

Westmount Second On Suburban List Of Realty Sales

Westmount ranked second among suburban municipalities in value of real estate sales during the month of August, it was shown in figures released this week by the Montreal Real Estate Board.

There were 30 sales locally, worth \$1,406,637. Town of Mount Royal ranked first with 60 sales worth \$1,609,639, and St. Laurent third with 66 sales worth \$1,186,225.

All suburban municipalities recorded 943 sales worth \$12,561,552. Last year at the same time there were 917 sales worth \$16,246,729.

Westmount ranked fifth in value of sales among the municipalities for the period from January through August, with 238 sales worth \$7,077,945.

St. Laurent led with 600 sales worth \$13,542,143, while Town of Mount Royal, Cote St. Luc and Town of Pointe Claire all recorded higher value totals.

There were 6819 sales over the period, worth \$100,168,971. Last year over the corresponding time there were 6055 sales worth \$87,549,750.

Tram Commission Notes New Routes For Local Buses

The Montreal Transportation Commission has announced that when Cote St. Antoine Rd. and Notre Dame de Grace, Westmount and Cedar Avenues become one-way arteries about Nov. 12, adjustments will be made accordingly in the routes of the No. 4 (Westmount-N.D.G.), the No. 102 (Somerset) and No. 114 (Claremont) buses.

Through co-operation of the City of Westmount and Montreal's traffic department, Cote St. Antoine Rd. will take only west-bound vehicles, while N.D.G. Westmount and Cedar Avenues will constitute a one-way road for eastbound vehicles as far as

F. W. Cowie, 92, Buried Tuesday

Funeral service was held Tuesday for Frederick William Cowie, of 3745 The Boulevard, chief engineer of Montreal harbour until his retirement in 1926, who died Sunday at this residence. He was 92 years old.

Mr. Cowie became chief engineer of the harbor in 1907. Prior to that, he had supervised the widening and deepening of the St. Lawrence river ship channel.

The beacons which guide ships up the channel at night were established under his direction following his lengthy studies of tides and river navigation.

He was awarded the Telford Gold Medal, one of engineering's most notable awards in 1914 in London, England.

Mr. Cowie was born in Caledonia, Ont., and attended Woodstock College and McGill University where he graduated in 1886.

His first job on graduation was planning the Niagara Falls Park. From Niagara Falls he came to Montreal for his work on the St. Lawrence ship channel.

In 1908, he was one of a group of engineers who made extensive surveys of the principal harbors of Europe and the United Kingdom.

He was a member of the Rideau Club, Ottawa, the St. James Club, Montreal Jockey Club, and a life member of the McGill Graduates Society and the American Society of Civil Engineers.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. C. S. Peck, Allentown, Penn., and Mrs. H. A. Crombie, and a son Frederick W. Cowie.

Current Events Club Debates Three Topics

The United Nations is actively engaged in diminishing the skirmishes on the borders of Israel. The big Western powers are trying to turn the USSR away from rearming Egypt. A possible solution was for the U.N. to station international police on the boundary lines.

Princess Margaret's decision not to marry Peter Townsend was accepted with mixed support and criticism, the latter mainly from the girls in the meeting.

The television program called "The \$64,000 Question" was, in general strongly defended on the grounds of sportsmanship, entertainment, and successful advertising. The point of such a program encouraging dreams of easy money in place of honest labour did not appear to impress the meeting.

Preliminary hearing examinations of Westmount school children are revealing cases of hearing loss.

While it is still too early for any concrete figures, it was stated by Dr. Donald G. Mackay, city health officer, than "an appreciable number" of the children already screened, do have a hearing impairment.

Now this doesn't mean you have to dash right out and buy little Johnny or Mary a hearing aid. On the contrary, Dr. Mackay wants it known that there is not even cause for alarm at this stage of examination.

The purpose right now is not to determine the extent of hearing loss, but to establish the fact that hearing loss is present. Those who do not pass the preliminary test will be brought back for further testing, at which time the extent of loss will be more fully determined.

Fortunately not all such cases are serious. Sometimes a student, who at the time of the first screening has a head cold, which often produces slight deafness, will fail, but pass a second screening with flying colors.

Some children may require nothing more serious than a simple ear flush, which can be done in the doctor's office.

Others who have a slight hearing loss of more permanent nature, can overcome this difficulty by moving closer to the front

of the room, although this can be something of a catastrophe at times too. (I remember one teacher who brought my gum-chewing to an abrupt end by this simple maneuver. Caught me every time.)

Dr. Mackay, who is head of the institute that bears his name, and was founded by a great great uncle, says good hearing is of paramount importance in the young child. Many speech impediments can be traced back to faulty hearing, and after all, who can blame a child for being unable to pronounce sounds he has never heard.

Some children, he continued, are accused of being inattentive, disinterested, and even a little backward. They are unco-operative at play with other youngsters, shy and retiring with adults, yet when given the special training they require, these same children sometimes develop into brilliant students.

He concluded by saying all parents should keep a careful watch on their children, and if a hearing loss is suspected, to consult a doctor as soon as possible.

I guess Hallowe'ens just ain't what they used to be.

The 114 Officers and Men who paid the supreme sacrifice while serving with the 17th Hussars during World War II will be honoured at the Armoury Sunday November 6th, when a Plaque will be unveiled in their honour, by Lt-Col. the Honourable Hughes Lapointe, Minister of Veterans Affairs.

The plaque is being presented to the Regiment by the 17th Hussars Association, which is very active with over 500 members, all of whom have at one time or other served with the Regiment.

D. C. Munro, president of the association, has announced that most of the Next of Kin have been notified and are expected to attend. Including Next of Kin and their families, Association members, civic and military dignitaries and the general public, over 2,000 people are expected to witness this commemorative ceremony.

The president of the association is, however, very anxious that all Next of Kin hear of the unveiling, since many could not be traced due to their address being unknown.

For the ceremony the plaque will be mounted on an "Arc" armoured car, which carried members of the Regiment through France, Holland and Germany.

An Interesting Visit

Bishop of Kootenay To Preach at Church of The Advent

The Lord Bishop of Kootenay, Rt. Rev. Philip R. Beattie, will preach at the Church of the Advent, Westmount, on Sunday evening. The visit of His Lordship will be of interest to a large number of local residents.

Dr. Beattie, who succeeded the late Rt. Rev. Frederick Clarke this year, is a graduate of the University of Toronto. Following a year of study at Wycliffe Col-

lege for his Licenciante of Theology, he was ordained Deacon and, in 1937, was raised to the Priesthood. From 1936 until 1940, Dr. Beattie acted as general secretary for the Student Christian Movement of Canada. Following periods as rector at Sudbury and St. Catherines, he was made a canon of Christ Church Cathedral, Hamilton, and, in 1952, became Dean of Niagara. In March last, Dr. Beattie was elected Bishop of Kootenay, and was consecrated in Christ Church Cathedral, Victoria.

The Church of the Advent has always maintained a close association with the Diocese of Kootenay. The first bishop, Rt. Rev. Alexander Doull, served as both curate and rector of the Advent between 1899 and 1910, and Rev. Frederick Clarke, appointed deacon-assistant at the Advent, in 1935, was consecrated third Bishop of Kootenay in 1948. At present, Mr. Michael Hewton, a resident of N.D.G. and a member of the Advent congregation, is studying for the ministry at Bishop's University. On completion of his studies, he will be ordained by Bishop Beattie and will work in the Diocese of Kootenay.

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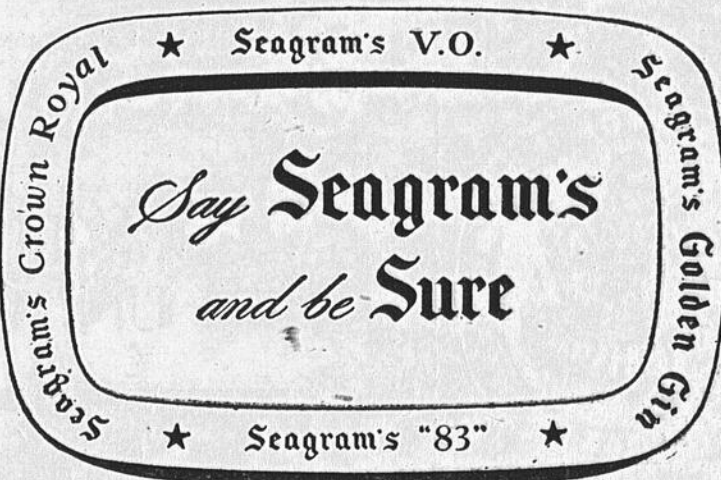
