THE ONTARIO ELECTIONS.

The returns of the Ontario elections which were held yesterday show conclusively that the power of the Conservatives is still advancing. Elections took place in 86 out of the 88 constituencies into which Ontario is divided for electoral purposes.

The Ontario elections turned out very much as most people expected. Men felt, in the same way perhaps as Mr. Vennor feels the weather, that the Conservative party had gained ground but not a majority.

generally admitted that the attitude of the Dominion Government in withholding the territory awarded by arbitration, and in disallowing local legislation, cannot have been anything but a source of weakness to the Conservative party in the Province of Ontario.

THE WHOLE TRUTH.

The increase of Canada's trade has, as every one who has watched it knows, been very rapid and very great during the past few years. During the latter part of 1878 and the first part of 1879 Canada was at the bottom of the severest depression which she has ever known; at present, or perhaps it would be nearer the truth to say a few months ago, she was at the height of a corresponding expansion.

THE VERDICT OF THE GRAND JURY.

of the enormous destruction of life in the Newhall House in Milwaukee is by no means a satisfactory one. The whole object of the jury appears to have been to remove as much blame as possible from the shoulders of the manager. The construction of the building is pronounced bad, and the means of escape inefficient, and sufficient men were not employed to give warning in case of fire, but this is all added with the addition that the Newhall House was in as good condition in every respect, and in fact a little better than the majority of similar buildings.

of the man who, while keeping a hotel that had been on fire thirty times, did not hire men enough to watch it, it would have at least thrown some much needed light on this question. The law having thus failed to do its duty, it devolves upon private enterprise, both in this country and the United States, to take this matter up and bring pressure enough to bear upon the authorities to force them to take strong measures to make these buildings a little safer.

Mr. PARNELL's amendment to the address attaching the Crimes Act was supported by only fifteen votes. The administration of the Crimes Act has had the effect calculated upon by the Government; agrarian crime has been pretty well stamped out. Mr. Parnell said things which ought to have been true but which were not. So long as the Government relied upon the ordinary law, which places the punishment of crime largely in the hands of the people, it should have won the sympathy of the people for the law, but it did not, and it is only since the Crimes Act gave the people less power that they have ceased to aid and abet criminals, and that crime has been punished so certainly as to make the administration strong.

THE CROWS PROSECUTOR IN TORONTO.

has received a post card bearing symbols of death accompanied by vague threats of the same and a hint that his personal safety lay in letting lotteries alone. He treats it as a joke, and likely enough it is one, but a criminal joke nevertheless. Lottery brokers are apparently great jesters, for in London some of them regarded summonses served upon them as jokes. When the justices show them where the laugh comes in, their merriment will be worth witnessing. What a pity the introduction of the bills to legalize lotteries in Quebec could not be treated as so much fun, even if that involved the viewing the introducers as harlequins instead of legislators.

THE SENATE TARIFF BILL.

in its amended form, which nobody, it is safe to say, understands in its entirety, and whose effect upon the revenue and upon taxation is only vaguely guessed at, has been passed by both Houses of Congress, signed by the chairman of the Senate and by the President and is now law. What was wanted was a measure which would reduce taxation and at the same time reduce the revenue. A measure may accomplish the first object without securing the last.

A STURDY LITTLE FELLOW.

was whipped by his French teacher, after crying a good while in a corner out of sheer humiliation, at last turned upon the master with scorn, and exclaimed, "Any way the English beat the French at Waterloo." A good many of the expressions we hear just now from the whipped English minority are about as puerile as this. We have no doubt whatever that Saxon Protestantism will, in the long run, prove superior to Latin Catholicism; but in the meantime we should like to see some feasible plan proposed to save Montreal from following Quebec on the down-hill track. The first thing to do is to form a citizens' organization to investigate thoroughly the method by which this victory has been gained.

A BILL ENFRANCHISING FARMERS' SONS.

is now before the Quebec Legislature. Farmers' sons were enfranchised in Ontario some years ago, and since then they have been placed on the assessment rolls in this Province by assessors. The bill will not, in all probability therefore, make much practical difference in the number of votes cast or in the political complexion of the rural constituencies, but it will regulate and regulate what was before a somewhat irregular practice on the part of assessors. The bill provides that each and every son of over twenty-one living on his father's or his mother's farm for eight months out of twelve shall have a vote in addition to that cast by his father, providing the farm is sufficiently valuable to qualify all the sons, in default of which the eldest or eldest sons next to the father or stepfather only shall have votes. Why should not a son-in-law who lives and works on his father-in-law's farm be allowed to vote on that qualification also?

the throwing off of allegiance to King Oscar and the founding of a Republic. It is probable if the royal prerogative is insisted on that this will be the end of the struggle, as Norwegians are of that race of men who know pretty well what they want, and who though they proceed slowly to its attainment, proceed surely and without faltering.

THE CONGO IS TRYING TO RISE TO THE DIGNITY OF A EUROPEAN QUESTION.

and a bone of contention between the powers. Britain has recognized the claim of her ancient allies, the Portuguese, to the Congo country. A bill has been introduced into the French Chambers with the purpose of providing M. De Brazza with a hundred thousand stand of firearms, twenty thousand salves, powder by the ton, axes by the hundred and a company of Algerian sharpshooters. Now it will be in order for the Belgians quietly to notify the world in general that Mr. Stanley has won the love of all the tribes on the Congo, to the number of several millions, and that it might be dangerous to disturb him in his retreat. Unloaded guns would, probably, be the safest for all parties, so it is to be hoped that the French Chambers will cut off the supply of powder.
