UNITED STATES.

(From the N. O. Picayune of June 15.)

FROM VERA CRUZ.—The papers and private accounts say that the fever at Vera Cruz is on the increase. When taken in time physicians have been pretty successful in its treatment and it is not considered dangerous; but it is to be presumed that the habits of many of those exposed to its ravages are not all calculated to secure their exemption from attack, or a favorable issue when attacked.

The heat at Vera Cruz is intense. For ten days, says the Eagle of the 5th, the thermometer has ranged from 87° to 92° day and night, in the shade.

A large train was to leave Vera Cruz on the morning of the 5th inst. for Puebla, under the command of Col. McIntosh. It was to carry up a mail, the first, says the Eagle, for nearly a month, and about \$300,000 in specie, in charge of Major A. G. Bennett, paymaster.

The train was to be escorted by a large force of soldiery, composed of company F of the 4th Infantry, company B of the 5th Infantry, company G of the 7th Infantry, companies K and L of the 15th Infantry, and companies D G and K of the 3d Dragoons—in all about 800 men.

HOSPITALS AT QUARANTINE, STATES ISLAND.—There were in the Hospitals on the 11th June, patients (emigrants) 741.—Admitted since 223. Total 964. Discharged 195; died 28. Remaining in the Hospital, June 21st, 740.

FREDERICKSBURG, June 16th.—TERRIBLE EXPLOSION.—TWENTY-FIVE LIVES LOST.—By the New-Orleans Picayune and Delta extras, issued at noon on the 9th inst., we have particulars of a dreadful explosion which occurred on board the steamer Eda on the 4th inst. in the Ouchita river. Twenty-five persons were killed, and eight wounded.

LOWER PROVINCES.

HALIFAX, June 15.—An extra Gazette, published on Saturday, contains a proclamation, by His Excellency the Lieut. Governor, enforcing regulations under the authority of the Quarantine Laws, to be observed by vessels arriving at this or any other port in the Province, from Great Britain or elsewhere, together with a list of fees to be paid to the Health Officer, on his visiting such vessels; and the appointment of several gentlemen as Health Wardens.

The weather, for the past three weeks, has been very seasonable, with occasional rains; and on Saturday evening we had some fine refreshing showers. We are happy to learn that the agricultural prospects are favorable.—(Ibid)

YARMOUTH, (N. S.) June 7.—THE SMALL-POX.—Mr. George Allen, of Kelley's Cove, when returned in Boston, took the Small-Pox. He returned home, and being unconscious of the disease that was lurking in his physical system, went out in a small vessel on a fishing cruise. Having been attacked by the malady, he returned home on Saturday, and unfortunately went into the bosom of his own family. There can be little doubt that others of the crew (consisting of seven) and his own family are infected. The Board of Health met yesterday, and adopted decisive measures to prevent the disease from spreading. We advise every body, by immediate vaccination, to avert the extension of a malady that has hitherto been so destructive of human life.—(Herald)

SMALL POX AT NEWPORT, CO. HANTS.—That terrible scourge the Small Pox has again made its appearance. Dr. Denison, jr. was called on the 2nd instant, to visit a young man, recently from the United States, who was laboring under the confidant kind. Every precaution should be taken to prevent this dreadful malady from raging.—(Acadian Recorder)

MORTALITY AMONG THE EMIGRANTS AT ST. JOHN, N. B.—There are several vessels still at Quarantine at St. John, N. B. The number of deaths on board the vessels and on shore amounted to 143. The sick at present are 450. About 5000 emigrants have already arrived at St. John the present season.

FREE TRADE.—The Jamaica House of Assembly has adopted some resolutions, which are thought, in the Island, highly important for the future well-being of that important colony. It has abolished the Differential Duties in favor of the manufactures of Great Britain, and it is hoped, that Kingston will next year be made a free port as St. Thomas now is. This, it is thought, will produce a very considerable traffic with the United States as well as with France and Germany.

FAMINE IN NEWFOUNDLAND.—We were informed by an intelligent and respectable individual who came hither a few days since from New Harbour, Trinity Bay, for a few pounds of flour (which he was obliged to carry over at his back)—that the people of that settlement were in the most deplorable condition, having nothing to eat and scarcely a seed-potato to put in the ground. He also assured us that no supplies were expected, and that even if they came the people were so much reduced by long and unavoidable abstinence from nutritious food that some considerable time must elapse before they would acquire sufficient strength to follow their avocations. Accounts no less distressing continue to reach us from other parts of the Bay. We have been repeatedly blamed for not giving greater prominence to those heart-rending narrations, but really we know not what benefit will derive from their repetition either to the sufferers or to the country.—(Harbour Grace Herald, June 2.)

A good deal of discussion having arisen about the treatment of passengers—the number which a vessel of a given tonnage can legally carry, &c., the following extract from the 5th & 6th Wm. IV., Cap. 55, for regulating the carriage of passengers from the United Kingdom, may prove interesting:—

That no ship shall proceed on the voyage with more persons on board than in the proportion of three persons for every 5 tons of her registered burden, the master and crew being included in and forming part of such prescribed number; that no ship having more than one deck shall carry any passengers upon any such voyage, unless she shall be of the height of 5 1/2 feet at the least between decks; that no ship having only one deck shall carry any passengers upon any such voyage, unless a platform be laid beneath such deck, in such a manner as to afford a space of the height of at least 5 1/2 feet, and that no such ship shall have more than two tiers of berths, that no such ship having two tiers of berths, shall carry any passengers on any such voyage, unless there shall be an interval of 6 inches at least between the decks or platform and the floor of the lower tier, throughout the whole extent thereof; provided that whatever be the tonnage of the ship, no greater number of persons as passengers shall be taken on board than shall be after the rate of one such person for every ten superficial feet of the lower deck or platform unoccupied by goods or stores, not being the personal luggage of such persons.

SMALL POX.—Two more cases have taken place on board of the Mayflower. The health officer went on board on Monday last for the purpose of releasing her from quarantine, when these two cases were discovered; it is said that they were attempted to be concealed by the Captain, by which he has subjected himself to a fine of £50. We have not heard

what steps the Board of Health intend taking in the matter. The pilot, Mr. Wm. Anderson, is still kept on board.—(Pictou Eastern Chronicle)

CANADA.

KINGSTON, June 19th.—Thursday evening several barges loaded with Emigrants arrived at our wharfs, and during the day a goodly number of Germans also arrived. There could not be fewer than one thousand, and we have pleasure in stating that generally they appeared in tolerable good health, the Germans more especially.

Two of the emigrants died during the night, but amidst so many, and under existing circumstances of previous deprivation, and in some cases of destitution, and a long voyage, the wonder is rather that more than two were not in a dying condition.—(Chronicle)

THE EMIGRANTS.—Upon enquiry in the proper quarter, we find that the emigrants are forwarded as soon as they are able to proceed—and over as wide a section of the Province as possible. About one half of the whole go to Toronto and Hamilton, and the remainder have been distributed between Cobourg, Port Hope, Windsor and St. Catharines.—The Earl Cathcart, Propeller, took a number of indigent emigrants to ports on Lake Erie, and at least 150 have been sent up the Bay of Quinte, and to the Townships in rear of Kingston.

The number already forwarded, amount to from 9 to 10 thousand. The deaths have not been great in proportion—not more than ten deaths in Hospital—and from the sheds and lodging houses, not more than 20 or 25 at the outside.—(Ib.)

ALARM OF FIRE AND THE VALUE OF TIN ROOVES.—About 9 o'clock last evening the fire bell rang and sparks were discovered apparently from the tin roof of the Easternmost guard house at the new fortification opposite the market building. The Engines with the Hook and Ladder Company were promptly on the spot, but it was found that the avenues were carefully locked, the hook and ladder men soon scaled the walls, and on reaching the ridge, found that the tinman who had been at work, had incautiously left his fire place with a few charcoal embers in it, and which became ignited, and the sparks were driven off by the strong wind which prevailed, so as to give the effect of a roof being on fire; had it been a shingle roof, it might again have endangered that part of the town. We cannot but think that the Corporation would be fully justified in passing a law requiring all old shingle rooves to be covered with a coating of coal tar and burnt sand, and that no new shingled rooves should be erected.—(Ib.)

PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT. HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY. Monday, 21st June, 1847.

Nineteen Petitions were brought up and laid upon the table. An engrossed Bill to alter and amend an Act, intitled, "An Act to remedy certain defects in the Registration of titles, in the County of Hastings, in Upper Canada, was read the third time and passed. Mr. Merritt, Of the Niagara District Bank, for amendments to their charter; referred.

Mr. Foster, Of Inhabitants of Brome, that the practice of selling property at the church doors on Sundays, be discontinued.

Mr. Cayley, Of Inhabitants of the district of Huron, that the Toronto and Goderich Railroad Company be incorporated, and that the present harbour of Goderich be resumed by the crown, and completed.

Mr. Speaker laid before the House a statement of the receipts and disbursements of the St. Lawrence and Atlantic Railroad Company from 1st June 1845 to 30th November 1846.

On motion of the Receiver General, it was ordered, that the officers connected with the several chartered Banks and Insurance Offices of this Province, do lay before the House, the statement of the affairs of said Banks and Insurance Offices, as required by their Acts of incorporation.

Mr. Chalmers introduced a Bill to prevent the distillation of spirituous liquors, in this Province, from grain; second reading on Monday next.

On motion of Mr. Aylwin, the following Committee was appointed to enquire into the management of the Quarantine Station at Grosse Isle:—Messrs. Aylwin, Moffatt, Murney, Chabot, Cayley, Chauveau, Boulton, DeWitt, and Christie.

On motion of Mr. Dickson, an Address was voted for a statement of the expenditure on the Welland Canal since the close of the first Session of the present Parliament, and what proportion thereof has been expended between Lock N. 2. 18 and Port Dalhousie and at that Port, including the amount expended in excavating various cuts which were intended to let in the water from Lake Erie, progressed with to a certain extent, and then abandoned.

Mr. Williams introduced a Bill to extend the provisions of an Act of Parliament of the late Province of Upper Canada, intitled, "an Act to make valid certain Marriages heretofore contracted, and to provide for the future solemnization of matrimony in this Province," to Ministers of all Denominations of Christians; second reading Thursday next.

Mr. Fournier introduced a Bill to revive and amend a certain Act therein mentioned, concerning Surveyors and the measurement of Lands in Lower Canada; second reading Monday next.

On motion of Mr. M. Cameron, an Address was voted for a Copy of an order in Council of the 17th September 1845, and an order or instruction to the Commissioner of Crown Lands dated 18th November 1845, relative to Clergy Lands, with a List of persons who have purchased Clergy Lands from 17th September 1845 to 1st April 1846, with the particulars of the sale, and whether charged with rent or interest; and also for a Copy of the rules and regulations of the Crown Land Department by which the public are excluded from the public office except on special application.

Mr. Moffatt introduced the four following Bills: To incorporate the Montreal Firemen's Benevolent Association; second reading Monday next.

To enable the Bank of Montreal to increase its capital stock; second reading Thursday next.

To enable the City Bank to increase its capital stock; second reading Thursday next.

To amend the Act of incorporation of the Montreal Gas Light Company; second reading Thursday next.

Mr. Laterriere introduced a Bill to facilitate the reunion to the domain of Lands in Lower Canada conceded by Seigniors on conditions which have not been fulfilled; second reading Monday next.

Mr. Aylwin introduced the three following Bills; second readings on Monday next.

To secure titles to real estate to certain persons naturalized under the Statute of Lower Canada of the 1 Will. 4 Cap. 53.

To supply proof of title to the Tollbridge over the River Etchemio, and for other purposes.

To facilitate proof of the charter and Act of incorporation of the British American Land Company.

Mr. G. Sherwood introduced a Bill to authorize the issuing of Letters Patent to Isaac Beecher for an improved Bark Mill; second reading Thursday next.

Mr. Lafontaine introduced a Bill to amend the Act incorporating La Banque du Peuple; second reading on Thursday next.

Mr. Scott introduced a Bill to authorize Augustin Norbert Morin to build a Tollbridge over the River du Nord, in the Parish of St. Jerome, to fix the rates of toll for passing thereon, and to provide regulations for the same; second reading Thursday next.

The Bill to confer limited corporated powers on the Towns and villages of Canada West not specially incorporated, was read the second time, and committed for Monday next.

The Bill for compensating the families of persons killed by accident, was read the second time, and committed for to-morrow.

The second reading of the Bills to amend the Law of imprisonment for debt, was deferred till Wednesday next.

Mr. Cayley laid the Public Accounts of last year before the House.

The Montreal New City Gas Company Bill was read the second time, and referred.

The second reading of the Montreal Mining Company was deferred till Wednesday next.

Mr. Sol. Gen. Cameron moved that the Bill to amend the law and facilitate proceedings in actions of Dowe, be now read a second time.

Yeas 14, Nays 39.

The second reading of the Bill to amend the Law of Slander and Libel was deferred till Monday next.

Mr. Meyers introduced a Bill to amend the Act incorporating the Cobourg and Rice Lake Plank Road and Ferry Company; second reading Monday next.

The Bill to revive and continue the 4th and 5th Sections of the Alien Act, was read the second time, and engrossed.

We have Halifax papers to the 16th inclusive. The Nova-Scotian of that date says: "We understand that the elections are to come off on Thursday the 5th August. The proclamation will probably appear in next Gazette. Thursday the 29th July will be the day of nomination."

A tremendous storm of thunder and lightning had descended upon the city on the night of the 14th, continuing for some time. The same paper says in it: "We have seldom seen any thing so severe in the middle of the month of June, even in Nova-Scotia."

The corner stone of a Lunatic Asylum was to be laid at St. John (N. B.) yesterday (being St. John's day), with masonic ceremony. The Hon. ALEX. KERR, provincial grand-master of Nova Scotia, was to officiate.

We learn from the Miramichi Gleaner of the 15th, that the steamer Conqueror, 120 tons old measurement, built in Europe and intended, we believe, to run between the western coast of the Gulf and Pictou, calling at Charlotte-town (P. E. Island), had arrived at Shediac. She is said to be a splendid and most powerful boat.

The Gleaner also gives the following: "QUARANTINE NEWS.—Intelligence having reached the authorities, that there was sickness on board the bark Bolivar, which vessel had proceeded up as far as the ballast heaps in Chatham, Dr. Key boarded her, and ascertained that seven of the crew were labouring under typhus fever. The vessel was immediately ordered down to the quarantine station, and the persons diseased were removed to Middle Island. The Bolivar brought out a number of passengers, and landed them in Newfoundland. The pilot ought to be severely dealt with, for bringing her up past the quarantine ground."

"The Richard White had eight passengers and two of the crew sick when she arrived. They have been landed at Middle Island. "All the passengers and crew of the Looshtank, with the exception of two of the former and seven of the latter, are now at the lazaretto on Middle Island."

Mr. Scott's motion for an address to the Governor General, praying him to take such measures as he deemed best for the formation of a strong and efficient ministry, was postponed from Tuesday to Wednesday, some of the honorable members wishing probably to attend Lady ELIZABETH'S drawing-room at Monklands on the former evening. The Montreal Gazette says that if the opposition had pressed the resolution that evening, they would have carried it, as they mustered their full strength, while four or five of the members on the other side were absent. Without any debate, more than a few words from Mr. SCOTT, the mover, and Mr. CHABOT, the seconder of the motion, the question was actually put from the chair, and the Sergeant-at-Arms sent to call in the members, when, on motion of Mr. DUGGAN, an adjournment was agreed to. On Wednesday night, the question came on again. Messrs. Chabot, Chauveau, Papineau, Lantier, LeBoutillier, Duggan, Macdonald of Glengary, Aylwin, Hall, Cayley and Cauchon spoke on the motion. It was ultimately decided by a majority of 4 in favor of the ministry, the votes being:—Yeas 37, Nays 41.

Our minister of finance (for such, we suppose, is the position of the honorable inspector-general of public accounts in the "ministry") brought forward his "budget" on Tuesday last, in a speech of considerable length, which we shall publish on Monday, our space to-day being already filled with the proceedings of the House and other matter prepared before hand. Mr. CAYLEY moved the house into a committee of the whole, and a resolution was passed declaring it expedient to grant a supply to Her Majesty. In moving this resolution, Mr. Cayley went into a general exposé of the policy ministers were prepared to adopt on the subject of the tariff. He said they intended to propose the abolition of the whole of the differential duties, with the exception of that on reprints of new works copyrighted in England; on which a duty of 1 1/2 per cent was to be levied. This will still amount to nearly a prohibition.

Strange to say, while some people talk of a threatened famine in this country, and some go even so far as to insist on the necessity of a law authorising the Government to prohibit the exportation of articles of food, the Canadian ministry, at the same time that they adopt the system of "free trade" in other respects, propose to continue the duties on agricultural products, similar to our own, as a "protection" to the farming interest. Mr. Cayley proposed to make no change in these duties, with the exception of that on lumber, which at present yielded little revenue while it was collected at a very great expense, and gave very considerable annoyance to persons who, living close to the frontier, found it necessary to send their saw-logs to the other side, for want of mills on this, and to pay the duty upon their being returned. At the same time, every facility would be given for the passage of merchandise through the Canadian waters for exportation.

In addition to these changes, it was intended to reduce the tolls on the canals, and to remove the tonnage duties now charged on vessels coming to Quebec and Montreal, hitherto payable for the improvement of the St. Lawrence below Quebec.

"MONTREAL, Wednesday, June 23rd, 1847. "There is nothing in the way of news here. In the legislative bodies little local Bills. The Provincial Accounts have been laid before the Assembly, but are not yet published, and the new "free trade" Bills of the Inspector General are not yet printed. The address in the Assembly for a strong and efficient administration is postponed till this afternoon. Celebration of St. John the Baptist's day, and a soirée in the evening, are the orders of the day for to-morrow."

"The weather seems to be setting fair, the thermometer is however too high, 75° in the shade. "The accounts of the destruction of the wheat crops in Upper Canada by the Hessian fly are still kept up. Flour has fallen here, from 41s. 6d. to 35s., and there has been a corresponding fall in the States."

"MONTREAL, Thursday, 24th June, 1847. "There is nothing new here to-day, but fine weather, the thermometer 75° at noon. If it continues, it will do more good than all our legislators and public authorities put together, who generally give very little to the community in proportion to what they cost; without counting the positive mischief which they effect by spreading errors, exciting passions, and the selfish prejudices of classes and localities, &c., &c."

"Our Responsible Government, who seem to set more value on majorities than on their good works, had a majority of four last night in the Assembly, including themselves, who being deducted, to wit: Messrs. Cameron, Cayley, H. Sherwood, Badgley, Daly and Papineau, would leave them in a minority of two: but if the number of the constituents is con-

sidered, their supporters probably do not represent an eighth part of the Freeholders of Canada. So much for "Self-Government"! "Responsible Government," &c., &c., &c."

"The Inspector General's speech on Tuesday, is in the Montreal Gazette and Herald. It is well worth reading as giving a view of the financial concerns of the Province, and of his views in respect to trade and revenue. It is "free trade" and "protection" at the same time. It is intended to raise money from the import trade by the St. Lawrence, and put that trade in competition with the import trade with the United States, which costs nearly as much in collection as the revenue amounts to, while smuggling and vexation attend the intercourse along an open frontier of about a thousand miles, and then, while the competition of the United States for supplying Canada is favored, the non-agricultural population, of Canada by whom the trade is carried on, is to be burthened with duties on the necessities of life, enhancing the cost of carrying on the trade, and consequently diminishing the power of competing with the United States: all under the erroneous idea that such a system can really prove beneficial, "a protection" to our agriculturists.

"On the 21st instant, flour was down to 35s. 7 1/2d. at New York. It had been above nine dollars. Here it has been offered at 35s., but little is doing in either market by way of sales on the spot, people prefer shipping the flour and wheat, taking the risk of the British market. They still give rumours of injury to the wheat crop in the western parts of Upper Canada and some of the western States. On the contrary, the accounts from the South are good.

"There are Tampico dates of the 7th June, nothing but political rumours, sickness, skirmishes and intended military operations."

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, FRIDAY, June 19th, 1847.

Dissent.— Because an order for expunging Resolutions of this House in the same sitting in which they are adopted, is contrary to British practice, and tends to bring this House into disrepute.

Because the said order for expunging and the rejection of the four last Resolutions submitted by the Honorable Mr. NELSON on the seventeenth instant, according to notice given on the fourteenth, the whole declaratory of the rights, liberties and privileges guaranteed by the Capitulations of Canada, the Treaty of Cession and various acts of the Imperial Parliament to the then inhabitants of Canada and their descendants, and the share which they now have in the Provincial Government entrusted with the maintenance and securing the enjoyment of the said rights, liberties and privileges, was carried by the casting vote of the Honorable the Speaker of this House, who is also a Member of the Executive Council, thereby preventing the said Resolutions from being humbly submitted to His Excellency the Governor General, as entrusted by Our Most Gracious Sovereign with the powers of the Crown in this Province.

We have received a printed copy of the Public Accounts for 1846, laid before the Legislative Assembly. Document No. 1, is the statement of Expenditure and Revenue which will be found elsewhere.

The Canadian society of St. John the Baptist celebrated yesterday their annual festival with great splendour and pomp. The day was beautiful, the streets through which the procession was to move were lined in many places with maple and evergreen trees and overhung with flags and other devices, and the shops and offices of the French Canadians generally closed. Between 8 and 9 o'clock, the different sections assembled on the Esplanade, where having been marshalled in the order they were to follow, with their gorgeous banners and flags and the colours of the Quebec militia of 1775, they took up the line of march, walking three abreast, the first division headed by the excellent band of the 93rd Highlanders, and Mr. Sauvageau's Canadian Amateur Band, in a new and handsome uniform, being placed in the middle; the whole preceded by a long line of pupils of the Seminary, of the Ecoles Chrétiennes and other schools, and followed by the Voltigeur Company of Firemen, also in uniform, with their beautiful engine.

After saluting His Worship the Mayor, G. O. STUART, Esq., at his residence in St. Anne street, the procession moved up D'Auteuil, thence along St. Lewis street, and down the Place d'Armes, to the French cathedral, where a solemn High Mass was sung by the Rev. Mr. CAZEAU, Secretary to the Archbishop, and a sermon, appropriate to the occasion, preached by the Rev. Mr. LANGEVIN of the Seminary. The musical part of the service was performed by a numerous choir of, we believe, some forty ladies and gentlemen, supported by Mr. MOLT on the organ. A rich pain béni, the gift of the Hon. R. E. CARON, the President of the Society, was distributed, and a collection for charitable purposes made by the lady of CHARLES LANGEVIN, Esq., accompanied by her husband.

After Mass, the procession moved down to the Lower Town and was saluted, at the Archbishop's Palace, by the Seminary Band. It halted in Mountain street, opposite the residence of the Hon. J. NEILSON, president of the St. Andrew's society, where it cheered and the band struck up a national air. After the procession had traversed the principal streets of the Lower Town and St. Roch and St. John Suburbs, the same ceremony was performed, on its return, opposite the residences of A. H. ANDERSON, Esq., president of the St. George's society, and P. BRADLEY, Esq., president of the St. Patrick's society. It also halted and saluted opposite Payne's Hotel, where the banners of the St. George's society were displayed.

Finally, the Honorable President was escorted to his residence in St. Louis street, where he addressed the members of the Society, complimented them on the manner in which the proceedings of the day had been conducted so far, thanked them feelingly for the attentions paid to himself, and alluded to the family afflictions which deprived him of the pleasure of taking part in the banquet by which they were to be closed. Repeated cheers having been given, and the band having played God save the Queen, the members then dispersed.

Among many other details which we have no room for, we should have mentioned that the procession was followed by a small printing press, throwing off copies of an ode in honor of the day.
