

HEAVY LOSSES AT PORT ARTHUR

General Stoessel Reports on the Recent Severe Fighting. St. Petersburg, Oct. 5.—Lieut.-General Stoessel, commander of the Russian military forces at Port Arthur, says the Japanese losses were 10,000 during the attacks on Port Arthur from Sept. 19 to Sept. 22. He reports that no incident occurred from Sept. 23 to Sept. 30, excepting outpost skirmishing.

General Stoessel adds that practically nothing remained of the waterworks redoubts when the surviving Russians evacuated them. The last Japanese attack to which General Stoessel refers was on a hill called High Mountain, south of Inthan (Etze Shan, or Mountain).

Situation at the Front. St. Petersburg, Oct. 5.—The military critics at St. Petersburg share in the general uncertainty as to how to size up the situation at the front. Field Marshal Oyama makes his anticipated advance. They seem to agree that a strong screening movement is in progress immediately east of Liao-Yang, that probably a feint will be made from the west, that the tactics of the Japanese at Liao-Yang will be repeated and that General Kuropatkin will try a wide flanking movement from the east.

Some of the critics point out that the conditions at Port Arthur may force a change of Oyama's plan of campaign. The continued failure of the attacks on the fortress and the enormous losses sustained by the besiegers, they think, may compel Oyama to despatch some veteran troops from the Manchurian army to Gen. Nodzu's support, as the reinforcements arriving at Port Arthur are mostly reserve men.

In the meantime Gen. Kuropatkin is receiving reinforcements, especially artillery. Nevertheless all the experts express great doubt whether Kuropatkin contemplates more than a passive resistance at Mukden, where, they say, the geographical conditions are unfavorable for a defense. It is considered significant that the Japanese generally agree that the Pass is a better position, both for defense and offense.

Story is Not Credited. Tokio, Oct. 5.—The Navy Department credits the report that the Russian cruisers, Rossia, Grombol and Bogatyr have been routed by the Japanese. It is stated that the Japanese Government has determined to place contracts for some twenty warships to be completed at a date as early as possible; the greater number of these ships to be constructed in this country.

San Francisco, Oct. 5.—From information received in San Francisco by prominent Japanese it is evidently the purpose of Japan to take immediate steps toward increasing her fighting efficiency to a very considerable degree. It is stated that the Japanese Government has determined to place contracts for some twenty warships to be completed at a date as early as possible; the greater number of these ships to be constructed in this country.

Japs Recruiting Chinese. St. Petersburg, Oct. 5.—A special despatch from Mukden, under date of Oct. 4 says: A regular recruiting service has been organized at Port Arthur, consisting of what is known as the "Chinese volunteer militia." The Japanese are assisted in this work by Liu Sen, a prince of the Chinese Imperial household. The men are paid by the Japanese, but not armed by them with the Japanese modern rifles. They use, instead, old muskets of enormous caliber. The Russians have come in contact with them several times and their bravery is incontestable.

SIR WILFRID WILL SPEAK AT QUEBEC TO-NIGHT. Magnificent Demonstration Will be Accorded Him—Political Situation in Quebec. Quebec, October 5. (Special.)—Sir Wilfrid Laurier is busily engaged in the organization of this district. His rooms in the Chateau Frontenac are constantly filled with political visitors, and the Premier is endeavoring to arrange all his engagements here by to-night, so that he can leave for his western tour in the morning.

It is rumored that Mr. Demers, the sitting member for Levis, will not present himself for re-election on account of ill health, and Mr. Louis Frechette, the founder of Liberalism in the county, will resign his position as clerk of the Legislative Council and be succeeded by Mr. Malouin. Mr. Malouin will seek re-election in Quebec Centre and be returned by a large majority. Mr. Wm. Power, member for Charlevoix, has already named on his requisition paper enough to assure his re-election.

The demonstration to be accorded Sir Wilfrid Laurier to-night by his electors and friends at Quebec will be a magnificent one. The Premier will be escorted from the Club Canadienne, where he will dine later in the evening, to the Jacques Cartier hall, where the mass meeting will be held.

JURY RETURN VERDICT ON EASTWOOD WRECK. Woodstock, Ont., Oct. 5. (Special.)—The inquest into the cause of the railway disaster at Eastwood on Wednesday morning last was concluded yesterday. Twelve witnesses were examined, and the evidence brought out by the "brakeman" Benedict, of the first train, had opened his switch back to out, and he and Conductor Falls had neglected to put up the semaphore against the freight following, with the result that the second freight crashed into the siding before the first could pull out.

Evidence was tendered showing that the brakeman, fireman and engineer had been on continuous duty thirty-six hours. The jury's verdict named no one as being responsible, stating that some member of the crew had left the switch open. They recommended the employees be given more rest, and urged the adoption of a better signal service.

Coroner Dr. McEay intimated that had Brakeman Benedict been living the evidence would justify the indictment against him for manslaughter.

MR. AYLESWORTH ENTERS CABINET

The New Minister. Hon. Allen Bristol Aylesworth, K.C., was born at Newburgh, Ont., November 29th, 1834. He was educated at the Newburgh High School, passing there to Toronto University, where he distinguished himself, taking his B.A. in 1874, in which year he was also Prince's prizeman.

During his career at the Bar Mr. Aylesworth has acted as counsel in many important actions, notably the libel suit of the Countess d'Arvy against the Toronto World in 1897. He is a member of the Ontario Bar Association and the Law Society of Upper Canada, and a senator of Toronto University.

Showing Statesman's Qualities. It was not, however, until last year that Mr. Aylesworth stepped into the public field as more than a lawyer, but a statesman, by his course as a member of the Arbitration Committee appointed to settle the dispute between Canada and the U.S. regarding the demarcation of the Alaska boundary.

On Mr. Aylesworth's return to Canada after the unfortunate ending of the arbitration, his course was marked by equal wisdom. Great efforts were made to secure from him public statements, criticizing the action of the commission but although he was fettered on all sides his public utterances on this delicate subject were conspicuous examples of prudent patriotism.

From that time to this Mr. Aylesworth has given to his country's service, and from time to time rumors of his appointment to the Ontario or Dominion cabinet have been published. Mr. Aylesworth has pondered long before he took the final step, knowing that it would be an arduous one, but he has decided to accept the position.

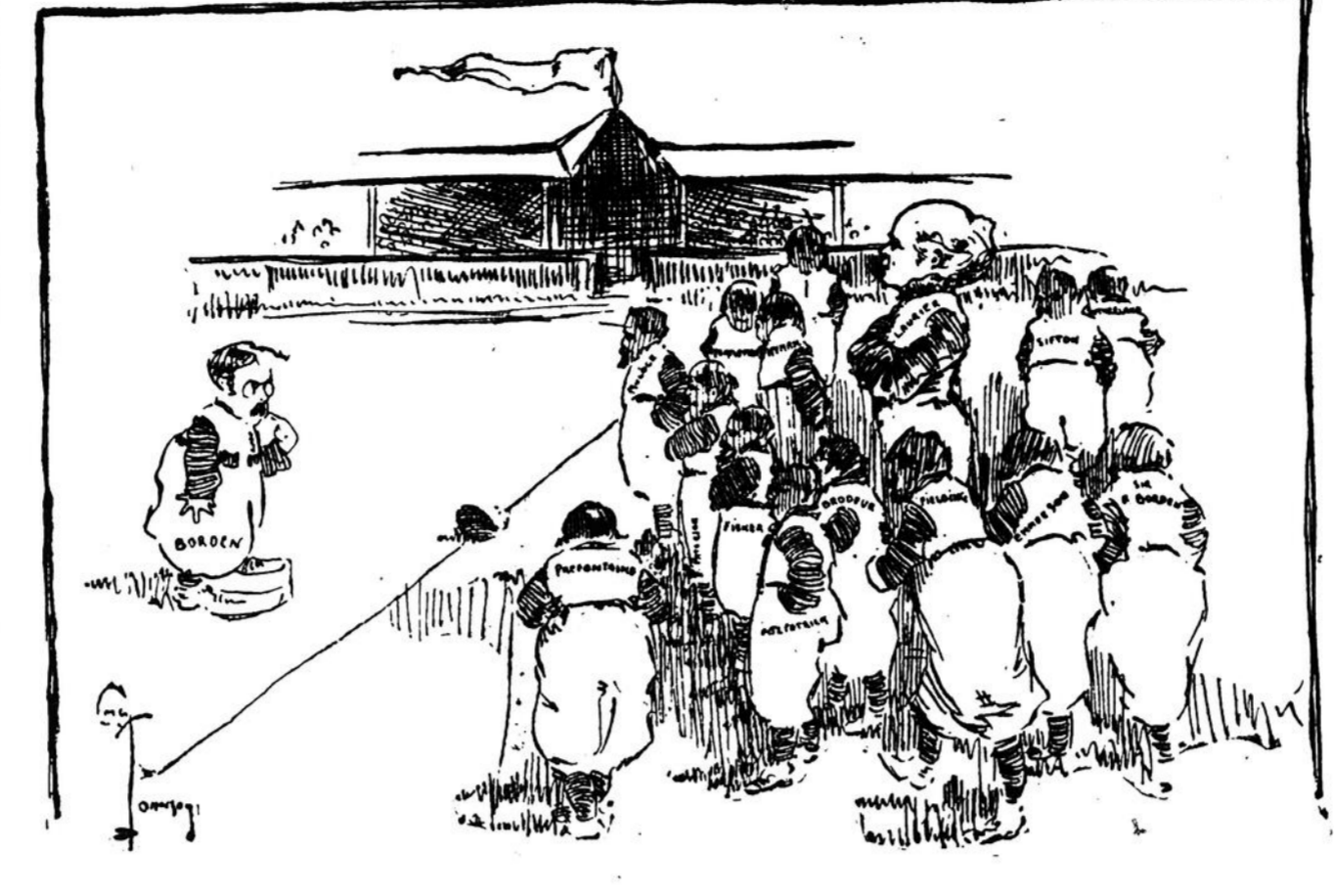

CITY'S FUNDS COULD BE INCREASED WITHOUT ADDITIONAL TAXATION

Ald. L. A. Lavallee Comes Forward With Scheme to Add to City's Borrowing Power, Basing the Addition Upon Increase in Value of Real Estate.

The fact that during the past six years the city of Montreal has seldom used the entire borrowing power which is granted to it by legislative enactment has suggested to Ald. L. A. Lavallee an elaborate scheme whereby the city's revenue could be increased.

The question of increasing the annual revenue is being much talked over at the City Hall at present, and especially after the declaration of Ald. Vallieres, chairman of the Finance Committee, that Montreal is by no means highly taxed. Montreal property owners pay only one per cent, on the assessed value of their real estate holdings, which is a very low rate.

By the present law the debt is 17.67 per cent, an improvement on the state of affairs which existed in 1898 and 1900. Why should we deprive our generation of the improvements which we can afford by these means in order to gratify the whims of a few men?

Those who remained in the field to the end of the war absolutely refuse to have anything to do with those who surrendered and will not even shake hands with them. It

WOULD REPLACE ELECTRIC PUMP

The John McDougall Co. Submit Another Offer.

At the Water Committee meeting yesterday afternoon, the John McDougall Company offered to replace the electric pump at the McTavish Street station with a turbine pump, and move the electric pump to the low level station for the sum of \$28,300. The offer, in its present form, was declined, and Chairman Clearhouse was authorized to interview the firm on the matter. The pump which would be installed at the McTavish Street station is known as the Worthington patented multi-stage electric driven pump with a capacity of five million imperial gallons in twenty-four hours. The letter of the John McDougall Co. says in part: "In the event of the Worthington turbine pump, which we will install at the McTavish Street station, not proving reasonably satisfactory on that

make," said Mr. Macfadden. DON'T GIVE INDISCRIMINATELY. Charity Organization Society Asks the Public to Refer Beggars to its Office and Discourage Pauperism.

The Charity Organization Society called the attention of its members and of the citizens of Montreal to the nuisance that especially appears in the autumn of people begging from door to door in the residential portions of our city. A large percentage of these beggars if encouraged will in time be dependents of the worst type. The society suggests that the charitable inclinations of the citizens be directed to the office—Main 142—and ask for the history of the party, or refer them directly to 98 Bleury Street, where they will receive proper attention. The remedy of this evil rests primarily with the citizens themselves, for neither the city officials nor the charitable agencies can adequately protect our city so that it may be entirely free from this nuisance.

Wickenden, the well-known artist, will give an address on the "Barbizon School of Painting," illustrated with original paintings by Millet, Corot, Rousseau, and Daubigny; Jan. 18 will be the official visit of the Grand Regent and his staff of officers; Feb. 15, Mr. Geo. Murray, F.R.S.C., will read a paper on "Sidney Smith," and on March 15, Dr. Robert Wilson will give a lecture on "The Mystery of the X-ray Machine." There are also smokings, euchres and identification meetings. The winter season promises to be a busy one for this progressive and up-to-date council of the Royal Arcanum.

TUBERCULOSIS CONGRESS. St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 5.—Preventative legislation was the subject which opened the discussion at the second day's session of the international Congress of Tuberculosis. The speakers told of ways and means that might be enforced through legislation for the prevention of the infection and spread of consumption and dealt with legislation compelling cities and national governments to closely inspect not only public buildings and vehicles of transportation, but also tenement districts and schools. It was also advanced that beneficial results would be attained by the segregation of the tubercular insane in asylums and hospitals.

Leading Figures in Panama Controversy.

New York, Oct. 5.—"The United States is great and powerful and Panama is a young and much weaker republic, but does this mean that the Washington administration shall be the judge, jury and the whole court?" This comment was made by Senator J. D. O'Rourke, Panama Minister to the United States, in discussing the statement that a movement had been started in Panama to protest to the Hague

tribunal against alleged oppressions by the American Government on the Isthmus. Further than this Minister O'Rourke would only say that he had filed with the State Department an exposition of the alleged violations of the treaty by the United States in taking up authority in the Canal Zone. Dr. Eusebio A. Morales, former Minister of State, at Panama, and now a member of the Fiscal Commission of that Government, who is in this coun-

try as legal adviser to the Panama Legation, said he had already advised President Amador to appeal to The Hague Tribunal unless some satisfaction was forthcoming from the administration in Washington. "Speaking for himself alone," said Dr. Morales, "I think this step on the part of Panama is entirely justified. In response to our repeated protests to the Washington Government we have never received the slightest promise that the evils we complain of shall be stopped."

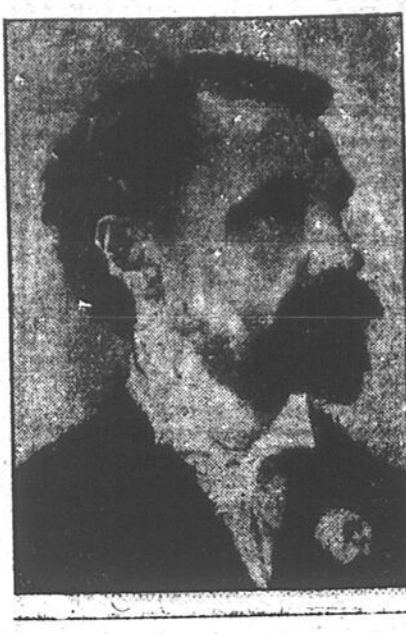

LIBERAL CANDIDATES.

Charles Arthur Gauvreau, B.A., Seigneur, author, and member of the Commons for Temiscouata, was born in this constituency, at St. Jean Baptiste, Ile Verte, in 1860, son of L. N. Gauvreau, Esq., N.P., and nephew of Sir N. F. Belleau, first Lieutenant-Governor of Quebec. He was educated at Rimouski and Laval, and studied law with Messrs. Laurier, Lavergne & Cote. He is a superior Court Commissioner, and has held several municipal offices in Arthabaska. He was elected to Parliament by acclamation on the death of C. E. Pouliot, in 1897. In 1900 he defeated the Conservative candidate, P. E. Grandbois, for many years member, by 512. Among Mr. Gauvreau's works are a "History of Ile Verte" and "Les Epreuves d'un Orphelin."



CONSERVATIVES FEEL DISCOURAGED.

Moncton, N.B., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—The cancellation of the meetings throughout New Brunswick, arranged by Messrs. E. P. Clarke and Hon. T. Chase Casgrain, has generally discouraged all local Conservative efforts. Every Liberal party is organizing in every direction. A nominating convention will be held at the Opera House here on Saturday afternoon next. There is only one Liberal candidate in Westmoreland. There is neither discussion nor rivalry, the convention is only a matter of form, and it is certain that Hon. Henry Emerson will be the unanimous choice. It is not yet known who will be the Conservative candidate. The Conservative convention will be held on Thursday at Sackville during exhibition. It is understood that Mr. Powell is not particularly anxious to run, nor are his supporters bubbling with overconfidence. In the event of Mr. Powell declining the nomination, Messrs. F. W. 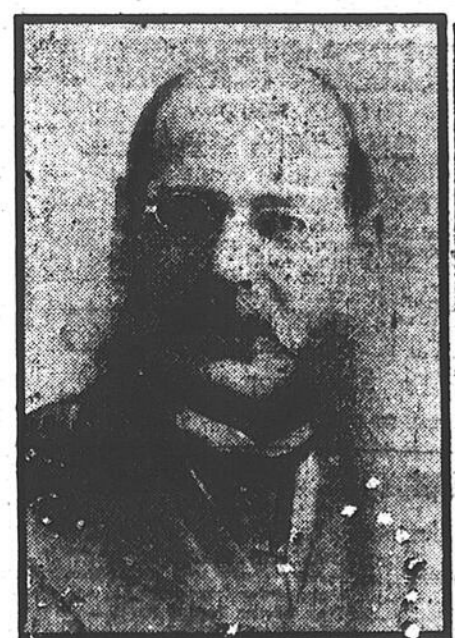
MAY SURPRISE THE PREMIER.

THE METEORITE IN FRONT OF THE AMERICAN MUSEUM OF NATURAL HISTORY.

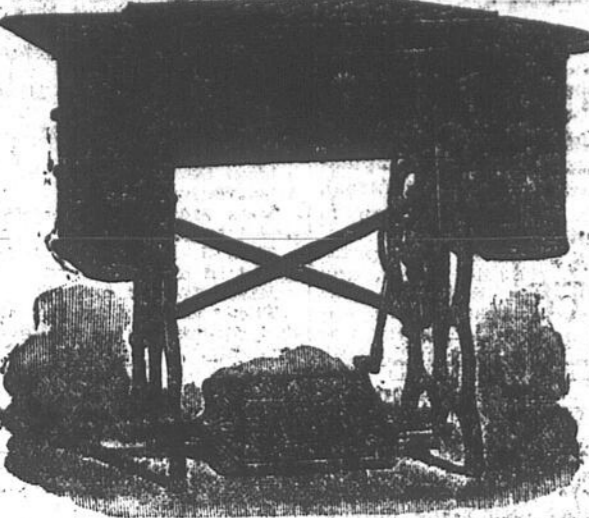
New York, Oct. 5.—Scores of scientists and hundreds of other curious persons watched with interest the placing of the huge ninety-ton Peary meteorite on a concrete pedestal in the grounds of the Museum of Natural History.

The artist who accompanied Robert E. Peary on two of his arctic expeditions, and who made many sketches of the meteorite as it was being excavated, for pocket knives, cold chisels and crowbars failed to make the slightest impression upon its surface.

The meteorite, as it appears to the casual observer, might be taken for a massive copper-colored bowlder. Closer inspection shows it to be a solid mass of iron. When the outside coating of a corrosive formation is removed it polishes as bright as the purest steel, and is the hardest iron known.

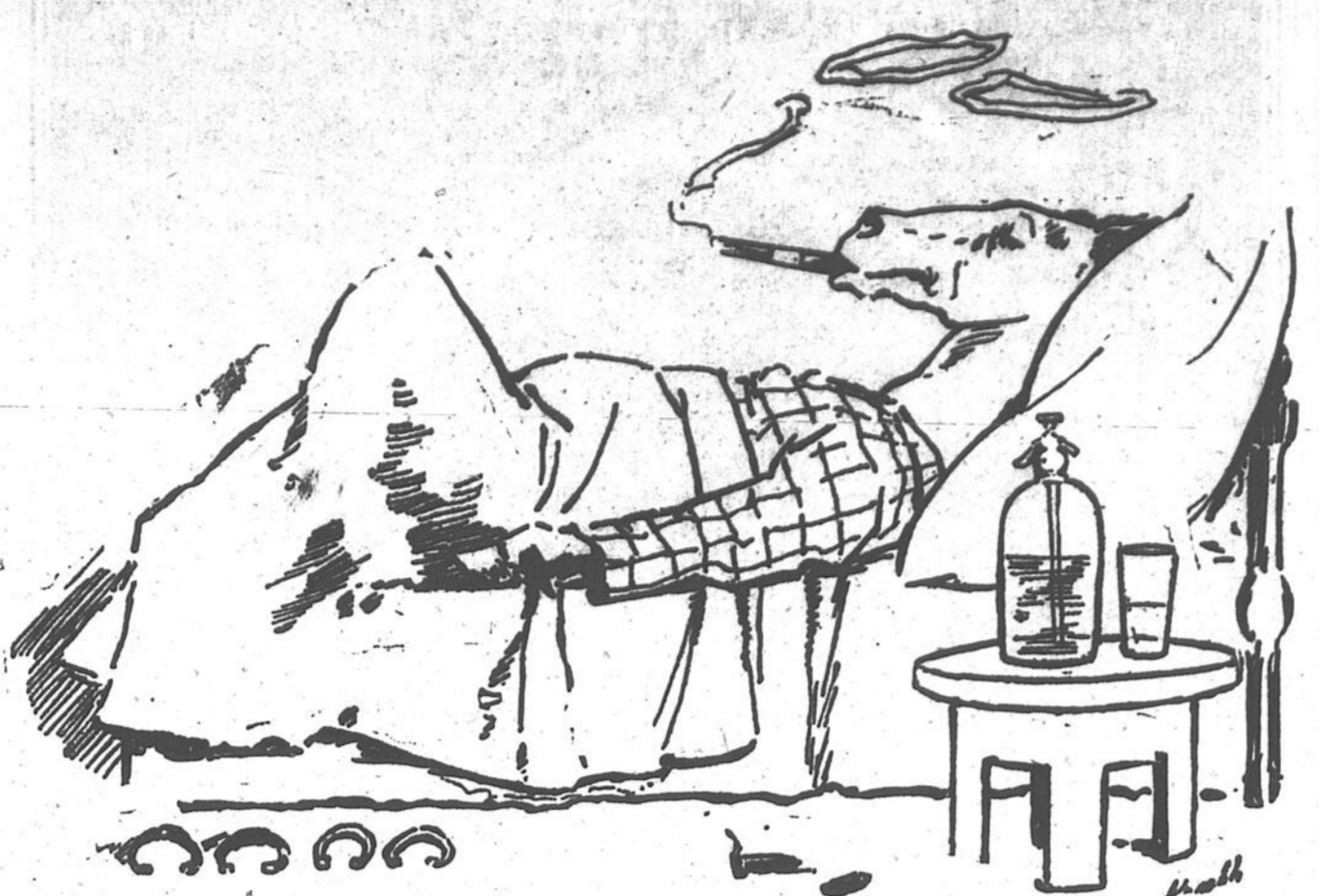

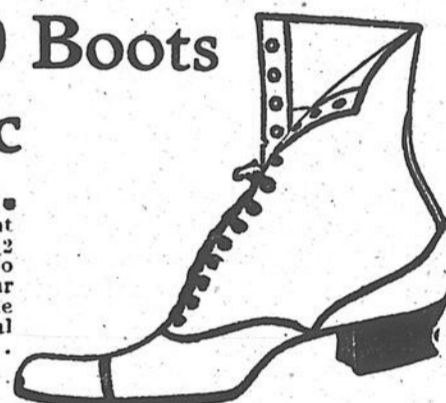
