THE BUSINESS OUTLOOK.

The fact that the hopes of the majority of business men, looking towards a return of prosperous times, are based upon the results of the forthcoming harvest, shows conclusively that "agriculture" underlies the whole structure of our welfare.

That those hopes are not extravagant would appear to be certain from the accounts of the state of the crops, which we receive from all parts of the Dominion and neighboring republics.

Should a benign Providence continue to favor the husbandman, as it has done since the opening of the season of vegetation, there can be no doubt that the aspirations we signalize will be thoroughly realized and that we may look before long to an alleviation of our present financial difficulties.

Already, the almost positive certainty of ample crops in the United States has produced a most beneficial and stimulating effect upon business in that country, with whose material interests we are so closely connected. It has been said that four things at present occur to change the business situation—ample crops, cheap labor, increased exports and a depreciation of money.

Last week witnessed in the New York market a new impulse in business, to be accepted as a promise of a turn in the tide and a removal of property.

It is to be noted that the reliable records of excellent crops of the cereals and cotton, and a knowledge of the fact that the cultivation of these crops in the Dominion is steadily increasing, are all factors which tend to restore the former energy to business movements, which depend largely, if not entirely, upon confidence.

Coming back to our own country, it may be safely said that it has abundant reason to rejoice at the condition of its agricultural products this year, and it should become satisfied that, however, other interests may turn out, agriculture is its main stay, influencing our national prosperity.

Special branches of trade, like our lumber, may temporarily languish, but with the assurance which all other things fail us, that our agricultural returns are likely to be satisfactory, there can be no room for despondency.

No better proof of this exists than the saying of business men themselves that presently it only requires a failure of our crops to fill the cup of our evil days to overflowing—to complete the catalogue and measure of our misfortunes. Happily, the latter would seem to be a case with which we are not likely to be afflicted.

From the fact that the present season is so favorable, it is in every way to be anticipated that a revival of business in other branches, so to make that revival permanent, if slow, by furnishing cheap food to other lands. Apart from these considerations, there are those, and their opinions are not to be despised, who hold that if we are not already indebted to the world for the present, financially speaking, the period is not distant when we will have a debt of thousands of lives. He who speaks of the "prosperity" of the present, and who looks upon the subject in the same groove,

and it will not surprise us to find that the proximate exhaustion of the stocks of the lumber yards in Great Britain will be rapidly followed by a demand for our supplies and a consequent stimulus to all branches of local industry.

Under every aspect we see little room for despondency as regards the business outlook, and believe that, ere the season closes, the present depression will be replaced by a more satisfied feeling and greater confidence in the prospects of the succeeding year.

THE O'CONNELL CENTENNIAL.

When Irishmen all the world over are moving to do honor to the day that ushered in the hundredth anniversary of the birth of the great O'Connell, it would ill behoove their countrymen in Quebec to be found backward in the celebration of so important an event, or a journal like our own which counts so many warm and respected friends in the nation, to remain silent on an occasion fraught with so much significance not only to the children of the Green Isle, but to all lovers of civil and religious liberty, wherever they may be found.

The day has happily long since passed when men of different creeds and political opinions could be said to look at things only from the selfish standpoint of their own party or religion. Education, in the best places, and time, the great remedial agent in the north, have produced their natural effect upon mankind, and even their prejudice is being dissolved, which, in a century ago, were viewed with an eye of doubt, as to their motives, if not of real hostility, as to their regard with feelings more akin to truth and justice.

Even men, whose characters were either little understood, or, for the same reason, grossly misrepresented, in their own times, have found that their rehabilitation has fallen to a later generation, and, in many cases, the duty has been nobly and satisfactorily discharged.

But with the great "Liberator," as our Irish friends like to call it, in its history, the cause which the old soil has ever produced, there has not been and cannot be any necessity for a labor of the sort, which, in analogous circumstances, may not be happily termed one of love. O'Connell must and will always stand a bold, unqualified figure in Irish history, and an advocate of popular rights, fearless, outspoken, and almost unapproachable in ability, versatility of talents and resources, his name and fame must go down to the future side by side with those of the great characters whose histories in those respects have earned for them enduring reputations while the world lasts.

Opinions may differ with respect to O'Connell's objects and the means he adopted to attain them, but this should not prevent us from admitting the greatness of the man and the wisdom of his policy, which his fellow-countrymen owe to him for the astonishing results of his powers of oratory, determination and organization in their behalf.

We do not propose to attempt a recapitulation of even half the work performed by this extraordinary man in the interests of his countrymen, constitutional, or to discuss his merits. Suffice it to say that all the virtues of the remarkable man, and the warm affections of his noble heart, more distinctly and patriotically devoted to the improvement, social and political, of his native land, and that in the galaxy of celebrities, maritime and possible, of which Irishmen boast, few have higher rank, while none possess a deeper hold upon the love and affections of the Irish people than Daniel O'Connell, the irrefragable champion for their rights, the hero of Catholic Emancipation, and the vigorous but unassailable champion for the rights of the Union, which fills its counterpart to-day in the agitation for Home Rule.

On the 23rd of August, 1800, Irishmen everywhere with an amount of gratitude and justice which reflects infinite credit upon the nation, propose in some way or other to honor the day upon which O'Connell first saw the light. In Montreal, Ottawa, and other leading cities of the Dominion, no doubt the most appropriate celebration in the United States, the preparations to properly commemorate the auspicious event are in the most lavish and extensive style. The mode of celebration may differ according to locality, but all agree in putting forth their utmost endeavors to render their respective communities worthy of the day.

Here, in the ancient capital of Quebec, where many descendants of the same Gaelic blood that fired the liberator in his day are prominent and respected members of the community, it is not to be supposed for a moment that they will be behind hand in the festive and patriotic exercises on an extensive scale, and a grand banquet, which is to be held at the Hotel de Ville, will be given in honor of the occasion.
