Truck fire extinguished

At 8:30 Saturday morning, Piers Ebsworth who was visiting with the Bill Brandums in Shawville, glanced out the front window and noticed a truck aflame on the hospital road. Bill grabbed his home fire extinguisher (a dry chemical extinguisher such as is required equipment in all the mine staff houses) also his Carbon Tetrachloride Extinguisher from his car, and played them both onto the burning gas which was dripping from the truck's engine onto the ground below.

The driver, Israel Chevalier had already exhausted his own Carbon Tet extinguisher trying to extinguish the engine fire through the hood which was too hot to lift and was shrieking that if the seven ton tank of anhydrous ammonia on his truck took fire the whole town would blow up. The contract, retroactive to October 14, 1967 when the brotherhood was certified to bargain for the employees, calls for a basic wage rate of 2.63 an hour for laborers with a top rate of \$3.84. The rate for Class A tradesman is 3.72.

Rates are based on current scales in the industry. These scales expired April 30 and negotiations are currently in progress in the pulp and paper industry in Eastern Canada for new contracts.

The Pontiac contract terminates April 30, 1970, but may be reopened this September for reconsideration of wages and fringe benefits. The signing took place Monday night, July 8 at Campbell's Bay with Doug Covey, Pontiac division manager, signing for the company and John DeCarufel, international representative of the brotherhood, signing for the union, and Robert Eiswald President of Pontiac Local 420, S. Doherty, Raymond L. Bertrand, James D. Houghton, Dave Whalen and L. C. Elliott of Local 420.

On November 14, 1967, the company presented its proposals for a contract to the brotherhood, which replied with its own on January 9, 1968. Bargaining began on January 29th but negotiations broke down March 21. Conciliation followed in April, May and June. The employees voted June 9 to strike if conciliation failed. Both sides reached agreement June 26.

Mr and Mrs Ronald Dean and family remained in town until Monday before returning to their home in Perth.

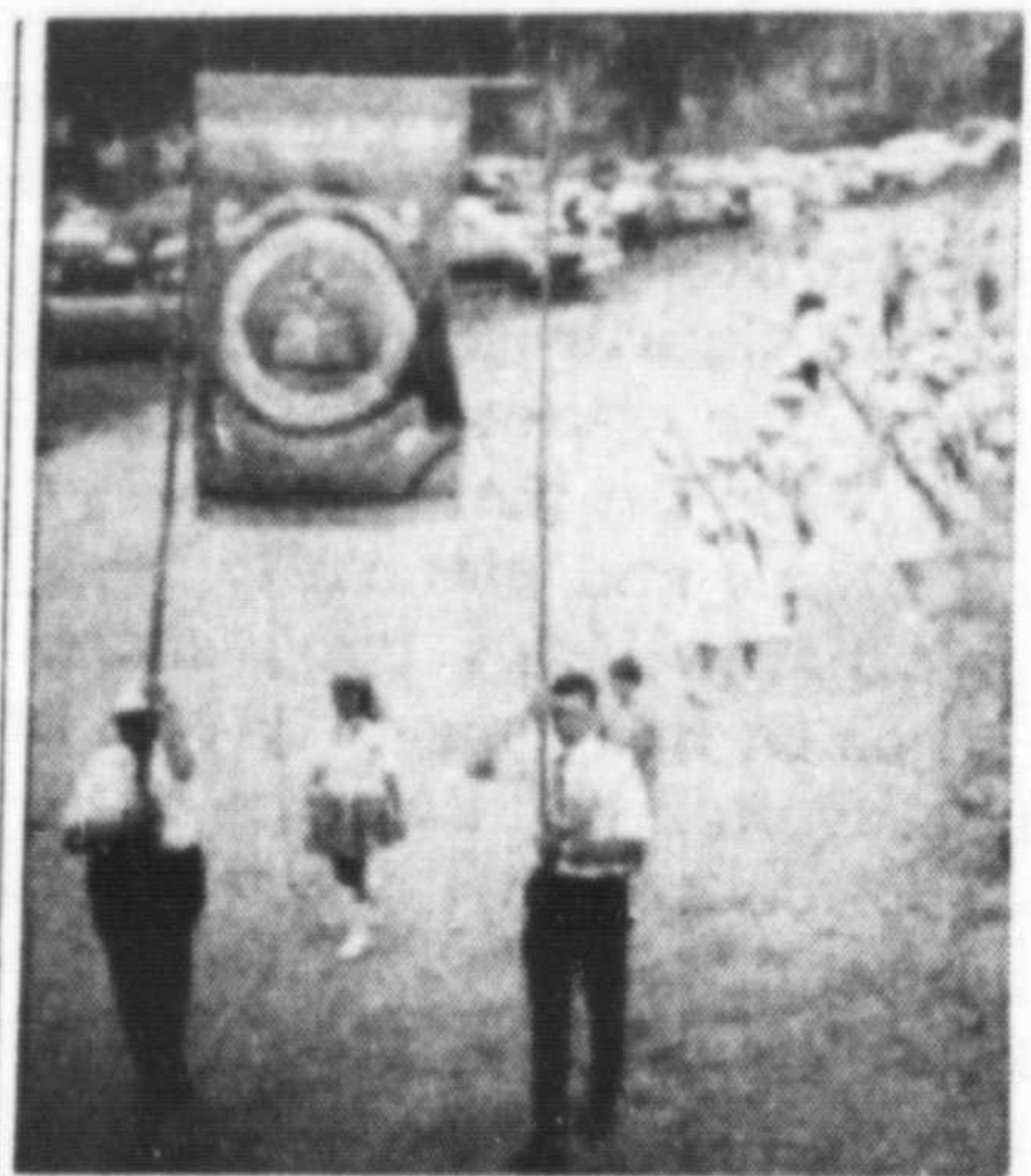

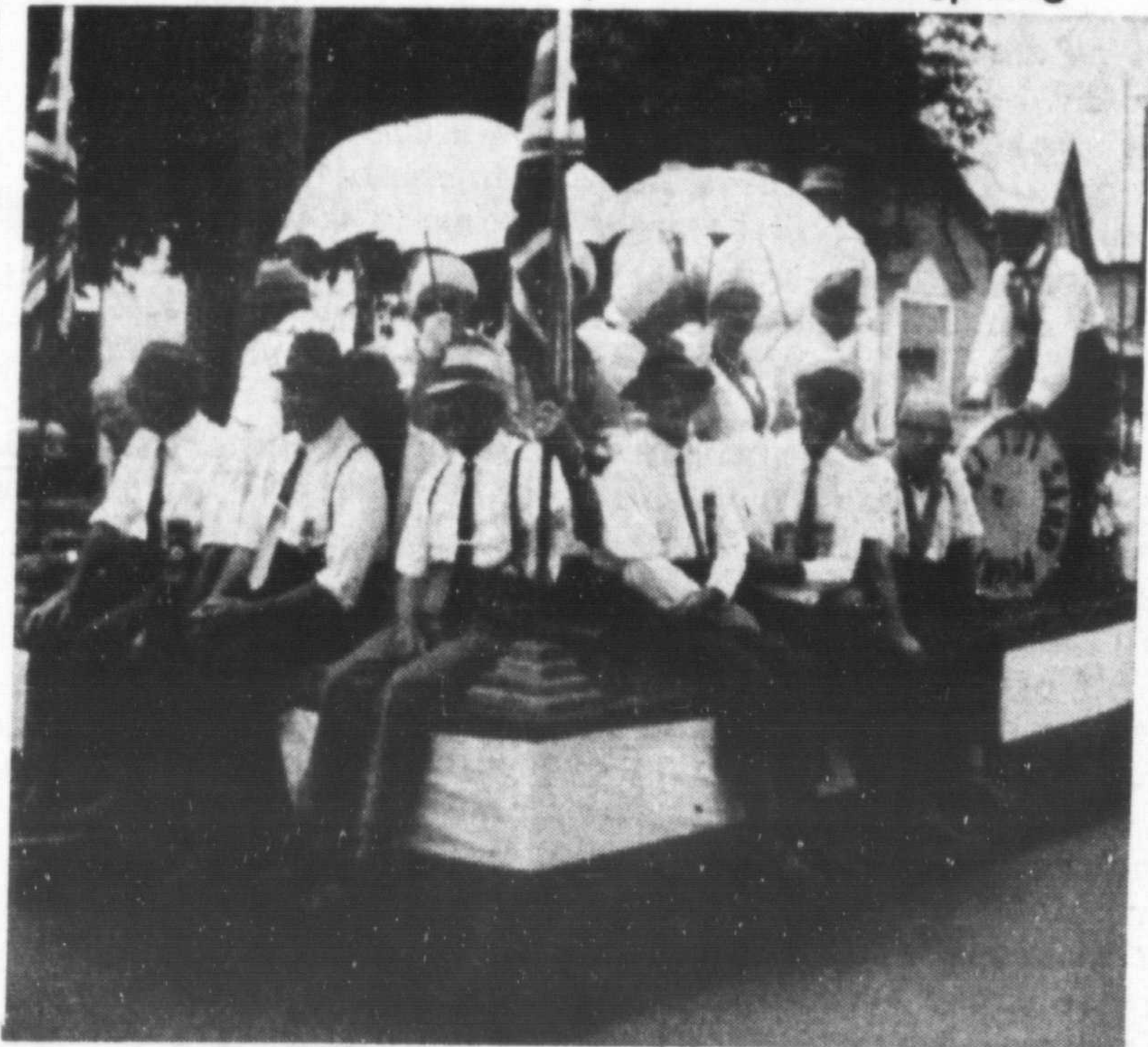

IN SHAWVILLE

If you are a little child on a hot day in Shawville you can splash around in the Rotary Club Wading Pool where there are slides and seesaws and benches in the shade for mothers and all the fun of the beach right in the middle of town. If you want to you can take lessons at Green Lake where Bryan Murray is teaching swimming at the Lions Club beach on Jack Argue's property.

In the middle of town there is also an enormous central park called Shawville Fair Grounds where ball games both organized and disorganized are played in the evenings by the working people and all day by keen youngsters. There are also creeks and ponds where a person can sit and fish by the hour undisturbed, fields to wander in or just lie down in and think, trees to climb, friendly stores where a cold drink can be bought and benches on Main Street to watch the world go by from.

In Shawville you can keep a horse or a pony and can still ride safely through town to shaded dirt roads for delightful trail rides in the country, or you can rent a saddle horse nearby.

Miles of sand beaches are so close you can slip out for a fast swim and be home before you lose your cool, or you can spend the day or the week, or as some Shawville families do, the whole summer at the beach.

From Shawville it is just a few minutes to really good fishing, hunting and skiing. Skating in winter is enjoyed by people of all ages at the local arena where the Minor Hockey arrangements are second to none and music is provided for evening skaters who just want to enjoy sociability on blades.

Shawville is a clean town where the street cleaning crew keeps busy year round. There is a courteous policeman who stands ready to help in case of emergency and who tries to keep people from parking where they should not. There is a town engineer who keeps the water system supplying pure spring water and the sanitary sewage system in good order.

Shawville has a town operated library, free outdoor band concerts in summer by its own band which anyone can join who enjoys music, garbage collection all year, fast snow removal crews in winter, zoned residential areas, modern stores as well as a home bakery, a blacksmith and a harness maker. Shawville has a modern printshop, a hydro office, dry cleaners plant, laundromat, hairdressers, a telephone company, jewellery store, four doctors and an up to date hospital with labs, X-ray, physiotherapy room, out patient service operating rooms and maternity section.

Shawville's schools are as progressive as they come and as of this year they will include academic and technical training and classes from kindergarten to post high school courses, with a separate school for Roman Catholic pupils. The town is also dotted with churches both historic and modern. We have daily bus service to Ottawa and two mail deliveries a day at the Post Office.

Stately homes on Main Street reflect the grandeur of a century ago and the newer residences include models of the most modern home building styles.

Two great industries outside town are an open pit iron mine and a kraft pulp mill, both of which provide steady employment for a large segment of Shawville's population. The largest employers inside the town are the hospital and the schools, which means that added to technicians and engineers are teachers and medical staff to provide a large population here of professional people.

There are fish and game clubs, bridge clubs, curling and broomball, Women's Institutes and church organizations, Boy Scouts and Girl Guides, a Calf Club, CGIT, and a Pony Club, Lions and Rotary and a Driving Club for harness racing, and an Agricultural Society which provides prizes as incentive for the public exhibition of handicrafts, horticulture, baking, canning and agricultural produce of every sort.

We have two taverns and a pool room, a couple of lunch counters and a chip wagon. Our streets are paved, our Centennial and our Memorial Parks are well kept, we have two banks and big post office, garages to service every make of car, a dental surgeon and a veterinarian. The fire hall is in the middle of town and the quality of the volunteer brigade and the equipment keeps the insurance rates low in Shawville.

Well, it was a hot week and we heard more complaining about one thing and another than we like to hear so just decided to list some of the nicer things about this old place. Actually it makes very good listing and if we've missed some of the best things about Shawville, please let us know.

This week, what with the postal strike and all, THE EQUITY may not get much further than Shawville but the point of all the above is not to sell the town to far away people, just to give us locals something to not complain about.
