Those who are in possession of certificates for tavern licenses in the Country, or of permits from the City Clerk, in the City, will have the right, on making applications to this office, and on paying the above taxes, for their licenses, as heretofore.

Those who make applications for shop licenses will be required, as heretofore, to produce a certificate from the city treasurer for \$8 road tax.

In all cases, the above provincial tax is eligible apart from the impost or tax imposed by the local or country councils.

In 1643 was founded the Québec Seminary, which afterwards became a regular College, and it had, by successive addition, acquired a high degree of importance, when it was erected, by Her Majesty's Royal Charter, into a University, under the style and name of *The Laval University*. By this charter, which bears date December 8th, 1852, no change was effected in the constitution of the Seminary itself; but a council composed of the directors of the institution, and the three senior professors of the several faculties was empowered to possess and enjoy all the privileges granted to the Universities of the United Kingdom, and especially that of conferring degrees in the Faculties of Divinity, Law, Medicine and Arts. His Grace the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Québec is, by virtue of his office, Visitor of the University. The Superior of the Seminary, for the time being, holds the office of Rector.

When Red and White Oak, Standard and West India Staves are mixed together in the same Crib, the Lumberman to pay the expense occasioned thereby.

In culling Staves the Lumberman to lay them in cord preparatory to culling, and to provide a man to hand them to the Culler.

Timber returned to pay the hauling down and up if it has been shipped from the Bank, and Staves and Deals returned to pay for delivering and repling.

WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

Previous to 1828, there were used in Great Britain as legal standards, the Ale Gallon, Wine Gallon and Corn Gallon, all of different capacities; also the Winchester Bushel for dry measure, besides Heaped Measure; all of these are now abolished, and but one standard Bushel and Gallon for all measures, both dry and liquid, is used, called the Imperial Bushel, one eighth of which is the Imperial Gallon.

The Imperial Bushel is an upright cylinder, whose internal diameter is 18,789 inches and depth 8 inches. The Imperial Gallon is one-eighth of this, and cubical contents equal to 10 lbs. water. We may quote from this, as Imperial Measure, "a pint of water a pound and a quarter;" and from the weight of water given below corresponding to the different measures, it follows, that if measures were lost, we could find their equivalents by weight of water, and if weights were lost we could find their equivalents by cubical contents of water.

The standard for Canada and the United States is the same both for liquid and dry measure, and consists of two measures, namely the Winchester Bushel for dry measure and the old English Wine Gallon for liquid mea-

sure. The Winchester Bushel, so called because the standard measure was formerly kept at Winchester, England, is an upright cylinder, whose internal diameter is 18½ inches, and its contents equal to 2150 2-5 cubic inches and equal to 77,627 lb. of pure or distilled water at a temperature of 62 and barometer at 30.

The proportion between the Imperial Liquid Measure and ours is very simple and convenient for reduction, being nearly 5 to 6. Thus 5 Imperial Gallons are equal to 6 Gallons Canada or United States Standard. The Imperial Bushel is about 1.32 part more than the Winchester, 31 Bushels Imperial being equal to 32 Winchester

There are still used in the United States, the old Beer or Ale Gallon of 282 cubic inches, equal to 10. 18lbs. of water and a New York State Bushel of 2211-84 cubic inches, and gallon of 221-184 cubic inches, or 8lbs. water. All transactions involving the measuring or purchasing of liquids, ac., should state the measures understood. By Act of Canadian Parliament, the following are the legal weights per bushel of the different kinds of grain :

The new Copper Coinage of Great Britain, 1860, is composed of 95 parts Copper, 4 of Tin and 1 of Zinc. A pound of this is coined into 48 pence of 80 half-pence or 160 farthings, and the half-penny measures one inch in diameter. The Canadian Cent is the same diameter, and 100 of them weigh one pound.

In the absence of Apothecaries weights and measures, the following items are worth remembering :

INTEREST.

General rule for calculating interest for days. Multiply 1 year's interest on the amount by the number of days, and divide the result by 365.

SPECIAL RULE FOR 7 PER CENT. Multiply the amount, days, and the decimal .019178 together; the result will be the answer in cents; or multiply the principal, days and .19178 together, and from the result cut off 6 figures from the right, the remainder is cents for the answer; if there be cents to multiply in the principal, cut off 8 figures.

TO CONVERT PENCE INTO CENTS.—Add a cypher to any number of pence and divide by 6. Example: To 44 pence add a cypher, 440; which divided by 6, gives 73 2-6ths, say 73 cents.

TO CONVERT CENTS INTO PENCE.—Multiply any number of cents by 6, and put off the last figure, which is tenths. Example: 73 cents multiplied by 6, gives 438, or 43 pence and 8-10ths, say 44d.

TO CONVERT STERLING INTO CURRENCY.—To the given sum, add one-fifth of itself and one twelfth of that one-fifth.

CURRENCY INTO STERLING.—Multiply by 60 and divide by 73.

EXCHANGE CALCULATIONS.

In the absence of tables, the following calculations will be found useful; and as there are various modes of calculating Exchange, we choose the following as being the most easily understood. As before stated, such are made upon the old base or par, rendering it necessary to convert all sums to that standard, to enable us to find the required result. Four shillings and six pence sterling and one dollar at old par are equivalents; and as that relative value has been altered, but still retained as a

base of calculation, it follows that 9, 9½ or 10 cent. premium quoted, means 9, 9½ or 10 cents on the dollar, or dollars, on the hundred, or pounds, &c., in addition to the old par value; and as in these calculations we shall use the dollar as basis, quotations as above will read as \$1.09, \$1.095, or \$1.09½ and \$1.10; and the sums are to be multiplied or divided by the required premiums, written in a similar manner.

STERLING INTO DOLLARS AND CENTS, at any premium. Multiply the pounds by 40, and divide by 9; this result gives the sum in dollars at old par; then multiply this result by the quoted premium, expressed as before stated.

Example.—What must I pay for a Bill of Exchange for £300 sterling, the quoted rate being 8 per cent., or \$1.08?

Solution.—£300 multiplied by 40 and divided by 9, gives \$1,333 33 at old par; then 8 per cent. added to this, or multiplied by \$1.08 gives the answer, \$1440.00.

DOLLARS AND CENTS INTO STERLING at any premium; (this operation is the reverse of the preceding). Multiply the dollars by 9, and divide by 40; this sum will be dollars into sterling at old par, which divided by the quoted premium, gives the required result.

Example—What amount of Exchange on Bondon can I buy for \$1440.00, the quoted rate being 8 per cent, or \$1.08.?

Solution—\$1440, multiplied by 9, and divided by 40, produce pounds at old par, this sum, being divided by \$1.08, gives the answer, £300 sterling. Note.—When shillings and pence are in the sterling amounts to be operated on, it will be necessary to reduce them to the decimals of pound. A very little practice will soon familiarize one to the easiest method: say for 17 shillings and six-pence, then 10 is £5. then say 5s. half of that or £1.25; these added, give £8.75, the required decimal. This mode will expedite all calculations in other denominations, especially where there are fractional quantities.

EXCHANGE WITH FRANCE.

London and Paris par of Exchange, one pound sterling equal to 25 francs 57 centimes. United States and Paris.—20 francs Louis Napoleon equal to \$3.84 or one dollar in gold= 5 francs 21 centimes. The real value of the francs is about 9½d sterling and the real value of the pound sterling is 25 francs and 26 centimes in gold, and 25 francs and 26 centimes in silver.

CANADA AND FRANCE.

Question.—I have a Bill from Paris to pay, amounting to 216, 05, sterling Exchange being $10\frac{1}{2}$ per cent; what must I pay here in dollars and cents?

Solution.—216, 05 francs divided by 25 produce £8 12s, 10d. sterling and this amount into dollars and cents at 11 per cent. ($\frac{1}{2}$ per more than the quoted rate), produces \$42.63, which I have to pay, to settle my account with Paris.

These rates must in all cases be prepaid except on letters to be forwarded to the United Kingdom, France, the Dominion of Canada and the United States. Letters addressed to the United Kingdom, if not prepaid or if insufficiently prepaid, will be charged with the balance of postage due thereon, and subject to a fine of three pence sterling (six cents). Letters for the United States not prepaid or insufficiently so, will be charged 10 cents per 1/2 oz.—Letters for the Dominion of Canada not prepaid or insufficiently so, will be charged 5 cents per 1/2 oz.

REGULATIONS AND RATES.

Letter Rates.—Letters posted in Canada, addressed to any place within the Dominion, pass, if pre-paid, for 3 cents per half-ounce; but if posted unpaid they are charged 5 cents per half-ounce.

On letters to Prince Edward Island, the rate is 3 cents per half-ounce, if pre-paid; 5 cents, if unpaid.

The rates on letters to the United Kingdom will be:

By Canadian Packet, 6 cents per half-ounce.

By Cunard Packet, 8 cents per half-ounce, advancing by one rate for each half-ounce.

Letters for the United Kingdom must be prepaid, or they will be charged a fine of 3d. sterling in addition to the deficient postage on delivery in England.

Money Orders on Canada.—All the Money Order Post Offices in Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, are authorized to draw Money Orders on each other for any sum up to \$100, and for as many Orders of \$100 each, as the applicant may require, upon the following terms, viz:

On Orders up to \$10 5 cents.
 On Orders over \$10 and up to \$ 20..10 "
 On Orders over \$20 and up to \$ 40..20 "
 On Orders over \$40 and up to \$ 60..30 "
 On Orders over \$60 and up to \$ 80..40 "
 On Orders over \$80 and up to \$100..50 "

Letters for British Colonies and Possessions beyond sea and for Foreign Countries, except France *via* England, must be pre-paid.

The rate on letters for the United States is 6 cents, if pre-paid; 10 cents, if unpaid.

Registration Charges.—For the registration of a letter addressed to any place in British North America, the charge is 2 cents.

For the registration of a letter to the United Kingdom, 8 cents.

For the registration of a letter to the United States, 5 cents.

Miscellaneous Charges.—The charge on parcels, which can only be sent by post *within the Dominion*, by Parcel post, to any place in Canada, is 12½ cents per half-pounds, (with 5 cents additional, if registered). No parcel must exceed *four* pounds in weight.

One cent per ounce, payable in advance by postage stamp, is the rate on printed circulars, prices current, hand bills, and other printed matter of a like character, and on books bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian Post Office, addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the United States.

The charges upon prices current, sent singly, when addressed to the United Kingdom, is 2 cents each, and must be pre-paid by postage stamp.

3.—Book and newspaper manuscript and printers proof-sheets, (whether corrected or not), maps, prints, drawings, engravings, photographs, (when not on glass or in cases containing glass), and sheet music, (whether printed or written,) to any address in Canada, or the United States, may pass in covers open at the ends or sides, and provided that no letter or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter be enclosed therein, on prepayment, when posted in Canada, by postage stamp of the ordinary printed matter rate of one cent per ounce; or upon payment of that rate on delivery of such matter when received in the mails from the United States.

Book Post.—Books, bound or unbound, posted in Canada, addressed to any office in the Dominion, British America, and the United States, are chargeable with the rate of one cent per ounce, which must be prepaid by postage stamps.

Book packets are forwarded by post from Canada to the United Kingdom and *vice versa* by Canadian steamer of the following rates:—

5.—No prints or printed matter will be allowed to pass by book post between the United Kingdom and Canada, unless printed on paper, parchment or vellum.

Books packets addressed to the United King-

dom can be registered on payment of the ordinary registration fee, (8 cents), in addition to the postage.

Periodicals passing by Mails in Canada.

The rate on all periodicals, other than newspapers, passing by mail in Canada, save such as may be addressed to or received from the United Kingdom, will henceforth be one cent per four ounce weight of package containing periodical matter whether the package contain one or more numbers.

Any fraction of four ounces to be charged as a full rate. Periodicals weighing less than one ounce per number posted in Canada, for any place within the Dominion when sent singly pass for *one half cent* per number, if prepaid by stamp.

The above rate will be payable *on delivery* on all periodical matter received from the United States, except that Canadian editors may receive exchange periodicals from the United States free of Canadian postage.

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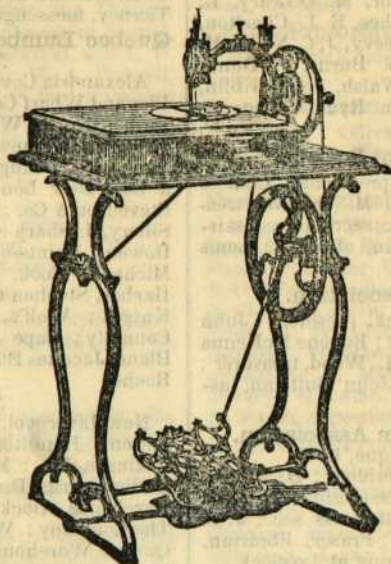
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
