## Membership now reached 2,034

Successful introduction of Westmount's urban renewal plans will require a full public information program, C. M. Russel, president of the Westmount Municipal Association, stated at the association's executive meeting last week.

"We are pleased that the council has promised to disclose its program as quickly as possible, for the association believes that proper understanding of these plans is essential," Mr. Russel added.

Mr. A. J. Fisher a member of the association's executive and past-president of the Westmount Tenants Association has expressed on behalf of the Selby Street residents, their satisfaction with the effective way in which their recent move was organized and carried out by city officials and staff.

The possibility of recommending the renewal of summer band concerts in Westmount Park is under review. The association plans to sample public opinion on the popularity of such concerts. It will also re-examine the costs of concerts provided through recordings or by local bands.

Mr. Russel has extended the formal congratulations of the W.M.A. to Mayor Tucker and members of the City Executive on their election to office. Following his election to Council, Mr. Ian Craig has resigned from the association's executive. Mr. Craig had served for over two

## 3 thugs picked up in an hour

An alert Westmount police force doubtless foiled a bank hold-up try Thursday. Within an hour police picked up three known criminals — one with an attempted-murder-rape against him, and two others who have been in and out of prison on major raps and have at least one shoot-out with police to their record.

One of the trio was known to police for involvement in the placing of a bomb near Westmount's city hall.

Whether the banks that were the target were on Greene avenue, the police are not aware, though two of the men were picked up in that vicinity. The third was apprehended not far from the bank near the Reader's Digest building.

A close watch is being maintained on all local bank-branches as a consequence.

## City plans rebuilding local yard

Westmount council has opened tenders for the construction of new buildings in Phase 3 of the redevelopment plan over a five-year span of the city's corporation yard.

It has been recommended that the city accept the lowest of six bids.

The work is to provide a new unit to house locker-rooms, mess hall, workmen's quarters, vehicle storage areas and office space on the south side of the yard in the space now occupied by the turn-of-the-century stables.

Tenders were opened Monday at 11:45 a.m. and were as follows:

- E. R. Casey Construction — \$290,379; City Construction \$304,000; Lloyd Construction — \$282,242; Pollock-McGibbon — \$278,944; Seal Construction — \$280,000; Sestock Construction — \$279,800.

At a Special Meeting of the Board held on Monday, January 9th, 1967, Mr. W. H. Bradley, Q.C., was re-elected chairman and Dr. David N. Solomon, Vice-Chairman. Mr. A. Reid Tilley continues as Westmount Representative to the Protestant School Board of Greater Montreal.

Westmount Council Monday night handled a 20-item agenda in jig-time, considering the fact that several statutory items required the major portion of it; swearing in two new aldermen: Daniel Doheny, QC, and Ian Craig, CA.

Peter McEntyre has been named pro-mayor for the months of February, March and April.

## Two fatal accidents

Two fatalities occurred this past week in Westmount. The first to happen in the city for 1967, according to the police reports. On Tuesday at 7:20 p.m., Joseph Victor Slaney slipped under the back wheels of a bus on the north west corner of Atwater and St. Antoine Streets. According to a passenger on the bus, Slaney could be seen through the window one minute and the next he had disappeared. Mr. Slaney, 48, was a veteran of the Canadian Navy from 1940 to 1945, and during this period he was torpedoed twice. Ten years ago he was struck by a car and seriously injured.

William Hood, 74, fell to his death last week from the window of his third storey room in the YMCA on Sherbrooke Street, onto the parking lot on the east side of the building. Mr. Hood had just been released from the hospital. It is believed that he suffered a dizzy spell while opening the low set window. Mr. Hood had occupied the same room in the 'Y' for the past 16 years.

## Urban Renewal boils down to housing for 50 families

Westmount's Urban Renewal Plan will remain before the council for continuous and periodic study — but at the moment all that is to be attempted is to ask permission from the province to enter into a housing scheme for 50 families from Selby street.

A resolution to this effect is being readied for submission to the Private Bills Committee of the provincial government — and even this may not be allowed by the province.

Westmount is ready to wait for the provision of a general law for Urban Renewal purposes — and it may be that the provincial authorities will require that the city waits, even for the housing plan for the fortunate fifty from Selby street.

The resolution will ask that the city be granted the power to 'acquire' homes for the dispossessed and not necessarily by expropriation.

The city, according to aldermanic opinion at the moment,

has no intention of getting into the housing business on a large scale, nor of going any further in the Urban Renewal Scheme at present, partly due to the public attitude on the question.

It is not essential, the council appears to feel, that the city go into the house-building business either, it is felt that there are properties for sale that can be acquired amicably by the city through negotiation.

Any borrowing by the city for the purpose, of course, would have to be approved by the public — and it is expected that the council will be ready to go to the public with their plans by the end of January.

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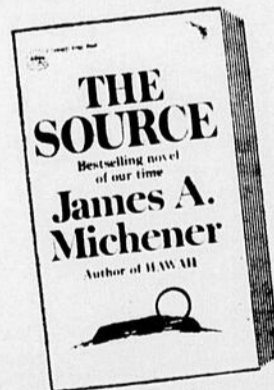
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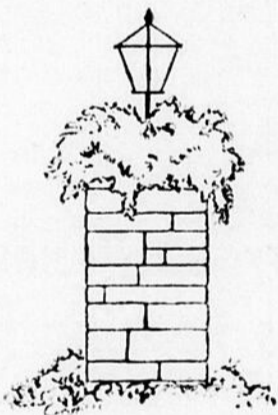

**Brian Bourke commissioner**

At the annual meeting of the Montreal Regional Scout Council held January 11, Regional Commissioner Ian Roberts announced the appointment of Brian Bourke of Pierrefonds as an Assistant Regional Commissioner. He will be responsible for serving five districts, Algonkin, Notre Dame de Grace, Seneca, Southern and Westmount.

Mr. Bourke was a Wolf Cub in 1938 in the St. Augustine pack and a Scout in the Rosedale Group in Montreal from 1940-1944. From 1952-54 he served as Scoutmaster of the 1st Vedder Crossing troop in the B.C.-Yukon district, and from 1959-64 as Scoutmaster of the 85th Ottawa troop. In January 1965 he was appointed District Scoutmaster of Riverview district in the Montreal region and in April 1966 Commissioner of that district.

**2 Firemen promoted**

Westmount has promoted two firemen to the rank of lieutenant in the city fire department.

They are firemen A. Smith and W. Timmons.

Vacancies were occasioned by a promotion to captain in one instance and a resignation in another.

**G. Reise is assessor**

Westmount has officially named Gerhard Reise as assessor for the city, according to article 106-a of the city charter, which requires that such appointment be made annually.

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# Renewal area survey lists institutions

As an appendix to the initial report, Goldyn Sunderland has produced for the city of Westmount, a review of the institutions in the Urban Renewal Scheme Area, presently being studied by council in committee.

The data on these institutions, as submitted in the survey, includes:

**Westminster Central United church:** to be demolished as a result of the Trans-Canada Highway construction. The facilities include the church itself and a hall. There is no residence attached to the church, for the minister. It is not yet known where the church authorities intend to relocate their facilities.

**Unity Boys' Club:** Founded in 1943, by the Westmount Rotary Club, the Unity Boys' Club moved to its present address in 1949.

It is operated by the Montreal Boys' Association and is a Red Feather service from which it receives its financial support.

It provides indoor recreational, craft and cultural programmes after school and in the evening, Monday through Friday, and a daytime programme on Saturday. It is closed on Sunday. The programmes vary from year to year depending on the interest and ages of the members. It accepts both boys and girls from the ages of 6 to 16. Membership fee is nominal and it ranges from \$0.50 to \$2.00 a year.

The director considers that their effective draw is approximately 6 blocks. The majority of their members come from Westmount. On March 1st 1966, out of 336 registered members: 63.4% come from sectors 1 and 2; 14.0% from other parts of the Urban Renewals Area; 6.8% from the remainder of Westmount and 12.8% from St-Henry and N.D.G.

The building is of brick construction and is two storeys high with a very high basement. It contains a gymnasium, recreation rooms, a workshop, a library and offices for the staff. There is a partial 3rd storey containing the caretaker's apartment.

The staff of the Boys' Club is made up of 3 permanent employees, 2 part-time employees and the caretaker and his wife. The club calls upon the Montreal Volunteer Bureau for additional help when needed. It also has a small Women's Auxiliary.

**Prospect House:** Prospect House established by the Westmount Rotary Club, (it was formerly two single-family homes) and operated by them for the first two years. It was then turned over to the Family Service Association.

The residence is non-sectarian and admits people of both sexes with a maximum income of \$125. a month. Preference is given to Westmount residents. There are 16 rooms and the rent ranges from \$25.00 to \$37.00 per month. Kitchen and bathroom facilities, and common rooms are provided on each floor. There is a small apartment with kitchen and bathroom facilities in the basement for the resident janitor.

The House is located at the eastern end of Prospect Street and faces a small park. It blends well with the area; except for a small sign, nothing distinguishes it from its neighbours. It is not very convenient to either shopping facilities or public transportation.

**Weredale House:** A non-denomination institution founded in 1870 which receives French, English, Jewish, coloured, Protestant or Catholic boys between the ages of 10 to 18. 170 boys can be accommodated.

The boys are referred to the House by the courts, the social agencies, the hospitals, and occasionally by parents. The majority still have one or both parents living. The average length of stay is just under 4 years. The institution stresses the maintenance of family ties, and parents' visits are encouraged.

The boys go to Westmount Public Schools during the school year, a few of the older boys attend University and some have outside work. The institution maintains a summer camp at "Lac L'Archigan" where the boys spend the months of July and August.

The Home is a large brick building in very good condition,

at the end of the Weredale Park Crescent. There is a large play yard at the back, between the building and the railroad tracks.

In addition to dormitories, the building has a gymnasium, a small indoor swimming pool, and auditorium with a stage, a craft shop, recreation rooms, visitors' rooms, kitchen facilities and a dining room.

This is a private incorporated charity. It receives support from the province in the case of indigent children from the municipality which in turn collects from parents who can afford to pay family allowances from endowment funds, and from Red Feather.

The boys who work, pay a small amount, in proportion to their salaries.

Alongside the main building, there is a small building of more recent construction which houses the administrative offices of Weredale House, the offices of the Canadian Association of Boys' Clubs and the living quarters of the director.

The institution is well located and is a good neighbor as it does not create noise or disturbances.

**Children's Service Centre:** a Red Feather Agency, which occupies a small new office building.

The Agency looks after the placement in foster homes or for adoption of non-Roman Catholic, non-Jewish children from birth to the age of 14 or until they are self-supporting. They also help un-married mothers.

They have had occasion to place children from sectors 1 and 2 in foster homes. On the other hand, a few families from these areas have accepted foster children. Three families provide emergency boarding for short periods from one night to one week.

The premises on Weredale Park contain administrative offices only (no children being accommodated there) and a medical clinic for children under their care.

There is garage space in the basement for the agency's own fleet of cars, but no parking facilities for the staff.

**Red Feather Building:** A small 3-storey office building which houses the administrative and fund-raising services of United Red Feather, as well as the administrative office of some of the Red Feather agencies: Child Health Association; John Howard Society; Montreal Boys Association; Society for the Protection of Women and children; Montreal Parks and Playground Association; Montreal Council of Social Agencies.

**St. Stephen Anglican Church:** This Anglican Church was established at this location in 1896: The present congregation is very small, comprising 240 people. 80% of them live below St. Catherine Street, from Westmount High School to Atwater, a few from the Tupper and Dorchester Street areas, and 8 families on Selby Street.

**Salvation Army Women's Receiving Home.** This is a large 3 storey brick house which was bought by the Salvation Army and converted to its present use, 13 years ago. This service was previously located on St. Antoine Street, east of Atwater. The building is in very good condition and has been well maintained through the years.

The Salvation Army provides 2 types of services at this address:

**Labour Market** This is a placement service which is operated on a daily basis for women between the ages of 30 to 55, looking for char-work. Many of these women have emotional or family problems which makes it difficult for them to secure and retain permanent employment.

**Emergency Shelter for Women and Children:** They have room for 19 adults, plus child. (Continued on page 7)

## City servants are commended

Sir:

I would like to call to your attention a service which may very often be overlooked, or belittled in the eyes of the general public. By this I refer to the garbage collection of our City of Westmount. We do try to speak in commendation of these faithful servants at every opportunity, but this past week saw an occasion which deserves a special word of commendation.

It is our custom to place our garbage can just outside the back door early in the morning on the day of the usual collection of garbage, and past Tuesday, I did this as usual. Owing to the recent snowfall, I left the can there for a short time, till I could get into my boots to carry the can to the fence, leading to the lane, from which the garbage is carried. When I stepped outside to remove the can from its place, I found that the garbage collector had come into the yard, taken the can to empty its contents, and had placed the can in its proper place. To me, this was an example of going beyond the point of duty. I feel this ought to be brought to the attention of those in charge of these men, who are public servants, and who are so often taken for granted.

I would appreciate it so much if you would print this so that your readers might become aware that there are those who appreciate these little acts of thoughtfulness and consideration done on the part of those, without whose help life would be more difficult.

At present Andrew, who is five, is at kindergarten at Academie Michèle Provost. When Mark and Cynthia are old enough to study in school it will be French for them too. By that time, even 'Krinkles', the family Boxer will be able to understand enough to follow along.

dren. Length of stay varies from a night or two to as long as 6 months. The majority of their clients are young girls between the ages of 14 to 19. They are kept until a permanent placement is found for them or until they are able to manage on their own. etc. The majority cannot pay, but the few who do, pay a nominal sum.

The receiving Home is operated by a total staff of 3; the director (who has her own quarters on the top floor); a cook and a general helper.

**Hillside Armoury:** A large 3-storey brick building housing two Militia units; The Corps of Signals (Squadron). Total strength of these units is 400 men. They train a few evenings a week and during the week end. The building is occasionally used by cadet corps.

The ground level is used for parking trucks. The upper levels include a large drill hall, mess and offices.

The personnel and visitors have to park on Hillside lane. On the occasional evening in the year when they need parking on a large scale permission is given to use the Westmount High School grounds.

**Atwater Library:** The Atwater Library is a private organization serving the Greater Montreal Area, and provides lending and reference facilities for its members. Meeting rooms are available.

**Reddy Memorial Hospital:** The Hospital is located on a long strip of land fronting on Tupper Street. An extensive building program is now in progress which should be completed by the end of 1967.

When completed, the hospital will have a 250 bed capacity, including a psychiatric unit, out-patient facilities and interns' and nurses' residences.

Public out-patient, staff and ambulance entrances are located on Tupper Street, all deliveries and pick-up will be made from two narrow lanes on either side of the building and from the lane at the rear.

There is no provision for public parking, but a small lot with 35 spaces at the western end of the property is designated for staff parking.

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The Provincial Association of Protestant Teachers of Quebec supports:

The public should also be aware of the fact that normal processes of collective bargaining have been impeded by unwarranted interference (in some cases indirect) from the Department of Education in teacher-school board disputes. As a result, certain strikes have been unnecessarily prolonged, and others have been permitted to occur when prevention was possible if the teachers and school boards concerned had been left alone.

## Herbert Reddy Memorial Auxiliary reports for 1966

Mrs. J. A. S. Wilson, President of the Auxiliary of Herbert Reddy Memorial Hospital, in her report to the annual meeting of the Auxiliary, stated that the Auxiliary has raised approximately \$10,000 during 1966, and that their goal of acquiring \$34,000 to furnish and equip our new Coffee and Gift Shop had now been reached. Donations to the hospital in the amount of \$2,000 included \$800 to the Social Service Fund, equipment for the Anesthesiology Department, and a camera for the Dermatology Department. A further cheque for \$700 was presented to Dr. T. L. Barry, Executive Director, at the meeting.

Mrs. M. B. Mackenzie, chairman of the Travel Cart, reported increasing sales during the past year in spite of restrictions during the rebuilding; also increased revenue from the "Get-it Now" Sale in November. She presented to the Auxiliary a cheque for \$2,000.

Other Money-raising projects included a Birthday Club Boutique Luncheon in November and a Fashion Show Luncheon in June. Mention was also made of the Special Gifts Fund, which now stands at around \$1,200, to provide memorial gifts to the hospital.

Credit was given to the Volunteer Program which continued to expand its service, contributing approximately 4600 hours of work in 1966. Auxiliary members also assisted at numerous Blood Donor Clinics of the Red Cross and raised money for the Canadian Cancer Society on Daffodil Day.

The president concluded her report by saying that as the hospital's program of building and expansion reached completion, the "waiting and growing years" would be succeeded by a time of increased activity and challenge in the new Rendezvous Shop and the newly enlarged hospital.

On Friday, January 6, 1967, the Academy went to Lachine to meet Bishop Whelan High School and they battled to a 2-1 victory. Grant Sherriffs, after a prolonged slump, came on strong and tallied both of St. Leo's goals. Wayne Colomb assisted on both goals.

Monday, January 9, 1967, St. Leo's played St. Thomas Aquinas High School and though it seemed at first the Academy would be stepped on — they suddenly came alive and won 5-0. Both Grant Sherriffs and Neil Fernandes scored twice and Gerry Fortin netted the 5th goal.

Last Monday, January 16, 1967, St. Leo's played Montreal West High School and proceeded to trounce them 7-1. Reid Sherriffs turned in an excellent game in nets for the Saints. Grant Sherriffs, Mike Gormely and Neil Fernandes each scored twice. Jacques Gendron accounted for the 7th goal.

Thus far in the league schedule St. Leo's has scored 20 goals and had only 5 scored against them. This puts St. Leo's in 1st place with nine points.

Goaler Reid Sherriffs has a 1.0 goals against average, the best in the league and he has 2 shut-outs in 5 games. Dalton Barnoff has played very consistent hockey for Coach Andy McGillis and has been a standout in almost every game. Neil Fernandes has also been a standout performer for the squad. Gerry Fortin seems to be staying away from the penalty box most faithfully now and Mike Gormely could be looking for Cassius Clay very soon for he seems to outclass his competitors 100% of the time.

There is a theory that hockey is not a one-man sport. Maybe a certain persons could try testing that theory more often, huh?

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Last December 27-28th McGill sponsored its annual Hockey Tournament. St. Leo's were invited to play and were somewhat favoured since they had won the consolation award last year. They came out of their first game as victors beating Montreal West High School 2-1. Neil Fernandes got both the goals. But in the next game the Academy was eliminated by Lower Canada College by a score of 5-3. Gerry Fortin scored 2 goals and Neil Fernandes getting the third goal. St. Thomas High School won the Tournament and Montreal West High School won the consolation round.

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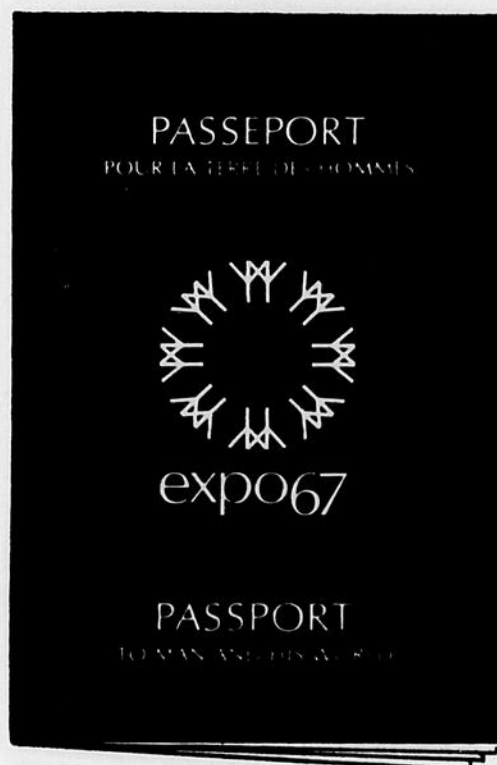

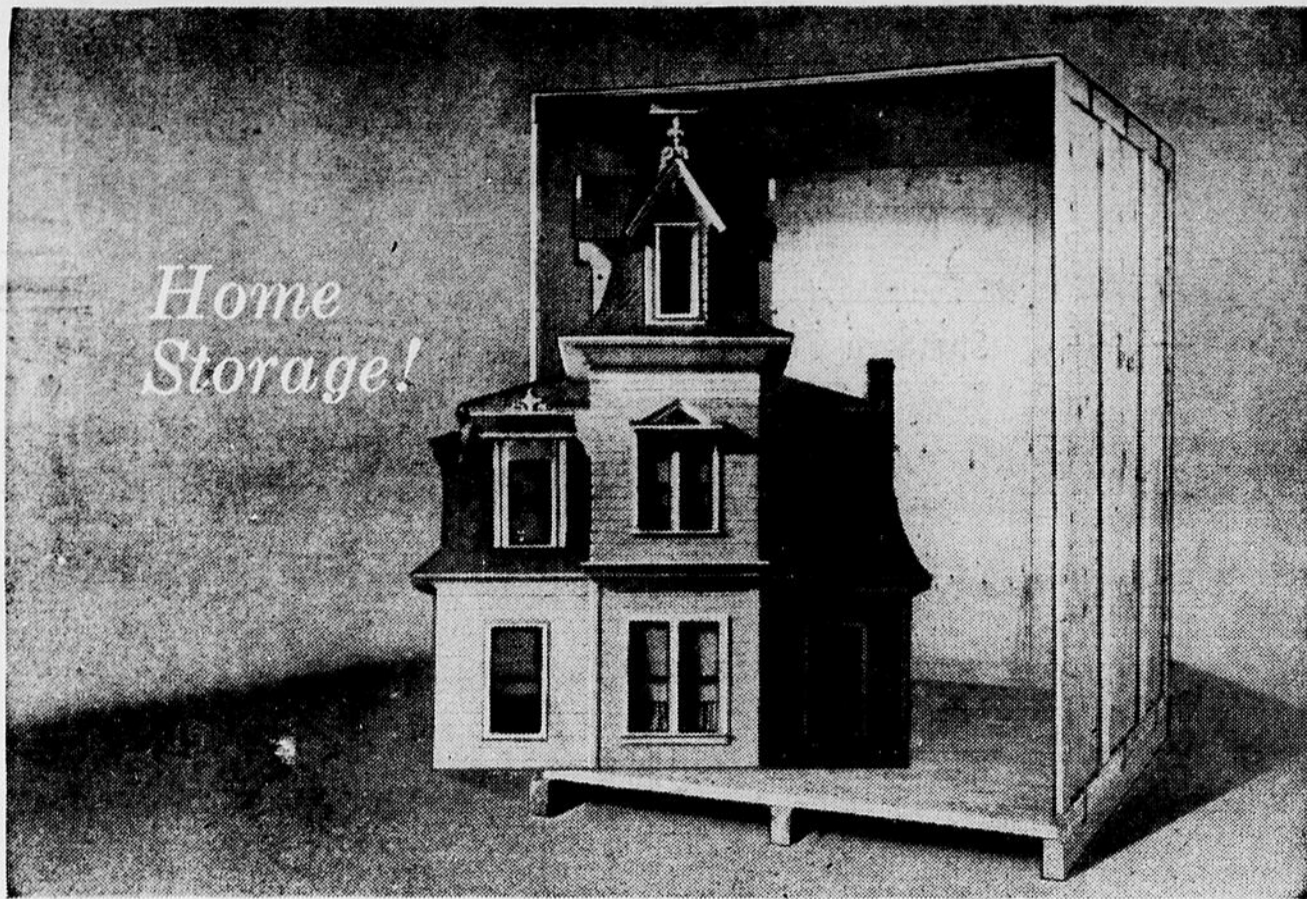
The next game was played against Montreal West High School and St. Leo's won 45-38. Stan Jablonski proved to be very consistent and again was the standout player.

Plans for the St. Leo's and St. Paul's Academies Carnival are being considered and should prove terrific.



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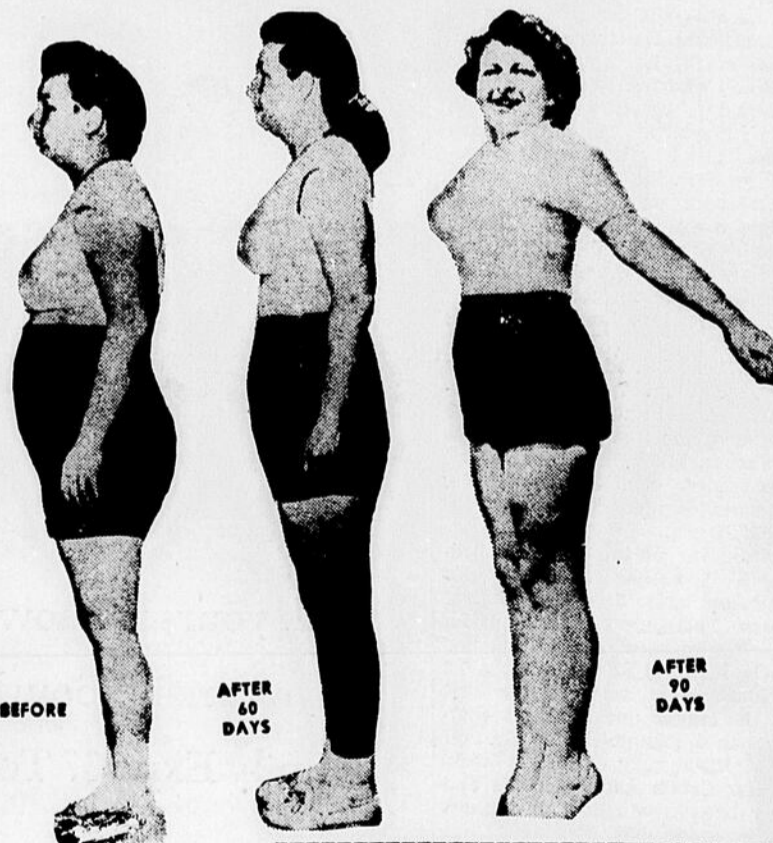
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
