### Got Away in a Cart.

**GENERAL BRUCE HAMILTON**  
NEARLY CAUGHT FAMOUS  
BOER LEADER.

London, January 14.—Lord Kitchener reports to the War Office that General Louis Botha just escaped General Bruce Hamilton after a seven miles chase. O. e Boer was killed and 33 taken prisoners. Some rifles, cattle, etc., were captured.

Hearing of a concentration of Boers at Knapdaar, Bruce Hamilton went to the spot, but only to find the Boers had been given the alarm, and four hundred of them were trekking three miles distant with General Botha in a Cape cart leading. Bruce Hamilton chased the Boers for seven miles, until his horses gave in.

### OPPOSED TO BRITAIN OFFERING TERMS.

**Boers Must Lay Down Arms.**

Cape Town, January 14.—Sir John Gordon Sprigg, prime minister of Cape Colony, presided today at a meeting of the Vigilance Association. In the course of an address he said that the termination of the war rested with the Boers, it being only necessary for them to lay down their arms. He added this would probably not occur just yet. He was entirely opposed to England offering anything in the nature of terms to induce the Boers to submit. Recollections of the blow inflicted on the loyalists by the Majuba settlement induced him to take a leading part in the movement to prevent any recurrence of the fatal calamity. Unconditional surrender was absolutely essential, and the Boers were sure to receive better treatment than they deserved.

### OPPERMANN KILLED.

London, January 13.—General Kitchener reports to the War Office that the well known and important Boer General Oppermann was killed in a recent engagement at Overmacht. He commanded the Piet Retief, Utrecht, Vryheid, Wakkerstroom and Swaziland commandos.

## Sherbrooke House In Ruins.

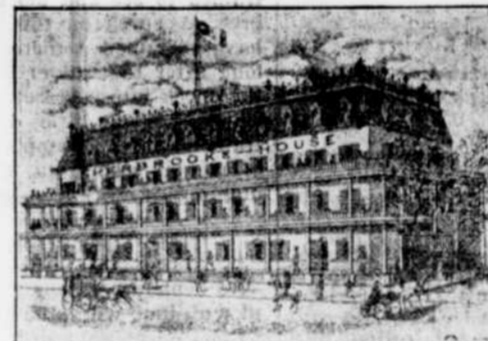
CUTTED BY FIRE  
YESTERDAY MORNING

Damage Estimated At  
Over \$10,000.

THE BOARDERS AND  
GUESTS ARE HEAVY  
LOSERS.

The most serious conflagration that has visited Sherbrooke for some time occurred yesterday morning. Shortly after eight o'clock an alarm was sent into the Central station by telephone that the Sherbrooke House was on fire. The alarm was repeated to No. 2 and 3 stations, but the latter station were just about to hitch up for the barber in the hotel had run down and acquainted them with the fact that a fire had started in the house. The brigade got out in quick time, and when they arrived flames were shooting skyward from that portion of the building between the hotel and Murray's Block. A line of hose was laid from Fletcher's corner, and a window was broken to admit the water.

When this was done "something akin to an explosion occurred, and the two firemen who held the nozzle were thrown back several yards. They again approached and

got in the water, and by this time the other portions of the brigade had got coupled on to the hydrants and with a strong pressure, a plentiful supply of water was being poured into the burning building.

To the spectator it appeared that the fire brigade would be successful in keeping the flames to that portion in and around the kitchen, where the fire started, but to those who were actively engaged in the work of fighting the flames, it was known that there was danger of the hotel proper being attacked.

At first the boarders and guests were not at all alarmed of the outbreak and some of them even finished their breakfast, thinking that the main portion was all right. Those who had gone, and were in the upper storey of the building, began to realize that by this time it was time to move their chattels, and a general stampede of the people of the hotel took place. Trunks were hastily packed, and as hastily removed to a place of safety. Several of the boarders placed their trunks on the third storey, thinking that they were all right there, but found out to their cost, in some cases, that their predictions were wrong.

About three quarters of an hour after the fire started the smoke was belching out from the roof at the four sides of the building, and it was apparent that it must go before the devouring elements. Steadily and surely it spread, and notwithstanding the heroic efforts of the fire brigade, backed by 12 stream of water, and good pressure at that, the whole of the two upper storeys was soon a seething mass of flames, which generated a heavy funnel of smoke that, as it ascended skyward, was beautiful to behold in the clear frosty morning.

About this time fears were entertained that the block adjoining the hotel, and known as Murray's Block, would also fall a victim to the hungry flames. The flames did secure somewhat of a hold on the storehouse belonging to William Murray, but willing assistance was rendered by the workmen of the adjoining premises and a stream of hose was playing on the building, and kept there for some hours, so that damage, which will not amount to more than a few hundred dollars, was done.

At about half past ten o'clock the upper portion of the hotel building was completely gutted, and the debris began to fall on to the second verandah. With a persistency that is to be commended the firemen, fought the flames inch by inch, and foot by foot, from the rear and drove the flames towards the front of building. To the uninitiated it seemed as if the flames were getting the upper hand, but

those who were directing affairs knew that, at least, the buildings in the rear were safe. The fire was now eating its way to the second storey, and the firemen began to get headway on them, and at about eleven o'clock it was apparent that the fire was under. No chances were taken, however, and the lines of hoses poured steady streams on the building.

When the construction of the building, and the fact that it was all of wood, is taken into account it must be admitted that the firemen did good work in saving the portion of the building remaining.

The lower storey and a portion of the second storey is still intact, but they are practically ruined, for a new building will have to be erected as the whole is practically gutted by water and fire. The insurance on the building, which belongs with much of the furniture to Mr. Higgins, Concord, N. H., was insured for \$7,000, and the contents for \$2,000.

In addition to that, the proprietors Messrs Bodwell & Wright carried about \$2,500 on their own furnishings, and bar fittings. The heaviest portion of the insurance was carried by Messrs W. S. Dresser & Co., and on the furnishings belonging to the proprietors by Mr. R. R. Burrage.

### NOTES.

The contents of the bar were removed early in the morning. The firemen presented a rather "Father Christmas" appearance. They were in most cases encased in leather, and any of the Fire Committee were present, they surely will now see the necessity of having rubber coats and helmets served out to the men, so that they can at least be dry underneath.

The Street Railway were unable to run their cars past the Sherbrooke House.

Water was being played on the ruins until a late hour in the afternoon.

This is the third time that fire has damaged this property. About fifteen years ago, on a cold Sunday morning in January, considerable damage was done to the building by fire, but the fire of yesterday morning is the most serious, and if a new building is erected, brick only can be used.

Mr. G. E. Borlase and Mr. T. F.

Kenny lost some of their effects, but their loss is covered by insurance.

Mr. King, of the E. T. Bank staff, also lost a considerable amount of clothing, but carried no insurance.

The bus driver of the hotel lost \$75 which he had in bills in his trunk. He attempted to reach his room, but the dense smoke drove him back.

### FIRE AGAIN BREAKS OUT AT MIDNIGHT.

The last portion of the brigade left the ruins at about five o'clock, and at that time it was thought that the fire was completely subdued. At various times during the evening the alarm was rung in, but the Chief on making enquiry did not call out the men again. At about half-past twelve o'clock, however, the flames began to assert themselves in the dining room, and a portion of the brigade was ordered out. They laid a line of hose and were kept busy until about eight o'clock this morning, playing a stream on the flames.

At eight o'clock there were still a few patches of fire and it will be necessary to keep men at the scene of the fire during the day.

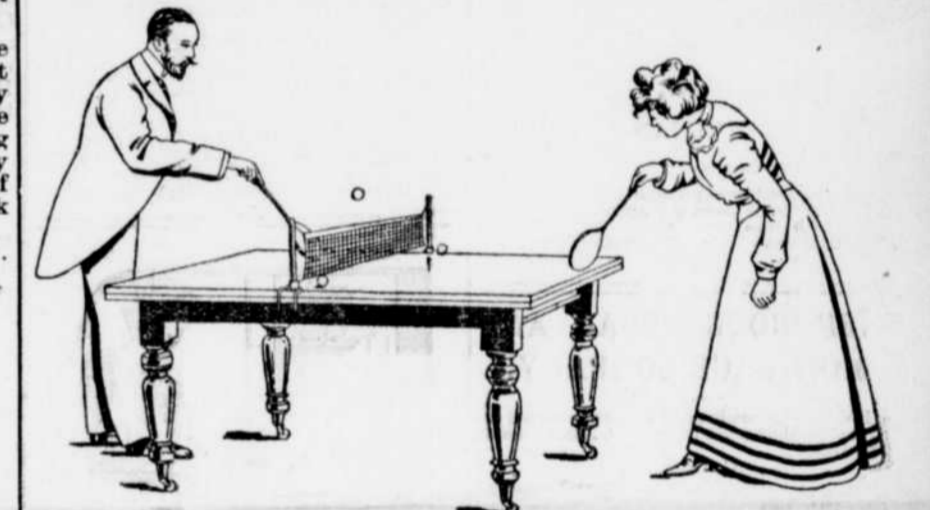

MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS.

LEEDS VILLAGE. The election of councillors took place on Monday, the 13th inst., and quite a number of the ratepayers turned out to the meeting. The old councillors were all re-elected, viz., Councillors William Wilson, W. J. Coxan and David Suitor.

ORFORD. Retiring councillors, Andrew Faith, Jos. Menard and J. C. McKelvey. Andrew Faith re-elected. Jos. Menard, and J. C. McKelvey re-elected.

DIXVILLE. The retiring councillors for Dixville were, Bruce Baldwin, and Ozo Baldwin. Bruce Baldwin and Ozo Baldwin were elected by acclamation.

The retiring councillors for Barford were C. A. Baldwin, George Belisle and Philander Hill. C. A. Baldwin, George Belisle and Wilson Howe, were elected by acclamation to fill the vacancies.

ROBINSON. At the election of municipal councillors held here on Monday, the retiring councillors were Jas. H. Leonard, Mayor Kenneth McCaskill and F. G. Goodenough. The nominations were James H. Leonard, Kenneth McCaskill, A. B. Hunt and Abel Whitehead. The three former were elected.

LINDA. The elections in this municipality passed off very quietly on Monday, there being no opposition to the retiring councillors.

HATLEY. The old Council has been returned for the Townships of Hatley.

MELBOURNE AND BROMPTON GORE. The councillors elected in this municipality were: Mr. James McNaughton re-elected, and Messrs. Leonard Coburn and H. J. Nelson in place of Messrs. Booth and Todd, whose term of office had expired. All by acclamation.

WINDSOR MILLS. B. Quinn, A. Trudeau, and H. Marcotte, the retiring councillors of the municipality, were re-elected on Monday by acclamation.

WINDSOR TOWNSHIP. The only change in the Windsor Township was that of C. Bourget, being elected in place of George Wilkie retired.

ST. FRANCOIS DE BROMPTON. At the election of the councillors for the municipality of St. Francois de Brompton, T. Lavagaurt was elected in place of David Knapp, and J. Lamontagne in place of W. Carrier retired.

COMPTON. Election day passed off very quietly here on Monday. The old councillors, Mr. B. F. Hitchcock and Mr. C. G. Craig were returned by acclamation.

ASCOT CORNER. The election excitement was over at noon on Monday. Mr. Wm. Murray was returning officer. Mr. E. L. Darche and Mr. Jos. Allard were elected in place of retiring councillors, Messrs. G. Blouin and E. Hall.

STORNOWAY. The municipal elections held here on Monday passed off quietly and resulted in the election of Messrs. D. S. McLeod, J. A. McDonald and Wm. A. McDonald. The retiring councillors were:—D. S. McLeod, J. B. McLeod and Angus N. McAulay. The by-law re compulsory vaccination has been adopted.

MELBOURNE VILLAGE. The councillors elected in this municipality were: Messrs. Ewing

and Desmarais, re-elected, and Lieut.-Col. Harkom in place of Ex-Mayor Allen, whose term of office expired. There were three others nominated in opposition to the above named gentlemen, viz., Ex-Mayor Allen and Messrs. Bartlett and Fregau. Accompanying these nomination papers was a requisition signed by eight electors demanding that a poll be held. As all of the parties who signed this requisition were absent, with the exception of Messrs. L. G. Verhill, and H. W. Gallup, the returning officer, Mr. Adkinson, held that at least five duly qualified electors should be present and make their demand orally or in writing, demanding that a poll be taken. He therefore called for a show of hands and the vote stood fifteen to four in each case. He therefore declared Lieut.-Col. Harkom, John Ewing, jr., and Wm. Desmarais duly elected. We understand that it is the intention of the defeated candidates to apply to the courts to have this election set aside as illegal and claim these seats.

THE EYE OF AN ARTIST. A Case Where It Was More Reliable Than a Sailor's Optic. Mr. N. Chevallier, the well known artist who accompanied the late Duke of Edinburgh on many of his travels, was once going from Dunedin to Lyttelton, New Zealand, by steamer. Anxious to catch the earliest glimpse of the coast he went on deck at dawn and was alarmed to see that the vessel was heading straight on to the land. Calling the officer's attention to the fact, he was told that it was only a fog bank. The artist maintained his point, but the second officer looked and confirmed his mate.

The artist then said: "Well, gentlemen, I will back my artist's eye against your sailor's eye, and I say that what you mistake for a fog bank is a low range of hills, and there is a range of mountains appearing above them."

But he was only laughed at, until the captain coming on deck found in the growing light that the artist was right and the seamen wrong. The vessel was out of its course, and there was only just time to avert disaster. The helmsman was dismissed in disgrace and the course given to the new steersman, but the vessel's head still pointed landward—the compass was all wrong.

The cause was discovered later. A commercial traveler had brought a box of magnets on his return and deposited them in a stateroom, causing what might have been a fatal deflection of the compass.

To return to the question of interpretation, the artist was dealing with the appearance which his eye was trained to see and his mind to interpret. A speck on the horizon might have remained a mere speck to him long after the sailors had interpreted the speck into a vessel of definite rig. There can be little doubt that the trained eye is accompanied by a sort of mental seeing, an instinct outrunning optics.

THE CHICKEN YARD. No henhouse that is frequently dusted with lime will be infested with lice. Lime purifies the quarters and dries them. It is cheap and should be used plentifully.

Always have the nests so low that the hens can step in rather than be obliged to jump down. If the fowls get too fat, oats as a single food are one of the best grains that can be given to lessen fat.

Mating birds to breed to a feather is a high art, to be acquired only by long practice, aided by close study. A flat perch is best because of being the most comfortable to the feet and the best support to the breast.

There are three breeds of fowls that are pre-eminently valuable as egg producers. These are the Minorcas, Leghorns and Black Spanish. A medium sized active male is twice as valuable as one that is large and extra heavy. If large size and weight are desired, select large hens, but the male should be active and vigorous.

When a fowl has canker and the mouth and throat are sore and ulcerated, wrap a soft rag around a lead pencil, dampen it slightly, dip in chlorate of potash and swab out the mouth clean and inject a drop of turpentine.

What Comes After Suicide? On the whole, it is something of a pity that some of these fellows who cut their throats, blow out their brains or swallow poisons in order to rid themselves of their troubles cannot come back to try their luck all over again. It is more than probable that relief lies in that direction or not. It is more than probable that what they then could tell would deter other reckless men and women from following in their footsteps, and for that, if for no other reason, their return would be welcome. As Hamlet implied, it is better to bear the ills we know than to fly to those we know not of, and there isn't much doubt that the suicides are not long in finding that out.

THE LICK LENS.

Wonderful Effect Upon It of the Heat From a Man's Hand. Some years ago the writer paid a visit to Alvan Clark at Cambridgeport to witness the testing of the huge lens for the famous Lick telescope. At the end of the long, dark room the largest flint glass then in the world was set up on edge. From a distance of about fifty feet a pencil of light was flashed into the heart of the disk and reflected back into the observer's eye. The slightest imperfections, if any, in the glass would then be revealed by the curves of light and the lines of polarization.

"Now," said Mr. Clark, "I will show you the wonderful sensitiveness of the lens to outside influences. Every human body gives out heat and when brought near to extremely sensitive substances affects them to a greater or less extent. Now watch."

He walked down to the lens and held his hand under it about two feet away. Instantaneously a marvelous spectacle burst into view. It seemed as if the great glass disk had become a living volcano, spouting forth jets of flame. The display was dazzling. Waving, leaping, dancing, the countless tongues of light gleamed and vibrated; then, fully, reluctantly, they died away, leaving the lens reflecting only a pure, untroubled light.

"What is it? How do you account for the wonder?" were the eager questions.

"It is only the radiation of heat alternately expanding and contracting the glass. If I had put my hand upon the lens itself, the phenomenon would have been even more violent."

To a person ignorant of lenses the almost supernatural sensitiveness of a mass of glass weighing several hundred pounds was astonishing, but to the scientist it is an everyday matter, for he has instruments that will register with unfailing nicety the approach of a person fifty or a hundred feet away.

CONQUERED HER RIVAL. A Pretty and Pathetic Story of Jenny Lind and Grisi. We have recently read a beautiful incident. Jenny Lind and Grisi were both rivals for popular favor in London. Both were invited to sing the same night at a court concert before the queen. Jenny Lind, being the younger, sang first and was so disturbed by the fierce, scornful look of Grisi that she was at the point of failure when suddenly an inspiration came to her.

The accompanist was striking the final chords. She asked him to rise and took the vacant seat. Her fingers wandered over the keys in a loving pride, and then she sang a little prayer which she had loved as a child. She hadn't sung it for years. As she sang she was no longer in the presence of royalty, but singing to loving friends in her fatherland.

There was no fierce expression now; instead a teardrop glistened on the long, black lashes, and after a moment, with the impulsiveness of a child of the tropics, Grisi crossed to Jenny Lind's side, placed her arm about her and kissed her, utterly regardless of the audience.

The Canadian Bacon Trade In Great Britain In Danger.

A great many undesirable hogs are being marketed by the farmers throughout the Province of Ontario. These are being converted into expert bacon, and forwarded to Great Britain, and because of their quality are sold there at a loss. This loss must ultimately be borne by the farmers, although the packers at the present moment are being severely punished.

As an example we quote the condition of the trade at the Geo. Matthews' Company's factory, Ottawa, for the months of November and December, 1901, and the first week of January, 1902. In November, 1901, a total of 8075 pigs were received at this factory. Of these 5703 were "Selects", 1022 were "Lights", 1241 were "Light fats", 81 were "Heavy fats", 97 were "Sows", 5 were "Stags", 13 were "Cripples", and 220 were "Stores", these latter being lean pigs, unfit for any purpose. Of 5151 hogs received at the factory in December, 1901, the "Selects" numbered 2875, the "Lights" 1172, the "Light fats" 720, the "Heavy fats" 51, the "Sows" 74, the "Stags" 7, the "Cripples" 35, and the "Stores" 217. From the 2nd to the 4th of January, 1902, 1000 hogs were received. Of these 276 were "Selects", 508 were "Lights", 159 were "Light fats", 19 "Heavy fats", 14 "Sows", 6 "Stags", 7 "Cripples", and 92 "Stores". This makes a total for the nine weeks of 8854 "Selects", 2282 "Lights", 212 "Light fats", 147 "Heavy fats", 185 "Sows", 18 "Stags", 55 "Cripples", and 524 "Stores". Total 15,109. Pigs termed "Selects" are those that can be made into the best class of Wiltshire bacon, and are the sort that have made Canadian bacon famous on the English market. In order to keep up the quality of hogs, the packers must receive the sort of hogs that will make the finest Wiltshire sides. To make this the packers must have smooth deep, well-fed pigs, with a large amount of lean meat in the carcasses, in proportion to the amount of fat. They must be well finished, and weigh on reaching the packing house from one hundred and eighty (180) to two hundred (200) pounds. On the pigs termed "Lights" the packers lost at least one dollar per head. The "Light fats" can be cut up and put into the retail trade, but too large a number of these light pigs, would at any time glut the local market. The "Heavy fats" can be worked up, when not too numerous, but will sell for at least one half dollar per hundred, live weight, less than "Selects". "Sows" and "Stags" are very poor property and can only be used in supplying a very inferior trade. In order to be of any value to the packers, "Sows" and "Stags" should be made as fat as possible. "Cripples" are of little or no value, to the packers, and are always fed at a loss to the farmers. "Stores" should never reach the pork market, yet thousands of them are packed every week to the market by the farmer. If the farmers continue to market such a large number of undesirable pigs, it will seriously injure the Canadian Bacon Trade in Great Britain, and will bring about greatly reduced prices for hogs throughout Canada.

CHEESE. Montreal, January 13.—Business in cheese was quiet today, but the firm tone is fully maintained and holders manifest no anxiety about the future.

BUTTER. There is a good local demand for butter at full prices, and with light supplies there is no accumulation of stock.

Finest Townships fall creamery 20 1/2c to 21c. Finest Quebec fall creamery 20c to 20 1/2c. Undergrade creamery 20c to 20 1/2c. Western dairy 16c to 16 1/2c. Manitoba dairy 15 1/2c to 16c.

EGGS. Receipts of eggs to-day were 350 cases, as against 450 on Saturday. The tone of the market continues very firm, owing to small supplies, and prices have an upward tendency. The demand to-day was good and sales of some fair-sized lots of western cold storage stock were made at 22c to 23c, and small lots at 24c. Strictly fresh eggs are very scarce and any coming forward command high prices. We quote: Selected cold storage, 22c to 24c; Montreal limed, 22c; western limed, 20c to 21c, and cull, 19c to 20c per dozen.

POULTRY. Receipts of poultry continue light, for which there is a good inquiry, but buyers find it difficult to fill their wants, and prices ruled firm. We quote: Good choice fresh killed, dry-plucked turkeys sold at 11c to 12c; and ordinary dry-plucked chickens at 9c to 10c; good at 8c to 8 1/2c; and ordinary at 6c to 7c; fowls, 4c to 5c; ducks, 8c to 9c, and geese, 5c to 6c per lb.

CANADIANS IN SOUTH AFRICA. As has been opportunely observed, Canadians in South Africa have suffered no reverse at the hands of the Boers that has needed to be followed by explanation. Bodies of our men have been caught in tight place, but so far the tighter the more the credit they have won by extricating themselves by acts of desperate heroism. Some of our troops have been made prisoners by the Boers who overpowered and disarmed them, but so far as we know not a Canadian in the war has yet, whatever his predicament hoisted a white signal and lay down and quit. It is true, it is not only gratifying but surprising because in the fortunes of war men, however brave and watchful, may find themselves compelled to surrender or to die in a manner seemingly quite futile. That some of our men avoided capture by bold movements we know, as in the case of Cockburn, Turner, Morrison and others who saved their guns on a notable occasion, and that some chose death rather than capture we know as in the case of Capt. "Gat." Howard and his orderly, who when attacked by a body of Boers, fought it to a finish. It is the simple truth to say that the Boers will find it difficult to boast of any deed of arms performed by them against men from this Colony. To a very large extent we believe the same is also true of the Australian contingents. It is not to be doubted that men quite as brave had to undergo the humiliation of surrendering, and we may hope that the men about to take their departure will prove as courageous, as enterprising, and as lucky as those who preceded them, and gave Canadians so high a status among soldiers. —Toronto Mail.

London, January 14th.—A remarkable article appears in today's Times, under the caption of "Literature of German Anglo-phobia," recounting the character of the anti-British cartoons, which have appeared in the German newspapers, which, the Times says, in coarseness, obscenity and venom are without a parallel in modern times. The wisdom of the publication of the article at this juncture is much questioned. The Star says: "The Times today, of all days, begins a series of articles on the offensive German caricatures. The Times ought to hesitate before it deliberately flogs the passion of the people. Are our publicists mad? Can they not see the abyss towards which they are bounding this long-suffering nation?" The Times' article, which is two columns long, says: "These papers are not gutter-sheets; but are sold everywhere at the stations of the state railroads, even at Potsdam station, where the Emperor is constantly travelling. He was finally obliged to personally order their removal. "Neither are these papers anonymous. One of the most infamous of all, entitled 'The Boer War,' bears on the title pages the names of persons distinguished in the literary and artistic world of Germany. From a purely technical standpoint the paper in an art production; but it is difficult to find words to convey a notion of the filth which its cultured artists and writers venture to lay before its cultured German readers. British soldiers are reported as robbing the dead, Mr. Chamberlain's state coach is depicted as a cart laden with skeletons, and King Edward is shown dead drunk in his bedroom, receiving the news of Cronje's surrender. But the crowning piece is a cartoon entitled 'Hero Vorshilf.' The then Prince of Wales, Queen Victoria and the young princesses by her side, it decorating a youthful soldier. The legend underneath reads textually: "An English Princess decorating the youngest soldier in the British army with the Victoria Cross, because although only thirteen, he has already outraged eight Boer women." "This obscenity, sold in respectable shops, was eagerly bought by the public and lies on fashionable drawing room tables."
