ITALO-FRENCH TENSION INCREASING

Fresh Strike Danger Adds To Troubles

French Government Demands "Explanations" of Italian Intentions Toward Tunisia, Djibouti and Corsica Following Outbreak in Italian Chamber of Deputies—Labor Orders Sympathetic Strikes in Protest to Discharge of Leaders.

Paris, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The dual danger of more strikes with increasing bitterness among labor at home and what was feared to be an Italian campaign for colonies in Africa confronted the Government of Premier Edouard Daladier today.

The new strikes were in protest against the discharge of workmen who led the one-day general walk-out Wednesday which the Premier crushed before it could have marked effect.

The General Confederation of Labor and the Socialist party charged 1,500,000 workers were discharged, suspended or locked out of factories while an informant who knew Government sources put the figure at "not more than 70,000."

A general strike at Saint Nazaire, which included calls to 11,000 metal and shipyard workers, appeared to have at least early success. Thousands refused to report to duty.

At Le Havre, 12,000 textile employees were called out and smaller strikes were ordered elsewhere.

Saint Nazaire bristled with Mobile Guards hurriedly dispatched to keep order and protect workers who stayed on their jobs.

A squad of Mobile Guards fought for fifteen minutes with eight hundred pickets attempting to enforce a metal workers' strike at the northern industrial town of Denain. Several of each side were wounded.

Of the 25,000 workers who walked out in the northern metal works, only 10,000 remained on strike. Northern coal mines were working virtually at normal.

The cries "Tunisia" from Fascist deputies in the Italian Parliament during a speech by the Foreign Minister, Count Galeazzo Ciano, Wednesday provoked the international situation and led Foreign Minister Bonnet last night to request "explanations" of Italian intentions toward Tunisia, Djibouti and Corsica.

The Italian press continued the matter, and French official quarters believed it marked the beginning of a German and Italian campaign to compensate Italy in the Mediterranean for support when Germany annexed Austria and part of Czechoslovakia.

Inasmuch as France and Great Britain agreed to the partition of Czechoslovakia on the theory the Sudeten Germans had the "right" to dispose of themselves in selecting a government, French commentators acknowledged that Italy could highly embarrass France by demanding the same right for Italians living in Tunisia.

There was some discussion of postponing the visit of Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop of Germany, who was expected on Monday to sign the new friendship agreement.

Sir Kingsley Wood, British Air Minister, on a visit to Paris this morning to discuss military aviation was expected also to talk with Premier Daladier about the Italian-African situation.

The Tunisian protectorate long has been a stumbling block in French-Italian relations.

It was recalled that General Maurice Gamelin, Chief of the National Defence Staff, made an Armistice Day inspection of Tunisia fortifications at the Italian Libya border although by custom he should have reviewed the army parade in Paris.

And just a year ago Daladier, Defence Minister but not then Premier, told Parliament that Tunisia was endangered by Italy.

Despite his easy victory over labor's general strike and although industrialists held the new sympathy strike movement lacked general momentum, it seemed apparent that the Premier's troubles at home were not ended.

His discharge of the leaders and many of their followers angered labor, which had hoped for a gesture of "reconciliation."

Daladier, determined to maintain order and keep industry going, was expected to ask a vote of confidence when Parliament convenes next

FAMED CALGARY MIDNIGHT SUN TO DISAPPEAR

Alberta Oil and Gas Conservation Board Orders that All Gas Not Used for Fuel Purposes Be Returned to the Ground.

Calgary, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Calgary's famed "Midnight Sun," the burning gas flares of Turner Valley forty miles south of Calgary, which have wasted billions of cubic feet of gas, will be extinguished within three or four months under present plans of Alberta Petroleum and Natural Gas Conservation Board, W. F. Knode, Board Chairman, announced last night.

All gas produced at the field, except that used for fuel purposes in Calgary and Southern Alberta towns, will be returned to the limestone under a compulsory repressuring scheme applying to both oil and gas wells of the field, Mr. Knode said. Gas used to lift oil to the surface in crude wells will be returned to the ground as well as that processed in absorption plants.

Five Nations Tackle Problem Of Saving European Refugees

Representatives of Great Britain, United States, France, Netherlands and Brazil Seek Removal of Germany's "Flight Tax" to Facilitate Settlement of German Jews in South American and British Empire Countries—Five Million Involved.

London, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Five statesmen, representing Great Britain, the United States, France, The Netherlands and Brazil, today tackled the gigantic problem of finding sanctuary for an estimated five million European refugees who are seeking new homes.

Informed sources said the group would seek to arrange modification of Germany's "Flight Tax" rule which strips Jews of almost all they own as they leave Germany, thus tending to make them public charges on the countries allowing them to enter.

With that barrier removed, the statesmen, who form the "Inner Committee" of the inter-governmental board formed at Evian-les-Bains, France, last summer, expect better reaction from South American and British Empire countries to the committee's efforts.

Today's meeting of the Committee was the first since the recent anti-Semitic drive started in Germany.

The chairman, Earl Winterton, and the permanent executive director, George Rublee, of the United States, submitted reports on the work they have done since the committee was formed.

Meanwhile, the first two hundred German Jewish children reached English shores this morning when the steamer Prague docked at Harwich. The children were from Berlin and Hamburg.

Some children from a Berlin orphanage were among the group. Their orphanage was burned during the Nazi outburst following the assassination of Ernst von Rath, secretary to the German legation in Paris.

SIX ARRESTED FOR RAID ON RUMANIAN POWER PLANT

Bucharest, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The Government announced today the arrest of six student members of the Fascist-patterned group, who attempted to blow up the Cluj electric plant.

Three bombs shattered windows in the town the night of November 5. Bombs placed at a gasoline depot did not explode.

The six arrested were students at the Cluj University whose Rector, F. S. Goanga, was wounded by a would-be assassin Monday. One of the Rector's assailants, Franco Antoniu, twenty-three, confessed the Cluj Iron Guard group drew lots for the job.

Three Sought For Abduction Of Young Maryland School Girl

Oxon Hill, Md., Dec. 2.—(AP)—Police search for three men in a black truck was intensified today after eighteen-year-old Mary Brown, sobbing hysterically, stumbled into her home last night with a story of being blindfolded and held captive for thirty hours.

The girl, her clothing torn and her hair disheveled, collapsed and was reported able to give her family little coherent information. A physician gave her a sedative and asked State Police not to question her until today.

Robert Manning, a family friend and former Washington detective who was in the home, quoted Mary as saying three men had held her prisoner all night long. "They had knocked her out and thrown her on a mattress," she said she had not been attacked.

"She said she was blindfolded all the time they held her, but she knew one of the men had a mustache."

Manning added that the girl, seized while coming home from school Wednesday with her sister, expressed belief she had not been taken more than five miles away.

An automobile—not the truck in which she was abducted—brought her to a field within a half mile of the Brown farm home about ten o'clock last night. There she was let out.

She ran up a lane to the house, where Manning was keeping watch while members of the family rested after an anxious night and day.

"She fell in my arms and I carried her into the dining room and put a coat over her. She looked terrible," he called a doctor, who confirmed the girl's statement that she had not been assaulted. Mary's parents embraced her and quickly put her to bed.

Writing On Purported Confession Links Accused To Slaying Of Girl

Montreal, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Evidence Antonio Godon was the author of an unsigned note purporting to confess to the slaying of Simone Caron eight years ago was on the record of his preliminary hearing today as it resumed after interruption through a fainting spell by the twenty-eight-year-old former dishwasher.

A couple of lines scribbled on rough cardboard, the note was received by police eight years ago while they were holding Brother Dositheo on a charge of slaying the seven-year-old girl, whose body was found in the cellar of Roussin Academy at nearby Pointe-aux-Trembles. The brother, a teacher at the Academy, directed the Academy at the time of the crime eight years ago, was arrested a few weeks ago. Since release of Brother Dositheo in 1931 the case had been marked as "unsolved" by police.

Dr. Rosaire Fontaine, Provincial medico-legal expert, and Prof. Paul Rioux of the Ecole des Hautes Etudes claimed writing on the note showed peculiarities of penmanship that made it certain it had been written by Godon.

Godon suffered a fainting spell yesterday during description of an alleged attempt at suicide by him. The testimony was given by Brother Rosaire, director of the Academy at the time of the slaying, who said it had occurred a few weeks after police arrested Brother Dositheo. Godon's collapse brought a sudden adjournment until today.

Mr. and Mrs. Magliore Caron, parents of Simone, said the ring delivered in the envelope to police had been worn by their daughter the day she left home to carry her father's lunch to a textile plant where he worked.

BRITISH COURT DECORUM UPSET BY APPELLANT

Disappointed Litigant Given Six Weeks for Bombarding Appeal Justices with Over-ripe Tomatoes.

London, Dec. 2.—(AP)—A disappointed litigant stood up today in the Court of Appeals and bombarded two bewigged Lord Justices with tomatoes.

He missed but the Justices, Sir Charles Clauson and Sir Rayner Goddard, immediately gave him six weeks in prison for contempt of court.

Earlier in the morning the litigant, Frank Harrison, had been refused an appeal for a new trial in a minor county court action in which he was involved. He departed muttering. After a while he returned, his coat bulging strangely.

As the Lord Justices arose for luncheon, Harrison stood up in the back of the courtroom and shouted, "I want justice!"

Then he began pulling tomatoes from under his coat and opened fire. Neither justice was hit but one over-ripe missile smashed against the woodwork just over Lord Justice Clauson's full bottomed wig.

"Send for the tipstaff," thundered Lord Justice Clauson, and the black-gowned bailiff, who carried a metal-tipped rod, strode forward and arrested Harrison.

"You're not worth your blasted state," Harrison shouted, adding as he was being led away, "It's a pity I'm not a better shot."

ISSUE LIST OF PROSPECTIVE BOMBING RAIDS

Insurgent Forces Take Unusual Action of Warning Inhabitants of One Hundred Cities of Anticipated Raids.

Hendaye, France, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The Spanish Insurgents' boasting of the superiority of their air force over the Government's planes, took the unusual step today of announcing the cities and towns they are planning to bomb in nearly one hundred Government localities which the Insurgents said contained military objectives.

A note published with the list said the action was taken "to avoid any damage to peaceful citizens." No date was fixed for the bombings.

ANOTHER BRITISH SHIP SUNK

Madrid, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The British ship Surrey Brook was struck by shrapnel today during an insurgent air raid on the port of Valencia, but nobody was hurt. The five planes dropped about 100 bombs. Three civilians on shore were wounded. Six aerial raids on Barcelona last night caused two deaths.

STREAMLINED REGIMENT FOR U. S. INFANTRY

New Unit, Smaller Either Than Great War Regiment or Regiment of Today, to Have More Effective Equipment.

Washington, Dec. 2.—(AP)—A new streamlined infantry regiment, smaller but far more mobile and harder hitting than either its Great War counterpart or the regiment of today, has received approval from the United States War Department.

Moving by motor truck and armed with semi-automatic rifles, it is intended to become a major unit in the high-speed army on wheels which is being developed.

While officials made public details of these plans today, War Secretary Woodring reported to President Roosevelt that national defence requirements may hasten construction of a third army, possibly larger set of locks for the Panama Canal.

His report followed closely his recommendation to Mr. Roosevelt that the canal be made "impenetrable."

Current surveys contemplate new facilities costing \$150,000,000 or more, to be ready about 1960. Begun in 1936, the surveys were ordered by Congress to meet expected increased demands from merchant craft and warships of larger size and from a greater flow of traffic.

Officials who told of the new infantry plans said three of the new United States regiments will undergo field tests for a year in Texas as a part of a projected smaller infantry division.

At full war strength, the new unit has but 2,411 officers and men, contrasted with the Great War's 3,742 and the present 3,600. Whereas the 1917-18 regiment was armed with 3,200 Springfield, single-shot rifles, and the existing regiment has 1,852 such weapons, the new organization will have 1,492 semi-automatic rifles, giving triple fire power.

Death Toll Of Worst Bus Disaster In U.S. History Mounts To Twenty-Three

Sixteen Others Injured, Three Critically, When Freight Train Speeding Through Blinding Snowstorm Struck Crowded School Bus Near Salt Lake City—Some of Dead So Badly Mangled that Parents Were Not Allowed to See Bodies of Children.

Salt Lake City, Dec. 2.—(AP)—With the death of a youth early today, toll of the country's worst school bus-train disaster rose to twenty-three identified victims.

Sixteen youths, all occupants of the crowded bus that was hit ten miles south of here yesterday by a speeding freight train roaring through an early-morning snowstorm, were injured, three critically. Some of the dead were so badly mangled parents were not allowed to see the bodies.

At Salt Lake General Hospital morgue where the bodies were assembled, one badly mangled body remained unidentified. Hospital attendants said it was possible the form was part of the body of one of the identified children.

Screaming through a December sleet storm which had put it more than an hour behind schedule on a run from Denver the "Flying Ute," fastest freight train on the Denver and Rio Grande Western line, ploughed into the loaded school bus near suburban Midvale, ten miles south of Salt Lake City.

Engineer E. L. Rehmer, warned of the impending collision only an instant before the crash, applied the brakes, but the heavy, fifty-car train thundered its entire quarter-mile length further, showering bodies and wreckage, before grinding to a stop.

Rescue workers employed a dozen ambulances to hurry the injured to the hospital, then set about—in many cases with sick and broken bodies—to gather up the shattered remnants of the dead and remove them to the hospital morgue.

There the heart-rending task of identifying the bodies was started. All of the dead except the driver, twenty-nine-year-old Farrold Silcox, of Riverton, and all of the injured were students at Jordan High School.

State and county authorities pressed investigations as to the cause of the tragedy. Survivors agreed Silcox observed the state law in bringing the bus to a complete stop before the crossing.

Marjorie Groves, sixteen, who escaped virtually unhurt, said snow covered the windows of the bus.

"No one saw the train coming at all," she said. "Mr. Silcox had stopped the bus, and was just starting up again when it struck us."

Engineer Rehmer said: "I couldn't see anything in front of me, because I was on the opposite side from the bus."

"My fireman, Alfred Elton, suddenly yelled 'Big Hole,' which means emergency—apply brakes immediately—and I did."

"I was blowing my whistle for the crossing at the time and had to let go the whistle and apply the brakes," he hit. "Things began to happen pretty fast. I saw the hood of the truck on the engine. When I realized how serious the accident was, the bottom seemed to drop out of everything. I know just how the parents of those children must feel. I have a son and daughter and two grandsons myself."

Allowances To Needy Mothers To Go Into Effect This Month

Several Hundred Needy Widows in Sherbrooke and District Welcome Announcement Made at Local Office of Hon. Col. Bourque—Application Forms for Pension Can Be Secured Only from Quebec.

Several hundred needy mothers in Sherbrooke and district will welcome announcement at the local office of Col. the Hon. Johnny Bourque, Minister of Public Works and Lands and Forests, that the Provincial Government pension designed for their benefit will go into effect this month, with initial payments made on the 15th.

Jean-Marie Bourbeau, secretary to the Minister of Public Works and Lands and Forests, stated to a Record representative this morning that the application forms can be secured only from the Old Age Pension Commission at Quebec. It was stressed no forms will be available at the local office of the Public Works Minister.

Mr. Bourbeau could not say exactly how many needy mothers in Sherbrooke would benefit from the plan, but he estimated that "quite a few hundred" would apply for the Government bonuses.

To qualify for the pension one must be a widow or the wife of a man who's interned, a British sub-

ject for the past fifteen years and a resident in the Province of Quebec for seven years immediately preceding the application.

No allowance will be given any mother who does not keep at least two children under sixteen years. The pension amount will be based upon the number of children in a mother's care.

Furthermore, Mr. Bourbeau explained, the applicant will have to provide, to the satisfaction of the organization, reasonable guarantee of her competence to give the care of a good mother to her children.

Only widows not having the means to maintain children under the age of sixteen will qualify for the allowance. Childless widows or mothers of only one child will not be eligible.

FIRE DESTROYS SCHOOL HOUSE AT ST. ARMAND

Valiant Efforts of Volunteer Fire Brigade Prevent Spread of Flames—Absence of Wind Removes Danger of More Serious Conflagration.

St. Armand, Dec. 2.—Fire of undetermined origin completely destroyed the Roman Catholic School here at a late hour on Tuesday evening and it was only by the valiant efforts of a volunteer fire brigade that a nearby barn belonging to Mrs. Mary Krans was saved. The barn had been ignited by flying sparks.

The school was situated in the centre of the town and it is believed that the entire village would have been wiped out had the wind been of a higher velocity.

The building was a wooden structure of two storeys and employed two teachers.

FEWER PERSONS WERE ARRESTED IN PAST MONTH

Ninety-Four Arrests Made by Local Police During November—Sixty Fire Alarms Answered by Fire Department.

A total of ninety-four arrests were made by the local Police Department during the month of November, according to figures released today at Police Headquarters, the majority of these cases involving petty offences and violations of traffic laws.

The Department reported that a total of 396 calls were answered, out of which thirty arrests were made for drunkenness, twenty-three for violation of traffic laws, twenty for vagrancy, nine for being inmates of disorderly houses, four for breaking and theft, three for keeping disorderly houses, three for violation of other municipal by-laws, one for authorizing false documents, and one for carrying a revolver.

Fifty-three of those arrested paid fines amounting to \$502, twenty-three were committed to jail for non-payment of fines, eleven received suspended sentences, three cases are still pending and seven were sent to the District Magistrate Court.

Thirty-seven business houses were found unlocked at night and protection was given on 127 different occasions. Ninety-seven street lights were reported defective and sixteen dangerous places discovered. Police officers returned two lost children to their homes and four stray animals, and delivered 204 loads of wood to the poor. There were 1,441 loads weighed on the public scales during the month.

The Fire Department answered sixty alarms during November.

Compared with last month, there were ten arrests less, twenty-one more fire calls and twenty-seven more loads of wood delivered.

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TRADE BODY URGES TOWN PLANNING SCHEME

Committee Does Not Regard New Bridge Project Timely

Report of Civic Improvement Board Presented to Chamber of Commerce Meeting Last Night, Opposes Erection of New Bridge Over St. Francis River at Present—Suggested Expert Be Engaged to Study Plan for Systematic Development of City.

Town planning as a necessary factor in the intelligent development of urban communities was recognized by members of the Sherbrooke Chamber of Commerce at their regular meeting held in City Hall last night, when it was decided to sponsor a movement to have an expert come to Sherbrooke to formulate a specific plan for the systematic growth of the Queen of the Eastern Townships.

An outgrowth of the discussion on the proposed new bridge over the St. Francis river, the town planning scheme was put forward as a

means to survey all the needs of this community, so that the most pressing necessities could be dealt with and plans for future development made. Referring to instances where large amounts of money could have been saved in Sherbrooke and elsewhere by a little foresight, speakers pointed out the advantages to any steadily-growing community of a definite plan for expansion.

Report of A. C. Skinner, chairman of the Civic Improvement Committee, on the results of the study made by his group relative to the bridge project, featured last night's assembly. Stating that the need for the new span across the St. Francis was much more pressing now than in other years when the project was first broached, Mr. Skinner outlined the growth of activity in Sherbrooke which has led to a steadily increasing flow of traffic to the East Ward. His report revealed that a survey by local police during a recent hockey game had shown that 2,427 cars had passed over the Aylmer bridge in five hours—an equivalent of eight cars per minute.

A review of the financial aspect of the undertaking showed that a steel bridge would cost between \$400,000 and \$500,000, while a concrete span would entail about \$50,000 less. This would mean that the city, in other words the tax-payers, would be faced with an annual disbursement of from \$24,000 to \$30,000 over a period of twenty years.

As a result of its researches, the Civic Improvement Committee was of the opinion that at some future date the city would need one or more bridges, but that present conditions did not justify the heavy expenditure now.

Speaking as a member of the Sherbrooke Chamber of Commerce, not in his official capacity as Chief Magistrate of Sherbrooke, Mayor Marcus Armistead was of the opinion that the time was now ripe for the

EVERYBODY WELCOME.

Appointment Of C. B. Howard To Senate Object Of Visit

Object of the visit of the Eastern Townships delegation to Prime Minister Mackenzie King and Minister of Justice Ernest Lapointe was to communicate to them the desire of residents of the E. T. that Charles B. Howard, M.P. for Sherbrooke, be appointed to the Senate, the Record was told this morning by J. P. Mullins, M.P. for Richmond-Wolfe, a member of the delegation which travelled to Ottawa.

Very cordially received, members of the delegation were informed that their wishes would be given the fullest consideration, Mr. Mullins stated,

but as was expected Hon. Mr. King made no definite announcement.

General opinion is that the Senate vacancy will not be filled before the next dissolution of Parliament and that definite choice will be made until that time.

Accompanying Mr. Mullins to the Capital were J. H. Leclerc, M.P. for Sherbrooke; J. A. Blanche, M.P. for Compton, and R. G. Davidson, M.P. for Stanstead. Donald Black, M.P. for Huntingdon, was also a member of the delegation. Cesare Gervais, M.P. for St. Maurice and Alphonse Houde represented the Sherbrooke Liberal organization.

Co-Operation To Halt Scourge Of Tuberculosis Held As Essential

"The public must be aroused to the dangers of tuberculosis and co-operation created among the citizens, the medical profession and the governments before any lasting benefits may be had," Dr. Simon Marcus informed the members of the Y's Men's Club at their regular meeting last night.

"The death rate in Quebec from tuberculosis is appalling," he remarked, "being around ninety per hundred thousand as compared with Ontario's forty per hundred thousand. The death rate is in reverse proportion to the number of sanatoria established. They have more in Ontario, few in Quebec."

Dr. Marcus, who was introduced to the club by Stanley Pearson, drew the attention of his hearers to the campaign presently being waged in newspapers and other media by the Provincial Bureau of Health. He pointed out, however, that the great lack is the money with which to fight the disease. Diagnosis of the infection and its control in the early stages often result in complete cure and at least in the prevention of the spreading of the infection to others, but unless there are sufficient means providing free tests and the care for those in whom infection is found, no lasting benefits can be expected.

"Hippocrates, the father of medicine," described the physical or tubercular constitution in the pre-Christian era," Dr. Marcus stated, "and not much more was known of the disease until 1824 when the stethoscope was invented. There was little improvement after that until 1882 when Koch discovered the bacillus of tuberculosis and developing tuberculin by infecting and culturing the toxin."

"The development of tuberculin did not lead to a cure," he continued, "but it has been the means of the tuberculin test whereby it is

possible to ascertain if a patient has ever been infected with the disease. A positive result of the test should lead to X-rays, to find whether the disease is actually present. A negative result means that the patient is not and has not been infected."

The speaker outlined the two main types of tuberculosis and the various sub-types, and stated that the use of the X-ray is most important in the diagnosis of the disease. It is far more reliable than the physical examination and in fact, he said, it is difficult to say positively that the infection is not present if no X-ray photographs are taken of the patient's lungs.

Dr. Marcus then described the various forms of treatment, especially the methods of lung collapse, pneumothorax, involving the removal of the patient's ribs, and the crushing of the ribcage under the neck which paralyzes the diaphragm.

"These methods," he continued, "do no good unless the patient enjoys complete rest. Unless he has complete rest he stands little chance of recovery from the infection."

Turning to the subject of prevention, Dr. Marcus pointed out that only through community effort can progress be made. The diagnosis of the disease in children, the checking on the homes and the people they come into contact with, and the isolation of the diseased until they are cured, are all important. The infection spreads fastest in congested areas, where there are poor living conditions, poor housing, insufficient playgrounds, lack of air, filthy surroundings and insufficient medical facilities.

"Tuberculosis can be eradicated," Dr. Marcus concluded, "in the United States from 1902 to 1932 the death rate per hundred thousand from this cause dropped from 250 to 70. The depression, with its lowering of the general standards of living, slowed the decline of the death rate, but modern results have shown that the disease can be conquered if the people co-operate with the governments by providing free tests, sanatoria, regular inspection of all children and other modern means of fighting it. It is expensive at the outset, but the city of Detroit, for one example, by providing almost unlimited facilities, has almost eliminated tuberculosis, and it can be done anywhere."

The speaker was thanked at the conclusion of his talk by Gordon Hodge.

GIVES ADDRESS ON RAILROAD'S EUROPEAN LINK

"C.P.R.'s Traffic Organization in Europe" Subject of Lecture Delivered by F. Bramley, of Montreal, to Railway Employees Last Evening.

The Treaty of Versailles set up a number of new independent states in Europe, each of which developed aspirations of a marked nationalistic character with attendant important effects upon the trade and commerce of the countries concerned. F. Bramley, of Montreal, secretary of the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Quebec Central Railway, pointed out

in a lecture at the MacKinnon Memorial last evening.

Mr. Bramley's address, entitled "The Canadian Pacific Railway Company's Traffic Organization, Europe," was the first in a series to be held during the winter months under the auspices of the Quebec Central Railway Employees' Educational Committee. A large number of C.P.R. and Q.C.R. employees attended last evening's illustrated talk.

By way of introduction to his subject, Mr. Bramley dealt with some of the principal political and economic factors as they emerged in Europe consequent upon the Great War, and outlined the manner in which they had had naturally a marked effect upon the build-up of the Canadian Pacific Postwar Traffic Organization in Europe.

Mr. Bramley stressed the important nature of the connection which had always been maintained between the Canadian Pacific Railway Company and the United Kingdom in general, and the City of London in particular. He mentioned that there had always been a representation of the directorate in London, and that there are two directors of the company in that city at the present time, namely, the Rt. Hon. Stephen McKenna, P.C., and Sir Edward Peacock, G.C.V.O. At the present time something like two-thirds of the capital stock of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company is held in the United Kingdom and Ireland, he said.

Mr. Bramley pointed out that many important departments of the company function in London, namely, the Canadian Pacific Steamships Limited, the Department of Colonization and Development, the Deputy Secretary and Registrar, and the Canadian Pacific Express Company. His subject last evening was described and more particularly referred to as "The Organization of the Traffic Department," which is within the control of the European manager in London under the general jurisdiction of the traffic vice-president in Montreal. The Canadian Pacific in the United Kingdom maintain their own traffic offices at many important points, including the principal ports. With South-

Confident New Ordinance In Silk Industry To Aid Labor

Minister Johnny Bourque Dispels Fears of Silk Industry Employees' Salaries Will Be Lowered by Ordinance 19—New Regulation Affects Employees in Three Sherbrooke Manufactures—Knitters Assured of 50 Cents Per Hour Minimum.

Col. the Hon. Johnny Bourque, Provincial Minister of Public Works and of Lands and Forests, in a communication to the press telephoned from Quebec late this morning, sounded assurance that the new Ordinance 19 of the Fair Wage Board would not be detrimental to employees in the silk industry.

He pointed out that this Ordinance is particularly interesting to Sherbrooke, as it affects employees in three industries, the Canadian Silk Products, the Julius Kayser Company and the Sheer Silk Company.

"Certain employees have expressed fear," he said, "that following enforcement of this Ordinance their salaries would be reduced. On the contrary, the majority will find that their situation will be improved."

The Minister drew particular attention to Clause No. 8 of the Ordinance, which stipulates that if an employee's regular rate for piece work or work by the hour, or for similar tasks, is superior to that set forth as the minimum in the Ordinance, no reduction in salaries can be made.

"This means," he explained, "that an employee, for example, making seventy cents an hour will not find his salary reduced because the Ordinance's minimum wage is lower."

"Knitters, to mention one category of workers," he said, "are assured of a minimum of fifty cents per hour in Sherbrooke, which is included in Zone No. 2 of the Ordinance." He considered this rate as very reasonable, and expressed confidence it would be to the advantage, and not the detriment, of these employees.

Col. Bourque's communication was handed to newspapermen through Jean-Marie Bourbeau, his secretary.

Chamberlain Vindicated

The work of Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain in attempting a European appeasement by bringing together the heads of the governments of the four major powers received a strong endorsement by the Lancashire voters who returned the Government candidate in Fylde division by a majority of more than two-to-one over the Labor nominee.

While the Government has lost some seats during the past few weeks, they have been essentially industrial ridings where matters other than the Munich accords have become involved in the argument with the result that no clear decision can be made on the outcome of the voting. In the provincial towns, however, the situation is different and the voters are solidly behind the Prime Minister in his struggle to prevent the outbreak of another world war.

Another French Crisis

Uneasy lies the head that wears a crown, wrote the ancient writer, but it is doubtful if anyone can be quite as uneasy as Premier Daladier, of France, who is faced with serious troubles both at home and abroad. In the foreign field, a land-hungry Fascist Italy is casting longing eyes at certain French colonial possessions to round out its Ethiopian conquest.

Meantime at home, despite his easy victory over labor's general strike, his troubles are far from ended. The labor leaders have called another series of sympathetic strikes in protest against the discharge of workmen who led in Wednesday's walk-out. While the new strike is generally conceded to lack momentum, it indicates strong disappointment on the part of labor who had hoped for some sign of appeasement.

Whatever the outcome of the latest trouble, the French Premier may reasonably expect to meet with considerable trouble when he asks a vote of confidence from Parliament next Thursday and the renewal of his decree powers.

Bullets Before Butter

Visiting in Montreal recently, a pure German told of having been sent to a concentration camp and beaten because he had expressed a preference for real butter instead of margarine. This sounds rather far-fetched to the Canadian who can spread butter thickly on his bread and does not know the taste of margarine, which is one of the few products the manufacture and importation of which is forbidden. Because he expressed the wish for butter in place of substitutes, this German was deemed to have held "wrong political beliefs" and was, therefore, cruelly punished.

Field Marshal Goering once said guns are more important than butter to Germany. If the Field Marshal were as much an economist as he is a soldier he would realize that the two things were about equally important. It may be true that an army marches on its stomach but it is equally true that the people in factories who produce those guns and all other kinds of military equipment besides the necessities of life, also work on their stomachs. If the economic machine is weak the military machine begins to suffer, too. German housewives are still complaining of the shortage of ordinary articles of food for which they have to stand in line. These facts are evidence that no matter how much Hitler may threaten war, Germany is far less prepared to stand a long war today than she was in 1914. If she went to war now she would have to win by quick knock-out blows or else go down to certain defeat in a year or two. But that year or two would be far more terrible than the four years of 1914-1918.

The experience of the Aryan German shows that the German who does not obey the Nazi decrees unquestionably and all that they involve is as likely to have a bad time in his native land as any Jew.

Sport And Education

There is a strange voice in the academic shadows. It speaks of sport and of education in distinct tones, but the words are unusual indeed.

"All subjects should be taught in the same way as athletics and the system of giving grades in school subjects should be abolished since, as in athletics, it is only the results that count.

Sounds like a football coach, irked by the tradition that holds many a scholar to an age old routine. But wait. "Because a student gets a grade of

ninety-five per cent. in a language under the present educational system, it doesn't mean that he knows that much, but simply that the teacher's score in catching him in mistakes is five per cent."

"You can't interrupt a boy playing football by teaching him the history of the sport. He isn't interested in getting a Phi Beta Kappa in the subject because the results are obvious."

That was no football coach speaking, but Dr. John Erskine, an internationally known author and for thirty-five years professor of English at Columbia University. He was addressing a foreign language conference of two hundred teachers and public school administrators sponsored by New York University.

Grapefruit And Oranges

Organized retailers who met in Washington to draft a programme for distribution and increased consumption of this year's bumper crop of oranges and grapefruit may have taken a most significant step in modern selling.

For the distributors proposed a plan where handling and distribution costs be reduced in that "such savings be applied toward lowering consumer prices and improvement of producer prices."

There were other important provisions such as the elimination of third grade fruit from shipments, the provision of a maximum mark-up of twenty-five per cent, the reduction of transportation charges, and a permanent board to advertise and merchandise the product.

But the vital part of the programme was the willingness of the growers to share their bumper crop, the bounty of nature, with the ultimate consumer, the housewife, by reducing prices.

Retailers of the country will do well to watch this effort on the part of one industry to move a bumper crop for the ultimate advantage of everyone along the line, producer to consumer.

RECKLESS BIDDER MUST FORCE OPPONENTS TO PLAY HIS GAME OR SEE CONTRACT FAIL

While every writer on contract correctly condemns reckless overbidding, there are times when the overbidder has the satisfaction of making a contract that a less ambitious player would not have undertaken.

Today's hand was taken from a recent duplicate game at the Laureton Bridge Club in New York, conducted by Mrs. Robert B. Fuller. Mrs. Fuller is president of the Women's Auxiliary of the American Contract Bridge League, and is one of the women contract stars at the National Championships in Cleveland this week.

The first trick was won with the seven in the closed hand, East discarding the spade deuce. South now laid down the ace of spades, and followed with the three, East winning with the king.

East could count the spades, and fearing that a return of that suit

would give South all of the diamonds through a successful finesse, he returned the heart king. South won with the ace and returned a low heart, East winning. On the heart return, South finessed the seven, which held.

Embodied by success, a low diamond was led, and the finesse of the nine forced the king from the East hand. East could see nothing better than a heart return, and declared won with the ten, and now returned the diamond queen, West refusing to win. However, another diamond put West in, and he was reluctantly compelled to lead a club, giving declarer the tricks needed to fulfill his contract.

SELL CANADIAN GOODS IN CANADA

(Le Jour, of Montreal)

To sell at home is still the surest and most practical policy. Therefore, we must become less dependent on outside markets. How are we going to do that? It is very simple: import the foreign market into our country. How is it going to be imported except by immigration? Let us bring here from overseas those who eat our wheat, who buy our leather and our shoes, who enjoy our cheeses, who read papers printed on a product of our forests.

We should find consumers for all these products at home. When that is done, we can always sell our excess products abroad. And at home we shall have ten times as much activity and prosperity. From the taxation viewpoint we are the worst-treated people on earth.

Why not contrive to relieve our descendants, who are ruined in advance, by calling here several million workers, producers and consumers of all kinds, who will share the burden with our sons? Let us remember that while the debt per capita per population in 1911 was only \$47.18, in 1915 it was \$56.13 and in 1934 it was \$251.00 (this is the Federal debt only).

Say what you like, immigration has never caused unemployment. It brings new consumers to the country. One hundred families means one hundred more houses, about five hundred more human beings to dress and feed and some individuals well gifted enough to overtake and create jobs and wages. We are very fortunate to live in one of the last countries on earth fit for settlement.

NOT ONLY ITALIANS FIGHTING IN SPANISH WAR

(Le Nouvelliste, Three Rivers)

A great deal has been said of the Italian soldiers fighting for General Franco's army. But to us it would seem that the only reason the Italians' part in the conflict is mentioned is to steer attention away from the fact that an almost equal number of foreigners other than Italians are also in the thick of battle.

And so it happens that when five hundred prisoners were taken from the international brigade in Aragon fighting recently, the count went something like this:

English 141, Americans 70, Germans 42, French 42, Polish 31, Dutch 24, Canadians 21, Yugoslavians 16, Czechs 14, and a lesser number of Swedes, Argentinians, Swiss, Italians, Danes, Irish, Norwegians, Chinamen—and one lone Russian.

DECREASE IN TOURIST TRADE EXPLAINED

(L'Information, Montreal)

Tourist business in Canada has diminished during the later summer months. This diminution has been recorded not only in the Province of Quebec but in certain quarters wished it to be understood, but in all the other provinces also.

This is easy enough to understand. The majority of the tourists who visit Canada naturally come from the United States. In the course of the last year and this year business among our neighbors was far from that in previous years.

Here in Canada we have suffered from a business depression which was a great deal more severe among our neighbors. Under the circumstances one could not expect to see a large number of tourists here.

QUEBEC'S PADLOCK LAW

(L'Evenement, Quebec)

The Padlock Law has aroused all kinds of protests, those of the Communists in the first place, who exclaim about injustice, and in the same class those of their sympathizers who have protested in the name of civil liberties.

Facts demonstrate today that the country in which democracy is not in danger are exactly those which have protected themselves against Soviet propaganda. Because she put

into practice a conception of liberty which took account of no shade and no restriction, France is obliged today to break with her parliamentary traditions if she does not want to rush into the abyss.

The Communists are in favor of liberty until the exact day when they take power, and then they withdraw this beloved liberty not only from those who do not think as they do, but from all the people whom they dominate.

Stalin is the most abominable dictator in Europe. He is a hundred times worse than the German Fuehrer, who is none the less a tyrant of the worst kind.

The Padlock Law is perhaps not perfect. Like all human institutions, it can be bettered. All those who judge it disinterested in its spirit, its inspiration and its application, recognize that it is an efficient instrument against Soviet propaganda. Others may split hairs and show off their dialectic suppleteness; it remains that the Province of Quebec is protected against the work of those who desire the destruction of God, of the country, of the family and of the human personality. Discussion here is free, and there are plenty of subjects.

EDUCATION IN QUEBEC PROVINCE

(Le Soleil, Quebec)

If "education is the supreme business of a people," as Cardinal Villeneuve said before the Teachers' Convention, that duty has not been sufficiently understood in our society. There is no question of the devotion of the parents and the moral value of the teachers.

Unfavorable circumstances claim the undeniable backwardness in matters of intellectual culture of the French-Canadian people. Thus when one desires sincerely by means of criticism to promote the cause of education, one should certainly stop impugning to a single class a national fault the responsibility for which falls upon our generation as upon those which preceded it.

A subject of general regret but not a reason for a real quarrel is how we consider this backwardness, while trying to bring about a better grouping of individual energy, the collective effort of which would permit us, step by step, to catch up with those who have got ahead of us and who are themselves an influential minority in the world.

RAILWAYS ESSENTIAL IN CANADA

(La Presse, Montreal)

Canada less than any other country could get along without railways, here, where every year a large part of our roads are blocked with ice and snow as soon as the season of navigation closes, and the air services are evidently incapable of replacing roads by land and water.

So far as the cost of our railway enterprises is concerned, it is true that the Government in the case of the Canadian National each year spends millions of dollars. But if accompanying other explanations the Minister recalls that it is erroneous to see in this an unexampled and unjustifiable largesse. The Canadian canal system, he said, swallows up annually \$20,000,000 furnished by the State.

Our roads system likewise absorbs \$50,000,000 more than the tax on automobiles and gasoline brings in. It is evident that our railways do not constitute an exceptional pace.

SALADS TO MAKE REDUCING A JOY

Would-be reducers who have a difficult time figuring out menus that are low in caloric content and appetizing at the same time, ought to be interested in "Food for Beauty," a new book by a famous cosmetic expert.

In case you are pretty tired of fruit salads and those of mixed greens, consider this one of twenty large blackberries, 1 cup of cottage cheese, 1-4 pound cherries, 16 lettuce cups, 1 head cauliflower, 3 large beets, 2 tablespoons walnuts (chopped fine), 2 large lettuce leaves. Simply shred the 2 large leaves of lettuce, slice cherries, grate cauliflower, peel and grate beets, make twenty balls of cheese the size of the blackberries. In the center of each plate make a ring of five blackberries and between each put a ball of cheese. Fill the center of the ring with shredded lettuce and sliced cherries. Place 4 lettuce cups on a plate and fill two with cauliflower and two with beets. Garnish each with chopped nuts. Serves four.

Among the other delectable recipes for reducers contained in the new book of Helena Rubinstein is one for Sun Shaft Salad. Here it is:

"Peel one large pineapple and remove eyes. Slice it lengthwise into quarters, leaving a few spines intact on end of each quarter. Peel one large grapefruit and separate into perfect sections free from all membrane. Do the same with one large orange. Wash but do not hull four large strawberries, partially cut through each and stuff with herbal cheese mixture. Make four small balls of remaining cheese mixture. Grate two acorn squash. Peel two white turnips and grate. Set aside one tablespoon of chopped walnuts.

"In center of each plate lay one of the quarters of pineapple. Along upper edge lay two grapefruit sections, alternating with two orange sections. At the base of the pineapple on a small lettuce cup, place a strawberry. At spine end on one side place a cheese ball. Place one medium size lettuce cup on either side of pineapple. Fill one with turnip garnished with a little squash, the other with squash garnished with walnuts. Serves four."

FINANCIAL AND MARKET NEWS

Country And Dairy Products Prices

Montreal, Dec. 2.—The egg market was slightly easier with receipts gradually increasing but still about sufficient for demand. Butter was a little easier in quiet dealings with cheese about steady. Potatoes and poultry were unchanged.

Spot butter sales on the Commodity Exchange were 200 boxes of Quebec regressed 92 score at 21c and 75 boxes of Quebec 38 score at 20 1/2c. The close was 21c to 21 1/4c for Quebec regressed 92 score and 20 1/2c to 21 1/4c for Quebec fresh. Futures were unchanged with December 21c bid, January offered at 21 1/2c and February 21 1/2c to 21 3/4c. The open butter market was generally 21 1/4c to 21 1/2c for regressed with small lots to the retail trade at 22c to 23c for prints and 22c to 22 1/2c for solids.

Cheese on the open market was about 11 1/2c for Ontario white and colored. On the egg market graded shipments in used free cases were 37c for A-large, 31c for A-medium, 28c to 29c for A-pullets, 24c to 25c for B, and 21c to 21 1/2c for C. Offerings at the Commodity Exchange were 37c, 31c, 28c, 25 1/2c, 25c and 21c respectively. Small lots to the retail trade were selling by jobbers in cartons with two cents less for loose, per dozen, as follows: A-1 large, 48c; A-1 medium, 46c; A-1 pullets, 36c; A-large, 42c; A-medium, 36c; A-pullets, 33c to 35c; B, 30c and C, 24c to 25c.

On the potato market, Prince Edward Islands were selling at \$1.25 to \$1.30 per 90 lbs. Prince Edward Island Whites \$1.20 to \$1.25, New Brunswick 80's \$1.05 to \$1.15, Quebec Whites \$1.05 to \$1.10 and Quebec No. 2 grade 75c to 80c.

The poultry market was quoted to the retail trade by wholesale jobbing houses as follows on A-grade dressed stock, B-grade being one cent to two cents per lb. less: Turkeys, 23-32c; milked chickens, 22-25c; selected chickens, 22-25c; selected fowl, 20-25c; Brome Lake ducklings, 36 1/2c; domestic ducks, 21c.

Continued from page 3. ampton, he said, company maintains a notable first class Atlantic steamship service by the Empress of Britain in particular, supported by the Empress of Australia, and also operates the renowned Duchess cabin-class steamers sailing from and to Liverpool with calls at Glasgow and Belfast. The lecturer dealt in considerable detail with the nature and extent of the traffic, passenger and freight, handled at the different ports, including the "Beaver" cargo boat service to and from London and the Continent, and he referred to the company's important connection with the sub-agency organization support for these services established throughout Great Britain and Ireland.

Mr. Bramley then referred to the company's traffic organization on the Continent of Europe and traced its post-war development, describing the situation in this respect in each of the Continental countries. He dealt with the emigration traffic to Canada up to the time when the general depression in the Dominion forced a virtual cessation of such business, which now, however, shows some tendency to slowly increase again under strict regulations as imposed by the Dominion and Provincial Governments, combined with the strict supervision of the company's officers.

Mr. Bramley called attention to the manner in which the Canadian Pacific Company maintains a well equipped and advantageously placed offices in practically all of the capital cities on the Continent. These, he said, perform an important service in catering for the large amount of tourist traffic from Canada and the United States constantly circulating on the Continent. This applies particularly to such important cities as Paris, Berlin, Vienna, Brussels, Rome and Budapest.

The importance of the Canadian Pacific as a steamship company operating on the Atlantic, with connecting services on the Pacific with the Far East and with Australasia via the port of Vancouver, was emphasized especially in its relation to the company's trans-continental rail line across the Dominion of Canada. In conclusion, the address also included references to the extensive cruise traffic operated from the British ports to the Mediterranean, the Baltic, West Indies, etc., with some information appertaining in particular to the round-the-world cruise of the Empress of Britain.

Three moving picture films were then shown dealing with life on board a Canadian Pacific Duchess Steamer illustrating a voyage from Montreal to Liverpool; a film depicting London both grave and gay, and the third film illustrative of the English countryside, taking the County of Somerset as an example, which were much enjoyed by the audience.

The chairman of the Educational Committee, M. A. Workman, presided and extended a welcome to all. He gave a brief outline of the activities and purpose of the Committee, which sponsors study and discussion groups for the benefit of the employees. Mr. Workman introduced the speaker, who was thanked by Charles J. Rose, vice chairman of the Educational Committee.

"A great calamity might occur in one of our hospitalization centers if during a period of confusion fire should break out," said Mr. Armitage, adding that Sherbrooke "must progress or fall into a lethargy of decay." Belief that the project could be realized without an increased burden on taxpayers was expressed by the speaker, who claimed that both Provincial and Federal Governments would lend a sympathetic ear to ventures for financial support.

Albert Charpentier, president of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, which body inaugurated the present study of the new St. Francis river structure, stated that realization of the plan would make for greatly increased development of the southern section of the East Ward, but that in his opinion other civic developments such as a municipal hall, were needed more urgently at the present time.

"In times of depression, let us prepare for prosperity," was the statement made by W. L. Reford Stewart who claimed that with the low interest rates that prevail at present and the very sound financial status of the city the time was opportune for needed expansion. Mr. Stewart then suggested that, in view of the many future needs of the city, a systematic town planning scheme be put into effect.

Support of Mr. Stewart's suggestion was received from several members of the Chamber and finally the motion, endorsing engagement of an expert to study plans for the future development of Sherbrooke, was passed.

During the course of the meeting the members of the Chamber of Commerce heard Paul Fortier, president of the Jeûne Musclic, who outlined the recently formulated plan for a new municipal building.

Head office of the company, which has been in existence for twenty-three years, is in Montreal and the concern is strictly Canadian-owned and operated.

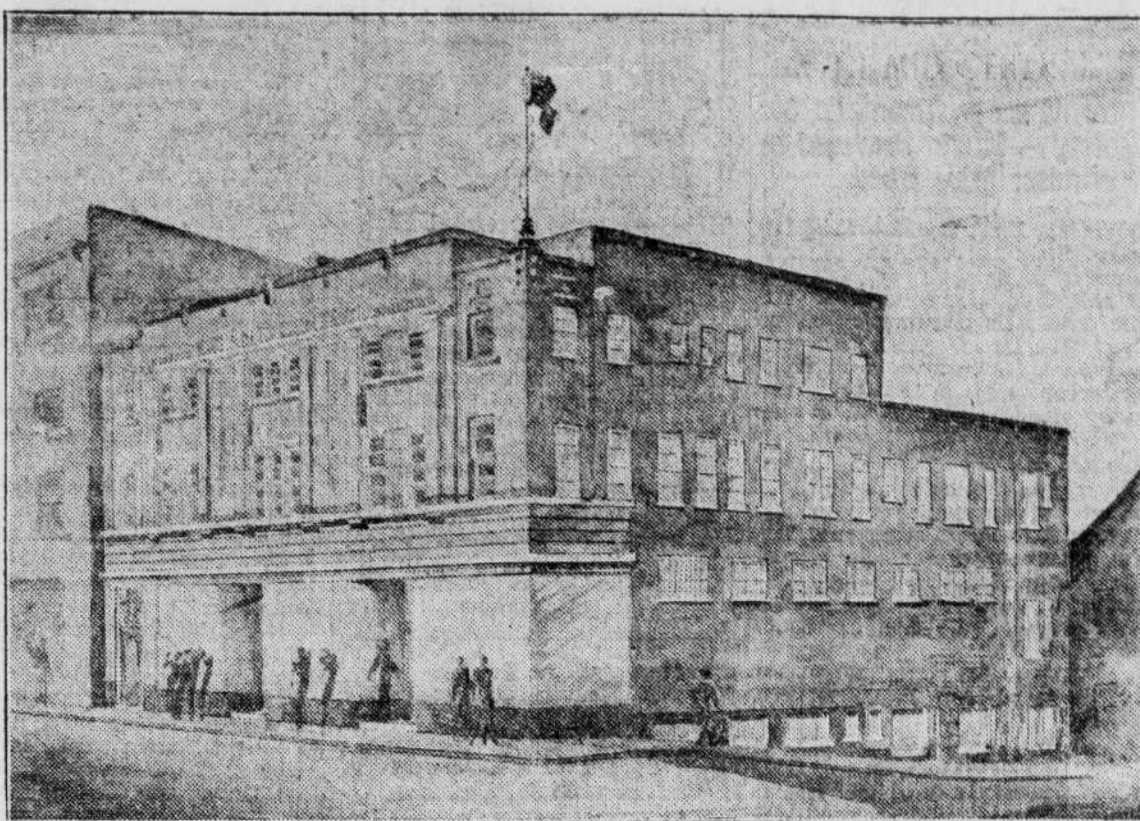
Officials stated that during ordinary periods approximately forty per-

Before a slim crowd that braved chilly weather the Royals had things all their way throughout the first period, maintained their lead of three to nothing in the second, ran in three more quick goals early in the last frame and then withstood a determined Red Raider rally that resulted in four goals and gave local fans a chance to cheer as the Cornier Clan's passing clicked for the first time during the game.

Stars for Sheffield Wednesday in English Football League Second Division—Rangers Receive Queen of the South.

London, Dec. 2.—(P Cable)—When Sheffield Wednesday play Plymouth Argyle in a second division English Football League match Saturday the eyes of a select coterie of spectators will be on one of the twenty-two players on view.

Dazzled by the marksmanship of Douglas Hunt the Wednesday centre-forward who leaped into fame by scoring nine goals in two matches, managers and scouts of several clubs seeking to strengthen their teams, will attend the match with businesslike intentions.

Hunt, formerly on Tottenham Hotspur's roster, is in his second season with the famous Yorkshire club. Last year he scored only six goals, but three against Luton Town a week ago brought his total for the current campaign to fifteen. The previous week he created a new scoring record for the Wednesday by netting six goals in the team's seven to nothing victory over Norwich City.

Driving for the championship of the first division, Derby County faces stiff opposition in a home match with Liverpool. The County has a three-point advantage over Everton who anticipate little difficulty in taking the measure of Chelsea, now near the bottom of the standing.

In an effort to get out of the major league danger zone Stoke City's directors went deep into their money bags to effect the transfer of Pat Gallagher from Sunderland. The clever inside left, with the Roker Park squad since 1927, was released for a fee of \$5,000.

Up in Scotland soccer fans are ready for the most attractive list of fixtures since the campaign opened. Apart from Rangers who have a good margin at the top of the major league, positions of contenders for the championship may be subjected to some revision when results are known.

Rangers are at home to Queen of the South, erstwhile leaders who won three to two in the corresponding match at Ibrox Park last year. Celtic, runner-up with twenty-four points, four behind Rangers, will find Hibernians of Edinburgh a much improved side with a strong forward line.

Hearts and Kilmarnock clash on the former's ground in the Scottish capital. Hearts, in third place, one ahead of the Killies has a slight edge in pre-game speculation but all indications point to a gruelling struggle.

The Bears have won eight of eleven starts, losing three contests.

The Bears never were behind here last night against the Hornets, although the Pittsburgh team tied the score after Mackie put the Bears into the lead with a first-period goal.
