# Cut speeding, make streets safer for pedestrians

Those are the main concerns of residents in west-central area, says a city survey



Westmount is stuck with backups along Sherbrooke Street these days while highway construction is under way on Ville Marie expressway, city officials said. Drivers are using Sherbrooke to exit and enter the Décarie autoroute to avoid bumper-to-bumper traffic. Expected to last throughout the summer, the traffic is especially heavy through Westmount at night when angry motorists lean on car horns as cars block intersections at Roslyn and get stopped by lights at Grosvenor. "This is a summer that's going to be hell on Sherbrooke," said city operations manager Bruce St. Louis.

Speeding and pedestrian safety are the main problems on west-central streets, according to a city poll of the area done in March.

Some residents called for two-way traffic on Grosvenor and Victoria, others wanted Roslyn one-way south or the bus taken off the one block it travels along Lansdowne. Many requested speed bumps and mid-block stop signs.

"The majority of complaints are easy to solve or already remedied," said city traffic chief Richard McEnroe.

But four specific problem streets will be referred to the Citizens' Traffic Advisory Committee (CTAC) for further study, he said. These are Grosvenor, Victoria, Roslyn at the school and Belmont at Murray (King George) Park.

The city received 93 responses on 18 streets when it polled all homes for traffic comments in the area bounded by Sherbrooke, The Boulevard, Forden and the west city limits at Claremont, he said.

In general comments, citizens complained that burned-out traffic lights take too long to be replaced, that drivers do not respect pedestrian crossings or stop at stop signs and that more crosswalk signs should be installed.

Some called for reducing the *Continued on page 2*

## Stop signs, up speeds

WESTMOUNT may have too many stop sign and speed limits that are unrealistically slow, city traffic head Richard McEnroe said Friday.

Each of the city's 367 stop signs is being assessed as the city updates traffic policies, he said. The 30 km/h designations on hills, in particular, are being reviewed.

"I've been driving some of the hills and that speed is so slow it's silly," he said, referring to the city's traffic policies.

## City reinstates one recycling depot

The city has decided to reinstate its recycling depot in front of the arena until all the apartment buildings have recycling bins.

This is a partial reversal of last month's decision to remove two depots, which would have left only one at the Corporation Yard.

"I felt that because two of the larger apartment buildings (4300 and 4800 de Maisonneuve Blvd.) were not on stream yet, it would be better to keep the arena recycling hut in place and the administration agreed," said Mayor Peter Trent.

The plan is to replace the depots with bell-shaped recycling depots within two to three weeks, said Fred Caluori, public works director.

"We're making arrangements now to implement the collection of

recyclables with the bells," he said. "Two will be located in front of the arena and another two at the Yard."

When all Westmount apartments are set up for recycling, the city will reassess its decision to have the bells at the arena, said Mr. Trent.

"I've asked the administration to get tougher with those apartment buildings that are not cooperating," he said. "We've tried the friendly route but it looks like we'll have to take the legal route to get them to comply."

Legislation to force apartment building administrations to come on line with recycling could be in place within three to six months, he said.

"Meanwhile, people will have the bells," he said. Keeping two locations should "go a long way to

placate people who think we've cut back too much on recycling."

What would be even better than the bells, said de Maisonneuve resident Don Wedge, is a recycling centre for things like textiles.

Academy Road resident Molly Keith Anderson agrees.

"I would like to see an area set up where people could bring different kinds of recyclables like fabrics, old clothes and even scrap metal," she said.

Both resident said they are happy the city decided to reinstate the arena hut.

"I think a lot of people must have phoned and complained," said Ms. Keith Anderson. "Several people I've spoken to said they preferred to take their recyclables to the depot right away rather than waiting for collection day."

number of stop signs, freezing the number of traffic lights and introducing a shuttle bus service.

Others asked that the city build narrower streets with wider sidewalks, and asked for better lighting and improved snow removal on Grosvenor.

The city has solved one complaint by having ordered pedestrian lights for Grosvenor at Sherbrooke, on the north side, Mr.

McEnroe said. They will be installed soon.

Traffic and parking congestion around Westmount Public Library will be addressed as part of the library building project, he said. Library Drive will be redesigned to alleviate problems at Arlington and Sherbrooke.

"My philosophy to traffic is to consult residents," said Mr. McEnroe, "let them identify the problems on their street and then give them what they want as long as

it's reasonable and doesn't cause problems somewhere else."

There are exceptions. They include speed bumps on streets, alternate side parking and, until speed limits are reassessed, speed limits painted on the road, he said. The city's policy for speed bumps is that they are ineffective at reducing volume or speed of traffic. They are approved for lanes.

The city is also reviewing the proliferation of stop signs.

Creation of the CTAC two years

ago has proven so successful, said Mr. McEnroe, that the city is now polling each sector of the city and referring problems that aren't easily remedied to the citizen committee, which has representatives from each area.

"We have one vacancy on the committee to represent the southwest sector between Sherbrooke to the south city limits and Meville to the west city limits." Anyone interested should call Director Richard McEnroe at 935-8531 local 307.

## Comments on traffic, street by street

Following are problems, requests and comments from residents involved in a survey of traffic in the west-central area of Westmount:

### • Grosvenor and Victoria:

Problems and solutions are interrelated due to the one-way traffic pattern and, north of Westmount Avenue, may have to be treated in concert with Roslyn and Lansdowne, traffic chief Director Richard McEnroe said.

Citizen suggestions to solve speeding, pedestrian safety and school safety include: mid-block stops, speed bumps, reversed traffic directions from block to block, parking on both sides, two-way traffic and increase pedestrian cross time on Westmount Avenue.

Selected for study by Citizens' Traffic Advisory Committee (CTAC) are: two-way traffic, parking both sides and reversed blocks. Increased police enforcement of speeding has been requested.

### • Roslyn:

Problems are obstruction of traffic around Roslyn School by school buses loading and unloading as well as illegal left turns from eastbound Westmount Avenue north onto Roslyn. A proposed solution to make the block one-way south from The Boulevard will be studied.

Citizens said the intersection at Sherbrooke was unsafe for cars entering off Roslyn but it was studied and found not to justify modification, Mr. McEnroe said. Timing between lights at Lansdowne and Grosvenor provides 12 seconds for southbound cars to cross Sherbrooke or turn onto it.

### • Belmont:

Residents want a stop sign at the intersection of Belmont Avenue and a speed bump on the avenue to curb speeding. The stop sign will be studied. Some residents want parking on one side of the crescent, others want parking on both sides.

### • N.D.G.-Westmount:

Intersection to be narrowed permanently by grassing over if residents agree, following successful experiment to improve safety.

### • Claremont-Sherbrooke:

Request to install a priority green light for eastbound cars turning left is not practical with the existing priority for westbound traffic turning south.

### • Claremont-Côte St. Antoine:

A problem with signage has already been modified in efforts to prevent cars going east on the westbound street.

### • Lansdowne:

Citizens say noise and speeding north of Westmount Avenue could

be solved by speed bumps and mid-block stop signs or rerouting of 124 bus line. City says bus line cannot be changed but will look at a request to improve delineation of cross walk now lighter shade of paving material.

### • Metcalfe:

At Springfield, a stop sign to control perceived speeding cannot be installed because street is a fire route.

### • Murray Hill:

Citizen call to narrow throat of street at The Boulevard is under study to deter volume of traffic off The Boulevard.

### • Prince Albert:

Request to reduce daytime parking limit to two hours from four makes sense, Mr. McEnroe said.

### • Sherbrooke near Strathcona:

Request to ease parking restrictions at peak hour has been implemented.

### • The Boulevard:

Requests to curb speeding by synchronizing lights to establish a 30km/h progression already completed eastbound.

### • Windsor:

Complaints of speeding to be checked out; none found in previous study. Parking changes have already been made at a previous request of citizens.

# Molson named Concordia Chancellor

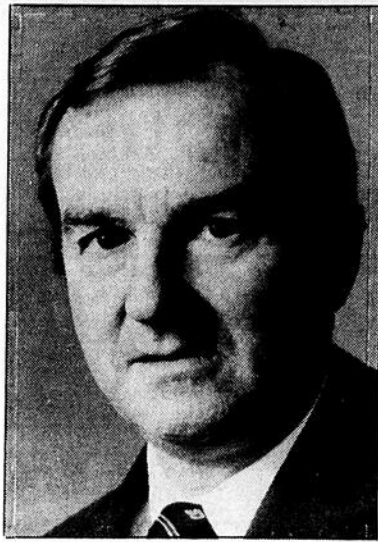
Westmounter Eric Molson has been appointed Chancellor of Concordia University, it was announced Friday.

When he speaks of Concordia it is with fondness, despite the fact that he only spent one gruelling summer there in the early 1960s.

"I had a job in the brewhouse, and did accounting at night in the summer," he recalled. The course was intensive; four hours twice a week with "a lot of homework" when, during the day, the 23-year-old worked a full shift at the family brewery.

He never got a degree from Concordia — that had come earlier at Princeton (Honours Chemistry 1959). Accounting was something he had to learn, to become part of the business world.

Now, at 55, Mr. Molson says of Concordia, "You can set your own pace for education and work... I like the idea of the time frame of education to be at the discretion of the students, if that's possible."

Mr. Molson is currently chairman of the board of The Molson Companies Ltd., which includes Molson Brewery — the company founded in 1786 by his ancestor John Molson.

He has been part of many charitable organizations, the most recent of which is Montreal General Hospital. He has been chairman of the hospital foundation and, more recently, has helped fundraise for its most critical needs.

That experience will be welcome at Concordia, which is gearing up for a capital campaign.

"I won't be able to do what she did," said Mr. Molson of former governor-general Jeanne Sauvé, who was Chancellor when she died Jan. 26, "but I will try to put in the kind of efforts she did, or would have."

His five-year term begins July 1, when he will be officially installed in a ceremony at fall convocation.

Concordia Board of Governors Chairman Reginald K. Groome described Mr. Molson as "a distinguished Montrealer whose long record of community service has brought credit to his family, his city, his province and his country."

making a return engagement after last year's successful launching of the aerial runway and boat rides in Horseshoe Pond, said recreation officials.

The Contactivity Seniors' Centre bake sale and craft sale will go on all day beginning at 11 a.m. After a cookie break there, people can mosey over to the east stage for the magic show, which will run from 11:30 to noon. At Noon "Casey at the Bat" will be performed on softball diamond 2.

Still feeling peckish? Get in on some light lunch, ice cream and other refreshments being sold by the Girl Guides, Venturer Scouts and Westmount High School.

For your listening pleasure, a Dixieland band will be performing on the east stage from noon for about 15 minutes.

But whatever you do, don't forget to dig out your old Family Day buttons for a contest on the east stage at 12:35 as a warm-up for the "Stars on Stage" variety stage, scheduled for 12:40.

## Clean your own house

It would be a lot easier to swallow tax increases announced in the latest provincial budget if evidence of government mismanagement and waste weren't so apparent.

How Premier Robert Bourassa can sanction five and 10 per cent surtaxes on personal income without visibly writhing in moral and ethical discomfort is hard to fathom.

This is the government that continued to finance an office to respond to complaints about bilingual and multilingual signs when it became plain that 90 per cent of the complaints were being made by four people.

This is the government that paid one man \$94,000 yearly, supplied him with a \$300,000 budget, and watched while that office received eight phone calls in one year. Who decided there was a need for an office for complaints about farmland rezoning? How many people placidly sat on their hands while about \$1 million was spent over three years for a handful of complaints?

This is the government headed by an economist.

We all know that governments everywhere are in trouble. It doesn't matter what was promised in pre-election speeches. If you're in power — Republican, Democrat, Conservative, NDP or Liberal — you're trying to reduce a deficit and make a dent in an accumulated debt.

Years of overspending racked up a \$37.065 billion debt in Quebec as of 1991 (the latest figure available from Statistics Canada), with an estimated

\$4.145 billion being added to it in 1993-94. In Canada, the debt reached a mind-numbing \$419.944 billion in 1992.

With numbers like these, we, taxpayers, know we're going to have to pull together and pay more if we want to wipe out the debt. That's not what rankles.

The annoying thing is that governments, including that of Quebec, appear to be making no effort to control spending. Everything is measured in new fees or new taxes. Medicare on the skids? Try emergency room fees, doctor's fees, fees for prescriptions.

Where are the government's efforts to cut waste? When will civil servants' wages be brought in line with the private sector? (The average civil servant is paid \$35,376 versus the average Canadian wage-earner, who gets \$27,544.) When will they be made to work as many hours each week as everyone else? (That measure alone could result in cutting hundreds of jobs.) When will the workers be given incentives for superior performance and cost-saving measures? When will managers be penalized for going over budget, and rewarded for keeping to budget?

Looking outward, when will MPs agree to scale back their generous pension plans for something approaching reality?

Is it any wonder there is a feeling of seething resentment in the air? Only when governments get their houses in order will it be possible, once again, to have confidence in politicians.

## Swift response time

Praise this week goes to the city of Westmount, which has moved swiftly to replace recycling bins at one of its three depots.

Two of the recycling depots had been deemed too costly and, in the face of curbside recycling for most Westmount residents, were discontinued two weeks ago. However, the amount of recyclables collected there had not gone down by much, if at all, and many residents still don't have access to their own recycling bins.

The city has decided to put one bin back — the one outside the arena — immediately and, as soon as possible, replace it with bell-shaped recycling

bins. The bell bins cost less to maintain because the recyclables do not have to be hand-sorted.

Now the city's challenge is to convince the few uncooperative apartment owners and managers to take part in the recycling program. Residents could pitch in and help. The hundreds of people who are denied recycling bins may have a stronger voice than city hall. Those who care should tell their apartment owners and managers they want the bins.

In the day, not too far off, when we have to pay for each pound of garbage we throw out, it will be these residents who'll foot the biggest bills.

## You Say

### King does not represent us

The undersigned, residents of the Châteauguay Valley region and active members of the community, wish to express our dismay at the prospect of Maurice King being elected president of Alliance Quebec.

Mr. King announced in a news release, dated April 30, that he would run against incumbent Bob Keaton. Voting will be held on the morning of May 29 at the annual general meeting of Alliance Quebec.

Alliance Quebec's strategy of persistent lobbying and presenting a positive public face may very well, in the event of King's election, give way to confrontational and belligerent politics practised by the leadership of CVESPA (Châteauguay Valley English-Speaking People's Association), in the name of freedom and democracy.

Although Mr. King may be perceived outside our valley as being the spokesperson for our English-speaking community, we challenge this opinion. His extreme positions are not held by all.

We feel that, should Alliance Quebec adopt tactics as practised by CVESPA leadership, the continued growth of good will and friendship between our francophone and anglophone communities would be jeopardized. This would come when, as a result of perseverance and passage of time, reason has begun to

prevail.

### Budget hits poor

Every year, the finance minister announces a reduction in the government deficit and the following year we learn that, far from decreasing, the deficit grows. This boasting by the minister, year after year, has become obscene, indecent and shameless. The debacle of the Bourassa administration would appear to be total.

Never before has Quebec been obliged to borrow the astronomical sums (\$4 billion in 1992-93) required this year and, never, have the "operating" accounts, i.e. the money needed to pay for day-to-day items, been so deep in the red (\$3.4 billion borrowed to "pay for groceries" in 1992-93).

This year's budget is the most irresponsible of (Finance Minister) Gérard D. Lévésque's efforts (of which there have

been nine). By increasing the tax burden of Quebecers, he has jeopardized the already weak recovery. The government claims to be preoccupied by the economy but it does everything it can to create unemployment.

I would remind readers that this year's tax grab of \$1.2 billion, when added to the hiked taxes from previous budgets, brings the total increase by this government to \$3 billion a year.

The finance minister tried to tell us that the rich were going to pay the bill; what a hypocrite. The removal of the basic deduction of \$750 for every worker hits the poor much harder than the rich. Small wage earners take it in the neck because of changes to the property tax refund, and the non-indexation of deductions for unemployment insurance and Quebec Pension Plan contributions and donations.

Even the surtax, which the government touts as "progressive," affects those with an annual income of \$32,000; hardly a princely sum.

About the only positive comment I've heard about Monsieur Lévésque's budget is that it's probably his and the Bourassa government's last one.

Solutions to police problems are increasing

We are reminded, every so often, of the dangers and complexity of police work. Just last weekend, two police officers were gunned down in Place du Canada, one of the most public places in the city. They were investigating what seemed to be a fairly routine call about the beating of a taxi driver. Both officers are recovering in hospital.

The shooting is especially horrifying because officers Lucy Krasowski and Walter Filipas were taken completely by surprise, having merely asked the gunman to answer a few questions when he opened fire.

At any moment, they know, there is potential for violence. Shots may ring out in a place as innocuous as a downtown park, ending an officer's career, or his or her life. When they're on the street, police officers have to be prepared for the worst.

However, the worst rarely happens. Part of what is so frightening about the Place du Canada shooting is that it is an extremely uncommon event. The horror stands out against the comparatively peaceful backdrop of Montreal police work.

Had we become desensitized to the kind of non-stop shooting that

characterizes a city like Boston or Atlanta, then the wounding of two police officers on patrol downtown probably wouldn't even rate a front-page story in the local daily newspaper. The whole point is that the shooting is something out of the ordinary, and we are all shocked and appalled at the strangeness of the violence.

Unfortunately, police are armed to deal with lethal threats like the Place du Canada gunman, and not for far more commonplace non-lethal violence. Gun-toting crazies are mercifully rare in the Montreal area, despite what sometimes seem to be rashes of shooting.

Yet police often act with lethal force in situations where it simply isn't called for. They have precious few options, and, too often, suspects are wounded or killed for the want of some response other than a .38 calibre round from a service revolver.

That's why the recommendations made by MUC police director Alain St-Germain last week should be applauded. The suggestion that police be armed with pepper spray, in addition to their sidearms, shows that he is conscious of the fact that his

officers need more than one option in order to respond to the complex range of threats they may encounter.

Police officers need an alternative to lethal force when physical intervention is insufficient to subdue a suspect or protect a fellow officer's life. Pepper spray, even with its shortcomings, offers just such an option.

The Place du Canada attack, as horrifying as it is, represents the minority of situations, where police officers' lives are placed in real and present danger, and where the use of lethal force may be justified. By recommending the use of a non-lethal weapon like pepper spray, Mr. St-Germain is acknowledging the true complexity and dangers of police work.

acquire. The act of buying should carry with it the responsibility for proper disposal. If man proposes, man disposes.

The moral responsibility devolves upon your friendly neighbourhood municipality, which, with increasing reluctance, removes your muck — both liquid (sewage) and solid (garbage). Sic transit detritus mundi.

On to more pressing matters. What should we do about the waste management board's plan to burn 50 per cent, recycle 20 per cent and compost 10 per cent of our garbage?

As well as decrying its secretiveness, I have long complained of the Régie's lack of emphasis on reduction. Rather than take our existing trash output and extrap-

olate its volume into the future, we should have started with a comprehensive reduction program using education and user fees. Then we would have had a much better idea as to exactly how much would be left to incinerate.

For all of us — both Régie detractors and supporters — incineration was meant to be a way of treating the *residuum* of our garbage.

Recycling — while a crucial part of any waste management plan — is very costly and uses a lot of energy — both in transport and in reconversion. Glass, for example, has to be heated to 1400°C in order to be recycled.

Reduction costs nothing and expends no energy — except the mental energy

required to decide to buy fewer over-packaged good.

In spite of certain misgivings, then, the prior and the present councils have supported the Régie's plan. *Something* had to be done with our garbage once the Miron Dump closed in 1994. Well, it apparently won't happen.

I think, therefore, that Westmount should formally ask the Régie some tough questions.

1. What's the rush now?
2. Why can't we cooperate with Montreal?
3. Shouldn't the Régie's loan bylaws require popular ratification?
4. Shouldn't the Régie be run as openly as our own cities?

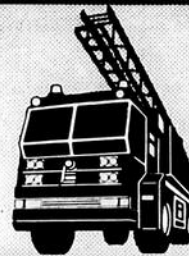

# More than half of WHS grads earned 70% or more

Melville Avenue resident Jonathan Macdougall said he didn't expect to win five awards at the Westmount High grad ceremonies Thursday last week.

"It was exciting because I didn't know I was winning that many times," he said. The 16-year-old won subject prizes for leadership, gym and history as well as the Douglas Lawley Memorial scholarship, Westmount YMCA service award and Birks Silver Medal. The latter was for having the second highest overall average of his class with a none-too-shabby 88.6.

Although he cites no one source of inspiration for his academic success, he said that part of the reason

was that he really likes the atmosphere at WHS.

This WHS graduating class is the first to go through its entire high school education with principal Richard Meades. Of 76 grads, 18 earned an overall average of 80 per cent or more, and 54 earned 70 per cent or more.

### Class clown gets serious

"It is a very closely knit school with very few problems now," said Jonathan. "I'm not a workaholic. I try to push myself but not beyond my limits."

Next, it's on to Marianopolis College to study health sciences, he

said.

Joshua Dougherty, 17, went from being a self-professed class clown to Westmount High student council president in about one year's time.

For this turnaround in behaviour, the class valedictorian became one of two recipients of the Joseph Kena-Cohen bursary and the WHS Prefect award.

The \$50 bursary goes to students recognized for overall improvement academically as well as in attitude, said vice-principal Garvin Jeffers.

"There was a time when we were not sure if Josh was doing the kinds of things necessary to be a student in good standing," he said. "He

really turned things around in a wonderful way."

What kinds of things was he doing?

"I was skipping classes and generally not taking school very seriously," said the N.D.G. resident, "but getting the responsibility of student council president changed things. I felt I had to rise to the occasion."

Mr. Kena-Cohen is retiring after 15 years of heading up the WHS French department. He asked that any money that was being collected for a retirement present be put toward a bursary for the most improved student.

"He has been my French teacher for the past year and my homeroom teacher for the last three years," said Mr. Dougherty. "He's an incredible man. It's very sad that future students won't have him as a teacher."

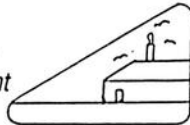

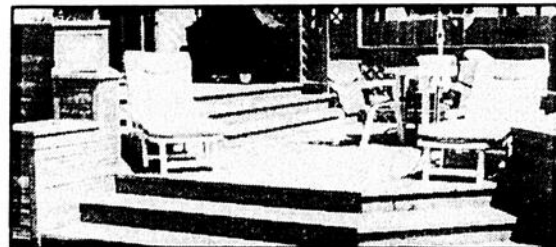

# All-Star students strut their stuff

## Four Selwyn footballers to play in game
