Former chief says jewels not Dennis'

The jewellery found by a young boy in Macdonald Park last week reopened the long dormant jewellery theft cases of the middle '40s, many of them in Westmount.

Linking of the same "Gerard Dennis", the infamous "Hooded Bandit" to the discovery added fuel to the flames of suspicion. Dennis was sentenced in 1949 by a New York court to 18 years to life imprisonment for thefts and violence. Before being jailed, however, he admitted several break-ins in the Westmount area, the most spectacular being the robbery of highly valued jewellery from the Timmins' home on Belvedere Place in October, 1944.

Dennis was interviewed shortly after his arrest in Cleveland in 1949 by ex-Chief Byford of the Westmount Police Department. The Examiner interviewed Mr. Byford yesterday and asked him whether or not he felt that Dennis was the one who had hidden the recently unearthed jewels.

Byford, who was consulted on the case by the Montreal Police Department earlier this week, was inclined to doubt that there was any connection.

"I could understand him burying some empty settings," but not with the stones still in them. That was not his method."

Dennis, according to Mr. Byford, planned all his thefts well. After the break-in, he and his accomplice would go directly to his house on Graham boulevard, remove the stones from their settings, and divide the spoils.

Moreover, when Dennis left for the United States, he took a great number of jewels with him. "Why would he have brought some to the U.S. and left some

Municipal body plans checkup on the Council

At a meeting of the executive of the Westmount Municipal Association Tuesday night, a report was heard from the committee appointed to meet with Mayor S. Bruneau on the question of open Council meetings.

The committee noted that all regular council meetings, held the first Monday of each month at 8 p.m., were in name open to the public and recommended that a roster be set up to assure that at least one member of the association would be in attendance of these assemblies.

At a previous executive meeting it was admitted that the council meetings were open but contended that there was no discussion at these conferences — that only the votes were taken there. The present committee felt that there should be regular attendance at these meetings by members of the association in order to determine whether or not council deliberations were withheld from the public.

The mayor also agreed that copies of the minutes of all council meetings be sent to the executive of the association. The minutes have always been available to residents, but only through a visit to the city hall.

General feeling of the meeting was that, before any final comments or demands were made concerning the practices of the council in their deliberations, a thorough investigation should be made to ascertain precisely what the practices are.

THEFT CHARGE

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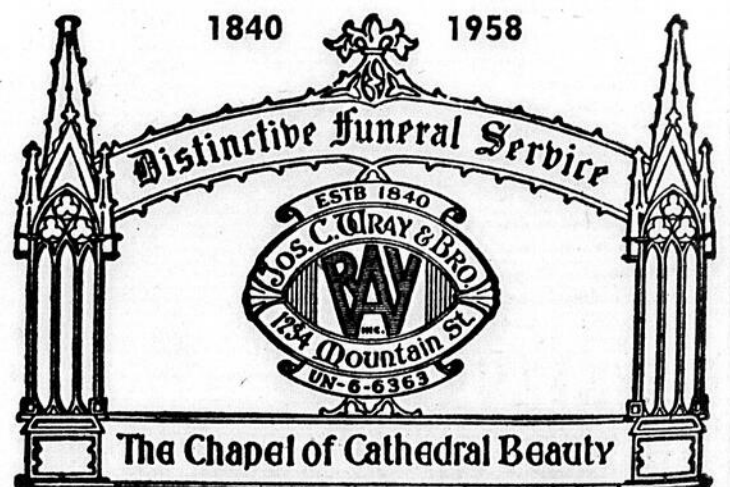

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Accent on half riding seen Webster tactic as Parliament opens

Ottawa — One of the pleasant aspects of representing St. Antoine-Westmount in the House of Commons is that half your constituents give you practically no trouble at all.

The City of Westmount, one of the richest communities in Canada, has proved itself well able to look after its own; it requires little or no help from Ottawa.

Ross Webster, therefore, will probably find himself more occupied with the problems of the St. Antoine district, where a matter of major concern at the moment is unemployment.

One thing is certain — electors in the riding won't hear as much from their member as they have in the past. When George Marler was representing St. Antoine-Westmount, as a cabinet minister and as a senior member of the Opposition team, he naturally took a major part in Parliamentary proceedings.

In contrast, the chances are reasonably good that Mr. Webster won't even make his maiden speech in the House until 1959. The Tories have 208 MPs, of whom 95 will be officially introduced to the Speaker for the first time.

If three of these newcomers were scheduled to make his first formal address each week — a high percentage — it would take eight months to run through the list.

Another sidelight: When a new member enters the Commons for the first time, he is accompanied by two other members, who parade him ceremoniously up to the Speaker's chair.

It is expected that the ninety-five recruits will be presented

Co-operation is two-way street

AT a public meeting scheduled by the local municipal authorities to enable ratepayers to investigate the fuller details of a proposed revision of building and zoning by-laws Thursday of last week, the taxpayers were conspicuous by their absence.

Mayor A. S. Bruneau and Alderman J. C. Cushing were on hand to answer questions or explain facets of the by-law amendments, but no citizens were present to question them.

It is true that there is an onus on the ratepayer to attend a meeting of this nature called by the municipality if the ratepayer wishes to avail himself of the opportunity to discover the details of the proposals to be put forward. But it does seem that early in the morning, the day before Good Friday, hardly can be considered the most convenient time for such a session.

We cannot feel that the absence of any ratepayers whatever reflected a total lack of interest by the citizens; but rather believe that those who were interested found themselves hamstrung by the necessity to do two days' work in one at the office, and leave sufficient time as well to prepare for the Easter holiday, whether at home or away.

Had the session been scheduled at a less inconvenient time, it is our opinion that interested citizens might have attended.

'Y' hobby emphasis a healthy pastime

ONE of the last of the really comprehensive hobby shows is held annually at the local branch of the YMCA, and a reflection on the show and the whole plan surrounding it indicates it to be a most worthwhile endeavor.

The hobby show, perhaps, more than any other single 'Y' activity, embraces the four-fold purpose of the organiza-

tion. A biblical verse states that "Jesus grew in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man." Thus are identified the mental, physical, spiritual and social aspects of living — all of which are directly or indirectly approached by the hobby activity.

Gymnastic competitions, swimming events, an art section, craft groupings, music and the many other sections of the show attest to the broad scope of the well-rounded program.

Of interest this year is the attendance, scheduled tomorrow, of Postmaster-General William Hamilton, who as president of the Montreal Boys and Girls Hobby Show in the 1930s, so increased interest in the event that it was sub-divided in order that it might not become too unwieldy. The Westmount "Y" show is an outcropping of that subdivision. Saturday Mr. Hamilton will speak on the growth and value of hobbies and will officiate at the presentation of the major trophies.

The Hobby Show committee this year has accomplished a really worthwhile work in the preparation and presentation of the 1958 event, and the special booklet issued in connection with the show is a most creditable effort.

Highly dangerous practical joking

WEST Hill and Westmount High Schools have experienced in recent days a most iniquitous form of practical joke — the one in which a public institution is indicated as the locale of a "bomb" which has been placed there by some unthinking individual.

In fact the Greater Montreal School Board has recorded some five such instances in schools in one month.

Apparently the dim-witted practice stems from south of the border, whence has come many another crack-pot scheme.

It is fortunate in the local instances that no one was killed or injured.

Examiner profile:

Greek priest guides big flock

A young priest who has come home to Montreal after 19 years in the United States to help look after a rapidly expanding flock of young people is Father Theophilus Peter Theophilus of the Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church at Sherbrooke and Clark streets.

Holy Trinity is the only Greek church in Quebec and it serves not only all towns and cities of this province but the northern parts of New York and Vermont. Its congregation of 12,000 brethren ranges from shipping magnate Phrixos B. Papichristidis, president of the board of trustees, restaurateur George Spiliotopoulos, chairman of the board of governors, and other influential West Enders to the latest little immigrant girls who have come from their Greek villages to take jobs in Montreal's sweating garment factories.

"The influx of immigrants from Greece in the past 10 years has been tremendous," said Father Theophilus. "You could describe our Greek population here in Montreal as exploding. It has grown from between 2,500 and 3,000 in 1947 to 12,000 today."

New Church

The present church which was bought from the Methodists in 1925, is no longer large enough to accommodate such a community. Father Theophilus said it is planned to "break ground" on May 25 at Cote St. Catherine and Wilderton for a new Greek church, school and community centre.

Father Theophilus returned last June to his native city after serving as pastor to 2,000 souls at St. Haralambos Church in Canton, Ohio, for

Nothing is calculated to create panic more than the threat of some hidden explosive, scheduled to blast at who-knows-what moment. seven and a half years. He came to Holy Trinity to act as associate pastor to Archbishop Father Nicholas Salamis who has headed the church for the past 14 years. The two fathers do a lot of travelling. Father Theophilus conducts the Burlington services in a borrowed Anglican church once a month. He has established in that community of 54 families — 246 souls — a Sunday school of 29 children and three teachers. Similarly Father Salamis tends the Plattsburg and Quebec City congregations.

Six foot

A strongly-built priest, six foot one in height, Father Theophilus has soft brown eyes in a round



face, a quiet voice which can become fiery in sermons on moral problems which disturb him.

One of his chief concerns is to keep the young people arriving from Greece on the straight and narrow. "Most of the newcomers are single and come from the villages of Greece," he said, during an interview at his church. "Here they are dumped in a big city and it is our duty to awaken them to the dangers of the city and warn them that city people aren't always as trustworthy as they appear."

Father Theophilus said that many immigrants are unskilled workers who have found jobs in the garment industry or as domestics.

"We feel an obligation to them," said the priest. "Their parents are not here and we have to substitute for them. We encourage them to come to church because they may be misguided elsewhere."

Father Theophilus said that his church is trying to do as much as possible for Greek youth which must be kept disciplined. Holy Trinity Sunday school registration totals more than 425 children ranging in age from five to 17 years.

Closely-knit

"The Greek family is closely knit and the father is definitely boss," said Father Theophilus. "I think I can truthfully say that juvenile delinquency is very

rare indeed among Greek young people." He thought that parents could be credited for this because they are very strict with their children.

The 36-year-old priest came from a closely-knit family himself and is father of four children. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Peter Theophilus, came to Montreal from Greece as immigrants; the father in 1910 when he was 26; the mother in 1921 as a bride of 19. Mr. Theophilus Senior is a retired restaurateur whose two sons, Paul and Christo, now run the family restaurant on Jean Talon street.

The fourth son, Steve, graduates this year from Holy Cross seminary, in Boston — the same seminary from which Father Theophilus graduated in 1943. Steve who is 26 has won a two-year

scholarship to the University of Athens.

Father Theophilus attended the parochial grade school here, graduated from Baron Byng High School. His first ambition was to attend McGill University and become a surgeon but one day at church he listened to the priest read a diocesan letter announcing the opening of The Holy Cross Seminary in Connecticut. (The seminary has since been moved to Boston.)

"It suddenly dawned on me at that moment that I wanted to become a priest," Father Theophilus said, smiling happy at the recollection.

Worked in N.Y.

On graduation from Holy Cross, Father Theophilus went as a layman to New York to be a youth leader and superintendent of the Sunday School at St. Spyridon Church. In 1944 he was ordained as a deacon by the present Patriarch of Constantinople in his own church of Holy Trinity in Montreal. He was deacon of St. Spyridon for a year and one half. In 1947 he was ordained as a priest by the same patriarch and went to Canton where he remained until returning to Montreal.

Father Theophilus married in 1914 the former Rita Zoe Geotas, of New York. They live at 7988 St. Denis with their four children, Peggy,

Responsibility

The overwhelming of the Progressive Conservative party in the last General Elections has brought about a situation which requires careful thought. It is a complete reversal of the state of affairs under the Liberal Government, when one party had so overwhelming a majority that it could almost ignore the Opposition, and, in fact, ignore criticism from any source whatever. They had arrived at the point where criticism was not answered but resented.

A party with a great majority is in a position of great power and equally great danger. The situation can be rectified only by an equally strong sense of responsibility. The party in power is responsible to the country as a whole. It has ceased to represent its own party; it stands for the country. It makes decisions not for the party but for Canada, and eventually it answers to Canada.

The dominant party is responsible not for its own rights primarily, but for the rights of minorities. The mark of a real democracy is the consideration it shows for minorities, even troublesome ones like the Sons of Freedom. In particular the dominant party is responsible for the well-being of the communities which did not support it.

There is, however, another area where responsibility lies heavily; that is the Press. Under the present conditions the Parliamentary Opposition — Her Majesty's Loyal Opposition — is rather ineffective. But the newspapers are never ineffective and for the time being they will play a very important part in representing the mind of the com-

munity. A political party, being composed of human beings, is bound to make mistakes, especially in the heat of political debate. But the Press, somewhat detached from party affairs, can sometimes judge an issue on its merits, and can sense the response of the community. Yet the criticism it expresses must not be captious but restrained, genuinely concerned with the country as a whole. We need a lot of patience and good will.
