

## OCCUPATION OF ADRIANOPE BY TURKISH TROOPS DENIED

### Sofia Dispatch Says Story Was Sent Out by Fugitive Bulgarian Officials. Greek Government Sends Delegate to Arrange Peace With Bulgaria. King Ferdinand Has Appealed to German Emperor to Bring About Peace.

Sofia, Bulgaria, July 22.—(Special)—The report of the reoccupation of Adrianople by Turkish troops turns out to be false.

It was spread by fugitive Bulgarian officials from that city, who, when they heard that a reconnoitering force of Turkish cavalry commanded by the notorious Enver Bey had been seen in the vicinity, fled incontinently under the belief that the entire Ottoman army was about to descend on the place.

#### TURKS RETIRED.

Communications have been restored between the Bulgarian citadel and Adrianople, and official reports from the Bulgarian commander there show that the Turks retired after reconnoitering the position.

The Bulgarian Government has ordered the scared civil functionaries to return to their posts, and similar instructions have been sent to the Bulgarian officials who fled from various places in the Province of Thrace as soon as they heard of the Turkish advance.

#### GOVERNOR OF ADRIANOPE.

Constantinople, July 22.—(Special)—In anticipation of the reoccupation of Adrianople by the Turkish troops, Hadji Adil Bey, former minister of the interior, has been given the appointment of governor, and leaves today for Adrianople to assume his post.

#### ON WAY TO PEACE MISSION.

Athens, Greece, July 22.—(Special)—M. Panas, director of political affairs at the Greek Foreign Office, has been appointed chief of the Greek delegation which is to arrange terms of peace with Bulgaria. He started for Nish, Serbia, to-day, and will be joined on the way there by the other members of the peace mission.

#### MOHAMMEDANS ARE PLEASED.

Calcutta, India, July 22.—(Special)—The advance of Turkish troops across the new frontier line from Enos, on the Aegean Sea, to Midia, on the Black Sea, which had been arranged between Bulgaria and Turkey after the recent war, has been received with hearty rejoicing by the Mohammedans of India. Newspapers here assert that an attempt on the part of Great Britain to coerce Turkey into abandoning her new projects will lead to dangerous Mohammedan agitation.

#### NO RESISTANCE WILL BE OFFERED TO ROUMANIANS ENTERING THE CAPITAL.

London, July 22.—An idea that the Bulgarian army is preparing for a counter stroke is now quite abandoned. It has become known that in his anxiety to bring about peace King Ferdinand appealed to the German Emperor regarding Roumania's action. The nature of the Emperor's reply has not been disclosed.

A semi-official despatch from Sofia says that even should the Roumanians invade the capital no resistance will be offered.

The actual occupation of Adrianople has not yet been confirmed. The advances of the Turks on Adrianople has been accompanied by considerable skirmishing.

The Bucharest correspondent of the Daily Telegraph hears, but is unable to confirm, that Greece has waived claim to Kavala and Drama and will content herself with the Saloniki hinterland, which would facilitate a peace settlement. He also says that a junction has been established between the Roumanian right wing and the Servians, who crossed the mountains on the frontier in four columns.

Besides accepting the Turtukai-Baltchik line, Bulgaria has consented to the Roumanian troops remaining in Bulgaria, according to a Bucharest

despatch to the Daily Mail, until Bulgaria has concluded peace with all her enemies.

#### ROUMANIA'S REPLY.

London, July 22.—A Sofia despatch to the Times says: "Roumania's reply to Bulgaria agrees to accept Turtukai-Baltchik as the future frontier, but declines to withdraw the troops until Bulgaria enters into negotiations with the other belligerents."

"Interruption of communication with North Bulgaria has already caused a scarcity of provisions here, and, if continued, will involve calamitous results in the capital and in the army. It is reported that the Turks have withdrawn from Adrianople."

#### MONTREAL GREEK COLONY DELIGHTED.

Montreal, July 22.—After a silence of nearly a week an official response to telegraphic inquiry is now forthcoming from Salonika, a system of war news service which King Constantine wisely instituted on the resumption of the war by Bulgaria, so that wilfully prejudiced news telegrams might have no more the monopoly they once enjoyed.

Mr. C. D. Metrakos, of St. Catherine street west, received the following cablegram yesterday afternoon at 5.30 for the information of the Greek colony in Montreal:

"The Turks have captured and occupied Adrianople. King Constantine has declared peace with Turkey, and the Greek Government has ratified the same by signing the treaty. The Greek army continues its advance against the Bulgarians victoriously. King Constantine commanding it will reach Sofia in three or four days from to-day's date."

From the above the important fact can be gathered for the first time that King Constantine's objective is no longer by way of the Aegean shore to Adrianople, but that he is moving northwards now towards the Struma Pass leading into Bulgaria from northern Macedonia. He has evidently completely disposed of the Bulgarians under General Ivanoff at Serez on his right flank to his own satisfaction.

The signing of a fresh treaty of peace with Turkey is a startling fact. It shows that Greece by this act at the present juncture supports Turkey's re-occupation of Adrianople and the territory outside the Enos-Midia line.

King Constantine says he will be in Sofia on Friday next, the 25th inst. The Struma Pass is a wildly mountainous defile, but evidently the Greek King is a very able general who already knows that the Bulgarian defence is weak. At any rate the statement is sent out by his own command from army headquarters vis Salonika to America.

PRINCE ARTHUR TO BE WED AT SANDRINGHAM.

New York, July 22.—(Special)—A London cable says: "Prince Arthur of Connaught has taken a house near York, where he will live after his wedding."

Queen Alexandra wishes marriage, which is to be celebrated in October, to take place at Sandringham.

## PREMIER ASQUITH WARNS TURKEY

### Must Live up to the Provisions of the Treaty of London

IF NOT QUESTIONS WOULD BE RAISED THAT MIGHT BE DIFFICULT TO ANSWER

Birmingham, England, July 22.—The Prime Minister characterized the spectacle presented by the Balkan states as "disheartening and repellant" in a speech at a Chamber of Commerce centenary banquet here last night. On the one hand, he said, were the Balkan states drenching with one another's blood the territory their united efforts had freed from Turkish rule; on the other hand, Turkey, disregarding the treaty of London, on which the ink was scarcely dry, and taking advantage of the differences between her late enemies to recover her lost territory.

The powers, continued Mr. Asquith, were doing everything possible to bring the disputants to a peaceful conference. Yesterday it seemed likely that such a conference would take place.

"We believe," he added, "that it must result in the immediate suspension of arms and a speedy settlement, upon the terms of which, with a view to what has happened, the great powers must and will preserve their own judgment."

The Prime Minister warned Turkey that if she were ill-advised enough to set the provisions of the Treaty of London at defiance she must be prepared for the introduction of questions which it would be by no means to her interests to bring into the debate.

Squads of police defeated the efforts of suffragettes to mob Premier Asquith by clearing the streets in the neighborhood of the banquet hall before he entered. Hostile crowds chased the suffragettes whenever seen, forcing them to take refuge in shops and offices. The women, however, succeeded in smashing several windows of the hotel where Mr. Asquith is staying. Six of them were arrested.

GRANT TO CITY BAND.

On the recommendation of the Finance Committee, it was resolved to make a grant to the City Band of \$50 for this year.

#### L. A. BAYLEY'S CLAIM.

The Finance Committee recommended that this claim be not entertained, as after consultation with the City Attorney they came to the conclusion that the City was not liable.

#### SEWERAGE EXTENSIONS.

A petition from Messrs. Sangster, Armitage, etc., for sewerage extensions on Drummond Road, the petitioners agreeing to pay their share of the cost, was referred to the Finance Committee.

Ald. Demault remarked he had no objection, but many other places had been asking for sewers for twenty years.

Ald. Forest presented a petition from some taxpayers respecting the sewerage from Aberdeen up to King. Referred to Civic Board and Road Committee.

Ald. Demault presented a petition from taxpayers on Alexander street regarding sewerage from Ball to King. Referred to Civic Board and Sanitary Committee.

BRICK TENDER ACCEPTED.

The Council confirmed the acceptance of the tender of the Eastern Townships Brick Co. for bricks.

TRUCKS FOR COLLECTING REFUSE.

Ald. Genest, on the recommendation of the Civic Board, moved that two trucks be purchased for the collection of garbage and refuse. He thought that every house should be provided with cans for depositing rubbish.

Ald. Jenckes raised the question of legality and cost.

Aldermen Demault and Simoneau thought the matter should be referred to the Sanitary Committee.

Ald. Thompson believed a by-law was necessary before they could have the cans.

Ald. Simoneau did not believe that two wagons would be sufficient. As soon as it became known that the City took charge of the refuse they would want six teams. The Sanitary Committee should be asked to make a full report.

Ald. Genest agreed, and the matter was referred to the Sanitary and Finance Committees.

AMBULANCE.

On the motion of Ald. Ewing it was resolved to discontinue sending the ambulance on the call of doctors and other persons to meet trains for out-of-town patients.

CLOTHING CONTRACT.

The Fire and Police Committees recommended that the tender of Walter Blue & Co. for clothing be accepted.—Carried.

GRANT TO 53RD REGT. BAND.

An application from the 53rd Regiment Band for a grant, stating that the Band had played in public 21 times since April, was referred to the Finance Committee.

DODD & STRUTHERS BUILDING.

A letter was read from the secretary of the Sherbrooke Board of Trade, asking if the Council would sell the Dodd & Struthers building, on Frontenac street.—Referred to Lighting and Finance Committees.

UNION STATION.

The City Secretary-Treasurer stated he had received a complaint from some ladies as to the unsanitary condition of the Union Station. No action was taken, it being remarked that a reference in the Record would have the desired effect.

C.P.R. TAXES.

Alderman Jenckes drew attention to the fact that the C.P.R. Co. owed \$2,400 for arrears of taxes. He understood that the company objected to make any payment until the question of the assessment of their property was finally settled. Some years ago an application was made to the Quebec Legislature whereby their charter was amended, giving the Council power to fix the assessment

Ald. Thompson presided at the bi-monthly meeting of the City Council last night. The other aldermen present were Jenckes, Brault, Prunier, Forest, Ewing, Genest, Darce, Simoneau and Demault.

A long session was held, and by the casting vote of the chairman it was decided to retain No. 3 Fire Station.

EXPRESS CO'S. TAX.

The Finance Committee reported that they could not recommend any decrease, would recommend that the tax on express companies be not again raised for at least five years.—Adopted.

GREEN BROS.' TAX.

The Finance Committee reported that if this firm is buying and selling second-hand furniture it is liable for the tax. Recommendation adopted.

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## TWO KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

### Car Rolled Down Embankment and Pinned Men Underneath

MR. LEGEARE, OF QUEBEC, WHO OWNED MACHINE, AND OTHER ESCAPED.

Quebec, July 22.—As a result of an automobile accident which occurred at Ste. Rose, county of Temiscouata, on Sunday night, George Goudreau, chauffeur, and A. Proteau, caretaker of a farm at Ste. Rose, both in the employ of P. T. Legeare, of this city, are dead.

On Sunday morning Mr. Legeare, accompanied by Arthur Drolet, grocer, of Quebec, and Proteau left for Temiscouata in Legeare's auto, driven by Chauffeur Goudreau. The party left the city on the ferry boat and on reaching Levis drove along the shore to within nine miles of their destination. Arriving there they had a steep and rough hill, which is unprotected on either side, to climb. When near the top Legeare and Drolet noticed that the chauffeur made a dangerous turn of the steering wheel, and, becoming aware of danger, jumped from the car onto the road. They had hardly done so when they saw the car capsize and roll down the embankment, pinning the chauffeur and farmer underneath it. After summoning assistance, Legeare, Drolet and others succeeded in releasing the imprisoned men, but they were so badly crushed that they died this morning.

Chauffeur Goudreau was a young man, only recently married. Proteau was also married and leaves a widow and one child.

KILLED WHILE ATTEMPTING TO SAVE ANOTHER.

Montreal, July 22.—(Special)—While his locomotive was stopped at St. Remi, on the Grand Trunk, Edwin Grey, the fireman, crawled under the engine to do some oiling. Not knowing his companion was there, the engineer started the engine. John Firth, the foreman, who saw Grey go under the engine, jumped for the engine in order to stop it. He missed his footing and fell beneath the wheels, and was ground to pulp, while Grey, the fireman whom he tried to save, was got out uninjured.

GOVERNMENT STEAMER ASHORE

### Beothic Was on Way to Hudson Bay With Valuable Cargo

#### CARGO IS VALUED AT ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS.

#### MANY MEN ON BOARD.

Halifax, N. S., July 22.—Early yesterday morning the steamer Beothic, chartered by the Canadian Government, and on her way from Halifax to Port Nelson, in the Hudson Bay, loaded with men and supplies, when approaching the southern entrance of the Straits of Belle Isle west ashore on Point Rock on the west coast of Newfoundland. At a late hour last night she was still in the same position, a difficult one from which to extricate her. She was making no water, and Captain Falk reported that there was no immediate danger of a wind such as would dislodge or break her up.

H. M. S. Sirius, of the Newfoundland station, answered the Beothic's call for assistance and reached her about three o'clock Sunday afternoon. An attempt was immediately made to pull the stranded steamer off, but it was unsuccessful.

80,000 MEN; 346 SHIPS OF WAR

### Great Fleet Assembled For British Naval Manoeuvres

#### PROBLEM TO BE SOLVED DURING EXERCISES WILL BE DONE TO PREVENT RAID ON COAST.

London, July 22.—The British naval manoeuvres begin to-day, after a week spent in preparatory exercises. Every ship taking part in the manoeuvres will be manned by a full complement, and the total number of officers and men engaged will be little short of 80,000 men. How the ships will be divided between the attack and the defence has not been divulged.

The total number of all classes of ships will be 346. Excluding auxiliaries, such as mining vessels, depot ships, etc., the number will be 315, and this represents 64.95 per cent of the entire strength of the navy.

The problem will be generally similar to that which was set last year, and may be briefly set in the form of this question: "Is the ordinary peace distribution of the fleet calculated to expose the East Coast of Great Britain to the possibility of a sudden raid?"

## COLLAPSE OF HUERTA REGIME

### Washington is Informed of Crisis Approaching in Mexico

U. S. IS NOT MAKING ANY ADDITIONAL NAVAL OR MILITARY PREPARATIONS.

Washington, July 22.—Reports of conditions surrounding the Huerta Government in Mexico have put administration officials in an attitude of keenest apprehension towards the situation there. Advice, which officials believe to be perfectly trustworthy, seem to indicate that the strife between the Huerta regime and the revolutionary elements is nearing a point where some definite conclusion is to be reached.

Information of this situation, when permitted to become known yesterday was coupled with the authoritative statement that the United States was making no additional naval or military preparations. Reports of an impending collapse of the Huerta regime are being talked over freely in official circles, though no official of the administration will permit his name to be coupled with them. All information made public was with the exact stipulation that it should not be represented as reflecting the views of the administration.

Meanwhile, President Wilson is awaiting the coming of Ambassador Henry Lane Wilson, hurrying north from Mexico City to make a first hand report of conditions. His report will be compared with those from other sources. Secretary Bryan, who has cancelled some of his lecture dates that he may return to Washington on Thursday or Friday, will participate in the conferences.

New Orleans, July 22.—(Special)—It is reported that the convicts' cage at Mississippi prison farm at Oakley burned early to-day, and that 35 prisoners lost their lives.

WILL DISCUSS WATER SYSTEM AT BEDFORD.

Bedford, July 22.—(Special)—A special session of the Town Council will be held on Wednesday night of this week to receive the report of the Water Committee, relative to the proposed new waterworks and sewerage systems. The committee consists of Messrs. C. B. Jameson, H. A. Best and N. A. Pare, and these three have been giving the matter considerable attention for some time. Expert engineers have also been on the ground and Wednesday's meeting should give the Council all the information necessary to enable the Mayor and Councilors to intelligently decide on the proper course in dealing with such an important and far reaching asset to any town as a good waterworks system.

## VALUABLE CARGO OF BLACK FOXES

Shipment on Way From Shagway Worth \$100,000

CONIGNED TO FOX FARMS IN NEW BRUNSWICK AND P. E. ISLAND.

Vancouver, July 22.—One of the most remarkable shipments that have been sent to this North for some time is \$100,000 worth of foxes which were included in the cargo of the C. P. R. steamer Princess May, which arrived in port from Skagway yesterday morning. There are 126 animals of the finest specimens, including black, silver tip and red foxes. All are cubs and one pair of black foxes alone, it is estimated, will be worth \$10,000 when full grown. The shipment is consigned to St. John, N. B., and Prince Edward Island, where there are large fox farms. Two men are in constant attendance upon the little animals and feed them on condensed milk.

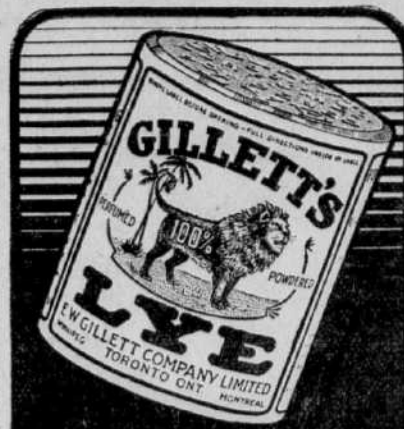

## DEMOCRATS OPPOSE BILL

Struggle Over U. S. Tariff Measure Expected to be Long One

VOTE MAY RESULT IN A TIE WHEN VICE PRESIDENT WILL GIVE CASTING VOTE.

Washington, D. C., July 22.—Senator Chamberlain, Democrat, of Oregon, exploded a bomb in his own camp yesterday when he announced on the floor of the Senate that he did not feel bound to support the Underwood-Simmons free trade tariff bill. "While I feel some obligation to support this bill which has been reported by the finance committee," he said, "I do not feel bound to any course of action here."

Senator Chamberlain is one of the Democrats who is counted among the supporters of the tariff bill. He has become convinced that the bill discriminated against the West, and that his own state, Oregon, will suffer severely. Should he vote with the Republicans it would mean a tie, which can only be broken by Vice-President Marshall, who will support the bill.

The struggle in the Senate is likely to be longer than was previously expected. It is now predicted that the Senate will make changes which will result in a fight with the House when the conference begin, and that President Wilson will have his hands full when he tries to bring about the enactment of the kind of law he has been demanding.



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**RICHMOND WILL BORROW FOR ROADS**

Council Applies to Government For Sum of \$30,780

THIS AMOUNT WILL BE SPENT IN MACADAMIZING STREETS OF THE CORPORATION.

Richmond, July 22.—(Special)—At an adjourned meeting of the Town Council, held in the Council Chambers, there were present Mayor Brock and Councillors Dyson, Hudon, Pearson, McMorine and Smith. It was moved by Councillor McMorine and seconded by Councillor Dyson that in order to carry out the provisions of by-law No. 101 for the macadamizing of Main street, Craig and Spooner Pond roads, the Council inform the Roads Department that the sum of \$30,780 is required to pay the total cost, and that this amount be applied for from the Government in conformity with the Good Roads Act, 1912. The Mayor and Secretary Treasurer were authorized to sign coupons or other documents to evidence the engagements set forth in the above. To provide for the payment of the interest a yearly tax of \$25,000, equivalent to 2 per cent. of the amount of the said allocation is to be imposed for forty-one years up on the taxable real property of the municipality. Councillor Pearson stated that the committee appointed for the purpose had consulted legal opinion in connection with the proposed street to Mr. Dionne's residence, and reported progress along the lines of the advice received.

A general rate of 3 1/2 mills was levied on all owners and occupants to be paid to the Secretary Treasurer on the first of October next. A monthly scholar rate of ten cents to be levied on all pupils, owners or renters, and a rate of 20 cents per month on all non-residents and dis-sentient pupils in the municipality, said rate to be paid at same time as the ordinary tax of the municipality. It was decided to levy special rates to pay for repairs on school houses as follows: No. 1, a rate of one-fifth mill; No. 5, three mills; No. 7, one and two-thirds mills; No. 10, one and one-half mills; No. 12, one mill. This to be paid same time as regular tax. The engaging of teachers for the balance of schools unfilled was left in the hands of the Chairman.

The meeting then adjourned subject to the call of the Chairman.

Sutton, July 22.—(Special)—At a general meeting of the Commissioners for the Village of Sutton, held in the Town Hall, at the usual hour on Saturday there were present Mr. B. A. Wilson, Chairman, and Commissioners C. M. Boright, E. B. Greeley, Wm. Brown and F. L. Safford, Secretary Treasurer Mr. H. A. Parsons was also present. Mr. C. M. Boright was elected Chairman for the current year. Mr. L. L. Jenne was appointed auditor for the ensuing year.

The audit report for the past year was filed, accepted and ratified.


