THE TALK OF THE DAY.

In admitting the Hon. H. G. Joly de
 Lotbinière to membership in the
 Knights of St. Michael and St.
 George, the Queen has honored an es-
 pecially worthy citizen of Quebec. Sir
 HENRY, as we must now call him, has
 been the best years of his life to the
 service of his country, and from a long
 political life he has emerged without a
 stain upon his character. Few public men
 can say as much. The whole community
 approves thoroughly of this mark of the
 Sovereign's favor, and all will hope that
 the new Knight may live many years to
 enjoy his distinction. Another Canadian,
 Dr. W. H. HINGSTON, of Montreal, has been
 raised to the dignity of Knight Bachelor.
 The decoration has been granted him for
 his services to medicine. This is a
 degree of Knighthood which is usually given
 to scientific men and Judges, and is held
 in Canada at present, by Sir HENRY
 STONG, Sir ALEXANDER LACOSTE, Sir
 NAPOLEON CASALTY, Sir JOHN ALEXANDER
 and a few other gentlemen. Dr. JOHN
 CHRISTIAN SCHULTZ, Lieutenant-Governor
 of Manitoba, has been created a
 Knight Commander of St. Michael and St.
 George. His public career has been
 long and valuable to the country, and his
 friends are very much pleased to see him
 singled out for honor at this time. The
 lesser decoration, that of Companion of St.
 Michael and St. George, goes to Mr. A. R.
 MILNE, Collector of Customs at Victoria,
 British Columbia, for services in connection
 with the Behring Sea negotiations. Literature
 is honored in the persons of Mr. LEWIS
 MORRIS, the author of "The Epic of
 Hades," and Mr. WALTER BESANT,
 whose charming novels have enriched the
 romantic fiction of the century, and the
 stage has been similarly recognized in the
 person of Mr. HENRY IRVING, of the Lyceum
 Theatre, whose real name is JOHN
 HENRY BRODBRIDGE. These gentlemen have
 been given the Bachelor Knighthood.
 The veteran war correspondent, in his
 day the greatest in his profession, Dr.
 WILLIAM HOWARD RUSSELL, now in his
 seventy-fifth year, is also the recipient of
 the same honor. There was considerable
 surprise expressed on Saturday, in the
 city, when the name of Mr. AURENCE, Min-
 ister of Agriculture, was not found in the
 list of Birthday honors. It was pretty
 well understood in some circles that the
 ex-Lieutenant-Governor of Quebec would,
 last year, have been made a Knight.
 He was not knighted, however, and
 many of his friends thought that this
 year he would not be overlooked. The
 names of Lieutenant-Governor CHAPLEAU
 and Senator SANFORD were also men-
 tioned, but they too, it appears, are not in-
 cluded in the list this time. Lord ABER-
 DEEN, as a Grand Cross of St. Michael and
 St. George, has his first order of Knighthood.
 He is a Baronet of Nova Scotia, an
 hereditary title. Our cable despatch, pub-
 lished in Saturday's impression of the
 CHRONICLE, made rather a mess of it. A
 number of Grand Crosses of the Bath were
 disposed of, and one of these, it was alleged,
 was to go to Dr. HINGSTON. The author
 of "The Climate of Canada," however, has
 simply been knighted.

Quebec Board of Trade.

At the last weekly meeting of the Council
 of the Quebec Board of Trade the following
 members were present: Messrs. G. B. Gu-
 neau, President, (in the chair), R. D. Dabell,
 J. M. Joseph, R. E. Bellier, F. X. Berlinguet, E.
 Dupré, and by invitation, Messrs. R. A.
 de la Roche, C. A. Langlais and D. A. de la
 Roche, of the Standing Committee on Insol-
 vency, and Messrs. J. Dion, Cashier of the
 Banque Jacques Cartier.
 The following circular was read to the
 meeting:—
 "Home and Foreign Produce Exchange (Ltd.),
 "Cheese Sub-Committee."
 "London Bridge, London, E. C., 1895.

"TO THE PRODUCERS OF CANADIAN CHEESE."

"It has no doubt come to your knowledge
 that there has been considerable dissatis-
 faction among the cheese distributors on this
 coast, and that the cause of this is the in-
 justice of the late two or three years, espe-
 cially as to buyers, who, in many cases,
 alleged that they did not receive the special
 month's make of cheese they had contracted
 for frequent arbitration during the season
 just closed.

The result has been to injure the good
 reputation of the Canadian product, and to
 destroy that confidence in dealing with it so
 essential between sellers and buyers.

"As the result of a conference representing
 a great majority of the trade in Great Britain,
 the following has been made to your Govern-
 ment as to the desirability of an Act making
 it compulsory to brand the date at the time
 of manufacture upon each cheese. It is fully
 believed that such protection will be a
 decided advantage to the factormen and to
 the distributors throughout the United
 Kingdom, as it will at once restore confi-
 dence in the quality of the product, and pre-
 vent the factormen from being deceived by
 speculative or unscrupulous shipper covering
 his transactions by substituting one month's
 make for another. It is earnestly hoped that
 the factormen throughout the Dominion
 will at once commence dating their cheese,
 especially as the desire is pretty general
 among the importers to prevent those fac-
 tories adopting this system.

"Our interest is, as you are, that goods
 should be sold honestly for what they are,
 and that the reputation and market price of
 fine fair makes should not be destroyed by the
 improper substitution of the earlier summer
 product.

"The specimen form we have suggested for
 use is enclosed herewith, and this and other
 cases should be put upon the cheese.

"Several of the factormen now and recently in
 England have also been deceived by the same
 subject, and they cordially endorse the action
 taken.
