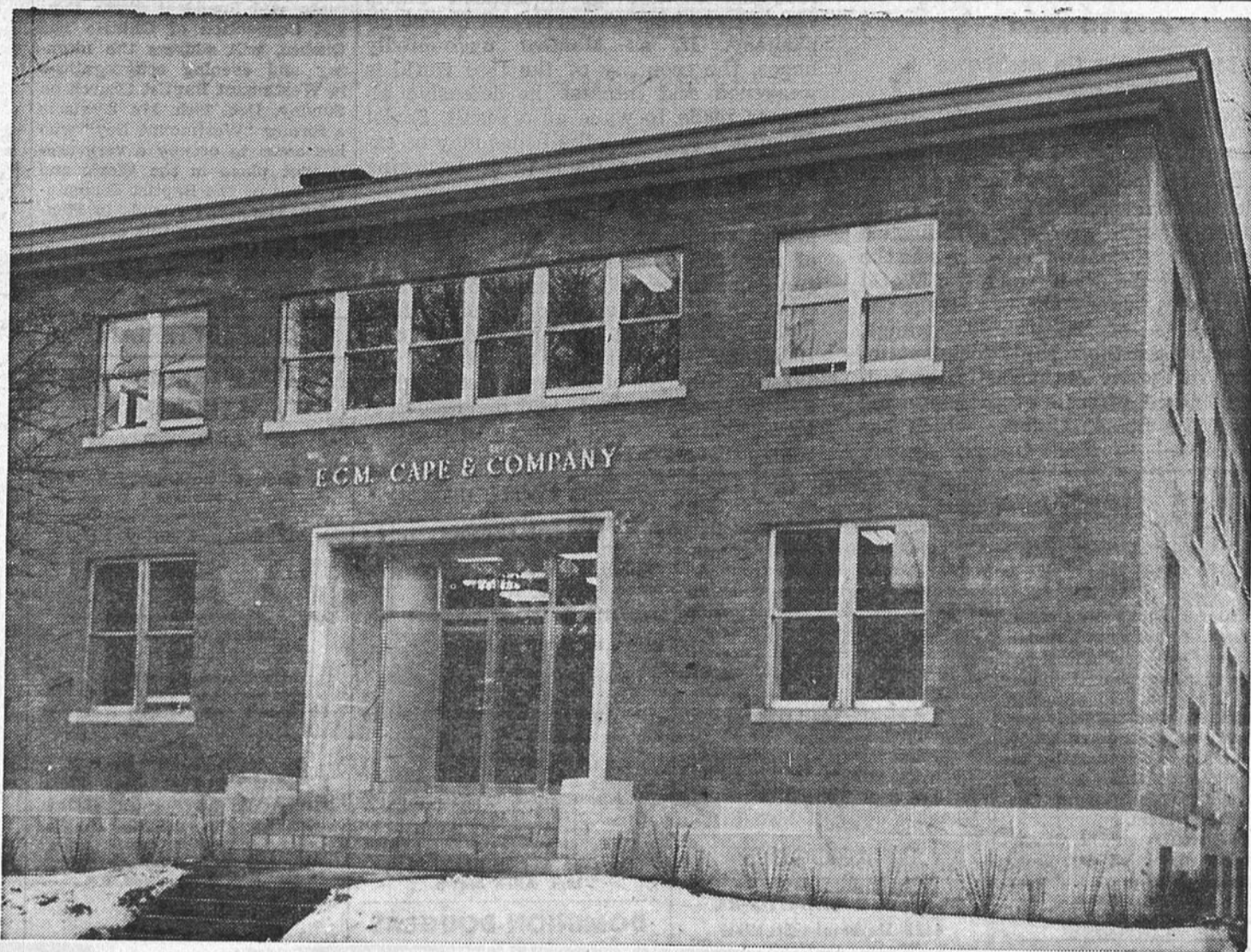
Another encouraging factor, he said, in relation to the afternoon schools, was that children were being enrolled at a younger age than ever before. Average age now is eight instead of 10.

"This welcome increase, however," said Dr. Eisenberg, "has created three problems that need our immediate attention. We have a very serious teacher shortage, and we must provide continuity in Hebrew education—through Hebrew high schools—to develop teachers."

Then, said Dr. Eisenberg, the importance of adult education must not be overlooked. "The parents must progress with the child so that the youngster does not feel that his education is irrelevant or remote to community life."

The third step necessary, said the educator, was to develop further Hebrew summer camps where the child's education can be extended beyond the classroom.

## New E.G.M. Cape Building In Tune With Expansions

WC Howard F. Marcou, of Westmount, now commanding RCAF Station, Mont Apica, Lake St. John, Quebec, will assume a staff position at AFHQ next month, it was announced recently by Air Force Headquarters.

Born in Westmount, WC Marcou served with the RAF before joining the RCAF overseas in 1943. He flew on operations with the famous 405 Pathfinder squadron and after several flights over enemy territory was shot down in February, 1945, over Germany. He was released two months later.

In 1945 he was posted to RCAF Station Lachine and during the next seven years successively served at RCAF Station, Trenton, Air Force Headquarters, the Experimental and Proving Establishment, RCAF Station, Rockcliffe, and Air Defence Command Headquarters at St. Hubert. In 1952 he completed the fighter control course with the USAF and was appointed to his present position in August, 1953.

WC Marcou was married in England in 1940 to the former Joyce Quarington, and has three children; Richard William, 13; Lesley Sandra, 11; and Victoria Louise, aged 2.

## Aid To Asia

### Moscow Steps Up Assistance For Propaganda Value

Economic aid from Western countries is no longer 'news' in Asia and the Middle East. In fact, most foreign economic aid provided by Canada, the U. S., the U. K. and other Western countries is funnelled through such international agencies as the UN, the Colombo Plan and the World Bank in order, supposedly, to assuage the susceptibilities of recipients. Strange, therefore, to see those same recipients of Western generosity enthusiastically hailing the limited offers of economic aid made by the Soviet Union, which has never deigned to cloak its gestures of

the UN or some other multilateral agency.

The truth is that Western countries will achieve precisely nothing by stepping up economic aid to countries of Asia and the Middle East. The threat of Soviet imperialism, which is the only ground upon which advocates of the Colombo Plan and other international 'give-away' schemes have sought to justify their action, will re-emphasize on economic aid, which socialists in the free world will be quick to applaud on 'humanitarian' grounds, is in fact just another of the sudden shifts which have long characterized Soviet diplomacy. If, as Moscow undoubtedly hopes, the economy of the free world is weakened and interest in defensive alliances made to wane as a result, Soviet diplomacy some months hence may be expected to resume its tone of hectoring belligerency once again.

Moscow's objective, whatever the methods employed, is to impress as much of mankind as possible that in the long run communism will prevail. To this end, every instrument of propaganda will be invoked to exploit local or regional conflicts, to discredit the motives of the West in the eyes of uncommitted peoples, and to create discord and divergence of views among free nations as to the best course of action to follow.

A noted figure in the construction industry, Mr. Wilmut was associated 44 years with Cape and Company, retiring as secretary-treasurer in April of this year.

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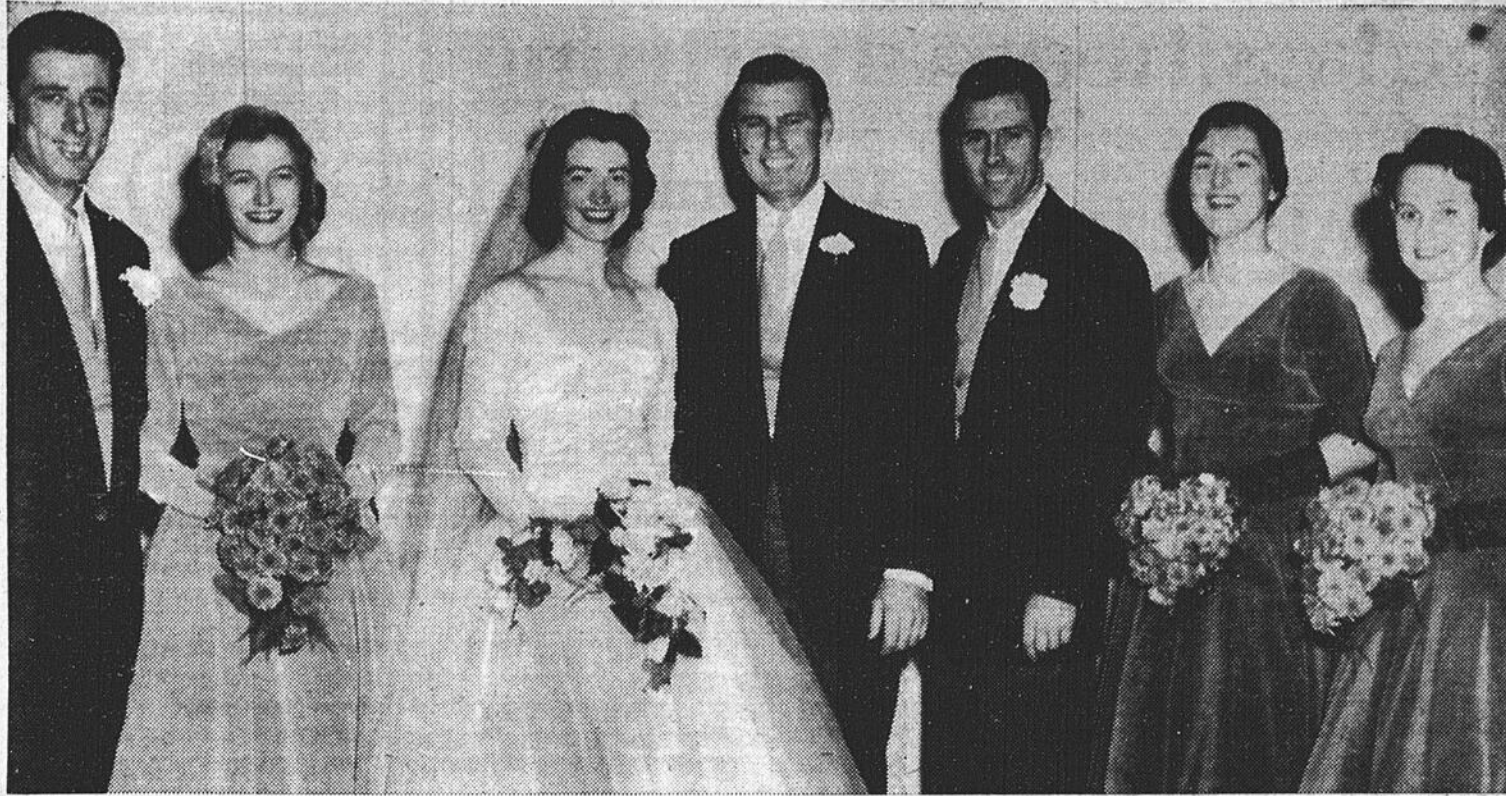

west's policy to so violently want the Arabs."

He said that if Russia can become established in Egypt, it will give the Soviet a direct hand at Africa, "where exists potentially one of the most dangerous situations in the world."

But more important, he said, there is the possibility that a secret agreement has been reached between Egypt and Russia not to allow British troops to re-enter the Suez Canal Zone, in the event of trouble in the Middle East.

"Never before has Russia made an arms agreement with a government that allowed the use of its land as a military base for another country. What makes us think that she has done otherwise in this instance?"

He also claimed that the refugee problem in Israel is actually "an unsuccessful fifth column. The call from Cairo came out that Arabs left behind should burn and plunder the surrounding territory, and generally cause as much mischief as possible."

Mr. Freedman called upon Israel and other interested parties to bring these facts to light, along with several other Arab misdemeanors, rather than allow the Arabs "to bury them in the dust of time."

as loyalty, to faith, self knowledge and self respect.

"The tiny State of Israel today has its modern Maccabees. In its struggle against the Arabs Israel is seeking to preserve the basic ideals of democracy. The Middle East conflict can be arrested if the Western powers will not flirt with the scions of Arab feudalism and instead bolster the sons of freedom of Israel who are seeking to sit down with Arab neighbours and establish peace that will bring blessings for all the inhabitants of the Middle East.

"In this hour of a world moral crisis we light the Chanukah candle and we rededicate ourselves to labor unceasingly in the cause of world freedom and

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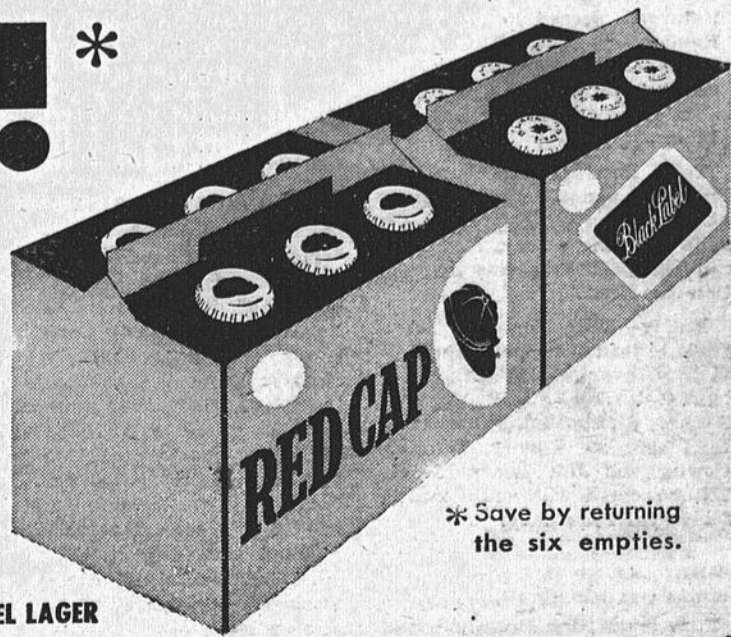
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
