LONDON PAPERS, to April 4, inclusive.

London, March 27.—The naval force to be under the command of Vice-Admiral Sir J. Saumarez, is to consist of 20 sail of the line, besides frigates and smaller vessels. The following ships, part of the fleet, are at Portsmouth: Vanguard, 100, (flag ship), Caroline, 74, Minotaur, 74, Mars, 74, Vanguard, 74, St. George, 98, Standard, 64, and the Stately, 64. The Formidable, Hero, Edgar, Orion, Saturne, Africa, Dictator, and Lion, are also attached to the fleet.

Paris, March 19.

The following telegraphic dispatch has been communicated to his Excellency the Minister for Foreign Affairs, under date of Strasburg, the 16th: The marriage of His Majesty the Emperor with the Arch-duchess Marie Louise was celebrated at Vienna, on the 11th, at six in the evening. The Empress set off on the 13th.

March 21.—His Majesty the Emperor of the French, the day of the celebration of his marriage at Vienna, ordered considerable sums of money to be distributed among the wounded and convalescent French soldiers remaining in that capital.

According to a letter from Bayonne, of the 15th inst. his Majesty the King of Spain during his short stay at Port St. Mary's, was attended by the Duke of Dalmatia, and General Senamont and Leri, to inspect the corps under Marshal Victor, and also the works going forward at Port Royal, Chelana, Rota, and Santh Lucar.

About 8000 troops of the Confederation of the Rhine and kingdom of Italy passed through Narbonne, at the commencement of the present month; and the passage of troops was expected to continue till the close of it. The reinforcement on march for the army of Catalonia is estimated at 30,000 men.

March 17.—It is reported, that M. Dumoustiers, late Charge d'Affaires at Dresden, is appointed Minister Plenipotentiary to the United States.

Since the appointment of the Prince of Neuchatel as Major General of the Army of Spain, the Duke of Dalmatia has taken the title of Major General of his Catholic Majesty.

The Duke of Abrantes has left Burgos with a part of his army for Valladolid.

General Soliman being appointed to the command of a division, called into active service, under the command of the Duke of Abrantes; General Thiebaud has resumed the command of the Province of Burgos.

The American Colonel Burr has arrived at Paris.

General Bonnet defeated the Asturian insurgents on the 11th inst. with the loss of 409 killed, and 500 prisoners, including a Brigadier, and three Lieut. Generals. They were routed a second time on the 15th, so completely, that they could not make any grand till they reached the Navia. General Bonnet's corps occupy Narcea. The inhabitants were sending in their declarations of submission.

Trieste, March 3.—The Russian fleet which has been ceded by Russia to France, consists of four sail of the line, besides frigates and corvettes. These vessels are partly at Trieste, and partly at Venice. The Russian crews have already set out on their return home, and the French have taken possession of the vessels. It is impossible to describe the satisfaction felt upon this event by the commercial classes of Trieste.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 19.—We learn, that by order of our Court, the coast of Courland, Livonia, Ingria, and Finland, will be occupied in the ensuing spring, by a numerous cordon of troops, appointed to prevent all importation of English merchandise and colonial produce coming from English possessions. Various provisions, of the most rigid description, are on the point of being published, relative to the admission of pretended neutral vessels in the ports of Russia. The papers and cargoes of such vessels will be examined with the most minute attention, to prevent every kind of fraud in that respect; our Court being resolved to co-operate, in the most perfect concert, with the French Government, in excluding from the Continent all merchandise coming from England. The King of Prussia will adopt the requisite measures to attain the same object. Denmark and Sweden will also act in the same manner.

London, March 28.—The King of Denmark, actuated by the influence of France, has issued an order, for the immediate sale of all American ships and cargoes detained in the Danish ports, and the proceeds to be paid into the Royal Treasury at Copenhagen. The value of the property thus condemned is immense.

Letters received from the coast of France state, that all the American property seized in the several ports of that country to the 18th inst. had been sold, and the proceeds paid into the Treasury of France. The amount is considerable. Mr. Armstrong, on receiving a notification to this effect from the French Minister, sent back a strong remonstrance on the subject, which was, however, expected to be attended with no good effect.

German papers to the 18th, French to the 22d, and Dutch to the 24th inst. have been received. Bonaparte's tyranny over the commercial part of the Continent, is exercised with increased severity. At Hamburg, and all over the North of Germany, the number of French custom-house officers and troops has been doubled, and in some places tripled, and no person dare to carry an ounce of colonial produce over the French custom-house line, under pain of corporal punishment and imprisonment. The prisons at Hamburg are crowded with offenders of this description.

The union of Hanover with Westphalia has excited much regret in the former country. The French Intendant having given a dinner in honor of the occasion, the citizens assembled tumultuously and broke his windows.

March 24.—Captain Yen, of the Navy, has received his Majesty's permission to wear the insignia of Knight Commander of the Royal Portuguese Military Order of St. Bento d'Aviz, conferred on him by the Prince Regent, for his gallant conduct at the reduction of the island of Cayenne.

The new alliance between France and Austria, will probably soon terminate the fate of Turkey, and facilitate the plans of Bonaparte against British Commerce in the Levant, and perhaps open a way to our possessions in India.

Above 1000 cargoes of corn, meal, flour, &c. have been imported into this country from France since licences were granted for that purpose.

The John Adams American frigate sailed from Cowes, on her return to the United States, on Sunday last. In addition to Mr. Pinckney's dispatches, she is to touch at the coast of Normandy, in order to receive the dispatches of Gen. Armstrong.

London, April 1.—The Danish papers mention, that in consequence of the difficulty of a direct intercourse with this country, it was probable that Wisby, a town in Gothland (88 miles South-east of Stockholm), would become the rallying point of the British and Russian trade, and receive the same liberties and commercial privileges as Gottenburgh.

The Prince of Neuchatel, who was appointed to escort the Consort of Napoleon to Paris, would, it is said, not proceed farther than the frontiers with the new Empress, and then return, in order to cement, by a treaty of amity, the alliance already formed with the Court of Austria.

A vessel, supposed to be a flag of truce, was seen off Dover on Friday evening, at the departure of the mail. On inquiry yesterday at the Admiralty and Transport Offices, we could not learn that any communications had been received at either during the voyage from the enemy's coast.

The necessary Officers at Hyderabad, Seringapatam, and various parts of Carnatic, will, we understand, be removed to Benar, in consequence of the possibility of their presence sanctioning the disloyal and seditious exhibitions among a part of the troops of the Nizam, which has been but recently quelled.

Upwards of 50 sail of merchantmen are about to leave our shores for different ports in the Baltic—they are to receive convoy at Yarmouth.

The planting of the waste lands throughout the country with forest trees, we perceive with pleasure, is becoming very general, and is likely in time to render the country less dependent on the supplies of inferior wood from the Baltic.

Yesterday accounts were received in town from Gibraltar, which state that the gales lately so fatal at Lisbon and Cadiz, had been felt there with equal violence, and that upwards of forty vessels in the Bay had been driven on shore—the oldest inhabitant at Gibraltar did not remember so violent a gale, the sea made completely over the Devil's Tongue battery, a circumstance never before known.

A considerable body of troops is, we understand, to accompany the fleet now assembling for the Baltic.

Sir J. Fellowes and Gen. Sontag are about to sail in a frigate for Cadiz.

Sir Samuel Hood's squadron, we understand, passed through the Dardanelles for the Black Sea at the beginning of January.

The Russians, anticipating such a visit, had been for some time previously employed in fitting out gun-boats, and putting the posts in the Crimea into a state of defence.

The recent dispatches from Lord Wellington announce, we understand, that Junot with the main body of his army, intended for the invasion of Portugal, had in consequence of the appearance of a numerous body of the Patriots on the frontiers of Cuba, and the successful progress of their arms in Catalonia, retired towards Madrid for the defence of that city, and to open the communication with the army in the South, which had been greatly interrupted by the paucity. We learn, however, that the French force which continued at Salamanca, amounted to 25,000 men, and that they have accumulated there immense magazines of provisions. On the 3d ult. a strong foraging party penetrated as far as Ascalao, within the Portuguese frontiers, and carried off 2000 rations, and all the cattle in the neighborhood.

The Marquis Romana had reinforced the garrison of Ciudad Rodrigo, and had stationed a strong corps in the mountains of St. Pedro, to cut off the communication between Marshal Ney, and the division of his army at Merida, which, it is stated in letters from Elvas of the 15th, the Marquis was about to attack. The periodical rains had however set in earlier than usual, and with more than common violence, and had rendered the transport of artillery nearly impossible.

In Galicia the Junta continued the most energetic measures for defence, and had resorted to forced contributions to defray their expenses. A deficiency of arms was much complained of.

It is reported that the inhabitants of Xeres, in Andalusia, having been summoned for enrollment by the French, with a view to be employed against their co-patriots, 1500 of them fled towards the Sierra de la Ronda, where 15000 peasants had previously assembled, and although mostly unarmed, had destroyed a French corps of 400 men. At Seville, the French garrison did not exceed 800 men, and apprehensive of a rising of the inhabitants, had adopted the most severe measures to repress all intercourse between the different parts of the city—during the four days preceding the date of the last advices from thence, no person under any pretext was permitted to go into the suburbs, or to pass the bridge.

Brig. Gen. Blaney is, we understand, to proceed immediately to Gibraltar, the garrison of which place is to be reinforced by the Welch Fusiliers and the 14th Regiment, now embarked and wind-bound at Spithead.

It is stated in a private letter from Lisbon, that in the possible event of our troops being obliged to evacuate Portugal, all the heavy baggage of the army has been embarked on board the transports in the Tagus.

Lisbon, March 21.—Diaries and letters from Badajoz have arrived to the 11th instant. From them we learn, that Gen. Ballasteros marched on the 10th with his corps of Asturias of 6000 infantry, and 500 horse, for Olivenza. Gen. Contreras was at Xeres, with a division of from 4 to 5,000 men.

The inhabitants of Lower Mancha were in active insurrection: they had killed the Intendant and other Spanish traitors, and had intercepted the mails, and several small parties which guarded the road between Madrid and Seville. The French, who were in Serra had fled for Andalusia. It was likewise said, that the report was considered as well-founded: that a corps of 20,000 men had advanced from the kingdom of Valencia for Upper Mancha, with a view to surprise some of the important points of New Castile.

CADIZ, MARCH 13.—In consequence of the violent storm experienced in the course of last week, and the like of which never was witnessed before, in point of the violence of the gale or of the heaviness of the sea, fifteen merchant vessels, and the Spanish ships of war Purissima Concepcion, San Roman, and Montanes, and the Portuguese ship of war La Maria, were lost on the S. E. coast of the bay. The frigate Paz was also lost, but the Pluto, which also got ashore, was brought aground again. The greater part of the said ships having got aground at high water, all attempts to save them must have been useless. In order therefore to prevent the enemy from rendering himself master of them, the Portuguese ship of war Montanes, and the frigate Paz, were burnt after all useful stores as well as the cargoes had been taken out. The enemy also set fire to some merchant vessels and having appeared on the beach during the storm, 500 men strong, this force was fired upon from the castles, and our advanced parties.

The enemy had completed the camp of Algaida, and it would seem that he intends to form another close to the castle of St. Catherine.

MARCH 17.—Several transports from Lisbon have arrived here, under convoy of his Majesty's ships De Rosa and Myrtle, with three British and one Portuguese regiments, and two companies of artillery. We expect others from Gibraltar the first of the month. All communication with the interior is for the present stopped by the French, who are a few miles from us.

VALENCIA, Feb. 16.—We have received positive accounts that the enemy has suffered a new defeat in the vicinity of Horta, and that Angerau is shut up in Barcelona, with little hope of extricating himself.

STRASBOURG, March 13.—It is confirmed that her Majesty the Empress Maria Louisa will leave Vienna to-day, in order to be at Brenau on the 16th, when, on the same day, the formal delivery of the Princess will take place. Her Majesty will, on the 17th, arrive at Munich, where she will be present at the fetes which will be given in honor of her on the 18th. On the 19th, she will dine at Augsburg with the Elector of Treves, and pass the night at Ulm. On the 20th she will arrive at Stuttgart, and remain there for the night. On the 21st she will dine at Pforzheim, and towards the evening make her entrance into this city, where she will remain the whole of the 22d. On the 23d she will proceed on her journey to Compiegne. Every postmaster has received orders to prepare 400 horses for the procession. Her Majesty the Empress will be accompanied by his Highness the Prince of Neuchatel, and by her Majesty the Queen of Naples.

Every day new particulars transpire relative to the festivities which will take place in consequence of the marriage of his Majesty the Emperor. These festivities, it is said, will continue a month, and far exceed in sumptuousness those of which history has preserved the remembrance, under the name of the Festivals of the Field of the Cloth of Gold. And among other games, it is said there will be a grand tournament, in the manner of our ancestors, in the Champ de Mars, in which the illustrious Empress will, with her own hands, distribute the crowns and prizes to the conquerors. The festivals are to commence in the distant parts of France on the day the Empress passes the Rhine, and in Paris on the day of the completion of the marriage, which will take place at St. Cloud. The Duke of Abrantes has left Burgos, with a part of his army, to proceed to Valladolid.

Speech of the French Ambassador Extraordinary (Berthier) to the Imperial Highness the Archduchess Maria Louisa.

"MADAME.—Your august father has fulfilled the wishes of the Emperor, my Master. Political considerations may have influenced the determination of both Sovereigns, but the first consideration is that of your happiness. It is above all your comfort, Madame, that the Emperor, my Master, wishes to obtain. It will be delightful to see united on a great throne to the genius of power those beauties and graces which are so dearly loved. This day, Madame, will be a happy one for the Emperor, my Master, if your Imperial Highness orders me to inform him that you participate in the hopes, the wishes, and the sentiments of his heart."

Answer of her Imperial Highness the Archduchess Maria Louisa. "The will of my father has constantly been mine, my happiness will always be involved in his. It is in these principles that the Emperor Napoleon cannot fail to find a pledge of the sentiments which will actuate my conduct towards my husband; happy if I can contribute to his happiness and to that of a great nation. I give, with the permission of my father, my consent to my union with the Emperor Napoleon."

Sketch of the intended New Empress of France:—"In figure she is below the middle size; gracefully formed in the neck and shoulders, with a complexion of the most delicate whiteness; a nose somewhat inclined to the Roman; eyes of the most brilliant blue, and a profusion of shining flaxen hair; that reaches nearly to the ground; her hands and feet most delicately shaped; her lips are truly Austrian (thick); however, when opened by a smile, they discover a set of teeth most beautifully arranged, and exquisitely white."

PARIS, March 26.

TELEGRAPHIC DISPATCHES.

The Prefect of the Lower Rhine, to the Minister of the Interior.

STRASBOURG, March 21st, half past six o'clock, A. M. Yesterday was the happiest of days for Alsace. One third of its population was at Strasburg, in order to see the Em-

press, who has shown herself every where, and gained all hearts.

Her Majesty will depart at 8 o'clock this morning.

The Prince of Neuchatel to the Emperor and King.

Strasburg, March 21, eight o'clock, A. M.

SIR.—The Empress proceeded on her journey to-day, at eight o'clock in the morning. Her Majesty is in very good health, and is extremely desirous to arrive speedily at Compiegne; but we are retarded by the zeal of the towns. Her Majesty is well satisfied with the city of Strasburg.

It is certain that their Majesties will arrive at St. Cloud from Compiegne on the 30th.

LONDON, April 2.

Dispatches were received this morning from Sir ALEXANDER COCHRANE, dated the latter end of February. They communicate the intelligence of the capture of the Islands of St. Eustatia, St. Martin, and Saba, without the loss of a man.

Bonaparte, it now appears, has revoked his intention of incorporating Holland with France. This is notified in the supplement to the Amsterdam Royal Courant of the 19th, which states the receipt of official intelligence from Paris, of the signature of a Treaty on the 16th, between Napoleon and his Brother Louis, by which, with the exception of some unavoidable sacrifices, the existence and integrity of the kingdom of Holland are preserved. The nature or extent of those sacrifices is not mentioned. But our private Letters add, that the country South of the Maese is to be incorporated with France, and that the territories North of that river to the confines of Hanover are to compose the kingdom of Louis. For this forbearance on the part of the Ruler of France, the Dutch are to pay him a contribution of four millions sterling!

AMSTERDAM, March 19.—The Supplement of our Royal Courant of this day contains the following important article.

"According to official accounts received from Paris, a Treaty was signed on the 16th instant, by the respective Plenipotentiaries of his Majesty the King, and his Imperial and Royal Majesty the Emperor of the French and King of Italy, by which, with the exception of some unavoidable sacrifices, the existence and integrity of Holland is preserved.

The same accounts state, that his Majesty intends, immediately after the marriage of his august brother, to return to this country."

LONDON, APRIL 4.—Dutch papers to the 30th, containing news from Paris of the 26th ult. They are filled with accounts of the passage of the new Empress through the different cities between Vienna and Compiegne—of the honours paid to her in each—of the magnificent preparations making for the marriage: the robes studded with diamonds—the triumphal arches erected at Paris—The illuminated temple of Hymen that is to crown the summit of old Notre Dame, and to appear at night as if suspended in the air.—All these details enchant the Parisians, as Bonaparte means they should do. He will spare no expense to surpass all that had been seen under the ancient government. The plunder of the continent has furnished him amply with the means, and the splendor that will surround the Princess will be paid for out of the contributions that have been wrung from the subjects of her father!

The civil ceremony of the marriage was to take place last Saturday, and the grand entrance into Paris, and the religious ceremony at Notre Dame, on Sunday.

By a neutral vessel arrived yesterday morning at Harwich, it appears that rejoicings took place at Rotterdam, on Saturday last, in celebration of Bonaparte's nuptials.

SUFFERNESS, April 2.—Sailed his Majesty's Ship Mercury with a Convoy for Gottenburgh. The next is expected to sail about the 15th inst.

HARWICH, April 3.—This morning sailed for Heligoland, the Beaufort packet, Captain Norris, and the Lark packet, Captain Naylor, for Gottenburgh, with Mails of the 30th ult. Sailed also the Freeling by-boat, S. Hart, Master, for Heligoland, with goods and passengers.

PORTSMOUTH, March 29.—Arrangements are making here in confident expectation that an exchange of prisoners will take place.

CORN-EXCHANGE, April 4.—There is a continuance of large supplies of Wheat, mostly foreign, and general sales give way in price; Barley is cheaper; Rye likewise; Malt in plenty, and few buyers; Peas and Beans of the two kinds, nearly at last prices; the supplies of Oats are considerable, and this trade is quoted rather lower; Flour without alteration.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

MARCH, 31.—Mr. Creevey gave notice of a motion for this day fortnight, on the subject of the late mutiny in the Madras army, and the recall of Sir G. Barlow from India.—The adjourned debate on the Scheldt Expedition being resumed, Sir T. Norton spoke in favour of the Resolutions, Gen. Loftus supported the policy of undertaking the Expedition.—Sir F. Burdett, in a long and energetic speech, contended that the Expedition was planned in profound ignorance of the obstacles it was likely to meet with, as well as of the means of resistance possessed by the enemy. The Commander in Chief, with the four Generals (Brownrigg, Hope, Gordon, and Calvert) when applied to for their opinions, had indeed returned papers clothed with the forms of office, and signed with their names, but giving no opinion at all. Even the Military and Naval Officers, who were considered the eyes of the Expedition, changed their operations with so much facility, as evidently shewed that they were mistaken in regard to which was the most favourable entrance to the Scheldt. For these reasons he must declare that those who had planned this frightful enterprise, as well as those who had the execution of it, should be alike handed over to public atonement, the one party by impeachment, the other to Courts martial. The Hon. Bart. then observed, that the only radical cure for these evils, and the safety of the nation, was a fair and equal representation of the people by a reform in the Commons House of Parliament. If that be not accomplished, the country will fall; and if it is to fall, it was quite indifferent to him whether it fell by the corruption of its own House of Commons, or by the efforts of a foreign despot.—Mr. Bathurst replied, but declared his intention of supporting the original Resolution.—The Chancellor of the Exchequer spoke at great length, and entered into several explanations, defending the conduct and policy of the Expedition.—Messrs. Dundas, Peel, and Sir H. Popham, said a few words, when the call for the question becoming general, the House divided on a part of Gen. Craufurd's amendment—ayes, 227, noes, 275, majority in favour of Ministers and negating Lord Porchester's Resolutions on the policy and conduct of the Expedition, 48.—Another division took place on Gen. Craufurd's amendment—ayes, 272, noes, 232; majority in favour of Ministers, 40.—The House then divided on the Resolutions of Lord Porchester, relative to the retention of Walcheren—for the Resolutions, 221, against them 275, majority for Ministers, 51.—During the exclusion of strangers, Mr. Canning proposed an amendment to the Resolutions, justifying Ministers in their retention of the Island, and ordering the same to be entered on the Journals of the House—for the amendment, 253, against it, 232, majority for Ministers, 21.—Mr. Ponsonby addressed his Friends while in the Lobby, and exhorted them not to withdraw till the whole of the divisions were over, as it was probable they would increase in numbers on the next division.—Mr. Perceval also addressed his Friends, requesting their perseverance and attendance, as there was no doubt of their ultimate success.—Adjourned at half past seven.

His Excellency the Governor in Chief has been pleased to appoint ANGUS SHAW and ARCHB. NORMAN M'LEOD Esqrs. Justices of the Peace and Civil Magistrates for the Indian Territories.

QUEBEC: THURSDAY, MAY 10, 1810.

We have been favored with London papers to the 4th ultimo inclusive, brought by the Anthonie in 31 days from Liverpool.

From a careful perusal of these papers, it does not appear that the general aspect of European affairs has undergone much alteration since the date of our last advices through the United States.

There is nothing which indicates an immediate rupture between France and Russia. A British fleet is certainly intended for the Baltic, for the present season; and another, it is said, had already penetrated into the Black Sea.

Spain is not yet subdued. The conquest of Andalusia and the dissolution of the Junta, may yet be of service to the cause of Spanish independence. The obstinacy with which the people in different quarters of the Country, continued their resistance to the French, after that event, is a proof that the Government never knew how to give its full effect to the national pride of the Spaniards, and their hatred of the French.

Bonaparte's marriage took place by proxy at Vienna, on the 11th March. On this occasion the Archduke Charles represented Bonaparte. The marriage was to be celebrated at Paris on the 1st April. The new Empress was at Strasburg on the 21st.

No change of Ministry had taken place in England at the latest dates. There had been several reported new arrangements of offices held by the Members of the Cabinet, by which Messrs. Canning and Huskisson were to be restored to place; but on this head we have seen nothing certain.

The following Resolutions passed the House of Commons on the 3d April:—

"That an humble Address be presented to his Majesty, that he be graciously pleased to give immediate directions that a minute and accurate search be made forthwith on the Island of Sombroero, for the purpose of ascertaining if any traces can be found of Robert Jeffery, a Seaman of his Majesty's Ship Recruit, left on the said Island by the Hon. Warwick Lake late commander of the said ship, contrary to every principle of duty, and in violation of every dictate of humanity. "That he will please to give directions that a search be made in all his Majesty's settlements abroad, and in his Majesty's fleets, and also in foreign countries, where his Majesty has influence, to ascertain whether the said Robert Jeffery is still alive."

"That there be laid before the House Copies or Extracts of all Communications, together with the dates of the Letters which passed between the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, or the First Lord of the Admiralty, and Vice Admiral Sir Alexander Cochrane, touching the landing from the Recruit, Captain Lake, a sailor named Robert Jeffery, on the Island of Sombroero, in the West Indies (in the month of December, 1807.)"

COUNTERFEIT DOLLARS.—Several of these are at present in circulation. They are made of pewter, and may easily be detected by their lightness and the clumsiness of their execution. There is reason to suppose that they have been coined in this City, and the public will do well to endeavour to arrest this new species of our infant manufactures.
