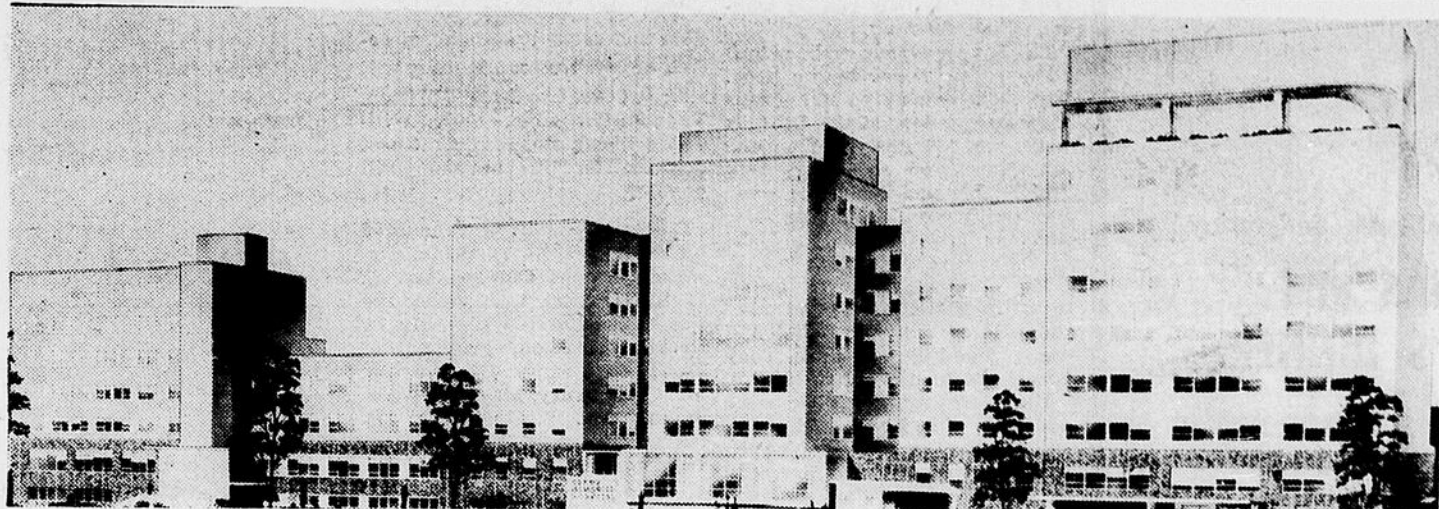

3 homes hit by thieves

Westmount detectives are investigating three cases of robbery and attempted robbery in Westmount homes. The Examiner this week learned of one case where two thugs forced their way into a Roslyn avenue home and tied-up the occupants before robbing the house. The incident took place Nov. 10 but was unreported by police until it came to the attention of The Examiner.

A reliable source disclosed that police in Montreal, Mount Royal, Hampstead and Cote St. Luc are searching for three men who have forced their way into homes and victimized the occupants. The trio is reported to delight in beating up their victims before robbing them.

Hampstead Police found the situation serious enough to send out a bulletin warning citizens of the activities of burglars in the community.

Westmount Police say that the incident here was not the work of the trio that has plagued other communities. Detectives report that 'Westmount has been lucky, so far'. Only one case of thugs forcing their way into a home has taken place.

The latest theft in the city was discovered Sunday when Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Henry, 768 Upper Lansdowne avenue, returned home to discover thieves had broken in and made off with jewelry, Christmas presents including a case of whiskey, money, and 1,000 pounds of meat from a freezer.

Detectives said the Henry's left home Saturday morning, and the theft probably occurred Saturday evening. Police again warned the public to make arrangements to have newspapers, etc. picked up

Reddy Hospital work reported on schedule

Work is progressing on schedule for the \$5.5 millions addition to the Reddy Memorial Hospital on Tupper street in Westmount.

Construction began in April of this year and the hospital expansion is expected to be completed within three years of the starting date.

The expansion is the first major building project undertaken by the Reddy since the present structure was built in 1927.

The addition and renovations provide for construction of an eight-storey east wing, a small centre wing, and an extension to the west along Tupper street, together with extensive internal modification and rehabilitation of services in the existing building.

The building program includes:

An increase of 45 percent in bed capacity.

A new out-patient department large enough to allow for a 50 per cent increase in out-patient visits.

A separate and fully equipped emergency department.

Construction of new operating rooms, a physiotherapy department, a pharmacy, dietary department, and a laundry.

A self-contained psychiatric unit.

Construction of a six-storey residence to accommodate interns and student nurses.

The Reddy's history dates back to 1871 when it was founded as the Woman's Hospital. In 1895 the hospital came under the direction of Dr. Herbert L. Reddy.

Lt. Stan Hugman relates traffic tales to Rotary

A policeman's lot is not a happy one— particularly if he is in the traffic division and in Westmount.

Westmount is only one mile square in area and has only 30,000 people — but 2,000,000 vehicles a month use its streets.

These figures were revealed Wednesday at Westmount Rotary luncheon by Lt. Stan Hugman of the local force, a graduate traffic specialist from Western University and the Ontario Traffic College, who has been with the Westmount force for more than a decade.

Westmount's force, of 62, may appear high by other standard, he said, but the crush of traffic at peak periods is unique and requires special handling.

One of a fund of stories told by the Lieutenant is worth repeating. Police picked up a wo-

man driving backward on Cote St. Antoine Road. She explained she couldn't get the car out of reverse gear and had driven that way from Eaton's parking lot without mishap. Police couldn't find anything in the books to charge her with, and, added Lt. Hugman, you must admit she had driven safely.

On the question of driving after imbibing — the Lieutenant was firm. His advice, of course, was "Don't try it."

Even if one is only sitting sleeping behind the wheel and the motor is not running, a charge of impaired driving could lead to a heavy fine and imprisonment or both, and suspension of license.

12 hurt in local accidents

Westmount Police this week again warned the public to drive safely as they processed accident reports showing that 12 persons have been injured in automobile accidents in the city just since the beginning of December.

Most seriously injured was Miss Sarah Starke, 64, 342 Olivier avenue. She was struck by a car while walking on the sidewalk at the southwest corner of Greene and Western avenue, Dec. 12. Miss Starke is still in Montreal General hospital where her condition is reported as 'improving.' Police identified the driver of the car that struck her as Terrence Day, 30, of 2236 Henriette street, Chambly.

Silence makes it unanimous

'Very happy' was Mayor Drury's two-word off-the-cuff comment Wednesday, after closing of a public meeting held for the ratification of revised plans for Westmount Centre.

The mayor was happy because the people were satisfied — no one showed up to oppose the plan.

The complex is to be built between Wood, Greene, Elm and St. Catherine and Western.

It consists of two 21-storey apartment buildings, a 20-floor office structure and a two-storey department store fronting on St. Catherine.

First reading of the by-law has already taken place, and since the law has been complied with, in the question of providing opposition opportunity — it is expected that the second and third readings will take place at the next meeting of council late Monday afternoon.

A spokesman for Westmount Centre told The Examiner that if all goes well work on the project is expected to get underway next Spring.

Forty-six elector-proprietors in the district were eligible to protest the by-law permitting the construction. At a public meeting held last year, five ratepayers lodged their protest. Ten were needed then to force a referendum. Some 70 persons showed up for that meeting.

Wednesday night the only persons present in addition to the mayor and alderman, were officials of the Westmount Centre, one representative of the Westmount Municipal Association, and an Examiner reporter.

Western ave. re-opening next week

City officials announced this week that Western avenue would be open sometime next week.

Resurfacing of the road was scheduled to begin Friday. It is expected to be completed early in the week.

Mainly sunny with some wind and powder snow. Very cold. Moonlit nights, blue sky, cloudless dawns and orange and salmon tinted sunsets. This is the beginning of the freeze-up in the north.

Normally the middle of this week should be extremely cold with 2-3" of powder snow and gusty winds. Low temperatures continuing in the north and east. For some places in the south, easing a little with white frosts, freezing drizzle and soft snow, then turning cold with wind driven snow.

The snow falls could amount to 10 inches, or we could have the equivalent precipitation as 1" of rain. In seasons where Easter is arriving late in April, thawing conditions can develop for this last quarter of the Moon.

Temperature range, night and day: south zero and 40°F; north and east, ten below and 35°F. Precipitation, rain 1" or snow 10".

 by a neighbour if home owners plan to be away, even if just for a weekend. Saturday's newspapers left on the Henry's porch may have tipped off the thieves that no one was home, they said.
 A burglar was frightened off by a maid on Dec. 10 in an Edgehill road home. The intruder entered the house around midnight. His movements awoke a maid who cried out. The man ran off without taking anything.
 The Roslyn avenue robbery took place a few hours before noon. Two men wearing painters' caps came to the door of the Cadman residence, 544 Roslyn. When the maid answered the door, they grabbed her and forced their way into the house. Inside they also tied up Mrs. Cadman, and the family's 14-year-old daughter.
 Mr. Cadman happened to return from the dentist at that time. He entered the house and was grabbed by the thugs. They bound him to a bookcase door.
 The thieves ransacked the house and fled with jewels, old coins, and personal papers including the family's passports and the deed to the house.
 The 14-year-old girl managed to work herself loose from the ropes around her and she released the others.
 Police report the thugs wore nylons pulled over their faces. They are believed to have used a blue truck with the lettering 'General Contractors' in the robbery.

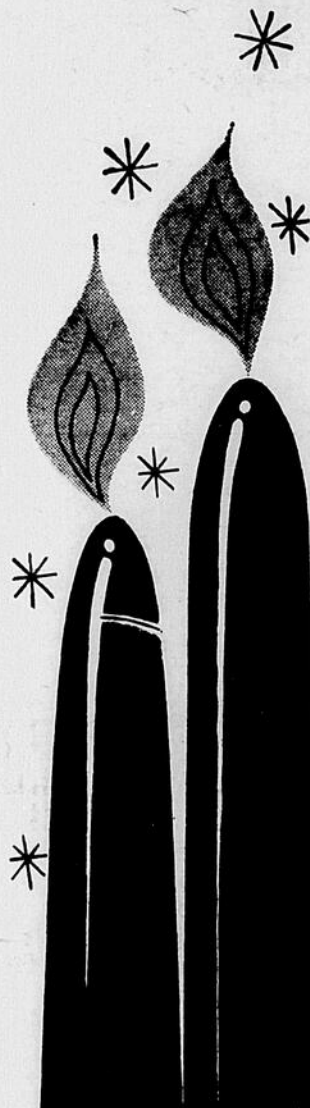

Book review

Good guide to Montreal

THE LURE OF MONTREAL. Revised Edition, by W. P. Percival. The Ryerson Press, Toronto, 204 p., \$4.95.

W. P. Percival, former Deputy Minister of Education in Quebec, has thoroughly revised his excellent guide to Montreal to bring in all the changes rapidly taking place in the city.

The book, as a tourist's guide to the city and surrounding areas, is the best so far published. Mr. Percival covers every aspect of the city, from its historical points of interest to plans for the latest high-rise complex.

Unfortunately, Mr. Percival also writes a great deal about the relations between French and English-speaking in the province. When he is simply presenting the facts, the historical data is fascinating and it gives added dimension to the picture he paints of the city. However, Mr. Percival's attitudes color the historical rendering all too often. He speaks of French-Canadians in those unreal terms that publicly defined their existence during the Duplessis era.

Mr. Percival has captured the bright, vibrant forward movement of the city, but he has completely ignored the struggle of French-Quebecers to catch up with the realities of 1964.

However, the book is primarily a guide to Montreal, and taken as such, it will inform and entertain even the Montrealer who thinks he knows all about this city. Time could be well spent visiting the sites mentioned with the book in hand. For any Montrealer showing his city to a visitor, it is indispensable.

The work, although it retains the former title, is really a new book, for every page has been rewritten and new pages have been added.

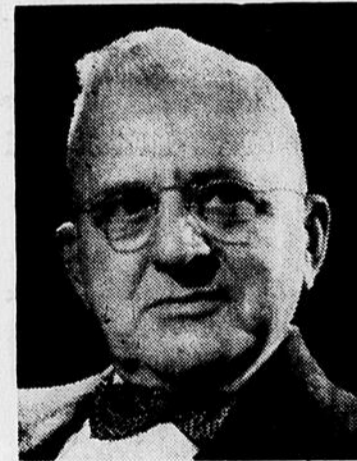

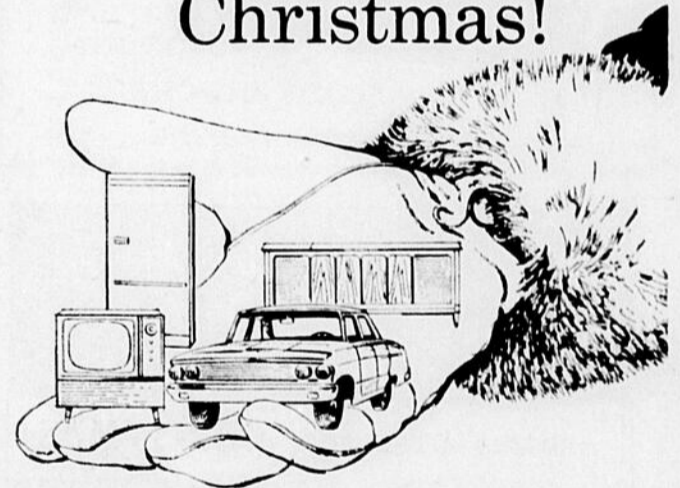

Mackay Center launches appeal for funds to finish building

The Mackay Center for Deaf and Crippled Children has launched a special appeal in order to meet the \$2,500,000 objective set for the Mackay Center Capital Campaign.

The campaign was short by \$236,121.74. That sum must be raised in order for the Center to finish their new building on Decarie boulevard.

About 10,000 copies of a special letter of appeal written by one of the pupils are being mailed out this week to friends and supporters of the Center. The letter, written by Diane Larkin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. Larkin, of

3092 Langelier street, Montreal, reads as follows:

"Dear Friend:

There is a wonderful new school being built on Decarie boulevard. It is for the boys and girls of the Mackay Center for Deaf and Crippled Children. I am one of the pupils. We are all excited as we hope we are really and truly going to move in next

Spring!

The outside is nearly finished and now many workmen are busy on the inside. We can

hardly wait to see the inside. Our teacher has told us that it has been specially planned for us with many new things that will help us. You see we are not able to attend regular school and our old building is out of date and so crowded we have no room to work or play.

Our teacher has told us that we are still short of money to finish our new school. Won't you please, this Christmas, send us as much money as you can so that our new school will be ready for us next Spring. You will make over two hundred children so happy if you can help and will be forever grateful."

Campaign officials report that the cost to date of conducting the campaign is just slightly over 3/4 of 1 per cent. The paper, printing and stamps for the letters being mailed were donated by friends of the Center, and volunteers addressed the envelopes.

"I know of no cause more heartwarming and satisfying than the rehabilitation and education of deaf or disabled children," Mr. A. Hollis Marden, president of the Center, said. "Crippled in body — or deprived of hearing and speech — these courageous children, through specialized training, can become happy and useful members of society."

The Mackay Center for Deaf and Crippled Children incorporates two of Montreal's oldest and best known charities, The Mackay Institute for the Deaf, founded in 1869, and The School for Crippled Children incorporated in 1919.

Obituary

Ralph L. Bercovitch

Funeral service was held this week for Ralph Lazar Bercovitch, Westmount lawyer.

Mr. Bercovitch, who lived at 4732 Westmount boulevard, died Friday in the Royal Victoria Hospital after a lengthy illness.

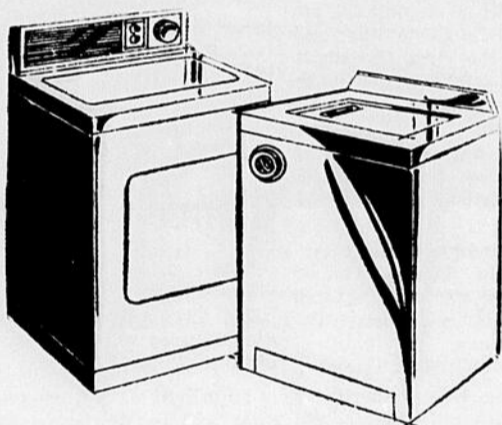

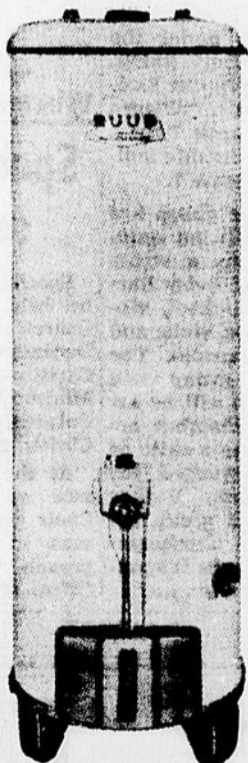

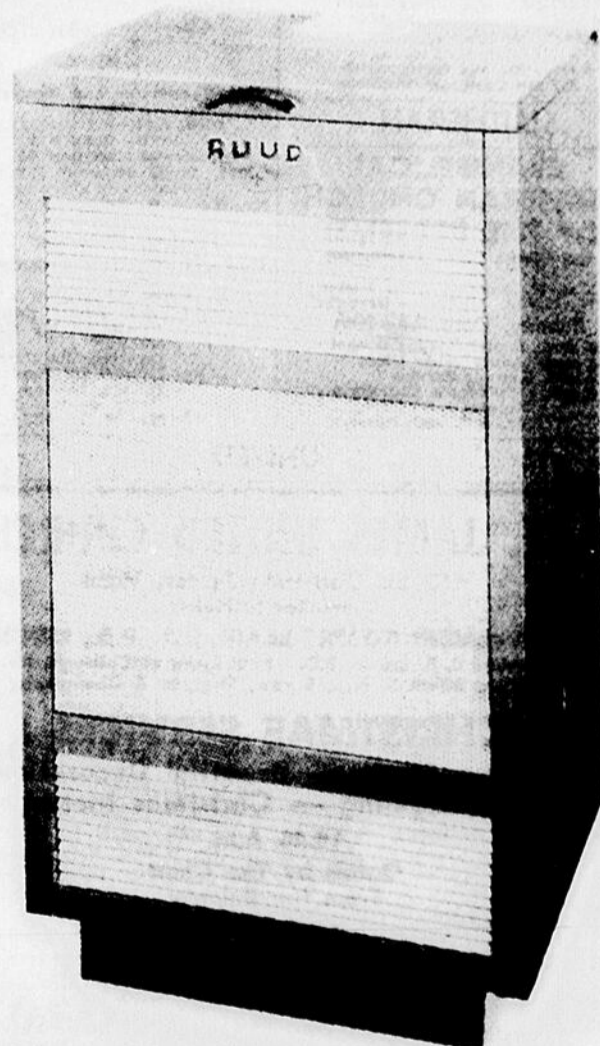

Group sets show for children

Family Planning Association tackles population problems

There is an old saying which goes like this, "If you want to be sure to get a job done, give it to the busiest person you know," and this motto might well be applied to **Dr. Anne Batshaw**, gynecologist, English vice-president of the Montreal Family Planning Association.

Dr. Batshaw, who is the wife of Hon. Mr. Justice Harry Batshaw, having brought up their two children, devotes her time to her practice, the Jewish General Hospital and the Family Planning Assn.

Interested in this topic for many years, Dr. Batshaw stressed the fact that "birth control is not intended to prevent children — but to plan for every child, an ideal time, when the mother is well and strong."

The Family Planning Association of Montreal draws its membership from such distantly related disciplines as medicine, theology, education, anthropology, physiotherapy and demography. It has 40 paid members, both English and French-speaking and a mailing list of 155.

Rabbi H. Leonard Poller of Temple Beth Sholom is the president, **Dr. Anne Batshaw** the English vice-president and **Mme. Alice Parizeau**, the French vice-president.

Stuffed toys — are they safe?

We would not let our children play with a mangy dog, but the plush animals which they hug are often dangerous. Many are stuffed with shredded rags of doubtful cleanliness, horrible color and suspicious origin.

The Consumer's Association of Canada (Quebec) has sought in vain for many years to have provincial legislation passed here which would require the use of new or sterilized wadding, especially in objects destined for children's use. Everyone knows that young children put both toys and clothes into their mouths, and so can easily become infected by unclean stuffing material.

Last year at the Christmas season one had to be very persistent to ferret out a toy dog or bear whose contents were shown on the label. Those which were labelled bore the notation "new material only" or an assurance that the

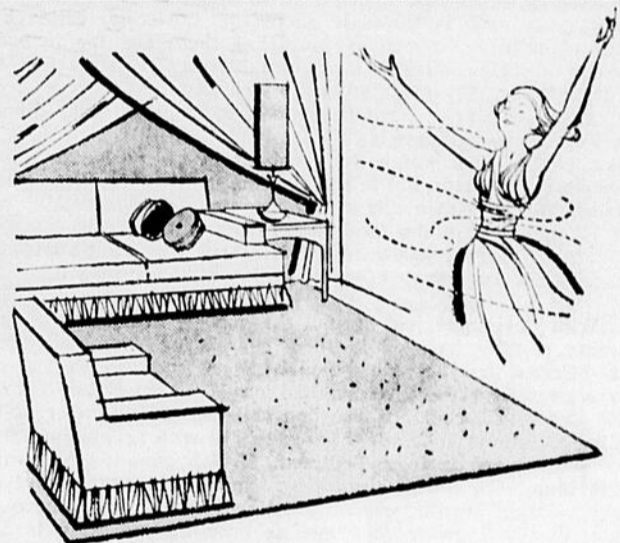

population of three billion, the third billion has only come into being in the last fifty years.

Mrs. Cadbury, who has spent thirty years working for the cause of birth control, is the daughter of a suffragette and has inherited her mother's fervent belief in the rights of women. She believes that a

woman should have the right to take up a profession, attend university, plan her pregnancies.

Statistics show that there are at least 75,000-90,000 abortions a year in Canada. The majority of these performed on married women who simply could not cope with another child.

LAW OUTMODED

Dr. Michel J. Berard, chief obstetrician and gynecologist at the Notre Dame Hospital said in an interview recently, that birth control and contraception had never been discussed by a medical association in Canada before this time. "This was so," he said, "because doctors cannot legally do anything about these problems." The Canadian government strictly forbids the selling or distribution of contraceptive devices, or the dispensing of birth control advice to parents.

Dr. Batshaw feels that the climate has changed because of the stand taken by Cardinal Leger when he urged the church to take a new look at its teachings on birth control and his statement that the church must teach that "married couples are not merely reproductive but also persons."

This Week in Westmount

DR. STANLEY SKORYNA, Sherbrooke west, in charge of research expedition to Easter Island which landed this week one day ahead of schedule. Dr. Skoryna, who has completed the first successful experimental attempt to prevent the absorption of radioactive strontium into the human system, had his latest discovery disclosed at the World Congress of Gastroenterology in Brussels, Belgium.

It took seven years of study to find that a certain species of brown seaweed can be processed to obtain a derivative which can be effective in preventing absorption of the deadly matter into the intestine, the only way it can work into the skeleton and cause

bone cancer. The effectiveness of the agent has been proved in controlled studies carried on in living rats. Dr. Skoryna expects that a pill may be used by persons working in nuclear research centres and atomic energy plants so they may be protected from the inadvertent release of radioactive materials. Pills may also be taken with food in fall-out areas to bind the radioactive strontium and carry it out as waste, ac-

ording to Dr. Skoryna.
