The Montreal Stock Market.

The market opened somewhat firmer this morning, but a comparatively small business was effected. The Bull party would advance the market if this could be done without accumulating more stock, but on any bona-fide offers of stock the bidding process is abandoned. The Bears are doing nothing and the commission business, either to buy or sell, is very small.

The operators that really make a good market are men who, having made more than average profits in their own legitimate business, are willing to risk a part of this profit in outside transactions. Unfortunately, at the moment, no extraordinary profits are being made and speculation remains entirely with the professionals.

Montreal was offered at 192 and 191, with 190 and 191 bid. It closed at 191 and 192 bid. Ontario opened at 115 asked and 111 bid. Sellers dropped to 113, and buyers advanced to 114. Financial Notes.

The money markets here and in London are unchanged.

At the rates ruled 1, 1, and 1 1/2 per cent. Cable advices quote consols advanced to-day. They opened at 100 1/16 for money and 100 1/16 for the account, and closed at 100 1/16 for the former and 100 1/16 for the latter. United States 4 1/2 per cent bonds were unchanged at 115 1/2. American railway securities, with the exception of Erie which advanced 1/2 per cent to 16 1/2, were unchanged. New York Central being 105 1/2, and Illinois Central 125 1/2. Canadian Pacific was also unchanged, being 46 1/2. In the New York Stock Market Canadian Pacific closed at 45, being 1/2 per cent better than yesterday.

SALE OF THE "GLOBE."

For some days past rumors have been rife here and in the West, to the effect that Mr. Duncan McIntyre had secured the control of the Toronto *Globe* newspaper by the purchase, at forty cents on the dollar, of the stock held by Mr. Nelson, of Edinburgh, brother-in-law of the late George Brown. The *Globe*, in its issue of Wednesday, under the heading of "Tributes to the *Globe*," instead of confirming or contradicting this report, takes great pains to tell its readers that the Nelson stock has not been sold to "the Canadian Pacific Railway," a statement which nobody has made, so far as we are aware. It is to be hoped, in the interests of the Liberal party as well as of the public generally, that the reported purchase by Mr. McIntyre, which the *Globe* does not deny, is true. Mr. McIntyre has been an active and staunch Reformer all his life, and there is nothing unlikely in his making an effort to rescue the old organ of his party from the clutches of a ring of speculators and wreckers, and to restore it to the position it held in the days when George Brown guided it and it had the confidence and support of Alexander Mackenzie.

The *Globe* winds up its evasive denial of its purchase by the C. P. R. by a fresh declaration of its independence, which very few will believe. The *Globe*, as everybody knows, has for the last few years been the humble servant of the Grand Trunk Railway, no doubt, for ample consideration. If its managers wish to enlighten the public on this bit of internal economy, they might explain the relations of two of their Directors with the Grand Trunk.

One thing from all this is clear—that the *Globe* is for sale; and it is equally clear, that if Mr. McIntyre has not bought it, he may do so, although we should think forty per cent. a high price in these times for a non-dividend paying stock.

A SHARP CONTRAST.

The Toronto *Globe* repeatedly declared that for hundreds of miles along the Canadian Pacific Railway the land was absolutely worthless. It has been demonstrated that this land is not worthless, but valuable. The *Globe* maintains that its original opinion is correct, and only a few days ago, in the face of the most convincing evidence to the contrary, it declared that time would prove that it was right.

Hon. Alexander Mackenzie at one time entertained the opinion that these lands were poor, and he said so publicly. He has just visited the country for himself; he has passed over these lands; he has examined the crops produced on them, and he has frankly intimated to those with whom he has conversed his change of opinion. From those about Mr. Mackenzie the Winnipeg *Sun* learned that:—

All the experimental farms with perhaps one exception were visited. A special point was made of examining the farms deemed to be the poorest. On no farm visited were the crops found to be inferior. The opinion which Mr. Mackenzie had early formed of the country west of Moosejaw was therefore revoked as he witnessed a proof against his early belief. Of course, not being aware to what extent early frosts might interfere with the crops he could not speak with authority as to the prospects, but as to the adaptability of the land, there was no question but it would grow excellent crops.

There is something mainly in the attitude of a public man who, convinced that he had been in error—who, of course, had relied on the statements of others and had been misled—is not afraid or ashamed to avow his mistake. It is no disgrace to a public man in a public journal to blunder in regard to matters of fact, and especially in respect to matters relating, at the time, to a comparatively unknown country; and it is no sign of weakness to admit a fuller knowledge of the subject and the formation of a more correct judgment. This is precisely what Mr. Mackenzie has done and the people of Canada will think all the more of him because of the manliness of this avowal. In sharp contrast to Mr. Mackenzie's conduct is that of the *Globe*, which not only repudiates the testimony of hundreds, even thousands, of disinterested parties, but is also found repudiating the reports of its own special correspondents sent out to examine and report upon the land in question.

THEY CHOOSE PLENTY.

In the course of some sensible reflections on the probability of wheat ruling low this fall and winter, the Winnipeg *Free Press* remarks:—

This is not a very cheering conclusion, it must be confessed, but the general situation is not without its consoling features. In the first place the abundance which brings prices so low is in itself

an advantage. It is better for the farmer in the North-West or any where else to have two bushels to dispose of at 70 cents per bushel than one bushel at a dollar. Under the present conditions of supply and demand, the world over, abundance of wheat and good prices in any particular country are very unlikely to be seen at the same time. If a choice has to be made between the two abundance would certainly be asked for, as that will be likely to bring compensation in some form for low prices.

There is another consideration growing out of an abundant crop which should not be overlooked. When the crop is a partial failure, there is a large proportion of the farming population that has nothing to sell—no surplus. When the barns and granaries are crowded, as they are and will be in Canada this fall, the farmer has something to dispose of, something to turn into ready money; and so from hundreds of thousands of points all over the country, there will pass out small sums of money to be distributed among the shopkeepers and tradesmen and mechanics of the Dominion, eventually to reach the banks, thence to be hired out again to keep in motion the vast commercial and industrial machinery. A failure of crops is the greatest blow this country can sustain. An abundant harvest is the greater blessing, whether prices rule high or only moderately so.

NEW COMPETITORS IN THE FIELD.

The following facts taken from *Bradstreet's* will convey some idea of the intensity of the competition which the United States and Canada are meeting in the English market for meats and dairy products:—

"Australia and New Zealand promise to be the only serious competitors with this country in the English market for the supply of fresh meat. The direct shipment of beef and mutton, especially the latter, from the Antipodes to Great Britain, has attained large proportions, and is susceptible of indefinite development. Mutton is the favorite item of export. New Zealand does not export beef and Australia does, but its quality is inferior to American carcasses. Queensland, however, is forcing its fresh beef in Batavia and other eastern points, displacing American canned meats. In England New Zealand mutton sells readily at 5½d per pound, Australian mutton ranging from a half-penny to a penny per pound lower.

"Shipments of fresh mutton from Buenos Ayres to London have recently been made, 3d. per pound being the top price; but Argentine sheep-raisers say it will pay to sell it at that price. We should say it would, inasmuch as heretofore sheep and cattle on the pampas of South America were only valuable for their wool, pelts, horns and hoofs. Now that the flesh has a market value for export, the net result is just so much money added to the producers' profits. And here it should be noted that numerous experienced sheep-raisers, having command of large capital, recently emigrated from New Zealand to the Argentine Republic, to engage in pastoral pursuits there. These men will introduce new methods, and tend, by their example, to develop the meat export trade of South America.

"But these are not the only heads under which the Australian colonies are competing with the United States in England. Butter and cheese are being shipped on a considerable scale from New Zealand to the London market. A sample of one hundred casks of butter, put up in rolls, was sent to London recently, and sold in Leadenhall market at 103s. per cwt., or 11d. (22c.) per pound. It made the voyage, in prime condition, in refrigerating chambers at a uniform temperature of 38°. Co-operative dairying has been established on the American plan, and the export of dairy products to London will steadily grow. Two lines of fast steel steamships ply between New Zealand and London direct. These vessels are fitted up with refrigerators, and carry merchandise and passengers. The facts stated are not only of interest to American farmers, but of the highest importance also, as showing them the widening area of competition in lines heretofore believed to be a practical monopoly for this country. Cheapness of production, rapid transport, and prime quality will, of course, always give the advantage to the United States and probably to Canada also."

The men who in these days do not study what is transpiring in commercial and industrial circles in all quarters of the globe are apt to miscalculate sadly. The march of development in new countries, and the slower but steady progress of the older nations, are factors in the commercial situation which cannot be overlooked or forgotten for a day.

A GOOD SUGGESTION.

The *Star* of last evening published the following communication:—

Sir,—The Public Library bill should be kept rolling. I would suggest that without further delay we should take steps to get Mr. J. T. Bulmer, of Halifax, who, I understand, is now in town, to give us an estimate of the requirements, best methods to employ, etc. Than Mr. Bulmer, who is known far and wide, no man in this country knows the public library subject better. He has been instrumental in establishing and equipping several. He knows what is wanted and how to do it. He is thoroughly public spirited on the subject, a public benefactor in fact in this respect, as many communities in this province can testify. If Mr. Bulmer can be secured to give us a statement of his experience and views they will be of great service. I enclose my card.

Mr. Bulmer, we are glad to find, is appreciated wherever he is known. In the Maritime Provinces he was instrumental in organizing historical societies in Hal-

ifax, N.S., Fredericton, N.B., and Charlottetown, P. E. I. Mr. Bulmer collected for the Historical Society at Halifax 10,000 works a year, having at the end of two and a half years a library of 25,000 titles, which cost the Society nothing. The library of this Society having been amalgamated with the Legislative Library of Nova Scotia, Mr. Bulmer became Librarian of the latter. By his untiring energies as a collector, he swelled the catalogue immensely, and made the Library, next to that at Ottawa, the largest in Canada. He was engaged by the governors of Dalhousie University to found a law library, and in a year Mr. Bulmer collected 5,000 law books for the institution without costing it a cent. The faculty will this year engage him to take charge of the whole University library, and to found for the institution a library in keeping with the resources of one of the richest educational corporations in Canada. (Dalhousie University gives away \$10,000 a year in scholarships and bursaries to poor young men.) With such a record it is not surprising that Mr. Bulmer's fame as a successful librarian and book collector has reached this city where he has lately spent a few days as a member of the British Association, honored with the friendship of the leading spirits of that body.

CORRESPONDENCE.

The Public Library Question.

To the Editor of THE HERALD.

Mr. Abbott's letter respecting the Fraser Institute will be welcomed by all who have at heart the intellectual progress of Montreal. There has been a very general impression that the Fraser bequest was in some way still hampered by legal entanglements, and unavailable for the purposes for which it was intended. Those who have had this impression will be glad to learn that the way is now clear to carry on the good work.

The general interest felt at present in the question of a Public Library, which has undoubtedly been stimulated by the meeting just closed, would indicate that the time is ripe for a great stride towards accomplishing the end in view. Nothing is now wanted but money, and Mr. Ferrier's statement at the closing meeting yesterday would indicate that that need not stand in the way much longer.

But I think we are in danger of dividing our forces, and wasting our strength; all of which is needed. For this reason I trespass on your space.

If money were no object, the site on Dorchester street bought by Mr. Abbott would be the very best to be had in the city—central, quiet, convenient in every respect. But money is decidedly an object, and it seems to me that the \$20,000 which the land on Dorchester street represents might do infinitely more service if it were employed in enlarging the library or in the purchase of books, than in the purchase of the site.

McGill College possesses a magnificent piece of ground, also well located, although not so central as the High School corner. A large part of this ground at present serves no purpose beyond that of ornament, and securing a quiet seclusion for the University. Why should not the authorities grant a lease at nominal rent, of sufficient land on the south-east corner of their grounds for the erection of a proper building or series of buildings by the Fraser Institute. If McGill College will so aid the Fraser Institute, and will divert to it as far as possible donations of books and money intended for the extension of library facilities, it will do much to recruit its own ranks. The general improvement in the intellectual tone of the city, which would result from throwing open a great library, would inevitably increase largely the number of graduates at McGill. This was strongly urged by many of our English visitors in the recent discussions of the matter.

In this connection I may add that there is a very general opinion, not, I think, without foundation, that McGill does not take the place it should as a centre of social and intellectual activity. Not to speak now of the influence such a body should have socially, i.e., in the improvement of the intellectual tone of society, it is apparent that many channels of public instruction are unopened. The University possesses large buildings, suitable halls for lectures, apparatus for the study of the sciences, but chiefest, men who are competent to instruct their fellowmen. These are no doubt well employed in all the direct work of the University, but they should influence a larger constituency. Let McGill take example by the English colleges and make herself a centre for scientific and literary life, not for her own students and members merely, but for the community in which she is placed.

There is no city in England of the same importance as Montreal which possesses so little of what may be called the machinery of popular education.

What with local college foundations, local university examinations, and the courses of lectures established by the University of Cambridge at various points, there is probably no place of importance in England where those seeking knowledge cannot find it. Why should we be so much worse off? There are among us men, I may say, of all ranks, whose days are given to their various employments, but who would be only too glad to avail themselves of opportunities such as those mentioned. Their number is possibly not very large, but what then? All the more reason that a body founded for the promotion of learning should endeavor to increase the number.

I fear I am trespassing too much on your space, but must ask your indulgence for a word or two more on the original subject. It was announced by Mr. Ferrier that a princely gift might be looked for to the college for library purposes. I think there can be little doubt that the Public Library, while fostered by McGill or any kindred institution, should be an independent public foundation. It is a pity even that the Fraser bequest was not made to a body more public in its character. But, as I understand Mr. Abbott's letter, the Governors of the Fraser Institute are prepared to share the government with other donors or subscribers, and to destroy any appearance of a "close corporation." If this can be satisfactorily accomplished it would remove any objection now felt, and put the administration on a sound and popular basis. The successful libraries amongst our neighbors are those managed on these lines.

It may occur to those who read this that it will cost a good deal of money to put up a proper building, even if the site were free; also that the High School building has already been purchased. As to the latter point, the property is no doubt worth all that it cost, and can be resold without loss; of the former point it may be said that the money laid out will secure a building specially adapted for the purpose, and likely to last for many generations. The building on Dorchester street, although it would serve very well for the present, scarcely comes up to the conditions mentioned.

The Proposed Public Libraries.

To the Editor of THE HERALD.

The letter of the Hon. J. J. C. Abbott and your sympathetic editorial render this morning's edition of THE HERALD of especial interest to all our citizens. And public curiosity is much excited over the identity of our local Maecenas, who has chosen such a fit time for his princely present to McGill, as announced by the Hon. Mr. Ferrier at convocation yesterday. The very pertinent question immediately arises whether this generous gift cannot be combined with (but not merged into) the bequest of the Fraser Institute, the project of Mr. Abbott and his associates to be promptly carried out.

On reading his letter to-day, it struck me that it would be a great pity to open our free library in the old High School building, if this could possibly be avoided. For it seems certain that, by gifts and purchase, the library would grow so rapidly as to make it well nigh impossible to move it. Besides this, it would be difficult to find any other place to temporarily accommodate it later on, while permanent buildings were being erected. Would it not be a vastly better

plan to erect a Maecenas library of the Fraser Institute this autumn and winter, ready for permanent occupation next summer? The donor's name would be preserved, and we would have one fine library belonging to a noble public institution instead of two feeble rivals for our citizens' aid. We already have a Peter Redpath Museum and Wm. Molson Hall in McGill University. We cannot do better than follow these good examples. And the governors of the Fraser Institute would gladly find seats at their board for "Maecenas" and other governors of McGill.

If any such scheme be carried out, I hope to see its execution entrusted to the firm that designed and constructed our noblest educational building—the Peter Redpath Museum. Our new library should be fire proof and capable of extension. It should be an unquestioned architectural ornament of our city.

These suggestions should not prevent the opening of a free library and reading room this winter. This could probably be done by arrangement with the Natural History Society to make use of the ground-floor of their building for that purpose. The accommodation would be very scanty. But present convenience had better be sacrificed for the sake of securing permanent efficiency. The Natural History Society would be offered a suitable place for the meetings and lectures I am sure, in the Peter Redpath Museum.

These crude suggestions might be greatly amplified, but I dare not trespass further on your space.

Now that the agitation for a free library has been well started, would it not be well to consider that we have the material ready to our hand. The Mechanics' Institute, with its fine building and rooms, would form the nucleus of a successful public library. I believe there are something like 10,000 books of all kinds in the library at present, which is a very good start for a public library. The present reading room could be continued for the English portion, the present library of the city, which is a French reading room, and the library could be transferred to the big hall upstairs, where, if necessary, there is plenty of room to form two libraries—French and English. I hope some one will consider this.

LEGAL INTELLIGENCE.

Court of Queen's Bench—Crown Side.

The Court of Queen's Bench opened yesterday morning at 10 o'clock.

Present—The Hon. Chief Justice Baby, Messrs. J. A. Oimette, Q.C., and C. P. Davidson, Q.C., on behalf of the Crown.

LARCENY.

Rebecca Smith (Mrs. Johnson) the partner of Caroline Taylor, who was found guilty yesterday in the shoplifting case, was first put upon her trial. The case occupied the whole of the morning session. As the particulars of the case have been published before it is unnecessary to repeat them.

The jury returned a verdict of guilty without retiring from their seats.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The court resumed at 2 o'clock, when Philibert Mallette, of Pointe Claire, was placed at the bar on a charge of

SHOOTING WITH INTENT TO KILL.

One Pierre Brisbois, of the same place. Several witnesses were called.

Mr. Pierre Brisbois, the complainant, was first put in the box. His evidence took up the greater part of the afternoon. The following is the purport of it:—About a month or three weeks previous to the shooting, Mallette and himself had a difficulty about a piece of land, when threatening language was used by Mallette. On the 16th of July last Brisbois was awakened between the hours of 2 and 4 in the morning by a pistol shot, into his room, breaking the glass. It was followed by two more shots from the same direction. None of the shots did any harm, but entered the wall of the room, opposite the window. He went out of bed and went to the door of his house where he distinctly saw the prisoner running up the road. He positively identified the prisoner at the box as the man that he had seen.

Jean Bie Meloeche, an employee of Brisbois, gave corroborative evidence.

As it was then half past 4 o'clock, the Court adjourned until this morning at ten o'clock.

CIVIC AFFAIRS.

Park Commissioners.

A meeting of the Park Commissioners was held yesterday afternoon, when there were present Aldermen Holland (chairman), Grenier and Donovan.

A petition was presented to the meeting from A. T. Nich, James Wright and A. X. Lefebvre, who represent a company, for permission to erect an inclined railway up the mountain. This same petition was presented to the Commissioners seven years ago, but was laid over. Now, however, they thought they would make another offer.

Alderman Donovan considered that the matter should be fully understood before anything was done. He said that the petitioners wanted a full and complete report that an arrangement should be arrived at with the City Passenger Railway, which for one fare would take a passenger from any part of the city to the top of the mountain.

Alderman Grenier said that it would be time to arrange the technical matters after the mountain had been inspected and a proper site selected.

It was resolved to let the matter lay over until this had been done.

The Commissioners will meet the petitioners on Saturday afternoon, and inspect the mountain at half past 4 o'clock.

Plans were laid before the Commissioners for a new restaurant to be erected on

the Mountain, on the site of the old one. Mr. J. McLaughlin, the proprietor of the restaurant, intends to stand the expense.

The plans were accepted, and it was resolved to find out from the City Attorney if it was necessary to obtain permission from the Council. If not the work will be proceeded with at once.

Alderman Grenier read a complaint from a gentleman about the incivility of one of the Park Rangers. In this instance one of them used the gentleman very roughly without any excuse.

The matter was left to Mr. McGibbon, Chief Ranger, to look into, and the Commissioners adjourned.

THE DOMINION EXHIBITION.

The State of the Grounds and Buildings Yesterday.

A Great Effort to Get The Exhibitors in Their Places.

Full List of Entries.

The aspect of the Exhibition buildings yesterday was that of all Exhibition buildings on the day previous to the opening, that is to say they looked as if the opening was not expected to take place for a week. "Tis ever thus," but why it should be so is something that "no fellow can find out." One would suppose that when the day was fixed for the Exhibition and exhibitors had notice far ahead of the event, they would be prepared with their goods and have them in their places at least twelve hours before the actual opening. But no living man ever saw such a condition of things in any exhibition, either great or small; every exhibitor waits until the last moment and then a frantic attempt is made to accomplish in a single day what might very well occupy three or four. The reason why our exhibitors are open late in the week is to give every one a chance to come in from outside places so that the exhibition may be in a decent state of preparedness on the opening day, but so small is the effect of this arrangement on exhibitors that openings might as well take place on a Monday morning.

Yesterday it seems to have suddenly struck the most of the Montreal exhibitors that the Exhibition was to open today. So there was much hurrying and scurrying, a rushing of goods to the Exhibition Grounds, and hammering and erecting and arranging a work which lasted late into the evening. The grounds themselves are in perfect order and never looked better; the Toronto men present acknowledge that they are far ahead of their own; and whatever it was in the power of the managers of the Exhibition to do has been done. Flags are waving from every available point and paint has not been spared or the decorator's art forgotten. True some of the varied hues which have blossomed out on the kiosks, until it has been made to resemble a barber's pole might have been spared, but on the whole the work that has been done about the grounds has been of a pleasing character and the buildings have been ready for the reception of goods for several days. Those worthy gentlemen, the restaurateurs, are ready also. Indeed, the first impression that a visitor receives when entering the Exhibition Grounds is that the crowds which gather at an exhibition come mainly to eat and drink. The fluid element was in strong force yesterday; all the bars were in order, and their bar-keepers behind their ready business. The state of preparedness in this department was in striking contrast to the condition of affairs in the several exhibition buildings.

Shortly after one o'clock yesterday Mr. S. C. Stevenson, the police Secretary of the Council of Arts and Manufactures, moved his headquarters up from St. Gabriel street to the main exhibition building. There he and his assistants were kept busy all afternoon giving directions, answering questions and dealing with the numerous matters which demanded their attention. The tediousness of the work kept up to late hour last evening.

Within the main exhibition building during the whole afternoon and evening all was bustle and activity. It is there that the finer and more elaborate classes of goods are shown, and no doubt when the last touches have been given to the display it will be found to be fully equal to any previous exhibition. But yesterday all was chaos, and with one or two exceptions there was not a single exhibitor who had his exhibits ready to be shown. All, however, were working with such energy as to give promise of a to-day display which will present a creditable appearance.

In the other buildings there was less stir and much less forwardness in respect to the preparations for opening. In the carriage building was a considerable number of exhibits, but all covered up and inaccessible. In the building devoted to machinery the main building very little had been done, and but few machines were in their places, but a good deal of energy was being shown in getting up shafting and putting machines together. The buildings devoted to horses, cattle, sheep and swine were almost tenanted. At a late hour in the afternoon three or four horses, half a dozen horned cattle and two sheep comprised all the live stock on the grounds, but later in the evening there were fresh arrivals, and no doubt by this morning there will be a considerable display in this line. The dairy produce building was locked and presumably empty. In the agricultural machinery department building matters were somewhat haphazard, about one-third, or perhaps one-half of the exhibits in that line were in their places, and one man was heard to say that he had all his exhibits there, but he was a *rara avis*, and several intending exhibitors had not an article in position.

The big engine built by Cowan & Co., of Galt (not Howell, as the types read yesterday), is all ready for work, but unfortunately the shafting was not up yesterday afternoon, so that the expected trial did not take place. This engine, which is one hundred horse power, has been purchased by the committee and is a capital bargain.

MEETING OF CITIZENS' GENERAL COMMITTEE.

A meeting of this committee was held yesterday afternoon in the Mechanics' Institute. Present: Mr. Richard White (chairman), Hon. J. B. Thibault, B. J. Coghlin, W. Wilson, C. Lavers, J. L. Cushing, Fred Colson, hon. secretary, and others.

It was announced that the badges for the committees had been ordered and would soon be given out.

It was decided to get up a programme of the amusements provided by the Citizens' Committee in a folder form to be handed around on the grounds.

Mr. Laperriere stated that Alderman Hood had told him that the Fire Brigade would turn out on any day the committee wished.

Hon. Mr. Thibault and Mr. B. J. Coghlin entered the room. The former gentleman announced that he had obtained subscriptions to the amount of \$870. This was felt to be extremely satisfactory.

A list of names of those who had subscribed to the last exhibition, but who had not yet been called upon, was parcelled out among those present to be canvassed. It was announced that \$1,900 in cash had been collected and that promises had been given for other amounts.

It was resolved to request Mr. C. E. Sonne to erect a tent on the grounds for the use of the Citizens' Committee. The Secretary was instructed to write to Mr. Crawford to arrange for an horse-jumping committee. The following programme was then made out: To-day there will be no events controlled by the Citizens' Committee. On Saturday the Hunt will be present on the grounds; Riley, the aquatic wonder, will make his first appearance; there will be Japanese fireworks and music by the bands. Monday—Horse-jumping, aquatic wonder, bands. Tuesday—Official opening by the Government, fireworks, horse-jumping, etc. Wednesday—Farmers' races, etc. Thursday—The athletic sports and games, grand display of fireworks in the evening. Friday—Turn-out of the Fire Brigade and other amusements. Saturday—Not yet decided upon.
