NAZIS RENEW INFANTRY ATTACK ON STALINGRAD

Italian Troops Appearing On Eastern Front

Weakened but Still Attacking, Germans Struggle to Get Fresh Offensive Going Against Stalingrad While Red Army Troops Are Reported Cutting into Several Sectors of the Mozdok Area by Counter-Attacks.

By HENRY C. CASSIDY, Associated Press Staff Writer Moscow, Oct. 13.—(P)—Weakened but still attacking, the Germans struggled to get a fresh offensive going against Stalingrad today while Red army troops were reported cutting into several sectors of the Mozdok area by vigorous counter-attacks.

Renewal of the assault upon Stalingrad, after a three-day lull devoted to artillery duels, found both German and Russian soldiers muffled in great coats against the autumnal chill.

Italian troops and tanks appeared in the fight.

The Russians said their air force held off the invaders after a minor penetration of a single street yesterday. Red army riflemen and artillery batteries held the Germans Northwest of the city and in the suburbs, dispatches said. Russian motorized infantry was reported checking all enemy attacks against the left flank South of the burning and smoke-hazed city.

Nazi ground forces sprang into action again after a three-day lull. The garrison treated a series of attacks.

The noon communiqué said more than 250 Germans were killed in a vain attempt by a rifle unit to crash through defense lines to a factory in the Northwest area.

Perhaps this was the Stalin tractor plant, Stalingrad's largest industrial works. Pravda said the Russians still held it. The front line runs close to the vast expanse of steel and brick sheds in the workers' settlement of the Northwest suburbs, the newspaper reported. It said that German shells screamed overhead, but damaged tanks were being repaired inside the factory.

Although Stalingrad remained the centre of Soviet interest, greater Nazi casualties were reported piled up in local fighting far to the North—1,000 dead in two actions on the Northwestern front and 400 on the Leningrad front.

Operations within the Don-Volga corridor Northwest of Stalingrad were described as a combination of trench fighting and warfare of manoeuvre.

"Our tank crews knocked out three German tanks, smashed five anti-tank guns and wiped out a company of enemy infantry," the communiqué said.

Deadly Soviet shelling of tanks was officially declared to have forced the German command to change its assault tactics.

"Before," the Moscow radio said, "the tanks went ahead covering the infantry but now, trying to protect the tanks against the murderous fire of Soviet artillery, the infantry goes first."

Whether the Germans were aiming at a full-scale revival of their offensive against Stalingrad was not apparent in more advice from that smoke-shrouded front.

HUGE JAPANESE FLEET IS REPORTED STEAMING INTO SOUTH PACIFIC

London, Oct. 13.—(P)—A Reuters news agency dispatch from Chungking today quoted a Chinese military spokesman as saying that a Japanese fleet including four aircraft carriers and seven battleships was sighted "some time ago" steaming toward the South Pacific.

(A similar report of such a large scale Japanese naval movement was current several weeks ago.)

Britain Calls On Nazis To Withdraw Shackling Order

Prime Minister Churchill Tells House of Commons that Terms of Geneva Convention Do Not Govern Handling of Prisoners on Field of Action, but Refer Exclusively to Prisoners Held in Camps.

London, Oct. 13.—(P)—Prime Minister Churchill announced today that Germany had been requested to rescind her action in shackling British and Canadian prisoners and that if the Nazis agreed Britain immediately would cancel her reprisal measures.

Mr. Churchill said the Germans violated the Geneva convention when they chained 1,376 prisoners taken at the Canadian-led raid on Dieppe August 19th and that representations had been made to Berlin, through Switzerland, urging the Nazis to desist.

If the Germans will desist, he continued, "the counter-measures of similar nature which the (British) Government felt themselves forced to take will immediately be withdrawn."

It was the Prime Minister's first report on the negotiations since Germany announced last Friday that the British and Canadians had been tied up for alleged binding of hands of Nazis seized in raids on Dieppe and Sark Island. Britain and Canada retaliated by fettering a similar number of Nazi prisoners Saturday.

"The British Government has never contemplated any general order for the tying up of prisoners on the field of battle," Mr. Churchill said in response to the German accusation which set off the whole controversy.

The Prime Minister charged the German Government with violating the Geneva convention in its treatment of British and Canadian captives.

He said the convention "does not attempt to regulate what happens in actual fighting," but deals with the treatment of prisoners who are "securely captured."

By binding prisoners in camps, he

FEDERATION OF LABOR FAVORS NEW AGREEMENT

American Federation of Labor Approves Report Calling for Reconciliation with Industrial Congress.

By FRASER MACDOUGALL, Canadian Press Staff Writer Toronto, Oct. 13.—(P)—The American Federation of Labor's 62nd annual convention continued its business sessions today after it gave approval yesterday to steps taken towards labor peace and condemned the administration of the United States National Labor Relations Act.

The approval of peace negotiations between the A.F.L. and the Congress of Industrial Organizations—committees of the two groups are slated to meet in Washington late in the month.

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Loss Of Further United States Cruisers In Solomons Announced

Washington, October 13.—(P)—Three heavy cruisers were added today to the announced American naval losses in the hard-fought but successful battle two months ago to break Japanese control of the vital Southeastern Solomons.

While protecting the night landing of American reinforcements in the Tulagi-Guadalcanal area, August 8-9, the navy announced yesterday, the cruisers Quincy, Vincennes and Astoria were sunk by enemy gunfire and torpedoes.

The toll raised the Japanese score in the Solomon Islands conflict to nine United States vessels—three cruisers, four transports and two destroyers. Two more destroyers were damaged. The enemy's known losses total thirty-eight ships sunk or damaged.

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CHIANG LAUDS STATEMENT OF MAJOR POWERS

Declares that Decision to Relinquish Extra-Territorial Rights Is Important Forward Step for Free China.

Chungking, China, Oct. 13.—(P)—Gen. Chiang Kai-shek in separate messages to Prime Minister Churchill and President Roosevelt thanked the two Allied leaders today for their move to relinquish extraterritorial rights in China.

To Prime Minister Churchill he said: "Britain has won a great moral victory to which Your Excellency's far-sighted statesmanship has made a lasting contribution."

To President Roosevelt he said: "Throughout my struggle to secure national freedom for China I have continuously dreamed of the day when she would assume the full

importance of the Solomons operations was emphasized by the navy in a communiqué disclosing that the United Nations supply lines to Australia and New Zealand. The enemy's apparent intention to control air and sea, it added, also would have put them in a position to strike at the Port Darwin naval base and other strategic Australian sites.

"It was necessary, therefore," the navy said, "that these designs of the enemy be blocked by our capturing and utilizing the key position in the Southeastern Solomons. This was accomplished August 7 when U.S. forces surprised and captured Japanese positions."

Booster Rally For Victory Loan Campaign Is Held At Coaticook

Coaticook, Oct. 13.—Organized by the Coaticook Lions Club, and held in conjunction with the regular meeting, a booster rally for the forthcoming Victory Loan was held at the Coaticook United Church Hall last evening, being an open meeting which all the businessmen of the town were asked to attend, in preparation for opening the campaign on Monday next.

Co-operating with the Coaticook War Loan Committee, the meeting was called at the insistence of Finance Minister Isley, whose "Message to All Canadian Service Clubs" featured the introductory remarks by Henri Turgeon, of Montreal, Quebec member of the War Loan Committee.

Seated on the platform with Lion President Anson P. Rogers were Squadron Leader Jean Paul DesLoges, R.C.A.F., guest speaker, and Dr. W. L. Sturtevant, K.C., Joint Chairman for the War Loan in Stanstead County, and Chairman of the Coaticook Committee; His Worship D. B. Hopkins, Mayor of Coaticook, Henri Turgeon of Montreal, Alphonse Therrien of Magog, County Organizer, Rev. George G. Dugas, of Coaticook, and Rev. Roy P. Stafford, of Coaticook, Lion Tamer.

Following a delicious chicken-pie supper served by the ladies of the United Church, Chairman Rogers called for the singing of "There'll Always Be An England" which was enthusiastically rendered by all present.

In his introductory remarks, Mr. Rogers stated that service clubs all over Canada were taking up the challenge of the War Finance Committee at Ottawa, to boost the sale of the Victory Bonds which opens on Monday next, and asked for full support in putting across the campaign in Coaticook.

Members of the Lions Club then joined in singing the "Lions Roar," accompanied by Lion Albert Tracy at the piano, with Lion Tamer Rev. Roy Stafford leading the singers.

Mayor Hopkins expressed his pleasure at being present, and especially commended the ladies of Coaticook for their share in all past loan campaigns and regretted his absence at this particular meeting, only Mr. DesLoges, Mr. Anson Rogers and Mrs. G. C. Tillotson, Chairman of the Ladies' Committee, being present.

The Mayor concluded by wishing the Committee every success in their efforts.

Dr. Sturtevant expressed the gratitude of his committee for the invaluable assistance of the Lions Club, and introduced Mr. Turgeon, of Montreal, Quebec Director of War Savings Certificates Sales, who read Finance Minister Isley's Message to All Service Clubs, urging them to operation in promoting the success of the forthcoming loan.

Dr. Sturtevant then proceeded to introduce the guest speaker, Squadron Leader Jean Paul DesLoges, R.C.A.F., now Chief Ground Instructor at St. Hubert Airport, and one of Canada's outstanding contributions to the present war, oft shot down himself, and who in turn has shot down several enemy fighters including a Junkers 88, and on one occasion lost the sight of one eye, now going mainly through life for the love of his country. "What Squadron Leader DesLoges had done was performed under no greater obligation than the rest of us have in defending our country, and the best we can do is support the War Loan to the very best of our ability, lending our money to hasten the final victory," Dr. Sturtevant said.

In opening his remarks, Squadron Leader DesLoges acknowledged the

kind words of Dr. Sturtevant, not for himself, but for all those from Canada who were serving in this war and even now fighting across the seas. He expressed great pleasure at the absence of five years, during which time he had changed the scarlet of his R.C.M.P. uniform for that of the blue of the R.C.A.F., and had acquired wings in addition to that.

Picturing the grim horrors of war and the bloodshed and misery he had seen in London and throughout England, recounting the ravages of famine and destruction in Poland and Greece, Squadron Leader DesLoges went on to describe how his squadron went overseas determined to shake Nazi barbarism from their menacing grasp, and especially related that the R.C.A.F. and R.A.F. had definitely gone on the offensive and were pasting Germany with everything they could lay their hands on.

In recounting his squadron's biggest show in August, 1940, when his entire wing was called out, divided into Polish, English, and Canadian squadrons, Squadron Leader DesLoges paid particular respect to the courage and do or die spirit of the Polish fliers in the R.A.F.

In this particular engagement over 1,000 aircraft participated and No. 1 Canadian Fighter Squadron bagged fourteen enemy aircraft themselves. One Polish flier, particularly, he stated, while ground-strafing an enemy airplane in France lost part of one wing of his ship yet brought it back safely. Another, back at the base, when asked if he wanted refueling, said, "More bullets," and that seemed to be the cry everywhere—it was full determination that "We must win, we can win."

He quoted briefly from the poem by Squadron Leader Tweed of the R.C.A.F.: "What Do You Think of the War, My Friend? What Are You Going to Do?" In urging fullest co-operation and untiring effort to make a complete success of the war loan, he said, "We must work, toil and sweat to lend every sweat-stained dollar that we can to hasten the end of this grim struggle, and that great day when skies will be serene again and the sounds of battle die away, we can rest content because, we as Canadians, all helped to do our part, and we can be satisfied to hear our conscience say, 'Well done, Canadian,' and he promised that we have had our share in ending it all. So, dig in, dig out, and buy bonds."

Dr. Sturtevant then introduced County Organizer Therrien, who spoke briefly, stating that "subscribing" to a war loan was now existing. "We are partners with our own Government, we are lending money and will get full returns for every dollar we invest. The war is the greatest investment today." He urged everyone to spread the word around, "Invest in your Government and save to win."

Mr. Therrien stated that the objective for Stanstead County was \$870,000 this time, and \$150,000 for Coaticook and district being an increase of \$15,000 over the previous objective, but stressed the fact that the Dominion total of \$750,000,000 was \$150,000 greater than last time, so all quotas were boosted accordingly.

J. N. White and C. F. Dugas, two of the committee's most energetic loan workers, Mr. White again being in charge of Coaticook salesmen and Mr. Dugas representing the manufacturers, each spoke briefly, and paid complimentary remarks to

gan for the loan truly expresses the situation we face: 'Nothing matters now but victory!'

Canada's four previous loans of this war all were over-subscribed. In January, 1940, a \$200,000,000 loan was subscribed to the extent of \$321,276,850 cash. In September, 1940, a \$300,000,000 loan was subscribed to the extent of \$324,248,300 cash.

The First Victory Loan in June, 1941, for \$600,000,000 was subscribed to the extent of \$710,958,950 cash, and the Second Victory Loan, in January, 1942, for \$600,000,000 was subscribed to the extent of \$834,000,000 cash.

Principal and interest on both Third Victory Loan issues will be payable in Canadian funds, the principal at any agency of the Bank of Canada, and the interest, without charge, at any branch of any chartered bank.

The bonds may be paid for either in cash in full at the time of application at the issue price, without accrued interest, or by instalment, plus accrued interest, Mr. Isley said.

Instalment payments will be as follows: Ten per cent on application and 18 per cent on the first day of each of five months starting with December 1, 1942. The final payment, April 1, 1943, will be 18.67 on the long-term bonds and 18.39 on the short-term bonds. This final payment includes accrued interest from November 1, 1942, to the due dates of the respective instalments.

by Spaniards but by Portuguese and Netherlands. She achieved her independence as an empire and not as a republic. Brazil is the only unique among New World countries in having been the seat of government of a European empire, when the court in Lisbon moved itself to Rio de Janeiro during the Napoleonic wars.

Typical of Brazilian history was her movement of the Imperial Family. When Dom Pedro II, the last Emperor of Brazil, was exiled in 1889—with the memory of many of the country's living leaders—it was accomplished without bloodshed, anger or complaint. This tolerant attitude has been continued by the Republic since then instituted.

The family was allowed to return in 1920, and none of its property had been confiscated. The Imperial Crown itself was bought by the Government for its full intrinsic value and given a place of honor in a museum.

The family live the lives of respected and respected citizens. The eldest son, Dom Pedro, manages the vast estate and is an exemplary landlord. The younger son, Dom Joao, is an outstanding naval aviator. The eldest daughter is married to the Count of Paris, Pretender to the Throne of France.

Mrs. W. G. Brown, Prominent Church and Welfare Worker, Passes Away in Hospital After Brief Illness—Was in 73rd Year.

Cowansville, Oct. 13.—Mourning not only in Cowansville, but throughout the Eastern Townships, by all who had the privilege of knowing her, the sudden death on Saturday of Mrs. W. G. Brown, prominent church and welfare worker of Cowansville, has cast a gloom over the entire community. Her death followed a very brief illness of only two weeks and occurred in the Western Division of the Montreal General Hospital. Intensely active in all church and social activities, Mrs. Brown had made a host of friends, and acquired an ever-widening circle of acquaintances through her unselfish and tireless work.

Before the recent lull, however, the invaders were reported attacking by divisions. A Nazi regiment supported by fifty tanks constituted the largest enemy force specifically reported by the night communiqué to have been in action there yesterday.

Three attacks failed to crack the Stalingrad lines, but defence detachments were pressed back somewhat in one block, the communiqué said. Twenty tanks were disabled or set on fire and about two battalions of German infantry were wiped out, it said. "On another sector our detachments beat off attacks by small enemy groups."

November—came in adoption of a report from the Convention's Resolutions Committee which recommended that a report from the A.F. L. Executive Council on Peace Negotiations be accepted but that four resolutions dealing with the subject be shelved.

stature of an independent democratic nation... China won't fail you in our joint task of securing freedom for all mankind."

(In simultaneous London and Washington announcements timed to coincide with the thirty-first anniversary of the Chinese Republic, the British and American Governments last Friday night made known their intention of joining with China in abolishing the system of extrajudicial rights and special privileges for foreigners.)

(Abolition of the system of special rights under which foreign governments have maintained their own courts in China and exercised other privileges, such as garrisoning troops on Chinese soil, has been one of the principal aims of China since the 1911 revolution.)

In another message, addressed to Gen. George C. Marshall, United States army chief-of-staff, Chiang expressed the hope that China and America soon would restore the peace of the Pacific.

DECREASE IN CHIMNEY FIRES SEEN IN MAGOG

Fire Department's Chimney Sweeping Project Responsible for Fifty Per Cent Cut in Fire Calls.

Magog, Oct. 13.—It has been found that the Magog Fire Department's recent project of sweeping chimneys has been well worthwhile as a fifty per cent cut in fire calls has been experienced.

In the first nine months of 1940, ninety-eight alarms were received. This was before the law was passed compelling all householders to have their chimneys cleaned. During the same period of the next year, after the law was passed, sixty-five calls were received.

This year the Town Council amended the by-law, stating that the chimneys would be cleaned at the expense of the town. A total of 1,553 chimneys were swept at a cost of \$276.50, and, as a result, only forty-nine calls were reported by the Fire Department. This was also for the same nine month period.

This fifty per cent decrease in the number of calls over the year 1940 definitely proves that the safeguard of sweeping the chimneys was warranted in the saving of thousands of dollars worth of property.

Distribution Of Prizes And Awards Took Place At B.C.S.

A large number of parents and friends attended the annual Thanksgiving Day activities held at Bishop's College School yesterday afternoon.

In the forenoon an inter-school football game had to be substituted for the customary match held between the school and the Old Boys, because enough Old Boys could not be found to make up a team, many of them having either joined the forces or left for the West to help with the grain harvest. The inter-school game played between the Prefects and the Seniors and the Head Boys and Neutrals proved to be both exciting and interesting and gave the spectators an idea of the ability and sportsmanship which the boys display in their games. Dr. Roebuck, of the Faculty, acted as referee for the game.

After the game the many guests gathered in the students' main dining room where lunch was served, the group later dispersing to the auditorium and gym to hear the Headmaster's report and to witness the presentation of prizes and awards.

Among those present on the platform were Dr. A. H. McGreer, Principal and Vice-Chancellor of Bishop's University, Bishop Williams, The Lord Bishop of Quebec, Jackson Dods, Chairman, F. A. Pattison, the Headmaster, and W. A. Page, the Headmaster of the Preparatory School.

The meeting was opened by Mr. Jackson Dods who acted as Chairman and Mr. Pattison then gave his report.

"For the past eight years on this occasion," he said, "I have sat in this hall, and listened to the headmaster delivering his annual report, but never before have I been in such complete sympathy with him. Today, for the first time, I fully realize the magnitude of the task

before him, to try to present to you, in the few minutes at his disposal a true and accurate picture of a year's activities in a school, a society in which, above all others, so many small and insignificant things can be of so vast an importance.

"The school has just passed through what proved to be a rather difficult year, due chiefly to the very unstable state of the staff. Scarcely a month after the opening of the Michaelmas term, Mr. Henry Holden of the preparatory school staff left us to join the R.C.A.F.

"Throughout the whole year the average health of the school was excellent. We had no serious epidemics although we narrowly averted a run of the mumps when one case that we had strangely enough spread no further.

"For the part they took in the war effort in its various forms a great deal of credit is due to the boys and more especially to the prefects. They relieved the labour shortage difficultly considerably by the work they did in the dining room as waiters, by the work on the grounds and by unloading the coal.

This year when they came back to school in September they were all very disappointed to find that the year's supply of coal was already in.

"For the seventh year in succession, the No. 2 Bishop's College School cadets corps has been awarded the Strathcona Cup for military efficiency. The two cups on the table each having been won three years in succession are now the property of the school. The third cup, that for 1942, has not yet arrived.

This year in order to vary the monotony a little the cadet corps also won the senior physical training trophy. I want to congratulate them on these awards and to point out to the new members the high standard of efficiency which is expected of them.

"I have kept till near the end the outstanding achievement of the year, an achievement which I very much doubt has ever been equalled before in the school. I am referring of course to the matriculation results. In the McGill junior matriculation, Godfrey Howard placed first in the province with an average rank of 88 per cent. D. W. McLimont placed second with an average mark of 85 per cent and R. N. Cockfield placed third with an average mark of 84.4 per cent. This year McGill University did not publish the marks in order of merit as previously. Instead the names were published in alphabetical order in three classes, first class being all with 80 per cent or better, second class 70 per cent to 80 per cent and third class 60 per cent to 70 per cent. The three names which I have read out were the only names listed in the first class. J. B. Holley with 79.5 per cent in the second class must have been very close to fourth in the province. During the summer we learned that Godfrey had added further to these laurels by placing first in the entrance examination for the Annapolis Naval Academy. R. N. Cockfield and D. W. McLimont were both awarded scholarships by McGill University. Cockfield a University entrance scholarship which gives him the title and status of a 'Scholar of the University' and McLimont a Beatty scholarship in mathematics. This is the third year in succession that this matriculation scholarship has been won by a boy from this school.

Dr. A. H. McGreer was then called upon to present the prizes. In a few brief remarks Dr. McGreer expressed his pleasure in being able to attend to give out the prizes. He also paid tribute to Bishop Williams whom he said was Bishop's College School's oldest old-boy.

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Mechanized Units Of War Will Cruise Sherbrooke Streets In Connection With Victory Loan

Sherbrooke County National War Finance Committee headquarters announced at noon today that a convoy of tanks, guns, jeeps, other mechanized units of war, including fifty trucks and a complement of between two hundred and two hundred and fifty men, will cruise Sherbrooke streets on Friday, October 23, in connection with the Third Victory Loan drive.

The itinerary worked out by military authorities in co-operation with Victory Loan officials, will take in Three Rivers on October 19, Valleyfield, October 21, St. Johns, October 22, Sherbrooke, October 23, and Drummondville, October 24, arriving back in Montreal on the morning of October 25.

The convoy will move through all major streets here in order to give

the citizens a close-up view of the weapons of war which even now are in actual use in the different theatres of war. During the visit of the convoy, the equipment, which will include Ram and Valentine tanks, will be stationed on exhibition.

The military exhibition will include a complete army workshop, commissary and dental wagon and each night of the tour will camp out, establishing bivouacs wherever the convoy happens to be at the time.

The last time residents of Sherbrooke and the Eastern Townships were able to see Canada's mechanized equipment massed together was when the army train, which toured Canada, visited Sherbrooke early this year.

Parade plans in connection with the visit of the convoy to the city will be announced later this week.

Three-Day Salvage Collection Will Be Opened In Sherbrooke Tomorrow

"Starting tomorrow, the fifth three-day inter-city salvage collection drive will get underway and in this connection I wish, on behalf of the Sherbrooke Salvage Committee, to make some suggestions to local householders as to what materials are wanted and how they should be put out," stated Alderman Guy Bryant, Chairman of the Hygiene and Health Department, today.

"1. All scrap metal and scrap rubber, as well as rags and bottles (except milk bottles) should be put out for collection tomorrow.

"2. No paper of any kind should be put out.

"3. All salvage must be put out front of the house, not later than eight o'clock in the morning. Those who cannot put it out in the morning, should put it out the night before. Our police will do their best to protect such salvage during the night.

"4. No garbage, fats or greases, bones or tin cans, should be put out tomorrow.

"5. Household items which regular garbage collection day would ordinarily be taken care of, should be put out for collection tomorrow. In the past collections garbage was put out with salvage, and it had to be sorted and disposed of by the sorters.

"6. Housewives are asked to put out any usable clothing or shoes, furniture, lamps, etc. These should be given to organizations for rehabilitation work.

"7. Magazines and books are not wanted in the salvage collection and should be given to organizations who supply reading matter to our men in uniform."

All householders are again requested to display their salvage cards. Those who desire cards are urged to telephone 89-W, Sherbrooke, and ask for Armand Waite, special collector.

ADDRESS GIVEN BY L. N. AUDET AT LIONS CLUB

A talk on the relations of art with civilization, given by Louis N. Audet, highlighted the Thanksgiving Day meeting of the Sherbrooke Lions Club in the New Sherbrooke House last night.

The speaker explained at the outset of his interesting discourse that art is the shadow of civilization and always reflects the ideas of its own time, pointing out that past civilizations are known by arts of the different epochs.

Stating that the antique civilizations of the Egyptians, Greeks and Romans were based on slavery, he asserted that this type of art had the temple as its feature, while the new art found the Cathedral, the home of God, and the house of prayer. "Great creed was necessary to bring the needed mountains of stone on unskilful rock. In those days, the art was religious," Mr. Audet asserted.

He added that the late art of this period was also influenced by what the Crusaders had seen at Constantinople and in the Mohammedan world. "The discovery of oil paintings changed all the painters' art and the discovery of antique statues with the ideas of the Renaissance following the new ideas, which were found in the study of the antique world."

In concluding his talk, Mr. Audet said that the art of tomorrow will keep abreast of the post-war period. He was introduced by Albert Charpentier and thanked by Armand Crepeau.

Three big affairs will be sponsored this month by the Lions Club. President Dalma Landry announced. He said that the "Father and Child" meeting will be observed next Monday, and on October 29, a "Military Week" will be held at the 54th Army. Fifty prizes will be awarded to the Sherbrooke children wearing the funniest costumes in the Lions Club Halloween parade on the night of October 31. Further details of this event will be announced next week.

HITLER'S CHANGING PLANS

Hitler's announcement that he has achieved his main objective at Stalingrad and therefore will depend on bombardment rather than infantry to complete the operation of reducing the city appear to cover a much more important issue than appears on the surface. There is sound reason to believe he is preparing to weaken his position there by a heavy withdrawal of airpower for other and even more pressing purposes.

His peculiar statement broadcast by a spokesman, obviously was calculated to prepare the German public for a slowing-down of the attack on Stalingrad and perhaps disappointment at the failure to capture the city. Probably it also was intended to soften the disclosure of the extent of the huge German losses.

However, it is doubtful that Hitler would thus tacitly admit the hiding he has been taking were it not for the necessity of making a quick shift in his plans. The only logical move of real magnitude would appear to involve his air force, the major part of which he has been employing in the bloodiest and biggest siege of history.

Reasons for believing this represents his purpose are:

1—The devastating Anglo-American bombing raids against Nazi war industries and transport systems in Western Europe are hitting the Reich in a vital spot and hurting like the devil.

We have a fine illustration of this in Friday's raid against the French industrial city of Lille by one hundred great United States bombers, supported by a fleet of five hundred British, Canadian and Allied fighter planes.

The time has arrived when Hitler must try to halt these assaults and that would necessitate the withdrawal of aircraft from the Russian front.

2—The Nazi all-higher has been displaying jangling nerves over the fear of an Allied attack somewhere in Western Europe.

3—Because Hitler has been so engaged on the Russian front that he has had to quit large-scale bombing of Britain, John Bull naturally has been free to get ahead with the business of piling up resources.

4—In order to throw every ounce of weight he could into the assault on Stalingrad, the Fuehrer even stripped Rommel of air power. This not only deprived the Nazis of strength to continue the offensive against Egypt but also placed them in a most uncomfortable defensive position.

5—Indications are that the Nazi chief hopes to be able to drive Eastward along the foothills of the Caucasus mountain range to the Caspian Sea in an effort to cut the Russian transport line from the Persian Gulf. This would call for more air power since the Reds have been holding well in that area.

6—Apart from all these considerations, there is one which basically is of even more pressing importance. Hitler must at once begin to prepare for the great war of the air which most certainly will be waged next spring over Western Europe. That battle is likely to determine the course of the war and length of time it will last.

DEMANDS A DICTATED PEACE

The American Legion's new National Commander has called for strong men to lead a ruthless devastation of "the lands and cities of our enemies" and then enforce a dictated peace.

Their country must be knit into "a great fighting giant, with the will to kill, destroy, and to win," Commander Roane Warning declared in his address at a home-coming celebration marking his return from the legion's national convention at Kansas City.

"America, even now, has not yet settled down to total war," he said. "Too much time is consumed by labor over questions of jurisdictional strikes, too much bickering occurs between bureaus in Washington, too many instances of jealousies are in evidence in our armed forces—and, again, too much unnecessary hesitancy and delay prevails in Congressional action."

"The time has come for us to demand of those to whom we have given unprecedented authority over our lives and fortunes, that all unnecessary wastage of military essentials be stopped."

"Let the stumble-bums, the do-gooders and the

bleeding-hearts step out of the picture and let strong men take their places."

The victory that would follow if "the job on the home front is done right," Mr. Warning said, must be one marking "the complete annihilation of the governments of Hitler, Hirohito and Mussolini," and the peace must be dictated "only after our victorious armies have marched across and devastated the land and cities of our enemies."

"They must be taught, the German people and the Japanese people and the Italian people, what war really means, and what retribution they will surely face again if in the years to come they again follow false war-like leaders," he said.

"Yes, it must be a dictated peace, a just peace of realities, because only by punishment can such people be taught to fear."

THE FRENCH FOOD SITUATION

Spokesmen for the Fighting French in Washington declare that they have received new advices predicting "severe food shortages" in Occupied and Unoccupied France during the coming winter as the result of poor crops and increased demands on the part of the Germans.

They reported receipt of "reliable information" that the Germans had demanded 8,000,000 quintals (each roughly equivalent to 3½ bushels) of wheat this winter against 3,000,000 handed over to them last year, and that France's wheat crop would average but 50,000,000 quintals against that country's pre-war consumption level of more than 80,000,000.

Butter production also is well under average because of a decrease in the number of cattle and the bad state of the remaining animals, most of which are underfed, they said, adding these statements:

Only 63,000 tons of peanut oil remain in France against a normal yearly consumption of some 400,000,000 tons.

Stocks of animal fats already are 44,000 tons under the level at which present fat rations can be maintained.

Condensed milk is going for the greater part to the German army, and it is feared that not enough will be left for French babies.

The French look forward to another cut in their meat rations during the year as a result of a fifty-per-cent drop in the fodder crop and German insistence that fifty per cent of the remaining crop in the Occupied Zone be surrendered to them.

MONEY IN THE BANK

By Grenville Kleiser

Some money is definitely spent in buying ill-health. The sweet trifles, ice cream, candy, chewing gum, that take up so much small cash are really injurious; yet children are often encouraged to buy them, and so establish a habit both of extravagance and self-indulgence, besides doing infinite harm to their health.

Girls who have only a small income often squander the major portion of it in beauty treatment, which is generally poor in results and often harmful in its effects. Others buy patent medicines which, as can be seen by studying their recipes, are generally useless and sometimes actually dangerous. People do these things solely because they have not formed the habit of thoughtful planning.

Expenditure, to be wise, must be thoughtful. Bargain sales should be patronized only with prudence. To buy a thing just because it is said to be greatly reduced, without considering whether it is useful or necessary, is folly.

Such sales, however, may really offer goods at prices which make their purchase sensible. The wise buyer goes to them with the firm intention of buying only that which he is likely to need, and at prices which make their purchase a real saving of money.

Wise expenditure is also seen in the habit—possible only to the thrifty—of buying goods in bulk. Certain cereals, soap, linen, stationery and so on can be stored indefinitely and used as required; their purchase in large quantities often means a substantial reduction in cost.

But to use this form of economy one must have in hand the cash for immediate payment. For the same reason, the purchase of goods by the instalment plan is a reckless extravagance. The dealers, to protect themselves, often charge as much as twenty per cent extra on goods bought in this manner.

A good rule is: "If you can't afford to pay for it, don't buy it until you can." In actual cash, the thrifty man saves sums in this way which, in the course of a few years, amount to a considerable total simply by the wise expenditure of his money.

Economical buying should be extended to every commodity. One sometimes hears people say, "Oh, I couldn't buy cheap clothes!" They seem to imply that cheap clothes would be bad in appearance. Yet the same people will often appear at home in slovenly attire.

No clothes look so bad as shabby finery. It is far better to buy neat, suitable clothes than to save for, or buy as a bargain, some article which is obviously not suited to your status. A good appearance is part of the stock-in-trade of the successful business man or woman.

Under the personal command of King Nicholas, the Montenegrin troops are continuing to advance. Reports from the war front tell of a large force of Turkish officers and men surrendering. In the meantime the other Balkan powers have taken no action but fears mount that the whole of Europe may be involved.

TRUTH ABOUT THE GERMANS

London Evening News

The time has come to stop being neatly mouthed about the Germans people. Even after these last three years, in which the German people have gloried in massacres, tortures and enslavements worse than anything in the story of man, there is still an insidious and formidable campaign in some quarters of this country—a campaign to persuade us that Hitler's millions really have nothing to do with it, that Nazidom is only a regrettable fungus on the outside of them, and that when the fungus has been scraped off they will be revealed as harmless, decent, neighborly Europeans.

The people who believe those things are making a most disastrous mistake. The ugly truth is that for generations the German people, taking them as a whole, have been a peril to the world.

What is the difference between Hitler, who orders savageries, and the Army which carries them out with relish? And what is the distinction between the Army and the millions who flow down those masks of innocence and comradeship. And from the people in this country who prate about the two Germans will come the plea that we really must be gentle with such honest, misjudged folk.

The German people, and not just the German leaders, must have meted out to them what they have meted out to millions of their fellow-creatures—unless they learn that war is both painful and unprofitable. We shall see these horrors all over again in another generation.

Somehow this malignant disease in the European body must be stamped out, and the German people cannot complain if the cure hurts.

THE ONTARIO W.C.T.U. IS A LONG WAY FROM LIBYA

Delegates to a convention of the Ontario Women's Christian Temperance Union, comfortable and well-fed in their Ottawa convention hall, by resolution denounced the Government of Canada "for allowing beer to be sent to Libya."

This is the sort of thing which alienates public sympathy from any organization, no matter how high-minded its ideals.

British and Allied troops in Libya have been fighting for months under conditions of discomfort we, safe here at home, hardly can imagine. Intense heat by day, dust, sand-storms, the blistering temperature of tanks in battle, the deadly game of bitter war against a tough and ruthless enemy—these are the things that go to make up the life of our men in North Africa. Most soldiers in these circumstances, would rather have a bottle of beer than a turkey dinner with all the trimmings, and a few except the extreme and unalterable "drys" would deny them this spot of comfort in their hard and dangerous days if it can be provided.

"Temperance" is the governing word in the name of this body, the W.C.T.U., and temperance is defined in our dictionary as "abstinence of excess; avoidance of everything indulgent in alcohol." Every sensible person knows excess should be avoided, not only in drinking but in eating, and in recreation, and if the W.C.T.U. aimed its missionary work at temperance it would have the sup-

port of great numbers of persons who are only irritated by its intolerance. In the Great War the W.C.T.U. was stoutly opposed to the sending of cigarettes to the Canadian troops overseas. That was as far from reality as its present protest against sending beer to Libya—or the statement of a convention delegate that "90 per cent of all users of alcohol become addicts," that is, drunkards.

The aim of real temperance in Canada is to secure curtailment of present prodigious expenditures on liquor because the drink bill is a shameful inconsistency with the economy of total war. The Ontario W.C.T.U., had it chosen to be useful and realistic, would have taken a strong stand with The Journal and other newspapers which have been urging the Dominion Government to take action in this matter—shortly to ration supplies to the provinces. Instead, the Union belies its name by violent and immoderate language, in the delusion that people can be scared away from alcohol if it is shouted at them that 30 per cent of all drinkers become drunkards and go to increase the population of hell.

With a really live problem right on its doorstep the ladies of the W.C.T.U. hark back to the outworn arguments of a half century ago. And by so doing they handicap those of us—life-long moderate drinkers who have not become "addicts"—who are battling for reasonable and practical restrictions.

The essential point about this business of drinking is that we in Canada are spending on it some \$250,000,000 a year—one W.C.T.U. delegate casually put the figure at \$290,000,000—and we cannot do that and give the war the attention we must give it if we are not to be beaten into the slavery which has come to a dozen other countries once as free and prosperous as Canada.

A PLAUSIBLE HESS STORY FROM SWEDEN

The Berlin-owned Dagposten of Stockholm has come forward with the first, Nazi explanation of Rudolf Hess' flight, that sounds even remotely like the real thing. Apart from its origin, the most impressive testimony to its plausibility is the incredible reasoning it reveals.

Hess went to England at Hitler's bidding, the story runs, to prove to Britain that he was an attack upon Russia. The U.S.S.R. was to be partitioned, with the Reich controlling the Ukraine and the Caucasian oil fields. Germany would take back all her old colonies. East Russia would go to Japan. Japan would also be given access to everything needed from the Dutch East Indies. Aid to "Bolshevik China" would be cancelled. In return, Britain's empire and her mandates would be "guaranteed."

Hess' flight took place in May, 1941. This was a few months after the frightful blitz of England in the autumn of 1940 and nearly a year after all the horrors the Nazis had visited upon Western Europe. There was only one matter that Hitler, in the wisdom of his notorious brute "intuition," overlooked.

This was that all hope of a diplomatic quid-pro-quo agreement with England ended for him with the fall of the first bombs. He forgot, if he has even yet learned, that he had outraged humanity beyond all possibility of forgiveness, and that the English people had fully demonstrated that they preferred extinction to compromise with such a cosmic criminal.

Napoleon made the same mistake when he called Britain "a nation of shopkeepers," believing that trade came first and last with them. If the Dagposten story of the Hess flight is the true version, it means that Hitler is making the same monumental mistake. And that when the final chapter is closed, the beginning of his downfall may be dated at Hess' arrival in Scotland.

FORCES DEFENCE LEAD FROM TENACE

Very soon, however, the local players fathom the systems of the experts.

Today's hand shows how Mrs. Ernest Ballard and G. W. Craig of Asheville, N.C., handled a situation that helped them win the Southern Appalachian mixed pair championship, held at Asheville recently. The no trump game was missed by most other tables after the spade bid by West. While North has two spade stoppers, he has little else, and only the discovery of the club fit can warrant the game bid.

West held the first trick and also his next lead, the king of hearts. Then he exited with a club. Five rounds of the suit made hash of the adverse hands, and Mrs. Ballard, the declarer, then established a second diamond trick. The third diamond gave dummy entry to lead a spade at trick eleven, and West, who had been forced to blank his ace, then had to lead hearts from the minor tenace.

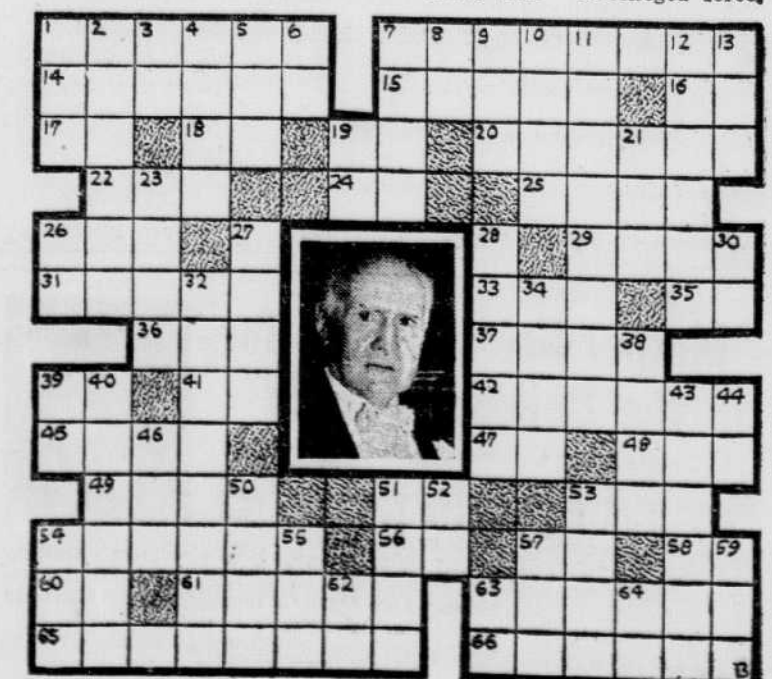

members of the services, both in the ceremonial parade of the Coast Cook Battery, the 72nd R.C.A., C.A. (R.), and the guard of honor mounted by the Legion of Frontiersmen, D Squadron of Magog, also in the crowds thronging the church and the wide verandas and spacious lawns of the Bishop Mountain Hall, where there were representatives from every branch of the services, Army, Air Force, Canadian Navy, Merchant Navy, U.S. Army and the C. W.A.C., all served to remind one and all that nothing is complete in this country today without that definite military atmosphere, yet looking on the faces and the bearing of those who are serving their country seemed to give everyone the thought that it was for the future and maintenance of such institutions as was being dedicated that the final victory must be won and they were confident that such a task was not far distant if those present were any indication of the determination and courage so evident among the forces over there. Notable too, was the fact that most of the young girls who have come to Coaticook to enter the Bishop Mountain Hall were themselves present in the colorful parade of military and youth organizations, being members of the Girl Guides, their deep-blue uniforms lending contrast to the khaki of the troops and the other groups in the line of march.

Broadened by Miss Helen Norton, herself, the dedication of her magnificent gift on Saturday came as the culmination of weeks of intensive and untiring work on the part of the Local Committee, prominent in which were the two most eager and tireless workers, the rector himself, Rev. T. J. Matthews, Supervisor of Bishop Mountain Hall, and Mr. Leon M. Thomas, Committee Treasurer, and close friend of the donors, Miss Helen Norton and her brother, Mr. Harry Norton.

MANY AT SERVICE

Opening the afternoon's ceremony, the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Quebec participated in a brief service in St. Stephen's Church, attended by such a great number of guests and well-wishers that accommodations were taxed to the limit, and in spite of extra chairs and benches, hundreds gathered outside, their very presence indicating that they, too, felt the magnitude of such an outstanding gift from the Nortons, and wished to share in the pleasure and spirit of the occasion with the recipients. Attending the service in a body, under the command of Capt. Max B. Ferrill, 72nd Battery C.A. (R.), were the four youth organizations under the direction of the rector and his wife, Rev. T. J. Matthews and Mrs. Matthews, including the Anglican Boys' Club, Girl Guides, Brownies and Wolf Cubs. Led by the flag of the Church of England, these groups occupied seats at the front of the church and rejoined the rest of the parade at the armories following the service.

Following the processional entry of the white-robed choir from the Guild Hall into the church, all joined in the singing of the National Anthem, after which the congregation joined in a hymn of praise, and were led in prayer by the Lord Bishop, who asked God's blessing on all those who had worked in any way to bring about the reason for their presence, from the original founders of Bishop Mountain Hall in Quebec to the members of the Quebec Committee and the newly-formed Coaticook Committee, asking especially for His blessing upon the donors of the hall, Miss Helen Norton and her brother, Mr. Harry Norton, to whom they were so deeply indebted for the gift of their former home with much of its contents, and the beautiful grounds surrounding the home. The Bishop also asked for Divine guidance for all those who continued to work with, and those who now or would occupy the Bishop Mountain Hall. In a few simple words that

reached deep into the hearts of those in attendance, the Bishop lauded the magnificent gesture of the Nortons, and briefly sketched the growth of the Bishop Mountain Hall from its founding in Quebec to the present date. His Lordship asked for continued co-operation in the operation and maintenance of the hall from all those who heard his words. Immediately following the service the entire congregation adjourned to the Bishop Mountain Hall, to await the arrival of the ceremonial parade of troops and youth organizations before beginning the actual dedication ceremonies.

PARADE HELD

One of the outstanding features of the afternoon's activities was the parade from the Coaticook Armories, through the principal streets of the town, to the lawns of the Bishop Mountain Hall on Union Street. Led by the Guard of Honor comprised of a detachment of the Legion of Frontiersmen, D Squadron from Magog, under command of Lieut. J. O. Aspinall, the line of march included the 72nd Battery, R.C.A., C.A. (R.), under command of Major Roger Bouchard, assisted by Capt. Roland Chartier, 2nd in command, with 'A' Troop under Capt. Max B. Ferrill, and 'B' Troop in charge of Capt. Hubert Rousseau. Immediately following the soldiers was the enlarged and vastly improved Coaticook Harmony Band, whose music greatly assisted the entire afternoon programme, being under the baton of their leader, Bandmaster J. O. Boisvert. Next in line were representatives of the Canadian Legion, followed by the eye-opening spectacle of four smartly-dressed in full uniform, youth organizations, stepping along in the best military style, in charge of their leaders, The Anglican Boys' Club, in command of Gerald Paige, O.C., assisted by Howard Allard, 2nd in command, the Girl Guides in charge of their Captain, Mrs. E. Markwell, the Wolf Cubs, in charge of Alvin Kirmeyer in the absence of Rev. Mr. Matthews and Leslie Bishop, Cubmaster and Assistant, and bringing up the rear, the smartly-stepping newly formed little group of Brownies, in charge of Miss Dora Hanna.

Arriving at the Hall, the parade entered by the Southern entrance and marched across the lawn, forming in two columns immediately in front of the saluting base, the front entrance to Bishop Mountain Hall. The Legion of Frontiersmen formed the Guard of Honor at the foot of the steps leading up to the doorway, where the Lord Bishop and his party awaited the color party, which was in charge of Lieut. Charles Wells, accompanied by Gnr. V. Boldue and Bdr. Harold Howitt, who advanced and received the blessing of the Bishop. Following this the general salute was sounded by Trumpeter H. Jack Howitt, and Major Bouchard mounted the steps to present his compliments to the Lord Bishop. Accepting the invitation of Major Bouchard, His Lordship accompanied him on an official inspection of the parade, following which the band accompanied the return to the steps by rendering a martial air. Speeches were definitely not the order of the afternoon and after the brief introduction by Rev. T. J. Matthews, who welcomed the assembly to the dedication of Bishop Mountain Hall, the entire gathering was somewhat saddened to learn that messages had been received regretting the unavoidable absence of the donors themselves, Miss Helen Norton and Mr. Harry Norton, and the guest speaker of the day, Miss Winnifred Kydd, O.B.E., M.A., Commissioner of Girl Guides, who expressed their deep regret and sent best wishes for a happy gathering. In introducing the Lord Bishop of Quebec, Rev. Mr. Matthews said, "Members of the clergy, Mrs. Crowfoot, President of the Corporation, ladies and gentlemen: I had hoped that Miss Norton, who has graciously, and generously endowed the

Formerly dedicating the Bishop Mountain Hall to the service of God, the Bishop turned and inserted the key in the huge front door, and stepped across the threshold, at the same time offering a prayer of benediction and consecration for work of the home.

Brief congratulatory remarks were offered by J. P. Wells, Chancellor of the Diocese of Quebec, and by Jackson Dods, O.B.E., D.C.I., General Manager of the Bank of Montreal, both of whom stressed the fact that the Bishop Mountain Hall was indeed endowed with a new life and everlasting thanks would be showered on the donors, Miss Helen Norton and her brother, Mr. Harry Norton. Mr. Dods also stressed that the Home would never be known by any other name than that of Bishop Mountain Hall, the Anglican Church Home for Girls.

Entering the hall, the Bishop immediately proceeded to the chapel, where a brief prayer of dedication to the work of Christ was offered and Bishop Mountain Hall was declared formally open to continue its gracious work.

Speaking before an audience that dwelt on every word and took the entire address to their hearts, the Lord Bishop of Quebec, in dedicating the Bishop Mountain Hall, delivered the following address, taking as his topic "Except the Lord Build the House, Their Labor is in Vain":

"We meet today to open and bless with prayer and solemn ceremony the new home in Coaticook for the old Bishop Mountain Hall of Quebec. We pray that God's blessing may continue on this enterprise and upon all those who are concerned in it. We pray that it may develop here into a strong Christian institution with a definite educational value for the diocese and for the community.

"We thank God for the work to which He has called us and the unity of purpose which He has given us. "We make mention just in this place of the generosity of Miss Helen Norton, who has made this gift of her beautiful home to be the new home of the old institution and has added to this gift by her gracious co-operation and interest in so many ways. God will give her the reward and gratification of seeing it become a centre of happy Christian life and of training in Christian faith and Christian virtues. And that is the reward that will please her most.

"Secondly, we remember the generosity, wisdom and forethought of those ladies in Quebec who more than a hundred years ago became the founders of what is now called the Bishop Mountain Hall, and especially of Mrs. Mountain, the wife of the great Bishop, who seems to have been the leading spirit. Our prayer and hope is that under new conditions their purposes may come

to a richer fulfillment than they dreamed of.

"Thirdly, we think of the Quebec Ladies' Committee, who carry the financial burden of this institution, and have had to make important decisions during the past year. We realize what a grief it has been to many of them to see the old building pass into other hands, and the girls go off to a new home. We are more than grateful for their courage, their realism, and their prudence.

"And fourthly, there is the local Committee in Coaticook, which has been faced with a multitude of problems, all of which have been successfully overcome.

"I mention no names in connection with either of these Committees, for they are well-known to you. And also the point which we would stress is that of co-operation, working together with God. This new beginning of the old Bishop Mountain Hall could not have been made unless numbers of men and women in Quebec and in Coaticook and elsewhere had been prepared to face trials, put aside their personal convenience and work hard.

"Christian faith, and Christian hope and Christian love have triumphed over numerous difficulties. Let Christian faith and hope and love continue to direct this enterprise, for the words of the old Psalm are everlastingly true: 'Except the Lord build the house, their labor is but lost that build it.'

"I see in this house which we now proceed to dedicate a blessed link between the past and the present, between the diocese of a hundred years ago and the diocese of a hundred years to come, between the old city of Quebec and the beautiful Eastern Townships. I see it as a monument and centre of our mutual love and our unity of purpose in Christ.

"I have mentioned the donor of the property, I have mentioned the original founders, I have mentioned the Quebec Ladies' Committee, I have mentioned the local Committee.

"I must conclude by mentioning the most important persons of all, the girls who are, or who will, be members of this institution. All we have to do is to see that they are to have been done for their sake.

"There are great possibilities in the Bishop Mountain Hall—education, social and religious possibilities. These possibilities are only limited by the possibilities which God has implanted in the girls who are or shall be committed to our care. Our concern is that all their natural gifts and talents and aptitudes should be developed to the utmost.

"May God grant, therefore, that we may wisely plan, sincerely pray, and truly work, so that sound learning, pure faith, good manners and honest industry may in this place forever flourish and abide."

Mingling with the guests were numerous representatives of the clergy from a large number of Eastern Townships churches, and one and all took full advantage of the opportunity to inspect this magnificent and far-reaching home, whose walls are of paneled, rare woods, especially chosen by the late A. O. Norton, who built the home about a half century ago. Signifying their presence tangibly, if not personally, and always symbolic of Harry Norton, himself, were the beautiful clusters of cut flowers which adorned the rooms and lent a colorful touch to the reception, having been sent especially for the occasion by Miss Norton, Mr. Norton and Mrs. M. Green, of Toronto.

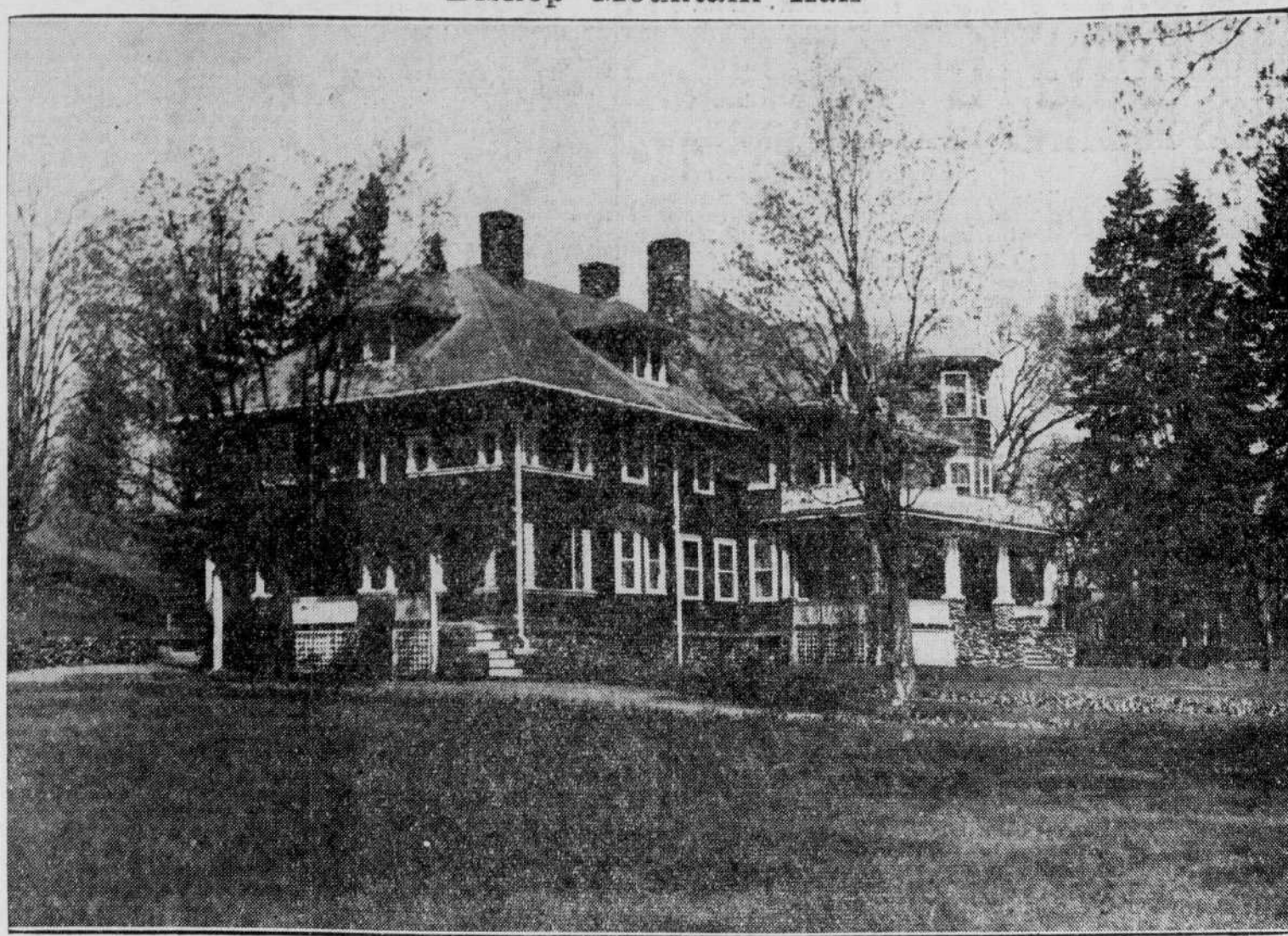

Following the reception, a brief business meeting of the Joint Committees was held in the Board Room, when routine business was transacted.

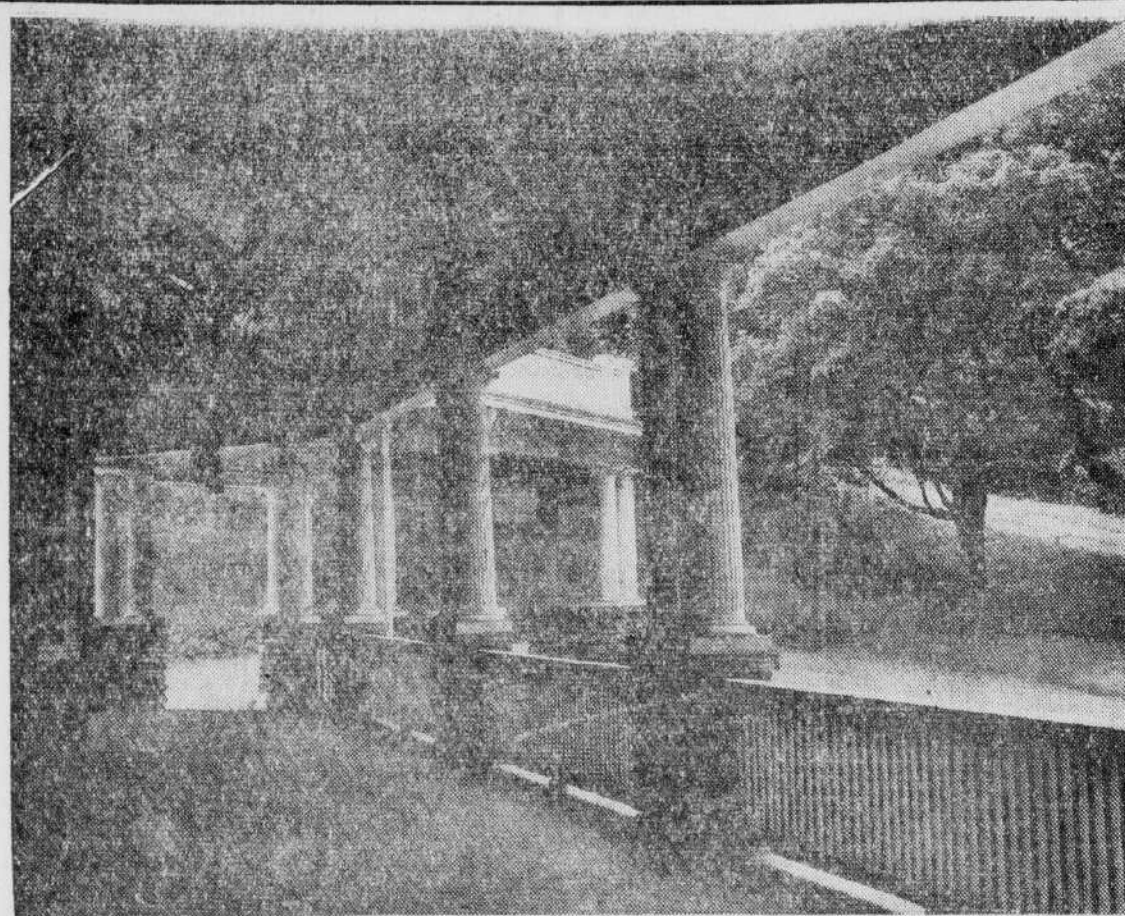

One of the interesting features of the reception was the Scrapbook presented by Dean Crowfoot, and illustrating by story and picture the history of Bishop Mountain Hall from its beginning up to the present institution in Coaticook. This was displayed by the Matron, Lady Principal Mrs. Gertrude Lovell, on whose capable shoulders rests the responsibility of caring for the girls in her charge.

NO CHANGES MADE

Formally taking over the magnificent Norton estate, the new occupants have had to make no changes and very few additions, so that nothing has upset the beauty of this grand old home, and the house and grounds remain as they always were. The girls of Bishop Mountain Hall have moved in and are living in the same home, with much of the same atmosphere that the Norton family kept for so many years.

Leaving considerable furniture and other beautiful appointments for the use of the new occupants, the Nortons made only one request, that as little be changed as possible, and nothing has. The only addition is that sufficient shower rooms were not available, and three new showers are now under construction in the basement. Besides this the only other work on the property included the installation of a huge flag-pole, the gift of Mr. George Johann, of Dixville.

Built by the late Arthur Osmond Norton and Mrs. Norton, nee Richardson, as a country house over a quarter of a century ago, the present rambling, magnificent Hall is a combination of several types of architecture, with the interior finished in rare paneled woods, and has many outstanding features, including huge porte-cochères, extra-wide balconies on the ground and second floors, the latter of which goes almost entirely around the house, and a huge ballroom on the third floor, which has now been put into use as a playroom.

The house was built on the same grounds as the former home of his wife, for sentimental reasons, but the home was never occupied continually as Mrs. Norton's health failed and she had to spend most of her remaining days in a warmer climate. Later, coming into the possession of the son and daughter, it has remained just as it was, and was used more by Miss Helen Norton than her brother, the former spending most of her summers there, while Mr. Norton seldom stayed at their Coaticook home, although he had many of the best pieces of art there, and much of his huge collection of curios and treasures gathered from his frequent world tours, which were the objects of awe and admiration from all who were privileged to see them.

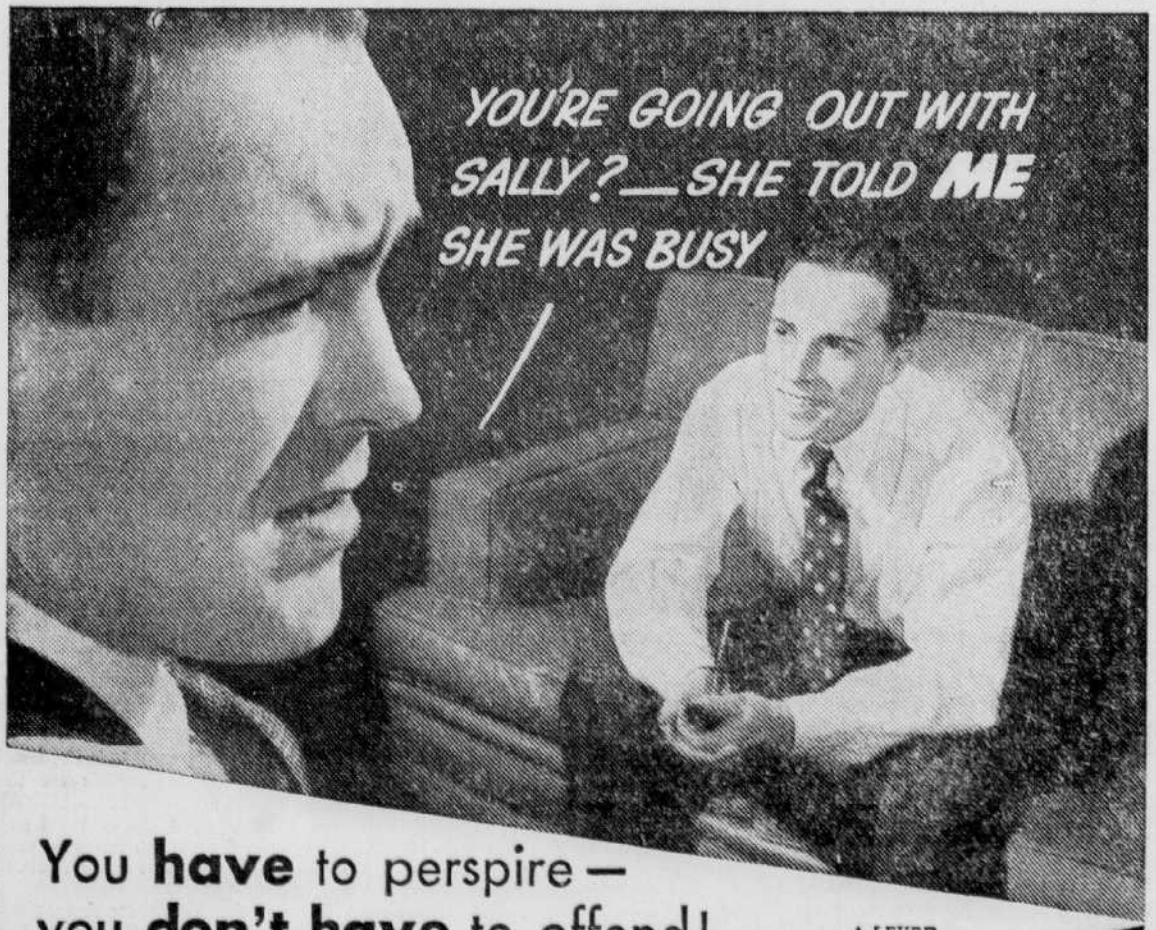
Another unique feature of the Hall is that the Chapel is furnished completely with all accoutrements from the original Hall in Quebec, including altar, cross, and other church requisites, individual small chairs especially made with hymn-book racks on the back of each, and the Hall's own miniature organ.



Following their Harvest Home Services this fall, the churches at Compton, Dixville, Stanhope, Hereford and Coaticook sent all their vegetables to Bishop Mountain Hall, while numerous private citizens have donated large quantities of jams, jellies, preserves, pickles and other such welcome treats for the young folk at the Hall.

Now, Bishop Mountain Hall has truly found a new home that is indeed an ideal Girls' Home, thanks again to the foresight and understanding and unforgettable generosity of Miss Helen Norton and Mr. Harry Norton, who made the whole thing possible. Long may it flourish.

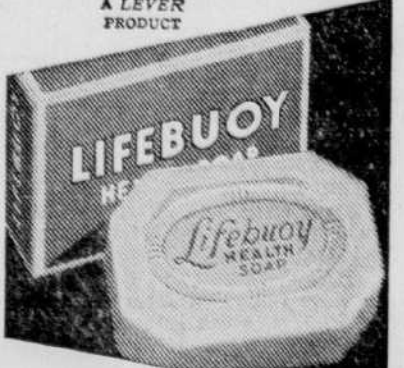

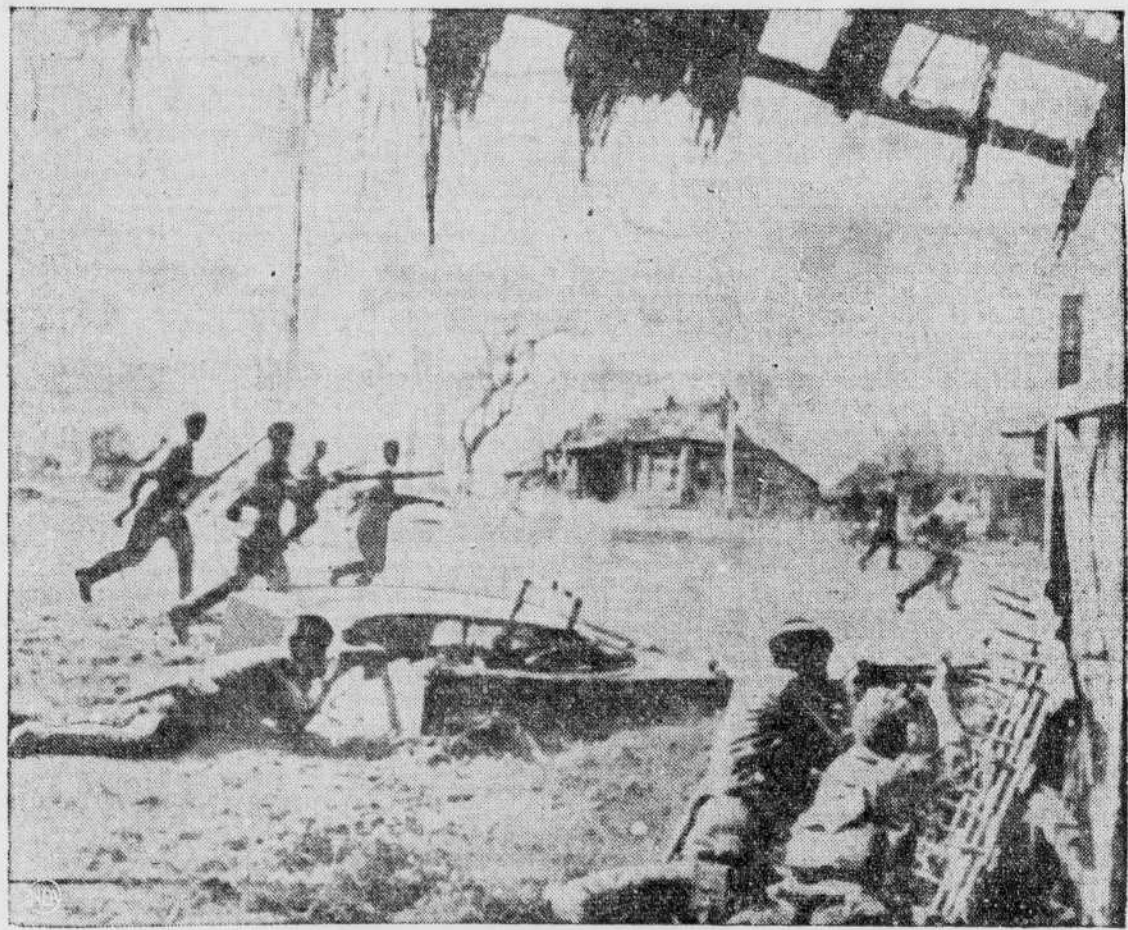

Brown Bomber Refuses Details On Retirement

New York, Oct. 13.—(P)—About the only member of Joe Louis' official family who wasn't denying Joe's statement of his retirement today was Joe, himself.

That, of course, didn't include Mrs. Joe, whose only statement when informed Joe had said his "fighting days are over" was that "It's just as well."

But, in New York Promoter Mike Jacobs, who has put on every one of the Brown Bombers fights since he hit the big time in 1935, and in Detroit John Roxborough, one of the two managers who piloted him into the world's championship and through a career that ranks him among the greatest fighters of all time, both insisted that Joe, in telephone conversations with them, had said he was "misinterpreted."

Yet, not a word came from Sergeant Joe at Fort Riley, Kansas, to refute the statement he gave to Associated Press Staff Reporter David Kaufman in Omaha Sunday. He was all set to leave for a fifteen-day furlough today to take care of some private business but there was no claim from him that he was "misinterpreted."

Meantime, the fight world was in quite a dither over Joe's retirement and what would come of it.

Billy Conn, who was to have met Joe last night in a return bout until the War Department turned thumbs down on the fight and Conn's manager, Johnny Ray, both declared that as far as they were concerned "Joe is still the champ."

"I want to fight him for the title," said the Pittsburgh pretty boy who, in June, 1941, came closer than any other challenger in Joe's record run of twenty-one successful defenses to taking the crown away.

Jimmy Johnston, as quiet as usual, took a different tack about Joe's announcement. He immediately issued a claim on the championship on behalf of his up-state heavy-weight, Rapid Robert Pastor, who holds the unique distinction of having been beaten twice by Louis.

Roxborough, explaining that he had spoken with Joe at Fort Riley, said Joe explained he had meant that he was only retiring while he

was in the army.

Louis told me, Roxborough added, "that he wanted to defend the title once more after the war is over."

Although all attempts by newsmen to reach Joe by phone were unavailing, there was no reason to believe Joe couldn't call up, himself, if he felt he was misquoted.

JOE EXPLAINS IT ALL
Kansas City, Oct. 13.—(P)—The Joe Louis controversy—will he or won't he fight again?—has ended. Both sides are right.

Sergeant Joe, on his way from Fort Riley, Kas., to Los Angeles for a two weeks' furlough, diplomatically voted both yes and no while waiting for his early morning plane.

He hasn't exactly retired. Still he doubts if he ever does any more heavy-weight title-defending.

(In Omaha Sunday Joe told David B. Kaufman of The Associated Press his fighting days were over. Later from New York came Promoter Mike Jacobs' cry that Joe had been misinterpreted.)

"When I said in Omaha I wasn't going to fight again," Joe explained, "I meant I'd probably never have another chance."

"This war is my business now. Say it lasts two years. I'm in for the duration and six months after. That's a long time to be out of training."

Then he figured he was through with the ring for keeps.

"It depends," Joe replied, "Maybe the competition won't amount to much. And it depends on how I feel. You can't tell what kind of shape I'll be in when this war is over."

Joe, now 28, reiterated what he said in Omaha, that he would be pretty old for fighting when the war is finished. "Layoffs sure don't help none," he pointed out.

London, Oct. 13.—(P)—You've got to hand it to a laddie such as tough Phil Milligan, of Oldham, a bantam-weight punch-tosser who trains in the hours he manages to get away from his job as a gunner in the Royal Artillery. He has to walk ten miles every day—five miles each way—to test his weight because he's stationed somewhere in England and the nearest scales are five miles from his camp.

After an absence of nearly twenty years Augie Ratner is appearing again in London rings. He's stationed in England with the American Army.

A famous middleweight in the years immediately after the last war, he won the Allied Services Championship then at the Albert Hall.

Referee for Ratner's initial appearance—or re-appearance to be more correct—was Lieut. H. G. Strickling, brother of the late Young Strickling. The bout was a three-round exhibition with Freddie Mills, light-heavyweight champ.

Everybody knows how big a public favorite Gordon Richards, the champion jockey, has become. But few realize he is even more popular with his brother riders.

They pay unstinted tribute to his sterling qualities and like him for the quiet modesty with which he has worn the jockey's crown for so many years. Richards is not a stylist, but he has an exquisite sense of balance, grit and tremendous strength in his hands.

Racing folk who remember Fred Archer, the great saddle idol of the '50s, say it is unfair to contrast him with Richards. For one thing they belong to different generations and the conditions of riding are different.

For a jockey Archer was tall, five feet 8 1/2 inches, with a figure emaciated by Turkish baths and starvation to keep down his weight. Richards, short and sturdy, has no weight worries.

Lemons are a thing of the past in Britain so football players just don't get a chance to suck them during half-time. The result is the local food committees in some spots have granted licences to serve tea to players during the half-time interval.

The licence is necessary because of rationing restrictions. It took the war to bring about a mingling of amateurs and professionals in rugby football and rowing.

Answering Your Questions about R.C.A.F. Air Crew

What is meant by "Air Crew"?

There are usually five members of an air crew: air navigator, air bomber, wireless operator-air gunner, air gunner, pilot. They are team-mates, each with an important job to perform in the operation of an aircraft.

What educational standards are necessary?

No standard is laid down. Those suitable for enlistment but lacking sufficient education to absorb service training right away are given the necessary academic training after enlistment. Lack of formal schooling (such as High School) is no longer a bar to enlistment.

If I apply for enlistment what personal documents will be needed?

Your Birth Certificate, Marriage Certificate (if married), and the Birth Certificates of your children (if applicable). If you have had previous military or naval service bring your Discharge Certificate. Documentary proof of education is useful if available. However don't let the absence of documents prevent you from applying. The Recruiting Officer will help you.

Can I enlist for a specific job in air crew?

No. All enlistments are in the one category—"Air Crew." Selection for specific training and duties is made at Manning Depots and is based on the particular qualifications of the recruit and the requirements of the Service.

Am I obligated to the R.C.A.F. in any way if I call at a Recruiting Centre for information?

No. Information to assist you in making such an important decision as enlistment in the R.C.A.F. is given freely and without any obligation whatsoever.

What should I do about my job if I decide to apply to the R.C.A.F.? Give it up first?

If you so desire, you may tell your employer of your plans, but do not give up your job. If you are accepted you will be granted sufficient time to settle your personal affairs.

Are married men accepted for air crew?

Yes. Married as well as single men are eligible.

What are the age limits for air crew?

If you are 17½ years of age and have not yet reached your 33rd birthday you are eligible. If you are over 33 but have exceptional qualifications you may still be considered.

If I cannot visit a Recruiting Centre during normal business hours what should I do?

All Recruiting Centres are open every Monday and Thursday evening.

Can I look forward to a reasonable chance of promotion?

Yes. Airmen who show initiative have even more opportunities for advancement than they would have in civil employment.

What are my chances of getting a commission?

Every member of air crew has the opportunity of earning a commission and will be commissioned when he has proven his right to it. Your chances are as good as you want to make them.

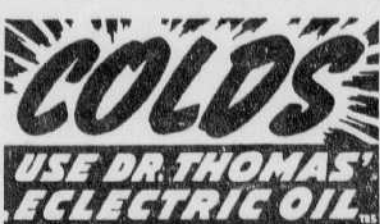

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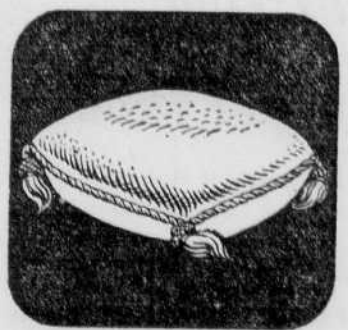
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
