POPE IS NOW CONVALESCENT

Gave a Lengthy Audience
to Archbishop Koppes
To-Day

ALTHOUGH PONTIFF IS VERY
WEAK MIND IS VERY CLEAR

Rome, April 12.—(Special)—The Pope is now considered as being fully convalescent. He slept so tranquilly all night that his valet found no need of calling Secretaries Pescina and Bressana, who alternately have been in attendance in an ante-chamber of his bedroom.

Early to-day the Pope received Archbishop Koppes of Luxembourg in private audience.

The Archbishop was obliged to leave Rome to-day and, as he had urgent matters to discuss with Pontiff, an audience was arranged notwithstanding the vigorous protests of Prof. Marchisava, Papal physician, against exposing patient to any fatigue.

The audience lasted for 34 minutes. Although Pope was very weak he showed remarkable clearness and keenness of mind.

SERIOUS ASSAULT AT MANSONVILLE

Victim is Confined to
Room and is in Serious
Condition

FATHER AND SON WERE THE
ASSAILANTS—FORMER HAS
BEEN ARRESTED AND
OTHER DISAPPEARS.

Manstonville, April 12.—(Special)—A serious affray took place on the streets of Manstonville on Wednesday evening. William Harrigan was assaulted and beaten by Newell J. Warner and his son William. Had it not been for the timely arrival of Henry E. Perkins and Alton Moore who hearing cries of distress rushed to the rescue, there is but little doubt of what the result would have been.

Harrigan was beaten on the head and in the face. He was immediately taken to the office of Dr. E. H. Henderson where his wounds were treated, and from thence to Botterell's Hotel, where he now lies in a very weak condition.

High Constable Boisvert came here, made investigation, and arrested Newell J. Warner, but his son could not be found.

"MOTHERS" BILL PASSED IN OHIO

Pension Will be Given
to Destitute and Deserted
Women

PROVISION WILL ALSO BE MADE
TO PROVIDE FOR CHILDREN
OF SUCH.

Columbus, O., April 12.—The Greenland bill, providing for pensions for indigent mothers, an administration measure was passed in the House yesterday and now goes to Governor Cox, whose approval is assured. The vote in the House was: Yeas, 92; nays, 4.

The bill makes provision for an annual tax levy of one-tenth of a mill, which is expected to create a fund each year of not less than \$700,000 for the carrying out of the mothers' pension plan.

Destitute widows, women whose husbands are completely disabled, have deserted them, or are serving prison sentences, are to be cared for under the provisions of the measure. Juvenile courts are to be authorized to pay such women \$15 a month for a child under fourteen years of age, and \$7 a month for each additional child under that age. The bill makes drastic changes in the juvenile code. Under the latter as amended boys under fourteen are prohibited from selling newspapers or chewing gum on the streets.

DUCHESS IS IMPROVING

NO DOUBT NOW ENTERTAINED OF
ULTIMATE AND COMPLETE
RECOVERY.

London, April 12.—Last night's bulletin states the Duchess of Connaught "had a fair day. The pulse and temperature remained normal, and steady progress was maintained. So well was the operation borne and so satisfactory has been the royal patient's progress since, that no doubt is entertained of an ultimate and complete recovery. It is understood the actual operation was the removal of the vermiform appendix, the displacement of which had caused an obstruction."

MAY BE FIRST THROUGH CANAL.
Washington, April 12.—Col. Geo. W. Goethals, builder of the Panama canal, received authority yesterday to select the vessel to which the honor of first passing through the canal will fall. It is said he will select the Fram, the ship on which Captain Amundsen sailed to the South Pole. Captain Amundsen has determined to pass through the canal on his coming North polar expedition. Secretary Garrison said yesterday the war department would not interfere with any plans Colonel Goethals might make.

MRS PANKHURST RELEASED

Condition of the Suffragette
Leader is Said to be
Very Serious

AUTHORITIES WILL ALLOW HER
FREEDOM ONLY UNTIL SHE
HAS REGAINED HEALTH.

London, April 12.—(Special)—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, Suffragette leader, was released from Holloway jail this morning after having been on hunger strike since she was sentenced, only nine days ago, to three years of penal servitude.

Mrs. Pankhurst was released on a license under terms of which she must report at frequent intervals to the police authorities, and in case she commits any misdemeanor she is liable to immediate arrest without a warrant and must then serve further full term of conviction.

It is understood that the intention of the authorities is to allow her to be free only for a limited period until she regains her strength.

CONDITION IS GRAVE.

The condition of the suffragette leader was described this morning as being very grave. She was removed at once to the nursing home where she was placed under the care of her own doctor.

MEETING OF LADY SCOTT AND SON

Peter Was Told That His
Daddy Would Not Come
This Time

THE REUNION WAS A MOST PA-
THETIC ONE. MOTHER RE-
TURNED FROM NEW
ZEALAND.

London, April 12.—Lady Scott arrived in London yesterday afternoon, having travelled overland via Brindisi on her long return trip from New Zealand, where she went to meet her husband.

Nobody awaited her return more anxiously than her three-year-old son Peter.

OPPOSITION TO TARIFF MEASURE

Looks as if Lively Times
Are Ahead in U.S.
Senate

DESPERATE MEASURES WILL BE
TAKEN TO HOLD DEMO-
CRATS TOGETHER.

Washington, April 12.—Opposition to President Wilson's dictation of the tariff bill which has been smouldering in the Senate, broke out with renewed force yesterday, and the lines of battle in the upper chamber seem to be so clearly drawn that the President's friends are preparing for desperate measures in their effort to hold something like an unbroken Democratic party to the support of the bill. These plans, of course, are being laid with a view to the handling of the tariff bill as a single measure, and more unusual tactics will be followed if the House Democrats yield to the wishes of their partisans in the Senate and divide the bill into three parts. But although the senators have presented their wishes on this subject in unmistakable language to the President and the leaders of the House, the program outlined that the tariff program will come from the House embodied in one bill.

CLOSURE DEBATE WAS CONTINUED

Reference Made as to
What Senate Will do
With Naval Bill

MEMBER FOR SHEFFORD SAYS
LIBERALS WANT TO KEEP
MONEY IN COUNTRY.

Ottawa, April 12.—The House was as calm as a millpond yesterday and there was a complete absence of the hysterics which characterized proceedings during the earlier part of the week. The quietude was welcomed by everybody and there was a general week-end exodus of members anxious to escape the harassing worries of debate. The Liberals had the floor all day on the closure, no Government speakers participating in yesterday's session. Mr. W. Manley (Welland) referred to the probable action of the Senate on the Navy Bill. In this connection it is interesting to note that an editorial in the Ottawa Press last night, in which the Liberal organ says: "The belief is that the Senate will not throw out the Borden Navy Bill if it is sent up to that House from the Commons, which it will be."

Mr. Bovin (Shefford) said there were two courses open to the Premier, to drop the bill or to make an appeal to the people. The proper course would be to drop the bill. "We are not asking for power or inviting a chance to go before the electors," said Mr. Bovin, "what we are fighting for is to keep in the country thirty-five million dollars that the Premier wants to send outside."

MORGAN'S BODY IN NEW YORK

ARRIVED ON THE STEAMER
FRANCE YESTERDAY AFTER-
NOON.

New York, April 12.—The body of J. Pierpont Morgan lies among the art treasures of his private library. It reached New York on the steamer France in a driving rain yesterday afternoon and at dusk was taken from the ship's mortuary chapel, sombre in heavy velvet and resplendent in silver and gold, to a motor hearse, which conveyed it from the pier to the library. Hundreds braved the drenching rain and stood in the streets to watch it pass. Among the rare bronzes, costly paintings and other art objects which he brought here from Europe, the dead financier will be in state till Monday morning when the funeral services will be held in St. George's Protestant Episcopal church.

FAVORS CLEAN JOURNALISM.

Washington, April 12.—Passage of his bill prohibiting the publication of details of crimes and serious accidents in newspapers within the district of Columbia next week by Senator Works of California.

He has prepared a lengthy speech dealing with many of the phases of modern journalism as a factor in the development of public morals.

CABLE REPORT OF POLICE BEING
CALLED TO COMMONS CRITICIZED.

London, April 12.—The Montreal correspondent of the Express cables "The reports cabled from London stating that newspapers published telegrams describing the summoning of police to the Dominion House of Commons have caused great astonishment and indignation here." As the foregoing obviously infers a denial that such an extremity was resorted to it may be as well to state that the report came through a prominent news agency in the following terms: "The debate is proceeding with much bitterness. The disorder was so great at one time that it was found necessary to call the Dominion police into the Chamber." Every evening newspaper in London gave prominence to this on its placards.

TITANIC MEMORIAL IN PLACE.

New York, April 12.—On Tuesday, April 15, one year from the day on which the Titanic sank, will be dedicated the Lamer Tower and Time Ball which has been erected on the New Seamen's Institute in New York City, as a memorial to all those who lost their lives when the steamship Titanic made her maiden voyage.

SETTLEMENT LOOKED FOR

Russia's Note on Montenegrin
Affair Has Had Good Ef-
fect in Europe

PRINCE WILLIAM OF SWEDEN
BACKED BY TRIPLE AL-
LIANCE FOR ALBANIAN
THRONE.

London, April 12.—(Special)—The Russian announcement yesterday in regard to Montenegro has had an excellent effect in Europe and has strengthened the hope of an early settlement of this question, which will probably be made in two or three days, but so far as Scutari is concerned, nothing is known as to effect of Russia's statement on Montenegro.

The intention of Serbia to withdraw her troops from Montenegro has not been announced officially, but it is confirmed from many quarters.

CANDIDATE FOR ALBANIAN
THRONE.

Vienna, April 12.—(Special)—The candidature of Prince William of Sweden, second son of King Gustave, for the Albanian throne is favored by European powers belonging to triple alliance, Germany, Austria, Hungary, according to Neue Freie Presse. Despatches received here from Cattaro, the seaport of Montenegro, announce that since yesterday the fortress of Scutari has been subjected to severe bombardment by Montenegrin besiegers.

TURKS MASSACRE CHRISTIANS.

Athens, Greece, April 12.—(Special)—A body of Turks coming from the coast of Asia Minor, yesterday massacred Christians among inhabitants on Island of Kastellorizo, to the south east of Rhodes on Asia coast, according to despatches received here during night. The details of occurrence are still lacking.

WANTS \$100,000,000 FOR RELIEF FUND

Resolution at Washing-
ton to Provide For Suf-
ferers by Disasters

WOULD HAVE A PERMANENT
FUND FOR RELIEF FROM
ALL CATASTRO-
PHES.

Washington, April 12.—A permanent Federal fund of \$100,000,000 for relief and reconstruction work in localities laid waste by flood, fire, earthquake and other catastrophes, was proposed in a resolution introduced in the House by Representative Gary of Wisconsin. The resolution would authorize the treasurer of the United States to issue \$1,000,000 notes to be held subject to the orders of the Secretary of the Interior. In catastrophes, the bill would authorize the secretary to make loans to counties, towns and municipalities affected, to the legal limit of their taxation, making the taxes of the locality security for the loan, and providing for payment in annual installments covering not more than twenty years. The loans would be made with the approval of the President and his cabinet. A bill to appropriate \$1,000,000 for the relief of the flood districts of Ohio was introduced by Representative Clapp of Ohio.

MAY DEPORT FOREIGN MILITANTS

REPORT THAT THIS WILL BE
DONE CAUSES CONSTERNA-
TION AMONG SUFFRAGETTES.

London, April 12.—It is understood that a member of the House of Commons who is friendly to the cause of woman suffrage intends to ask Reginald McKenna, Home Secretary, next week, whether he is contemplating a plan whereby Miss Zelle Emerson, of Jackson, Mich., and other foreign militant suffragettes guilty of breaking English laws, will be deported as undesirable aliens.

Under the English law Mr. McKenna would be acting within his legal rights in doing this. Therefore, the report that he intends to do so has caused consternation among the American women here who have jail records, as well as among those whose affiliation with the Women's Social and Political Union, the militant suffrage organization, might lead to their being sentenced to a term of prison.

STRIKE IN BUFFALO HAS BEEN SETTLED

Men and Company Came
to an Understanding
Yesterday

BOTH SIDES MADE CONCESSIONS
THROUGH MEDIATION
OF THE MAYOR.

Buffalo, N. Y., April 12.—The strike of the motormen and conductors on the city and suburban lines of the International Railway Company, which began last Sunday, was settled yesterday through the mediation of Mayor Louis P. Fuhrman. In arriving at a basis of settlement both sides made concessions. The company officials consented to confer at the Mayor's office with President William D. Mahon, of the Amalgamated Association, and the men receded from their demand that after the resumption of car service the negotiations on hours and wages for which the men struck should be carried on with a committee of the association.

The agreement was signed only by President E. G. Connette, of the railway company, and a committee of men composed entirely of former employees on city and inter-urban lines.

WEIGHED 370 POUNDS.

Kingston, April 12.—The remains of the late Samuel Milligan, of Millhaven, a retired farmer, aged eighty-six years, were interred yesterday. Deceased weighed 370 pounds, being the heaviest man in this part of the province.

LARGE BOILERS FOR GRANBY
FACTORY.

Granby, April 12.—(Special)—Two immense boilers each weighing about 12 tons arrived in town this week for the Empire Tobacco Company's new plant.

Dauphin, April 12.—(Special)—Baron de Champlouis formerly of this town, but now of Paris, France, has sold his farm near Lorne, to Mr. F. Martel. The farm consists of about 200 acres of land with good buildings. Mr. Martel has taken possession.

SPARKS FROM ENGINE START
FIRE.

Dauphin, April 12.—(Special)—A small fire took place in a shed at the rear of H. Roux and Sons Store, at the station, Friday morning. Sparks from passing trains dropping on the roof are said to be responsible for the conflagration. The alarm was given and the firemen responded promptly. The fire was extinguished before any great damage was done.

GLEN SUTTON CREAMERY TO
OPEN UNDER NEW MANAGE-
MENT.

Sutton, April 12.—(Special)—The Glen Sutton Creamery, which has been closed during the winter, will open up on Monday, April 14th, under the management of the Lynndown Creamery Association, who purchased the plant from Mr. W. W. Learned a few months ago. The local manager will be Miss Mary Loe, who has been engaged in this factory for the past 18 years. The plant will be operated as pasteurized cream shipping station.

HOTEL CHANGES HANDS AT
BEDFORD.

Bedford, April 12.—(Special)—The Central Hotel changed hands this week, Messrs. A. O. Norton and Co., the proprietors, selling out to Mr. P. Grassetto of Frelighsburg. Mr. Grassetto is well known locally, having kept a livery business in town a few years ago. It is understood he intends to thoroughly renovate the hotel and put same in a first class condition.

BERLIN'S ANTI- NOISE CRUSADE

New Regulations Passed
For Keeping Peace
on Streets

NO WHISTLING OR LOUD TALK-
ING WILL BE PERMITTED
ON THE STREETS.

Berlin, April 12.—(Special)—Residents and sojourners in the German capital heretofore have found it difficult enough to go about their everyday business without violating some of the thousand and one municipal laws and regulations, but this difficulty is likely to be increased several fold by the batch of new police regulations that are to come into force to-morrow. These regulations were drawn up with the evident purpose of making the streets quieter and cleaner. They include the following:

No whistling, singing, shouting or loud talking of any kind likely to endanger the quiet of the streets is to be permitted; no paper, remains of fruit, cigars and cigarettes may be thrown into the streets; the dragging of women's dresses is prohibited. Persons with umbrellas or canes must not carry or swing them in any manner likely to imperil the safety of passers-by, and, finally, no windows or doors of houses, flats, shops or restaurants in which music is being played may be kept open.

TELEGRAPHIC DISPATCHES SUMMARIZING CANADIAN AND WORLD NEWS

WILL HOLD ANNIVERSARY SER-
VICES.

London, April 12.—(Special)—Tuesday will be the first anniversary of the sinking of the steamship Titanic, by which 1,500 persons, including many men and women of world-wide prominence, lost their lives. The anniversary will be observed with memorial exercises in London, New York and other cities.

M.P. MUST VACATE SEAT.

London, April 12.—Sir Stuart Montagu Samuel, Radical member of Parliament from the Whitechapel division of London, and one of the leading bankers, must vacate his seat in Parliament, owing to his firm having last year become purchasers of silver for the Indian Government.

The Judicial Committee of the Privy Council yesterday decided that he must give up his seat, basing its judgment on an old act of Parliament under whose terms a member of the House may not be even indirectly interested in such a transaction or in any government contracts.

FROM FOUNDRY TO PULPIT.

New York, April 12.—(Special)—The Rev. Dr. William H. Morgan, until recently pastor of the Central Methodist Episcopal Church in Newark, will to-morrow preach his first sermon as pastor of Calvary Methodist Episcopal Church in this city, which is the largest Methodist congregation under one roof in the world. Dr. Morgan has one of the most striking records of any man in an American pulpit. From a puddler in an iron mill for eleven years, he has risen to the position of pastor of one of the leading Methodist churches in the United States. Up to the age of 23 Dr. Morgan could not read or write.

ARMAND LAVERGNE WINS SUIT.

Quebec, April 12.—Judge Caron in the Superior Court rendered judgment yesterday in the case of Mr. Armand Lavergne against the Government for libel, the outcome of the Hochelaga bye-election campaign. The Court awarded Mr. Lavergne \$200 damages with costs on the full amount of the \$5,000 action. The costs are estimated to amount to not less than \$1,000.

The action was based on the publication of the report of a speech in which it was asserted that Mr. Lavergne had sought a portfolio in the Dominion Cabinet and had endeavored to obtain government contracts for his friends, allegations which Mr. Lavergne contended had no foundation in fact.

ATTEMPT TO BURN AERO PLANT.

London, April 12.—An alleged suffragette attempt to destroy by fire the dirigible balloon sheds and aeroplane parks of the Army flying corps is reported from Farnborough. Two lighted candles were discovered in the furze bushes surrounding the sheds, but these were extinguished before any damage had been done.

LADY BEATRICE CECIL A BRIDE

London, April 12.—(Special)—Society gathered in full force to-day at Westminster Abbey for the wedding of Lady Beatrice Cecil, who is intimately related to no fewer than half a dozen of England's greatest families, and Hon. William George Ormsby-Gore, son of the third Baron Harlech and member of Parliament for the Denbigh district. The marriage ceremony was performed by the Archbishop of Canterbury.

AMERICAN SAILORS KILLED.

Guaymas, Sonora, Mex., April 12.—Two sailors of the United States cruiser California were killed and three others wounded in a street fight Wednesday morning at Mazatlan, a Pacific coast port below this point. Two or three Mexican policemen were wounded in attempting to arrest the American sailors. Admiral Cowles is investigating the incident.

FUNERAL OF J. P. MORGAN ON
MONDAY.

Washington, D.C., April 12.—(Special)—Men of prominence in many parts of the country will gather in New York Monday to attend the funeral of J. Pierpont Morgan. The funeral services are to take place in St. George's Church, Stuyvesant Square. Following the services a special train will carry the funeral party to Hartford, Conn., where the body of the late financier will be placed alongside those of his parents and his first wife.

NO POSTPONEMENT OF ALBERTA
ELECTIONS.

Calgary, April 12.—There will be no postponement of the Alberta election. Justice Walsh handed down his decision dismissing the application of the Conservatives for an injunction restraining the returning officer from proceeding. The application was dismissed on an objection raised by James Shorter, K.C., that the matter was one over which the court had no jurisdiction. In this view the court acquiesced. The decision was given earlier than was expected.

SAW A WHITE FOX.

Manstonville, April 12.—(Special)—Mr. Wm. H. Davis saw a white fox yesterday about three miles from Manstonville. Mr. Davis is an old fox hunter and has seen all kinds, but never saw a white fox before. There cannot be any doubt of its being a fox as he was within eight rods of Davis who had time to scrutinize him carefully.

MRS. POINCARRE DEAD.

Paris, April 12.—Mme. Poincarre, mother of M. Raymond Poincarre, the President of the French Republic, died suddenly yesterday. Her husband was general inspector of bridges and highways, and the family home is at Barle-Duc (Meuse) which was the birthplace of the premier.

LIPTON RECEIVES MESSAGE.

London, April 12.—Sir Thomas Lipton is deriving great pleasure from a cablegram received by him, yesterday from the Yacht Racing Association of Massachusetts, which reads: "The Yacht Racing Association of Massachusetts applauded the sportsmanship of your unconditional challenge. Wish you well-sailed match in 1914. (Signed) Bliss, Secretary."

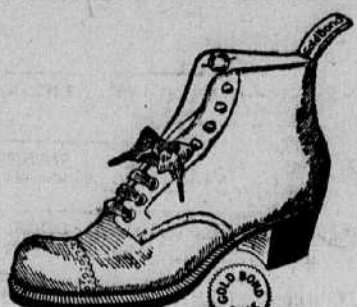

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THE ONLOOKER COMMENTS

Oath of The Athenian Youth.

We will never bring disgrace to this, our city, by any act of dishonesty or cowardice, nor ever desert our suffering comrades in the ranks. We will fight for the ideals and sacred things of the city, both alone and with many. We will reverence to the city's laws and do our best to incite a like respect and reverence in those above us who are prone to annul or to set them at naught. We will strive unceasingly to quicken the public's sense of civic duty. Thus, in all these ways, we will transmit this city not only not less, but greater, better, and more beautiful than it was transmitted to us.

City Planning

Reference was made in these columns, last week, to some of the problems of city building. It was urged that streets, parks, tenement conditions, sanitation and all kindred subjects should receive constant and intelligent consideration, that the city may grow along right lines.

It is not only the older cities which have made serious initial mistakes, Calgary, a product of the West, is just now preparing to spend a million dollars to rectify errors of the past. An English architect has been engaged at a salary of \$10,000 to replan the city.

Cities of the old world, with their accumulated slum districts and badly planned streets, have during the past quarter of a century awakened to these unwholesome conditions and are striving for the betterment of civic conditions.

The Lord Provost of Glasgow recently said:

"The main object of the municipal administration is to make life more livable for the great mass of the citizens; to give, as far as practicable, to the poorest the material advantages which the rich man is able to command."

"The rich man's advantages—what are they? Wholesome food, a healthy, well lighted house, with an ample supply of pure water, a bathroom, a good library and beautiful pictures, a fine park and gardens, carriages to take him about, telephones to enable him to speak to people at a distance on business or social, or to send for a doctor instantly when disease invades the household; nursing homes and private hospitals to which to send his dear ones when isolation is necessary, and, lastly, provision for his old age. These are all at the disposal of the rich, and it ought to be the aim of wise statesmanship to make them available for the other classes of the community."

"Glasgow corporation, I am glad to say, has long taken a leading part in this direction."

The Lord Mayor of Liverpool remarks upon the same subject.

"Modern civilization, with its rapid and permanent annihilation of space, has brought in its train a deeper intelligence and a stronger vitalizing influence amongst the people of the world. The idea of separating nations holds far less strength than the idea of a common brotherhood—of a citizenship which knows no geographical distinction; and in this city there is a strong civic patriotism. It shows itself in the better housing of the people, a quick and ready transit to the outer areas for healthy dwellings and the rational amusement, the provision of a garden suburb, the making of broad main avenues in the city and an ever broadening development of commerce and industry. These are some of the ways in which this civic pride is being illustrated."

As a part of their administration of a growing city, the civic authorities of Sherbrooke should inaugurate an investigation into housing conditions in Sherbrooke and insist that every tenement family shall be provided with at least sanitary surroundings and that every household shall provide for his own property at least these requisites. The park committee should employ a competent landscape engineer, not only to present parks and squares but to present a comprehensive plan to be put into execution in connection with the city's growth.

The healthfulness and attractiveness of the greater Sherbrooke of the future may be ensured by proper planning and execution now or may be seriously marred by present day neglect and lack of foresight.

Cause and Effect.

Is the greater Sherbrooke movement prejudicial to the interests of the working man?

This was the contention of "J. E. L." in his letter published in the Record on Wednesday.

The writer of this column has always considered the opposite to be decidedly the case.

"J. E. L." points out that rents

have advanced 20 p. c., that wood has advanced from \$4 to \$6 per cord, etc., and that \$12 will not go farther than \$10. would three or four years ago. This is true. It is, however, not a condition peculiar to Sherbrooke but applies to the whole continent. The Greater Sherbrooke Movement cannot be blamed so far as the condition is general.

There is no doubt that the establishment of new industries, the growth of civic pride and confidence in the city's future, has had effect of advancing land values and increased values, in the case of tenements, naturally tend towards higher rentals. This is, however, not the only cause and not the chief cause of advance in the price of rent. The cost of building operations has gone up 30 p. c. during the past few years. If the Greater Sherbrooke movement is to be charged with raising the rent, it must be credited with raising the price of all labor employed in connection with building operations. From the mason and the carpenter to the laborer there has been an advance close to 30 p. c. Labor is the principle single item of expense in building. It is unfortunate that building operations have not quite kept pace with the growth in population, the increased cost of construction being doubtless the chief cause. Then take the advance in the price of wood which is cited by "J. E. L." The increased cost of labor employed in cutting and hauling this wood will, we believe, be found to be the principal cause of advance in price. If the Greater Sherbrooke movement is responsible for one, may it not, also, be credited with the other.

But it may be asked, where does the man who is neither a wood cutter, nor a mason, nor a carpenter come in? Where does the machinist and the working man who pays rent and buys wood figure?

This may perhaps be determined better by looking at the reverse side of the case and considering his situation, if in this city, instead of a spirit of civic pride and optimism, discontent and an air of pessimism, prevailed; if instead of new industries and expansion, the factories were not extending and the town was at a standstill. How long would it be before there was a surplus of labor? During the slack periods of the year, what would be the situation of men laid off for lack of work? What would be the chance of maintaining an advance in wages rendered necessary by the increased cost of provisions and clothes? Would compensation in the way of lower rentals counterbalance the disadvantages of the other conditions?

It seems to the writer of this column that the best condition for all the citizens is a condition of progress. New shops mean more opportunities for employment. Many opportunities for employment mean steady work and higher wages.

Rentals may advance and a great city movement may have some bearing upon this particular item of expense. In other ways, however, it will bring more than even compensation. It is not responsible for advance in the general cost of living. That is a continental condition.

By creating a condition of prosperity and progress, conducive to steady employment and higher wages, the greater Sherbrooke movement will shed its fruits into the laps of the artisan and the workman as well as of the capitalist and the land owner.

Who is there, no matter what his calling or occupation, who would not rather take his chances in the town that is moving than in the town at a standstill?

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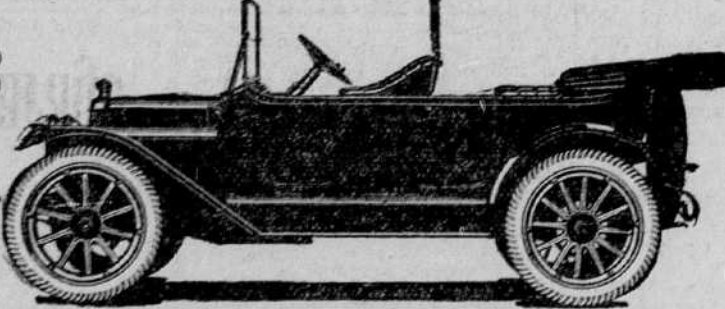

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CASES HEARD BEFORE JUDGE MULVENA

Peopolis Man Fined For Extreme Cruelty to His Horses

EAST ANGUS MAN BOUND OVER TO KEEP THE PEACE FOR NEXT TWELVE MONTHS.

Judge Mulvena recently heard the complaint of Mr. E. S. Foss, Inspector S.P.C.A., vs. Napoleon Viens, of Peopolis, near Lake Megantic, for cruelty to animals. The defendant was charged with treating his horses with extreme cruelty, one of which died presumably from the results of the ill-treatment.

The defendant pleaded guilty, and as he was extremely poor and the costs of the prosecution heavy, he was let go with a fine of \$5 and costs, or thirty days in jail.

THIRTY DAYS FOR THEFT.

The King vs. Wilfrid Malhot, of Coaticook.—The accused had been committed for trial on a charge of stealing valuable tools to the extent of \$350. He asked for a speedy trial and pleaded guilty and was sentenced to thirty days at hard labor in the common jail.

BOUND OVER TO KEEP THE PEACE.

C. E. Desjarlais, of St. Edwidge de Clifton, vs. Wm. Girardin, Jr., of East Angus. The complainant asked that the defendant be bound over to keep the peace for twelve months, on account of threats made to blow up the complainant's house with dynamite and to kill him. The charge was contested at great length, but the Court held that the making of the threats to a number of people and the repeating of them to the complainant had been abundantly proven, and that under the circumstances the complainant had ample ground for being alarmed. The defendant was ordered to give his personal bond in the sum of \$200 to keep the peace for one year.

Proceedings were taken before the District Magistrate against the keeper, inmates and frequenters of a resort on Wellington street. The evidence was very lengthy and of a very unsavory nature. The keeper and inmates were fined \$20 and costs each, or 60 days in jail. The frequenters were fined \$5 and costs each.

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SUGGESTS THAT NAVAL PLAN BE DROPPED

Mr. Keir Hardie Brings Matter up in British House of Commons

LONDON TIMES SAYS CONTROVERSY IS ONLY ON THE FORM OF EXPENDITURE.

London, April 12.—Mr. Keir Hardie will ask Premier Asquith in the House of Commons whether he is aware that the proposal of Mr. Borden to make a loan or gift of three battleships to the Admiralty has become a matter of acute party controversy in the Dominion Parliament and whether under these circumstances he will take the opinion of the Cabinet on the propriety of suggesting to the Canadian Government the undesirability of proceeding further with the proposal.

THE TIMES ON THE SITUATION.

London, April 12.—The Times yesterday editorially points out that the necessity for closure at Ottawa arises not through objections to naval expenditure but against a particular form of expenditure proposed. Therefore, the opinion of the other parts of the Empire has nothing to do with this aspect of the controversy. We have, of course, to recognize, as a defeat that Mr. Borden's emergency measure will inevitably involve the introduction of supplementary estimate here. The three ships proposed by Mr. Borden will be needed for the general security of the Empire in 1915, if not laid down by Canada public opinion here will insist they be laid down by themselves.

The ships, continues the Times, are of no account compared with the principle for which they stand. They stand in British eyes for Canada's determination to take her place beside the motherland and the other Dominions in maintaining the supremacy of British sea power.

"We should indeed profoundly regret," concludes the Times, "a situation which divided French Canadian and British Canadian sentiment into any semblance of old race camps but we shall not believe any such danger is threatened so long as Mr. Borden's French Canadian colleagues remain loyal to his side. To observers in this country Mr. Borden has always seemed to speak without the slightest touch of race prejudice for Canada as a whole. He has clearly conducted the Canadian Commons through some very difficult weeks with dignity, sense of justice and serenity not surpassed in the great record of his chief opponent, Laurier, himself. To suggest that he has been won over by English pressure to a policy prejudicial in any way to the freedom and national status of his fellow countrymen is not merely to misread, completely the English view of the Imperial idea it must also seem to all who met Mr. Borden in England a strange, almost ludicrous misjudgment of Mr. Borden's own intelligence and strength.

DROP CLOSURE; PASS NAVAL BILL

OTTAWA PAPER MAKES AN APPEAL TO BOTH POLITICAL PARTIES.

Ottawa, April 10.—The Ottawa Free Press (Liberal) said last night: "Liberalism has exhausted every means to compel the Borden Government to appeal to the country for a mandate on its navy Bill. It has failed. That fact might be faced first as last. If the Senate were to throw out the bill the Government would drop it. There would be no election. The closure is a nightmare. Analysis of it proves that it is revolutionary. No Liberal had the right to assume that any Canadian Government would dare to propose so sweeping, so monstrous a measure. Liberalism cannot help throwing up its hands in horror at this proposed closure. In face of it and rather than that it should become law for ever, Liberalism can afford to transfer its fight against the Navy Bill from Parliament to the public platform in the constituencies.

In order to save Canada from the greater of two evils, the Free Press earnestly suggests that the time has now come for Liberalism to abandon its demand for an immediate election and permit the Borden Navy Bill to be passed on condition that the closure is dropped. If that offer is not accepted, then the people of Canada will be able to understand the real motives of those responsible for the introduction of the closure."

MONEY ROAD TAX IN STANBRIDGE

QUESTION OF BORROWING MONEY FOR GOOD ROADS TO BE TAKEN UP AT PUBLIC MEETING.

Bedford, April 12.—(Special)—A regular monthly session of the Council of the parish of St. Ignace de Stanbridge was held at North Stanbridge, the following Councillors being present, G. Ferland, E. Galipeau, Geo. H. Miller, Jos. Favreau and S. Doudelin. The Mayor Nap. Fournier presided and the Secretary Treasurer, Mr. Geo. Sulley was also present. The By-Law doing away with Statute Labor on roads and substituting thereof a cash tax was read and confirmed.

A recent wind storm had blown off Mr. Irwin Unwin's barn roof and the adjuster, Mr. Russell, reported a damage of fifty dollars. The Mayor and Secretary Treasurer were authorized to sign a note for two-thirds of said amount bearing six per cent interest to settle the claim as provided by the law governing parish mutual insurance companies. The company here has existed for 12 years and had only four losses in that time totalling \$150.00, three losses by wind and only one by fire.

The question of applying for a subsidy under the Good Roads Act of 1912 was discussed and some of the members of the Council, wishing to hear from the rate payers, it was decided to hold a public meeting on Monday morning, the 14th, inst., at ten o'clock, to hear what the rate payers will have to say on the subject. It is understood that only a few of the many roads in the parish can be selected for the macadam and there will be no doubt be a difference of opinion as to the choice which will have to be made. A big rally of the ratepayers is expected.

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WIRELESS FOR CANAL ZONE

WILL COMMUNICATE WITH SIMILAR HIGH POWER STATIONS IN THE PHILIPPINES.

Washington, D.C., April 12.—(Special)—Bids were opened at the Navy Department to-day for the construction of the towers and buildings for the great wireless plant which the Government purposes to erect in the Canal zone. The plant will be a duplicate of the one recently completed at Arlington. It will be located on the San Pablo site, at the station of Caimito, on the relocated line of the Panama Railway, about midway between the terminals. There will be three 600-foot steel towers, and the station will be equipped with a 100-kilowatt radio set. It is calculated that the new station should be able to communicate easily with similar high-power stations to be erected by the navy in the Hawaiian Islands, Samoa, Guam and in the Philippines.

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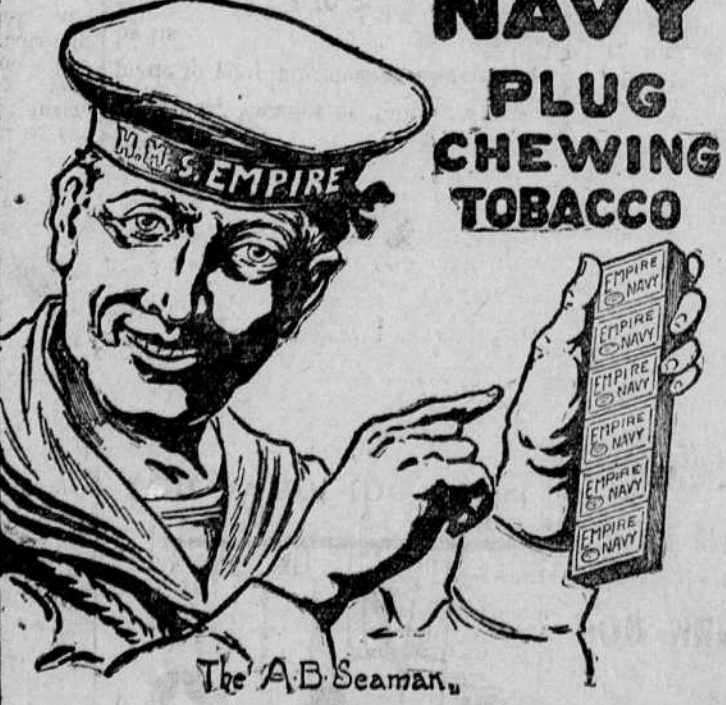

PROTESTANT SCHOOLS OF QUEBEC PROVINCE

Superintendent of Public Instruction Issues
Letter. Among Other Things Urge Consolidation of Schools in Many Localities

The Superintendent of Public Instruction has issued a letter to Protestant School Commissioners and Trustees of the Province. The following extracts will be of interest.

DELAIS MEANS NO GRANTS.
The Superintendent scores some of the districts for delay in sending annual reports and adds:

By a change which was made in the school law at the last session of the Legislature, it is now more important than ever that this report should be sent promptly. Hereafter the Public School and the Minimum Salary grants are to be distributed on the basis of school attendance, without regard to the census of general population. If, therefore, there are any reports not received at the time that the division is made, the municipalities in default will be unable to obtain any portion of these grants. The statistics of the secretariat-treasurer's report are absolutely necessary to determine the share of each municipality. I trust, therefore, that every commissioner and trustee will regard it as a duty to see, at the proper time, that this report has been duly signed and forwarded. The report must be under oath.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE.

You will observe that there will be a difference in the amount of the Public School and Minimum Salary grants in many cases, as compared with those which were received when the census of population was taken into account. Some municipalities will receive more and some less than usual. The one determining factor now is the ratio of the school attendance in the municipality to that of the whole Province. Hence it is to the interest of the school boards to encourage the fullest possible attendance at school.

FREE TEXT BOOKS.

After art. 2709 R.S.Q., the following article has been inserted:
2709 a.—"It shall be lawful for school commissioners or school trustees to supply, wholly or in part, text books to any children who attend the schools under their control; and such books shall be paid for out of the school funds of the municipality."

MONTHLY FEES.

Art 2745 R.S.Q., is replaced by the following:
"2745. School commissioners and trustees may, by resolution, abolish the monthly fee."

INCORPORATED COMPANIES

TAXES.
Arts. 2893, 2894, 2895 and 2896 R. S. Q., have been repealed.

This means that the taxes on incorporated companies, carrying on any manufacturing or industrial undertaking, cannot be commuted. Agreements, however, which were made before the repeal of the above articles, are valid until the specified time limit has expired.

ENGAGEMENT OF TEACHERS.
I must continue to insist upon a more careful observance of the requirements regarding the engagement of teachers not holding diplomas or Grade II. Academy Permits. Many boards have fallen into the habit of engaging unqualified teachers, first of all without exercising due effort to obtain qualified ones, and then without obtaining the recommendation of the Inspector in any particular case. In all such cases, it is the duty of the boards to consult with the Inspector beforehand. Frequently he may be able to inform the board of the addresses of qualified teachers who are available, and if an unqualified teacher only is available, he is in a position to judge of her fitness. I am obliged to insist more strongly than ever upon attention to this point. Let me remind you, also, that the engagement of teachers, under art. 2712, shall be in writing, in virtue of a resolution of the school board. Too often this is overlooked, and the engagement is made verbally by the district or local manager.

On the recommendation of the Protestant Committee, the Department will now require a statement to be signed in the form of application from School Boards for permission to engage a teacher without a diploma. This statement must set forth that adequate efforts have been made through advertisements in the newspapers to secure qualified teachers

and that these have failed.

SHORT TERM SCHOOLS

The proper school year is 10 months. During 1911-12, 61 Protestant schools were open for three months only; 19 were open for four months; 29 were open for five months; 48 were open for six months; 45 were open for seven months; 286 were open eight months, and 57 were open nine months. More than half the rural schools were open less than the required time. This is a regrettable showing, and a more determined policy on the part of the boards would mend matters greatly.

CONSOLIDATION.

Again let me urge the need of consolidation in the case of the short term schools. It is in most cases the only means by which qualified teachers can be obtained with certainty. Few qualified teachers are willing, even when the salary is fair, to take charge of a school in which there are only a few pupils. The consolidated school, with its larger classes, gives the competent teacher the opportunity of doing creditable work. Everywhere it is recognized as the one solution for the chief difficulties of the rural school on our continent. It has been well said that "consolidation permits a better grading and classification of the pupils; ensures more months of schooling; makes for a larger average attendance; adds the stimulating influence of larger classes; leads to better school buildings, better equipment, a larger supply of books, charts, maps, and apparatus; quickens public interest in the school; gives the opportunity for more practical instruction; affords a community center for the people; means very little extra expense; brings the pupils to school in wet weather a distance of four or five miles when it would be impossible for them to walk a mile; is better for the health of the pupils; gains the approval of the people whenever and wherever it is given a fair trial, and suits our rural conditions."

More and more the consolidated school, with its ampler and more substantial educational facilities, is called for in the interest of progressive agricultural development. It is in such schools that the kind of instruction can be given which is directly helpful and useful in the preparation of the pupils for those principles which are the very basis of successful modern agriculture. In saying this I do not rely upon theoretical considerations alone. In other parts of the world and notably in Denmark, the mutual connection between advanced rural schools and advanced agriculture has been abundantly proved. I learn from those who took part in the educational campaign of last August, that at the meetings the general principle of consolidation was heartily approved. There is still lacking, however, the determination to put it in operation, and give it a fair trial. There are many municipalities where it is needed, and where faithful effort would make it successful. Once more, therefore, I commend it to your thoughtful consideration. This Department is always ready to give information on the subject, and the Inspectors are well qualified to advise as to the best means in any municipality.

TEACHERS SALARIES

I regret to say that while there has been a distinct improvement here and there in the salaries of the teachers, as a result of the increased Government grants, the general average has not increased as it should have done. The extra grants are not intended to relieve the boards from their responsibility. They are intended to be supplemented by increased local taxation, to the end that such salaries may be paid as will ensure a supply of qualified teachers. With a general increase in the cost and standard of living, and in view of the benefits of humanity, P. N. Meyer, the Government agricultural explorer, has started on another trip to China and Siberia in search of new fruit novelties which can be introduced into this country. He will be gone three years and during that time will travel with his own caravan in the wildest parts of eastern Asia.

Whenever he hears of a remarkable fruit he will follow it up, and get seeds or cuttings from the tree. These will be sent to Washington for propagation and study. Owing to the great distance it is very difficult to make seeds or cuttings preserve their vitality so they can be made grow. PHYSICAL EXERCISES.

Last year a manual of physical exercises was sent to every school through the secretary-treasurers. Each book is the property of the individual school to which it is sent. The physical exercises are designed for the purpose of developing the health and bearing of the pupils. Experience everywhere shows that such exercises tend to aid the pupils in their studies, rather than to interfere with them. Under the terms of the Strathcona Trust, prizes are offered to the schools making the most progress, or obtaining the best results, in these exercises.

TEMPERANCE AND HEALTH.

This subject is a compulsory one, but I find from the reports of the Inspectors that it is sometimes neglected, and often imperfectly taught.

CAMPORH MONOPOLY IN JAPAN

THE GOVERNMENT'S POLICY — MORE THAN HALF THE WORLD'S SUPPLY.

(From the Japan Times)

The production of Formosan camphor (government monopoly) for the current fiscal year (ending March 31) is given at 3,500,000 cattie, excluding the production of camphor oil, which is returned at 5,000,000 cattie. Adding to this 1,500,000 cattie representing the production in Shikoku and Kyushu, the total rises to 5,000,000 cattie. Thus Japan supplies 55 per cent. of the world's consumption which is given at 9,000,000 cattie.

Though the Japanese camphor controls the market at present, if the Government fails to keep in view the situation of the market in framing its monopoly programme, the result will be the sure revival of the artificial camphor industry and the consequent severe damage to the industry in Japan as was experienced a few years ago. In the circumstances, it is reported, the Government will, in framing its camphor policy maintain the production of the coming fiscal year at about the same as the present year, while maintaining the current price, which is 150 shillings a hundred cattie for B class coarse camphor and 147 shillings a hundred cattie for new B class coarse camphor, the increase is made in case of necessity, being limited to 100 shillings for the above-mentioned article.

The camphor industry in China is still in its infancy, the output at present falling of "one million cattie. There exist many camphor forests in a promising condition in the interior of Fukien province, and if these be properly developed it is not difficult to increase the production. But as China lacks means for forest preservation, the new resources, if utilized, would prove only a temporary benefit and soon dwindle away as the result of reckless deforestation. Moreover as these forests are located in remote regions, with very inconvenient communication, and their development involves much expenditure and danger, they are, after all, no formidable rival to the Japanese industry.

But what is feared to become a formidable rival to the Japanese camphor interests is the gradual development of the camphor industry in Borneo and Sumatra, where camphor afforestation is being done on an extensive scale by Europeans. But it will be over twenty years before the camphor trees in these places will be ready for the establishment of the camphor manufacture. If the Government authorities take care to adopt their measures of camphor administration to the situation, there need be no fears as to the future of the camphor industry, because, besides the many magnificent camphor forests found in the undeveloped and remote interior of Formosa, which offer very promising prospects for the domestic industry, along with the progress of the subjugation of the aboriginal districts, the decrease of the insular production from deforestation can be sufficiently supplied by the use of camphor leaves for the coming two or three decades, by which time the young trees will attain full growth. Thus the camphor production in Formosa will remain exhaustless and afford the country the monopoly of the world's market.

HUNTING VEGETABLE WONDERS.

Hunting wild animals may be all right so far as it goes, but how much more romance and how much more value to the world there is in hunting for wild vegetables and plants which can be made use of for the benefit of humanity. P. N. Meyer, the Government agricultural explorer, has started on another trip to China and Siberia in search of new fruit novelties which can be introduced into this country. He will be gone three years and during that time will travel with his own caravan in the wildest parts of eastern Asia.

I would recommend that in all cases where there is a library in the school the board should purchase the excellent set of books known as the Ginn Hygiene Series (Ginn & Co., Boston). These would not be used as class text books, and would therefore not be purchased by the pupils, but would furnish interesting and instructive lessons to be given by the teacher to the pupils.

AGRICULTURE.

Every school library should contain, also, one or more simple text books on agriculture to be made use of in the same way. There is a number of excellent books of the kind to-day, among which I may mention James's, and the late Professor Brittain's of Macdonald College.

Venezuela and Cuba. Black is not at all popular, being found only in the cases of Germany, Belgium and China, while Germany is noticeable for having black and white together.

Nine countries boast of a flag partly yellow, viz.: Austria, Spain, Belgium, Brazil, Persia, Sweden, Egypt, China and Venezuela. To Ecuador belongs the distinction of having a standard nearer white than any other country.

WILD BEASTS WITH MUSICAL TASTES.

The big hulking elephant would scarcely be suspected of refined musical taste, but the pachyderm is a most exacting critic. Circus men have learned that elephants will not walk into the arena peacefully unless a stately march is played for them, and they will not be on their good behavior if music of a frivolous character is played during their act.

Circus bandmasters become well acquainted with the musical idiosyncrasies of inhabitants of the menagerie tent. It is their experience that the most nasty tempered brute always excepting the ghoulish hyena, can be calmed by soothing music. Tigers are not very susceptible; but they will sit quietly when a pleasing melody is played softly.

Leopards are the only felines that display musical interest. They caper with delight to a lively tune and snarl at slow music. Lions are great music lovers. They will sit motionless for hours and listen with every evidence of pleasure to smooth-flowing melody. But rapid or broken rhythms will make them pace their cage impatiently, while a discord will evoke growls of angry protest.

FORTH BRIDGE IS ONE OF THE GREATEST STRUCTURE IN WORLD

There have been two tremendous bridge catastrophes in modern history. The most recent was in Canada, when the Great Quebec bridge, designed and under construction by United States engineers collapsed and fell carrying some 75 men to a terrible death. A Canadian firm, the St. Lawrence Bridge Co., is now preparing to construct this bridge with the largest span ever erected. The world will not soon forget how on the night of Sunday, Dec. 28, 1879, the first Tay bridge was overwhelmed by a hurricane, and a North British Railway train, with its freight of seventy-three human beings, precipitated into the estuary beneath. In the route to the north two great waterways had to be crossed, the Forth and the Tay, and at the very time that the viaduct over the Tay was destroyed, its designer, the late Sir Thomas Bouch, had made a plan for spanning the Forth, the execution of which was to be in the hands of Mr. Wm. Arrol. But that dread catastrophe stayed all plans. Sir Thomas Bouch died within a year and a new scheme for bridging the Tay was passed through Parliament under the guidance of Mr. W. H. Barlow as engineer. Mr. Arrol meanwhile was constructing a viaduct over the South Esk at Montrose, and here again he manifested his ingenuity for designing a floating pontoon for the sinking and building of piers. This device was a marked success, and he employed it in erecting the second Tay Bridge, for which his firm secured the contract. It was begun in 1882 and finished in 1887, and after being thoroughly tested by the Board of Trade was opened immediately.

THE GREAT FORTH BRIDGE.

Compared with Mr. Arrol's next undertaking the viaduct over the Tay was a modest construction. The massive erection that spans the Forth is, in not a few respects, without parallel. Sir Thomas Bouch's idea of a suspension bridge 690 feet above the tideway had been set aside, and in its place the plans of Sir John Fowler and Sir Benjamin Baker were adopted, the construction being placed in the hands of Wm. Arrol & Co. The scheme was gigantic, and its execution a new departure in engineering. The viaducts are over a mile and a half long, between the viaducts are three cantilever piers rising 360 feet above high water mark—the two main spans stretch 1,710 feet on either side are two others of 675 feet, and the girders are 150 feet above the high-tide mark. The cantilever principle, which was, we believe, the design of Sir Benjamin Baker, though not absolutely new, had never before been applied to so colossal a structure. It has been spoken of as one of the wonders of the engineering world.

At 1.30 p.m. on March 4, 1890, the Prince of Wales, later King Edward VII., having driven the last rivet, in the presence of the Duke of Edinburgh, Prince George of Wales, the Duke of Fife, the Earl of Rosebery, the Marquis of Tweeddale, M. Eiffel, and other eminent visitors, said: "Ladies and gentlemen—I now declare the Forth bridge open," and almost immediately thereafter baronets were conferred on Mr. M. W. Thompson, chairman of the Forth Bridge and Midland Railway Companies, and Mr. John Fowler, and knighthoods on Sir Benjamin Baker and Sir William Arrol. No slight honor this for one who began his career at nine years of age, like David Livingstone, as piercer in a cotton mill.

SELF MADE MAN.

William Arrol was born at Houston, a village in Renfrewshire, some eight miles from Paisley. His parents were poor, but there was a strain of ability in the family. His grandfather was the first man to make and use gas for lighting purposes in the village of Johnstone, where he lived; while his father rose from the position of mill worker to be manager in one of Messrs. J. & P. Coates' mills at Paisley. While William was quite young his parents moved to Johnstone, a busy industrial town. They were not very prosperous, and at the early age of nine the future engineer was sent to work as a piercer in a cotton mill. Many a thousand lads have gone under with the long hours and hard work of the cotton mill; Arrol had two years of it and survived. His family then moved to Paisley, and William was sent to the Bobbin-turning works of Messrs. Coates. Three years later, when still only fourteen, the lad was apprenticed to a Mr. Reid, blacksmith and general engineer, of Paisley, where, as he has himself recorded, his principal occupation was "singin' sheep's bells for the neighbors."

The period of apprenticeship over, William Arrol found employment in various districts in England and Scotland. While in the service of Messrs. Blackmore and Gordon, at Port Glasgow, his qualities as a skilled workman attracted the attention of a wealthy ironmaster, through whose influence he obtained the appointment of foreman in the boiler-shop of Messrs. Laidlaw and Son, Bridgeton. In the five years that he remained with the Laidlows he gave such proof of his capacity that the head of the firm used to say "that Arrol has a positive genius overcoming mechanical difficulties."

Thus it happened that in 1868, when William Arrol was nine and twenty, he started business for himself, in a very small way, near the outskirts of Glasgow. His whole capital, it is said, amounted to £16, saved from his weekly wages. Within a few hundred yards of that modest shop, off the London road, there now stands the vast Dalmarock Iron Works, property of the firm of Sir William Arrol and Co.

MAN OF INGENIOUS CONTRIVANCES.

The first great undertaking of William Arrol, contractor, was the construction of the Caledonian railway bridge over the Clyde, at Bothwell. He had, we believe, never built a bridge, but he had thought out the subject of bridge construction, and Bothwell bridge was a test of his capacity. It is a lofty structure which has to bear the occasional strain of a flooded river, and ordinarily a heavy mineral traffic. In the construction of this work Arrol gave proof to the originality which was the true secret of his success. He conceived the idea of building the bridge on shore, and rolling it out, span by span, over the water, instead of raising the whole structure in position, as had hitherto been done. This was the plan adopted in putting into position the cantilever span of the C. P. R. Bridge between Lachine and Caughnawaga last autumn. The plan was a success and Bothwell Bridge was the beginning of Arrol's career as a bridge builder. Next he was entrusted with the ironwork of the great Central Station at Carlisle, and on the heels of this the still larger contract for the Caledonian Railway Bridge, over the Clyde, at the Broomielaw. Here, again, Arrol displayed his inventive genius. Booms of enormous size were required, and holes had to be drilled through a depth of 7 in. of solid material. For this purpose he designed a special drilling plant and an hydraulic riveting machine. The latter, known as Arrol's patent, has revolutionized riveting everywhere.

LIFE'S STORY AN INSPIRATION.

Sir William Arrol, LL.D., F.R.S.E., J.P., D.L., head of the firm of William Arrol and Co., engineers, has just passed away, at his residence, Seaford, Ayr. Sir William had been unwell since the middle of January, in consequence of a chill. He appeared to be slowly recovering, when an internal trouble arose which rendered necessary an operation, but, unfortunately, the patient's strength had been undermined, and he collapsed suddenly. By his passing away the greatest bridge builder of his age has been removed. The structures that stand as monuments to his memory are unsurpassed in number and magnitude by similar works to be ascribed to any other man. The bridges over the Forth, the Tay, the Clyde, and the Thames alone would make any engineer industrious—however complete might have been his technical training—how much the more honorable to one who was self-taught, and had practically no professional education.

NOTES FROM THE LABOR WORLD.

A Southern conference of women and child labor will be held at Meriden, Conn., April 28 and 29. Canadian labor unions will make an effort to have the Government investigate the high cost of living.

An army of 15,000 children, two-thirds of them girls, is employed in the great textile industry in Pennsylvania.

The union of all railroad employees in one strong organization is predicted by W. S. Carter, President of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

After fourteen years of continuous work the laboring people of Colorado have at last secured the enactment of an eight-hour day for mines and smelters and kindred work. More than 50,000 miners in South Wales will go out on strike as a protest against the employment in the mines of non-union workmen. An attempt to bring about an agreement with the employers has failed.

The date of the decision of the arbitrators on the demands of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers against the Eastern railroads has been extended to April 23 to give both sides more time for arguments.

cient city, with written records for 500 years in the heart of Northern Nigeria. It is enclosed by walls twenty to thirty feet high and twelve miles in circumference. Hither the Emirs with their horsemen and followers gathered from all parts of the province, and the durbar was held in the great plain outside the city walls. Many horsemen were entirely in chain armor, and cloths of gold and many colors gave a brilliant and varied appearance to the scene as each tribal contingent passed before the governor. Most remarkable, perhaps, of all was the presence of bands of almost nude pagans, who had come out of their fastnesses and danced and yelled with delight, brandishing their clubs. Such a thing was not conceivable a few years ago. The number of horsemen taking part in the game was reckoned at from 15,000 to 30,000 with footmen innumerable. Each Emir, in turn, with his horsemen, galloped right up to the Governor in a whirlwind of dust, desert fashion, and did obeisance. Afterwards Sir F. Lugard shook hands with the principal chiefs and gave a short address; and on subsequent days he received each chief separately in audience. There were forty-eight of these separate interviews, and in each case the Governor inquired after the prosperity of the chief's district and asked if he had any matter to bring before him. The almost universal report was of peace and prosperity. In all, sixty-three Emirs and chiefs, representing sixty-eight tribes, were present. The whole gathering—at which chiefs formerly in bitter hostility met in friendship—was a splendid tribute to the wisdom and skill of British administration, which in a little more than a dozen years, by a policy of justice and consideration, has established order and security—Christian World, London.

HIGHWAY BUILDING IN NEW BRUNSWICK.

(Christian Science Monitor) Recently in St. John, N.B., a large meeting of representative citizens took up the matter of throwing open the country in a larger way to the sightseer, the investor and the settler. The temper of the gathering was such as to leave little doubt regarding the support that will come to the Flemming government in any scheme of highway construction upon which it may elect to enter. Townspeople and country people alike are demanding road construction on a large scale. It has become clear to them, as to the residents of the maritime provinces in general, that the most effective method of opening the areas of fertile land, now idle, to cultivation and development is to build roads through those areas that will enable the outside world to see and pass upon the territory.

At the present time the province is expending about \$100,000 annually upon its highways; the municipalities an additional \$60,000. This amount goes no further than to maintain those highways already in existence, but they are wholly inadequate. The province needs many miles of new trunk and branch lines. It could well afford to bond itself for these. The experience on this side of the line, and it is practically the same in Quebec and Ontario, and other parts of the Dominion, is that good roads at once enhance the value of land and raise the tax valuation correspondingly.

New Brunswick and Nova Scotia are not at this time accessible to the automobile in any large sense. They should be. When they become so, the wisdom of highway investment will at once make itself apparent.

A TRUE HERO.

Many stories have been told of the heroism of the Albanians, whose country is at the present moment being devastated by the war in the Balkans. An incident showing how inborn is the courage of that daring people has just been related by a British war correspondent, Captain Trapmann.

He was cycling along an Albanian road one day, when he came across a bright little girl of about six and a boy of five. The girl was asking for bread. He got off and spoke to her, and she immediately understood he was a foreigner, and it appeared to her that he could not be anything but a Turk. At once both children looked terrified, and then to his surprise and admiration the little fellow caught him by the legs and shouted to his sister, "Run!"

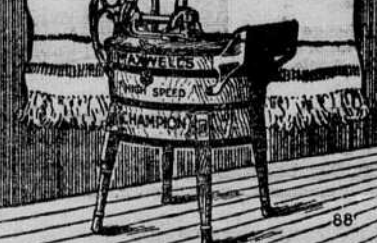

DOMINION SECURES SINGING IMMIGRANTS

Much Interest Centred in Importation of English Birds

A LARGE CONSIGNMENT WAS SENT OUT TO VANCOUVER SENTIMENT PLAYED A PART.

A great deal of interest is being shown in the importation of English goldfinches, robins, skylarks, robins, and tits to Vancouver and hope is freely expressed that these welcome little singing immigrants may increase and multiply in the Dominion. British newspapers spoke a good deal of quiet fun at the anxious folk in the United States, who believe the English sparrow to be a nuisance, the starling a menace, and fear terrible things from the latest immigrants.

DREAD MULTIPLICATION OF THESE BIRDS.

It is presumed that these birds—supposing that they succeed in establishing themselves, which introduced birds seldom do—will soon be disconcerted with the narrow bounds of the islands and will spread like a devastating flood over the United States, carrying ruin to the American farmers and their feathered friends. This is what the sparrow is supposed to have done, and what the starling, also established in America of late years, is expected to do. Yet, with extraordinary inconsistency, attempts are being made to naturalize the wood-pigeon in the States. It may safely be said that this bird does more harm in Great Britain than all other mischievous birds put together, and less good to make up for it. The fact is that the history of birds introduced artificially into a country has never been fairly examined; they have been found guilty without fair trial.

The good the sparrows do in destroying insect life, would, in all probability greatly outweigh the objections to them in Canada at least.

NO HARM DONE ELSEWHERE.

There is really no case on record in which an introduced bird has exterminated a native one. A good instance of what has happened may be found in the histories of the few foreign birds which have obtained a footing in the British islands. These are the pheasant, which has been there since Roman times; the tame or mute swan, which is said to have been introduced by Richard Coeur-de-Lion, and is now truly wild in some localities in Britain; the Canadian goose, an introduction of about a century back, which has also locally changed its status from an ornamental park bird to a really wild one; the French red-legged partridge, a rather older alien, which is quite a common game-bird; and last and latest of all, the little owl. None of these birds has exterminated anything; all the native game-birds exist in spite of the pheasant; the wild whooper swan still visits Britain in winter—it never was a common breeding bird; the wild grey goose still has a few breeding stations, but it was already rare as a breeder when its Canadian rival was introduced;

the "Frenchman" does not exterminate the native grey partridge, but frequents different localities by preference, and is not a match for the English bird in a fight; and as to the little owl, although it undoubtedly preys on our small birds, it attacks the same species on the Continent, and has not exterminated them here.

NATIVE SPECIES DECREASE NATURALLY.

Going further afield, we find that the native birds in some countries have undoubtedly become scarcer, while introduced ones have increased; but such birds are often found to be dependent on their native vegetation for their subsistence, and when forests are felled they must recede in any case. Foreign birds, like the sparrow and the Indian house-mynah (the starling of the East), have been introduced into many countries, because some birds were badly wanted to eat the insects with which the native birds, under changed conditions, were unable to cope, even in the United States the sparrow was credited with exterminating caterpillars in town parks, a good deed which is sometimes now forgotten.

The Vancouver consignment was admittedly ordered from motives of sentiment; but its constituents are none of them so truculent as the sparrow, and are not likely to do anything very terrible. They will be great acquisitions to the music of the grouse if they increase as we cannot but hope will be the case.

CLEOPATRA'S NEEDLE HAD A STORMY VOYAGE.

One of the most remarkable towing feats on record was the transport of the huge obelisk, known as Cleopatra's Needle, from Egypt to London, where it now stands on the Victoria Embankment. This famous undertaking, which took place in 1878, has just been recalled by the death of Mr. William Watkins, the Mark Lane tug owner, London. Owing to the size and form of the "Needle," a cigar shaped craft was specially built for its accommodation, but while it was being towed through the Bay of Biscay, the steamer in charge had the misfortune to lose it during a terrible storm. However, the strange craft was ultimately saved and taken to Ferrol. To this part the Watkins firm dispatched a three funnel tug which brought Cleopatra's Needle to London without further mishap. It now stands on the Embankment, as a beguiling reminder to Londoners of the responsibilities of England to the wheat-growing land of the Pharaohs.

HARD WATER FOR DRINKING.

(Newark Evening News)
Hard water for drinking and soft water for washing and cooking is the recommendation of Dr. H. Roemer, of Berlin, after an investigation of the effects of the hardness of water. Dentition especially is affected, and an examination of several thousand school children has shown a percentage of sound teeth varying from 1.3 to 20.2, the variation for the different localities agreeing with the degree of hardness of the drinking water. Both the lime and magnesia seem to have influence, the latter hardening the enamel. The lime and magnesia also act favorably on the blood, and the growth of children is stimulated and strengthened by them. In hard water regions a notably large number of men are fit for military service. Whether the advantages of hard water continue throughout life we are not told, but there is a quite common understanding that the body in old age tends to the over-accumulation of lime.

THE TORRE RIVADAVIA.

Application has been made to the municipality of Buenos Ayres for a sixty-year concession to erect on public property the "Torre Rivadavia," similar to the Eiffel Tower in Paris. It is to be 1067 feet high, topped by a 106-foot statue bearing a light of 1,000,000 candle power, making the total height 1173 feet (Eiffel, 984 feet). It is to be equipped with a wireless station, a meteorological observatory and an immense electrical clock. Next June there will be completed at Tuckerton, N.J., a wireless tower 820 feet high, 200 feet higher than any metal tower now in existence, the Eiffel tower excepted. It is stated that if the Tuckerton station and a station in Berlin prove successful, other stations will be built in German West Africa and on the Pacific coast in California. The proposal is to establish direct communication with continental Europe, and the station, it is explained, is to be one of a series with which a German company proposes to encircle the globe. As German capital is behind the enterprise, so will the whole structure of the tower be completed by German labor, and every piece of steel used in the construction is being imported from Germany.

COAL FOR FIVE THOUSAND YEARS.

(From the Philadelphia Press)
New interest is added to the dispute concerning control of coal fields in Alaska by the testimony given in Chicago recently that there were in 1,500,000,000 tons of the precious fuel buried under an area of five hundred square miles. What is more interesting still, and comforting as well, is the expert testimony that there is coal enough in the United States proper to last for 5,000 years to come.

This testimony was given in a suit in which fraud against the Government in the Alaska coal fields was charged. The comforting witness was William Griffith, mining engineer and geologist employed by the Government Bureau of Mines. His figures are stupendous. Although the average yearly consumption of coal has been 400,000,000 tons, there are, he declares, still underground in the United States (taking no account of the enormous reserve supply in Alaska) not less than 2,500,000,000 tons. What is more, we have hardly scratched the visible supply since we have been mining coal.

Amongst the new arrivals at the London Zoo is a bird-eating spider.

Furious Driving at Funeral
A farmer was fined \$1.25 at Omagh, Ireland, for furious driving at a funeral.

Ringed Sea Swallow

A tern, or sea swallow, was shot at Walton-on-the-Naze bearing a ring on its leg, on which was inscribed: "WITHERS, High Holborn, London."

Dancing Lessons for Bad Boys

Dancing classes have been successful in improving the manners of the boys at the Calder Farm (Yorks) Reformatory, according to a Home Office report.

Motor Cycling at Seventy-two

Mr. Robert Hall Jackson, of County Kildare, who at 72 years of age took up motor cycling, was killed while riding his machine. He had a collision with a motor car.

Farmers' Enterprise

Evidence of the growing enterprise of Irish farmers is found in the increasing number of modern reapers and mowing machines that are being bought.

Demolishing a Windmill

One of the oldest windmills in Lincolnshire has been demolished by encircling it with a rope attached to a traction-engine.

First Change in Twenty-nine Years

Under a charitable scheme a blind woman inmate of Windsor Workhouse, who had not slept outside the institution for twenty-nine years, had a holiday at Eaglefield Green, Surrey.

Watching the People's Food

During one year, 5,785 samples of foods and drugs were analysed for the Middlesex Council; of these 632 were found adulterated, including 411 of milk and 222 of butter.

Where Wesley Preached

An ancient chapel, or meeting-house, at Newbury, in which John Wesley preached, has been rebuilt and furnished as a mission room in connection with Newbury Parish Church.

G. E. R. Men's Increased Pay

The wages of about 5,000 Great Eastern railwaymen employed in the department of the superintendent of the line have been increased by the awards of the conciliation board, and the hours of work for shunters and signallers have been decreased.

National Aviators' Wages

It is officially announced that officers qualifying in the Naval wing of the Royal Flying Corps as squadron commanders will receive \$7.92 a day, or almost as much as junior captains commanding any vessel except a first-class battleship.

Ball Cartridges in Refuse

While a quantity of refuse was being dealt with at the destructor works at Aldershot a number of explosions occurred. A careful search was made by the workmen, who discovered between fifty and sixty ball cartridges among the refuse.

Found After Forty Years

While picking potatoes turned up by a plough at Swineshead a boy found a sovereign which was lost in the same field forty years ago by his grandfather. The loss was verified by a laborer who is still employed in the family.

55,000 Inaccurate Measures

According to the quarterly return of the Public Control Committee of the London County Council, no fewer than 523,055 weights and measures were stamped by the inspectors during the past quarter, 55,590 being rejected on the ground of inaccuracy.

Anthrax From Mohair

At an inquiry held at Kelghley into the death of a woolsorter named Maude, it was stated that he had been sorting Turkey mohair, and had evidently inhaled dust, as the post-mortem revealed anthrax germs.

Birds as Scavengers

Ash Council passed a resolution asking the President of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries to use his influence with the Government to endeavor to induce foreign countries, in view of the increase of blight and small winged insects, to protect swallows, martins, and swifts. It was pointed out that no fewer than three millions of these birds were last year killed in France alone.

Hatpin as Weapon

Four women were charged at Dublin with assaulting Alexander Wm. Lalor, a conductor in the service of Dublin United Tramways Co.

Labor said as the women were under the influence of liquor he refused to allow them on the car, and they assaulted him, one of them using one of her long hatpins, fortunately, as the witness stated, without effect.

Women's Ninety-two Hour Fast

Four Irish suffragist prisoners were released from Mountjoy Prison, Dublin, on completing their term of imprisonment. They kept up a hunger strike for ninety-two hours before their release.

They all agreed that the prison officials had treated them with every consideration. One of them complained that while the hunger strike was in progress it was "a refinement of cruelty" to place the usual three meals a day in the room as it to tempt the prisoners. "Fortunately prison food is not very tempting, so that none of us broke down."
