VALLEYFIELD TRACK MEET GREAT SUCCESS

ANNUAL LEGION EVENT BRINGS OUT HUNDREDS

The 8th annual Track and field meet was held in Valleyfield last Saturday. Sponsored by Branch 62, Canadian Legion, Valleyfield, hundreds of amateur athletes turned in a fine performance for track and field fans.

Fast times for all events were recorded in all events, helped by the fine weather and dry track. Such stars as Joan Woods, Carol Jennings, Jackie Carroll, Rosella Thorne and Kathy Barycky paced a well packed entry list from a number of schools and track-clubs. The feature event of the day was the mile, won by Andy Crawford who turned in a fast 4 minutes 32.2 seconds, fast for the track here at Valleyfield. This is the fourth year in a row this stellar athlete has won the mile here. Jackie Carroll, of the Montreal Track and Field Club turned in a fine performance in the 440 yards, taking first place in 53.2. He was pressed close by Doug Moule of St. Lambert and Mike Osborne of Olympic Athlete Club in a hair raising finish. After the event, Carrot confessed that he is not in the best of shape, this being the first outdoor meet for him this

year. He ruthfully admitted that he would have to run the kinks and the fat off before doing any good times. This boy is preparing for the try outs of the Olympic games next year. If he was not in shape today he should be a real threat for any Olympic berth when he is ready. In the future, Jackie will run in the Caledonia games at Lachine and in the Invitation 220 yards at Molson stadium. As an added sidelight of a thrill packed afternoon, the 61st LAA 182 battery RCA (M) put on a gun drill with their 40mm anti-aircraft guns. All events stopped while the two gun crews put on a sparkling performance of simulated action against aircraft. In the high school events, V. Osborne of Verdun High School ran a blistering 880 yards in 2 minutes 28 seconds, followed by R. B. Cohen of Cornwall, Ontario. All in all the events were well run, all times were recorded. The games were well handled by Legion members. The Ladies Auxiliary turned in a fine performance with their refreshment booths. Merck's tug of war team won the tug of war event by default with no opposition turning up.



Jackie Carroll of Montreal did 19 feet 2 inches in the Broad Jump he also came first in the men's relay with 47.8 seconds. In the 440 this flashy runner made the time of 53.2 seconds. He is in the process of getting into shape for future events and eventually hopes for a berth on the Olympic Team.

Beauharnois Blood Donors Clinic Successful

Although the Red Cross Blood donors Clinic in Beauharnois didn't reach its goal of 225 pints of blood, the result is still considered a good.

186 pints of blood were given. This is 42 pints more than last year and 116 more than in 1953.

On the closing day of the Clinic one of the Red Cross representatives from Montreal, Mr. Gaulin, was present. He expressed his satisfaction with the results and thanked the local committee, under the chairmanship of Mr. E. A. McLaughlin, and all the others who have co-operated in making the Beauharnois blood-donors campaign a success. Similar satisfaction was expressed by Mr. B. Calhoun, President of the Red Cross in Beauharnois. The committee itself wishes to thank Mrs. Louis Renaud and her helpers, Mrs. A. Dufour for providing entertainment at the piano; Mr. Nicholson of the Coca Cola company in Valleyfield who contributed all the necessary soft drinks; the local industries and al others — especially the St. Clement Church and Canon Julien who made available the parish hall — for contributing to the success of this year's Red Cross blood-donors clinic.

RESULTS IN VALLEYFIELD NOT SO GOOD

The Red Cross appeal for blood donations last week was not nearly as successful as it should have been. Only 445 pints of blood were donated in the Valleyfield area, which compares unfavorably with the 600 pints which were given to the local hospital during last year.

The appeal commenced with an official opening at 1.30 p.m. Monday, May 16th, by the Mayor, Mr. Louis Quevillon, at the Tougas Nicholson. Also present representing the hospital were three sisters and Rev. Gault.

The acting vice-president of the Red Cross, Jean Marc Clermont, was introduced by Mr. W. Shannon, president of the blood donor clinic.

Mr. Shannon extends his appreciation to all those who assisted in the campaign.

NEW POLIO INJECTION DATES FOR BEAUHARNOIS

Dr. Gaetan Gauthier, who is in charge of anti-polio vaccination program in this area, reports that those children who received their injections in Beauharnois on the 9th and 11th of May will be able to receive the second one on the 23rd and 25th of May. The 3rd injections for this group will be given some time in December or January.

In Valleyfield, Beauharnois and other places where Dr. Gauthier has been in charge, he reports that there have been no unfavourable reactions. He is perfectly satisfied with the results and wishes he had more vaccine to be able to meet the demand. Many children had to be turned down.

Up to date 1151 injections have been given in this district, 646 in Valleyfield and 505 in Beauharnois and other places in Dr. Gauthier's area. Dr. Gauthier hopes that there will be more vaccine available in the fall or possibly next spring.

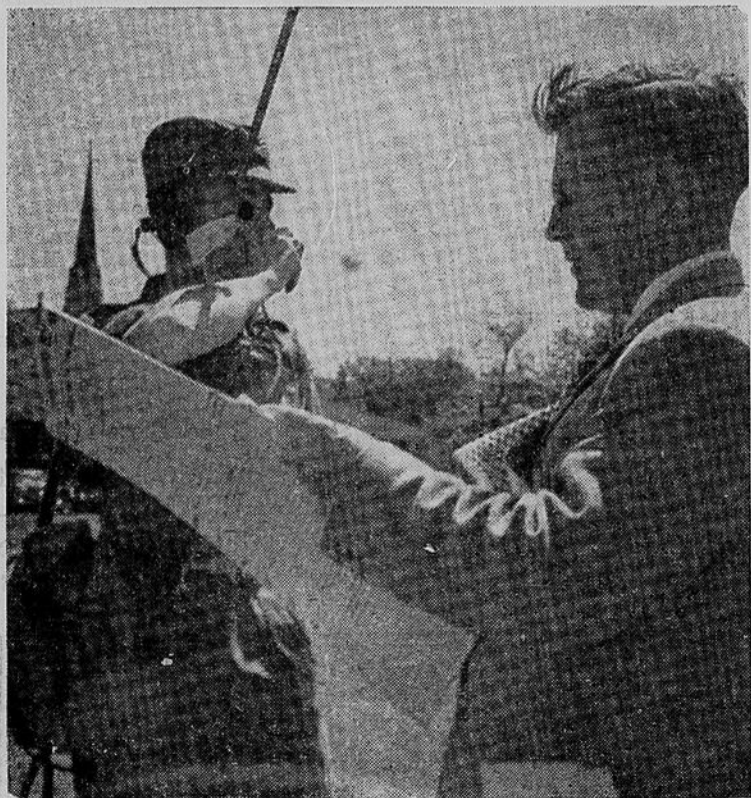
For 2 days the board heard request and opposing arguments from towns North of Montreal as to why the fares should not be raised.

Editorial...

THE PROBLEM OF HIGHWAY SAFETY

Year after year thousands of words are spoken and written against traffic offenders and against those who, through carelessness and indifference for the lives and property of others, make driving along the highways of our fair land a seemingly dangerous and hazardous pastime.

During the past week-end many lives were lost and the damage to cars was heavy. Now, no doubt, wherever possible, the guilty ones will be punished. We also know that the police are exercising extreme vigilance against what we like to call the highway "cowboys." It is, however, a practical impossibility for the police to be everywhere at once along the thousands of miles of highway that span the province. Therefore, for our own safety and the safety of others, it is our duty to be continually alert and watchful when driving, especially at night and during the week-ends, when the risk of accidents is the greatest.

The problem of highway safety is the subject of the first Canadian Conference on Highway Safety, taking place in Ottawa from the 24th till the 26th of May. This conference is being sponsored by the Good Roads Association and supporting national organizations. The conference has four objectives:

1. Focus attention on the vital importance of highway safety.
2. Exchange of views on ways of reducing the wastage of human life and resources on the roads and streets of the nation.
3. Formulate recommendations for a program of action.
4. Consider a permanent Canadian highway safety organization.

Some 3,000 persons were killed last year on Canadian roads, tens of thousands were injured, more than \$100 million of property was destroyed. In the past quarter century more than 42,700 people were killed in highways accidents. You may not have been touched by highway tragedy yourself, but you could have been and can be. At the current rate, no one in Canada will be immune during his lifetime from this 20th century scourge.

Safety is an individual matter. It begins with you. The most effective group safety action is taken by the community, highway driving if we ourselves, as part of the community, don't. All the conferences and talking won't help reduce the hazards of participate in the efforts to make highway driving safer and give up the idea of "it can't happen to us."

CANADA'S WEEKLY NEWSPAPERS

(continued)

Another thing known to the alert editor of a live weekly is that he cannot sit in his office waiting for news to come to him. A news story does not just happen. It depends upon organizations of sources, on looking ahead so as to anticipate coming events, on preparing questions that will bring out the covert implications, on planning the routine connected with publication so that fitting attention may be given some unexpected event near deadline.

He is a wise editor who recognizes and caters to the everyday interests of his readers in addition to satisfying their curiosity about unexpected happenings and "big" local events. For example, he will give space and deserved prominence to regulations designed to prevent loss of life, to articles he believes will contribute to the betterment of living conditions and the spread of happiness. He will not ignore so common place a thing as the weather, but he will try to make it interesting by informing his readers authoritatively about its current significance in their farming and business prospects: what has the state of the weather during the past week meant to the economy of the community.

In Canada, "news" is still largely local or regional in character. We inhabit half a continent, and we cannot possibly keep track of everything that is happening everywhere in it. Our interest in what is near and our preoccupation with what is familiar is not parochialism, but a necessity imposed upon by conditions. The weekly newspaper, if the editor is a lively, inquisitive person, ministers ideally to our needs.

Woodlands Resident Dies Suddenly

D. B. Burdon, well known resident of Lower Woodlands and vicinity for many years, died on Friday, May 13th, at St. Joseph's Hospital in La Chine in his 60th year.

Mr. Burdon was born in Maple Grove and belonged to one of the oldest families of this district. He also lived for many years in Hudson and Valois where he was very well known. In Valois he was active in church and Masonic affairs.

Mr. Burdon and his family moved to Woodlands in 1947 and soon became active in community affairs. He served on the Ville de Lery Council for several years and was one of the first members of the Ville de Lery Protestant School Board.

For over 40 years he was associated with the Sun Life Assurance Company, where he held a position of responsibility. During the first World War he served with the Canadian Army in France.

A kind and genial man he will be very much missed by his friends and neighbours. He is survived by his wife, the former Mildred Simpson, 5 sons and one daughter.

The funeral took place at the Collins Chapel on Sherbrooke St. in Montreal. He was buried at Lakeview Cemetery, Pointe Claire.

People in small communities whether rural or suburban, have keen interest in whatever they see that is out of the ordinary. The commuter walking home from the train wants to know why the men are digging up the street; he is interested in when the new school will be opened, how long it will provide necessary accommodation and on what facts and speculation the council bases its judgment; he is curious about every change in his neighbourhood, whether it is big or little. There is, in fact, no incident so trifling that in the hands of a competent weekly newspaper reporter, may not be developed into a news story — and frequently such stories make better reading than much of the "big" news crowding upon people through other media.

Newspaper textbooks have a lot to say about the value of "human interest" in reporting and editing. The big daily newspaper has to work harder to print human interest stories than does the weekly, for an obvious reason: the thousands who read the daily paper are not interested in Thomas Jones himself, but in the picturesque or tragic thing that has befallen Mr. Jones; the hundreds who read the rural or suburban weekly paper are interested in Mr. Jones himself, because they know him. What happened to Mr. Jones need not be urgent, but only something that affected him pleasurable or adversely, or something that might conceivably have happened to the reader.

Editors of weekly newspapers could, if their time permitted, add to the value of their papers by writing occasional expository articles dealing with issues of local importance. Such exercise would too, be a relief for the editor because it would allow him to sink his teeth into something bigger than routine. An example might be the issue of whether or not to add chemicals to the water supply: the weekly editor who clarified such a subject, telling his readers what the points are upon which arguments are based, would be highly appreciated.



The Province of Quebec Safety League Says!...

1. Week-end trips are safer when begun in the morning and after a good night's rest. If a driver has worked hard all day, he will be wise to set out on his journey next Saturday morning, rather than Friday evening.

2. A stop for coffee or other alertness beverage every 100 miles is a practice followed by many careful drivers. Others carry a thermos of coffee for driving through district where restaurants scarce.

3. The impulse to pass the car ahead may become a fatal one. The achievement of keeping one's passengers alive is far worthier than that of speeding past other vehicles.

4. Following a coffee stop at night, be sure to switch headlights back on before swinging back to the highway.

5. Don't wear colored glasses at night. While they reduce headlight glare, they reduce the driver's vision, too.

6. When the highway narrows through a community, throttle down to a speed even less than that required by law. The coming week-ends will see many children on the sidewalks from which some will dash out to play on the streets.

7. At no time during next week-end's driving should one forget the Golden Rule. Give the other fellow the right of way.

Valleyfield Chamber of Commerce To Meet on Seaway Problems

A Board of Directors meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, was held on Monday, May 15th at 12 noon at the Market Hotel, presided over by Mr. Lawrence Lyons.

A resolution was made at the meeting, concerning the Employees of Hydro Quebec, who at present are unable to draw Unemployment Insurance during periods of unemployment, because the Provincial Government refuse to pay Federal Employees Unemployment Insurance.

The resolution was made in an effort to bring about an understanding between the Provincial and Federal Governments, and will be sent to the Minister of Labour.

The Chamber has also written to the Provincial and Fed-

eral Governments asking them to come to an understanding, in order to help the employees of Hydro Quebec during their periods of unemployment.

On Tuesday, May 17 a special meeting of the Chamber was held, regarding formation of a special committee to study the advantages and disadvantages of the St. Lawrence Seaway in the district.

All the Mayors of the cities and municipalities, presidents of principal organizations, Industrial Expansion Committees and Junior and Chambers of Commerce of Valleyfield and Beauharnois, have been invited to attend a dinner at the Chateau Salaberry in Valleyfield, on May 26th at 6.30 p.m. in an endeavour to form the special committee.

Schenley Signs New Labor Contract

Results of a new labour contract between Canadian Schenley Ltd., and the members of Local 106 of the Distillery, Rectifying, Wine and Allied Workers' International Union of America at the Company's Valleyfield plant were made public last week through a joint announcement by C. Foley, Company Plant Manager, and J. C. Labrosse, Union President.

The contract is for a two year period from May 1st, 1955 through to April 30th, 1957, replacing the previous two year contract which expired on April 30th last. A general wage increase of 6.8 cts. per hour for both male and female labour applies during the first year of the contract; an additional 4 cts. per hour is effective May 1st, 1956 for the second year of the contract. These increases bring the minimum hourly wage in the plant to \$1.40 for men and \$1.14 for women which is increased to \$1.44 and \$1.18 respectively as of May 1st 1956. Employees, under the previous contract, were being paid \$1.332 per hour for men and \$1.072 for women as minimum rates which included 3.2 cts. as a cost of living bonus. This cost of living bonus now forms part of the actual wage rates.

The new contract now provides for nine paid holidays—an additional day's holiday over the eight in the previous contract. These paid holidays are in addition to the one, two and three week paid vacation periods that are provided as in the past. Another fringe benefit now includes brothers and sisters as well as husband, wife, father, mother, sons and daughters which, in the event of death of these relatives, entitles the employee to three days leave of absence with pay in order to attend the funeral.

In making the announcement of the signing of the new contract, Mr. Foley expressed the appreciation of the Company for the able co-operation of all employees in the manufacture of the Company's products and specifically spoke of the harmonious manner in which the contract negotiations were carried out.

On behalf of Canadian Schenley hourly workers, Mr. J. C. Labrosse, President of the Union, said "The new contract is part of the beneficial conditions at Canadian Schenley, second to none in Valleyfield and hard to match anywhere."

teach the young boys to sail and swim.

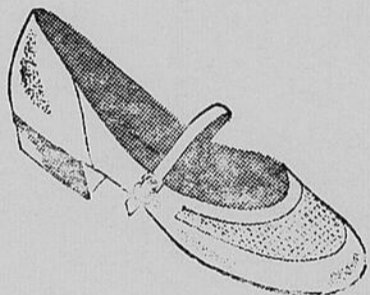
This will be the 16th year of the Regatta, and the club which began with only five members, now has 75 and hopes to welcome many more members.

WATCH OUT FOR HITCH - HIKERS

Hitchhiking crimes have become so common that only the most bizarre get nationwide attention, states the June Reader's Digest.

Before the summer is over you are sure to see many hitchhikers. Most will be innocent enough — soldiers on leave, youngsters without bus fare. But how can you tell the honest youth from the vicious thug who is waiting to steal your car and money and perhaps even kill you? "There is one sure way to find out," the Digest observes. "Pick up the hitchhiker and give him a chance to rob, knife, black-jack, shoot or kill. If he does none of these things, he is all right."

The article cites case after case of robbings, assaults and killings on the nation's highways. Some of these crimes have been committed by men in uniform, others by youths mistaken for college boys. A businessman picked up a young hitchhiker only a block from his son's fraternity house. This was the motorist's kindly custom — a "thank you" for lifts given his own son. The next day his naked, beaten and mutilated body was found in a bloody snowbank on a back road.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK Molded Vegetable Salad (Serves 10)

- 2 packages lime-flavored gelatin
- 3 cups hot water
- 2 cups thick soured cream
- 2 tablespoons vinegar
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 cup diced cucumbers
- 1 cup sliced radishes
- ½ cup sliced green onions
- ½ cup diced celery

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water; stir until dissolved. Chill in refrigerator until thick and syrupy. Fold in soured cream, vinegar and salt. Toss in vegetables. Turn mixture into oiled mold and chill until firm. Unmold on greens and serve with mayonnaise.

ahead of time and let stand at room temperature for about an hour. They'll blend more easily.

When making applesauce, do not peel apples since the skin contains vitamins and minerals. Apple skins are thin and will slip off easily when you strain the sauce.

Hull berries just a short while before serving. Before hulling, wash them thoroughly so berries don't become water-logged.

If you dislike scum forming on top of cocoa, beat the mixture when cooked with an egg beater. If desired, frost some marshmallows on top.

In areas near penal or mental institutions, a large proportion of all hitchhikers are escapees. Some of these places are marked for motorists' protection, but most are not. Drivers unfamiliar with the area cannot know they are entering a critical region.

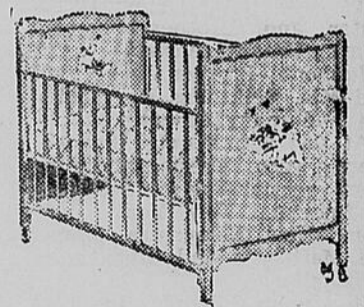

The St. Ignatius Guild - Valleyfield

(Note: The Editor is pleased to print herewith an article received from Mr. J. Atkins, Treasurer and Bulletin Editor of the Guild.)

Although Quebec is a Bilingual Province, it is elementary to state that not all of its inhabitants are able to speak the two languages.

This defect is really important form the point of view of Religious instruction.

The English speaking Catholics of Valleyfield however have not been neglected in this regard, because for several years past they have been very well served by the Rev. Canon D. Saint-Aubin, Pastor of the Church of the Immaculate Conception, in Bellerive, who made it a practice of reading the weekly notices and of giving a short instruction in the English language at one of the Masses each Sunday.

However, with the growth of the English Speaking population of Valleyfield, some few years ago there grew a feeling that the time had come when it would be to the advantage of all concerned if the English speaking members were consolidated into a separate group.

During the year 1943 the Rev. Canon Alfred Sauvé was approached, who, with his usual Missionary zeal took the matter up with His Excellency Bishop J. Alfred Langlois who readily approved of the idea with the result that the Crypt

of the Cathedral was placed at our disposal where Mass could be said and instructions and sermons given by an English

speaking priest. Thus the Guild came into being and a slate of officers (continued on page 11)

To me May is probably the most exciting month of the year and Maytime the grandest time of all to be outdoors. Those annoying insects of June and July are not yet present, the vacationists (who may be perfectly nice people, but who clutter up the landscape in vacation months) are still in the cities, nearly all the spring flowers are out, racing north after the retreating snows. Maytime's only flaw is that it is also the one time of the year when there seems to be an overabundance of chores that should and must be done before summer. If a fellow isn't pretty cagey first thing he knows he's making passes at the garden furniture with a paint brush, when he could be much more profitably occupied wielding a fly or spinning rod on his favourite lake or wading some quiet stream in quest of the ever wary trout.

Fisherman's Month

Ordinarily warm and pleasant as the beginning of summer, May can be a contrary month and sometimes turns disagreeable and makes itself obnoxious. However the important thing is that this is the month when the fish are striking as they invariably do in May, regardless of weather. May is pre-eminently the fishing month for everything but warm water fish such as bass and muskellunge. April starts the ball rolling but it really picks up speed in May. This

last week-end the weather by turning cold played right into my hands and it wasn't too hard to convince the wife it was far too early to take down the double windows, dig up the garden or do any outside painting and that the whole family would benefit from a week-end up north.

Had To Work For Them

The lake we were fishing was not large, about three quarters of a mile long and a quarter of a mile wide at its widest point. On the Saturday we systematically worked the shoreline with streamer flies and small spinning wobblers to find out where the fish were, at what depth and on what they were feeding. Opening up the first few trout taken showed us they were feeding on minnows. In fact some were so gorged on minnows that they spew up a couple or so during the process of being netted, which probably accounted for the fact that we really had to work for them.

Artificial Pay Off

Of twenty-five trout netted only one took live bait and that one a worm that our four and a half year old daughter, who gives every evidence of becoming as keen a fisherwoman as her mother, was drifting from the back of the boat as I worked-out a streamer fly. Streamer flies accounted for about two thirds of the week-end's catch, with the take equally divided over three patterns; the Perch Belly, described last week, the Spruce and the February Red Dazzler. The balance taken on spinning tackle, struck on a red and gold stickling wobbler and the Delphin Silver Smelt. There were no mosquitos or black flies and over the entire week-end we didn't see more than two fish feeding on the surface.

Poo Is Joe Boy

Of course, as any family man will quickly appreciate, on a junket like this this father is kept busier than a bee in a beer bottle, baiting hooks, retrieving lures fouled on bottom, giving casting lessons, fetching wood, lighting fires, bailing boats, even doing some of the cooking, that he's lucky to have time to wet a line himself. Just the same it's fun and there is the deep-down satisfaction of knowing that the kids are all the time storing up a fund of knowledge and experience that they can't get in any other way, all of ciation of a way of life that which combining to an approval, as they grow older be a source of solace in a world that goes crazier with each passing day.

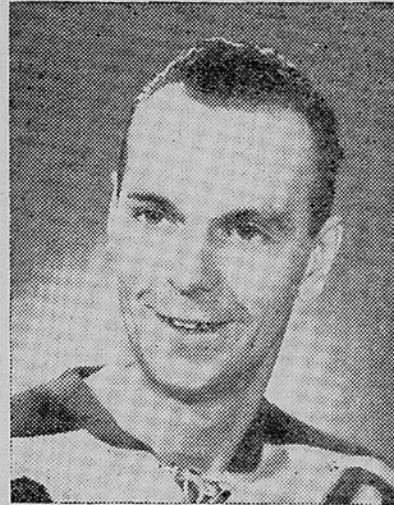
Good weather brings out the tennis sport in Valleyfield with the Knights of Columbus and Moco Club courts much in use these days. Dave White is handling the Moco Club and

Device No Larger Than Stamp Demonstrated to Engineers

Electrical engineers demonstrated before a recent meeting of the Institute of Radio Engineers a newly developed storage battery that is no larger than a postage stamp. The battery is no thicker than a cookie and is believed to be the smallest rechargeable battery in the world, Science Service says.

It weighs only one-sixth of an ounce. Its cells consists of zinc and silver oxide electrodes with one-fourth the ampere-hour capacity of a penlight battery that is sixteen times bigger.

The battery was designed by the engineers to power a secret defense device for the armed services. It may be used also in portable communication equipment, electric wrist watches and photography. It could operate an electric-powered watch for a year without being recharged.

(Continued from page 9) appointed under the Presidency of Mr. W. F. Tigh; and arrangements were made whereby we would be served by a Priest of the Redemptorist Order from St. Ann's Church in Montreal.

The first Redemptorist priest to undertake the Spiritual guidance of the Guild was the Rev. Fr. John S. MacDonald, C.SsR. As the members of this Order usually receive new appointments every two years we have been very well looked after by a series of Redemptorists Fathers since that time; our present Spiritual Director being the Rev. Fr. D. J. O'Donnell, C.Sc.R.

As mentioned above, our first meeting place was the Crypt of the Cathedral, but as our numbers grew this place became too small so that after a couple of years arrangements were made to have the Mass said in the Convent Chapel of the good Sisters of Providence, Rue de la Fabrique where the accomodation was everything that could be desired, and where Masses are presently said on the First and Third Sunday of every month at 9 A.M.

We also have a full week of a Parish Mission every year towards the end of the Lenten well attended.

A Monthly Bulletin is issued to all the Guild Members to keep them informed of all Religious and Social events in addition to other items of news of interest to the members.

The Guild is showing steady progress and at the present time we have upwards of 120 families who are members in addition to a number of other individual members.

An important adjunct of the Guild is the St. Ignatius School for the English speaking children of Valleyfield.

In 1951 an old School building situated in Bellerive became available, and a School, exclusively for the English speaking Children was organized. This School now has an enrollment of 120 pupils, under the guidance of Miss Mary Pease of Huntingdon as Principal together with a competent staff of teachers.

As there is a steadily growing number of applicants for the classes in this School and as the present accomodation is becoming overtaxed there is a growing demand for a new and larger School, and there is every reason to believe that this project will be realized in the near future.

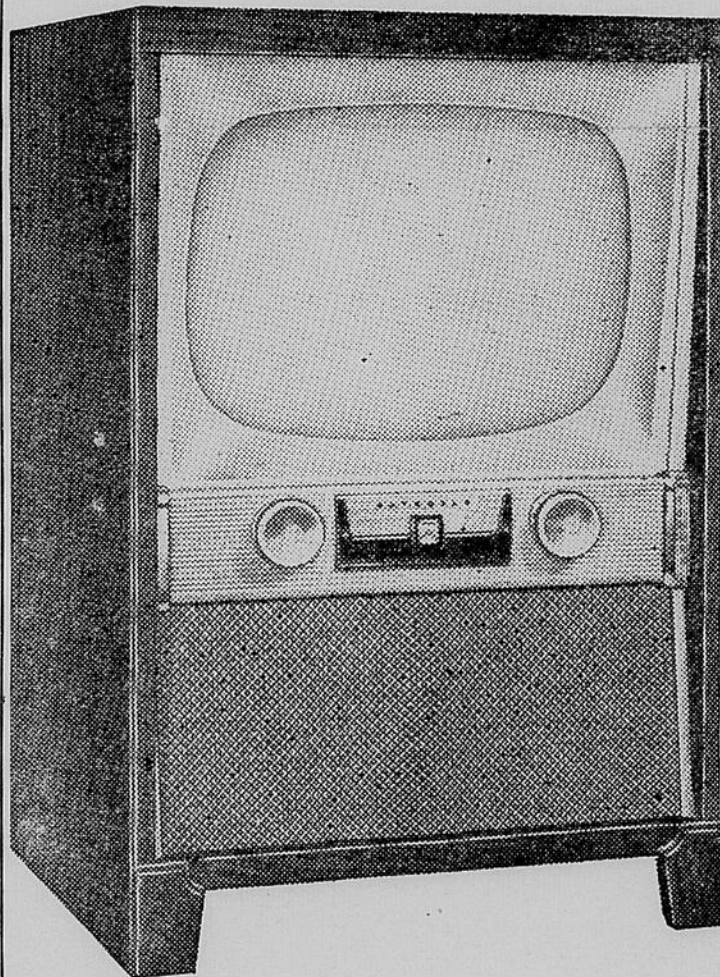

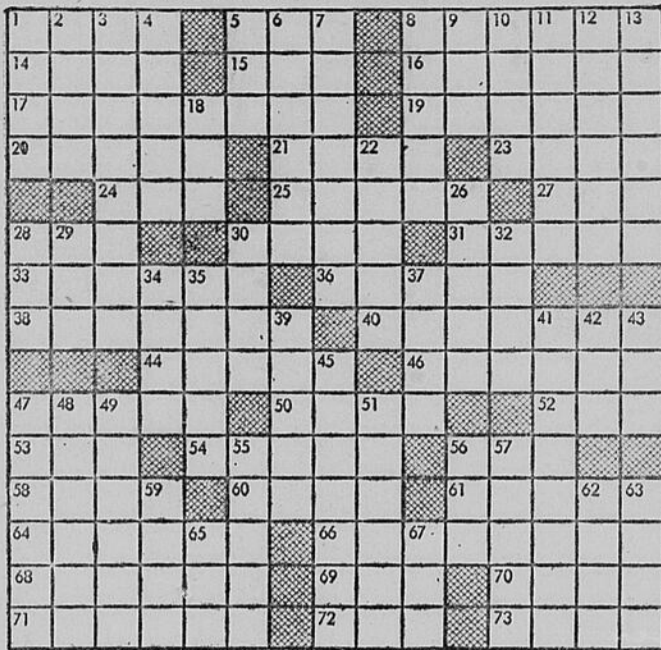

Tips for Your Garden

Many people are likely to take a second look at chemical soil conditioners this spring. It is fairly certain that those who try them will get something for their money this time.

Two years ago it was a different story for the good products were surrounded by vari-

condition of a problem soil has had no beneficial effect on the plant being grown in it.

Equally surprising are the instances in which a soil considered to be in excellent condition grew still more vigorous plants when treated with soil conditioner. These results are not the rule, but until they are amply explained, soil scientists are reluctant to make specific predictions of how plants will respond to a conditioning treatment. Blanket statements are difficult and risky to make, particularly where there are so many variable factors involved.

Labor Saved
But even if the plant does not always profit when the soil is treated, the gardener does. Properly conditioned soil is easier to spade, to rake, to weed and to water. The gardener who is accustomed to using liberal quantities of compost or manure to condition his soil is aware of the advantages of good soil structure and works hard each year to maintain a favorable phy-

sical condition in his soil. The commercial synthetic conditioner is intended for this same purpose, and usually does it remarkably well.

FAST COUGH—

When you cough you force air through the windpipe at a speed approaching or exceeding that of sound, which is 732 miles an hour at sea level. Experiments performed by Dr. Benjamin B. Ross of the University of Oregon's School of Medicine indicate that by the time the air reaches the level

of the Adam's apple, its speed has dwindled to hurricane velocity of about 100 miles per hour. When it blows out of the mouth the air is moving at fifteen miles per hour, a mere zephyr. A cough is over in one-tenth of a second.

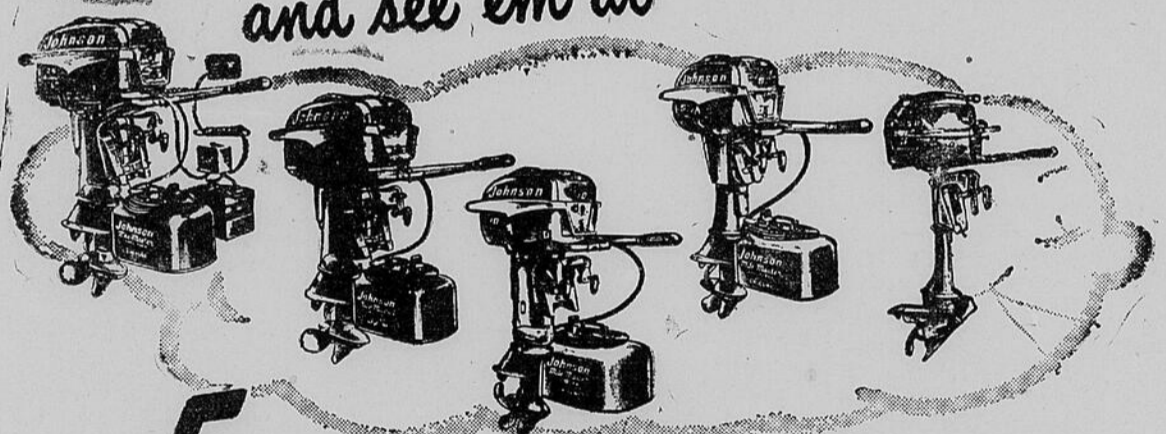
