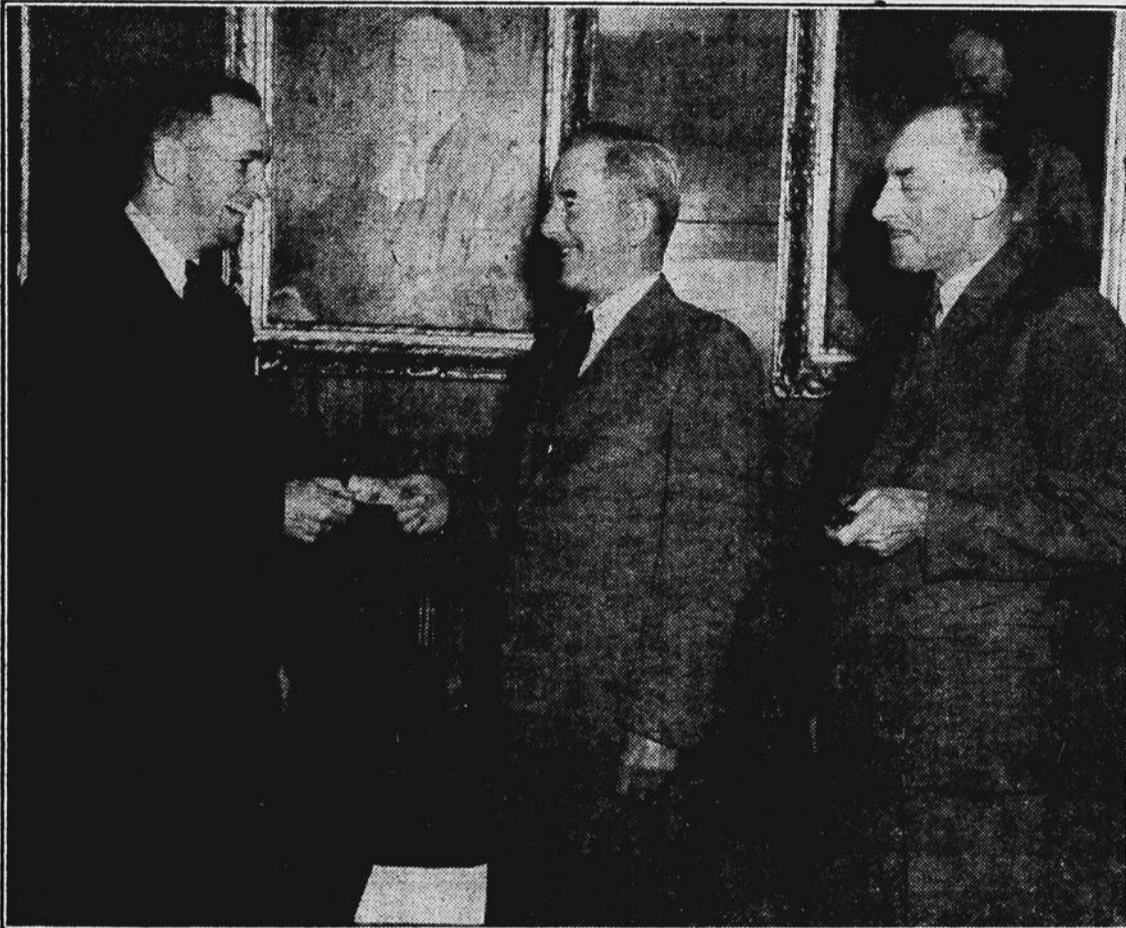

### Westmount Stores To Feature Sales Discounts, Prizes

"Booster Week" staged by the Westmount Business Association commences on Monday with most of the stores in Westmount participating.

The special sales week will run through until Saturday the 18th. During the period of Booster Week customers at the various places of business will be offered attractive discounts, merchandise will be marked down in some stores, favors will be given away in others and drawings will be held in many.

The members of the association point out that with Christmas not so far away Westmounters should take the opportunity offered of laying away Yuletide

presents. It is stressed that there is actually a better choice of merchandise in the stores at present than there will be nearer the festival date and also that replacement of present stocks may cost more which of course will result in increased prices.

As an example of what some of the places of business are offering. Charlotte Gowns announce a 10 per cent reduction on all merchandise, May's Ladies Wear are doing likewise. Girard Automobile Company will give a 20 per cent discount on all goods sold over the counter. The Victoria Pet Shop offer ten per cent reduction on certain articles such as dog furnishings and bird cages, etc., also drawing for budgie bird and cage. Madame Joel is putting on specials. Several stores are giving free prizes on drawings.

An all out effort will be made by storekeepers to prove to Westmount buyers that they can do better by buying locally than by taking the car to neighboring Montreal. The merchants feel that residents should support Westmount business concerns which contribute considerably to civic taxes thereby helping to keep taxes down.

That Westmount stores are attractive is undeniable and that quality goods are sold is another factor which needs little emphasizing. Westmount shopkeepers also pride themselves on the fact that their policy is to give that added personal attention which is

### "Remembrance"; a Mental Reaction Rotarians Told

"Remembrance; a positive mental reaction dictated by sentiment rather than reason," Alec S. Solomon, First Vice President of the Canadian Legion, Quebec Command, told members of the Westmount Rotary Club at its luncheon meeting Wednesday.

Speaking in connection with "Remembrance Week" and replacing Brig. John B. Weir, who was originally slated to give the address, Mr. Solomon claimed that at Remembrance Week time, people think with the heart. "It is an implication which makes us human," the veteran of the First World War declared.

"Remembrance is the manifest-

ing of a divine spark when we think of the men who gave their lives so that we may carry on our way of life," the speaker continued.

Mr. Solomon, who is also chairman of the Canadian Legion Polio Fund and holder of a number of other positions in Legion affairs, said it was the time to evaluate the loss of a complete generation due to the two world wars.

He pointed out that more than 100,000 young men gave their lives in the two global conflicts and asked, "who knows what their contribution may have been to our nation if they had lived?" "We

### Westmount Council Passes Loan Bylaw of \$620,000

The Westmount City Council, approved after a third reading, loan bylaw of \$620,000, to cover a number of expenditures in various departments that the City intends to carry out.

The by-law will now be presented to the Quebec Municipal Commission for approval before any expenditures can be made. A Bond issue, through which the loan will be achieved will carry interest rates from two and three-quarter percent to three and one-quarter percent depending on the terms, the by-law read in part.

Expenditures to be covered by the by-law were divided into three

parts. Group A, having an assessment period of 10 years included traffic and street signs and traffic lights at an estimated cost of \$48,000. The traffic lights are expected to be constructed at Western and Lansdowne; Western and Victoria; Sherbrooke and Metcalfe and Sherbrooke and Kensington avenue.

Business machines, office and other equipment for the Finance, Light and new Police and Fire station department is expected to total \$16,000, while a number of departments will benefit from the \$39,700 to be spent on heating equipment, sanding machine, or-

pause," he continued, "to think of what it might have been."

The speaker, who was introduced by Dr. John Lockhead, claimed also, that all veterans forget the roughness, coarseness, hardships and frustrations of the war, to remember instead, the friendships and decencies of the period. He gave this as one reason why the Canadian Legion has grown in scope and called it a service club for veterans since it is responsible for many aids to them.

Enlarging on the work of the Legion branches, some 2,000 in Canada, the speaker said that in treating it as a type of service club in the community, there should be a greater co-ordination of all groups since all are trying to make a better Canada.

The speaker was thanked by Dr. Ken Carver. Frank Kenwood presided.

## Ex-CSM. of R.M.R. E. J. McMahon Dies

Funeral service for former C.S.M. Ernest James McMahon of the Royal Montreal Regiment, who died on Thursday in Queen Mary Veterans' Hospital, was held on Monday morning in the Church of the Ascension of Our Lord, Westmount. He was 37.

gan, benches, and other improvements.

Under Group "B" having an assessment period of 20 years, the projects singled out in the loan will have an estimated cost of \$205,000. Included in this, is the grading, gutters, catch basins and paving in concrete and asphalt including widening, of Sherbrooke street, from Roslyn to Clarke; Greene avenue, from Dorchester to St. Catherine, and Victoria Avenue, east side only, from St. Catherine to 500 feet south of Sherbrooke.

Another \$4,000 of this group has been allotted to the relocating of poles and hydrants in various locations throughout the City.

A number of items are contained in Group "C" which has an assessment period of 30 years. Under the heading of sidewalks, the areas being the same as the street widening and repairing of group "B"

an estimated cost of \$57,703 has been awarded. Also land to be purchased in order to bring the repairs about on these three streets has been considered with \$140,197 being allocated for this purpose. Land for the disposal site on Upper Lachine Road is included in this figure.

Discounts and debentures for the total loan by-law was estimated at \$13,300.

## St. Andrew's United Church Honors Its War Dead



## "Duty" To Guard Against New Wars, Clergyman Says

Rev. Dr. G. G. D. Kilpatrick, D.S.O., principal of the United Theological College and a chaplain in two world wars, last Sunday, told the congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Westmount, that tribute to the memory of war dead was meaningless without remembrance of "our duty to be on guard lest new aggression rob us of the fruits of their sacrifice."

Guest preacher at memorial services which opened a week-long celebration of the Golden Jubilee of St. Andrew's Church, Dr. Kilpatrick scored "that pacificism which is based on fear and hatred of war rather than on passion for right and justice."

The moral climate of today is such, he said, "that this is not the time for beating swords into plowshares."

### War Dead Honored

The memorial service consisted of the unveiling and dedication of three stained-glass windows, an honor roll listing over 200 of the congregation who served in the Second World War and a memorial plaque containing the names of 22 who died in that conflict.

The windows—a large rose window complemented by two smaller rectangular ones with all three containing appropriate symbols of courage, devotion and sacrifice—are set high in the east wall of the church.

The honor roll and memorial plaque are also on the east side, lower down, and balancing similar

First World War memorials on the west side.

"Memorial Sunday" introduced for the congregation of St. Andrew's a week of religious services and congregational activity in celebration of the 50th anniversary of the founding of the church. Rev. D. M. Grant, minister of the church, dedicated the memorials which were unveiled by Col. R. D. Harkness, president of the congregation.

Dr. Kilpatrick said that a memorial service and jubilee celebrations were fittingly combined because the jubilee was "essentially a service of thanksgiving during which nothing could be more fitting than that we should remember with gratitude the sacrifices of our soldier sons."

### Peace Preparation Urged

He stressed that "keeping faith with the dead" meant being pre-

pared to defend those things for which they died. But he stressed that defence of freedom and justice was not carried out solely by war and urged "a deliberate cultivation of the spirit of goodwill" on the part of the individual towards his fellow citizens of all races and creeds.

"Canada has small influence in the preaching of international peace and unity so long as we have not ourselves attained true national unity," he said.

On November 16, 1949, Mr. Duperron was made general manager in succession to D. E. Blair who retired after 46 years service.

Two years ago the honorary degree of Doctor in Science was conferred on him by the University of Montreal.

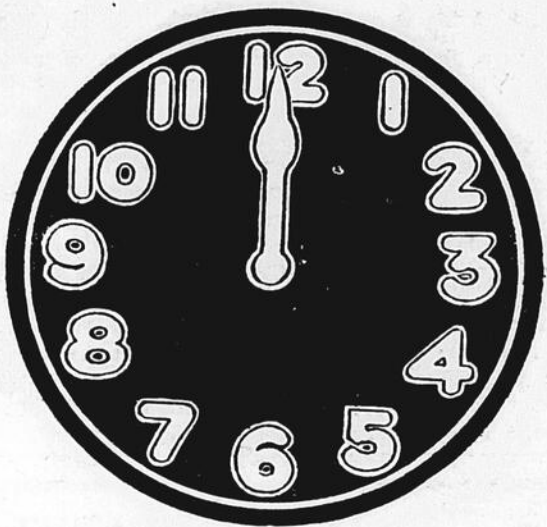
Mr. Duperron is married and has resided in Westmount for some years.

## G. W. Bourke, Sun Life Praises Fiscal Policy

George W. Bourke, 774 Upper Lansdowne avenue, Westmount, president of the Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada, told the members of the Sun Life War Veteran's Association at their 20th annual reunion dinner held in the Queens Hotel on Thursday that Armistice Day had particular significance: it marked, he said, the close of hostilities at the end of the First Great War.

It was also the day set aside by the Government for remembrance of those who had served and fallen in World War II.

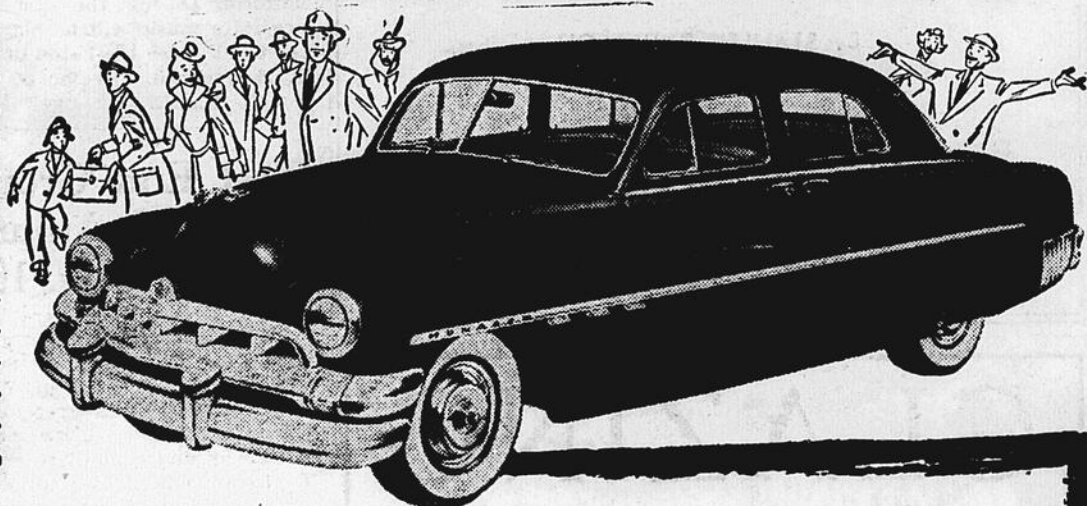

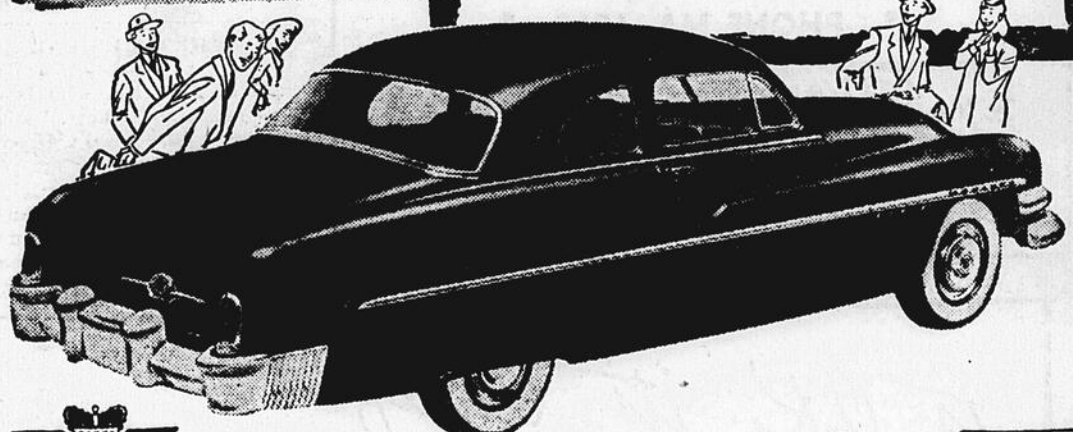

## Brides Here Are Peeved Unemployment Ins. Cut

Many Westmount girls will learn with mixed feelings that the Government is expected to clamp down shortly on the practice of working girls collecting unemployment insurance benefits after leaving their jobs for marriage.

The Cabinet is considering new regulations under the Unemployment Insurance Act which would close up loopholes that now permit brides to dip into the insurance fund. Announcement of the new regulations, nature of which have not been fully decided on, will be made soon.

Officials say the practice of newlywed former working girls drawing unemployment insurance

has become widespread across the country, though no definite estimate is available on how much money this has drained out of the fund. The employment insurance

advisory committee drew it to the attention of the Government in a report tabled at last spring's session of Parliament.

Under unemployment insurance regulations, it is possible for girls to draw up to \$16.20 a week for months, depending on how long they have paid into the fund before leaving their jobs.

If a prospective bride leaves her job voluntarily to get married, she is disqualified from collecting benefits for six weeks. But after that she may start collecting.

If a "suitable" job is found for her by National Employment Service, she is expected to take it or become disqualified again for varying periods up to six weeks.

## Young Canada's Week At Westmount Library

For the second year in succession, Young Canada's Book Week, under the patronage of Senator the Honourable Cairine Wilson, is being observed right across the Dominion from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

The principal aim and purpose of Book Week for the young, November 11 to 18, is, primarily, to bring books and children happily together. Of no less importance, it hopes to stimulate adult interest in good literature for boys and girls, and to remind parents of all the fine worthwhile books there are to be found on the shelves of their public library.

Do, by all means, take your youngest children to the library next week, or buy them a book, even if they are still only in the picture book stage. Remember, it is never too soon to build a shelf of worthwhile books in your home, so that you may open the door to a new world of wonder and delight for your sons and daughters.

Today, there are books to answer the tastes and requirements of every child in this vast country of ours. The colourful, expertly written tales of this century are indeed a far cry from the narrow moralistic literature provided for children in earlier times. The dry, humourless prose of previous centuries was invariably designed to instruct and reprove young readers in uncompromising terms of good and evil, but never, under any circumstances, was it designed to please or entertain them. For example, "A Token for Children", being an exact account of the Conversion, Holy and Exemplar Lives and Joyful Deaths of Several Young Children" and "Divine Emblems, of Things Spiritual", both published for the young readers' diversion in the 17th century and, probably, painstakingly perused by our unfortunate forebears.

Those perennial favourites of children's literature, "Robinson Crusoe" and "Gulliver's Travels" were two of the earliest tales to be written primarily for a child's pleasure and, even they, were originally published for the sole enjoyment of the adult reader. More than one hundred years elapsed before that pair of immortals, "Peter Rabbit" and "Little Black Sambo" made their bow and carved a permanent niche for themselves on the bookshelves of the world.

Our present century, sometimes known as "the golden age of children's literature", has witnessed the full flowering of books for the young. The tremendous development of juvenile departments in public libraries after World War I, provided the necessary incentive for all the great publishing houses on both sides of the Atlantic to present increasingly attractive and varied styles in book making, specifically designed to hold the young reader's restless gaze and wandering attention.

It must never be forgotten that, above all else, a good book should be one that a child enjoys; that will kindle his imagination, colour his thoughts and, at the same time, require him to reason things out for himself. The magic of "Treasure Island", written about 70 years ago, can still capture a child's imagination and satisfy his craving for adventure, as well as, for example, "Storm, a dog of Newfoundland", a recent recommendation of the Canadian Association of Children's Libraries, or R. S. Lambert's "Franklin of the Arctic", written and published in Canada and judged the most outstanding Canadian juvenile book of 1949.

For the five-year-old who queried recently, "D'ya think there's any use joining the library if I can't read?" there is the inimitable "Barab and Father Christmas", "Foxye" or "Wait til the Moon is Full". These are only a few of the various tried and true favourites of the picture book age group recommended by the Association. For the beginning reader there is the lively tale of "Tim to the rescue" by Edward Ardizzone, "Rufus the seafaring rat", a delightful story by Dorothy Anne Lovell, and that perennial favourite "Paddle-to-the-sea", which never fails to satisfy a child's

many sided needs.

Today the most vital task of children's librarians, of parents and educators is, namely, to provide youthful readers with a glimpse of new, unexplored horizons through the medium of good literature; to furnish the necessary incentive for them to automatically choose and enjoy the world's finest stories, so that they may gradually learn to discriminate between the shoddy, second-rate efforts of comic books — the majority of which are far from comic — and such classics of good taste and clean, lively adventure as "The Jungle Book" or G. D. Robert's animal stories which are both informative and exciting.

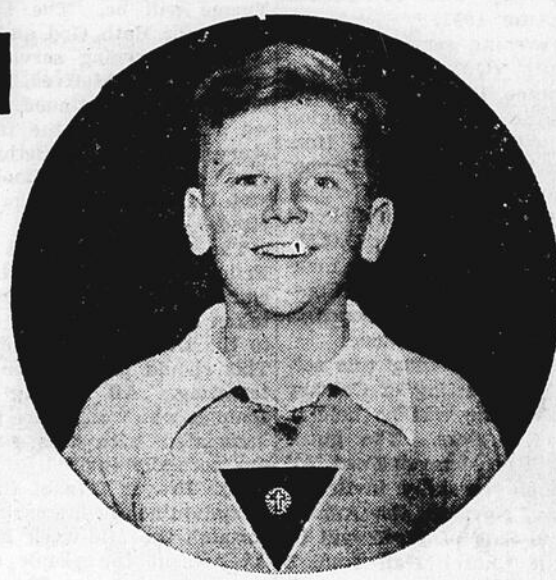

## Enjoy Cabbage Baked, Creamed Or Dutch Style

Cabbage is cheap now. It's top quality food, too. So we tried a few cabbage recipes and enjoyed these three particularly.

### Baked Cabbage

One medium-sized head of cabbage, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 cup grated cheese, 1 1/2 cups hot milk, 1 tablespoon flour, 2 tablespoons butter.

Cut cabbage in wedges 3/4 inch thick. Cook in salt water for 10 minutes. Drain and place cabbage in a greased casserole. Sprinkle with flour salt and pepper. Dot with butter. Add hot milk and top with grated cheese. Bake at 350 degrees F. (moderate oven) for 35 minutes.

### Dutch Cabbage

One medium-sized head of cabbage, 6 slices bacon, 2 tablespoons flour, 3 tablespoons fat, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 6 medium-sized potatoes, 2 cups cabbage broth or tomato juice.

Shred cabbage coarsely and cook in salt water until tender. Cut bacon in small pieces and fry until crisp. Blend flour with 3 tablespoons bacon dripping and brown. Add seasoning and liquid or tomato juice to make a gravy. Add sauce to cabbage and place in a greased baking dish. Cook potatoes in salt water until soft and then mash them. Put mashed potatoes on top of the cabbage. Bake at 375 degrees F. (moderate oven) for 25 minutes.

### Creamed Cabbage and Dried Beef

One-half large head of cabbage, 1/2 pound dried beef, 1 1/2 cups medium white sauce, 1/2 cup buttered crumbs.

Cook coarsely chopped cabbage in salt water until tender. Drain. Soak chopped dried beef in 1/2 cup warm water for 10 minutes. Place cabbage and dried beef in alternate layers in a greased casserole. Pour wine sauce over mixture and top with buttered crumbs. Bake at 350 degrees F. (moderate oven) for 25 minutes.

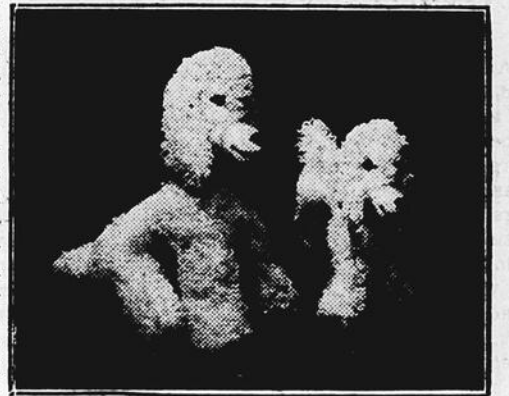

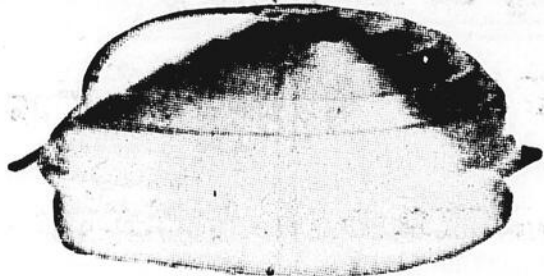

If you like clams, you'll be interested in this recipe which will serve either two or three people, depending on how much cracker and milk is added. Served with bacon strips, potato chips, and a tossed green salad, and cranberry jelly or pickles, this makes a delicious meal which can be gotten up at a moment's notice. The woman who dines alone can prepare half the can of clams with one egg and put the rest in the refrigerator for a stew or more clam cakes another day.

### Jiffy Clam Cakes

2 eggs, well beaten  
1 10-oz. can minced clams  
Saltines or similar crackers  
Milk

Empty contents of can of clams, liquor and all, into beaten eggs. Then crumble crackers into mixture until it is thick but still very

## Serve South African Lobster for De Luxe Party



South African lobster tails with watercress, heated potato chips and Hollandaise sauce — a wonderful treat.

For a special de luxe party try frozen South African lobster tails. They are all meat with a minimum of waste, and for that reason are far more economical than you'd expect for such luxury eating.

### Rock Lobster 'n Chips

Allow one 8-oz. South African rock lobster tail for each serving. Boil according to directions. Remove meat whole from shell. Plunge into boiling water for 1 minute. Drain.

Arrange on platter, garnish with ring of watercress and surround with heated potato chips. Pass Hollandaise sauce at table.

Directions for boiling: Place South African rock lobster tails, either thawed or frozen, into large kettle boiling salted water (1 tsp. salt for each quart of water). When water reboils, lower heat so water boils gently and begin counting time. Keep covered. Boil tails 1 minute longer than their individual weight in ounces.

For instance, boil an 8-oz. tail 9 minutes. Add 2 minutes to all boiling times when tails are cooked frozen.

To remove meat easily from shell, drain off hot water, drench with cold water. Using scissors, cut lengthwise through center of sert finger under meat at open end and pull meat out.

### South African Rock Lobster Supreme

Four tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, ½ teaspoon salt, ½ teaspoon paprika, 1½ cups hot milk, 2 egg yolks, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 2 cups diced, boiled South African rock lobster meat, toast points.

Melt butter. Stir in flour and seasonings. Stir in hot milk gradually while cooking over low heat. When sauce is thick, remove from heat. Beat in egg yolks, one at a time. Stir in lemon juice and add diced boiled South African rock lobster meat.

Reheat while stirring gently, but do not allow to boil. Serve with toast points. A chafing dish may be used for reheating and for service at the table. Note: A 1-pound rock lobster tail supplies about 2 cups diced meat.

**Pan-Broiled Oysters With Bacon**  
Twenty-four oysters, 12 slices bacon, 8 pieces toast.

Drain and dry oysters. Wrap each oyster in half a slice of bacon and fasten the end together with a toothpick. Brown very quickly on all sides in a hot frying pan. Arrange three oysters on each piece of toast. Pour a little of the liquid over the toast and serve immediately.

### Cream Cheese Spread

One-half cup (4 oz.) pimiento or chive cheese spread, 3 tablespoons sour cream, dash salt, crisp salted crackers.

Cream the cheese spread with the sour cream and salt. Spread generously on crackers and serve with tall glasses of milk. The mixture may be stored, tightly covered, in the refrigerator for future use.

### Cream Cheese and Jelly Dots

One 3-oz. package cream cheese, raisin nut bread, cut into squares, crab apple or red currant jelly.

Chill cream cheese. Cut the 3-oz. package into 6 squares. Place on squares of raisin nut bread and dot with a little crab apple or red currant jelly.

### Toasted Cheese Strips (Makes 16 strips)

Eight slices white bread, 4 tablespoons butter, 4 slices cheese.

Soften butter and spread over slices of bread. Trim crusts. Put one slice of cheese on each slice of bread. Cover with second bread slice. Cut each sandwich into four strips. Place in hot oven (400 degrees F.) until golden brown; turn and toast other side. Serve fresh from the oven.

### Cottage Cheese Snacks

One-half teaspoon grated onion, 1 cup cottage cheese, 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper, ¼ teaspoon salt, dash pepper, ½ teaspoon celery salt, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, crackers.

Combine all ingredients except crackers. Store in refrigerator in a tightly covered container. When ready to serve place a generous spoonful on each cracker and serve with hot cocoa or milk and honey.

### POTATO DOUGHNUTS

½ cup melted shortening  
½ cup sugar  
2 teaspoons salt  
2 beaten eggs  
1 cake fresh or 1 package granular yeast  
¼ cup lukewarm water  
1 cup milk, scalded  
½ cup potato water  
½ cup mashed potatoes  
8 cups enriched flour

Combine cooled shortening, sugar, salt, and eggs; add yeast softened in ¼ cup lukewarm water. Combine milk, potato water, and mashed potatoes. Add alternately with flour; knead well. Cover and let rise in greased bowl overnight. Roll ¾ inch thick on lightly floured surface; cut with doughnut cutter. Let rise until double, about 1 hour. Fry in deep hot fat (375°) until brown, placing raised side down first. Drain on absorbent paper. Roll in granulated sugar. Makes 3 dozen doughnuts and 3 dozen "holes."

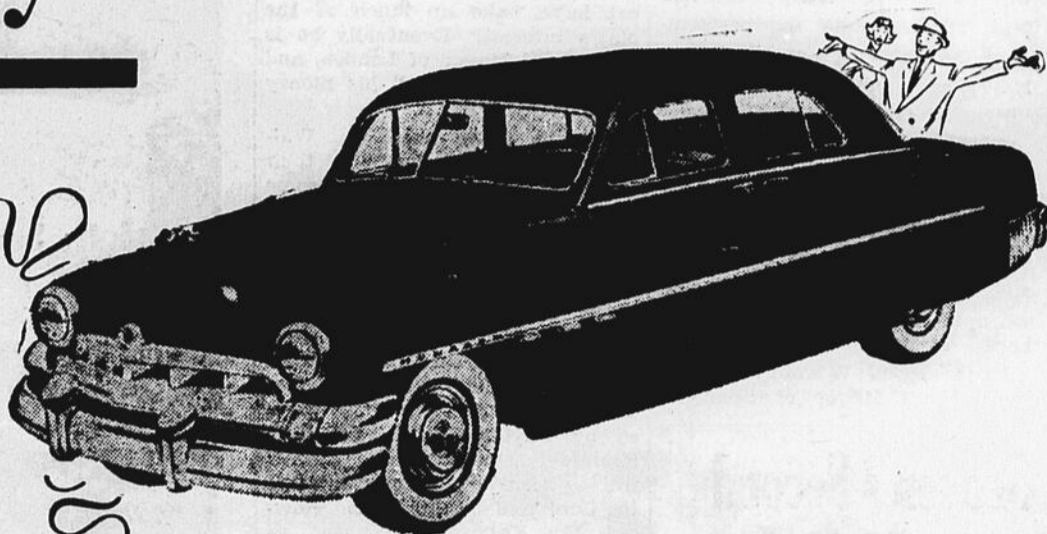

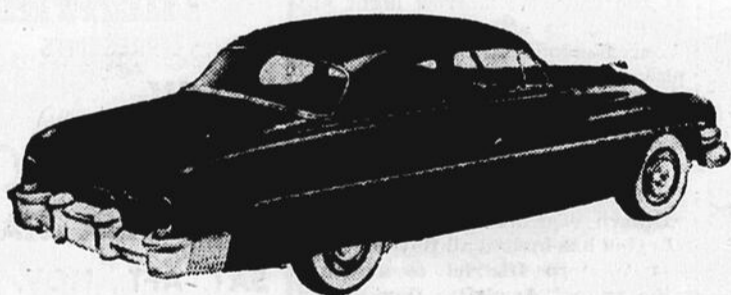

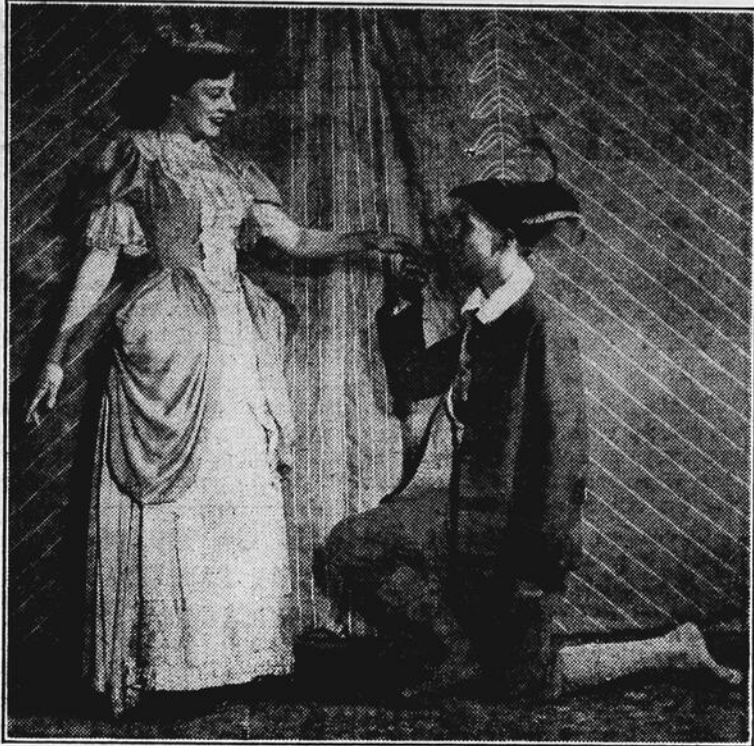

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 9 — Since television is still clothed in mystery for a majority of Canadians who have not yet had the opportunity to live in a video-cursed home, the following lines may provide a glimpse into what awaits them in the teevee age.

Woodbury College in Los Angeles sent me the results of an extensive poll conducted among the local citizenry in whose living rooms Hopalong Cassidy prances nightly.

Since buying their sets, 67 per cent of families

questioned spend more time at home than before. Over 25 per cent said the biggest problem of the video age was getting the kiddies to bed on schedule — the children don't want to turn the set off. Most folks feel crime films should be confined to late evening hours. Close to 40 per cent claimed their kids' favorite show was a puppet program called Time for Beany, with Hopalong Cassidy coming in a poor second and Milton Berle a sad third. Berle, however rates tops with adults.

Significant is the note that among people who have owned a television set at least a year 28 per cent seldom turn it on any more. The novelty apparently wears thin quickly. These people, however, attend the theatre 34 per cent less frequently than B.T. (Before Television), although 59 per cent of the total census said they would gladly pay \$1 to see a first-run movie at home on their own teevee screen.

Statistics are dangerous at best and can be twisted every which-way. But it's been my experience that television loses its novelty in eight to 12 months, after which the set is mainly used by kiddies and invalids. The average adult glues his eyes to the screen for only a few choice shows and the occasional sports broadcast or spot news attraction.

The Westmount grounds will be filled to capacity for this stellar attraction

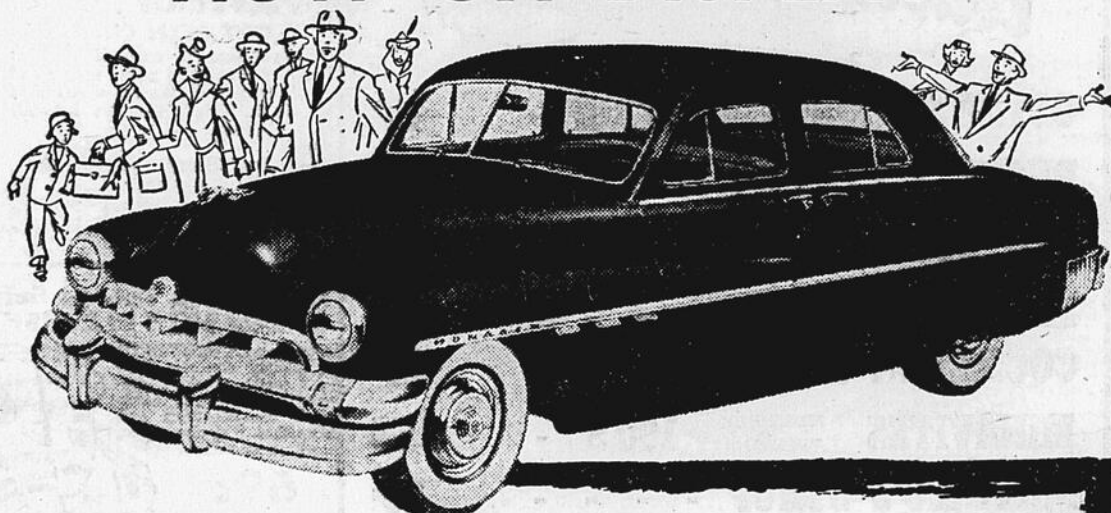

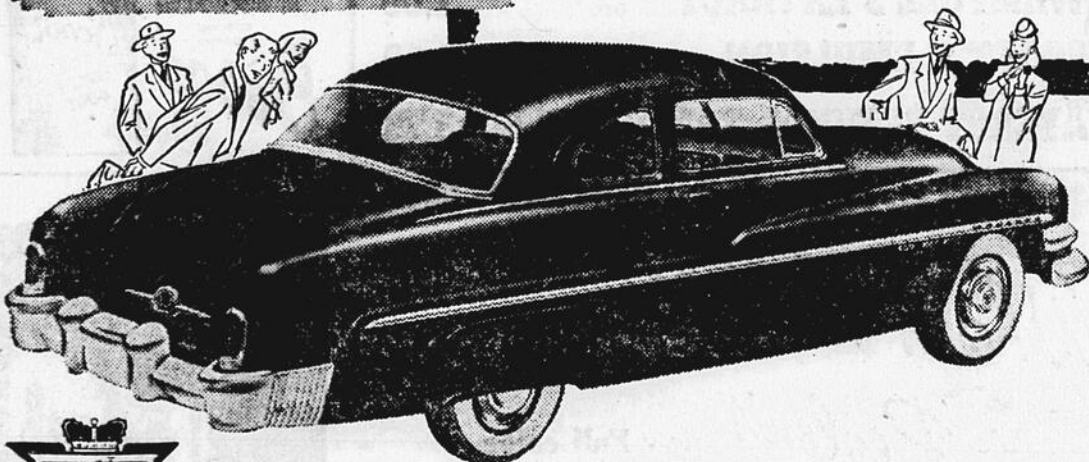
