London June 20.—The town is now all bustle. It has been increasing since twelve o'clock, and promises an immense crowd in the course of the day. The people in the line through which the procession is to pass are leaving their shops, and the company already assembling to take their stations on the balconies and at the windows. Bands, with many bones and cleavers, with blue cockades, and various complimentary to the Barenet, are parading the streets. About one o'clock, a party of about 300, from Solis, with blue cockades and colours flying, proceeded down Catherine-street and the Strand, for the city. They marched two and two, and invited every passenger whom they met to join them. At Catherine-street they were met by the 12th Light Dragoons, on their way to Hyde Park Corner. The music of the former was playing St. Patrick's Day. The band of the Dragoons immediately struck up "God save the King." The 14th Light Dragoons have followed the 12th; both regiments mustered very strong. The Bloomsbury, and other Volunteer corps, have been out this morning, but have been dismissed, with orders to be in readiness to muster again in the evening if necessary.

The firemen belonging to the several insurance, are also parading the streets, with music.—They act as Constables.

The crowd at the Tower, and at Sir Francis Burdett's house, in Piccadilly, is immense.

June 21.—Some of the letters by the Lisbon mail, state, that Massena on being sent for to forward the French troops destined to act against Portugal, was ordered to conquer that country, which in future is to be his kingdom.

Dutch letters were received yesterday morning to the date of the 7th inst. Louis had not at that time left Holland, and the report of his abdication of the throne appears to be wholly unfounded.

Letters from France arrived yesterday morning by which it appears, that Bonaparte has refused to grant any more licences for the exportation of grain; but from what cause is not distinctly explained.

Bonaparte and the Empress Louise arrived at Paris. Dutch papers to the 10th, and Paris papers to the 7th inst. reached town yesterday, but their contents are unimportant. The Turkish army is said to be 450,000 strong, of which number, after deducting garrisons, about 180,000 can be brought to the field.

We have received Dutch papers to the 11th inst. but their contents are not interesting. The only article in them that deserves to be mentioned, is a commercial decree, issued by King Louis, which, however, is not sufficiently important to render it necessary to insert the article in detail. Its principal object is to alter the line of demarcation, within which (with some exceptions) all magazines, depots, or warehouses of colonial productions, or English manufactures, were by a former decree prohibited, from 2000 rods to 5000 rods from the sea coast.

Letters were yesterday received from Holland, dated the 10th inst. which state that licences had been granted by the Dutch government, for ships to clear out for neutral ports, on giving bonds to the amount of three times the value of the vessel and cargo.

There is a report that Swedish property has been sequestered in France and Holland, in consequence of French consuls having been refused a residence in some of the ports of Sweden, and facilities having been afforded for the admission of English merchandise into those ports.

Price of Stocks, 8 per cent consols reduced, 69 7/8 to 70. Omnium, 1 per cent premium.

Plymouth, June 15.—Dispatches arrived on Wednesday from London, which were immediately sent on board a Cartel for Mexico. They relate to an exchange of prisoners, and probably contain a final answer of government. There is every reason to believe that a cartel will be immediately arranged.

Dublin, May 10.—A few days ago, two old men went on board a Whitehaven vessel at George's quay to purchase coal. One of them had a little boy by the hand, apparently about three or four years old.—"This (observed the captain) is your grand-son, I suppose?"—"Yes (replied the former) he is my son."—"Your son?"—"Yes, and that old fellow there is another of my sons; but there is a difference of twenty years in their ages!" This turned out to be the fact.—The father is a hundred; and about four years ago he married a girl of twenty two, by whom he had this youngest child!

Paris, June 10.—Letters from Bayonne, of the 8th inst. speak of the uninterrupted passage of troops through that town for Spain.

Stockholm, June 5.—It is strongly rumoured on 'Change, that peace is restored between Russia and Great Britain, and that, in consequence of it, the former power has entered into a new coalition against France.

[Letters from the same place, eight or ten days later, make no mention of this news.]

New York, July 24.—Captain Smith, of the ship Projector, (see Marine List) who left the Baltic on the first of June, informs that there were, in the two Belts, 40 ships of the line, and 40 frigates and sloops of war; and that in the course of last spring, three convoys from England had gone up the Baltic, one of which consisted of 500 sail, and the other two of about 250 each, making in the whole, the immense number of one thousand sail of merchantmen which had gone up in less than two months.

Capt. S. further informs, that a war between Russia and France was expected.

New-York, August 2.—On Tuesday afternoon the brig Tamahmah, captain Story, arrived at Hurlgate from Liverpool, which port she left on the 24th of June, and has brought advices about three weeks later than before received.

George W. Erving, Esq. late American chargé des affaires in Spain, came home in the above vessel, and is the bearer of dispatches from our minister at the court of St. James, to the Secretary of state, and we understand will proceed with them this morning.

On the 19th of June parliament was prorogued. Sir Francis Burdett was on that day liberated from the Tower. There were great rejoicings among his partisans, and it is said there was a more numerous assemblage of people in the streets of London, than took place when he was committed.

We do not learn whether any change in our affairs with Great Britain had taken place; but it has been rumoured, that the emperor Napoleon, has issued a decree for the capture and condemnation of all the American property he can get hold of.

The editors of the Mercantile Advertiser have been furnished with the following partial extracts from a file of London papers to the 22d of June.

Capt. Story of the Tamahmah, inform us that the British frigate Venus, with Mr. Morier (the new chargé des affaires to America) on board, was to sail from Portsmouth on the 24th of June; and that Mr. Jackson is to return to England in the frigate Venus.

From Liverpool, June 4.—A bill is now before Parliament for doubling the duty on foreign timber imported; and the act to continue in force until six months after a treaty of Peace.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman in Liverpool, to a Mercantile Firm in the same city, dated June 9.

"In reply to your note, left last night at my house, the information I have concerning the double duty on timber, I had yesterday from Mr. Blackburne, M. P. as follows:—

"That the duty on Oak Timber, of all sorts, is to take place on the 1st of Jan. next; and on Fir, and all other sorts, in Jan. after, (say 1842). On which Mr. Blackburne justly remarks, that the next session will give us sufficient time to counteract both.

"It appears to me, that government have gone too far to withdraw the bill in toto. That on receiving the several memorials, the ministers found they were wrong in the measure partially represented to them, by interested speculators, and that by putting the dates at the above distances, they have rendered the bill harmless without withdrawing it."

Information of the expiration of the Non-Intercourse Law was published in Liverpool, June 7, and several vessels had arrived.

Porto-Rico. We learn from Porto-Rico, that it was the intention of the Spanish government there to send off the French inhabitants, as had been done in Cuba. Many were preparing for their departure. Almost every Frenchman in Spain and the Colonies, is a spy, or an intriguer of Bonaparte. A vessel from Laguna had been condemned at Porto-Rico, on the pretext, that the Caracas was in a state of rebellion.

CARTAGENA. A revolution took place in this important Spanish province the 19th June.—The Governor, was seized to Havana, and the old Governor, who had been displaced by

the Seville Junta, had been appointed Chief of the Revolutionists; who acknowledge Ferdinand for their King, but not the authority of the Junta.

We learn from Capt. Morgan, of the schooner John, from Coro, that a revolution had taken place on the Spanish Main.—That Laguna and Porto-Cavero acknowledged Ferdinand the 7th, but not the authority of the regency, which the province of Coro and Maracabo have to the utmost extension; and apprehensive of an attack from the former, they were concentrating their forces; and 20,000 men marched from Maracabo to join these of Coro.

Highly Interesting.—A letter from the Mississippi Territory, dated July 4th, says, the inhabitants of Florida below our line, have had several large meetings, the result of which has been a determination to declare themselves independent of all European powers, and to claim the protection of the United States. They have already ordered all Frenchmen to leave their territory. The letter containing this information, is from a source the correctness of which can be relied on.

Boston, August 6.—The U. S. brig Hornet, Capt. Hunt, sailed from New-York, for France and England on Thursday last. The Hornet was a government messenger on board with dispatches.

The U. S. frigate Constitution, Capt. Hull, has arrived in the Chesapeake; she passed a British frigate of 22 guns, bound to New-York.

On August 1st, arrived at Providence, the ship Mary Ann, capt. Rumb, in 33 days from Cadiz. He left there on the 24th of June, and informs that the garrison were in high spirits, and entertained no fear of the French being able to reduce the place. The garrison consisted of 30,000 troops, 18,000 of which were British. An almost constant cannonade was kept up between the French in Fort Matagorda, and the English and Spanish gun-boats, and forts on the island of Leon. The French were unable by their shot to injure the city. A few days before the departure of the Mary Ann, an expedition, consisting of 5000 Spanish troops, sailed, supposed for Algiers. Flour was at 20 dollars, at which price several cargoes had been sold.

Captain Russell brought a file of Cadiz papers to the 9th of June, but they mention no events of importance.

Accounts from Lisbon, are to the 27th June.—A report is brought by Capt. Adams, arrived here, that the French general Massena had 60,000 select troops; and the English force of 10,000 under general Beresford. That Massena had declared himself king of Portugal. (We before learned that Napoleon had promised Massena the *Rio-Real* as a reward should he conquer Portugal.)—And was determined to cross and descend the Tagus; and that an engagement, probably decisive of the fate of Portugal was expected. The allied British and Portuguese army, we trust, will not rashly risk a general engagement; nor will they avoid one on any thing like equal terms.

Accounts from Palermo to the 9th June, state, that the British would be in possession of Sicily by the 23d June; and that a British frigate had arrived at Palermo to convey one of the Bourbon family to Spain. The Duke of Orleans who married the daughter of the king of Sicily, has been mentioned as the person going to Spain; and whose presence, being one of the Bourbon family, may have been required by the Spanish Regency, with a view to inspire the people with additional confidence and enthusiasm.

An English paper of June 20, has the following quotation of *Prices and Remarks*, viz. Ashes Pot, 56 a 58; Cotton, Sea Island, fine, 2 1/2 a 2 3/4; middling, 1 10 a 1 11; New Orleans, 1 3 a 1 4; Campeachy Logwood, 30 a 32; Tar, 27 a 29; Flour, 65 a 68; Cotton, dull sale, the spinners waiting for the overstock expected from America.—*Wool* no sale;—*Wheat* dull sale, prices considered as merely nominal; *Wheat & Flour* dull, and the prices declining.

Died at Parkersburg, on the 3d ult. at the house of J. Richardson, Esq. Capt. John Vincent, an Indian, aged 95. In 1755, he had a command among the Cognawaga tribe, then opposed by French influence to these then colonies and provinces. Gen. Braddock was at that time defeated at Fort du Quesne, near where Pittsburgh now is. Capt. Vincent had recommended the country southerly to the mouth of the Scioto, and had returned before the engagement. He formed the ambuscade which defeated Braddock.—He piloted the American troops from Cambridge through the province of Maine to Quebec. He was at Quebec when Montgomery fell. He well understood the history of the revolutionary war, having in 1775 espoused the American cause, and his tribe being seduced to the British interest. He has since secreted himself among our mountains in Sherburne.—The Legislature of Vermont having known this distinguished chieftain, long since made him a pensioner. Capt. John was early educated by a Roman Catholic Priest in the French language and in the tenets of that Church. These early impressions were not erased. At no time was this tenant of the forest known to rise without his orisons, to sleep without his vesper, or to eat without at least offering up his silent but reverend petition.—*Retland paper.*

MONTREAL, August 13.—On Monday last arrived here from Upper Canada, his Excellency the Right Honourable FRANCIS JAMES JACKSON, his Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary to the United States of America, his Lady, and one of their children, a fine boy about 4 years old. They put up at Holmes' Hotel, which was no sooner known, than the gentlemen of the city determined upon inviting him to honor them with his company at a public dinner.

Being circumscribed in point of time, from his wish to return soon to New-York, where a frigate is expected to carry him and family to England, he was unable to promise a later day than Thursday. That day was accordingly fixed upon, and notwithstanding so short a notice, such was the eagerness and anxiety of the public, to pay every possible mark of respect to so distinguished a character, that a very numerous list of English and Canadian gentlemen was rapidly filled up.

Invitations were also sent to Major-General Drummond, the Field Officers of the 41st Regt. the Officers commanding the Artillery and Engineers, and the Heads of Departments in the Garrison; as also to the several gentlemen strangers then in town. On Thursday about 6 o'clock, the company (in all about 130) sat down to table. The dinner provided by Mr. Hojines did him great credit; it was excellent, and considering so short a notice, and the disadvantage of there being no fruit this year of any kind in the country, may safely be pronounced elegant beyond any expectation. But what gave a double zest to the entertainment, was the harmony and good humour that universally prevailed. Every heart seemed to be actuated by the same feeling of superlative respect for their distinguished guest, and an anxiety was conspicuous that what might in point of form or otherwise be wanting, should be considered as made up by the warmth of zeal and good intention.

The Honorable Mr. McGill was in the chair, and Mr. Justice Pannet and the Honorable Mr. Richardson, vice-presidents, there being one cross table and two longways.

The toast given on the occasion by the president in English, were well translated and repeated in French by Mr. Pannet.—They were as follows, and the band of the 41st Regt. played thereto the several appropriate tunes after mentioned.

1. "The King,"—with three cheers, and God save the King.
2. "The Queen."
3. "The Prince of Wales and Royal Family."—Duke of York's March.
4. "The Governor in Chief."—The Garb of old Gaul.
5. "The health of Mr. Jackson, and the distinguished ability, dignity and firmness, displayed by him in the late negotiation at Washington, in support of the honor of our King and the interests of our country, he followed as an example by all British Plenipotentiaries."—Three cheers, and Lord Moira's welcome to Scotland.
6. "The Lieutenant-Governor of our sister Province of Upper Canada."
7. "The Navy"—with Rule Britannia.
8. "The Army."—British Grenadiers.
9. "British Constitution, may its sterling worth be proof against the fumes of Democratic innovation."
10. "His Majesty's Subjects throughout all his dominions—May they be sensible of the blessings they enjoy, and oppose every attempt to disseminate disloyalty, dissension and discontent."
11. "Success to the Patriots in Spain and Portugal."—with Britons strike home.
12. "The immortal memory of Lord Nelson."
13. "May the United States, in appreciating their true interests, ever remain in peace and friendship with the country of their forefathers."
14. "May the Democratic part of the United States feel, that brutal abuse of a public minister for fidelity to his trust, marks a ferocity that even savages would blush at."

On the health of Mr. Jackson being given, the room resounded with applause, after which he addressed the company as follows:—

"Gentlemen,—"I beg leave to return you my heart-felt thanks for the honor you have this day done me; and I thank you very warmly President for the manner of his expressing a sentiment which you have favoured with your animating approbation. Although I have for some time had the happiness to number amongst my friends a portion of this company, yet, we, Gentlemen, are for the most part so little personally known to each other, that however much I am indebted to your kindness, and how deeply soever I may feel the obligation, I must chiefly attribute the favourable manner in which you have received this Toast to those principles of national policy by which I have been more actuated in that part of my public services which has come more immediately under your observation. Those principles which I had the good fortune early to imbibe from some of the most illustrious statesmen that have adorned our country, it will be my pride to adhere to, to my latest moments, and to transmit unimpaired as the most valuable patrimony that I can bequeath to my children. They consist, Gentlemen, briefly in this, that with every disposition to promote harmony with other powers, the honour and dignity of our Sovereign must be at all risks vindicated—the commercial interests and the naval supremacy of Great Britain must be as strenuously asserted in the cabinet as they are gloriously maintained upon the ocean by those heroes to whom our interests upon that element are deservedly entrusted.

"Gentlemen—after the approbation which I have been so happy as to receive from our most gracious Sovereign, conveyed in terms far transcending any merits that I can have contracted in his service, it has been a satisfaction to me to find my conduct sanctioned by a great and very respectable part of the community in which I have lately resided. It is a further and a still higher gratification to me (because the approbation of my countrymen is a higher object of my ambition) to find that conduct applauded by you who from your local situation are to be considered as very competent judges of the subject. With sentiments so congenial as those which thus prevail between us, I cannot on my part fail to entertain the most sanguine wishes for the happiness and prosperity of these Provinces, and of this city in particular, whose loyalty to the King, and attachment to our common country, have ever been so conspicuous.—Permit me to embody these feelings in a Toast which I propose."

"Toast—"Union in the councils and prosperity to the commerce and agriculture of the two Canadas."

After the Toast of the Army, Mr. Jackson requested permission to give one more sentiment, which being readily granted, he spoke as follows:—

"Gentlemen,—"You will have observed that in the sentiments I before expressed there was nothing exclusive, nothing that could give umbrage out of this room. The principles which I then stated are to be asserted, not for the gratification of any selfish object of profit or ambition, still less for the vexation of any less formidable power, but as affording the only safeguard which remains to the freedom and independence which is yet to be found in the civilized world against that system of rapine and usurpation that has to nearly overwhelmed continental Europe, and the only bulwark that can shield this western hemisphere from similar disasters. In these principles, therefore, there is nothing inconsistent with that good will that should exist between us and the neighbouring States, where there are men who duly appreciate the value of a good understanding between the two countries. There are those, who able and well-informed would be an ornament to any society, and are capable of unravelling the intrigues and exposing the artifices of their and our enemies; and who, knowing that the world affords sufficient scope for the spirit of enterprise which in all countries so eminently distinguishes the present age, are convinced that the interests of Great Britain and America not only do not clash, but are likely most to prosper where they are most united. It is to such men that we must look for the arrival of that period so much desired by the true friends of both countries, when discarding jealousies and banishing every unpropitious recollection; remember only that our friends in the United States are blood of our blood and bone of our bone. As for me, I shall carry home with me no other regret than that of not having been the instrument of reconciling differences which have been too actively fomented and suffered to exist too long.—I propose as a Toast, "Prosperity to the United States of America."

After which an American gentleman present, desired permission to give a Toast, which being granted, he spoke to the following purpose:—

"That inspired by the liberal sentiments expressed towards his country by the enlightened Ambassador from Great Britain, he felt it incumbent on him to follow Mr. Jackson with another sentiment, which he had no doubt would be drank with entire satisfaction by all the gentlemen at table.

"OLD ENGLAND, who with Roman pride and Roman power, hath during a war of eighteen years resisted and repelled the enormous and overgrown power of democracy, and who with extended arms hath successfully lashed and buffeted the waves of despotism, which have overwhelmed and mercilessly destroyed all continental Europe."

Other volunteers were given, particularly one by General Drummond, viz. "The health of Mrs. Jackson," in which the company most cordially joined. Upon this Mr. Jackson again said that it had almost the appearance of presumption in him to have occupied so often the attention of the company that evening. But he had another volunteer to propose, and they would allow that there could not be too many volunteers in a good cause, and now (he added) that the ice is broken, which by the by he understood was no easy matter in this northern region, he would shortly propose to them to drink "The City of Montreal," which was immediately done with three cheers.

Mr. Jackson and some of the other guests and part of the company retired a little before 10 o'clock, and some remained until midnight. The whole went off in the utmost good humour, and we may safely aver, that in no country, and upon no occasion, was ever hilarity and decorum more perfectly united.

After leaving the company at Holmes' Hotel on Thursday evening Mr. Jackson visited the Theatre, and was received by the audience with the loudest applause—the band of the 41st Regiment struck up "God save the King" when he entered the box; after which the audience cheered, and the band again played that favourite air.

About nine o'clock on Saturday morning he and his family embarked for Quebec in a large birch canoe, manned by twelve Canadians; being attended to the water side by a number of the citizens, who repeatedly cheered them as the canoe pushed off from the beach.

MONTREAL, August 13.—It is with great regret that we communicate an unpleasant circumstance which occurred at St. Johns on Saturday the 4th inst.

The Officer commanding there without having previously discovered any symptoms of derangement became perfectly insane, and being under the apprehension of being attacked, was induced to seize and confine in the Guard House many persons that arrived at St. Johns, among others a Lieutenant of the 41st Regiment, two Spanish gentlemen who a few days before he had by the Orders of the Governor General, passed into the Province. The collector at St. Johns and the surgeon at the Post of Chambly, with many others who were confined until the sergeant of the 49th Regiment being convinced of his unfortunate situation, seized him and relieved the prisoners.—We are sorry to add, that previous to his being arrested he had injured the Steam Boat and some vessels that were at the port.—He was immediately removed to his Regiment at Three-Rivers from whence we hear that there are but little hopes of returning reason, and that he is kept under a constant Guard of two centinels in his room.

We learn from good authority, that the Governor has ordered an estimate of the damage done the Steam Boat and other vessels at St. Johns to be made, and the amount paid to the sufferers.

LA MALLE DE BURLINGTON D'HIER.
New-York, le 24 Juillet. — Le Capitaine Smith, du navire Hector, qui a laissé la Baïque le 1er Juin, informe qu'il y a dans les deux Bâtes 40 vaisseaux de ligne, et 40 frégates et autres; et que dans le cours du printemps dernier, trois cents d'Angleterre étoient allés dans la Baïque, un desquels de 500 vaisseaux et les deux autres d'environ 250 chaque, tant en tout, le nombre immense de mille vaisseaux marchands qui étoient allés en moins de deux mois.
Le Capitaine Smith informe de plus qu'on s'attendoit à une guerre entre la Russie et la France.
New-York, le 2 Août. — Mardi après-midi le Brig Tamashah, capitaine Story, arriva à Harboret de Liverpool, porta le parti le 25 Juin, et a apporté des nouvelles plus récentes que celles qui avoient été reçues auparavant de près de six semaines.
George W. Erving, Et. ci-devant chargé des affaires britanniques en Espagne, est arrivé dans le vaisseau sus-dit, et porteur de dépêches de notre Ministère à la Cour de St. James au Secrétaire d'Etat, et l'on dit qu'il doit partir avec des dépêches ce matin.
Le 29 Juin le Parlement fut prorogé; Sir Francis Burdett le jour la loi en liberté, et sortit de la Tour.—Il y avait de grandes réjouissances parmi ses partisans, et l'on dit même le concours de peuple dans les Rues de Londres étoit plus grand, que lors qu'il fut emprisonné.
Nous avons pu apprécier s'il s'étoit opéré quelque changement dans nos affaires avec la Grande Bretagne; mais il n'y a eu bruit que l'Empereur Napoléon avoit publié un Décret pour la capture et condamnation de toute propriété Américaine qui tomberoit sous la main.
Le Capitaine Story du Tamashah, nous apprend que Laus, frégate Angloise, ayant à bord Mr. Morrier (le nou-veau chargé des affaires près de l'Amérique) devoit faire voile de Portsmouth le 24 Juin, et que Mr. Jackson doit retourner d'Angleterre dans la frégate Venus.
BOSTON, 2 Août.
PORTO-RICO. — Nous apprenons de Porto Rico que l'Intendant du Gouvernement Espagnol de cet endroit étoit d'envoyer des habitants Français, comme on avoit fait à Cuba. Plusieurs négocieront pour leur départ. Presque tous les Français en Espagne et dans les Colonies, sont des espions ou des intrigans du parti. Un vaisseau venant de la Guinée a été capturé par Porto Rico, sous prétexte que le Caracas étoit dans un état d'ébullition.
HARTFORD. — Il y a eu une révolution dans cette importante Province Espagnole, le 18 Juin. — Le Gouverneur a été élu à Havanah, et l'ancien Gouverneur qui avoit été déposé le Junta de Séville, a été appointé chef des révolutionnaires, reconnoissant Ferdinand pour leur Roi, mais renonçant à l'autorité du Junta.
Nous apprenons du Capitaine Morgan, de la Golette John, capitaine de Coro qui a eu une révolution sur le Continent d'Espagne. Que Laguita et Porto Cavallo ont reconnu Ferdinand VII, mais non l'autorité de la régence, que la Province de Coro et Maracaibo ont reconnu dans toute la rigueur, et signant une attaque de la première, ils concentroient leurs forces; et 20,000 hommes marchent de Maracaibo pour rejoindre ceux de Coro. — (Gaz. N. Y.)
Une lettre du Territoire du Mississippi, datée du 4 Juillet et des Habitans de la Floride au dessous de notre ligne, ont plusieurs grandes assemblées, dont le résultat a été une détermination à se déclarer indépendans de toutes Puissances Européennes, et à demander la protection des Etats-Unis. — Ils ont déjà ordonné à tous les Français de laisser leur territoire. — Cette lettre qui contient cette information vient d'une source sûre, et peut se fier. — (Gaz. Philad.)
6 Août.
Le Brig des Etats-Unis Hornet, Capitaine Hunt, a fait voile de New-York pour l'Angleterre et la France, Jeudi dernier. Le Hornet a un Message du Gouvernement à bord et des dépêches.
La Frégate des Etats-Unis Constitution, Capitaine Hull est allée dans la Baie de Chesapeake; elle a passé une Frégate Angloise de 32 canons, qui alloit à New-York.
Le 1er Août est arrivé à Providence, le Navire Mary-Ann, Capitaine Russel, en 38 jours de Cadix; j'en est parti le 24 Juin; il rapporte que la Garrison ne pouvoit point courage, et craignoit point que les Français ne réduisissent la place. La Garrison consistoit en 30,000 hommes de troupes, dont 18,000 étoient Anglois. Il y eut une canonade presque continue entre les Français dans le fort Metagorda et les chaloupes Canonières nioises et Espagnoles, et les forts de l'île de Leon. Les Français étoient point en état, avec leurs canons de faire tort à l'île. Quelques jours avant le départ du Mary-Ann, il est parti une expédition, consistant de 5000 hommes de troupes Espagnoles, on suppose que c'est pour Algéras. La Frégate étoit à pistoles, et ce port il avoit été vendu plusieurs corraïons.
Les détails de l'expédition sont jusqu'au 27 Juin. — Le Capitaine Adams arrive ici rapporte un rapport que le Général Francisco Masena avoit 60,000 hommes de troupes espagnoles; et que la Frégate Angloise de 1900 Obolons, étoit sous le Général Beresford; que Masena s'étoit déclaré Roi du Portugal. (Nous nous sommes déjà apprises que Napoléon avoit promis la Vice Royauté d'Algerie, comme une récompense, s'il venoit à conquérir le Portugal.) Et étoit déterminé à traverser et à descendre le long; et qu'on s'attendoit à un engagement qui décideroit le problème de la route du Portugal. L'armée alliée Franco-Portugaise, ne risquera pas imprudemment un engagement général; et elle ne l'acceptera point non plus à des conditions telles.
