LORD CECIL SAYS TRIBUNAL WITH BINDING POWERS TO PRESERVE PEACE IS NOT PRACTICABLE

Claims that Formation of Council to Influence Conciliation When Trouble Crops Up Will Be the Main Strength of Future Peace Workers—Favors Establishment of International Council of League of Nations, Which Would Sit at Place Determined Upon and Formation of Superior Council in Which Various Governments Would Be Represented, to Meet Regularly.

LONDON, Jan. 23.—Lord Robert Cecil, who today announced at Paris that he had submitted to the Peace Congress a draft of the British view of the subject of the League of Nations, believes the world has not yet reached a stage at which an absolutely rigid system for the preservation of international peace can be set up, according to a Reuter despatch from the French capital. In discussing his idea of the form the League should take, Lord Robert says he thinks an international tribunal with absolutely binding powers is not practicable at present.

"The creation of non-rigid international machinery by which a council by exerting influence toward conciliatory work, will be the main strength of future peace makers," he said. "Such a body must, however, possess at least sufficient international guaranteed power to be able to prevent surprise declarations of war and to compel disputants to accept delay during which forces of civilization may have time to work to try to avoid a calamity. Delay which can give opportunity for discussion and conciliation will be the main resource of the League in dealing with disputes in which the vital interests of great nations are involved.

"As in the Peace Congress, the ultimate decision must rest with the great powers, since as a last resort, the League can enforce its decisions only by the military power, which will always be possessed by the great nations," he said.

Lord Robert said he favored the establishment of a permanent international council of the League, which would sit at a place agreed upon. Above this, he said, there should be a superior council, consisting of Premiers or important members of various national governments which might meet regularly, and during the next few years very frequently.

"New status formed out of the wreck of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy," Lord Robert said, "could be admitted to the League without difficulty as soon as settled governments were established."

LOST HIS LEG AS RESULT OF TRAIN ACCIDENT TODAY

William Costogin Brought Here from Island Pond With Limb So Badly Crushed that It Had to Be Amputated.

With his left leg so badly crushed that it had to be amputated, William Costogin was rushed by a special train to Sherbrooke this morning following an accident which took place in the freight yard at Island Pond. The unfortunate victim, whose home is at Island Pond, was employed as a brakeman by the Grand Trunk Railway. He was busy coupling an engine and a freight car, when an engine from the opposite direction or the same track backed into the car. Costogin did not notice the second engine coming towards the freight car on which he was working, and as a result was thrown down and run over. Dr. Sargeant rendered first aid to the injured man at Island Pond, while a special train, composed of one engine and a van was being got in readiness to bring Costogin to Sherbrooke. The special train made excellent time, and on arrival at the local station was met by Lord's motor ambulance, which rushed the victim to the St. Vincent De Paul Hospital. Dr. Ledoux took charge of the patient at the hospital.

EVERYBODY ON STRIKE IN BERLIN.

BERLIN, Jan. 23.—In consequence of a strike of electrical workers, the greater number of hotels, restaurants, cafes and places of amusement in Berlin have been closed, and the general public is suffering great inconvenience. The tramway men are also on strike and service has been partially suspended.

FRANCE LOST TWO-FIFTHS OF MERCHANTMEN

Commissioner Buisson Suggests that France Should Attain Compensation for Tonnage Destroyed By Submarines.

(Canadian Press Despatch) PARIS, Jan. 23.—(Havas).—M. Buisson, Commissioner for Merchant Marine, discussing today the reconstruction of French shipping, declared that France had lost during the war almost two-fifths of her merchant fleet, which was already greatly inadequate for the requirements of the French trade. The commissioner suggested that France should obtain as rapidly as possible compensation for French tonnage destroyed by submarines and the prompt carrying out of the convention with Great Britain with regard to shipping, which would increase France's tonnage by 500,000 tons in two years. He also urged the carrying out of the details of a convention negotiated by Captain Andre Tardieu, French High Commissioner, with the United States. M. Buisson added that purchases of shipping which might be made would be insufficient for France's needs, and that France must build rapidly in order to secure the indispensable three million tons of shipping in five years, a part of which would be the property of the State and the remainder that of ship-owners.

TELLS OF VICTORY SCORED AGAINST THE BULGARIANS

General Sir George Milne Gives His Report of Great British Victory at Saloniki.

(Canadian Press Despatch From Reuter's, Limited) LONDON, Jan. 23.—General Sir George Milne, commander-in-chief of the British forces at Saloniki, in a despatch dated December 1st, 1918, gives the first official description of the great Allied victory against the Bulgarians last September, which contributed so much to the final smashing up of the Central powers, and their allies.

The General's despatch shows that the British played a very conspicuous and important part in this battle, and suffered heavy losses. General Milne reports that he received instructions to prepare for his share in the general offensive in July. He was advised that the British were to take the heights west and northwest of Lake Doiran, provided the initial Franco-Serb attack from Sokol to Verenik was successful. This latter assault on September 14th was a brilliant victory, so that on the eighteenth the British attack was begun. The British strength at this time, owing to climatic disease and influenza, was half its normal strength, therefore the Allied Commander-in-chief General D'Esperey, reinforced General Milne with a French infantry regiment.

General Milne says of the front between Doiran Lake and the Vardar, that it baffles description, with its steep hillsides, rocky ground, deep ravines, crowned with the "P" ridge and the Grand Couronne overlooking the British lines and the whole country south to Saloniki. These positions were held in great strength with numerous guns and machine guns.

KING GEORGE CONSENTS PRINCESS PATRICIA RENOUNCING HER TITLE.

(Canadian Associated Press) LONDON, Jan. 23.—King George has consented to Princess Patricia renouncing both her title of Princess and her style of address as her Royal Highness on her marriage. The Princess after her marriage will be known as Lady Patricia Ramsay. She will now receive a considerable fortune from her mother's estate.

PAYS TRIBUTE TO WORK OF THE BRITISH NAVY

Well Known Russian Official Tells How Over Four Hundred Persons Were Rescued at Riga.

(Associated Press Despatch) LONDON, Jan. 22.—Baron de Meyendorff, second vice-president of the third Russian Duma and professor of law in the University of Petrograd, who has just reached London as a refugee, spoke today with gratitude of the action of the British admiral at Riga and the captain of the warship Princess Margaret, who gave splendid assistance in rescuing more than four hundred persons, including Baron de Meyendorff, when Riga was taken by the Bolsheviks.

G.T.R. CHIEF LEAVES FOR ENGLAND.

(Canadian Press Despatch) MONTREAL, Jan. 23.—Howard G. Kelly, president of the Grand Trunk System, left Montreal this morning for Halifax, en route to England. Mr. Kelly will confer in London with Alfred W. Smithers, the chairman of the board of directors of the Grand Trunk on general matters affecting the road.

SUBSCRIPTION TO NATIONAL WAR LOAN OVER £1,600,000,000

(Canadian Press Despatch) LONDON, Jan. 23.—The subscriptions to the National War Bonds reached and passed a total of £1,600,000,000 before the close on Saturday last, it is learned. The Bank of England figures now available show that during the final week of the issue applications were made for £102,980,202, making the grand total for the Bank of England issue of applications of £1,549,005,816. To this has been added £50,984,240, subscribed through the Post Office. The amount, therefore, so far realized by the National War Bonds is £1,600,592,056.

BRAN AND SHORTS OUTPUT WILL BE AFFECTED ALSO

A Proportion of Bran and Shorts is Being Released for Export to Any Country.

(Canadian Press Despatch) OTTAWA, Jan. 23.—If the mills of Canada are compelled by temporary interruption to their export shipments to reduce the output of flour, the output of bran and shorts will also be affected. A proportion of bran and shorts is being released for export to any country on the basis of sixty five pounds to the barrel of flour, exported to the West Indies, Central and South America and Newfoundland. Bran and shorts from flour sold in Canada will, of course, continue to be available at the fixed prices already established. The effect of the new regulation will be simply to afford relief to the flour millers without detriment to Canadian farmers, as the bran and shorts allowed to be exported would not be manufactured unless an export market was found for the flour.

FREIGHT RATES ON SHIPS TAKE A SHORT DROP

Decline of \$1.50 Per Cubic Foot Announced By the Shipping Companies in Montreal.

(Canadian Press Despatch) MONTREAL, Jan. 23.—Freight rates on regular steamers plying between Canada and the British Isles have dropped to \$1.50 per cubic foot. This announcement by shipping companies is accepted by local shippers as indicating that in the next months space will be seeking cargoes, thereby reversing conditions that have prevailed during the past four years. The rates before the war were thirty cents a cubic foot.

ORDER SALE OF AETNA PLANT AT DRUMMONDVILLE

New York Court Also Ordered Steps to Liquidate and Close Up Business of Aetna Chemical Company.

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—Judge Mayer in an order made today in the Federal District Court, directed Receivers Odell and Holt, of the Aetna Explosives Company, Incorporated, to sell the company plant at Drummondville, Canada, for \$350,000 to the St. John Dry Dock and Steamship Company, Limited.

HAS ORDERED TROTZKY TO SURRENDER CITY OF PETROGRAD IF ATTACKED

(Canadian Press Despatch) LONDON, Jan. 23.—Leon Trotzky, the Russian Minister of War, has ordered Zinovieff, the Bolshevik Governor of Petrograd, to surrender that city with out a fight if it is attacked by the Northern Russian forces.

MOOSE DYING FROM INFLUENZA. FORT WILLIAM, Ont., Jan. 22.—

WILL OFFER THRONE TO DON MIGUEL.

(Canadian Press Despatch) PARIS, Jan. 23.—Portuguese circles here have learned that if former King Manuel is not ready to head the Monarchical movement in Portugal, his followers will offer the throne to Din Miguel of Braganza.

LADIES' TEAM TO ASSIST IN S. A. CAMPAIGN HERE

Reports are Slow in Coming in, But Workers are Confident They Will Prove Successful in Their Efforts.

Twenty-two workers in the Salvation Army Campaign sat down to luncheon yesterday, which was in charge of Mrs. A. M. Sangster, assisted by Mesdames Bryant, Maskell, Broadbelt, Lockhart, Cross and Miss Haggie. Most of the good things were donated for yesterday's luncheon by members of St. Andrew's Church.

The Salvation Army reports from a few teams were brought in, and showed good progress in the campaign, but no definite amounts were given. The workers feeling that the first two days were more of a preliminary kind.

The amount given in up to noon was \$809, making a total of nearly \$1700 for the two days. The formation of a ladies' committee is in progress, a meeting being called for four o'clock this afternoon at the Red Cross rooms, at which Miss Eva White will occupy the chair, and teams to cover the women's canvass of the city will be elected. Ensign Graves will be present, and speak on the work for which this money is being requested.

Ensign Graves reports good success in the outlying districts, the response and interest shown being most gratifying. The slogan, "The Salvation Army spends where it does the most good," is recognized by not only the soldiers who have been cared for, both physically and spiritually, but by men, women and even children, who realize what it means to have the S.A. men and women looking after the soldiers and their families. "No social organization has a clearer record than the S.A.," it is stated.

SPAIN TO RESUME PRE-WAR POLICY SAYS PREMIER

Count Romanones Would Not Discuss Anything About Gibraltar.

(Canadian Press Despatch) MADRID, Jan. 23.—Count Romanones, the Spanish Premier, was interviewed by Deputy Darcia, Republican Reformer, today, relative to his visit to Paris, the Moroccan question and the seizure of ships belonging to the Central Powers interned in Spanish ports. The Premier replied: "During the war Spain was the object of constant aggression from the German submarines. I wished then to react against aggression, but found myself deprived of the support of public opinion. We, therefore, were compelled to be neutral, and were loyally impartial. The armistice being signed, we can no longer be neutral. We must resume our pre-war policy."

Count Romanones recognized that Spain's policy in Morocco had been a failure, but declared that Spain must observe the Cartagena convention (between Great Britain, France and Spain relative to the community of interest between the three countries in Mediterranean and Eastern Atlantic waters).

Deputy Darcia mentioned Gibraltar in his speech, but on this subject the Premier only said: "I do not wish to speak about it, and will reply to no question on that subject."

He said he had been unable to get a reply concerning interned German ships, but added that negotiations were proceeding.

GERMAN ARMY ASSUMING GREATER IMPORTANCE.

(Canadian Press Despatch) LONDON, Jan. 23.—Since German troops were summoned to put down the Spartacan uprising in Berlin, the army has been assuming a position of greater importance, according to advices received here.

RUSSIAN PROBLEM DISPOSED OF FOR PRESENT—ESTABLISHMENT OF LEAGUE OF NATIONS IS TAKEN UP

Inasmuch as Supreme Council Has Accepted American Plan for Settlement of Russian Question, It is Understood that British Plan Will Form the Foundation for Formation of League of Nations—Solution of Russian Question is Considered a Visible Manifestation and Realization of British and American Accord on Great Issues Before Conference.

(Associated Press Despatch)

PARIS, Jan. 23.—Having disposed of the Russian question for the moment, the Supreme Council of the Peace Congress turned today to the principal object of its work, the establishment of a League of Nations. This question promises to command virtually the undivided attention of the delegates until their action regarding Russia shows results one way or another.

Out of the Russian negotiations it is hoped that some unanimous agreement will be reached that will bring representatives of that country into further sessions at Paris.

The solution to the Russian problem proposed by the Supreme Council of the Peace Congress is considered here as the first visible manifestation and realization of British and American accord on great issues before the Peace Congress. This accord was pledged in speeches and in private expressions in England by both Premier Lloyd George and President Wilson.

It is understood that, inasmuch as the Supreme Council has accepted the American plan for the settlement of the Russian question, the British plan may form the foundation of the structure which the peace may erect to house the League of Nations.

GOMPERS BELIEVES (Canadian Press Despatch)

PARIS, Jan. 23.—Samuel Gompers, President of the American Federation of Labor, who was told upon his arrival here last night of measures relative to Russia adopted by the Peace Congress said: "I think it is a very wise decision and hope it will have satisfactory results in restoring peace in Russia and placing that unfortunate country again into comity with the great factors of the civilization of the world."

COUNCIL AWAITING RUSSIAN REPLY

(Canadian Press Despatch)

PARIS, Jan. 23.—With replies from various Russian factions to its proposal for a conference being awaited, the Supreme Council of the Peace Conference met at 10.30 o'clock today. Meanwhile the joint Allied commission is being made up although no names have been announced.

All the members of the councils were present when the meeting began.

BRITISH VIEWS DO NOT DIFFER MUCH FROM THE IDEAS OF GEN. SMUTS

(British Wireless Service)

PARIS, Jan. 23.—Lord Robert Cecil, who has in charge for Great Britain the task of aiding in the formation of a League of Nations, said today that he had submitted to the Peace Conference the draft statement of the British views on the subject, which in broad line did not differ much from the ideas expressed by General Smuts.

PRELIMINARY PEACE TO BE SIGNED IN JUNE.

(Canadian Press Despatch) PARIS, Jan. 23.—The preliminary peace will be signed early in June at the latest, according to the most trustworthy information, says Marcel Hutin in the Echo de Paris today.

THE SOUTH AFRICAN LEADER.

"It is certain that public opinion of the world," said Lord Robert, "is in favor of a decision that will not only make a world peace real, but ordain that international recognition of a League of Nations is an essential part of modern civilization. It is absolutely impossible to proceed on the old arrangement, everybody pulling for his own side without any regard for the others."

CONFLICTING NEWS RE THE REVOLUTION IN PETROGRAD TODAY

(Canadian Press Despatch) PARIS, Jan. 23.—Contradictory advices on the status of the monarchist revolution in Portugal were at hand today. A wireless despatch from Madrid quotes a Vigo telegram as stating that the monarchist movement has assumed a more serious character. On the other hand, Lisbon advices declare that the Government is on the point of quelling the rising.

The official journal of the Lisbon Government has promulgated a decree inflicting heavy fines upon the districts of Oporto and Braga, where the monarchists have been in control.

CANADIAN OFFICERS' CLUB IN BRUSSELS.

(Canadian Associated Press) LONDON, Jan. 23.—A Canadian Officers' Club is being established in Brussels by the officers of the fourth division, as the prices in the Belgian capital are abnormally high. The club will provide things considerably cheaper and therefore will be bound to be popular.

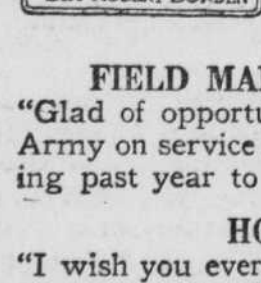

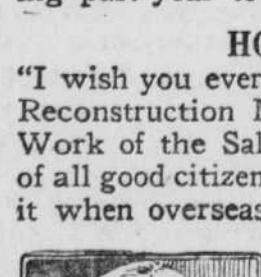

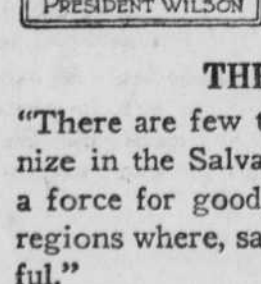

Bringing Our Soldiers' Dependents to Canada

IN England, there is a colony of Canadian women who went overseas in order to be near their husbands. There are also in England and France many women who married Canadian soldiers and have never seen Canada.

It is one of the duties that Canada has incurred through the war to bring back these dependents of our soldiers with all speed, and to help establish their home life.

Up till the time the Armistice was signed, some 22,000 women and children were returned. There still remain about 50,000 to be brought back.

These 50,000 soldiers' dependents will be returned to Canada at the public expense. Those who have already arrived in Canada since November 11th, 1918, will have their ocean and railway fare refunded by the Government.

The facilities for transporting soldiers and their dependents are limited to about 30,000 monthly. Therefore, women and children will be returned to Canada at the rate of about 5,000 to 7,000 each month. Many of the women will be accompanied by their husbands. On every boat carrying 200 or more unaccompanied women there is a Y.W.C.A. secretary.

At the Ports.

To these 50,000 returning women and children every care is being given. Until they reach the shores of Canada they are in charge of the Overseas Militia Department.

At HALIFAX they are welcomed by the Women's Reception Committee, composed of women who have been engaged in war activities. This committee has been organized for nearly two years and has been doing splendid work.

At ST. JOHN there is also a committee representing all the organizations interested. This committee, although more recently formed, is giving excellent service. The National Y.W.C.A. has assigned two secretaries for work at this port.

On each of these Committees there is a trained nurse to give necessary attendance.

At the ports the organizations meet every boat. Locate the women's luggage. Take charge of the babies. Bring the women to a cosy rest room. Here cots and baths are provided for the children. Hot lunch can be secured. Overnight accommodation is arranged.

Women who are too sick to proceed on their journey are taken to the local hospitals. Women who are without

money receive assistance from the Patriotic Fund; are provided with lunch baskets and money to buy meals on the train.

These organizations also secure the railroad tickets for the women, get their money changed, give them such information as they need. The workers accompany the women to the train.

The Repatriation Committee have a nurse, trained in social work, lent by the Victorian Order of Nurses to act as the committee's representative at each port.

On the Train.

On each train carrying unaccompanied women and children there is a Red Cross nurse, experienced in social service who has been enrolled by the Canadian Association of Graduate Nurses. This nurse carries with her first aid supplies and an emergency fund of money furnished by the Red Cross Society.

Telegrams are sent ahead to the local branch of the Patriotic Fund and to the local Reception Committees giving the number who will arrive.

On Arrival.

The Rotary Clubs of Canada have undertaken to provide motor cars to take the women and children from the station to their homes.

The Patriotic Fund have undertaken to provide temporary accommodation and other necessary assistance at cities and towns en route and at points of destination.

The main function of this nation-wide organization is to care for soldiers' dependents. It is therefore fitting that they should be responsible for arrangements for all the returning women and children.

Many other well-known organizations have been doing admirable work—meeting trains, providing rest-rooms, canteens and hostels and generally caring for the women and children. It is important that these organizations continue this work and co-operate as closely as possible with the Patriotic Fund.

DECIDE TO FORM SOCIAL SERVICE COUNCIL HERE

Dr. Shearer Stated that Many of the Laws of Canada Far Less Advanced Than Those of England.

Rev. Dr. Shearer, general secretary of the Social Service Commission, of the Dominion, arrived in the city yesterday, and a meeting was held in the Art hall in the afternoon, a comparatively small, but interested audience being present. Rev. Alfred Bright acted as chairman, and after a few preliminary remarks, introduced Dr. Shearer, who proceeded to give a talk, rather than a formal address, saying that the afternoon meetings were generally devoted to giving information, answering to questions, etc. First of all, however, he would define social science, and point out which it really is. The social service council had been established eleven years ago, and its object was to improve all conditions, social, moral, industrial and religious, which affect the welfare of the community, or the people. The Provincial and local councils were formed exactly along the same lines as the Dominion council, with delegates from all the Protestant churches, Methodist, Anglican, Presbyterian, Congregational and Baptist, as well as from all societies, and organizations working for the betterment of the country, notably the Y. M. C. A., the Y. W. C. A., the W. C. T. U., the Red Cross, National Council of Women, Agricultural Associations, and many more.

Dr. Shearer paid a striking tribute to the magnificent work of the Red Cross, not only in Canada, but through out the world.

The latest Council, the "Baby" Council, he said was formed the previous day in the city of Quebec. The speaker expressed the hope that a Social Service Council would be formed in Sherbrooke.

In referring to the laws of Canada, the speaker said that in regard to certain conditions, they were on a par with those of Germany, Austria and Hungary, and Mexico, and far less advanced than those of England and the United States of America.

Dr. Shearer gave instances of the efforts made where those laws remained and the reason of their failure. At the close of Dr. Shearer's address, it was unanimously resolved to organize a local Social Service Council in Sherbrooke, to include Lennoxville. The constitution was read and adopted as a whole, and a provisional committee was appointed, composed of Mrs. G. G. McCurdy, Lennoxville, Mrs. S. A. Jones, Mrs. W. S. Armitage, Mr. J. K. Edwards, Mr. W. Moy, with the clergy of the churches. The Rev. T. P. Perry was made convenor. The committee will request the churches and various organizations to arrange for delegates with a view to organizing a local Council, at a meeting to be held in two weeks' time.

RE-ELECTED BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

RICHFORD, Vt., Jan. 22.—(Special)—The annual meeting of the Sweet-Cummings Co. was held in their office. The directors were re-elected, as follows: C. A. Powell, R. H. Whitman, H. C. Comings, E. K. Shattuck, S. C. Carpenter.

The board of directors held their meeting and re-elected the following officers: President, C. A. Powell; vice-president, R. H. Whitman; secretary-treasurer and manager, H. C. Comings.

A 6 per cent. dividend was declared on the preferred stock. The dividend on the common stock was discussed and laid on the table for further investigation. The financial report of the year shows the company paid a war tax of over \$8,000 in 1918.

METERS BEING INSTALLED BY GRANBY COUNCIL

Some Objection Made Over Clause Taxing Farm Lands in Outlying Districts.

MAGOG, Jan. 23.—(Special)—The work of installing electric meters in the various homes, stores, etc., around town has been in progress for some time past, but it is estimated that it will not be completed for some time yet. At first there seemed to be a certain amount of aversion to the installation of the meters, but this is gradually giving way to a feeling of satisfaction. This move was not, as at first thought, a sort of retaliation on the part of the Council for abuses on the part of the public for privileges given in the use of lights. It is rather a necessity, as it was more with a desire to conserve power which has been used up carelessly by many townspeople, thus depriving the Dominion Textile Co. of much power which was legally due them, as all surplus power was purchased by them under a contract arranged at the time of the erection of the town electric power plant. For many the new system will probably prove to be a cheaper method, as the rates given are quite low. There are a few who have been using heating appliances of high power, that will either have to cut down or pay up. As regards current for heating purposes, the town has arranged a rate especially for this, requiring a second meter, which will render electric heating quite inexpensive.

Men's Mass Meeting. There will be a Men's mass meeting held under the auspices of the Men's Own at the Methodist Church on Sunday afternoon next, which will be addressed by Rev. D. Mick, of Montreal. A cordial invitation is extended to all men to attend this gathering.

Held Snow-Shoe Tramp. The Junior and Senior Leagues of the Methodist Church held a snow-shoe tramp under the auspices of the Juniors in place of their regular Tuesday evening meeting this week. There were about fifty snow-shoers present. Those who did not care to attend the tramp remained and enjoyed a few games in the Sunday School room of the church. After the tramp there were a series of games held, followed by refreshments, which brought the event to a close.

Organ Put in Place. Workmen have completed the erection, installation and tuning of the new pipe organ at the Methodist Church, and practically everything is in readiness for the opening of the organ. This will be a special event and special preparations have been made for music in this vicinity. The local Methodist choir have been preparing a programme of exceptional merit, added to this we are informed that Prof. C. Versel Chamberlain, organist and choir director of Knox Crescent Presbyterian Church, Montreal, will be present. He will also bring with him four soloists. The decision of the committee in charge to have reserved seats has been rescinded and a one price rate of fifty cents decided upon. The outlook already is that there will be a well filled house on Thursday evening, January 30th.

Filler that all of his family were down with the influenza. Mrs. J. B. Oliver, Mrs. McKenna, and Mrs. E. Ball, are delegates to a W. C. T. U. convention in Montreal this week.

Last week it was erroneously reported that Mr. J. Donahue recently re-elected Township Councillor, was considering the sending in of his resignation. This should have read Mr. C. H. Chartier, and we understand that it has already been received by the secretary-treasurer. The reason for this move was a technical one.

Mr. Earl Crothers who went overseas during the early part of the war and, who was for a long time a resident of Magog, has recently returned from the front. He was in town for a short time this week. Mrs. Crothers resided in Magog during the progress of the war. Mr. Crothers expects to leave in a few days for Montreal, where he will undergo further treatment at a hospital there.

The skating rink, which has been built on the lot near the Methodist parsonage, under the auspices of the Epworth League of the Methodist Church, is proving quite popular. It is free to all, and the only charges will be occasional ones when special events will be featured for the raising of funds merely to defray some small expenses in connection with the building of the rink.

The Methodist Church, along with other churches, is endeavoring to increase its missionary givings this year by a considerable extent, and the pastor, Rev. S. W. Boyd, is anxious that the Magog circuit shall fall into line and increase its quota accordingly. Thus far, certain departments of the Magog church have increased their givings over 100 per cent, and this in the face of other heavy demands.

Miss Kimpton, who recently underwent an operation at a Sherbrooke hospital, is improving quite rapidly.

YEARS OF WAR TERRIBLE AND WONDERFUL

Stirring Address on "Social Welfare" Given Last Night By Rev. J. S. Shearer.

The High School Assembly Hall was well filled last evening at the continuation of the week of prayer for Christian unity, the speaker being the Rev. J. S. Shearer, D.D., general secretary of the Social Service Council for Canada. The work he represented, Mr. Shearer said, stood for Christian unity, a federation of churches and associations banded together. The speaker explained that some people drew a sharp distinction between evangelism and social service, but stated to his mind they belonged together. "Evangelism is the transforming of the heart, character and life of the individual. Social service is the transformation of the environment in which the individual has to live. I believe in both with all my heart," said the speaker. He referred to the chapter from Scripture read during the evening by the Rev. G. E. Read, where Christ said: "I was hungry and ye fed Me, thirsty and ye gave Me drink, naked and ye clothed Me," and quoted a saying of the late Josiah Strong: "Religion consists not so much in services as in service," and a western man who said: "You sky-pilots are always trying to get people into Heaven; why don't you try to get Heaven into people while they're here?"

The speaker expressed the opinion that this man was not far wrong, and that if they could put Heaven into people, the other would come as a matter of course. "Christ came to establish the Kingdom of God on earth, and the Church is a means to that end. The Social Service of Canada is a federation of all forces to establish that kingdom, by christianizing of all life, industrial, commercial, social.

"The years of war have been terrible ones, but they have also been wonderful ones, bringing about results that could never have been accomplished, or at least not for many years. The spirit of the war has brought willingness to co-operate, social efficiency, which also means individual efficiency. We have submitted to interference with our personal liberties and in small ways have gone without things we regarded as necessities, in order that the war might be won. The spirit of the war has brought out that strong feeling of Christian chivalry, the chivalry which made Great Britain rush to the defence of Belgium, and made Canada hasten to her assistance, brought our young men in hundreds to enlist under her flag. Are we to allow this Christian chivalry to drop out of sight now that the war is over? Can we not use these same forces for fighting the battles of peace? Then there is prohibition. Five years ago if anyone had told me that Canada would be 'dry' in 1920, I should have laughed and thought such a person possessed with anything but insight and good judgment, but prohibition is coming and that is a great victory. The men have won it, and with the entrance of so many women as voters it is hardly likely that it will be lost again."

"The enfranchisement of women has been brought about by the war spirit. Women in the Province of Quebec have the vote in Federal elections, but in the West they have the franchise in both Federal and Provincial elections. We are going to get an impetus in reform now when women have the vote. The home is going to be safeguarded against its worst enemies, and child welfare will get a tremendous boost. Nearly all great reforms are connected with the welfare of children."

"Can Deal with Social Evil in Open. "The war atmosphere has enabled us to take steps to deal with the social evil such as have not been possible during any other period. There has been in the past a conspiracy of silence on this subject; we are out of that conspiracy from now on. This terrible evil works far greater havoc than drink, and the terrible ill which result from it, and which attack not only the guilty but the innocent, the unborn, to the second and third generation, are beyond our imagination. We have got to tear the veil aside and be courageous enough and loyal enough to the coming generations to have done with this conspiracy of silence, and not allow the devil to do his work, as it best pleases him, in silence. An article in the October number of the Social Welfare Magazine, a report on conditions in the army overseas, was most enlightening, and certainly, if it made us feel less proud of our civil- ization, made us more proud of our men in khaki. The safest place for a young man was the army, as far as this terrible trouble was concerned."

Child Death Rate Cut Down. "The terrible death rate among children is opening our eyes to the necessity of child welfare work. In the three and a half years of war, 35,000 of the best of our young men perished, and we are saddened by these figures, but the medical statisticians tell us that during one year only 35,000 Canadian children under five years of age died. Has society no responsibility for this? We are working for sanitary housing, for playgrounds, for pure fresh water, for abundant supply of pure milk and other foods suitable for little children, at a price within the reach of the poor. What proportion of these 35,000 children belonged to Sherbrooke? Do you know? Have any children died in Sherbrooke for want of these things?" continued the speaker.

The Rev. Mr. Perry acted as chairman of the evening, and the Revs. G. E. Read, A. Bright and E. C. Russell were also on the platform.

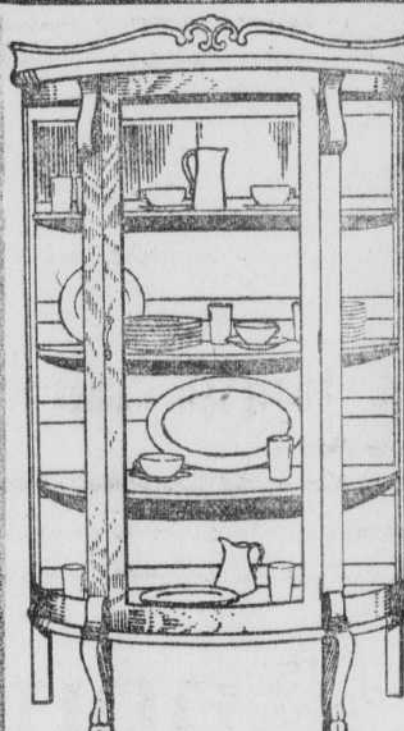

PRESBYTERIANS OF INVERNESS AND ADDERLEY

Reports Submitted at Annual Meeting of Congregation Were Considered Very Satisfactory for Past Year.

INVERNESS, Jan. 23.—(Special)—The annual meeting of the Inverness and Adderley congregations of the Presbyterian Church was held in St. Andrew's Church, the pastor, Rev. Jas. M. Miller, presiding. Reports were received from the following: The session, Sunday school, W. M. S., Mission Band, Y.P.S.O.E., mission treasurer and congregational treasurer. The session reported a successful year, although the congregation has been reduced by deaths and removals. The Sunday school and Bible class has been well attended during the year. McMillan were appointed as trustees for the village cemetery. Extensive improvements were made during the year on the church at Adderley, and repairs were made on the Manse, but in spite of those additional expenses the financial statement was very satisfactory, there being a total of \$1,929.46 subscribed.

THE LATE JOHN STEWART.

The funeral of the late John Stewart, whose death has been previously reported, was held on Tuesday last. The service was in the home and was conducted by the pastor, Rev. Jas. M. Miller. A large concourse of neighbors and friends were present to pay their last tribute of respect to the departed. The pall-bearers were Messrs. Malcolm McNeely, James Longmore, Wm. Murchie, Louis Bolduc, Elmer Tinkham and Harry Patterson. The interment was in the village cemetery. Deceased was born in Valcartier in June, 1837, and came to reside in Inverness township about the age of 16. In 1850 he was married to Rosella McNeely, of Inverness, and unto them were born twelve children. In 1884 the death of his wife occurred. His second marriage took place in 1894 to Mrs. Logie, widow of the late J. Logie, also of Inverness. His wife predeceased him about ten years ago. Deceased was active to the last and enjoyed good health until the morning of the 11th inst., when he was taken suddenly ill about 4 a.m. and passed away at 6 o'clock. He was a member of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, and is stated by his pastor at the funeral, attended regularly by his services. He is survived by six daughters, nine grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. Three of his daughters present at the funeral were Miss Zella, who has been living at home; Mrs. Tinkham, Lynn, Mass., and Mrs. Jas. Loogmoore, Campbell's Corner. Those from a distance were Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Tinkham, Lynn, Mass.

The news quickly circulated through the prison, creating an atmosphere which is difficult to describe. The evening was very dismal. We all felt uneasy and depressed as though our every action was being spied upon. Who knew what might happen to anyone of us? It might be the fate of oblivion or it might be condemnation to execution. Life had become intolerable in the presence of this emissary of the enemy—MacLins. On his side, existence was made so miserable for him that he finally requested to be removed, and a few weeks later he left the jail, never to return.

One noteworthy feature of this spying business in Germany is that the authorities can never trust, but are constantly suspicious of the spies they employ. MacLins, it is true, was allowed to leave the Stadtvoigtel, but he was not allowed his full liberty. Authentic information was able to obtain subsequently was to the effect that he was moved from one prison to another.

My Three Years in a German Prison

(By Dr. Henri S. Beland, M. P.)

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Chapter XX.

MACLINKS AND KIRKPATRICK.

The names of two prisoners, MacLins and Kirkpatrick, recall to my mind one of the most tragic events of my prison life. MacLins was already in the Berlin jail when I arrived in June, 1915. The door of his cell bore an indication that he was a British subject. He spoke English fluently, and if one may believe what he said of himself he was for several years the correspondent of the London Times at Vienna, where he lived. According to all initial appearances, MacLins was a loyal British subject. He associated with the British prisoners, who in turn would visit him in his cell. He had great talent and intelligence.

Some months later there arrived at the prison a young Englishman named Russell. He had been arrested at his place of residence in Brussels. A friendship immediately sprang up between Russell and MacLins and they spent much of their time together. One fine day, or rather one bad day, Russell was peremptorily ordered to leave the prison for a destination which was not known to him. He was not allowed to take with him any of his books or papers.

"Put on your overcoat and hat, and follow me," was the abrupt order given him by the officer at the door of his cell. A minute later and Russell had departed.

The incident aroused an intense feeling amongst us. What had happened? Why had Russell been ordered away without a minute's notice? What added to our apprehension was the fact that at the bottom of the stairs on the ground floor we saw two armed sentries, and they accompanied Russell from the prison.

On this same day one of the Kammandantur's officers, Captain Wolfe, had visited the jail, and it was known that while here he had an interview with MacLins. We were getting very suspicious of MacLins. Why? Well, for an infinity of reasons, which I have not space here to enumerate. The British prisoners would have no more relations with him. Only one man continued to speak to him from time to time. He was a Mr. Kirkpatrick.

Confident, perhaps, that Kirkpatrick would continue to be his friend in any event, MacLins several days afterwards made a confession. He showed Kirkpatrick the copy of a letter purporting to be one he had sent to the military authorities, and in this letter Kirkpatrick read that Russell had been denounced by MacLins as having been a spy in the employ of the British Government in Belgium. Kirkpatrick was more than amazed, but before he could make any observation MacLins explained that he was an officer in the reserve of the Austrian army, and that his conscience had prompted him to do what he considered to be his duty and denounced Russell. Kirkpatrick could no longer contain himself. He stood up, and threatened that if MacLins did not leave his cell immediately he would throw him out.

The news quickly circulated through the prison, creating an atmosphere which is difficult to describe. The evening was very dismal. We all felt uneasy and depressed as though our every action was being spied upon. Who knew what might happen to anyone of us? It might be the fate of oblivion or it might be condemnation to execution. Life had become intolerable in the presence of this emissary of the enemy—MacLins. On his side, existence was made so miserable for him that he finally requested to be removed, and a few weeks later he left the jail, never to return.

philosopher and friend." And his Scottish humor was of the best quality.

For example, he would see two or three of us sitting together at table partaking of canned beef and bread, and very seriously he would say: "Really, boys, I cannot understand how you can be so unfeeling as to enjoy such luxuries when the poor German people are on the verge of starvation. Don't you know, gentlemen, that you are here to purge a sentence a thousand times merited?"

It was the same Kirkpatrick who, on December 31st, when we asked him how he hoped to cross the threshold of the New Year, answered, "You will hear of me before to-morrow morning." We all wondered what he meant. None of us had the slightest idea, but the answer came punctually as he had predicted. At midnight, while the bells of the churches in the neighborhood marked the passing of the old year, a window was heard to open in the darkness near us, and, as the last note of the bells died away, the first silence of the new year was broken by a stentorian voice singing "Rule Britannia!"

The patriotic hymn had scarcely ended when another window opened. It was that of the non-commissioned officer in charge of the prisoners, and he thundered forth an order for silence. I afterwards made inquiries amongst my prison companions to ascertain who it was that entertained and cheered us on the first of the New Year with the singing of this grand song, but I could not then obtain the information I sought. Then, at about nine o'clock Kirkpatrick came into my cell, looking cheerful as usual. We wished each other a Happy New Year and I asked him, "Were you the brave man who broke the stillness of the morning with the echoes of 'Rule Britannia!'"

He shook his head, but the significant smile was eloquent of the truth. We had changed the subject when a non-commissioned officer appeared and demanded to know the name of the nocturnal singer. We were each of us asked in turn, with the exception of Kirkpatrick. He had never been heard before even to attempt to sing a note, so the question was not put direct to him. Hence everybody who was asked, truthfully denied being the singer the jail authorities were seeking. The joke was a good one in the circumstances, and we enjoyed it immensely.

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FAMINE RELIEF MONEY HELD UP IN U. S. SENATE

Considerable Opposition to \$100,000,000 Requested By President Wilson for Relief in Europe

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Growing opposition and protracted debate covering a variety of subjects again prevented the Senate from reaching a vote yesterday on the bill appropriating \$100,000,000 asked by President Wilson for famine relief in Europe. Several more Senators plan to speak tomorrow, and some members said to-night that passage of the measure before Thursday was improbable.

Vigorous addresses in opposition to the appropriation were made by Senators Harding, of Ohio; Johnson, of California; Foiden, of Washington; and Senator Hardwick, of Georgia. Democrat, while those speaking for the bill included Senators Hollis, of New Hampshire, Democrat, and Weeks, of Massachusetts, who is one of the few Republican Senators who thus far have given the measure support in debate. In the course of his address, however, Senator Weeks criticized many Governmental activities.

FIRE DOES \$800,000 DAMAGE.
ALLENSTOWN, Pa., Jan. 22.—Fire last night destroyed the big plant at Fen Argyle of the Fitzgerald Speer Company, manufacturers of fancy bar fixtures, causing a loss estimated at more than \$800,000.

CLAIM MARITIME REFINERIES GET AN ADVANTAGE

Recommendation Made to Minister of Railways Regarding Existing Rates Charged for the Transportation of Sugar.

OTTAWA, Jan. 22.—Consideration of a proposed recommendation by the Railway Board to the Minister of Railways that the order-in-council amending the commodity rates on refined sugar in carload lots be rescinded, was commenced by the Railway Board this morning, the various interests being represented by a big array of counsel.

The board in a judgment already given in this case has shown a disposition to agree with the contention of the Montreal Sugar Refinery that the rates established on the Government Railways constituted a discrimination against them, and gives the refineries of the Maritime Provinces an advantage on sugar shipments to western points.

Mr. E. Lafleur, K. C., on behalf of the Montreal and Wallaceburg refineries, this morning strongly supported and proposed recommendation of the Railway Board. He maintained that the new rate had been imposed as a measure of relief to the eastern refineries, who ordinarily get their raw sugar by water, but that they were adversely affected by war conditions. He urged that now that the war is over Montreal refineries should be relieved from the discrimination that now prevails and that the sugar rates be put on a class basis.

On behalf of the Maritime Provinces sugar refiners it was maintained that the existing rates should be maintained because of the increase in ocean freight rates.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CHARTER AT BEDFORD PASSED

There Was Considerable Opposition to the Move, But Residents are Now More in Accord With the Council's Decision.

BEDFORD, Jan. 23.—(Special.)—A largely attended meeting of the rate-payers of the town of Bedford was held on Monday in the town hall, for the purpose of hearing and having explained the proposed amendments to the Town Charter, and also to hear the report of the Citizens' Committee appointed to look after the drafting of the same. Much discussion was raised by the clause which allowed taxing of farm lands in the outlying portions of the centre ward at the same rate as properties in the main part of the town. An effort was made to introduce an amendment to the bill that this clause be struck out, but this would cause a new bill to be drafted, and the amendment was refused.

Secretary-treasurer A. T. Gould was instructed to communicate with the Southern Canada Power Co., in regard to running their line to Bedford. They replied that they would be pleased to meet a deputation of the citizens and to discuss the matter, although at present the cost of all electrical material is very high. The matter will come up for discussion at the next meeting of the Council.

PTE. ST. CYR SENTENCED TO A LIFE TERM

However, Before He Was Taken to Penitentiary Sentence Was Commuted to Two Years Hard Labor.

OTTAWA, Jan. 22.—Private T. St. Cyr, a young French-Canadian member of the second depot battalion here, was sentenced to life imprisonment by court-martial yesterday. However, before he was taken away to Kingston penitentiary, where he is to serve his time, the sentence was commuted to two years at hard labor. St. Cyr was drafted to the Second Depot Battalion, but did not like army life and took French leave, going to Calumet, where his home is, and was captured there by the military police.

A court-martial was also held for Adolf Gohr, of Golden Lake, who was acquitted of a murder charge at the Assizes held in Pembroke in December last. Just after Gohr was acquitted on the serious charge he was taken into custody by the military authorities. The result of the court-martial will go before the Privy Council for consideration, and will be announced later.

PEASANTS HIDE GRAIN FROM THE BOLSHEVISTS

German Soldiers in Kiev and Other Ukrainian Towns Offered Large Sums to Fight for Petlura or Bolshevists.

WARSAW, Jan. 22.—Ukrainian peasants are hiding grain from the Bolshevists by burying it in large pits dug in the clay soil. Before the grain is placed in hiding the peasants dry the pits by building large fires in them.

It is reported that large numbers of Germans remain in Kiev and other Ukrainian towns, and have no intention to leave. It is reported they have been offered large sums to fight in Petlura's army or in the ranks of the Bolshevists. Common soldiers are said to be getting thirty rubles and officers from one hundred to two hundred rubles per day for service.

Kiev is being deserted by all foreigners, who are for the most part headed for Kovel, Cracow and Warsaw.

BOLSHEVIST PROPAGANDA IN GERMANY.

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 22.—Maxim Litvinoff, former Bolshevik Ambassador in London, admitted to the Associated Press today that Bolshevik propaganda had been carried on in Germany, but denied any activity in neutral or Entente countries.

SEVEN DAYS OF PRAYER IS SUGGESTED BY THE BAPTIST CHURCH

TORONTO, Jan. 21.—Seven days of humiliation and prayer are suggested by the Baptist Church of Eastern Canada, as a preparation on the part of the church for the work of taking advantage of the opportunities offered by the war. At their convention here, this afternoon the Baptists unanimously supported the suggestion that from March 2nd to March 9th should constitute that period.

GENERAL LIST ON WALL STREET STRONGER TODAY

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—(Wall St. noon.)—Reactions of two to four points in oils were ignored by the general list, early gains showing variable changes. Baltimore and Ohio's rally was accompanied by one to two points' advance among "other rails," but Texas and Pacific was the prominent feature of that group, rising almost four points on free buying. United States steel gained a point and Bethlehem steel 2 1/2, other equipments a point each and shipbuilding and tobacco one to two. This advance was partly cancelled at midday, when Marine preferred and distilling shares showed heaviness. The bond market, including Liberty issues, was lower.

A Woman Poked Her Nose Into British Army Mess

And Wonders Resulted

WARD MUIR recounts in "The Spectator" the following sprightly experience:

"Any complaints?" Regularly at dinner time the orderly officer materializes for a fraction of a second in the men's mess and, having uttered this challenge, vanishes, waited on his way by the unvarying 'No, sir!' of the senior corporal.

"Before I enlisted I had heard such harrowing stories about the roughness of life in khaki that the victualling was from the first a pleasant surprise; it would never have occurred to me to uplift my voice in 'any complaints.' There was always enough to eat. Beyond this point there seemed to be nothing more to be said.

"Nevertheless, looking back, I am conscious that our mess is better than it was in the spring of 1915, when I joined.

"The story hangs a tale. It is the tale of a woman who poked her nose in where she was not wanted—and on whose head a hundred and fifty men should shower blessings for her inquisitiveness.

"At the time of which I write the cookhouse staff in our mess were men—chosen on an ancient principle. The mess corporal, who at that era was chosen on grounds not dissimilar to those which governed the choice of the cook, dumped upon his counter at the end of the messroom the large tin receptacle—resembling a baby's bath—which contained the stew for the dishes bearing the roasts, as the case may be, and left it to the hungry rabble to help themselves as best they could. This you may be sure they did, and our spirit of fairness was such that I am certain no one was deprived of his share by another's selfishness. Still—it was a nuisance.

"The stew was mobbed by persons armed with spoons and enamelled soup plates; the skirmish to dip into the appetizing mess was so confusing that you sometimes hardly knew what lucky morsel you had scooped until you had elbowed forth and could examine at leisure your plate's contents.

"The attack upon a joint was even more vigorous. The joint could not be said to be carved; it was rent asunder by several individuals' knives and forks hacking into it simultaneously—with awkward effects in the matter of juices.

"But these matters were beneath the notice of our corporal. He kept order in the mess. He produced the food from the background of the kitchen at the hours appointed. Having done so, he beamed at us from behind his counter, with the complacency of one who would be pained to learn that as far as his messroom was concerned all was not for the best in the best of all possible worlds.

"The scene I remember well. We orderlies were seated at our tables, munching hard, when I noticed that the usual babel of talk had died down. Looking up, I saw behind Corporal Morgan's counter three figures—those of the corporal himself, the quartermaster, and—astonishing vision!—Miss N—, the assistant matron. It was the first time that any one present had ever seen a woman in our mess but. The sight struck us dumb. We gaped. Miss N— with two spots of pink in her cheeks and a determined expression, was interrogating Corporal Morgan; we saw her sniffing the stew, peering with a frown into the egg-box and gingerly lifting out specimens of its contents, the knives and forks and spoons. It was not difficult to guess that she was dissatisfied with her scrutiny.

"Presently Miss N— withdrew through the kitchen, the quartermaster in her wake. The babel broke forth afresh, but with increased loudness and fury. I regret to say that the assemblage with almost complete unanimity expressed its vehement disapproval of the sacredness of the men's mess being invaded by a woman. Our corporal, haranguing us in language which reached an unusual floridity, demanded to know whether we were or were not a girls' school and whether the matron, the assistant matron or any other member of the female staff had a right to come and lord it over us.

"What exactly happened thereafter, behind the scenes, I do not know; nor do I know what influence had caused Miss N— to examine into the men's mess. Suffice it to say that, mysteriously, phenomena began to supervene. Corporal Morgan found himself transferred to another post. Women cooks appeared in the kitchen and a woman washer-up in the scullery. Stranger still, we suddenly beheld our bare wooden tables covered with American cloth; a new outfit of flawless enamel plates, in two sizes, one for meat and one for pudding, on the counter; likewise, a complete new act of cutlery. The anti-social method of the skirmish was superseded by a system whereby each table was allotted to a given number of men, and a plate of food, exactly calculated for that number and ready carved, was placed thereon only when the table was filled.

"And the 'grab' itself!—It was the same as before, yet how different! Steak pudding, shepherd's pie, 'grogons,' fried oysters, stewed fruit, blanc mange, salad, jazz tart, roly-poly—why were these things, all quite unpretentious, never once seen as addenda to the stew, roast and duff of our men cooks, yet introduced as a matter of course into our menu as soon as women reigned in the kitchen?

"When the orderly officer calls out 'Any complaints?' it is Miss N— whom he has to thank for the gentleness of the 'No, sir!' which lets him go straightway on his round."

INVITE RUSSIAN PARTIES TO MAKE TRUCE AT ONCE

Supreme Council Proposed that Conference of All Leaders Be Held on Islands in Sea of Marmora on February 15th.

Associated Press Cable
PARIS, Jan. 23.—The Supreme Council of the Great Powers yesterday moved to unite the factions of distracted Russia and bring them into the Peace Congress. They unanimously adopted a proposition brought forward by President Wilson, asking all the Russian factions, including the Bolsheviks, to meet the Allied and Associated Governments at Princes' Islands, in the Sea of Marmora, on February 15, the contending factions meantime declaring a truce and suspending all military operations.

The joint commission of the associated Governments will be announced as soon as the Russian factions accept the proposal, which was communicated to them by wireless tonight. The Russian commission will proceed to the meeting place, probably on a warship, by way of the Black Sea and the Bosphorus.

General John J. Pershing, the American commander-in-chief, has been called to Paris, and it is expected that he will be the military member of the American representation of the joint commission.

Even if eventually the proposal is not accepted, members of the Council expressed the view that their proposition was before the world, and that it would pave the way for such other measures as their own actions had brought about.

Besides the decisive action taken with regard to Russia, the Council today also provided a joint commission of two each from the United States, Great Britain, France and Italy, to proceed immediately to Danzig and Warsaw for consideration of the entire military, economic and political situation of Poland.

A plenary meeting of the full Conference was announced for next Saturday, when the plans of President Wilson and David Lloyd George, the British Prime Minister, dealing with a League of Nations will be the first order of business.

CLAIMS ALLIES SHOULD NOT MAKE A HARSH PEACE

Von Bethmann-Hollweg Says if Kindly Germans are Treated Roughly that Justice Will Be Grieved.

(Associated Press Despatch)
BERLIN, Jan. 23.—Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, German chancellor after the outbreak of the war, has made the following statement to the Associated Press concerning peace questions:

"I am asked what constitutes a peace of justice. I answer gladly. President Wilson has announced an exalted programme for the future regulation of international amity, and that there shall be an arrangement similar to that which has long been the aim of the policy of all individual states. Just as a constitution guarantees to a people of justice, I have gladly, in my mental rights as a human being, protection against violence and freedom and integrity of person and property and honor, so the new League of Nations shall assure to all states, great or small, those rights which are consequent upon mutual recognition and respect."

"Only if the peace to be concluded is animated by this spirit can it deserve the name of a peace of justice. If the victor exploits the distressed conditions of the conquered, violates his body, compels him to employ his forces of blood and property in an endless service, he is guilty, it seems, of a crime. Power, but justice will veil her head and the ideal of a League of Nations will sink into dust and ashes under the domination of a new international Bolshevism."

"What do I think about the division of responsibility for the war? My answer is plain. I have precisely the same opinion today which I always have had, and which as Chancellor I repeatedly expressed in the Reichstag. I have never carried on a spurious propaganda, but have always endeavored to serve the truth."

Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg admitted in an interview which he gave in Berlin last November, it may be recalled, that the Germans erred in the administration of Alsace-Lorraine and in paying too little heed to pan-German activities. He blamed also what he called a false naval policy and "many deficiencies in international politics."

MME. LEBAUDY GIVES "LODGE" TO HER GARDNER
Widow of "Sahara Emperor" Will Probably Shortly Return to France.

WESTBURY, L.I., Jan. 23.—When Madam Marie Augustine Lebaudy went into seclusion with her daughter, Jacqueline, "somewhere on Long Island," Jules Lascombe, the Peruvian, who has acted as gardener and handyman about the place, became not only custodian but sole owner of The Lodge.

LABOR REVOLT IN ENGLAND QUITE SERIOUS

Claim Strikes are Attempt to Revolutionize the Whole Condition of Labor Employment.

(Associated Press Despatch)
LONDON, Jan. 23.—Serious strikes and threats of more serious ones in England over disputes which ordinarily would be considered unimportant have led some students of British labor conditions to the belief that the demands are made, not in an effort to better labor conditions, but in an attempt to revolutionize the whole condition of labor employment.

Today 147,000 Yorkshire coal miners are idle because their employers declined to allow twenty minutes "dead time" for meals, to surface workers. The employers wanted the men to eat in relays and thus keep the machinery going. Stoppage of work in the great shipbuilding industry on the Clyde is threatened over a meal hour dispute. Under the old 54-hour week the men went to work with empty stomachs. They worked two hours and then had an hour for their breakfast. Under the new 47-hour plan, which has been agreed to, no time is allowed for breakfast, and work is to start at 7 o'clock. The discontent is said to be caused by the women, who do not like to arise in time to prepare an early breakfast.

In the Shipbuilding Union is a radical minority which demands a 30-hour week. A number of responsible labor leaders have declared they are not in sympathy with continued trial demands, and they are represented as being supported by the most conservative members.

The Daily Mail, which is usually well-informed on labor questions, in this connection says:

"These extremists are a small minority, but are exceedingly active. They are in revolt, not only against capitalism, but also against the union leaders."

ASSASSINATIONS IN DUBLIN CAUSE MUCH WORRY

Sinn Fein Parliament Held a Brief session—Papers Claim Feiners Will Not Attract World Attention to Their Cause.

(Associated Press Cable)
DUBLIN, Jan. 23.—The Sinn Fein Parliament provided only a one-day session. Its members held a brief meeting at the Mansion House yesterday afternoon, but behind closed doors. Count Plunkett told the reporters that a statement of the business transactions would be furnished to the press later, thus following the precedent of the Paris Peace Congress. A group of one hundred young men gathered outside the secret session, but no excitement of any kind was shown.

The official report of the meeting says that twenty-four deputies were present. A temporary Prime Minister was elected unanimously, and four other Ministers, nominated by the Speaker, were approved by the Parliament.

Comments of the Irish papers on the Parliament are to the effect that it was an empty beating of the air, and that its special purpose was to attract the attention of the world, particularly of the Peace Congress, to the Sinn Feiners' cause. In the opinion of the papers, most of the Dublin people believe that the Sinn Feiners expected and desired the Congress to be suppressed by the police or military.

The Irish censorship prevented the appearance of the Sinn Fein declaration of independence in the Dublin papers.

The public was far more interested yesterday in the murder of two policemen in Tipperary yesterday at the time the Parliament was meeting. This is taken to signify the beginning of a new period of terrorism, which veteran Irish politicians expect will include other assassinations and attempts to destroy Government buildings and public works.

The extremists are exceeding anxious to get explosives. Two policemen were guarding a cartload of gelatin, which was being taken to a mine, when they were surrounded by masked men. The policemen were shot dead and the explosives carried off.

The immediate sequel was a proclamation placing Tipperary under the Crimes Act, which means a regime much like the occupied German cities are undergoing.

All meetings are prohibited and nobody can pass in or out of the district without permits. None of the residents may be out doors after seven o'clock in the evening without a permit. No letters may pass in or out without censorship. Enough troops were quickly sent into the district to enforce these regulations.

The Clare district was recently proclaimed under the Crimes Act, and the measure was enforced with apparent success.

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—(Wall St. Noon)—Price movements became more confusing with the progress of the session. Lomer Gouin, Prime Minister of the Province of Quebec, gave the Legislative Assembly last night for appointing Mayor Méric Martin of Montreal to a seat in the Legislative Council. The Premier did not say in so many words how the interests of Montreal would be benefited by the appointment of the mayor of that city to the Upper House, but he did refer to the appointment last session of an administrative commission as a temporary form of government to handle Montreal's affairs, and this, with his glowing words as to the future that Montreal should have, led to the inference that the appointment of the mayor meant a more free hand for the commission.

As to the attacks of the mayor upon him and the members of the House during the last civic elections, the Premier asked whether disagreeable words were to be forever remembered when the public interest was at stake. He finished an eloquent speech with a proudly delivered declaration of principles.

It was a Liberal member of the Assembly who precipitated the storm that blew in the House, and turned a routine debate on the speech from the throne into a fiery debate in which could be traced the restlessness of some members of the Liberal party with actions of the Government.

Mr. George Mayrand, the deputy for Dorion, Montreal, an ex-almshouse in Montreal, started the attack, but the Speaker of the House did not allow him to go on to the lengths he wished in denouncing the appointment of Mayor Martin to the Legislative Council. The rules of the House were invoked by the Speaker. It had been expected that other Liberal members would have succeeded Mr. Mayrand, for there is some strong feeling, but, as happened so often, the corridor talk of leaving the Prime Minister came to naught.

Mr. Arthur Sauve, leader of the Opposition, took the opportunity, however, of dealing with the matter of the mayor's appointment, and was vigorous on the subject, at the same time promising the Prime Minister that he would refer again to the matter before the end of the session. He asked to know whether the mayor had been correct in what he had said in his election campaign.

The people of Montreal, said the leader of the Opposition, had not elected the mayor at the last election to have him appointed a Legislative Councillor, but to have an enquiry into scandals to which the mayor had referred to in his campaign.

The following report gives an idea of the work done during the year: Knitting for work committee, Sherbrooke, 127 pair socks, I.O.D.E. (for sailors) 24 pair socks, 15 sweaters, total, 166. Made for Red Cross, 46 towels, 2 wash cloths, 31 Red Cross badges. Twice during the year, candy, gum, cigarettes, etc., were sent to all the Scotstown soldiers. The income of the society for the past year was \$1,073.30. Of this amount \$1,005.20 was earned, the balance consisting of donations, fees, interest, etc. The money was spent as follows: Y.M.C.A., \$630; Prisoner-of-War fund, \$50; Red Cross (Sherbrooke) \$50; naval prisoners, \$25; lonely soldiers' boxes, \$10; Maple Leaf Club, \$10; Armenian relief, \$20; Star Bible fund, \$10; soldiers' boxes, \$18.41; yarn for Scotstown soldiers, \$83.24; joint campaign fund, \$10; dining hall expenses, \$128.02; sundries, \$16.16, leaving a balance of \$12.47 in the treasury. MANY FINE BIRDS EXHIBITED AT POULTRY SHOW

Mr. Frank Hubbard Won the Killing, Plucking and Dressing Contest at Armory Last Night.

The gay call of the chattering and the modest cluck of his feathered mate proclaimed the opening of the annual Sherbrooke Winter Poultry Show at the 54th Armory yesterday. All exhibits were in place bright and early, and judging began without any delay. It was a busy day for the judges, for the exhibits are numerous and the competition keen, but they expressed themselves highly grateful at the fine showing of birds, and the excellent arrangement of the entire exhibition. The Armory is well lighted and heated, and the large space allows a freedom that adds greatly to the comfort of all concerned. The exhibits include a fine showing of White Wyandottes, Spanish and Buff Orpingtons from Montreal. Mr. Greenshields, of Toronto, is here with his White Orpingtons. The Barred Rocks are considered the best exhibit in the Eastern Townships, 169 being shown, and the dark Cornish are also considered of very good quality.

Mr. Brown, of Point Fortune, has 157 entries, in all classes, and among the local exhibitors are Mr. F. Wilcox, Mr. W. H. Griffith and other well known poultry men. The farmers' utility fowls are creating a good deal of interest from various points of view, as is also the exhibit of dressed birds and eggs. The latter are being viewed somewhat enviously by thrifty housewives, who are anxious to know if any of the city grocers contemplate making a purchase.

The Minister of Agriculture has sent a demonstrator, Mr. L. A. Perreault, to show the latest methods in killing, plucking and dressing fowl. Mr. Perreault had arranged plucking contests for Wednesday evening and Thursday at 3 p.m. and 8 p.m. for local amateur competition. The result of last evening's contest was as follows: Mr. Frank Hubbard, 1st, time 2 min. 40 sec.; Mr. M. Armitage, 2nd, time 3 min. 5 sec.

Another interesting exhibit is that of the Chisholm Milling Co., of Toronto, who show some up to date poultry feed and supplies.

Mr. F. C. Elford, Dominion Poultry Husbandman, Ottawa, is expected to arrive today to be present at the banquet, which will be given at the Royal Hotel this evening at 6.30.

The judges in the different sections are: Messrs. P. E. Aird, Montreal; W. H. Reed, Kingston; A. W. Cook, Waltham, Mass.; A. G. Taylor, MacDonald College, and A. P. Hillhouse, Foster.

WERE PRISONERS ABOARD GERMAN SUB FOR DAYS

Members of Crews of Schooners Torpedoed Tell of Their Experiences as Prisoners of Huns.

HALIFAX, N.S., Jan. 23.—Among the civilian passengers arriving on the Empress of Britain were Captain H. G. Sprague, of Bridgewater, N.S., Master of the schooner Pontiac, torpedoed on April 28th, 1917, and Jackson Baker, Thos. Bowbridge, Edgar Baufeld and Chas. Blagdon, all of Fortuque Bay, Newfoundland, and all members of the crew of the Newfoundland schooner Dictator, torpedoed in the North Atlantic on June 28, 1918. All these men were taken aboard German submarines when their craft were sunk, and after harrowing experiences at sea served as prisoners in various German prison camps. The Empress also brought the crews of the schooners Wilfrid Marcus, shipwrecked on the 14th of December, 1918, and Jane Cox, which foundered in mid-Atlantic on December 2.

The spokesman for the Newfoundlanders was Jackson Baker, a brother of eighteen, who is one of two brothers with the Newfoundland regiment, and has returned home minus a hand and an arm. Baker stated that two members of the Dictator's crew of seven died in Germany, one of pneumonia and the other as the result of what Baker describes as an accident, in which he was cut in two by a German shunting engine, while a batch of prisoners were being marched across a railroad track. The skipper of the Dictator, Captain Thos. Fiend, is not in the party returning on the Empress. He was last seen in Germany, although Baker believes he is still safe. The Dictator was bound for France with cod liver oil, when she was bombed six hundred miles off the coast of Newfoundland. The crew were taken aboard the submarine and for twenty-two days the Newfoundlanders remained cooped up in the U-boat, living on the food which the Germans had taken from the schooner and suffering from want of fresh air. The submarine was attacked on six occasions by British patrol boats and the men were in constant fear of meeting their death before the Germans could get back to harbor. One day after firing forty-three shots, the Germans informed their captives that they had sunk a British tanker. Arriving at the U-boat's base they were sent first to Brandenburg camp and then to Dolmen, where they found themselves among military prisoners. They were set to work in the coal mines, and as Baker expressed it: "Growled at and knocked about" at the hands of their German masters for seven months, during which time they were without a word from home. They believe they have been given up as dead by their people.
