THE RUSSELL SCANDAL CASE. A BRITISH VICTORY IN INDIA. ANGLIO-VENEZUELAN DISPUTE.

LONDON, April 5.—In the case of the Countess against her husband, Earl Russell, for the restoration of conjugal rights, counsel for the Countess this morning withdrew the charges made by her against her husband, and the case is proceeding with this feature eliminated.

The Foreign Office, in answer to inquiries, replies that there is nothing to be said in relation to the Venezuela situation.

AT A SPECIAL MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF QUEBEC, held on the FIFTH day of APRIL, 1895, the following By-Law was passed, to wit: BY-LAW TO MAKE COMPULSORY THE SWEEEPING OF CHIMNEYS.
