Annual Convention at Chateau Frontenac.

Q. A. A. Club Recognized.

Quebec Again in the Intermediate Series.

The 26th Annual Convention of the N. A. L. A. took place at the Chateau Frontenac yesterday and was attended by 56 delegates.

There was a good deal of lobbying done in the corridors of the hotel, which were crowded all day, each lobbyist having some wire of his own to pull. The chief part of the fine work was done by the rival sections of the Quebec Club, who worked hard all day, pretty nearly every delegate being canvassed by both factions.

The Council meeting was first held and at it the Secretary-Treasurer's report was read and adopted and Mr. Griffith, of Sherbrooke, in the absence of Mr. T. J. Maguire, who could not attend, was appointed Secretary pro tem.

The members of the Council present were Messrs. Butler, President; W. H. Davidson, Vice-President; Gagné, Carragher, McKenna, Carlin, O'Reilly and Scullion.

The meeting of the Convention began about 4 p.m. when the following Committees were struck by the President, Mr. Butler:—

CREDENTIALS.—C. Chittick, O'Reilly, Carlin, and Davidson.

ADDITION.—Davidson, Brambley, Carlin, O'Reilly, Scullion, Dupuis, Kirwin.

Mr. Davidson, Quebec, object to Mr. Kirwin, Sherbrooke, as a delegate, as representing the Quebec Lacrosse Club, signed by Mr. J. E. Walsh, as President, and T. D. Beattie, as Secretary.

Mr. Beattie, however, was not Secretary nor was Mr. J. E. Walsh President of Q. L. C. He however allowed the matter to drop for the moment.

Mr. Butler then read the annual report, which was adopted on motion of Messrs. O'Dell and Scullion.
