THE PROROGATION OF PARLIAMENT.

The prorogation of the Imperial Parliament took place on Saturday after a session which has been prolonged beyond the usual period, and which was remarkable for being the first session under the new rules, and the first since the present Government came in power which has not been almost wholly devoted to Irish affairs. The new rules, perhaps, have not been as effective as was expected, and a good deal of time has been wasted by obstructive and boring, as is usual with all sessions of Parliament, but still a considerable amount of substantial work has been accomplished. Several of the measures proposed by the Government at the commencement of the session have had to be abandoned, but those which have been passed are important, not only for what they enact, but as a basis for future legislation. The Agricultural Holdings Bill, which has already been sufficiently explained in our columns, is the chief of the measures passed, and marks a new departure in legislation so far as England and Scotland are concerned. The Corrupt Practices Bill is the most stringent enactment against bribery and intimidation ever passed by any legislature, and should it prove a success will go far towards removing from electoral contests their most objectionable features, and insuring a fair and full expression of popular opinion. The Bankruptcy Bill is another valuable measure which can be placed to the credit of the present session, and the National Debt Bill is also worthy of mention as committing the country to the policy of paying off the Debt by appropriating a fixed sum every year for that purpose. The Patents Act and the Irish Tramways Bill are also among the measures of the session, both likely to be of benefit to the country.

There can be no doubt that the close of the session leaves the Government considerably stronger than it was at its commencement, a fact due as much to the mistakes of the Opposition as to any other cause. Mr. Gladstone now no longer talks of retiring; his health is entirely restored, and he is said to be more active and versatile than ever. The Conservative party, on the other hand, is badly demoralized; Sir Stafford Northcote is sick and desires to resign the leadership of his party in the Commons, while the Marquis of Salisbury has just led his party to a humiliating defeat in the House of Lords. The Irish party is lively and active, but whether it has any very definite policy as to the future is not quite clear.

The difficulty of passing bills in Parliament which every one admits to be necessary, and the obstructive tactics employed to defeat measures which affect the interests of certain members, has naturally directed public attention to the Constitution of that body. That we are on the eve of radical changes in parliamentary representation few people will deny, and no doubt next session will be largely devoted to measures for the improvement of the representation. Indeed, Mr. Gladstone last week indicated as much. For a long time the propriety of making the qualification of a voter in a county the same as the qualification of a voter in a borough has been conceded, and it was expected that this year a measure to that end would have been carried. But various causes delayed its introduction, of these being, no doubt, the consideration that a new election would have to be held as soon as the bill passed, and the obvious inconvenience of bringing an election on when so many important legislative measures were pressing. The Parliamentary Representation bill is, however, likely to be all the broader and more sweeping from the delay in its introduction. The present system is full of anomalies and cannot be defended on any just grounds. It is now impossible for a man to be elected or to sit in the House of Commons unless he is wealthy or has wealthy friends ready to spend money on his behalf, and this must always be so until members are paid, as they are in Canada. The electoral districts must be equalized and many other changes introduced before Great Britain can be said to have a good representative system.

"SAVE MOUSSEAU" AND "DOWN WITH THE CASTORS."

The Gazette must share the responsibility of encouraging the interference by Dominion Ministers in local elections. It defends Mr. Chapleau's appearance in the Jacques Cartier contest, and therefore approves of the Secretary of State's attempt to punish the "Castors" for opposing Mr. Mousseau. It says:—

We notice that objection is made to Mr. Chapleau's taking part in this election for the Legislative Assembly, on the ground that he is a member of the Federal Government, and that the support of that Government is divided in the contest. Under ordinary circumstances there is much to be said in favor of members of the Federal Government abstaining from the Provincial contests. But in this case the circumstances are not ordinary. The grounds of objection to Mr. Mousseau are that he has assumed responsibility for the acts of the Chapleau Government. It is, in fact, the policy of Mr. Chapleau, rather than that of Mr. Mousseau, which is assailed by the Conservative opponents of the Provincial Government. The sale of the railway was made by Mr. Chapleau, not Mr. Mousseau; and the sale of the railway is the chief ground of objection which the Castors make to Mr. Mousseau's reelection. It is as ex-Premier of the Province that Mr. Chapleau appears in this contest, in which the policy of his Government is being assailed, not as Secretary of State for the Dominion. In this contest Dominion politics are not an issue in any sense.

We have already pointed out that there are many methods by which Mr. Chapleau can defend himself against those who question his Local record, besides the method of throwing himself and the Dominion Government's influence into a Local election. He could call a meeting of his old constituents at any time and make his defence. He could arrange a meeting for the special purpose with those who accuse him. He could make personal explanations through the press. He could write a pamphlet or issue a circular. He could find any number of avenues to the public mind and conscience, any of them eminently proper and sufficient. But he has chosen the only one course by means of which he could make the influence of the Dominion Government tell upon a Local election, and on Mr. Mousseau's fate. He has resorted to the very worst method for his own interests, but has been apparently compelled to this course by the necessity which has arisen to "save Mousseau!" It is not so much Mr. Chapleau's reputation that is at stake as Mr. Mousseau's political existence. It is to "save Mousseau" that the Dominion Government's influence is being invoked and the Dominion Government's patronage wielded. It is to "save Mousseau" that the Dominion Government is being pressed into the breach between two wings of the Conservative party, one of them favoring the other opposing, the Local Government; and Mr. Mousseau is to be "saved" by crushing out the able and influential Conservatives who will not have for a leader the helpless politician who cannot stand with Mr. Chapleau's assistance.

The Gazette endorses this war by the Dominion Government on the Castors; it approves the trailing of the Dominion Government's standard through these local squabbles; and it is willing to see the Conservative Party of Quebec irrevocably broken up and the ablest men in the party driven out, just to "save Mousseau!" This is quite in keeping with the Gazette's past attacks on the anti-Mousseau Conservatives, but, of course, the result aimed at cannot be reached without the active aid of the Dominion Government itself. The Dominion Premier must be a consenting party. Sir Hector Langevin, the leader of the French supporters of the government, must approve of it; and the government as a whole must be regarded as favorable to such a demonstration, before the Secretary of State will be permitted to cast the government's influence into one scale or the other in the Jacques-Cartier election. This is the feature of the contest which really gives it importance. It is upon the decision of the Dominion Government in the matter that the public mind will rest. We shall learn from the Government's attitude in the Jacques-Cartier contest the precise value which the Government places on the allegiance of the Castors in Dominion politics. Present appearances indicate that as between Mr. Chapleau and Mr. Mousseau, on the one side, and the great body of French Conservatives who will not sustain the Local record of those gentlemen, on the other side, the Government are now giving the latter to understand that they are not wanted in the Government camp.

There can be no doubt that we are on the eve of serious political business in Quebec Province.

FISH CULTURE IN CANADA.

It is to be regretted that such misleading information as the following, which we find in the editorial columns of The Canadian Gazette, of London, Eng., is published abroad, especially when unaccompanied by Mr. Whittecher's letter:—

A letter from Mr. Whittecher, Commissioner of Fisheries at Ottawa, upon the practical results of fish culture in the Dominion, has been recently circulated in this country, and has attracted much attention. Mr. Whittecher desires to show that fish culture in Canada has not been a financial and commercial success. His views, however, apparently do not meet with much support from many of his colleagues officially connected with the Dominion Fisheries. The Canadian representatives at the Fisheries Exhibition have again and again shown the satisfactory results which have followed from the operations carried on. Many other authorities—scientists and practical men alike—have confirmed their statements, and the Fisheries Statement for 1882, just published by the Dominion authorities, contains a large number of reports, the majority of which record an appreciable increase in the yield of salmon and white fish during the year, and attribute it to the well-directed system of fish culture which the Dominion Government has set on foot. Much credit has

been given to the Government for its enterprise in this matter by those best qualified to judge.

The several governments of Canada are entitled to credit for having undertaken the experiment, but after immense sums of public money have been expended in experimenting, fish culture in Canada is found to have failed. Whether this is due to the mismanagement of Mr. Wilmot, Superintendent of fish culture, and his subordinates, or not, is a subject which Parliament will do well to investigate. Mr. Wilmot has already admitted, officially, the failure of all his calculations in regard to salmon culture in Ontario waters, and there is no doubt of the failure being general throughout the waters in which the young fish have been placed. That fish can be hatched and that tens of millions have been turned into Canadian rivers are undoubted facts, but that the fisheries of Canada have been benefited to any extent by simply placing these young fish in our rivers by other than the natural way, still remains to be proved. There has been a hatchery in the Restigouche river almost since the date of Confederation, and two of them for a portion of the time; tens of millions of young salmon have been placed in the river; and the protection extended to the fishery has been greater than before; and although the fishing of the present year has been the best for several years past, and this is spoken of as an exceptionally good year, yet the quantity of salmon caught is not as large as before the hatchery was established. The Restigouche has received more attention than has been given to any other river in Canada, and the result in this case ought to be conclusive. It is true that the Sandwich hatching house, from which the Ontario waters were supplied, is the oldest of all the hatcheries, and it is remarkable also as being the one connected with the most complete of all the failures with which Mr. Wilmot's name is doomed to be associated.

THE SENSATIONAL STORY which comes from the West of the intention of a party of cowboys, or persons dressed as cowboys, to capture President Arthur and hold him for ransom, is not likely to be regarded seriously. Such an exploit would savor too much of Greek or Italian brigandage to be considered possible in the United States, even in its wildest regions. Still, there is a bare possibility that there may be some foundation to the story, for forms of crime have recently been introduced from the old world which did not exist on this continent before. The capture of a President by brigands would certainly be a sensational event, and it is hardly likely, even should such a plot succeed, that the expectations of the brigands with regard to ransom would be fulfilled. We trust, however, that no such ill fortune as an imprisonment with cowboys may attend the President, and that he may return safe and sound to the duties of his high office and become the Republican candidate for the Presidency in 1884.

MR. SHAW, the English missionary, who was imprisoned by Admiral Pierre and very badly treated, has been acquitted of the charges brought against him and released. These charges substantially were that he was the chief adviser of the Hovas and engaged in inciting them to acts of hostility against the French. The charge was proved to be untrue as soon as it was inquired into, a fact which shows that Admiral Pierre either was misled by false information or that he acted wholly without warrant. Most people will be inclined to believe the latter to be the case, and public opinion in England will demand that ample reparation be made for the injury.

THE TORONTO Mail on Saturday took the Chicago Tribune to task for its ignorance in stating that the debt of the Dominion represented deficits from year to year. In this it only said what THE HERALD said several days ago. The Tribune is certainly censurable for its ignorance, but not more so than the Mail when it stated, as it did, the other day that France was paying off her debt; the truth being that France is going more deeply into debt every year. This was even a worse blunder than that of the Chicago Tribune, and was calculated to make people think that there was "a great moral lesson lying around somewhere."

THE COUNT OF PARIS, who is now the representative of the Bourbons, intends to drop the insignia of the Orleans branch of the family to which he properly belongs. The union of these two branches of the Bourbons has filled the portions of that family in France with enthusiasm, and some of them profess to have hope of the cause to which they are so much attached. But it is impossible for persons outside of France to regard such ideas otherwise than as chimeras. The Bourbons have as little chance of becoming the rulers of France as the Bonapartes have.

AT A MEETING of prominent citizens held in the Corn Exchange Rooms on Saturday, Mr. F. W. Henshaw, President of the Board of Trade, being in the chair, it was decided to entertain the officers of the Vandalla in such manner as might be acceptable to them. A committee was appointed to wait upon the officers, and, after conference with them, it was decided to give a reception and ball on Friday evening next at the Windsor Hotel.

AN important measure, affecting patent medicines, will shortly be carried into effect by the Inland Revenue authorities of the United States, with regard to all tonics and bitters containing alcohol. It has been proved that many of these so-called medicines contain from 10 to 60 per cent. of pure spirit. These preparations will be, most likely, made dutiable to the extent of the proportion of alcohol contained in them.

THE BEST OFFICIAL TROTTER TIME for double teams was cut down on Saturday from 2.13 to 2.10, or three-quarters of a second better than Dexter's best record. There are some who expect to see 2.14 accomplished by a double team before the season closes.

ENGLAND'S GREAT JURIST.

Arrival and Reception of Lord Chief-Justice Coleridge.

His Views of America and the Splendid Harbor of New York—A Reception Dinner.

New World, 25th August.

Lord Chief-Justice Coleridge, of England, arrived in this city yesterday morning on a two months' visit to the United States and Canada. The steamer Celtic, on which he took passage, was expected on Thursday, and arrangements were made to meet him down the bay. His Lordship comes as the guest of the New York State Bar Association, that body defraying all expenses of the trip. The committee appointed to receive the distinguished jurist comprised Messrs. Elliot F. Shepard, chairman, of the committee on arrangements, and Elbridge T. Gerry, Mr. Gerry placed his steam yacht Pastime at the disposal of the committee, and with Revenue Officer Sarner on board cruised down the bay in search of the Celtic, but it was not until 6 o'clock yesterday morning that the steamer was sighted. The committee boarded the vessel and in a informal manner welcomed the great jurist and his party. The visitors were then escorted to the yacht, on which breakfast was served. Secretary Folger had issued orders to allow Lord Coleridge's baggage to pass without examination, and by special permit the quarantine regulations were waived.

The gentlemen accompanying the Chief Justice are his son, Hon. Gilbert James Duke Coleridge, Sir James Hannen, President of the Probate Divorce and Admiralty Division of the High Court of Justice, his son, Hon. James C. Hannen, Charles Russell, Q.C., and Home Rule member of Parliament for Dundalk, Ireland, and Mr. P. Martin, member of Parliament for Waterford. After breakfast the party proceeded on deck while the yacht steamed up the harbor and along the long black, lively interest being manifested in the panoramic view presented. At the great bridge a stop was made, the wonderful structure calling forth the remark that it was the greatest of bridges in the world. Blackwell's Island, the Battery, Governor's Island, and interesting and historic spots were pointed out and described.

HIS APPEARANCE.

As His Lordship was leaning over the rail he presented little the appearance of the typical English judge. His six feet of height was made taller by the long black Prince Albert coat he wore, and the slight stoop in the shoulders appeared more pronounced as he lounged over the vessel's side. His face was ruddy, pleasant and clean-shaven, and the sixty years in passing over his head had touched it with gray. The tall hat he wore added to his appearance more slender than he actually was. He possesses a peculiarly pleasing voice, with the rising intonation naturally English. After a surfeit of East River scenery, North River points of interest were visited and a landing was effected at Twenty-third street, where carriages were taken, and Lord Coleridge and his son were driven to the residence of Mr. Elliott F. Shepard, at No. 2 West Fifty-second street, where luncheon was served at 2 o'clock.

To a reporter for The World the Lord Chief-Justice said that his plans for the next two months were exceedingly indefinite. "It is absolutely necessary for me to be in England by November 9," he added, "as I take my seat then. For the present I am in the hands of my American friends. My desire is to see as much of this country and of Canada as I conveniently can. I hope to be able to see something of the West—isn't that what you call it? But I shall not try to cover a certain amount of territory in a given time. I object to that mode of travelling with a smile at reminiscences which 'American travellers' called up."

"A have met a number of cultured Americans, and have been attracted by a certain vivacity possessed by them, as a class," he continued. "My ideas of this country are exceedingly vague, though. I know hardly more of it than did young Martin Chuzzlewit. What I have seen thus far impresses me with a desire to see more, and to anticipate a pleasant journey."

He referred to the courtesies extended to him by the committee, and believed the sea voyage had proved beneficial to his health. The judicial absence of superlatives was noticeable in his remarks. The remainder of the party who accompanied Lord Coleridge were entertained by Mr. Elbridge T. Gerry. They will not accompany His Lordship, but are here upon invitation of Mr. Villard, of the Northern Pacific road, who has tendered them an excursion through the North-West.

The committee of the State Bar Association, to whom arrangements for the entertainment of the Lord Chief Justice are entrusted, comprises: Elliott F. Shepard, Chairman; Elbridge T. Gerry, Leslie W. Russell, Attorney-General of the State; John F. Seymour and Charles D. Adams, Utica; Martin V. Cooke and James L. Annel, Rochester; Edwin Young, Albany; and Sherman S. Rogers, Buffalo.

While the plans are not definitely fixed it is Lord Coleridge's desire to visit his friend the Lord Bishop of Fredericton, N.B., almost immediately, Toronto, Quebec, the West, Newport, Washington and Niagara Falls will also be visited.

A formal banquet will be tendered to the English jurist in this city on October 11, at which the leading legal representatives of the country will be present.

In the afternoon Lord Coleridge received a telegram from the American Bar Association, now holding its annual meeting at Saratoga, extending to him, on behalf of the entire bar of the country, a cordial welcome and wishing that the interest taken by the American Bar in his visit, marked by their esteem or his personal character, and eminent professional and public service, as well as by their respect for his high office, may in some degree contribute to the pleasure and satisfaction which they hope may attend his visit.

The Lord Chief Justice returned cordial thanks for the welcome, adding that he could be more grateful to him in regard of the sentiments conveyed and of the body conveying them.

In the evening the distinguished foreigner was tendered a dinner by Mr. Elliott F. Shepard, at his residence, No. 2 East Fifty-second street. There were present besides the host and his guest, Gilbert Coleridge, his son Sir James Hannen James L. Hannen, Hon. Charles Russell, M.P., Hon. P. P. Martin, M.P., Chief-Justice Waite, Chief Justice Kupper, Attorney-General Brewster, Justice Swaney, Justice Noah, Davis, Judge Van Vorst, Whitlaw Reid, S. Hastings Carr, Augustus D. Shepard, William D. Sloane, H. O. Armour, Thomas C. Acton, Algernon S. Sullivan, Delano C. Calvin, and Rev. Alex. Mackay-Smith. The dinner, which comprised ten courses, was served by Belmonts. There were no speeches. After the dinner an autograph album was passed around, in which all the guests inscribed their names.

To-morrow evening a number of gentle-

men will meet the Chief Justice at dinner at Mr. Shepard's house. On Sunday morning he and his party will attend services at Trinity Church, where three pews will be reserved for them. It is expected that Dr. Dix will preach.

A MOURNING CITY.

Burying the Dead and Aiding the Living Victims at Rochester.

ROCHESTER, Minn., August 24, 1883.

Most of the present dead are entombed, and the human remains of the storm are mainly the wounded, and tossed restlessly on their beds in the improvised hospital. At four o'clock yesterday afternoon hundreds of wagons and carriages congregated near the Cook House for the conveyance to the Oakwood Cemetery of the bodies for which graves were dug a few hours previously. Eleven in all were taken there, and the three hearse of the city made repeated trips to carry them, there being nine coffins in all, two of the number covered a double burden.

THE CITY IN MOURNING.

The announcement of the funeral had been made by printed slips edged with black, and about 3,000 people assembled at the cemetery between the hours of four and six o'clock. Every store, saloon and office in the city was closed. The flags hung at half-mast and a general solemnity was clearly noticeable. The cemetery, a beautiful spot, lies to the north-east of the town, across the Zumbrota River. The amount of damage to monuments and trees therein has been very large, though not so great as at first reported. The graves were in various parts of the grounds, and the service over each coffin was of the briefest possible character consistent with due observance of respect.

THE BURIED VICTIMS.

Eleven in all were buried at Oakland, named as follows:—Mrs. Westerbe, Nellie Irvin, Mrs. Zarah, Mr. Osborne and child, Mr. Hetzel, Mrs. Fred Clough, Mrs. Quick and child, and Miss Mahala McCormick. Mrs. Steele was buried in Byron and Mr. Cole in Winona.

Thus far according to burials the dead in the city proper were as follows:—Eleven buried in Oakland, two in the Catholic cemetery and four in Haverrill; also one in Byron, one in Winona and one at Dodge Centre—twenty in all.

Carl Quick died at two p.m. yesterday, after amputation had been performed. One child is held here awaiting the arrival of friends, and two persons undoubtedly have not been found. One is a child, name unknown; the other is a woman who lived beyond the river and east of the Broadway bridge.

A FAMILY OF TEN PERSONS.

The case of the Quick family is particularly distressing. The father died yesterday afternoon; the mother and one child were taken out dead from the ruins; six children, the oldest a boy of twelve years, lie ranged on cots in the hospital. The eighth is missing, but a Mrs. Roberts, who lives across the river, has a child three years old in her possession, which is probably the one. When the other Quick children recover sufficiently they will doubtless be able to tell certainly whether or not this is the missing one.

As a brighter picture may be given the case of the Donahues, mother and ten children, not one of whom was hurt, though their house was crushed to atoms around them.

It is more than possible that two or three more bodies will be found in the ruins when they are cleared away.

SAFETY IN CELLARS.

No person escaped unscathed who did not take refuge in a cellar. Of those who did so comparatively few are seriously injured. J. H. Chapman had just completed a vault for a place of refuge in his cellar, when his family would certainly have been killed. A. K. Williams, who was dangerously hurt in the former cyclone, in the train wreck at Owatonna a month ago, was on his farm, supervising the harvest, and was again badly bruised.

On the grounds of F. A. Poole, opposite the court house, a curious freak of the storm is to be seen. A pine board, about six feet long and four inches wide, is driven endways through the trunk of a maple tree six inches thick, and remains imbedded in it.

Numerous narrow escapes from sudden death are reported.

DESTRUCTION OF SALEM.

A farmer just in from Salem township says the destruction there is terrible. John Gills, Jr., and Andrew Johnson were instantly killed. The property of the following people has been utterly destroyed: Property of Mrs. Jackson, occupied by Peter Watson; O. Johnson, a widow, name unknown; Charles Johnson, John Gills, Joseph and Ole Christ.

NUMBER OF KILLED OVERSTATED.

The streets of the city to-day are full of people from all over the State, some from curiosity and some to care for friends, while a large number are prominent men from all portions of the State to see the effect of the cyclone, that they may know its extent and the way to be followed. On every side can be heard accounts of some new freak or horror of the monster storm till the heart sickens at their relation. The reports from the hospital are to the effect that the children are much improved, while some of the adults are worse and cannot live. The reported list of the killed has been so large through the confusion of names. Careful inquiry shows that sixteen comprises all of those instantly killed.

DESTITUTE OF EVERYTHING.

One thousand men, women and children of the class that possess hardly anything outside of their homes and what there is in them are to-day without anything. Of 200 houses which were standing before the approach of the storm there is not sufficient material to build an ordinary frame shelter. All the household furniture and clothing were also completely destroyed. The people are poor and must be cared for. At present they are lodged in private houses, empty stores, warehouses and halls, and are being fed by the city. Rochester is doing all she can to aid the sufferers. A large dining hall, 20 by 60 feet, is being built on the devastated track. Food and clothing are being brought in and \$3,000 has been raised by the citizens. St. Paul has subscribed \$5,000, Minneapolis \$1,200, Winona \$3,000, Stillwater \$1,000, Lake City \$2,500, Red Wing \$500, and Hastings \$100. Owatonna and Mankato have also responded.

MUTE APPEALS TO SYMPATHY.

The great need of the people can only be appreciated by those who have seen their condition. A gentleman who visited the hospital yesterday and saw Mr. Quick and his five motherless little ones, all seriously hurt, wrote a check for \$200 and gave it to Judge Start, chairman of the relief committee, for the benefit of the afflicted family. Since then the father has died and the helplessness of these young orphans is typical of the general distress.

The report of a disaster to a passenger train at Zumbrota Falls grew out of a freight train disaster here, in which a fireman was killed, and the other reported disaster did not occur.

The loss of life by the cyclone in the country adjacent to Rochester has not yet been accurately computed.

SAVING THE TRAIN.

The usual crowd of autumn liars were gathered together in the store, occupying all the grocery seats—only the gross receipts that the proprietor took no pride in—when a little, bear-eyed, weazen-faced individual sneaked in by the back door and slunk into a dark corner.

"That's him," said the ungrammatical bummer with a green patch over his left eye.

"Who is it?" asked several at once.

"Why, the chap who saved the train from being wrecked," was the reply.

"Come, tell us about it," they demanded, as the small man crouched in the darkness, as if unwilling that his heroic deed should be brought out under the glare of the blazing kerosene lamp.

After much persuasion, reinforced by a stiff horn of applejack, he began:

"It was just a night as this—bright and clear—and I was going home down the track, when right before me, across the rails, stood a great bear."

"There it was," he said, "pale and ghastly as a lifeless body, and light as it appeared, I had not the power to move it. A sudden rumble and roar told me that the night express was thundering down and would soon reach the fatal spot. Nearer and nearer it approached, till, just as the cowcatcher was lifting me, I sprang aside, placed myself between the obstruction and the track, and the train flew on unharmed."

The silence was so intense for a moment that one might have heard a dew drop. Presently some one said:

"What did you do with the bear?"

"I didn't touch it," he replied, "but it touched me."

"Well," persisted the questioner, "if you couldn't lift it, and didn't touch it, how in thunder did the train get over it?"

"Why, don't you see?" said the sad-faced man, as he arose from his seat and walked toward the bear. "The obstruction was a moonbeam, and I jumped so that the shadow of my body took its place, and—"

Bang! flew a ham against the door, and if it had struck the body of the retreating hero there would have been a much bigger green spot faced on the panel.—Drake's Traveller's Magazine.

NOBILITY AND THE STAGE.

Viscount Garmoye, eldest son of Lord Cairns, is to marry Miss Fortescue, of the Savoy Theatre. This is certainly not the first instance of a nobleman making suit and winning the hand and heart of an actress. But this is the most remarkable instance in every way. First of all, Earl Cairns is the head of one of the oldest noble families, and, what is more remarkable, it is a very religious family of which he is the head. Lord Cairns is very evangelical, and is even puritanical to the backbone. But those who know Miss Finney (the real name of Miss Fortescue) congratulate the young nobleman upon his choice and his conquest. The young lyric actress has both genius and character, and has contrived to win esteem and respect by her personal dignity as well as by her charming grace and singular beauty.

MERMAID'S KISSES.

Thrown to an Astonished Crowd Upon the Beach.

NEWCASTLE, N. H., August 22.—Fort Cottage is a neat wooden structure situated near Fort Constitution and about 200 feet from the sea, upon a rough and craggy ledge of rocks from which a good portion of the walls of the old fort was taken. In the surf just in front of this house, during a southeast gale, a few of the islanders were gathered near the beach to witness the effects of the storm, a mermaid made her appearance three times on the top of huge waves, showing to the crowd a head well crowned with long, heavy hair streaming over the shoulders and bosom, a pleasant face and long, muscular arms. Taking a long look on shore, this daughter of the sea waved her fair hand and threw a kiss to the spectators on the strand, and departed again for her haunts in the depths of the ocean.

FROM THE CAPITAL.

Imports and Exports for July—Official News from Canada Gazette. Personal—Lumber Shipping—Proposed Reception to Lord Coleridge—Excursionists from Montreal—Lobster Close Season Shortened.

OTTAWA, August 25.—The value of the dutiable goods entered for consumption in Canada, exclusive of British Columbia, for July was \$7,088,006; duty \$1,785,909.92; free goods \$2,997,775; total, \$10,121,178.

Chas. McCabe has been appointed a Commissioner of Police for Ontario, Manitoba and Newfoundland. He will be a Commissioner under the Act of 1869 as amended by the Act of 1870 for, from Algoma Mills to Calgary Station and from Sudbury Junction to River Pierre.

Peter Lelacher, of Martineau, Lennox, N.S., has been appointed a preventive officer.

George Alexander Jamieson, of Ship Harbor, N.S., has been appointed a preventive officer.

Geo. Fry, landing waiter at Victoria, B.C., has been appointed Surveyor of Customs at that place.

Robt. Gillis has been appointed Harbor Master of Eastbay, N.S.

An order-in-council has been passed authorizing a drawback on iron imported and manufactured into horseshoes and exported at 90 per cent of its value or 35c per hundred lbs. A drawback of 90 per cent of the value or 10c per 100 lbs has been authorized on iron imported and exported again in the shape of rails.

The rules and regulations governing the port of Halifax have been approved by order-in-council.

Letters patent have been granted to the Northrop & Lyman Manufacturing Company, of Toronto, and the Yarmouth, N.S., duck and yarn company.

Applications for letters patent of incorporation have been made by the Beacraft field wine and vineyard company.

The Ottawa Bar are contemplating a great reception to Lord Chief Justice Coleridge on the occasion of his visit to Ottawa. He will be the guest of His Excellency the Governor-General.

Some three hundred excursionists arrived here this evening from Montreal. During his stay at the capital Lord Chief Justice Coleridge will be the guest of His Excellency the Governor-General.

Rev. Father Dowdell, of Pakenham, has been appointed curate of the Basilian. Some 70 American boats are tied up at the Chaudiere lumber docks awaiting loads, with poor prospects ahead of them for freight, unless the prices in lumber advance. The greater bulk of the freighting this season is being done by Canadian vessels.

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QUEBEC.

Personal—Church Destroyed—Ministerial Visit to Chicoutimi.

QUEBEC, August 25.—Sir Leonard and Lady Tilley arrived this afternoon from Liverpool by S.S. Parisian.

It appears from letters received from the new parish of St. Damien de Buckland, that the new church in course of construction was entirely destroyed a day or two ago by a cyclone.

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An address of welcome was presented by Mr. Gagne, M.P., and Mr. Michel Caron, Mayor of the parish.

ONTARIO.

Another Man Blows out the Gas—Vital Statistics—The Vice Royal Visit to Toronto—A Welsh Colony for the North-West—Fatal Results of a Druggist's Carelessness—Haulan Returns to Toronto—Arrival of Navies—Civic Bodies and Railway Crossing—Law Examination—Lobster Escape.

YONGE, August 25.—Daniel Curran, a young farmer from Glenhuron, put up at the Beaver House last night, and on the door of his bedroom being forced open this morning he was found lying on the bed unconscious. It took a couple of hours to bring him round, and the first words he uttered were, "Well, I blew out the gas all right last night, and there must have been a leak somewhere."

The vital statistics for this week are births 51, marriages 19, and deaths 51.

The city clerk has received a message that the Governor-General and the Princess will be pleased to receive an address from the City Council in the Queen's Park on the 13th.

The Globe special from London announces that two delegates of the Welsh Quarrymen's Union sailed from Liverpool on the Saxifrage yesterday to seek a location in the Canadian North-West for Welsh emigrants. Their intention is to establish a Welsh colony near Fort Calgary.

On Saturday the Typographical Union and friends, numbering about 700, escorted to Lambton Mills on the Credit Valley road. On hearing that station a freight train was approaching at full speed for Toronto and when both trains were brought to a standstill about twenty yards separated them. A frightful catastrophe was therefore narrowly averted.

TORONTO, August 26.—Hannan arrived in the city this afternoon and proceeded at once to his hotel on the Island.

About 300 navies from the Lower Provinces arrived here yesterday. A number left in the afternoon for Algoma and the others will work on the Grand Trunk double track to be laid between the Don and Scarborough.

An indignation meeting of residents in Brockton was held last night, when a deputation was appointed to wait upon the City Council to protest against the

adoption of the 40-foot subway at Queen street. A special meeting of the council will be held to-morrow afternoon, when a deputation will likely be appointed to proceed to Ottawa to oppose the scheme. The result of the first and second intermediate law examinations has been made known. In the former 12 out of 38 candidates were placed. Brewster, Glass, Godfrey, Hill, Cunningham and Higgins are entitled to write for scholarships. In the latter 10 were placed out of 30, Smith and Patton being entitled to write for scholarships.

LONDON, August 25.—A sad affair, by which two little children were killed through the blunder of a druggist, happened at Mt. Brydges. Mr. Thos. Frazer, a farmer, yesterday sent to a drug store for a small quantity of salamine to be used as worm medicine. The medicine was received and taken home but in less than half an hour after the doses were administered both children died, suffering excruciating agony. It has been ascertained that the druggist had given them salamine instead of salamine. Criminal proceedings will probably be taken. An investigation is pending. The children were aged three and five years respectively. Coroner McLaren of Delaware has gone to Mount Brydges to make inquiries into the case.

THE MARITIME PROVINCES.

Personal—Centenary—Baptist Convention at Halifax—Declaration Day in St. John.

HALIFAX, N.S., August 25.—Mr. C. H. Pupper, M.P., has returned from England. A colored woman, named Bella Johnson, died at Granville Mountain, Annapolis county, aged one hundred and eleven years.

The Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces opened this morning, about three hundred being present. Among those invited to take seats in the convention were President Castle, of Toronto Baptist College, and Professor McVicar, Rev. John March, of St. John, was chosen President.

In the afternoon the report of the Home Mission Board was taken up and addresses delivered by Rev. Calvin Goodspeed on reasons for enlarging home mission work, by Rev. Mr. Normandy on work among the French, and by Dr. McVicar on reasons for aiding the mission work in the far West. The convention represents three hundred and forty-four churches with thirty-seven thousand four hundred and eighty-nine members.

ST. JOHN, N.B., August 25.—Hon. T. W. Anglin arrived here to-day from Toronto. This was declaration day and the Sheriff formally declared Messrs. McLellan and Stockton elected to the vacant seats in the Assembly.

A TELEPHONE CASE. Ed. J. Mich. Sustained.

BOSTON, August 25.—Judge Lowell has sustained the decision of the district court in the case of the American Bell Telephone Co. vs. Amos E. Dolbear et al., which was an appeal from the decision of the district court in favor of the Bell Telephone Co. He holds that the invention of the telephone is the property of the Bell Telephone Co. and that the Dolbear telephone is an infringement.

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FRANCE'S WARS.

The Annamite Campaign. A French Victory—Hue Captured and Occupied.

PARIS, August 25.—A despatch has just been received by Admiral Peyron, Minister of Marine and of the Colonies, from General Bouet, the French military commander in Tonkin, stating that the city of Hue has been captured and occupied by the French. The attack was conducted from both land and sea, the fleet keeping up a heavy bombardment while the land forces attacked from the north. When the fleet had done its work and the garrison of the city were completely demoralized, the troops on shore made an onslaught, which was but feebly resisted, and carried everything before them. The losses of the Annamites are calculated at 700 killed, and many wounded. The French loss was trifling, but a few soldiers receiving slight wounds. The Annamite court is in a state of alarm bordering on chaos and will probably accept any terms offered. M. Harmand, the French civil commissioner in Tonkin, has gone to treat with the Annamite authorities, and will submit an ultimatum on the part of his government which must be accepted, otherwise a complete blockade of all the ports of the empire of Annam will be organized and strictly enforced.

Reinforcements from Tonkin. PARIS, August 25.—Reinforcements have been ordered to replace the troops required to hold the forts at Hue. A regiment of infantry and a battery of artillery will shortly arrive at Tonkin for Annam. As an effective blockade of the whole coast of Tonkin and the southern part of Annam is impossible with the forces at his disposal, Admiral Courbet will confine himself to blockading Tourane, Hue, the delta of Red River and Hanoi.

THE MADAGASCAR TROUBLES. Mr. Shaw Acquitted.

PARIS, Aug. 27.—The Government has received a telegram from Admiral Piere, French commander in Madagascar stating that the trial of Mr. Shaw, English missionary arrested by the French, resulted in a dismissal of the charge. He will be liberated.

A Denial. PARIS, August 25.—M. Waddington, French Ambassador at London, has not been summoned to come to Paris to discuss the Tamaris affair reported.

THE EUROPEAN CHURCH. Good Advice to France. ROME, Aug. 25.—The Diritto points out to France her fatal blindness. She has left nothing undone to alienate the friendship of Spain, Italy and England. It hopes she will repair her faults and avert the perils which beset her.

Warlike Intentions Denied. BERLIN, August 25.—No unusual warlike preparations are contemplated here. A meeting between Bismarck and the Austro-Hungarian Minister of Foreign Affairs is now probable, if only to demonstrate that the warlike rumors are unfounded.

IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT. The Prorogation—Full Text of the Queen's Speech.

LONDON, August 25.—Parliament was prorogued at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The Queen's Speech, closing the session, was read by Royal Commission. It is as follows:—

My Lords and Gentlemen: I take this occasion to acknowledge your unremitting energy, devotion and fulfillment of the great trust committed to your care. The harmony of my relations with foreign governments continues undisturbed. The conference which assembled in London to settle questions connected with the free navigation of the Danube arrived at an agreement favorable to the commerce. The administrative reorganization of Egypt, though retarded at important points by the visitation of the cholera, has steadily advanced. The aim of the temporary occupation of Egypt by my military forces, the considerations which must govern its duration and the constant direction of my efforts to tranquility in the East and to the welfare of the Egyptian people, have been more than once explained to you and remain unchanged. Occurrences arising from French operations in Madagascar form the subject of communications with the government of France which are conducted in a spirit of friendship, and will, I doubt not, lead to satisfactory results. In connection with these occurrences my attention has been, and will continue to be steadily directed to all which may affect the rights and liberties of my subjects. My hopes for the re-establishment of stable peace and order in Zululand are not yet fulfilled, and the working of the convention with the Transvaal government has proved in certain respects far from satisfactory. Regarding the first case I shall, while avoiding all gratuitous interference, study to maintain such engagements as I have contracted, and keep steadily in view the security of the border of Natal. The questions of frontier policy opened by the second case, which in different forms have so long constituted the main difficulty in the administration of my South African possessions, will, with other points, shortly be discussed here between my ministers and confidential envoys despatched from Transvaal for the purpose."

THE HOUSE OF COMMONS. The House of Commons for Liberal supplies voted, and continues: "The revenue thus far has not fallen short of the anticipated amount. The condition of classes suffering from the depression in agriculture has, in most districts, shown some degree of improvement. The general state of trade and industry is sound. I can refer with greater satisfaction than on some former occasions to the condition of Ireland, except in regard to the disposal of appeals, where there is still much to be desired. Action in appointing tribunals has brought into wide operation the provisions of the land act. The late combination against the fulfillment of contracts, especially for payment of rents, has been in a great degree broken up. There is a marked diminution of agrarian crimes, and agrarian hawking murder for their object have been checked by the detection and punishment of offenders. The expectations of more successful progress in the work of legislation which I expressed at the close of last session have not been wholly disappointed. I have cordially given my assent to many measures of public usefulness. The acts which secure due compensation to the owners of land in England and Scotland respectively, will, I trust, tend to promote confidence between the classes affected and to the more advantageous prosecution of the great business of agriculture. The law relating to corrupt practices in elections will extinguish the

graver forms of corruption and promote more efficient representation of all classes. The act improving the law of bankruptcy is well adapted to fulfill the anticipations of the commercial and trading communities, and the act concerning patents will greatly improve the position of inventors. The provisions which you have made for the further continuous redemption of the National Debt will materially aid in the maintenance of the public credit. The act for the encouragement of Irish industry and enterprise by the improvement of communities and for the further relief of particular districts by emigration and agriculture has supplied new proof of your anxiety to promote the prosperity of Ireland."

In conclusion, Her Majesty says: "I trust the favor of providence may uniformly guide you to promote the object of my constant solicitude, the welfare and happiness of my people."

THE LORDS CAPITULATE. The House of Lords at the last moment agreed to the Agricultural Holding Bill.

IRISH AFFAIRS. The Irish National League. LONDON, August 25.—The Irish National League of Great Britain will hold a convention at Leeds, September 27th. Mr. Parnell will probably preside.

Parnell to Contest Down. LONDON, August 26.—Mr. Parnell will contest County Down at the next elections for members of Parliament.

The Coarbridge Riots. LONDON, August 26.—The rioting between Orangemen and Catholics at Coarbridge was renewed on Saturday. Twenty-two were arrested.

The Murder Conspiracy Charge. LIMERICK, August 26.—At the examination of Dr. Connelly and Patrick Connelly, brothers, who were arrested at Bruff on a charge of implication in the murder conspiracy, Michael Dineen testified that the Connellys compelled him to swear that he would shoot John Carroll, a rent warner of the Earl of Limerick, and promised that the head centre would pay him £50 for so doing. The prisoners and himself laid waiting several times for Carroll, but witness' courage failed and he did not shoot him. Witness swore the Connellys also proposed the poisoning of Carroll and his sister. The prisoners were remanded.

The National Programme. LONDON, August 26.—At a conference of Irish members of Parliament last night a programme was prepared for a convention of the Irish National League of Great Britain to be held at Leeds on September 27th. The programme demands self-government for Ireland and direct representation of the Irish laboring class in Parliament.

COLLISION OFF EDDYSTONE. Steamer Woodburn Sinks in the British Channel with 18 of Her Crew. LONDON, August 26.—The French steamer St. Germain, Capt. Bonneau, from Havre for New York, and steamer Woodburn, from the east, collided off Eddystone light at 3 o'clock this morning. The Woodburn sank immediately and 18 of her crew were drowned. The St. Germain which was disabled has arrived at Plymouth with her passengers and those saved from the Woodburn.

The Woodburn foundered three minutes after the collision. It was a starlight night and the sea calm. The Woodburn was being towed. She was struck on the starboard quarter, and there was no time to lower her boats and only eleven persons on board were saved. Those drowned were sucked into the vortex caused by the sinking of the steamer, or became entangled in the wreckage. The St. Germain's bows are completely stove in and her fore compartment was filled with water. The greater portion of her passengers were transferred to a tug boat.

Another Disaster—Five Persons Drowned. LONDON, August 26.—The steamer Palermo, from Hamburg to Lisbon, collided off Ushant with the steamer Rivoli, from Bilbao to Middlesborough. The latter sank and five persons were drowned. A thick fog prevailed.

LEONSO'S KINGDOM. The King Will Receive on His Tour. MADRID, August 26.—The King reviewed the troops at Logrono yesterday, and afterwards received a cordial welcome at Burgos. He will return to Madrid on Monday and preside at a Cabinet Council when the question of his journey to Germany will be decided. It is believed that before long the Prime Minister will be charged with the reconstruction of the Ministry.

The Dark Continent. LISBON, August 26.—It is reported that Stanley has closed the Upper Congo to commerce. The King of Dahomey has liberated the garrison of Portuguese at Fort Whydah on condition that the place will not be ceded to England.

The Cholera Epidemic. ALEXANDRIA, August 25.—There were twenty-six deaths from cholera here yesterday, three British soldiers. There were two hundred deaths elsewhere in Egypt.

LONDON, August 26.—The deaths from cholera in India were 129 in upper Egypt and 38 in lower Egypt.

ALEXANDRIA, August 26.—There were twenty-two deaths from cholera here yesterday.

LONDON, August 26.—It is reported that cholera has broken out in Sumatra.

An Undertaker's Criminality. LONDON, August 25.—The inquest on the twelve bodies of children found at an undertaker's in Bermondsey shows that the bodies were deposited with the undertaker for burial by the parents of the children. Although the cost of interment had been paid the undertaker neglected to bury the bodies.

THE LABOR PROBLEM. Trouble Among the Unions. NEW YORK, August 26.—The Brassworkers' Union to-day withdrew from the Central Labor Union because it decided to exclude reporters from the meeting for the alleged reason that it was inimical to workingmen's interest was unanimously adopted by the Central Union. A strike will be ordered to-morrow on a number of buildings where non-union men are employed.

The Western Railroad War. CHICAGO, August 25.—The Chicago and Atlantic have met the cut rate of \$20 from Chicago to Buffalo and return, and have announced \$19 as round trip rate to Chautauque.

An Indian Quarrel. FORT BURD, Mont., August 25.—There is great excitement over a fight at Little Muddy, between Cree and Grosvenor Indians. Many were wounded. The former stole horses from the latter and are in pursuit of the thieves.

THE DEAD COUNT DE CHAMBOURD. Laying in State. FROHSBORO, August 25.—The body of Count de Chambord lies in evening dress decorated with the Grand Cordons of the Order of the Holy Spirit. The hands are folded over the breast. In one of them is a crucifix. Wax tapers burn at the head of the corpse. The first Chamberlain of the Emperor Francis Joseph will be present when the will is opened. As the deceased enjoyed ex-territorial rights he was not a subject to the ordinary laws of Austria. As soon as the news of his death was known the inhabitants of the villages around Frohsdorf thronged to the chateau where they attended mass. Telegrams of condolence poured in all yesterday.

European Opinion. LONDON, August 25.—The News says Count de Chambord's death, like his life, will not affect French politics.

Condolences of the Pope. FROHSBORO, August 26.—When Chambord was dying his confessor exclaimed, "Ascend to Heaven, son of St. Louis." Count de Chambord left a large legacy to the Pope. The latter has telegraphed his condolences.

The Future of the Party. PARIS, August 25.—Le Francaise, Conservative, says the Comte de Paris, conforming to tradition, will relinquish the title of the Orleans family and assume that of the House of Bourbon. It adds, "The royalists are neither divided nor scattered. The two parties of Conservative France will henceforth be united. The future is no longer doubtful. We are certain a transition will occur. The constitution permits us to look forward and strive for a reason."

Will Open. VIENNA, August 25.—Count de Chambord's will was opened on Friday. Nothing was found referring to the political wishes of the deceased.

Preparing for the Funeral. VIENNA, August 26.—The funeral of the Count de Chambord will be the occasion of a grand Legitimist demonstration. The coffin will be made of glass and the hearse drawn by six white horses. All the members of the Bourbon and Orleans branches of the Count's party will attend.

Requiem in Paris. PARIS, August 23.—Requiem masses were celebrated throughout the city to-day, for the repose of the soul of the Count de Chambord. Legitimists will go into six months mourning.

French Government and Orleansists. PARIS, August 26.—The council of ministers to-day discussed the adoption of measures against the Orleansists, and decided to take no action unless necessary.

A PRESIDENT'S DANGER. Alleged Plot to Kidnap President Arthur at the Yellowstone. OGDEN, Utah, August 25.—Considerable excitement exists here over a report in the Times that a party of cowboys have started for Yellowstone Park to kidnap President Arthur, and Sheriff Farry has detailed two trustworthy deputies to look the matter up with instructions to summon a strong posse to arrest the kidnapers if the facts are as stated. The Times says: "During the past two weeks numbers of strangers well provided with good riding animals, fire arms, resembling party regulators or Texas cowboys, have been camped on Willow Creek. Considerable curiosity was expressed as to their intentions, some accounting for their outfit as a party organized to go to the Indian country on a prospecting trip. During several days past some of the party have ridden through the town in a defiant manner, and have seriously disappeared. From a man who came in to-day it is learned that the party who induced him to join and make certain pledges of secrecy were organized to proceed to Yellowstone Park. They left last night going on the stage road and escaped during the night. The object of the expedition is to coral and capture President Arthur and party and spirit them away into a mountain fastness and caves where they will be fed but kept prisoner while members of the party act as pickets to prevent being surprised and captured while negotiations for ransom are conducted. The captain or leader of the party has an idea that a heavy ransom will be offered by the personal friends of the President after the capture. The President's party shall be given up and that half a million dollars or more can thus be extorted from the secret service fund and divided among the party on the principle adopted by Italian Banditti. An escaped member of the party says that there are 65 men in the outfit. Some were guerrillas in the late war and five wild Soshone and Banack Indians go along as guides and are armed with repeating rifles and scalping knives. The leader is a Texas desperado, on whose head a price has been set, and with the exception of two Italians, who left a railroad grade, the others of the party are cowboys. A grand council was held the night before last on the prairie, where every man swore by his dagger in the firelight to do his duty."

BOSTON HOLOCAUST. Five Persons Burned and Many Injured—Suspected Incendiarism. BOSTON, August 26.—A fire broke out this morning in a two-story tenement in Thatcher's Court, occupied by eight families, and spread with frightful rapidity. Before the fire was under control four were smothered and one fatally injured by jumping. The killed are George and Thomas McLaughlin, 14 and 11, Mrs. Fred Savage, Katie and Mamie Savage. The cries for help from the persons imprisoned amid the flames were heartrending, but the people outside could do nothing. The fire was subdued in less than an hour. The promptness and vigor of the firemen saved the neighboring houses, which are mostly wooden. John McLaughlin, wife and six children, occupied the front tenement and attic. Fred Savage, wife and two girls, one of the rear tenements. The four McLaughlins' children were asleep on the attic, and himself, wife and two girls, down stairs, and Savage's wife and two children in another attic. John Savage first discovered the fire, and giving the alarm, sprang from the window, thirty feet. He had his leg injured. McLaughlin, awakened by the cries, saved his wife and the girls succeeded in bringing down two of his boys. In a second attempt to return they were driven back by the flames. Little George McLaughlin was aroused and reached the roof. A canvas was spread in the street below and he was rescued by his father by jumping into his arms. The boy jumped, but missed the canvas and is fatally injured. His mother, crazed with anguish, attempted three times to enter the burning building to save the other boy and received such injuries that she is not expected to live. Mrs. Fred Savage and her children were

suffocated and the bodies found where they slept. The fire started in Savage's apartments, and is believed to have been caused by a kerosene lamp which evidence obtainable indicates was thrown by John Savage, who had been boarding with a brother, at Fred or by the latter at John. It is thought also that John McIntosh, who had trouble with Savage brothers, may have had a hand in causing the fire. It is known he visited the Savages during the night. McIntosh denies he was there. John Flynn, who slept near Savage's, states that just before the fire he heard some one cry, "For God's sake don't throw that lamp." McIntosh and the two Savages have been arrested.

The arrested men told contradictory stories, and there is little doubt that they were intoxicated and engaged in a row when the fire caught and one of them is responsible for it.

THE GREAT CYCLONE. Remedy the Ravages of the Blast. ROCHESTER, Minnesota, August 25.—Governor Hubbard yesterday made an excursion about the ruins and suggested that the relief committee prepare 5000 circulars. The circulars are written and will be sent to all parts of the state. It recites the details of the loss by the cyclone, that 135 dwellings were destroyed in Rochester and the buildings on about forty farms. The business men of the city are all heavy losers and cannot do as much as they would for the sufferers. The relief committee rooms are crowded with applicants for provisions and shelter. It is estimated that 150 families in the city and fifty in the country are destitute, or 500 persons who require to be almost supported by charity for some days or weeks. About 200 were fed yesterday at the committee's lodge, besides meals sent out. The committee have determined to rebuild rough houses to be occupied by the sufferers by the storm. These will cost at least eighty and will cost from \$150 to \$200 each. The railways will transport the lumber free. Sixteen carloads have already been ordered. A call will be issued, offering employment to hundreds of carpenters and masons. Meanwhile homeless families will be provided for in warehouses, although some sleep in the open air. The death toll for Rochester is 20; in Byron; two in Havelland, and two in Merriam. A mangled tramp was found south of the town yesterday. He will die. Other deaths reported are: at Salem, John Liller, John Anderson, Mrs. Mulda; at St. Charles, Jop Sherrington and Mrs. Wells. At the impoverished hospital 39 patients are doing fairly well although two deaths are expected.

Two More Deaths. ROCHESTER, Minn., Aug. 26.—Twenty-five thousand has been contributed to the relief of the cyclone sufferers but the funds are still inadequate. A hundred and fifty destitute are relying on outsiders to shelter them. Two more victims died to-day.

South Eastern Railway Statement by Mr. Barlow. ST. ALBANS, August 26.—Hon. Bradley Barlow says the New Jersey Syndicate has decided to purchase the South Eastern Road at a sum sufficient to pay the total indebtedness of the road, about \$3,500,000, providing the claims of the creditors can be purchased. The attitude of the Canadian Pacific will determine the matter.

Poisoned Cattle in Boston. BOSTON, August 26.—Five imported cattle, Government Quarantine, have died and a large number are seriously sick of the effect of poison maliciously administered.
