The New Pupils at St. Matthew's. A pupil novel and artistic design and carefully adapted to the purpose it is intended to serve, has been completed for St. Matthew's Church.

The main outline of the work is circular, broken by the projection of several brackets placed at right angles. These with the inverted conical structure reach the floor, which is supported by winding stairs from the rear and supported by columns, caps and bases; a projecting string course from which arched corbels depend, carries the main body of the structure, which is openly arched; its clustered shafts are wrought in rare and highly polished marble; the arches are deeply moulded and enriched; the spirally twisted columns are carried in the circular contour of the design, rising upwards by the disposition of the statues of St. John Baptist, Peter and Paul. The massive structure is surmounted by a dome and is inscribed in honor of "The glory of God and the beloved memory of the Rev. George Hamilton, M. A., Orono, January 18, 1850, died December 24, 1880."

The architect is Mr. Alfred Drevre, of Margate, England, and the execution of the design has been carried out by Messrs. J. and J. Morgan, of Quebec, at whose suggestions several pleasing and important details have been incorporated. The interest in the progress of ecclesiastical art, will find in the present object of interest; the style, unconventionally early English, and the architectural details, which are of the greatest value, are well represented in the marble, which is well supported by the brackets to carry the statues. These with devotional, pure, supporting features, power and lightness of wing, challenge the first attention, and is one of the details of the work that has been entirely carried out by the Messrs. Morgan. The spiral columns, which support the structure, are also originated by them, and its graceful outline coinciding with the progressive elevation of the statue in front of the building. It would require a good photograph, to give very correctly a partial idea of the pulpit, but we recommend what will apply to the examination of the whole, which may serve as an illustration of the excellence of design and execution at this time attainable in the production of this kind of art manufacture.

The Census. The arrival in town of a census is generally the occasion for a good deal of excitement among the younger members of the community. Yesterday was no exception to the general rule, and the streets were filled with spectators on the occasion of the grand outdoor parade of the famous Ryan & Robinson's Circus. Refugees Swarming into Alexandria. Their stories of horrible massacres. A skirmish with Arab's Cavalry at Ramleh. The British occupy the place. Arab's total force estimated at 100,000 men. A French vote for the protection of the Canal. A letter to Mr. Gladstone.

Alexandria, July 24.—The town continues to swarm with refugees, who bring accounts of massacres at Tanta, Damietta and elsewhere.

An eye-witness from Tanta states that 85 Europeans were tortured, disembowelled and torn to pieces. Women were violated and tortured. The soldiers participated in the atrocities.

Arab's new Government has issued a proclamation stating that every native molesting Christians will be shot. It is believed that this is a mere ruse to cover themselves.

According to the latest news from Cairo, 5,000 starving and homeless persons are camped in the desert. There is great mortality among them.

The 60th Rifles marched to occupy Ramleh this morning. Some skirmishing is now proceeding. The 30th Infantry are ordered to support the 60th Rifles. Arab's infantry are reported concentrated at Damietta.

The Rifles and Mounted Infantry occupied Ramleh early this morning. They stationed one garrison and one field gun at the bridge over the Bahig garden. The British appeared and galloped boldly along the railway at 300 yards range, but fled upon a broken by the projectile, and several were killed. After a short time they reappeared with two guns, which they opened fire ineffectually upon the British, who took to cover. By nine o'clock the British had covered the bridge, and the riflemen reappeared with reinforcements. Crowther, one of the two English engineers reported massacred at Tanta, has arrived here. The commander of the Fort at Aboukir, who thought flying a flag of truce, refused to allow any Englishman to enter the fort; he is probably really holding the fort in the interest of the British Government. The desert of Arabia. Arabi came from the island of Malaita to Aboukir; his force is estimated at 700. The first skirmish lasted until the evening. One of the British officers was killed.
